Ward had been working on the house Tuesday, and Mrs. Reynolds, who is partially deaf, was at the home of her daughter, Mrs. James Davis.



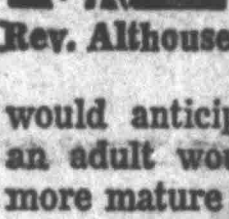
PRAYER FOR TOUGH TIMES

Lesson for August 4, 1974

Background Scriptures: Colossians 1:3-8, 23-27, 47-51
Devotional Reading: Matthew 5:13-20

A well-known corporation lawyer was overheard one night on a train from his Pullman berth: "Now I lay me down to sleep, I pray the Lord my soul to keep..."

There is nothing wrong with that prayer, except that it would seem that a Christian might be expected to grow beyond its simple requests. One is not surprised if a child is self-centered and simplistic in his prayers. We would anticipate, however, that an adult would have learned a more mature approach to prayer.

Always Thanksgiving
In Colossians Paul is writing to a church that is in danger of some kind. Its situation is precarious. The first chapter of this epistle is a good illustration of how a Christian can pray in times of deep concern and stress.

For one thing, Paul prays thankfully. In fact, thanksgiving is the one constant element in his prayers, regardless of how dark the situation may be. "We always thank God... when we pray for you" (1:3). Even when Paul is concerned about the dangers confronting the Colossians, Paul continues to pray thankfully.

This is the secret of Paul's effective prayer life: he always finds something for which to be thankful and by concentrating on his gratitude he opens up the channels through which God's grace will flow. Anyone can thank God when things are going well, but if we learn to thank him in tough times, we will find our prayers much more effective in the long run. God works best in thankful hearts and lives.

A prayer for understanding

One would expect, perhaps, that from thanksgiving, Paul would settle down in his prayer to ask for HELP! But Paul sees another petition as more important: "that you may be filled with the knowledge of his will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding" (2:1). Why would he pray for understanding God's will?

The answer is that very often, unless we understand God's will, we do not recognize the help he sends us. God always answers our prayers, but sometimes those answers come in forms that we may not recognize.

Paul makes a further petition "to lead a life worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, bearing fruit in every good work..." (3:10). Once again, Paul puts something else before sheer rescue. He asks that in the midst of this danger, the Colossians may conduct themselves in such a way that God is glorified in the sight of men. This was the example of Christ on the cross.

Finally, Paul asks, "May you be strengthened with all power..." (3:11). If we are not to escape the danger around us, it is more important that we find the strength from God, to see it through and emerge as victors rather than victims.

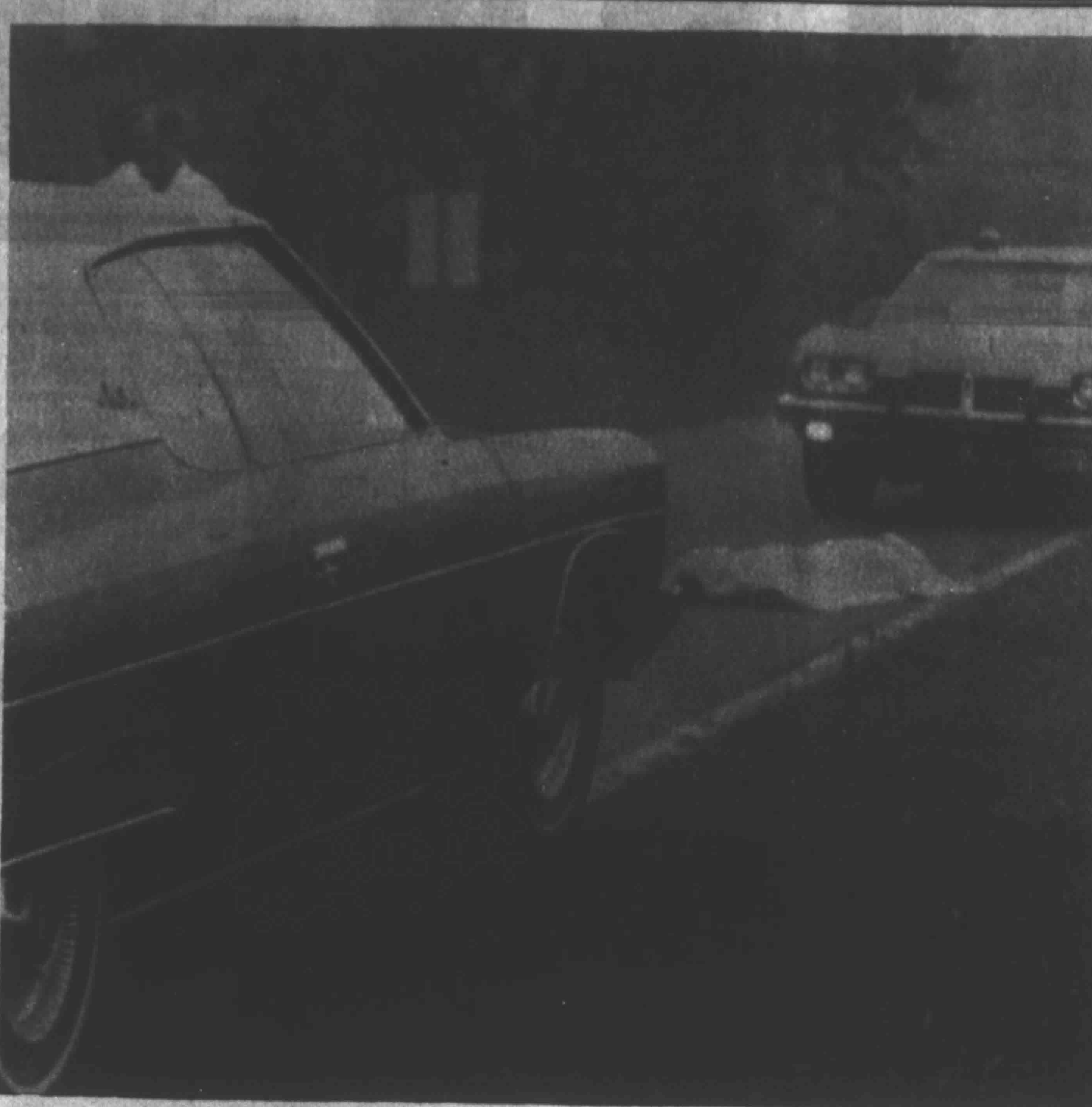

Koonce was employed by Chancellor Construction Co. in Memphis.

Services were at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday in Ripley Funeral Home, with burial in Grace Cemetery.

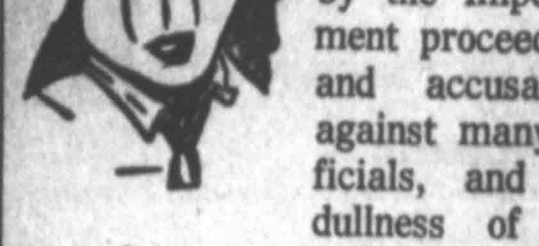

Damage to our nation, whether the fault of Mr. Nixon, the liberal element in government, or the so-called liberal news media, has reached almost the irreparable stage. The nation and Mr. Nixon both deserve better treatment.

17-Bed Nursing Home Addition Under Study

A Mid-South Medical Center Council committee, meeting at 4 p. m. Tuesday in Tipton County Hospital in Covington, will consider plans to add a second east wing, with 17 beds—seven 2-bed rooms and one room with three beds—to the Lauderdale County Nursing Home, between the present 43-bed building and Lauderdale County Hospital.

The Council is asked to endorse a certificate of need required for all new health care facilities. It has estimated the county will need 98 beds for nursing home care by 1975.

The proposal estimates the wing will cost \$189,300, and equipment \$10,200, plus the cost of a physical therapy department. Plans state the sum would come from general obligation bonds to be issued by the county.

Hospital laundry and kitchen services can support the additional beds without expansion, the proposal says, but nursing home staff would increase five persons, plus physical therapy manpower. The proposal says construction of the addition would not affect room rates.

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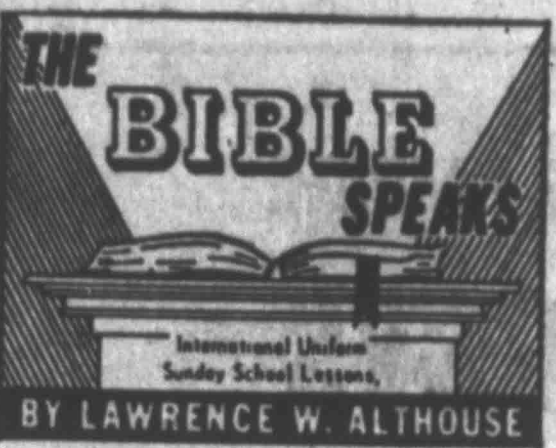

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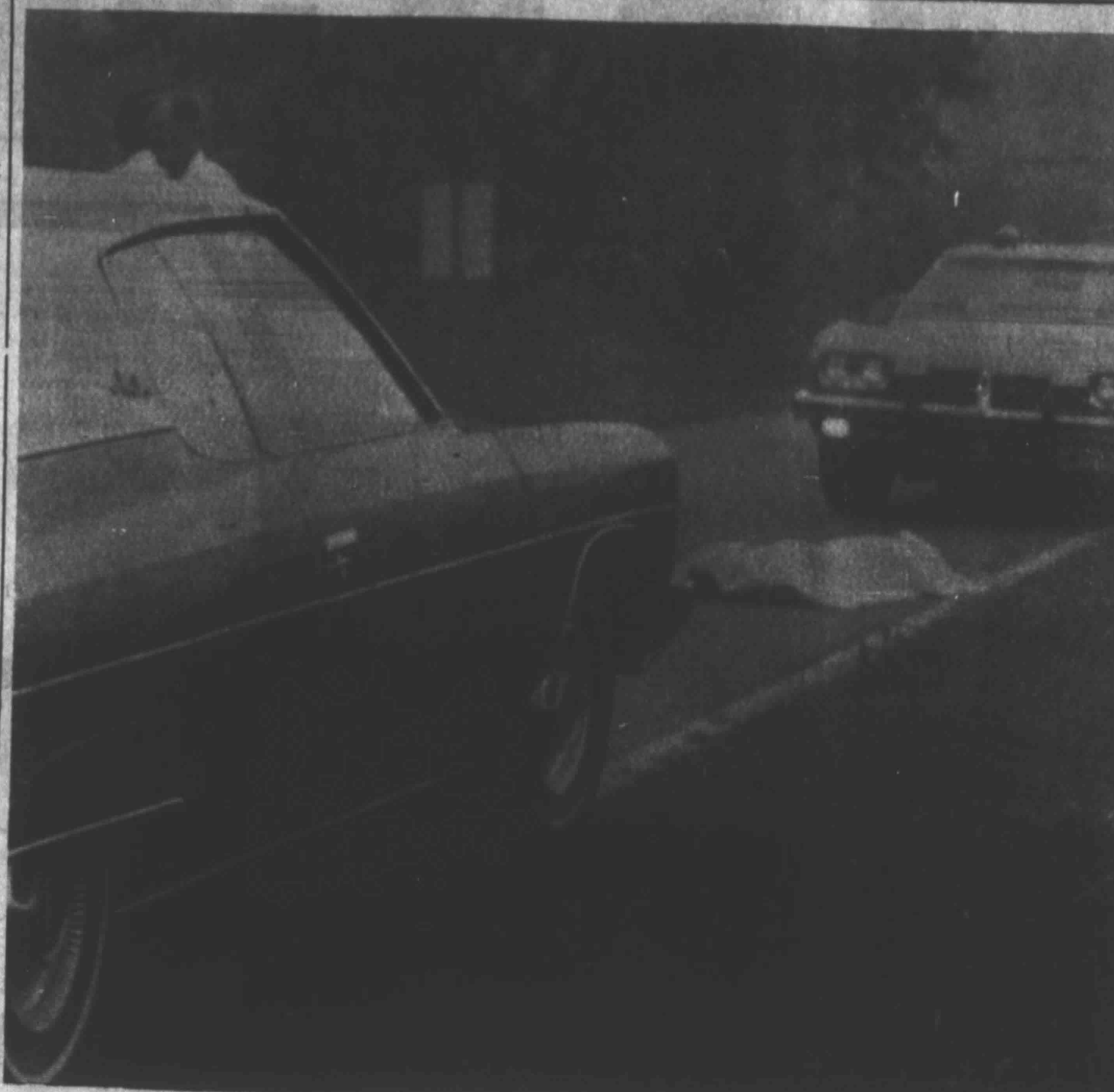

Corlew, Louis Craig, Norvell Win Office

All vote counts reported in last week's Enterprise edition mailed to county residents were certified this week in the official canvass, without alteration.

They made Jerry Corlew county judge with a narrow 175 margin over incumbent Paul E. Dew, and Louis Craig sheriff with a more decisive 582 majority over Billy Joe Childers in a 10-man free-for-all to succeed Lewis Gibbel, retiring after the 3-year legal limit.

Gibbel ran third in the race for general sessions judge in which ex-sheriff and later Petal Farm warden Willard Norvell unseated Odean Craig by 224 votes to gain a seven year term in a 5-way battle.

Four incumbents were re-elected: Trustee Paul Meadows, polling 587 more votes than Ella Mae Eason in their second consecutive confrontation; Register Nolan Carter and County Clerk Vernon McBride, Jr., with huge leads over their opponents and Circuit Court Clerk Don Connel, unopposed.

In the party primaries to name November candidates, the county went with state winners—Democrat Ray Blanton and Republican Law Alexander—for governor and helped U. S. Rep. Ed Jones swamp challenger Wayne Brown.

Though below predictions, first county-wide punch-card voting was fairly heavy, with 561 ballots cast. Computer counting went smoothly and was completed within two and a half hours after polls closed, with neighbor counties' results still uncertain as late as noon next day.
