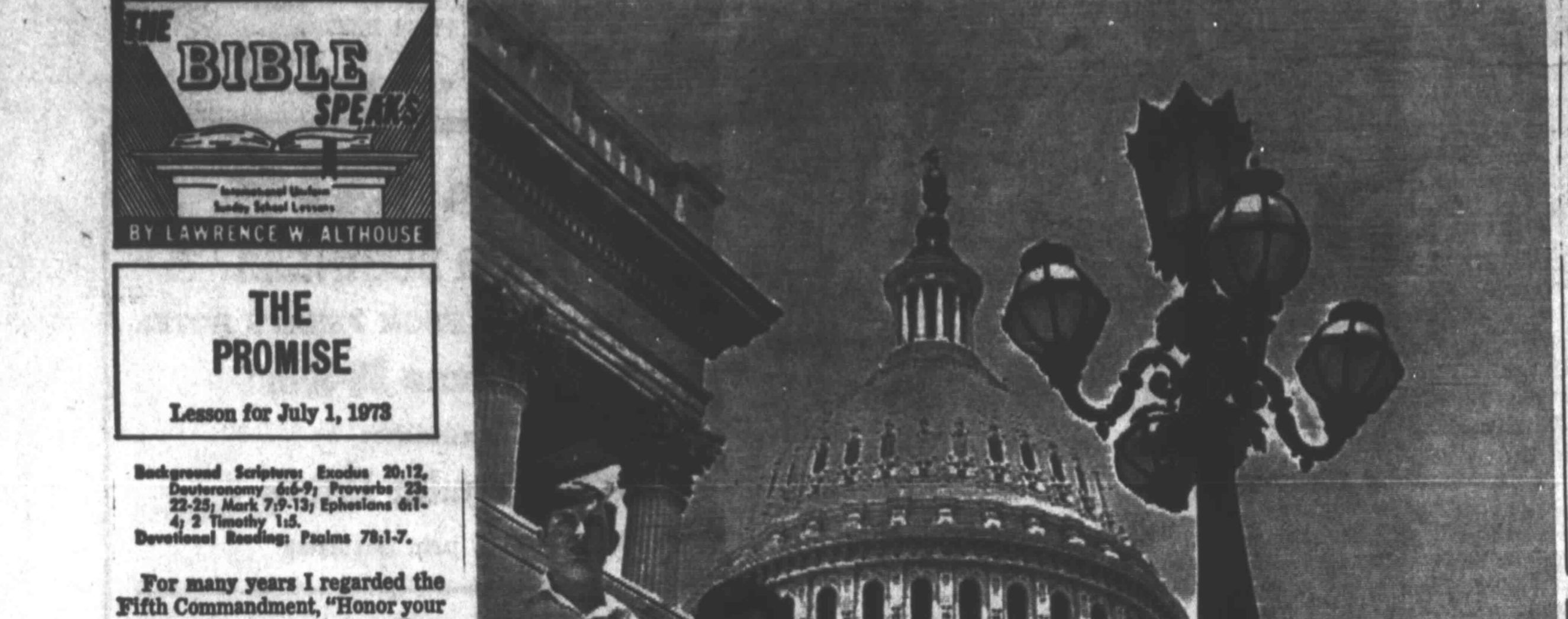

On the other side, he reminded motorists that it is their responsibility to drive with extreme caution to avoid the injuring of some child.

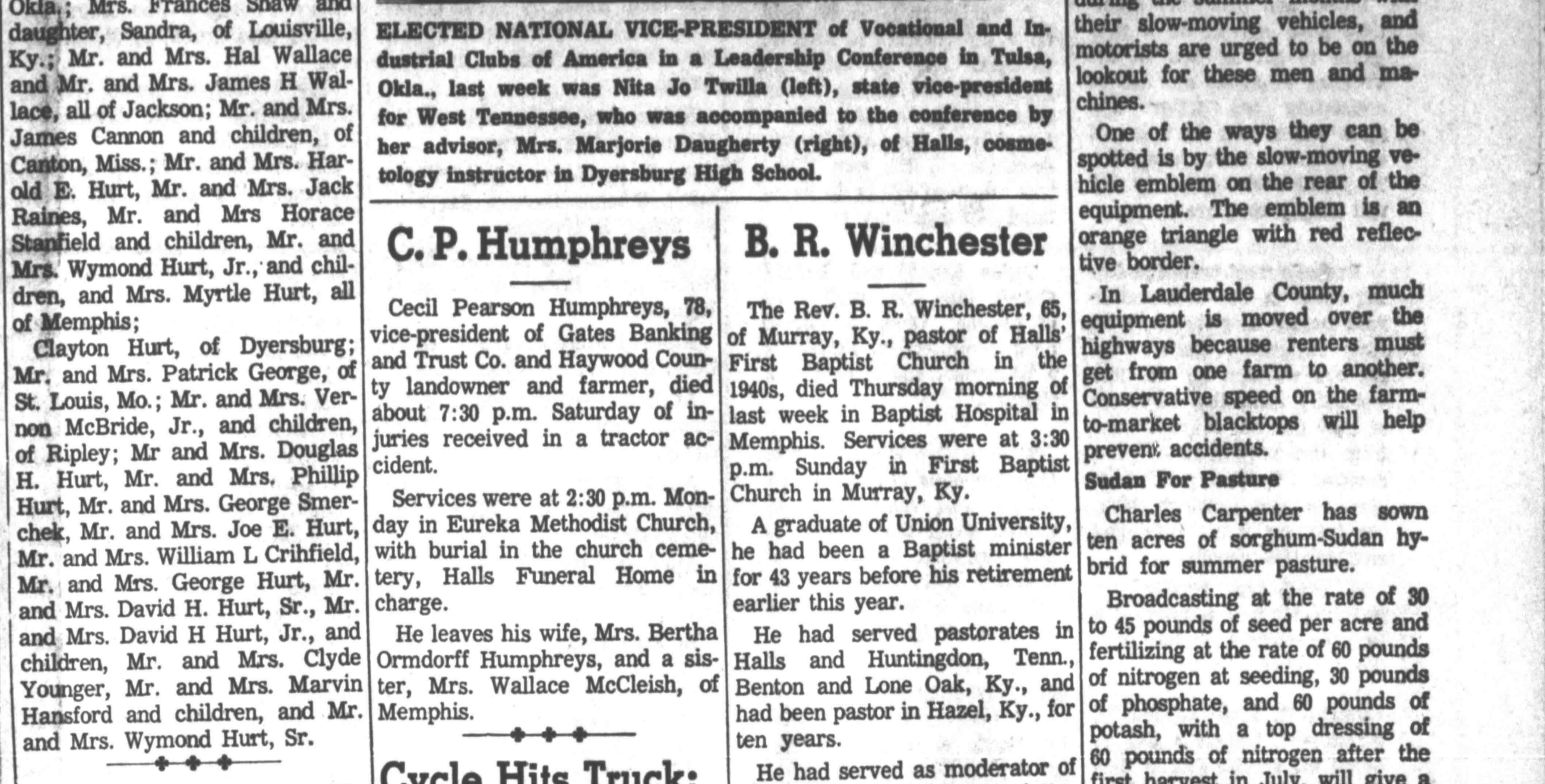

JESUS, OUR HIGH PRIEST

The Lord is not only exercising authority as God's prophet in this age, but He also serves as our High Priest. The writer of Hebrews states that "when he had by himself purged our sins" (Heb. 1:3). In purging our sins, Jesus was serving as our priest.

There are many references in the book of Hebrews to the priesthood of Christ. (cf. Heb. 1:3; 2:17, 18; 3:1; 4:14-17; 5:1-10; 7:1-28; 8:1-4; 9:11-28; 10:10-23).

Under the law of Moses, the priests were from the tribe of Levi, and the high priests were from the family of Aaron. These priests were selected and appointed according to God's law. They were men of infirmity and were required to "bear gently with the ignorant and erring," and they had to offer sacrifices for themselves and then for the people.

Christ Jesus could not be a priest while on earth because He came from the tribe of Judah (Heb. 7:14), but He was appointed as our High Priest "after the order of Melchizedec" (Heb. 5:6). Since Melchizedec appears in the Scriptures without genealogy, this means he had no successor and his priesthood was a type of our Lord's priesthood. Also, since Melchizedec's priesthood was greater than the Aaron priesthood, then it follows that Christ's priesthood is greater than Aaron's (Heb. 7:4-17). In these verses, it is also stressed that the "priesthood being changed, there

is made of necessity a change also of the law." (v.12). Our Lord's priesthood is also eternal (v.17) and unchangeable (v.24). Furthermore, Jesus "was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin." (Heb. 4:15) and thus, He is qualified in every way to be our High Priest.

"We ought to rejoice that the Lord is our High Priest, rather than one of the fallible men of the Levitical Priesthood. "There can be no doubt, therefore, that Jesus is eminently qualified to act as a merciful and faithful High Priest in things pertaining to God. For (1) He has received His appointment directly from God as did Aaron. (2) Being the Son of God He occupies a rank far above all created intelligencies; and is able to save to the uttermost all who come unto God by Him. (3) He has borne temptations, trials, and afflictions, incomparably greater than those endured by any other man. And hence He knows well how to sympathize with the afflicted, and how to support and deliver those that are tempted. (4) He had by his own obedience unto death learned the necessity of a strict compliance with all the requirements of the Divine Law and hence He knows how to support and save those that obey Him." (Robert Milligan).

It should be stressed in closing that all Christians are priests (1 Pet. 2:5; Rev. 1:5,6), and therefore, there is no need for any special priesthood.
