

### **TIME TO CHANGE**


Lesson for January 7, 1973

Background Scripture: Jeremiah 31; 32: 36-41.
Devotional Reading: Isaiah 55:3-11.

"I think the Lord just got my

attention!" These words suddenly came from a friend as he brooded over a stinging personal defeat. What meant was, not that God had

caused this defeat, but that in the



ing to get through Rev. Althouse to him: there were going to have to be some substantial changes in his life.

"I will forgive their iniquity..." One thing that was now for the first time very clear to him was that his pride had become a sinful, destructive factor. "Riding high," he had not been willing to see this, but now, his pride wounded, he realized that it had been a subtle but destructive force in his life. "Strange," he mused, "how blind I've been to it." This is the way it had been for

the people of Judah. Jeremiah the prophet had tried to make them see their need for repentance and change, but they had stubbornly refused to heed his warnings. Now, captives in Chaldea, God's message at least was beginning to get through to them. And the man who had correctly forecast their tragedy, now was bringing them a new message of hope: " . . . I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more" (31:34).

Sometimes we have to go through bitter experiences before we' begin to hear the message God has been sending to us: "Time to change!" "Time to change!"

"Upon their hearts . . ."

Jeremiah spoke of a "new covenant" which God would make "new covenant" would be a new relationship between God and his people. The old relationship ("covenant") had rested upon laws written on scrolls. Intended to guide the people in spiritual growth, these written laws were often broken, ignored, or twisted into insignificance. What God proposed now, said the prophet, was a new relationship based, not on written laws, but a new spirit within their own hearts.

This promise of a new covenant relationship also speaks to our needs today, too. No less than the people of Judah, we too are likely to drift into a weak, second--appearances of respectability, rituals, customs, churchisms, etc. -and miss that most necessary spiritual reality: the experience within. Thus, it is for us too that Jeremiah gives the promise: "And no longer shall each man teach his neighbor and each his brother saying, 'Know the Lord' for they shall all know me . . ." (31:34). Perhaps God is trying to get your attention, to tell you that it's

THE NEW COVENANT

Why don't you attend the annual feasts in Jerusalem as 1 quired by the Law of Moses? Why don't you offer animal sacrifiecs through a Levitical priest? Why don't you observe other rites and ceremonies of the Law of Moses? The answer to these questions is because that law was taken out of the way and is not binding on Christians, Paul said, "Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, which was contrary to us, and took it out of the way, nailing it to his cross." (Col. 2:14) In this passage, Jesus is pictured as nailing the law to the cross, hence, he took out of the

In the book of Hebrews, the superiority of Christianity over Judaism is emphasized, and one important theme of that book is the priesthod of Christ. The writer says, "For the priesthood being changed, there is made of necessity a change also of the law." (Heb.) 7:12). Of course, all Christians are priests today (1 Pet. 2:5), and Christ Jesus is our High Priest (Heb. 5:10; 6:20; 7:17). But notice that it was necessary to change the law. (Heb. 7:12). This change in a system of law or covenant was made known several hundred years before Christ came by Jeremiah the prophet. He gives prophecy in Jer. 31:31ff concerning such a change, which is quoted in Heb. 8:8-13.

As the late G. C. Brewer wrote, "the whole Jewish economy was polished, and a new covenant was given (Jer. 31:31-34; Heb. 8:13), a new man created (Eph. 2:14, 15), a new moderator enthroned Tim. 2:5; Heb. 9:15), a new priesthood ordained (Heb. 7:11, 12), 13:10), and a new and living way opened up (Heb. 10:19,20). ### THE PATRIARCHAL DISPENSATION

Paul said to "Study to show thyself a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." (2 Tim. 2:15). Many people don't realize that the Bible is to be "rightly divided," or as the American Standard Version renders this passage: "handling aright the word of truth."

A proper classification of the books of the Bible makes a study of the Bible easier. The Old Testament contains thirty-nine books which are grouped as law, history, poetry, and prophecy. The New Testament has twenty-seven books consisting of gospels, history of conversions, epistles, and prophecy.

Also, the Bible falls naturally into three great periods or dispensations of time, the first of which is the Patriarchal Age This period of time lasted from Adam to the giving of the Law of Moses at Mt. Sinai. The Patriarchal Dispensation has derived its name from the father of the family, since patriarch means father. Under this system, the patriarch directed the affairs of the family, both religiously and politically. He was priest, prophet, and ruler. God spoke orally or in visions to the heads of the family such as Adam, Enoch, Noah, Abraham and others.

The type of worship that God required during this period of time was simple. Also one outstanding principle which is emphasized in this early portion of Bible history is obedience to God. It is thrilling to read the early chapters of the Bible such as Genesis and Exodus, and one can also read of many heroes of this period in Heb 11:1-22. It should be emphasized that God blessed these men and women when their faith obeyed or became active. This principle of an obedient faith is stressed throughout the Bible (cf. Gen. 6:22; Heb. 11:7; Gal. 5:6; Heb. 5:8, 9)
