"If you are the Christ," said the crowd to Jesus, "tell us plainly" (John 10:24). Has it ever occurred to you in reading the gospels how frequently Jesus seemed to resist all attempts to make him popular title of

Messiah (Christ)? Although he reject the titles that men gave him, neither did he seem anxious to claim them. In Rev. Althouse numerous occa-

sions when he steadfastly refused to discuss the matter. He seemed to have a definite aversion to telling people "plainly" who or what he was. The problem with names

One reason for his reticence was that certain religious factions had different expectations concerning these titles. For many, the designation Messiah meant a political or military leader sent by God to restore the Hebrew nation. Although Jesus seemed to the messianic expectation, he obviously had no intention of assuming either policical or military leadership. He believed he was annointed (what Messiah means) by God, but his understanding of his role and purpose was considerably different than what many people expected. He was therefore hesitant to use a title that conveyed the wrong expectations

Another reason for his avoidance of titles was that he did not want to be bogged down in theological dispute. A good example of how this could happen is found in John 10 where we find him referring to God as "My Father " (10:29). Immediately, his critics pounce on his words, say-

ing: "We stone you . . . for blasphemy; because you, being a man, make yourself God" (10:33). It is the word "Father" and the implication that Jesus is his "son" that is at the heart of their contention with him. Jesus attempts to show them in the scriptures that his use of the term is not blasphemy. but they are too immersed in their theology and doctrine to see his point.

Let me show you

Usually we find that Jesus refused to "tell" people who he was. Instead, he preferred to "show" them. For example, in response to their challenge to "tell us plainly," he says: "The works that I do in my Father's name, they bear witness to me" (10:25). Later, when they attack him, he says: "I have shown you many good works from the Father: for which of these do you stone me?" (10:32).

Jesus preferred not to get involved in theological and doctrinal dispute, but instead wished to let his works speak for themselves. So, once again, Jesus is emphasizing the fruits of his ministry instead of doctrinal words: "If I am not doing the works of my Father, then do not believe me, believe the works, that you may know and understand that the Father is in me and I am in the "Father" (10:38). Like Jesus, we would probably

be more effective in our discipleship if we did less telling and more showing.



Farmers Racing Flood Crest For Soybean Harvest

high pitch for the last sev days as farmers in low-lying are of the county rushed to be threatened flooding by the Miss sippi River.

95% complete. Applies Phosphate, Potash Perry Chisholm broadcast phosphate and potash on cotton and soy bean land last week and disked it immediately.

Fall application of these e ments can save valuable time i the spring, when planting needs to be done.

Experiments show little, if any difference in yield between fall-ar plied phosphate and potash, compared to spring application. Nitro gen for cotton will need to be applied within 30 days of, or at planting time.

Charles Gilliland, of Route Ripley, last week received result on four soil tests, all above pH 7. with high phosphate and low potassium levels. All that was recommended for his soybeans for the 1974 crop year was 40 pounds of potash. This can be quite a saving for him.

Farmers in the hills can benefit from liming acid soy bean land Adding lime alone to these low pH soils ups yields 14 or 15 bushels per acre, even where no fertilizer is used. The addition of molybdenum to soils low in pH will increase the yield, but over the long haul, lime will pay.

Farmers interested in soil tests can secure boxes at various locations and return them to the same location to be picked up and shipped to the laboratory. The cost of each test is 50¢. Soil is shipped through the County Extension Office at no cost. Results require two weeks.
