**THE BIBLE SPEAKS**

**THE OPEN MIND**  
Lesson for May 5, 1974  
Background Scriptures: Acts 17.  
Devotional Reading: Acts 17:22-34.

Someone has said that when some people insist that they are "standing on their principles," what they are really doing is "sitting on the lid of a closed mind." One of the primary reasons for the divisions among men of religious faith and the parochial spirit is our unwillingness to listen to each other with open minds. Often I have found that people in an argument may be much closer in their thinking than they realize. The reason they do not understand this is that they are too busy arguing to really listen to one another.

**Examining the scriptures**  
Many of the places that the Apostle Paul visited on his missionary tours greeted him with closed minds and a hostile reception. One exception was Berea. Here, the writer of Acts tells us they "received the word with eagerness, examining the scriptures daily to see if these things were so" (17:11).

There was an "eagerness" to open about the people in Berea. They were willing to listen to Paul and his group. All too often, people reject what others have to say without ever considering what it is that is being said. They begin with the assumption that they will disagree and nothing will deter them from fulfilling that expectation. As Herbert Spencer once noted: "There is a principle which is a bar against all information, which is proof against all arguments, and which cannot fail to keep a man in everlasting ignorance. That principle is contempt prior to investigation. Often I find Christians using the scriptures, not 'to see if these things are so,' but to prove that someone is wrong. Thus, they take to the scriptures a mind that is already prejudiced."

**"You are very religious"**  
Not only did the Bereans greet Paul with open minds, but we also find that Paul himself could be open-minded when he spoke with men of different religious persuasions. In Athens, for example, he did not begin his preaching by telling the Athenians that their was a "wrong" or "false" religion. Rather, he began by acknowledging that they too were seeking God: "Men of Athens, I perceive that in every way you are very religious" (17:22).

This was not only a skillful strategy on Paul's part, but a recognition that these men were sincere in their religious quest. His technique was to try to show them that the God they were seeking to know was the same God he revealed so fully in the person of Jesus Christ.

Acts 17 can be very instructive for us today, for, if as followers of Jesus Christ we want to be received with open minds, so we must also approach others with that same willingness to listen and consider.

## CANDIDATE



**PAUL R. SUMMERS**, of Somerville, is seeking re-election as Chancellor of Part I of the 9th Division, a judgeship to which he was elected two years ago. He has no announced opponent.

"Due to the tremendous case load increase during the past year," he notes, "the General Assembly created another court to serve the 9th Division, which will be Part II.

"But each court will serve Fayette, Hardeman, Hardin, Haywood, Lauderdale, McNairy, and Tipton Counties, and both chancellors will be candidates in all seven counties."

Summers, 50, was Fayette County General Sessions judge 12 years before becoming chancellor. He has an office in the courthouse in Brownsville and holds court regularly in all seven counties of the division.

A graduate of Fayette County High School, he received law degrees from Cumberland and Samford Universities.

He completed the Judge Advocate Officer Career Course in the University of Virginia and the Command and General Staff Course in the University of South Mississippi. He also attended the University of Tennessee, Lambuth College, and Memphis State School of Law.

Licensed to practice in Tennessee in 1948, he is licensed to practice in all courts in this state, in U. S. District Courts, the Court of Military Appeals, and the United States Supreme Court.

He was a pilot in World War II and a pilot and judge advocate in the Korean War. He has served as Staff Judge Advocate for the Tennessee National Guard since 1966 and is still active in the National Guard, in which he holds the rank of Colonel.

He is affiliated with the National Guard Association, the American Legion, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He is a member of the Bar Association, the Judicial Conference, and the Methodist Church.

His wife, the former Peggy Myers, of Fayette County, a supervisor in Fayette Academy, was formerly with the Shelby County Board of Education. They have two sons, Paul Garvan, who will graduate from the University of Tennessee School of Law this fall, and Phillip Mark, a sophomore in Fayette Academy.

Summers is part owner of West Tennessee Realty Co. and a part-time farmer. He was formerly distributor in this area for Gulf Oil Corp.

## U.S. SENATOR BILL BROCK WASHINGTON OUTLOOK

For some forty years, since the days of President Franklin Roosevelt, the Congress of the United States has slowly but surely been relinquishing its authority under the Constitution, and allowing the Executive Branch to absorb it. As a result we hear charges of "do-nothing" sessions of the Congress, and a Congress which by and large is ineffective in dealing quickly and effectively with national problems. However, the Congress has taken a major step on the road toward becoming again the body that the Constitution intended it to be, a voice of the people.

This past week, the Senate passed 80 to 0 a measure which I introduced two years ago. It was the Congressional Budget Reform Act which directs the Congress to establish its own budget, to place a limit on massive federal spending, and to debate on the floor our national priorities. This measure would also set up a watch-dog committee of the Congress to oversee the budget and how appropriations are spent. In effect, this measure is a tool whereby Congress can see how every tax dollar is spent and if it is spent wisely.

The entire matter sounds complicated, but in terms of what it can do for Tennessee and the nation, it is very simple. The greatest single cause of the inflation that we suffer today is the huge spending of the Federal Government. Tax dollars are spent on just about everything, and until now there has been no real limit to or test of the effectiveness of that spending. Additionally, it seems that every year we have to raise the debt ceiling because of our over-spending. All of this has led to inflation.

The measure passed by unanimous vote in the Senate would set a ceiling on spending, one that the government would have to observe. This could cut drastically the increase in the national debt each year, and thus ultimately hold down taxes and prices.

I am very proud to have authored the initial version of this measure in the Congress, and am very pleased that my colleagues have seen the merit of it. It is a long stride toward returning responsible government to the people of Tennessee and the nation. It is the least that the Congress can do after years of passing the buck, in more ways than one.

**DRINKING, DISTINCTION OR DELUSION. (No. 2)**

Solomon wrote these words of warning: "who hath we? who hath sorrow? who hath contentions? who hath babbling? who hath wounds without cause? who hath redness of eyes? They that tarry long at the wine; they that go to seek mixed wine. Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his color in the cup, when it moveth itself aright. At the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder." (Prov. 23:29-32)

The use of alcoholic beverages is harmful to the body. Our bodies belong to God because He has made us. In a special sense, the Christian's body belongs to the Lord. (cf. I Cor. 6:19-20)

The facts are beyond dispute concerning the harm that alcohol does to the body. A pamphlet printed by the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare reveals, "Organs that control important chemical processes in the body are affected by alcohol's action on the brain, and this in turn affects the way other glands and organs work. When such a process is repeated over and over, as it is in habitual drunkenness, it causes serious and lasting injury to the body's tissues and organs." ("Alcoholism," PBS Publ. No. 720)

The use of alcohol in its various forms is wrong because God requires us to maintain control over our bodies. Alcohol makes it impossible for one to maintain moral and spiritual cautions because it dulls one's judgment and it removes restraints.

Rational man know that a person cannot function at his peak level of efficiency if he has been drinking. Airlines do not permit their pilots to drink twenty-four hours before flying!

The person who refrains from taking the first drink will not have to worry about becoming an alcoholic, and he will not have to worry about the problems and heartaches that drinking brings.

One person has described strong drink in the following way: "A bar to heaven, a door to hell; whoever cannot fit, named it well. A bar to manliness and wealth; a door to want and broken health. A bar to honor, pride and fame; a door to grief and sin and shame. A bar to home and a bar to prayer; a door to honored, useful life. A door to brawling, senseless strife; a bar to all that's true and brave; a door to every drunkard's grave. A door to tears and aching hearts. A bar to heaven, a door to hell; whoever named it, named it well."

**Important Notice To Dog Owners**

All dog owners are hereby notified that "The Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law" as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court will be enforced throughout the county.

**All Dogs 3 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian**  
**All Cats 6 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian**

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1974, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

The law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dogs owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$2.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

**Important Notice To Dog Owners**

All dog owners are hereby notified that "The Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law" as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court will be enforced throughout the county.

All Dogs 3 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian

All Cats 6 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1974, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

The law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$2.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

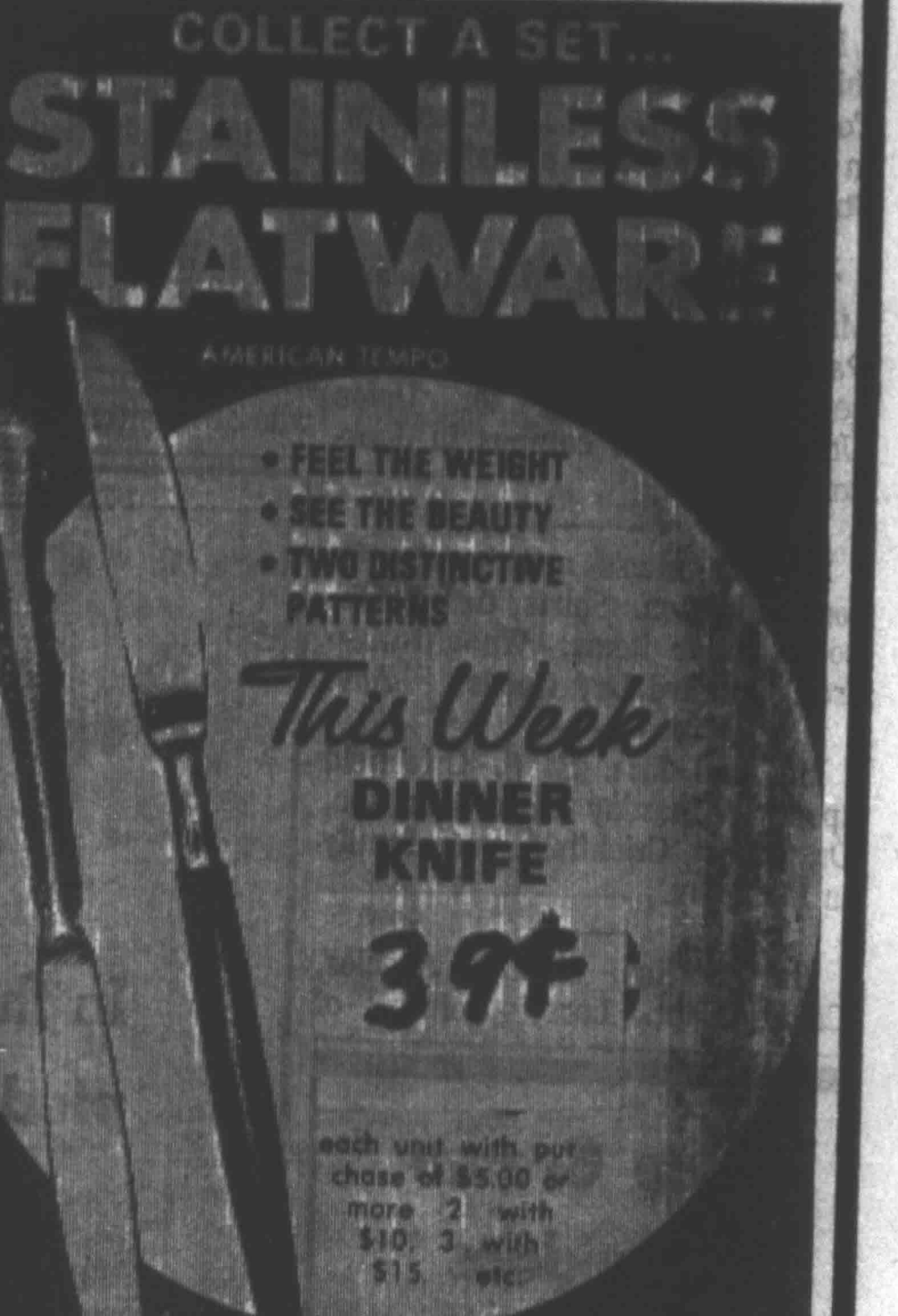

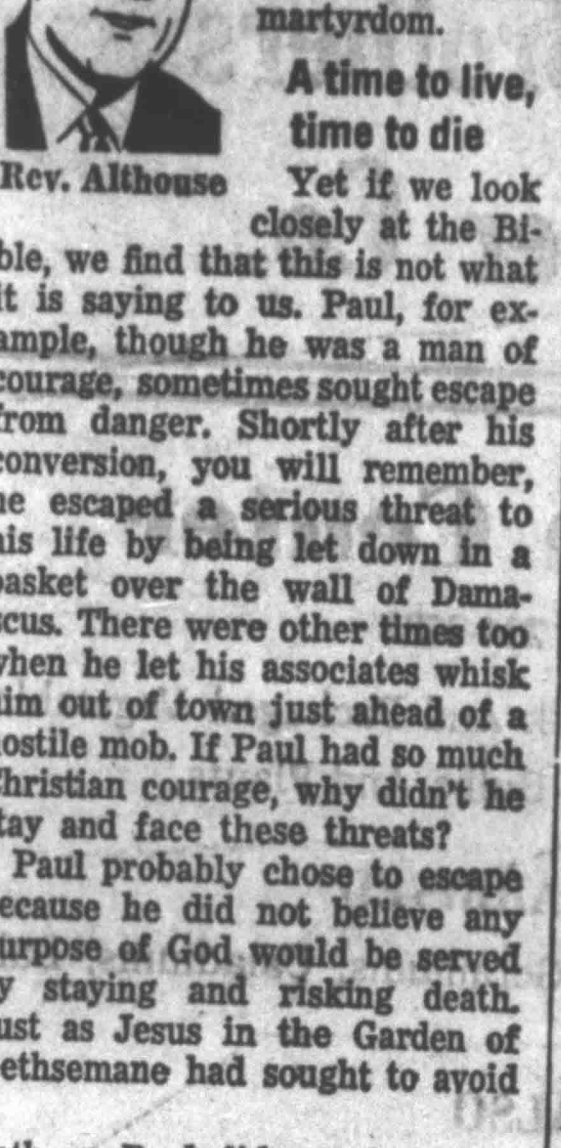

## Rain Damage Placed At A Million Dollars

By Charles T. Peal

Heavy rains, estimated at as much as 11 inches, fell in the Gates area Thursday night of last week, getting as high as 18 inches in some spots and damaging considerable merchandise.

Every business house in the main section of Gates except Gates Banking & Trust Co. and the main portion of Mrs. Ruby Pennington's grocery store had water inside from two to twelve inches deep.

Calvin Mills, owner of Mills Lucky Foods, estimated stock loss at about \$7,000. Billy Reece, of Reece's Fabrics, expected losses to his stock and building to reach \$25,000. Martha's Ready-To-Wear suffered major loss, as did several other firms.

The thunderstorm started about 11 p.m. Thursday and continued for about 22 hours. Highway 88 from Gates to Maury City was blocked for several hours, and a bridge was reported washed out on the Beach Bluff road.

Earl West, who surveyed the damaged area around Gates and in the Forked Deer bottom area, estimated the damage at around a million dollars, including houses, levees, and other structures.

"I believe that we had at least 20,000 acres under water along the entire Forked Deer land area," he said. "Land zoned for the loss of fertility, pre-emergence, and shilling would be at least \$25,000," he said.

"The erosion was the most I have ever seen in this county," he said.

Once water drains from this land, it can be planted to beans, but it would need to drain soon, and it might be three to four weeks before some of it could be planted. The heavy rainfall, not only in the Forked Deer area but in some other areas as well, may change some farmers from cotton to beans, thereby decreasing acreage still further.

Sprey Wheat For Army Worms

Carey Gaines, of Hocking, Calvin and Lynn Pittman, of Lattin, and Harry Wright, Jr., of Poplar Grove, are spraying their wheat for army worms.

The rule in deciding when to spray is three worms per square foot on the ground or stalk.

As many as eight worms per square foot were found in some of the fields.

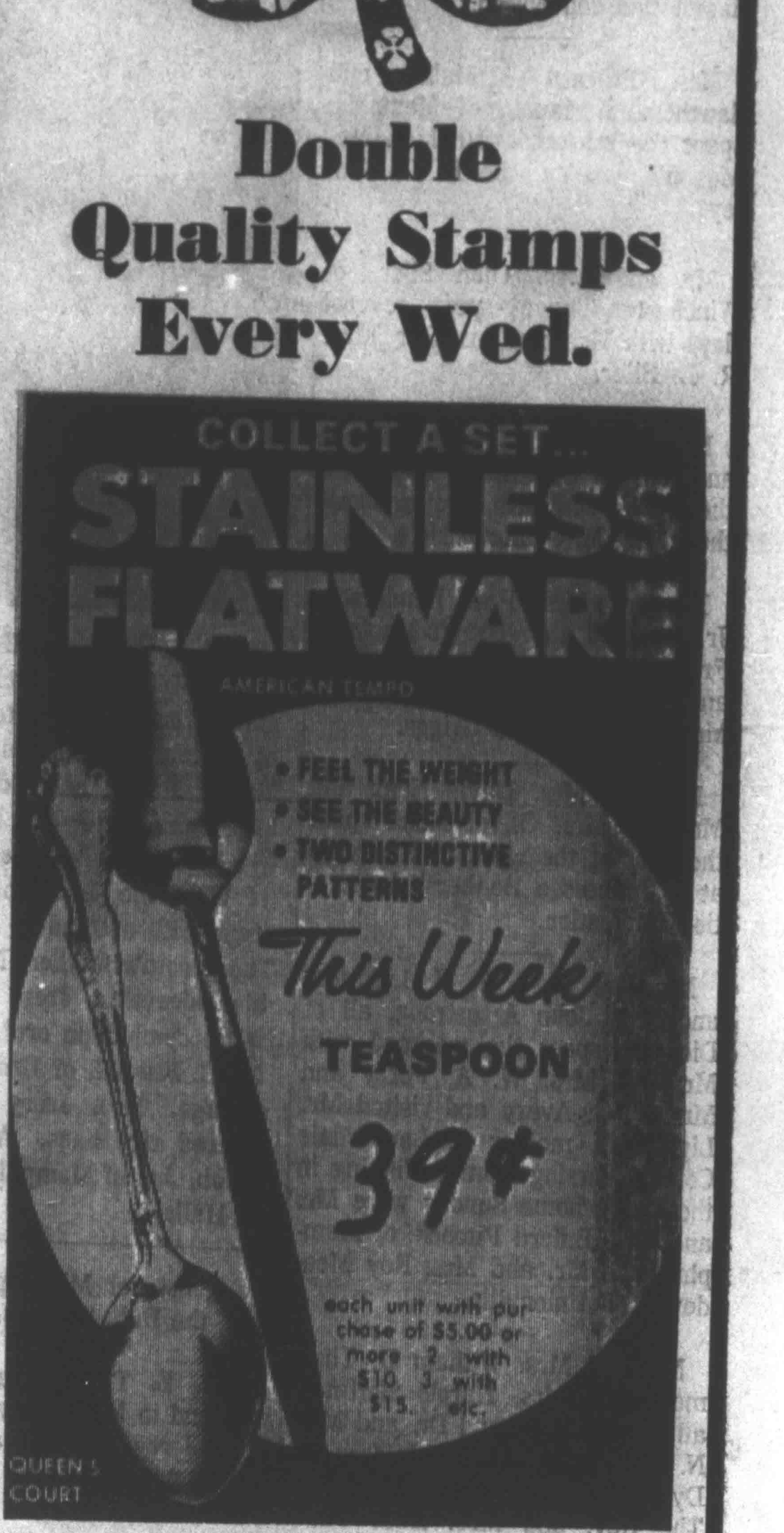

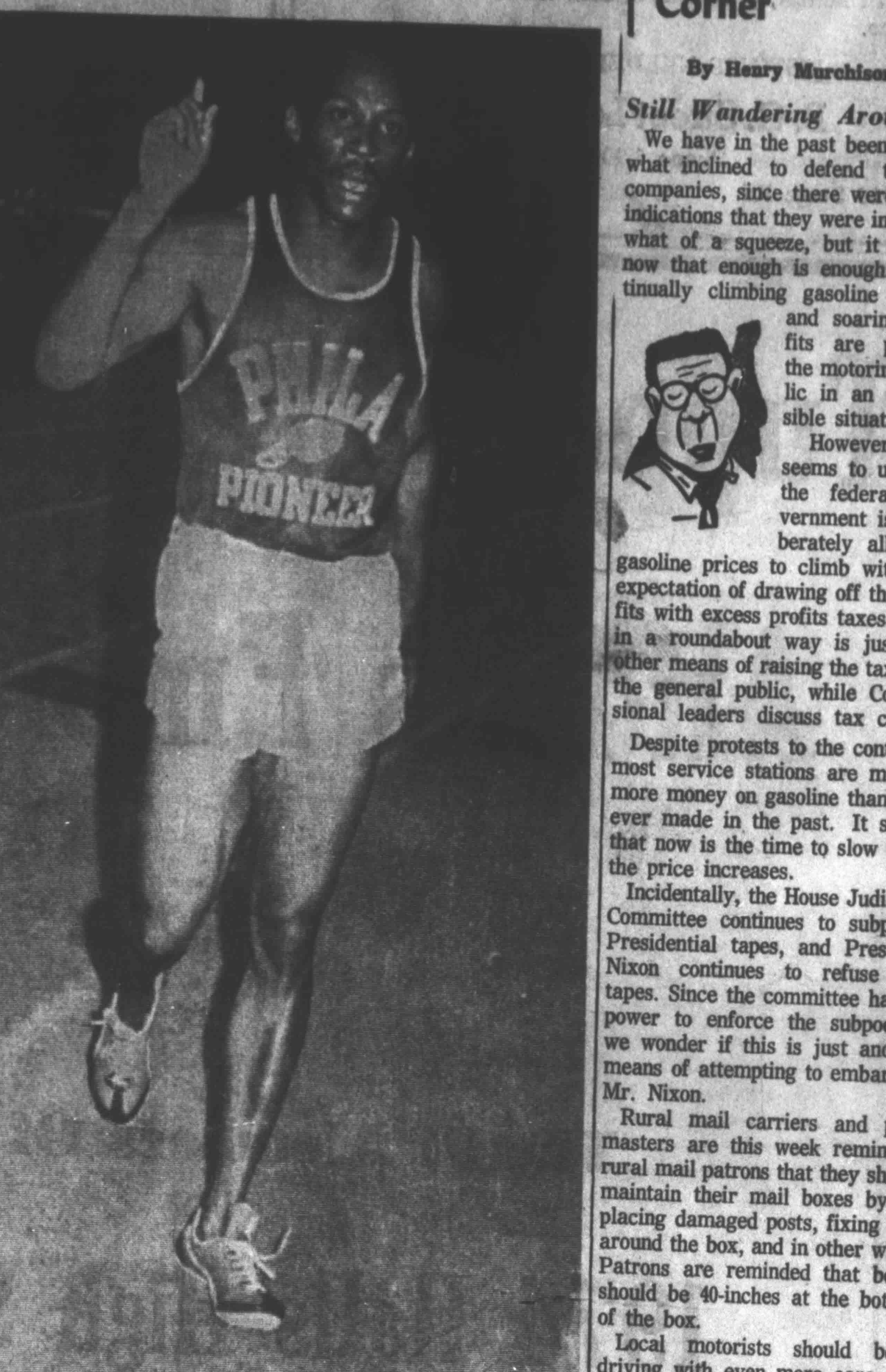

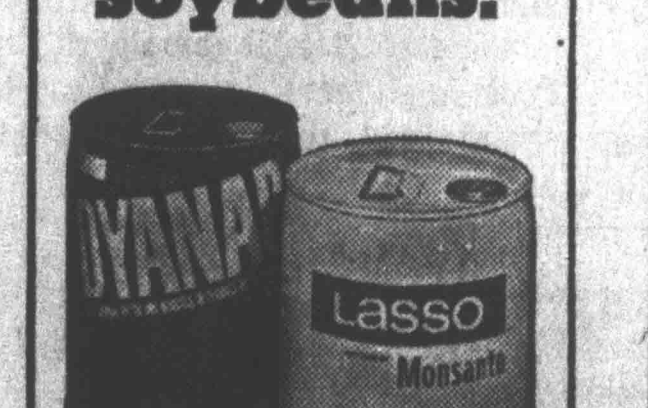
