

For he is our peace who has made us both one, and has broken down the dividing wall of So, Jerusalem today stands as

both the symbol of the walls that divide men from one another and also as a reminder of God's reconciling purpose for the world.

The writer of Ephesians speaks of the barriers that existed in his own day: "...remember that you were at that time separated from Christ, alienated from the Commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to (2:12). These experiences of separation, alienation, and being day in our own world. No longer strangers

This, however, is not God's will for men. His plan is to pull down these walls, bridge the gaps, overcome that separation and alienation, and reconcile us both to God and one another. It is his intention that those who are "far off' be "brought near," so that they are "no longer strangers and sojourners, but . . . fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of

God" (2:19). One looks at today's walls and wonders how they can ever be pulled down. They are so high, so formidable, so resistant to our efforts. Yet, says Ephesians, Christ, the wall-breaker, is more powerful than man, the wall-







THE USE OF ILLEGAL DRUGS IN LAUDERDALE COUNTY

Drug abuse is the use of drugs without the advice and supervision of a physician. Drug abuse has become a serious problem in our society. "Officials of the National Council For the Prevention of Drug Abuse believe that the rate of drug users in some high schools may be as high as fifty per cent of the student body," said Good Housekeeping in June 1969.

One drug that is commonly used in this country is marijuana. It is commonly called "pot," "grass," or "weed." The use of marijuana is often the first step on the drug ladder. Dr. Gabriel Nahas said, "There is ample evidence that many occasional or intermittent users of marijuana turn into abusers of multiple drugs or of heroin," said Mid-South Magazine, April 7, 1974.

There are some who try to justify the use of marijuana by saying that it is no worse than alcohol. But the truth of the matter is that alcoholism is the No. 1 drug problem in this country. Also, there are some who mix certain drugs with alcohol, which makes for a more dangerous situation.

TVA RATES

The price of power in Tennessee is one area in which we must be especially vigilant. We must not allow the utility rates to place a burden on the working man. And we must maintain a favorable rate structure if we hope to attract new industry to Tennessee.

INSURANCE REFORM

If we do not move quickly to enact our own insurance reform, the federal government will thrust a national program upon us. I would like to see Tennessee have the option of tailoring a modified no-fault insurance plan to our own specific needs. I believe we can do so in a manner that would be most beneficial to the consumer, and still protect the right of the injured victim in an automobile

ETHICS


