

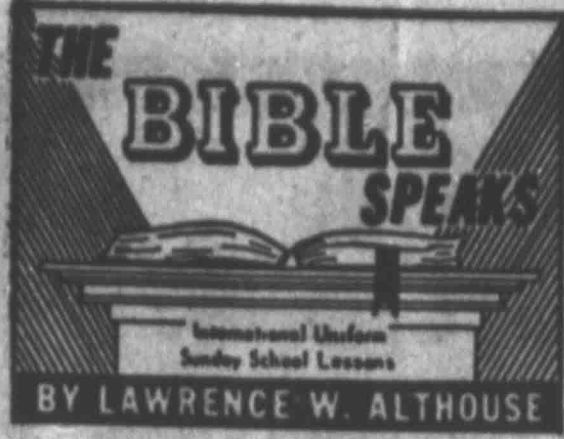

## PENTECOSTAL PURPOSE

Lesson for March 3, 1974

Background Scripture: Acts 1 through 2  
Devotional Reading: Isaiah 61-8

If what happened in Jerusalem on the Day of Pentecost happened in your church, your minister, your congregation, or both would probably be in trouble. There is little room for the pentecostal experience in the lives of most churches. Most church worship services are designed to be the very opposite of the experience of the Jerusalem Church on Pentecost. Our services are, for the most part, intended to be unexciting, un-dramatic, and certainly not spontaneous.

### Filed with the Holy Spirit

The rise of the so-called "pentecostal" groups today has helped many of us in the "standard-brand-denominations" to realize that we have been too contemptuous of the pentecostal experience and have therefore been too restrictive to the work of the Holy Spirit. As John the Evangelist indicated, the Holy Spirit is like the unpredictable wind; it cannot be manipulated and controlled. We cannot schedule it through an order of worship or liturgy.

Young people have often become disenchanted with the churches because they have found them largely devoid of power. They are convinced of the validity of religion, not so much by argumentation, but by demonstrations of spiritual power to heal and mend broken lives and communities. Many of us are rediscovering the need for pentecostal power in our Christianity.

At the same time, it is very evident to some of us that the pentecostal experience may be misused. For some people the ecstatic experience is an end in itself. They seek the experience because of the way it makes them "feel." The pentecostal experience for some is a continual search for "spiritual kicks" or "fireworks." Religion of this kind becomes self-centered, a never-ending quest for spiritual excitement.

"And they devoted themselves..."

Consider, by comparison, the account of the first Pentecost experience in Jerusalem. Acts does not tell us that the result of Pentecost was a pentecostal binge, but changed lives that were devoted to Christian growth, fellowship, and worship. Because of the first pentecostal experience, Peter preached a mighty sermon that brought conversions. There was a pentecostal purpose behind that pentecostal experience.

Once the Day of Pentecost was over, the writer of Acts does not tell us that the old and new followers of Jesus spent their time trying to repeat the pentecostal experience. The writer does not indicate that they spent their time trying to teach people to speak in ecstatic tongues. Rather, he says, "... they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2: 42).

The churches may still need at times the pentecostal experience, but let us remember that behind that experience there is always pentecostal purpose.

ALEX HALEY, who resided at Henning in the 1920s and 1930s, until his late 'teens, with his grandmother, Mrs. Cynthia Murray Palmer, is the author of one of four articles featured in the February, 1974, "American History Illustrated" magazine published at 206 Hanover St., Gettysburg, Pa. (\$10 annually).

The 12-page article recounts his dogged detective work, criss-crossing the Atlantic, in tracing his ancestry, "from what I'd heard on the front porch in Henning, Tennessee, from grandma, from Cousin Georgia, from Aunt Liz, from

Cousin Plus, all the other old ladies who sat there on that porch" to the village of Juffure (population 70) in Gambia, one of the new African states, where the village's oral historian, Kebsa Kanga Fofana, 73, recited the family's history since it came to Juffure from Mauretania.

The trail led from names and African words his family had passed down, through United Nations sources to a University of Wisconsin expert in African languages, Gambian officials, the village elder, British and Annapolis, Md., shipping and tax records, newspaper advertisements of the arrival in this country of an ancestor was included, and a deed in which a Virginian sold this ancestor to his brother.

Haley spoke on all this to the Seventh Annual Colloquium on Oral History in Austin, Tex., Nov. 10th, and an edited text of his speech appeared in the 1973 Oral History Review, from which the magazine article was extracted.

He and his brother have established a non-profit Kinte Foundation in Washington, D.C., to create a black genealogical library. He will publish a book, "Roots," this fall, and a motion picture based on his search is planned.

Haley entered the Coast Guard during World War II, after two years of college, and began his writing career composing love letters for other sailors on an ammunition ship in the South Pacific.

### Don't Do It

It has always been somewhat difficult for us to understand just why a politician feels that he must do something, even though it is wrong, when an emergency arises, and also why the general public immediately begins to scream for the government to do something.

We have in mind the state-by-state gasoline rationing which is gradually creeping over the nation and reportedly is being considered in Tennessee.

So far, there has been no evidence that even and odd days rationing has done anything except create additional problems, and there is some evidence that limiting sales helps create long lines at service stations, as car owners seek to top off their tanks.

Fewer wild-eyed statements on the gasoline shortage, especially threats of service station shutdowns by officials of station organizations, etc., would help ease the situation.

Congress has finally passed an energy bill, although it may have caused additional problems by inserting a price cut-back clause that could be ill advised.

There have been problems throughout the nation with gasoline allotments, many of them caused by poorly conceived energy commission rulings, but actually, most of the problems have been caused by panic buying by motorists in most of the nation.

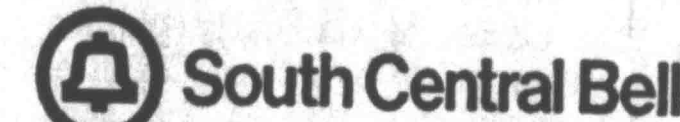

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The Holy Spirit And The Conversion Of The Ethiopian

The conversion of the Ethiopian officer is found in Acts 8:26-38. Here is a man who was devotedly religious. He had been to Jerusalem to worship and was "returning, and was sitting in his chariot" and was reading the prophet Isaiah. The Spirit directed Philip, the evangelist, saying "Go near, and open thy mouth to this chariot." Philip obeyed the Holy Spirit. He approached the Ethiopian and inquired, "Understandest thou what thou readest?" The Ethiopian replied, "How can I understand some man guide me?" Philip accepted his invitation to join him in his chariot and he "began at the same scripture, and preached unto him Jesus."

We should realize that the intervention of an angel (v.26) and the Holy Spirit (v.27) was for the purpose of directing Philip to the Ethiopian so that the gospel of Christ could be preached to him. (cf. Matt. 23:18-23). This conversion took place during miraculous days of the first century. Neither the angel, nor the Spirit appeared directly to the Ethiopian to deliver the message of the gospel. The reason why such was the case is that God had left the preaching of the gospel "in carnal vessels." (2 Cor. 4:7).

What are the elements of this man's conversion? As in all other conversions under the Great Commission, the gospel was preached. The text reveals that Philip "preached unto him Jesus." Thus, the Ethiopian had an opportunity to hear evidence concerning Christ Jesus, and he acted upon this evidence. He believed and confessed faith. (v.36-37; cf. Rom. 10:10). He turned from the error of his way—in fact he changed religions. He gave up Judaism for Christianity. He was baptized into Christ, and then Philip listened to his testimony concerning his conversion, and he did not join a denomination. Now if this man from Ethiopia could become

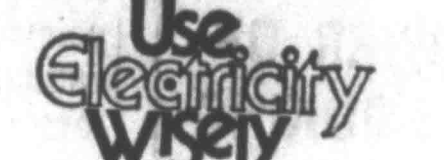

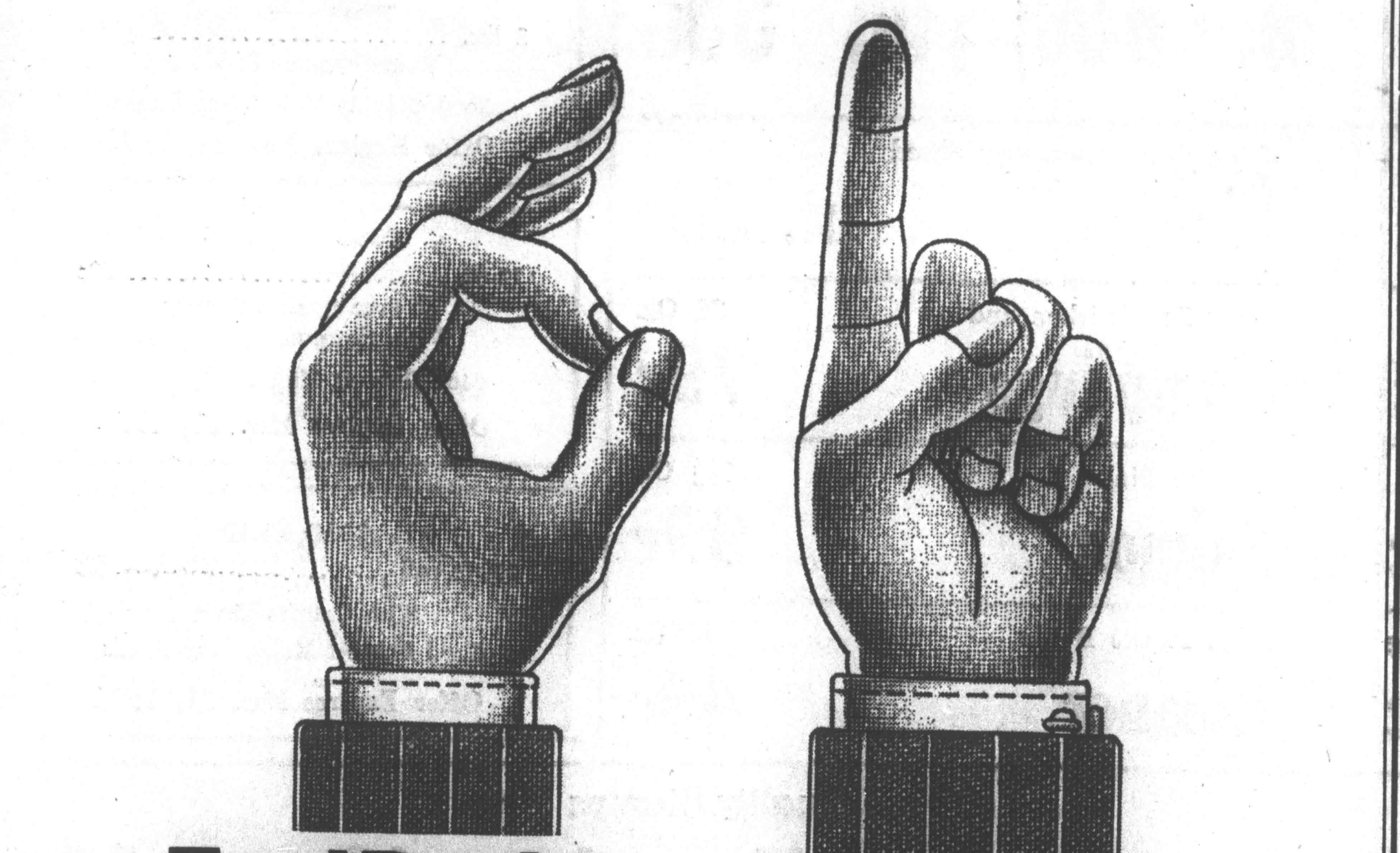

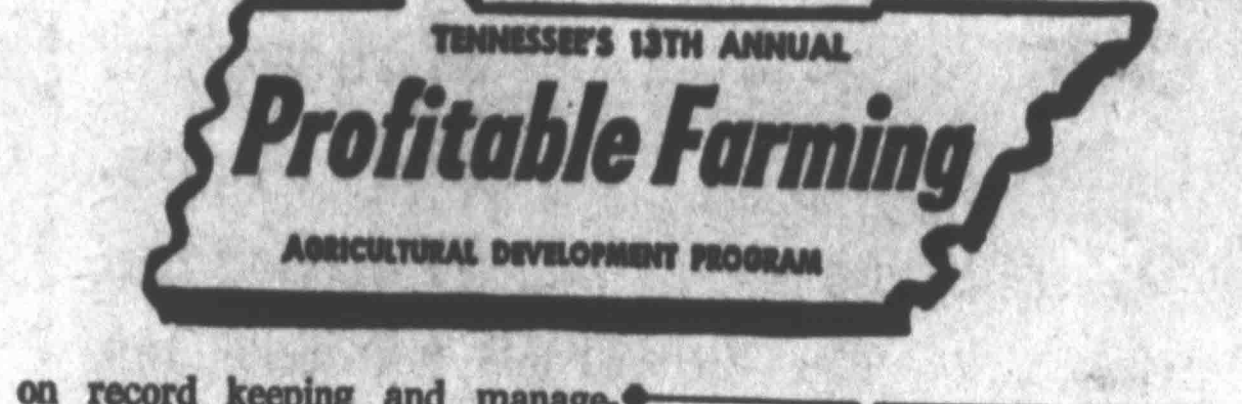

80-Mile Rural Water District Under Study

County Court's session Monday approved further study, without financial obligation, of the prospects for a rural water system which would incorporate the present Arp-Central and Northeast utility districts and operate 80 miles of lines.

Billy Joe Childress, who outlined the proposal, said rural lines from Halls could also be incorporated into the success as the other two existing districts would be.

In addition to their present lines, the project as projected at present would build two miles of lines east of Gates, more than eleven miles at Flippin, more than 16 from way 19 from Arp to Open Lake and south from Highway 19 along two roads to Lightfoot, and about two miles to Olive Branch and Leckert, and more than 14 on Highway 7 from new Highway 51 to Pleasant Hill.

A hearing for two Halls men, charged with straddling the Bank of Halls parking lot, will be held Saturday morning before Mayor James H. Cheshier.

Childrens said the Arp-Central district's bonds would have to be paid off to permit alteration of its facilities, which he said have already pumped up to 20 hours a day, in order to maintain a maximum of 18. He said the overbuilt is threatening the supply of water to the Northeast district.

Childrens said the combined debt of the two districts, which the new district would have to assume, is about \$330,000.

He suggested the project be financed by revenue bonds backed with the county's taxing power if district revenues proved insufficient, but he said "this would not happen—you would raise the rates before you would raise taxes to pay for these lines."

Childrens proposed a new well, tank, and filtering facilities at the Arp-Central district's plant. The court approved further study of building code requirements covering the entire county but chiefly directed at controlling height, foundations, and other features of new construction in flood areas, in order to qualify residents of these areas for federal flood insurance, without which banks can neither make nor renew loans for buildings there.

Computer Election Systems, Inc., demonstrated the Votomatic punch-card ballot system which will be used in Ripley's city election April 4th and, if found satisfactory, in county elections to comply with state law requiring voting machines. Magistrates appeared pleased with the system, which is much cheaper and faster than lever machines.

School Supt. Jack Taylor was questioned about Ripley High School driver education cars being used outside schools hours and as far away as Jackson and about Board of Education policy on "streaking."

He said these matters were in the hands of the principal and that the board had adopted no policy on streaking, since there had been only one minor incident at schools, and it had been handled firmly by school authorities and parents.

Placed on next month's court agenda by Clifford Sweet was consideration of land fill expansion and rural garbage pickup service, and by Emmett Young, consideration of transportation for senior citizens being offered free hot lunches at Northeast Community Center.

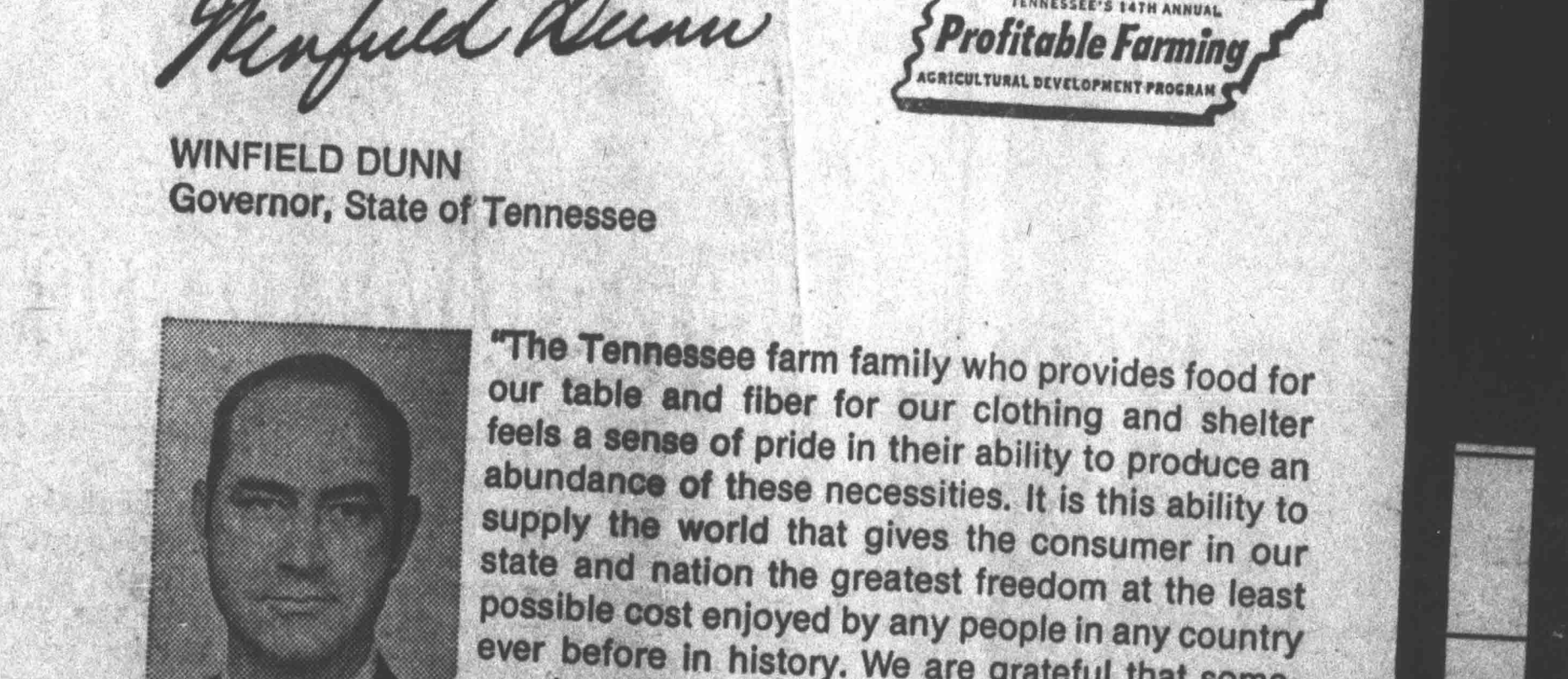

In this article, we are dealing with a habit which is usually acquired in one's youth and continues many times throughout one's life.

The problem is not trivial. In a recent year, seven billion dollars were spent on tobacco in this country. Should we condone the use of tobacco or condemn it?

Some who have written: "Tobacco is an American weed. No doubt the devil sowed the seed, it empties men's pockets, and soils their clothes."

The following quotation indicates how King James of England felt about the use of tobacco in the seventeenth century: "Smoking is a custom loathsome to the eye, hateful to the nose, harmful to the brain, dangerous to the lungs, and in the black stinking fumes, nearest resembling the horrible Stygian smoke of hell."

But one can quit using tobacco if he desires to do so badly enough. I saw a poster in recent months which revealed the following facts: "100,000 doctors have quit smoking."

An article appeared in 1968 by the New York Times News Service about William Talman, the losing prosecutor on the "Perry Mason" television series.

Mr. Talman smoked three packages of cigarettes daily for his entire adult life, and six weeks before he died of lung cancer, he made a one-minute television commercial for the American Cancer Society.

In this commercial, he said, "I'm in a battle right now I don't want to lose at all because if I lose it, it means losing my wife and those kids you just met. I've got lung cancer."

So take some advice about smoking and losing from someone who's been doing both for years. If you haven't smoked, don't start. If you do smoke—quit. Don't be a loser.

**SMOKING (No. 2)**

Paul said to Timothy, "Keep thyself pure." (1 Tim. 5:22). In this and a previous article, we are concerned with a problem that is not trivial, because in a recent year alone, seven billion dollars were spent on tobacco in this country. Dr. Alton Ochsner, an expert on lung cancer, said that someone "dies every two minutes from the use of tobacco." (The Nashville Banner, 11-19-65). I am not suggesting that everyone who smokes will die of cancer, nor am I suggesting that everyone who has cancer smokes. But, there is ample evidence to show that the use of tobacco is a cause of lung cancer.

The user of tobacco stands self-condemned because he often advises others not to use tobacco. For example, parents who smoke, nor do they suggest that their children not smoke. The actor, William Talman, died of lung cancer. Before his death, he made a one-minute television commercial in which he advised people not to smoke.

The use of tobacco is an unclean habit. Tobacco stains a person's clothes and it causes an offensive odor. Also, when one smokes, he pollutes the air, especially if he is in an enclosed room or automobile with others who do not smoke.

There may be those who would respond to the teaching of this or similar articles by saying, "I have the right to do what I want to do." It is true that every person is a free moral agent and each one can make choices, but it is also true that we have to accept the consequences of our choices. (cf. Eccl. 11:3). Each person has certain liberties, but no one has the right to abuse his own liberties by infringing on the rights and privileges of others. For example, an individual has the right to smoke if he chooses, but he does not have the right to pollute the air of a non-smoker.

The user of tobacco becomes enslaved. The apostle Peter wrote,

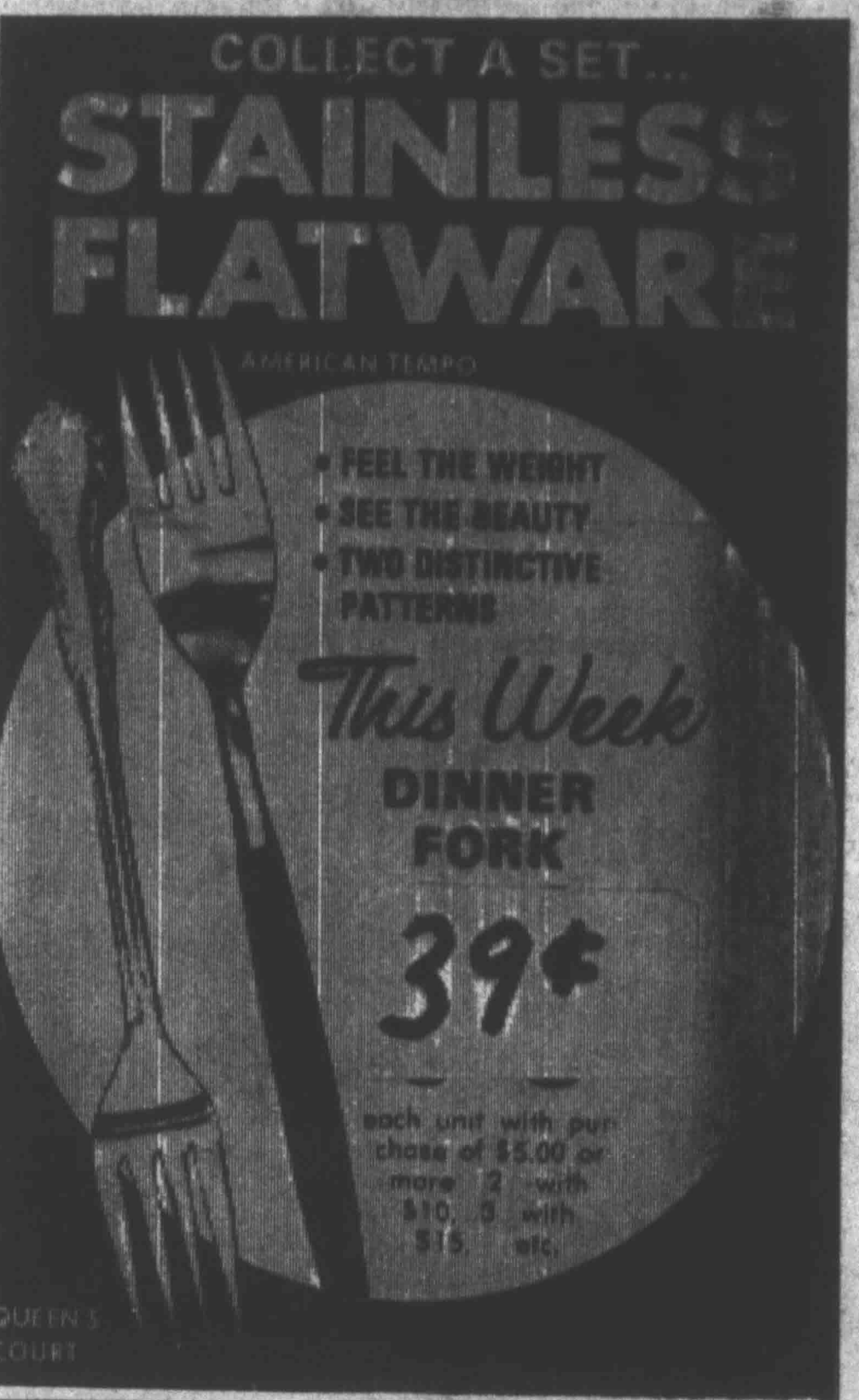
