# Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that "The Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law" as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court will be enforced throughout the county.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1974, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored

The law also requires that a certificate of rables vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rables vaccination is produced for each dog to be 1 ensed.

In order to help dogs owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$2.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.



Fortunately, the "circumcision party" did not prevail. The parochial spirit lost out for two reasons. For one thing, Peter re-minded the church that neither ircumcision or any other ritualistic practice is necessary for salvation, for the Christian is. "saved through the grace of the Lord Jesus . . ." (15:11). It is the love of God, not the parochial orthodoxy of men that saves the follower of Jesus.

Secondly, Paul and Barnabas told the church of the great works that the Holy Spirit had through them among the Gentiles. As Jesus himself had taught thes. As Jesus himself had taught them, it is "by the fruits" that we may judge what is of God's Spirit and what is not. Doctrines and creeds, regardless of how important they may be, are not the determining factor and we must remember that the paro-chial spirit can never be the Holy Spirit.

All dog owners are hereby notified that "The Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law" as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court will be enforced throughout the county.

All Dogs 3 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian

All Cats 6 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1974, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored

The law also requires that a certificate of rables vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rables vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dogs owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$2.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs with-





This is the portrait we find of Paul in Acts. It is almost a relief to find that this great Apostle was, along with everything else, a human being. This means that, despite his great work, Paul was sometimes inconsistent and subject to human weaknesses.

In Acts 15, for example, we find that he falls into a signifiworker and missionary, Barnabas. young John Mark in the mission Barnabas ' apparently disagreed and felt that Mark should given another opportunity. "Unlike Paul"

It seems 1 us are not always consistent not live up to the best that we ourselves to a party vote. know. Perhaps that is what happened with Paul in Acts 15. At any rate, he and Barnabas parted and, as far as we know, were never partners nor associates suited to do the job.

Later, in Acts 16, Paul again acts in a manner that seems contrary to what we know of him. 





# Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notifi ed that "The Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law" as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court will be enforced throughout the county.

All Dogs 3 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian

All Cats 6 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1974, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored

The law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is

In order to help dogs owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$2.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs with-






