

56 Set County Races Aug. 1st

Ten Qualify As Candidates For Sheriff And Five For Sessions Judgeship By Thursday's Noon Deadline

The county's first computer-counted election for county offices Aug. 1st will give the computer a workout, it appeared Thursday as the noon deadline for filing qualifying petitions passed with ten names on the ballot for sheriff, five for general sessions judge, and 41 for other offices.

Only Don Connell, circuit court clerk, filed for re-election without an opponent, in county-wide voting. Not all candidates qualifying have announced, and any qualified may withdraw their names from the ballot before noon next Thursday. ### CANDIDATE

## School Bldg. Plans Would Near Double Taxes, Squires Told

Monday's County Court, presented an \$8,500,000 school building program which Judge Paul Dew said would nearly double the real estate tax rate, now \$2 per \$100 assessed valuation, delayed action for 60 days to study the proposals in detail.

Supt. of Schools O. R. "Jack" Taylor said the proposals were based on studies by members of the Board of Education, the State Department of Education, and the superintendent of schools, with assistance from the U.S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare.

Other proposals were considered, Taylor said, but they were either impractical or too costly. He said recent legislation reducing the size of classes will cause a critical shortage of classroom space.

Ripley Middle Grade School has used the stage and hallways for some classes, and Ripley Primary utilizes eight portable classrooms last year.

The old Halls High School building has been condemned by fire marshals.

Bob Thomas, representing Hart, teaches in special education in the Ft. Worth public school system.

A new elementary school is needed on a new site to house 1,500 students through sixth grade, costing \$3,000,000, and a new junior high school should be constructed for 1,000 students in Ripley at a cost of \$2,340,000.

Halls will need a new 22-classroom elementary school to serve 900 students through grade six. Estimated cost is \$2,294,000. The present elementary school is completed, that portion of the present buildings being used for these grades should be demolished, for grades seven through nine, for grades seven through nine, for \$275,000. Renovation would include enclosing stairways, providing proper exits from classrooms, replacing the combustible ceiling with fireproof material, and re-working the corridors. An alternative proposal is to install a sprinkler system. The building would get new lighting where necessary and would be air-conditioned with window units.

The 20-year-old elementary school at Arp, which contains 12 classrooms, a cafeteria, gymnasium, library, and a playground, would be up-graded to meet Life-Safety Codes.

This would require classroom standards, relocation of the auditorium, and replacement of the combustible ceiling.

To comply with educational standards, the building should have new lighting and air-conditioning with window units. Estimated cost is \$100,000.

The present elementary school at Hemming would receive the same up-gradings as Arp, except it would have six classrooms added.

Approximately \$160,000 would be reserved for land and legal and fiscal fees. Should construction be delayed until 1975, the study says 19% should be added to the total estimated cost.

Taylor said schools at Nantkipp, Centerville, and Curlew would be closed.

In other action the court referred to the agriculture committee a proposal to construct a building to house the County Agent's office. The federal government will begin charging \$5,000 per year per for the office now located in the Ripley Post Office basement, Judge Dew said.

Magistrate Lawson on Chairman said it would cost \$48,000 to construct a building in county out-of-state vehicle at the intersection of new Highway 51 and Central-Edith Road near Ripley. As you know, Fort Pillow State Park is far from being completed. Upon being elected County Judge, I will seek the help of interested citizens and work for the rapid completion of Fort Pillow State Park, which will preserve one of the historical landmarks of our nation.
