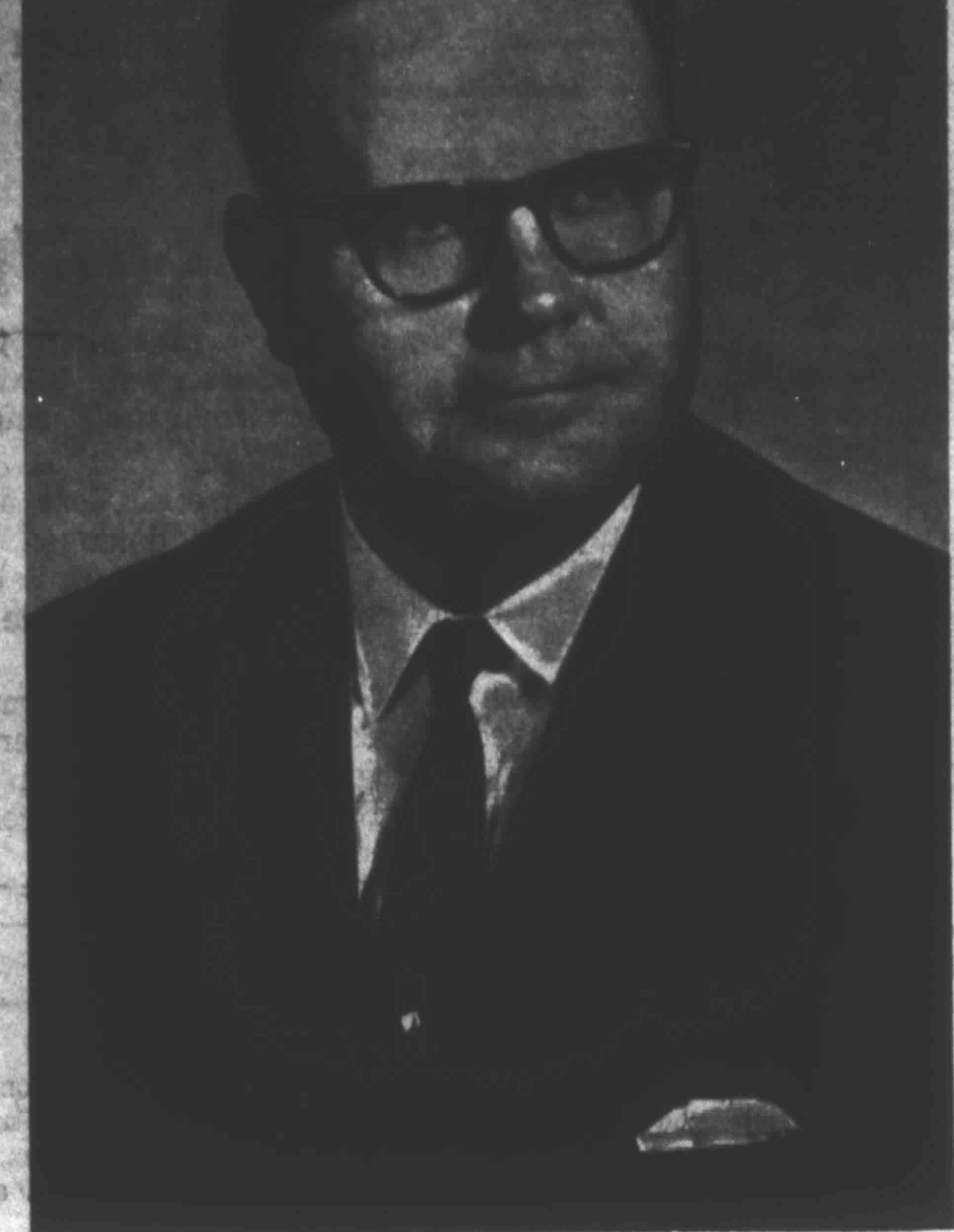

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1% Loans, \$5,000 Free Flood Aid Available

Flood victims in Lauderdale County whose homes or business were destroyed or damaged may apply to the Small Business Administration for loans at one per cent with the first \$5,000 a grant which will not have to be repaid.

Other benefits include temporary housing and unemployment compensation, retroactive to March 24th and until they can go to work.

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# Drug Addiction - A Community Problem

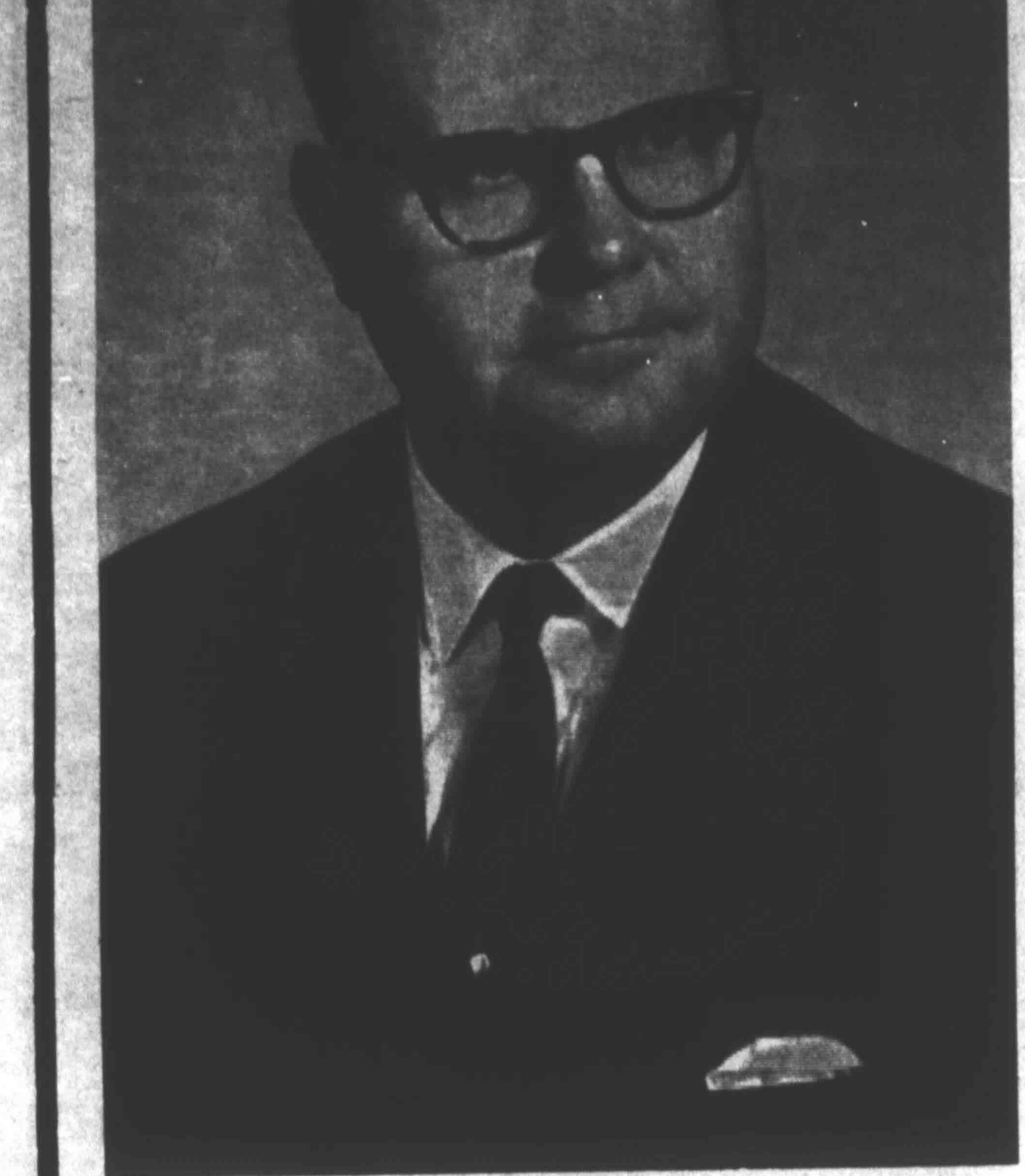
Happiness is certainly one of the primary requisites for the fullness of life, but it should never be sought as an end in itself. An elated spirit or mental state cannot long endure unless the basic human elements of self-assurances, self-acceptance, and personal esteem are present. Wise indeed is the one who learns early in life that there are no pills or magic formulas capable of producing such desired results.

Drug addiction is a complete denial of this rational, as well as Christian, philosophy of life. In one's haste for social acceptance on the part of his peers, there is the temptation to forget that artificial status soon begets short-lived composure.

Let each of us be aware that human problems are created by human situations. It is the ex-

ception when either good or evil is the subject of individual participation. Yet, this does not lessen, but strengthens, the need for proper personal conduct of each member of society. No matter what the contributing factor may be, one becomes dependent upon narcotics simply because he cannot live with himself as he is. Loneliness and drug addiction go hand-in-hand. Children seem to suffer most of all from this human evil. Much of this can be directly attributed to the fact that nearly 50% of all marriages are now ending in divorce. Children have strong capacities for re-adjustment, but when their greatest security is destroyed by one short stroke of the judicial pen, few priorities remain with which to fill the vacuum of rejection.

Drug addiction is a community problem; it must be treated as a community responsibility. The church has not been able to claim perfection in this area of concern. The pulpit is often at fault in that it finds wrathful condemnation more attractive than serving as an agent of reconciliation. Professional and social groups also must share the burden of rehabilitation of drug addicts, as well as create social conditions which discourage such practices. It remains evident that many individuals place a higher priority on a monetary fee than they do on human life and soul. In no logical sense can the conduct of the addicted be divorced by the addict. The drug problem, like any other private and public sin, cannot be properly dealt with on an individual basis. It is only as the public becomes concerned and involved can the conditions that aid and encourage human escape from reality be eliminated.

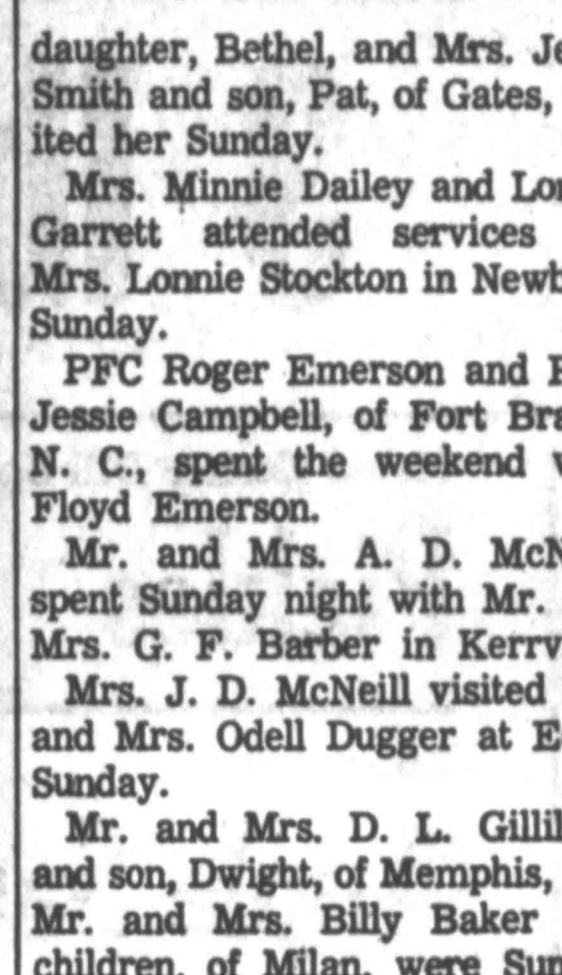

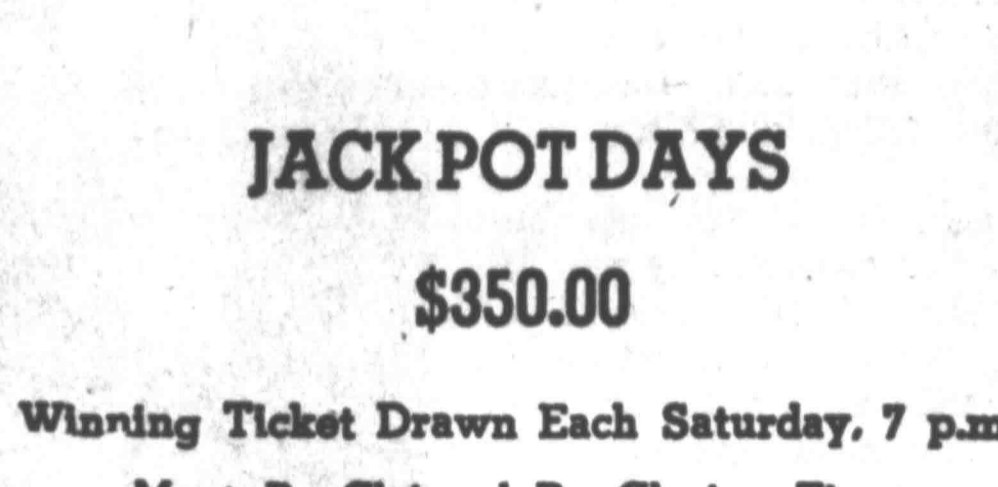

Temporary housing aid for those who had to move from their homes, and unemployment compensation for farm workers during this period, are aiding some countians.

A special fund is reported available through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service that will aid farmers in repairing fences and levees and removing debris from the lands.

Woods use water and fertilizer needed by pasture plants and also shade and slow their growth. Present cattle from grazing large areas.

Try moving half your pasture acreage first and mow the other half in late June or early July. Mow Bermuda pastures.

## Education And The Drug Problem

As a high school administrator, I am constantly aware that the drug problem is a serious one which can strike our student body at any time. The faculty and I always try to be conscious of any unnatural behavioral patterns of students which might result from the use of drugs.

Although the drug-misuse problem is usually thought of in connection with large population centers, evidence is accumulating daily which indicates that suburban and rural communities are beginning to feel the effects of drug misuse. But as familiar as the facts may be, we realize that so far we have failed to prevent the spread of this social ailment that has affected many of our children.

We as educators know the problems, but how do we reach the student for whom drugs is an enticement away from the painful prob-

lems of growing up? How do we communicate the information that tells of the realities of addiction and dependence without lecturing? How do we contend with and influence the pupil who has experienced what the teacher has only read about?

Through education I feel that the teachers in the various subject areas can help instill within the child who might be a potential for misusing drugs the dangers of drug usage. This can be done through class discussions, research and reading assignments, debates, guest speakers who represent a reputable agency or is someone who has dealt with some aspect of the problem successfully, and audiovisual aids such as films, filmstrips, tapes and records.

Since drug misuse is both psycho-social and medical in nature, careful planning on the part

of the teacher is necessary for it to be meaningful for the students. Second, you should be aware that in order to influence attitudes and affect behavioral patterns, it is advisable to use a variety of teaching methods. Careful, imaginative planning, and a flexibility that allows you to abandon your plans when necessary, are advantages in leading a drug-education program.

Our objectives should be to make young people aware that indecision and self-doubt are a natural part of maturing, but to-morrow's circumstances are affected by what we do today. We know that the use of drugs does not answer these problems, so we as educators must continually strive to instill these values in our students.

**THE SAVIOR'S INVITATION**

In Matt. 11:28-30, we have recorded the greatest invitation ever offered to man: "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." There are many rich and wonderful truths which are stated or implied.

It is implied that Christ Jesus is divine, the Son of God, and therefore, he has the right to issue such an invitation. It would be the very height of conceit and a gross indignity for some mere man to give such an invitation. Immediately, we would ask, "who are you? What right do you have to make such an offer?" But as it is, this great invitation is in harmony with the whole life and mission of Jesus.

In the final analysis, there are only two positions which can be taken relative to Christ. One is that he was a mere man, like the rest of us. And if he were indeed a mere human being, we ought to be able to excel him since we are two thousand years more capable of producing characters now than they were back in the first century. We have two thousand years' advantage in schools, libraries, means of communication, etc. Why can we not excel Jesus, if he were nothing but a man? At least we should be able to produce someone who would be his equal. The followers of Christ have been striving since the first century to produce characters like him, but even the best of them confess, like John the Baptist, that they are unworthy to stoop down to unloose his shoes.

The second position that one can take concerning Jesus is the true one, and that is, he was—and is—the Son of God. This accounts for his greatness, for his influence—for everything. This is it fitting and proper for him to extend the great invitation.
