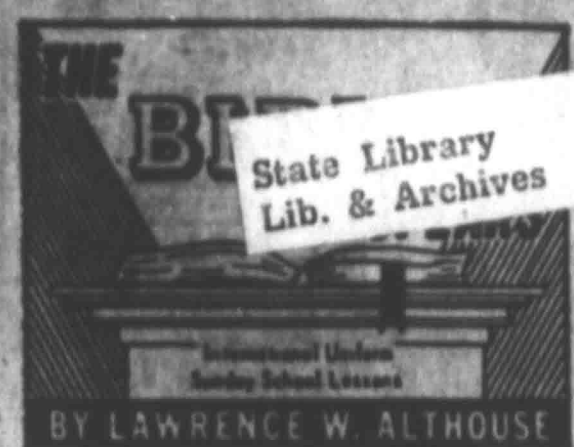

## BROKEN WALLS

Lesson for July 7, 1974

Background Scriptures: Ephesians 2:1 through 4:16  
Devotional Reading: 2:1-10

Jerusalem is today—and long has been—a city of walls.

Surrounding the "old city" are walls that, for the most part, were built by the Turks to keep out armies of the Western world. The Mosque of Omar, one of the world's great Moslem shrines, stands on the site of what was once the Jewish Temple. Its presence on this holy site serves as a constant and painful reminder of the walls that separate these two faiths.

### The Dividing Wall

The writer of Ephesians also speaks of a wall, "the dividing wall of hostility" broken down by Christ (2:14). This "dividing wall" is a reference to the wall that separated the Court of the Gentiles from the inner courts of the Temple that were restricted to Jews. A Gentile would be subject to instant execution if he were to go beyond that wall.

Today in Jerusalem there is a scale model of the city of Jerusalem as it was in the time of Jesus. Dominating the model city is the Temple and one can see the wall that separated the Jews from the Gentiles. Last November as I stood and studied that model, I remembered these words of Ephesians:

"For he is our peace who has made us both one, and has broken down the dividing wall of hostility. So, Jerusalem today stands as both the symbol of the walls that divide men from one another and also as a reminder of God's reconciling purpose for the world.

The writer of Ephesians speaks of the barriers that existed in his own day: "...remember that you were at that time separated from Christ, alienated from the Commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenant of promise..." (2:12). These experiences of separation, alienation, and being strangers are no less with us today in our own world.

**No longer strangers**  
This, however, is not God's will for men. His plan is to pull down these walls, bridge the gaps, overcome that separation and alienation, and reconcile us both to God and one another. It is his intention that those who are "far off be brought near," so that they are "no longer strangers and sojourners, but... fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God" (2:19).

One looks at today's walls and wonders how they can ever be pulled down. They are so high, so formidable, so resistant to our efforts. Yet, says Ephesians, Christ, the wall-breaker, is more powerful than man, the wall-builder.

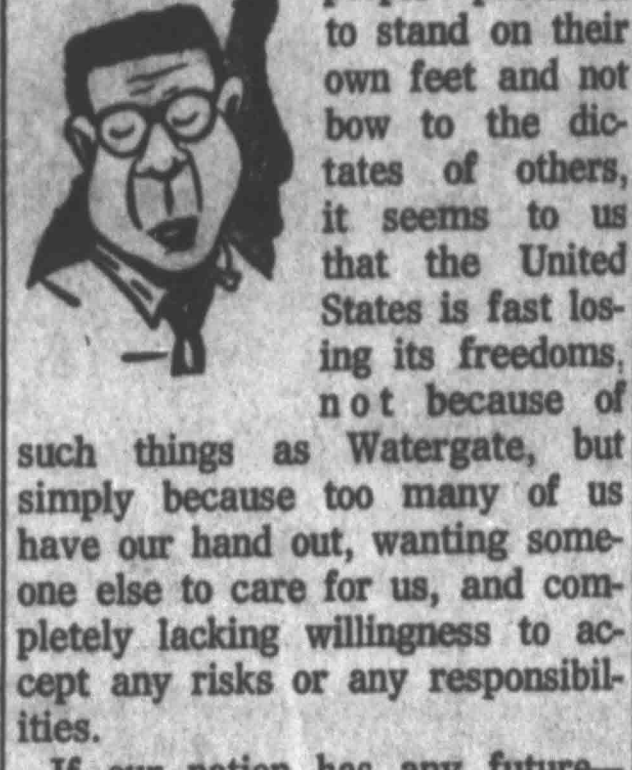
Mrs. Inez McGage, 98, of Gates, widow of L. S. McGage, died Monday in her home in Gates.

## Customers Picked Carmack Berries

Reg Carmack, of Curve, reports a successful strawberry season with his "pick-it-yourself" operation. Reg has operated this for several years and has learned many techniques which have helped make it a success.

Cavner Leggett, of Rosemark, formerly of this county, initiated this method in this area of the state.

Reg is renovating his berries by cultivating the rows between beds and thinning the plants on the beds.

Application of 30 pounds of nitrogen, 50 pounds of phosphate, and 25 pounds of potash will promote quality plant production in preparation for next year's crop. A further application of nitrogen in August will keep the plants growing strong.

Renovation should be completed this month.

Joe Burns, Extension pasture agronomist, suggests that mowing weedy pastures now can prevent or slow weed seed production and remove the mature forage, which will allow the plants to produce new tender regrowth.

Weeds use up water and fertilizer which are needed for pasture plants and shade pasture plants, causing slow growth.

These ideas especially apply to fescue and ladino pastures, which have been unusually good up to this time.

## Cattle Testing Used

Vernon McBride, Jr., has had his herd of Angus cattle in the Performance Testing Program of the University of Tennessee for more than seven years.

This program is designed to make it possible for a cattle producer to know which cow in his herd produces the heaviest and fastest gaining calves, so he can save the best heifers and most desirable bulls for breeding animals.

He can also determine the cows which do the opposite and should be culled from the herd in order to improve the average performance and make the most efficient use of feed and management.

Vernon, Jr., has an excellent system of identifying the cows and bulls and the calves they produce.

## Control Potato Sprouts

Two new chemicals are available to control sprouting of Irish potatoes. One is maleic hydrazide, applied to the vines when the tubers are well set. It is sold as "De-Sprout" and "Sprout Stop."

The other material, called "Sprout Nip," is to be applied after the potatoes are dug and placed in storage.

This material is normally sold in aerosol cans.

## Ruling For Union Vs. Custom Craft

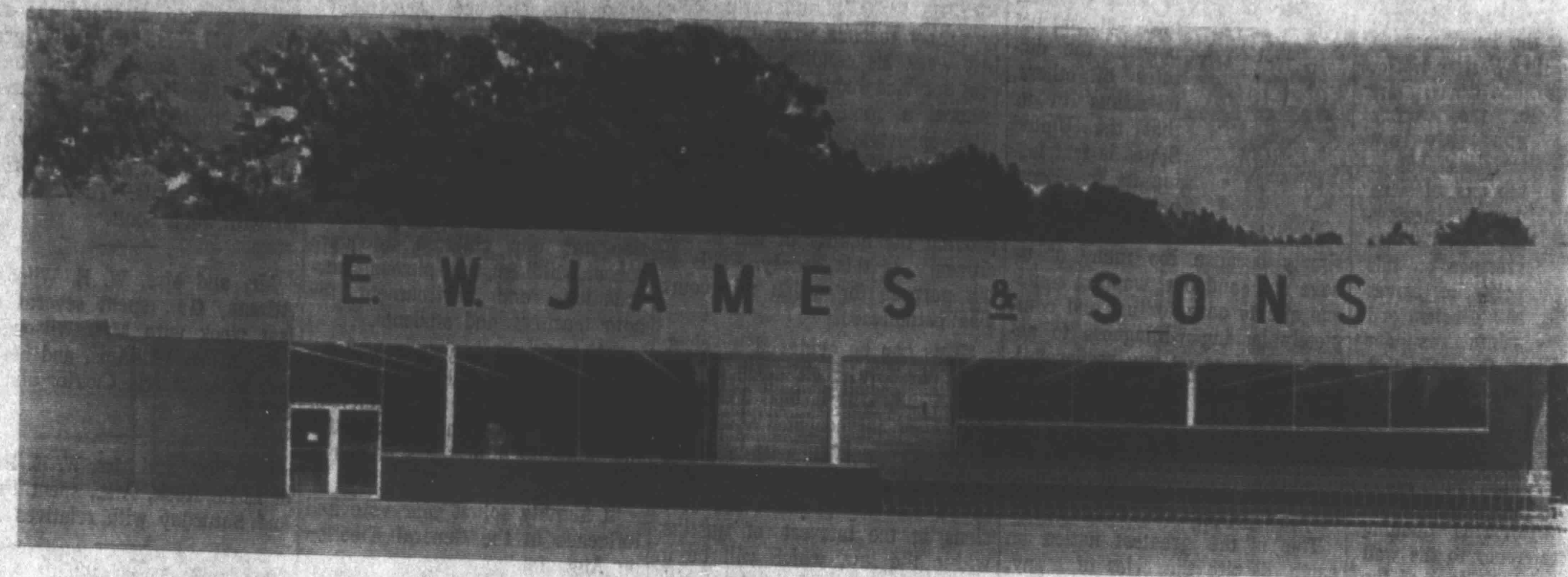

Dew Wins Big Jump In Revenue Sharing. An appeal to the Treasury by County Judge Paul Dew has won for Lauderdale County more than \$100,000 in additional federal revenue sharing funds for the first year of the program and thus more than half a million dollars in all. Dew, working with the University of Tennessee's County Technical Assistance Service, convinced the Treasury it was basing its payments on erroneous data. Quarterly payments have increased from \$38,000 to \$49,000. Dew says the funds are being invested until used by County Court. He says idle county funds earned more than \$22,000 in interest last year. D. W. McKinnis, Jr., executive director of the County Services Association, said in Nashville that Dew's success in appealing the Treasury computation "will benefit the people of Lauderdale County for years to come." "Judge Dew was in the forefront of the fight for property tax relief during the last General Assembly," McKinnis added, "which resulted in more than \$35,000,000 in state funds being returned to local governments to help stabilize the property tax rate." 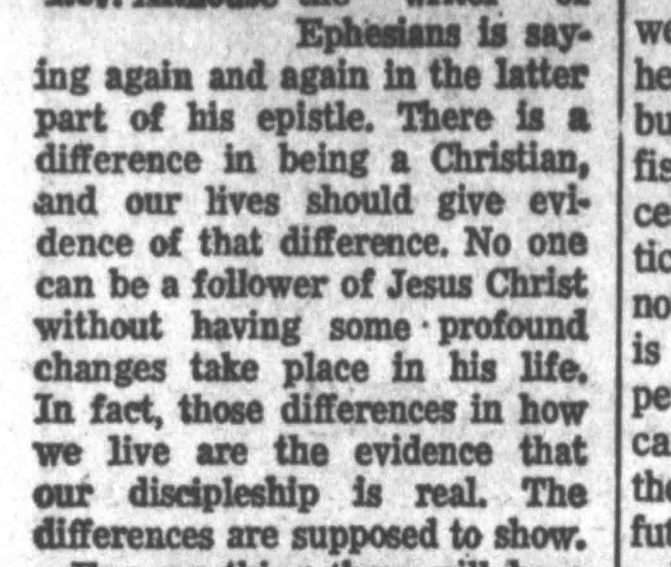

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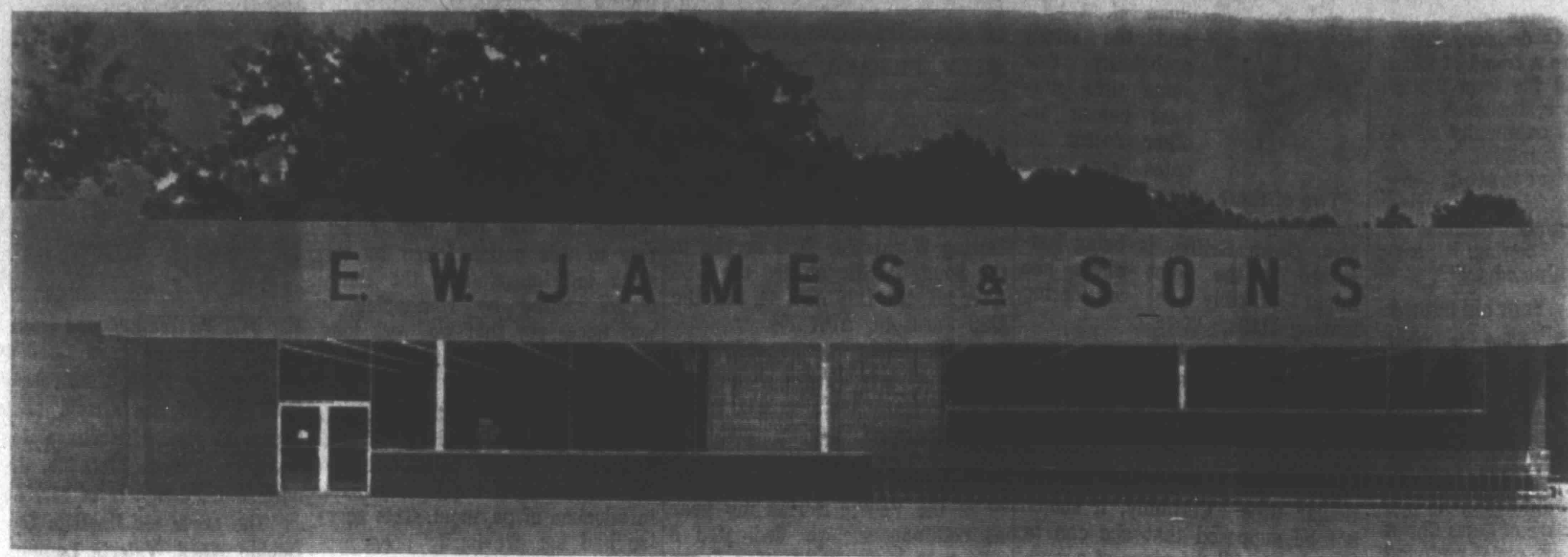

**Times And Summer Make Ethrel Test**

Pete Tims and Jimmy Sumner cooperated in an experiment using the chemical Ethrel to ripen green, mature tomatoes within five days after they were sprayed. This material was sprayed on the lower fruit clusters of 40 feet of rows on Monday, June 17th, near noon. By the weekend, large tomatoes were ripening to the point they could be picked. Mature fruit on the rows adjacent to these were still fully green. This hormone defolates the section on which it is sprayed, so that it appears struck by early blight. Small, immature tomatoes are not affected. Ethrel can mean better color and flavor.

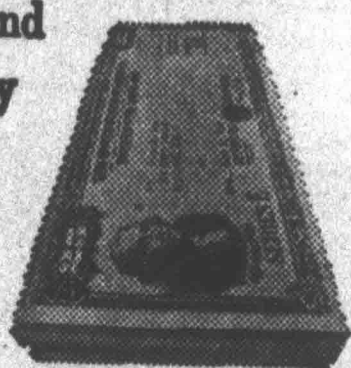

Lesson for July 21, 1974

"That is none of my affair." That is frequently the response of people who feel that they should not become involved in something that affects someone else. Another way of putting it is: "I mind my own business."

"No man is an island." John Donne thought otherwise and we all know it. He said: "No man is an island, no man is an island, no man is an island." We may think of ourselves as islands, but we are not. We are part of a larger whole.

For one thing, he says we have a "partnership" in the gospel. We share the responsibility for the gospel because we have first shared the benefits of the gospel. Paul reminds the Philippians that they are "all partners with me in the gospel" (1:7).

Paul speaks of still another kind of partnership. Referring to his hardship in prison, Paul says: "It was kind of you to share my trouble" (4:14). It is likely that the Philippians church had sent Paul some money during his imprisonment. Paul's response was to share the money with the church.

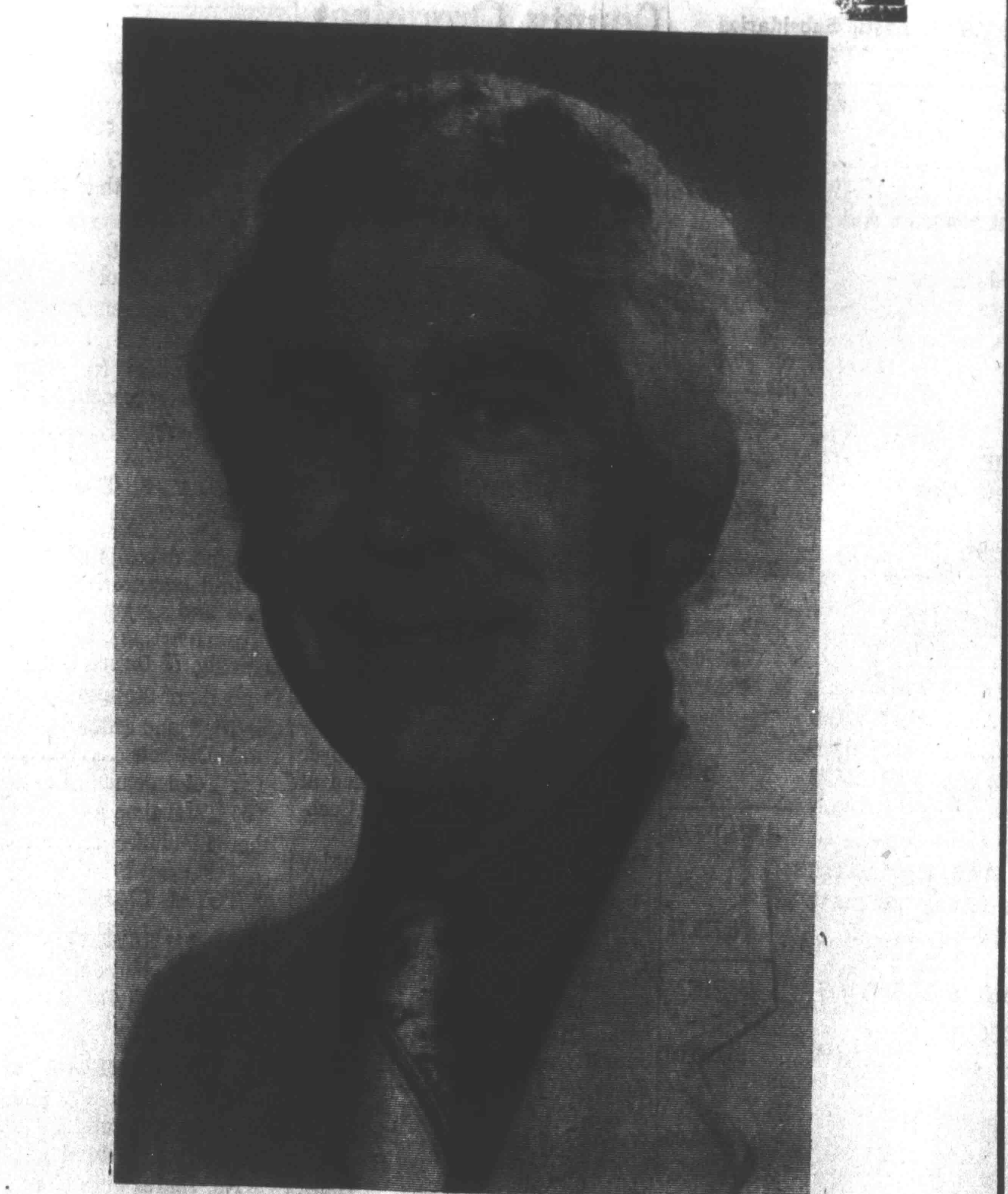

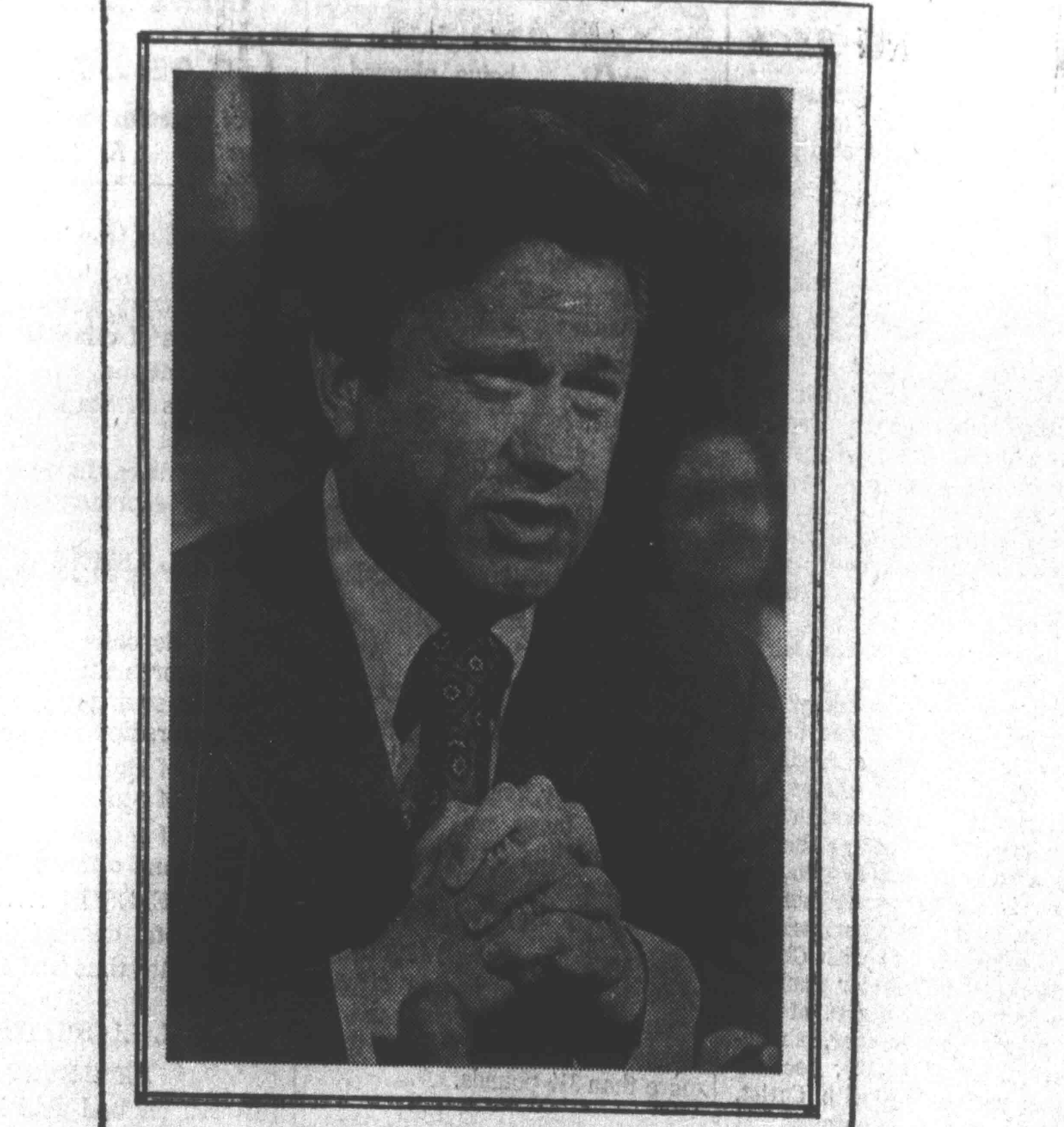

The Sheriff is obligated to serve every citizen of this county fairly and impartially, whether they are white, black, rich, or poor; he is obligated to employ and maintain a good department; he is responsible for patrolling every road in Lauderdale County; he is responsible for the jail, its upkeep, and the prisoners; he is obligated to sit down with you and discuss your problems; he is obligated to see that every public business in this County is safe and decent for anyone to patronize if they desire; he is obligated to set an example for the rest of the people to follow. I believe I can meet these obligations.  
 I don't believe that a Sheriff or any Deputy is any better than anyone else, but they should be respected, but the only way they are going to be respected is to earn that respect.  
 I have four years experience as a Deputy Sheriff and 22 years experience in working for the public. I believe this should qualify me for Sheriff.  
 I believe the next Sheriff will need four requirements: a little education, a little experience, a lot of work and a lot of just plain common sense.  
 As I have stated before, there are a lot of people in this County that wonder why I want to be Sheriff. My answer is, I want to work for all people of Lauderdale County, whether they are black, white, rich or poor, and help make our county a better place to live.  
 I do not want any money from anyone while I am running my campaign or any money other than my salary and expenses if I get to be Sheriff. There have been a few people who have asked me if I would live in the jail if elected Sheriff. My answer is yes.  
 As most of you know, I own a construction company. If I am elected Sheriff, my brother will run the company and I will run the Sheriff Department of Lauderdale County. My obligation will be to serve the people of Lauderdale County as Sheriff to the best of my ability.  
 I have not made, nor will I make any promises other than that I will try to make them a good fair Sheriff. I will not be obligated to any one individual, or any particular group, but I will be obligated to serve everyone in this county to the best of my ability.  
 There are some changes that I would like to see made in the present system that will require co-operation of the Sheriff, General Session Judge, and County Court members. I believe that the Sheriff Department of Lauderdale County needs recognizing from Jailer to Radio Operator.  
 I believe that Lauderdale County should have a full time black Deputy Sheriff, because I feel that the black people of this county deserve to have someone to work with their families, their religious meetings, and businesses. I believe this is needed for race relationship. I believe that there are times when some black people will talk to their own race when they wouldn't talk to a white deputy or to the Sheriff.  
 I would like to see all deputies that are capable of making arrests to have uniforms on and be in marked cars with proper lights and emblems. If I am Sheriff, I will ask the County Court to approve three full time deputies and three part time deputies. I will ask for each full time deputy to have a car furnished by the county.  
 I would like to see some type of program put forth in which we would try to educate our children against using dope and really concentrate on catching the person or persons who are bringing narcotics to our county and selling it.  
 Some of the people are saying that I don't need to be Sheriff because I have a business and I am making a good living. My answer is, when you vote for a Sheriff, you are hiring a man to run the Sheriff Department of your county; this office should be run just like any business. Which man would you hire to run your business?  
 I would like to ask all candidates for Sheriff one question: Do we want to be Sheriff to help make Lauderdale County a better place for ALL to live, or do we want to be Sheriff for the money that can be made?  
 I realize that at this stage in any campaign, there are always a lot of false rumors going around. Friends, I have nothing to hide from anyone, and anyone that has any question about my life or business, don't be afraid to ask me.  
 I believe there is only one thing that you can make a man or woman out of, and that is love. Let's get together and give them some proper guidance in the next two years.

THE GOAL Lesson for July 23, 1974. Background Scripture: Philippians 2:13. A mother sent her little boy to the store for some groceries. Much later, the little boy returned empty-handed. 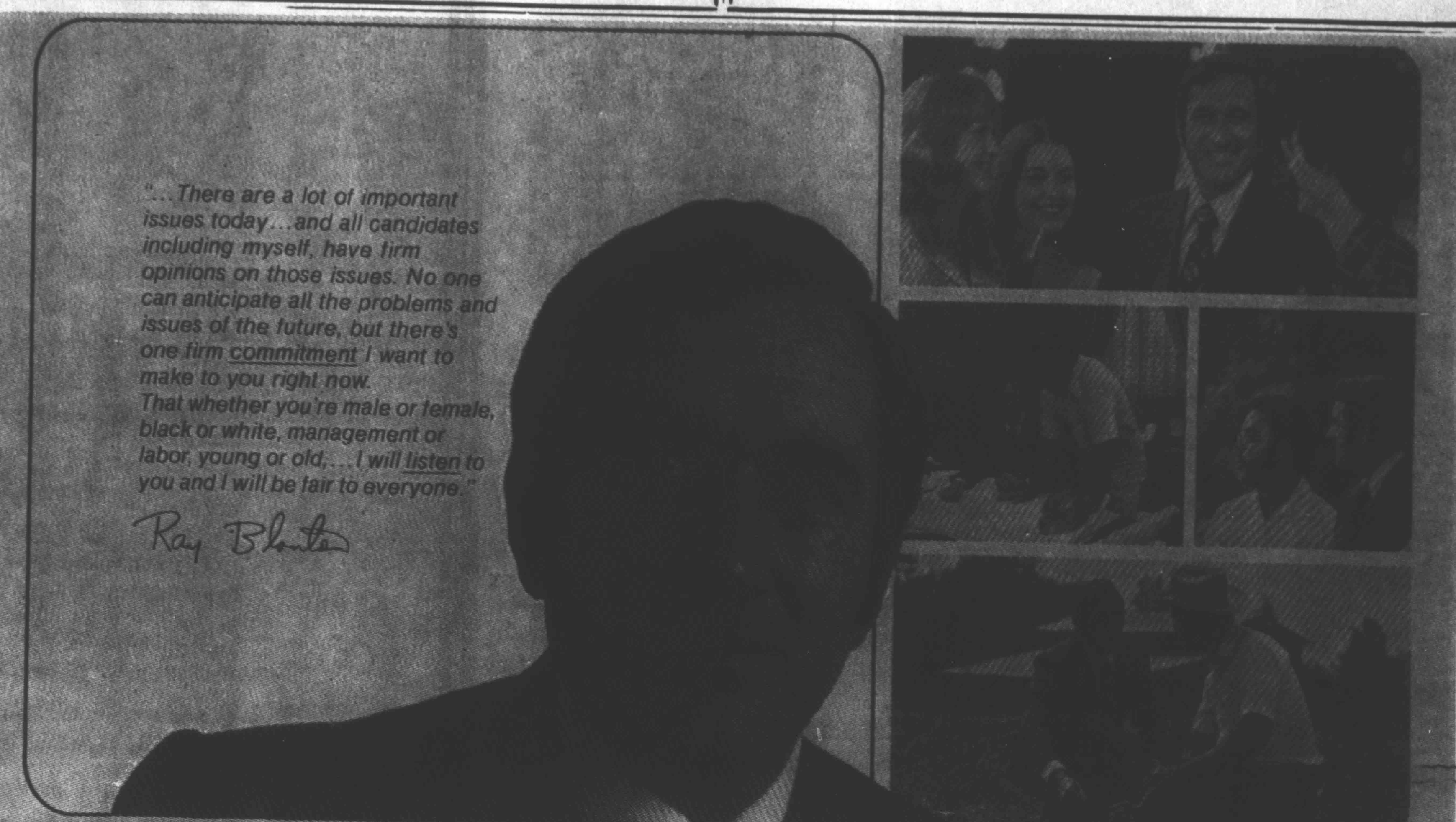

Ray Blanton on the issues:

Ray Blanton has studied carefully the issues affecting the citizens of Tennessee. 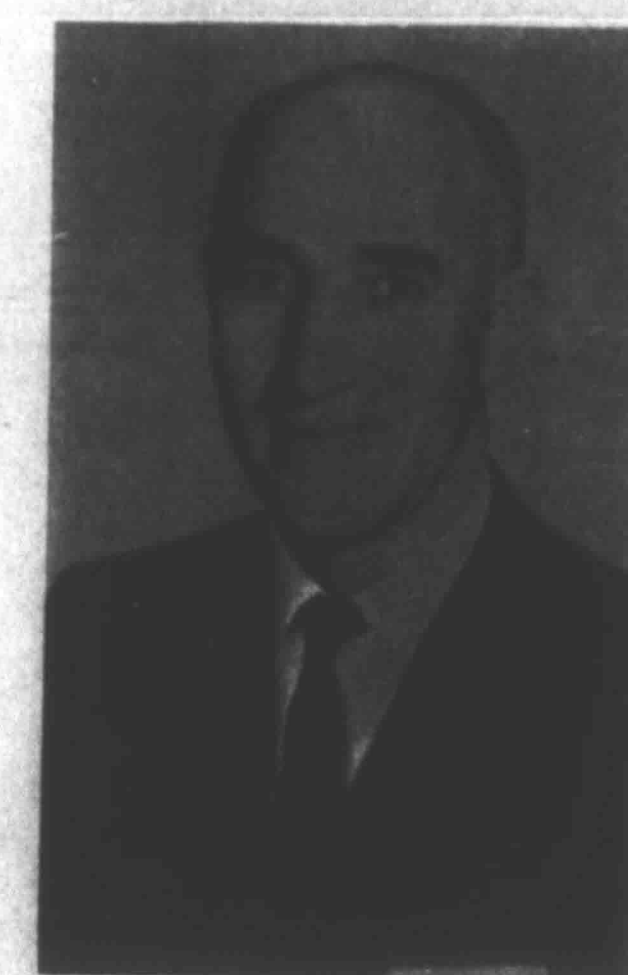

# ONE Man Can Make A Difference

## ATTORNEY

The duties of the County Judge that required an attorney were removed in June of 1973 to the Chancery and Circuit Courts. The primary duties of County Judge now are business administrator and Juvenile Judge. With this change, it is imperative that the County Judge be a dedicated, full time administrator.

At the present time, when items that require legal assistance occur, a local attorney is hired to handle these matters. During the May term, the County Court made plans to hire a County Attorney after the election regardless of the outcome of the election.

## Juvenile Judge

Serving as Juvenile Judge is a very important part of the duties of County Judge. In this court, we are dealing with the most important assets that we have, our young people. The highest moral and ethical standards are my goals in conducting the business of this court. This is the only way that the court can earn the respect of the youth of this county as well as the confidence of the adults.

Many citizens are alarmed at the rapidly increasing drug problem in Lauderdale County and the apparent lack of concern on the part of some officials. This is a very serious problem and it will be my policy to work closely with other enforcement officials and deal fairly, but firmly in combating this problem.

## Fiscal Responsibility

The administration of the business and fiscal affairs of the county is a demanding duty of the County Judge. The County's business is everybody's business.

I promise to be a full time Judge, with no outside business interests to take my time and attention away from the duties of this office. It will always be my policy to get a dollar's value for each dollar of the taxpayer's money spent. I will not play political games with your money, but will base my judgments on what will be best for the citizens of this county.

## ANOTHER LOOK AT THE RECORD

The present Judge has taken credit for saving the county several thousands of dollars by investing county funds. In the most recent copy of the Audit Report for Lauderdale County, the County Judge is called a "Fiscal Agent," and the following report was filed:

"During the 1972-73 fiscal year Lauderdale County received \$21,673.87 from the investment of life county funds. It should be noted, however, that our examination of official records revealed that an uninvested cash balance in excess of \$529,000.00 existed at the beginning of the audit period. The uninvested cash balance exceeded \$600,000.00 for several months dur-

ing the year under audit and totaled \$447,726.53 on June 30, 1973. Had the investment program been expanded during the year under audit to include the major portion of the uninvested funds, the earnings would have been increased considerably. The investment program should be designed to have the maximum amount of cash invested at all times." (p.5)

As County Judge, I will work closely with the Finance Committee, the Trustee, and the County Attorney to insure that this county receives the highest legal interest for money invested, and the maximum amount of cash will be invested at all times. On pages 7 of the same Audit Report, the recommendation was made that a system of purchasing be established in order to insure that all of the County Departments obtain the lowest and best prices on all purchases. Many citizens agree with this point, and as your County Judge, I feel that this matter should be carefully studied and considered by the County Court.

Also, I will work energetically in seeking State and Federal funds, which will benefit the financial situation of our county. This is a very important decision that you will make. Your choice will serve as County Judge for the next eight years. I ask you to weigh all of the evidence carefully. I humbly solicit your vote and support.

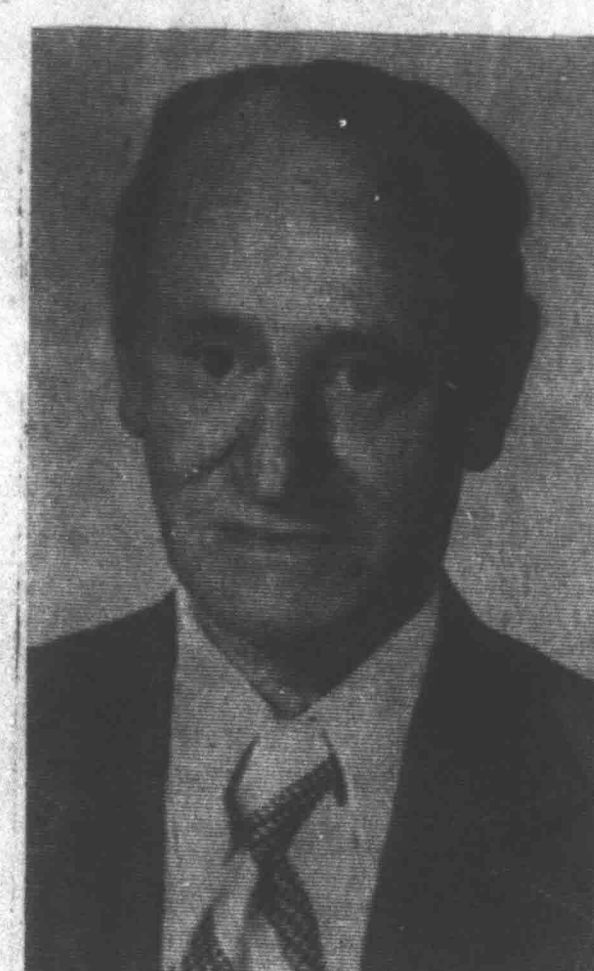

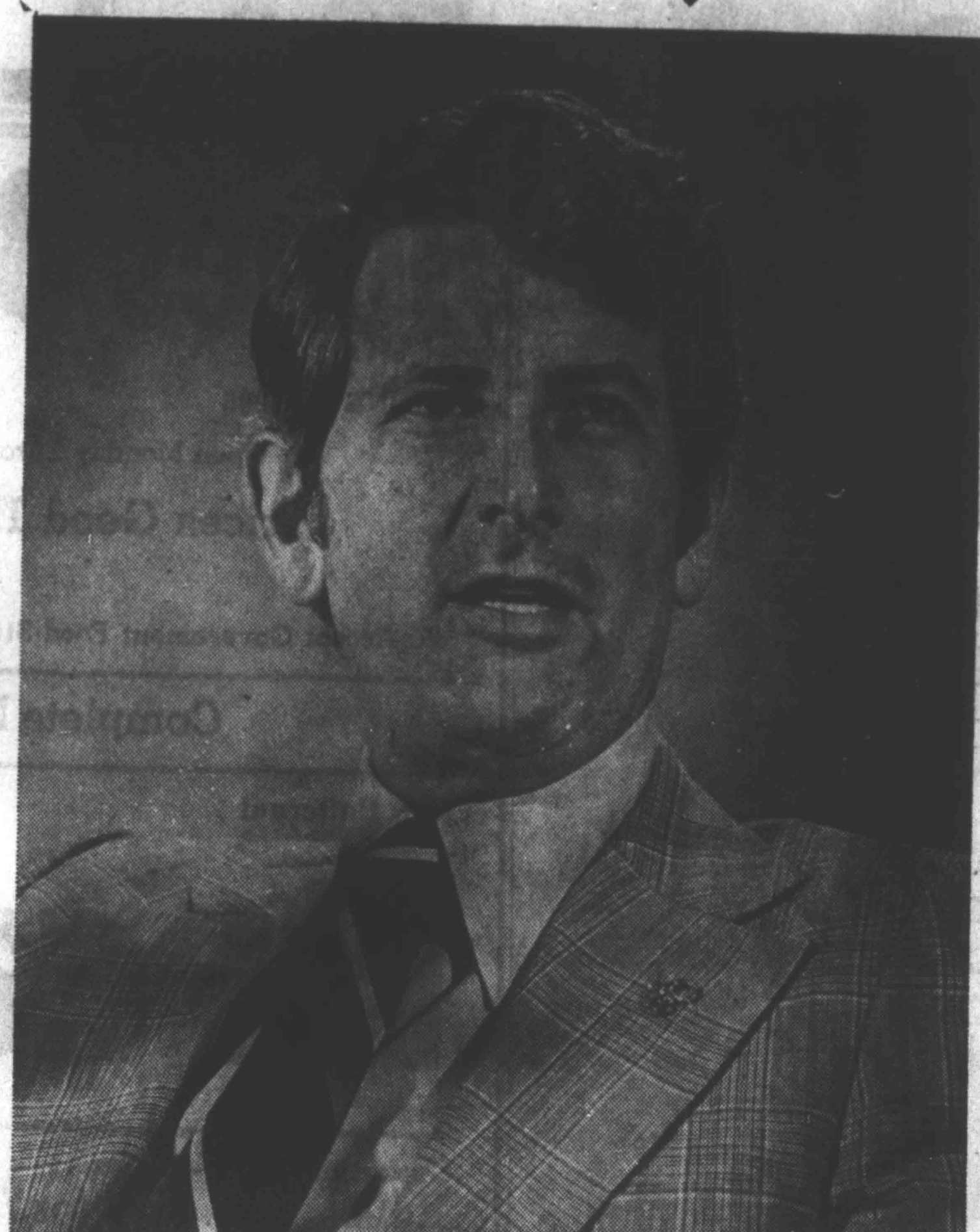

### INFLATION

I believe the governor of Tennessee can fight inflation. I believe he must, because inflation is eating the very heart out of America. I would clamp down on the runaway spending in state government which has contributed to inflation here in Tennessee. And, I would work to see that we make the best use of the tax dollars we are getting now, so that we get a dollar value for a dollar spent. Industrial development can help alleviate inflation in Tennessee. I would work to bring clean industry to Tennessee, the kind of industry that provides meaningful jobs and good incomes for the people, without polluting our environment.

### INTEREST RATES

The root cause of inflation is the high interest rates on loans and rampant spending. And the eastern financial establishment is lobbying to raise the rates even higher. As Governor, I will exert the influence of the Governor's office, in Washington to get the interest rates rolled back to a liveable level, and to hold the line on the cost of money, so builders can build, and buyers can afford to buy homes, cars and the necessities of life.

### CRIME CONTROL

The crime rate is climbing in our cities and spreading beyond the suburbs into the countryside. While there are no quick solutions, we can begin with more citizen involvement in the problems of law enforcement. We need neighborhood watch programs to teach people how to prepare against potential crime. We must provide job opportunities and educational opportunities. And, in our law enforcement offices we need good leadership and adequate funding for salaries, personnel training and equipment. We need an attitude of respect for enforcement of the law.

### PENAL REFORM

We cannot afford to release unrehabilitated prisoners to commit another crime to society. Our prisons must become places in which rehabilitation can occur because, in one way or another, society pays the bill for the way our prisons are run. Right now the bill totals \$3,700 a year for each of the 3,400 prisoners in Tennessee. Counseling in prison, in-prison and out-of-prison work programs, the teaching of skills and the proper transition

into society can greatly reduce the rate of return to our prisons and can convert convicted criminals into useful, contributing members of society. We must separate the first offender from the hardened criminal.

### REORGANIZATION

The effectiveness of government decreases as the bureaucracy increases. And good communications between the governor and his staff bog down in sheer numbers of people and committees.

I believe we need a total reorganization of state government to make it more functional, more efficient and more responsive to the people. We need to study our boards and commissions and combine or eliminate wherever necessary to avoid duplication of functions and to increase productivity.

### POLITICS

We have endured much in the way of bad roads, inferior educational system, lack of health care, rising crime rate, while the old line politicians have played their political games. I think it is time for some aggressive new leadership, leadership that is not tied to any past administration or political faction to start working to make Tennessee a better place to live.

### HEALTH CARE

Eight counties in Tennessee have only one doctor for every 6000 people. Five counties have no dentists and fifteen lack even a single general hospital bed. As governor I would work with the medical leadership in Tennessee to develop improved health services in our rural areas and small communities and to attract medical and para-medical personnel into these areas where they are so desperately needed.

### SCHOOLS

The Tennessee school system is rated 44th in the nation,

sixth from the bottom. That's not good enough. We must make education the top priority of state government. We need to insure that our young people who want to go on to college can have that opportunity. We also need to provide career oriented education in our high schools, so that we can provide our children with meaningful job skills, not just diplomas.

### TVA RATES

The price of power in Tennessee is one area in which we must be especially vigilant. We must not allow the utility rates to place a burden on the working man. And we must maintain a favorable rate structure if we hope to attract new industry to Tennessee.

### INSURANCE REFORM

If we do not move quickly to enact our own insurance reform, the federal government will thrust a national program upon us. I would like to see Tennessee have the option of tailoring a modified no-fault insurance plan to our own specific needs. I believe we can do so in a manner that would be most beneficial to the consumer, and still protect the right of the injured victim in an automobile crash to sue.

### ETHICS

We must produce legislation that will require the publishing of campaign contributions and expenditures. We must not allow the opportunity for large, secret campaign contributions which may be paid off by successful candidates with state contracts. I have and will continue to disclose my campaign contributions voluntarily this year because I believe it is time government officials came out from behind the cloak of secrecy.

### WASHINGTON ADVOCATE

We need a full-time representative in Washington whose sole responsibility is to analyze and coordinate funding and programs and channel them into the cities and counties of Tennessee. There are many federally-funded programs from which we could benefit if we could be made aware of the availability and the requirements. These represent funds our taxpayers have paid in to the federal government, and I would work to see that Tennessee gets its rightful share.

### TOGETHER, WE CAN MEET THE CHALLENGE

I want you to stand with me now, in this campaign, so that together we can have the opportunity of effectively meeting the challenges facing Tennessee. I will need you throughout my administration, working with me, to see that the government in Nashville is representative of all of the people of Tennessee. 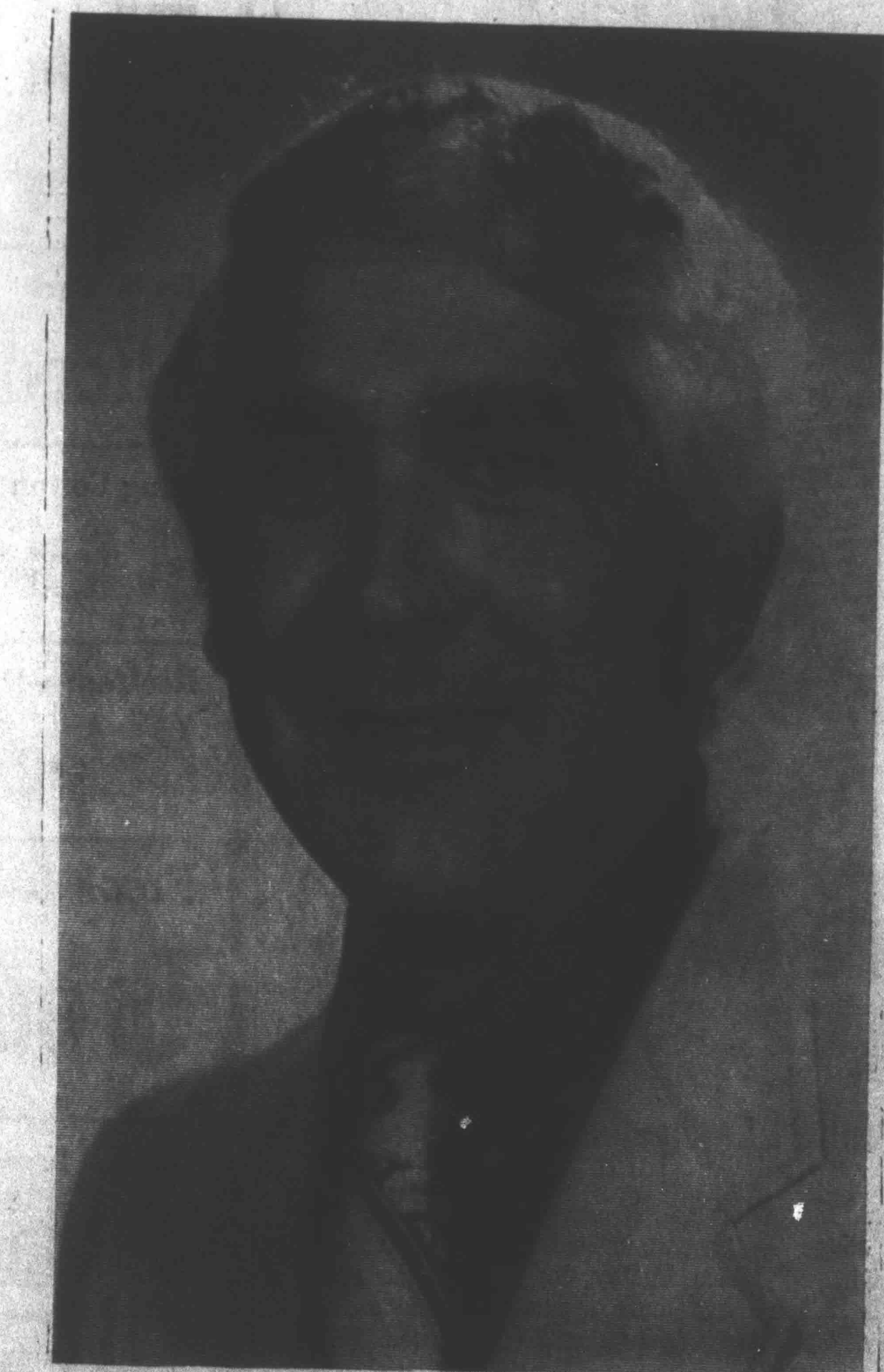
