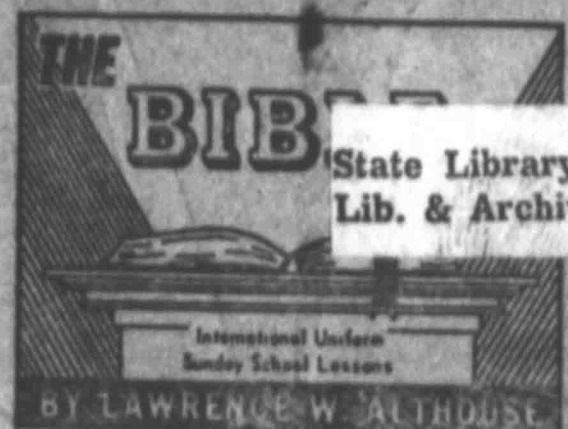

THE MEANING OF 'CHOSEN'

Lesson for September 8, 1974

Background Scriptures: Genesis 12 through 17.
Devotional Reading: Genesis 15:1-16.

There's an old piece of dog-gone that goes like this:
We are God's chosen few;
All others will be damned;
There is no place in Heaven for you;
We can't have Heaven crammed.

Many people have comforted themselves with the conviction that they were "God's chosen few." It is understandable — if not accurate — because at the heart of the Old Testament there is the concept of a "chosen people." Modified, this concept reaches on into the New Testament and Christianity itself.

"God Said... Go!"
The concept of being "chosen," as far as the Bible is concerned, is valid, but what does it mean? The story of Abraham furnishes us with some insight in attempting to answer that question. First of all, we find that in being "chosen" by God, Abraham received "a call" from him. In the Bible, "a call" means a direct challenge from God to do something. In Genesis 12, for example, we read: "Now the Lord said to Abram, 'Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you' (12:1). Again and again in the Bible we find God making this "call" to men whom he has chosen: Moses, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Samuel, Elijah, and others. Each time, as with Abraham, God comes with a challenge to perform some mission or task for the Lord.

The "call" God gives Abraham is no small request; he is to leave behind his homeland for a country utterly alien to him. Put yourself in Abraham's shoes; wouldn't you find this first aspect of his call rather unappealing? Maybe being "chosen" isn't as great as we thought it might be?

"... I Will Bless You"
Yet, along with the disturbing "call," there is also a promise: "I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you" (12:2). God always equips those who embark on his challenging missions with a promise of some kind. The challenge is always conditional on the promise, just as the promise is dependent upon a response to the challenge.

Unfortunately, too many people have looked only upon one side of the covenant agreement. They have ignored the challenge and focused upon the promise. They have thought in terms of what "is coming to them" as "God's chosen," and ignored what is expected of those whom God chooses and blesses. They have concentrated upon the "honor" to the exclusion of the "responsibility."

To be sure, there is a sense of "honor" in being "chosen" by God, but his purpose in calling a person is much more a matter of the task that is to be performed. That's what it means to be "chosen."

Atmosphere Clearing

Sen. Cotton Producers Battling Weevils

Boll weevils continue to attack cotton, in some cases so severely that individual squares have been riddled with egg-laying punctures to the point that there is nothing left of them.

Conditions remain ideal for a further increase in weevil damage. Migration to fields of rank cotton continues.

Controls have been difficult, but results are better than expected. Farmers using a scouting service have held infestations within reasonable limits, despite the frequent rains, which have broken control patterns and caused "runaway" infestations in some areas.

Vernon McBride, Sr., plans to spray his cotton this week and next to protect small bolls at the middle and the top of the stalks.

Off-Weight Bales Penalized

Bales weighing 350 to 379 pounds net get a \$5 penalty, and bales of 380 to 413 pounds net weight catch a \$1 penalty, effective Aug. 1st, according to notices posted in gins after conferences of cotton merchants with the Southern Cotton Ginners Association.

Bales under 350 pounds may be rejected, but if accepted must be penalized \$10 per bale. Bales of more than 600 pounds may be rejected.

When an invoice of 20 or more bales averages 474 pounds per bale or more net, there will be no penalty on bales between 380 and 600 pounds.

Memphis Cotton Exchange and Southern Cotton Association representatives said the increased penalties would not cover added expenses caused by irregular weight.

Stops Corn Storage Insects

Charles Morris plans to protect his new corn crop by cleaning the storage bin and treating the grain as it is being binned.

He will remove all old grain and sweep down the walls and ceiling. He will then spray with Malathion, 1/3 pint 57% premium grade emulsifiable concentrate per gallon of water.

Grain can be treated by applying one pint of premium grade Malathion in five gallons of water to each 1,000 bushels, using a hand or tractor sprayer as grain is being elevated into the bin.

Pre-Emergence Weed Control

Bill Stephens, grounds-keeper for Rolling Hills Country Club, is applying a pre-emergence chemical, Balan, to the greens this week to prevent the germination of winter weeds and grass.

Home-owners troubled with wild blue-grass, chickweed, and other winter-growing annuals will need to apply this material promptly. Dacthal, granular or powder, applied at recommended rates is effective in controlling these weeds.

Selling 22 Feeder Pigs

Sammy Fennel, of Gates, plans to sell 22 feeder pigs at the sale at Brownsville Sept. 25th.

River Museum Eyed For Park

Anticipating no difficulty in getting Fort Pillow State Park first stage construction contracted before July 1, 1975, Walter L. Criley, director of the division of planning and development of the state Department of Conservation, revealed to county Bicentennial Commission leaders Tuesday evening that a river museum has been suggested for the park and that he "likes the idea."

Criley said Col. Marvin Jacobs, of the Army Corps of Engineers, originated the proposal. He said at no other point on the river is there an outstanding river museum, and this would be the only state park in Tennessee suitable for one.

Such a museum would tell the story of navigation on the Mississippi River from the canoe and steamboat eras to the barge tows of today and would include radio communications with passing tows which visitors to the museum could hear.

Any river museum would be added to the historical museum planned to center around Fort Pillow's Civil War role.

Criley said park planning delays were due to the tremendous expansion of the park system in the last decade, to more than 215 separate activities, but he said he anticipated a master plan by the middle of October and construction contracting before a \$900,000 appropriation would expire at fiscal year end.

He promised to bring master plans to another meeting with the commission as soon as they are ready.

Interior Secretary Names Fort Pillow One Of 13 National Landmark Areas

Secretary of the Interior Rogers C. B. Morton has announced selection of Fort Pillow as one of 13 National Historical Landmarks associated with blacks in America.

The designation is recognition by the Secretary of the site's exceptional historic value.

On the first Chickasaw Bluff, the fort was an earthen structure erected in 1861 by the state of Tennessee and in 1862 by Confederate engineers under orders of Gen. P. G. T. Beauregard. It was named in honor of Gen. Gideon Pillow.

On April 12, 1864, Union troops, mostly black, were over-run by Confederate troops under Gen. Nathan B. Forrest.

Top Crop Lost, Some Cotton Growers Quit

Boll weevils, gaining the upper hand during August's cool, damp, rainy period, denied cotton producers maximum mileage from insecticide applications, with the result: no top crop.

The outlook here is for an average of less than a bale per acre—maybe 3/4 bale. Some fields won't make as much as half a bale.

Some producers have indicated they will no longer grow cotton after this year.

With chemicals, fertilizer, seed, and all other inputs so much more costly, they cannot produce a pound of cotton for 46¢ to 48¢.

Producers spoken with this week already have this much—or more—in the crop.

Soybeans, in contrast, look more attractive. Prospects here are for a normal crop.

However, soybean diseases—some of them never before reported in this county—have been noticed this year.

Brown stem rot was found last week. Southern blight is wide-spread and has taken its toll. Stem canker has been found in some Mississippi River bottom-lands, but it appears that these will make a normal yield. Leaf spot and others prevalent each year do not affect yield.

Most of these diseases are seed borne. Clean seed and rotation help prevent them but is hard to do under our present cropping system.

Farmers Defoliate Cotton

Vernon McBride, Jack Crutcher, and other producers are this week applying chemicals to speed the defoliation of cotton.

While they are using planes for these applications, other producers employ "high-boy" sprayers, covering eight to 12 rows at a time.

The materials, called Def and Folex, are being used by most producers at 1 1/2 to two pints per acre. Where second growth is a problem, some cotton producers plan to use Parquat at the rate of four ounces per acre, or one gallon for 30 acres, in combination with Def or Folex.

Kansas experiments indicate effective results.

The Extension office has received many calls in the last two weeks on controlling fleas inside and outside the home.

To control fleas under the house and in the yard, use five ounces of 2% Malathion, rogan, fenitrothion, or 2 1/2 ounces of 24% Dimecron per gallon of water. One gallon of spray covers 1,000 square feet.

Within the home, use a hose-hold spray containing 3% Malathion or 3% Dimecron. Apply as light mist to floors, rugs, furniture, and baseboards. One quart should cover about 250 square feet and disoriented furniture.

Erosion Controls Spraying

Byron Eacus, of Durbanville, is sowing fescue and wheat in watersheds he has constructed in his cultivated fields.

Spraying rains caused so much erosion that he has taken advantage of an opportunity through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service to develop this system of disposing of surface water.

Wheat, sown at two bushels per acre, will provide some protection this winter as the fescue, 12 pounds per acre, grows to produce 25 pounds of nitrogen, 25 pounds of phosphate, and 75 pounds of potash, initially.

It works best when the average temperature for day and night is above 60 degrees. Nozzle sizes of X6 and X12, at 80-90 pounds pressure per square inch, break the spray into fine droplets.

The fungicide can be applied by broadcast at 1 1/2 to two pints per acre, at the rate of four ounces per 100 pounds of seed, or by the producer as a hopper box dust treatment, at the rate of three ounces per 100 pounds.

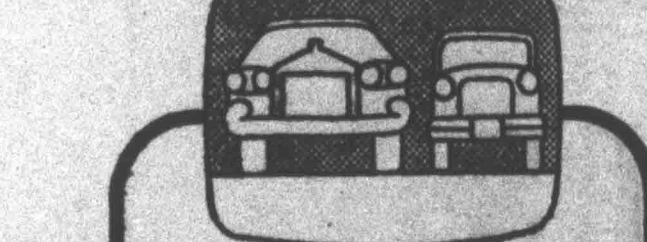

TVA Calls For Cutback In Use Of Electricity - The decline in TVA coal stockpiles has now reached the point where major reductions in the use of electricity are necessary to avoid the likelihood of power shortages, TVA announced today. "We need the immediate, voluntary help of every electric consumer in the TVA power service area to cut back around 20 percent in the use of electricity in order to stretch our scarce coal supply to meet the region's electric energy needs this winter," TVA Chairman Aubrey J. Wagner said. "It is absolutely imperative that each of us—in our homes, in our businesses, and in our industries—makes a dedicated effort to practice strict conservation in the use of electricity in the months ahead. If voluntary efforts do not provide sufficient savings, the only alternative will be more stringent measures which could include some type of rationing or mandatory allocation of power," Wagner said. In a letter to the 160 local power distributors, TVA pointed out that the stockpiles at TVA steam plants continue to decline despite best efforts to procure adequate coal supplies. The systemwide coal supply is now down to 47 days, well below the 90-day supply considered desirable. Ten of the 12 coal-fired plants are now down to a 31-day average coal supply, with several of the plants operating on an even smaller supply. For several months TVA has been burning 700,000 to 800,000 tons of coal per week to meet the region's electrical needs, while receiving only 500,000 to 600,000 tons per week. The average shortfall of around 200,000 tons a week is being met by drawing from stockpiles, causing the rapid decline in the reserve supplies. In a cooperative effort to help stretch the coal supplies through the winter, the local power distributors are urging every electric consumer to give full cooperation in voluntarily reducing electrical use to help meet the emergency. The distributors will be following electrical reduction guidelines developed earlier this year that include a wide variety of measures that consumers can take to reduce electrical use. Detailed information on these guidelines and other energy reduction steps will be made available by the local municipal and co-operative systems through the news media, printed literature, and by a variety of direct contacts with the public. TVA will continue to furnish regular reports on the status of coal supplies and will issue periodic reports on the effectiveness of energy reduction efforts. Both TVA and local distributors are intensifying efforts to reduce power use at their facilities. TVA has been in an energy reduction program at its steam plants, offices, and other facilities during the past year. This program has resulted in about a 30 per cent reduction in the use of electricity at these facilities from May through June over the same period a year ago. Ripley Power & Light Co.

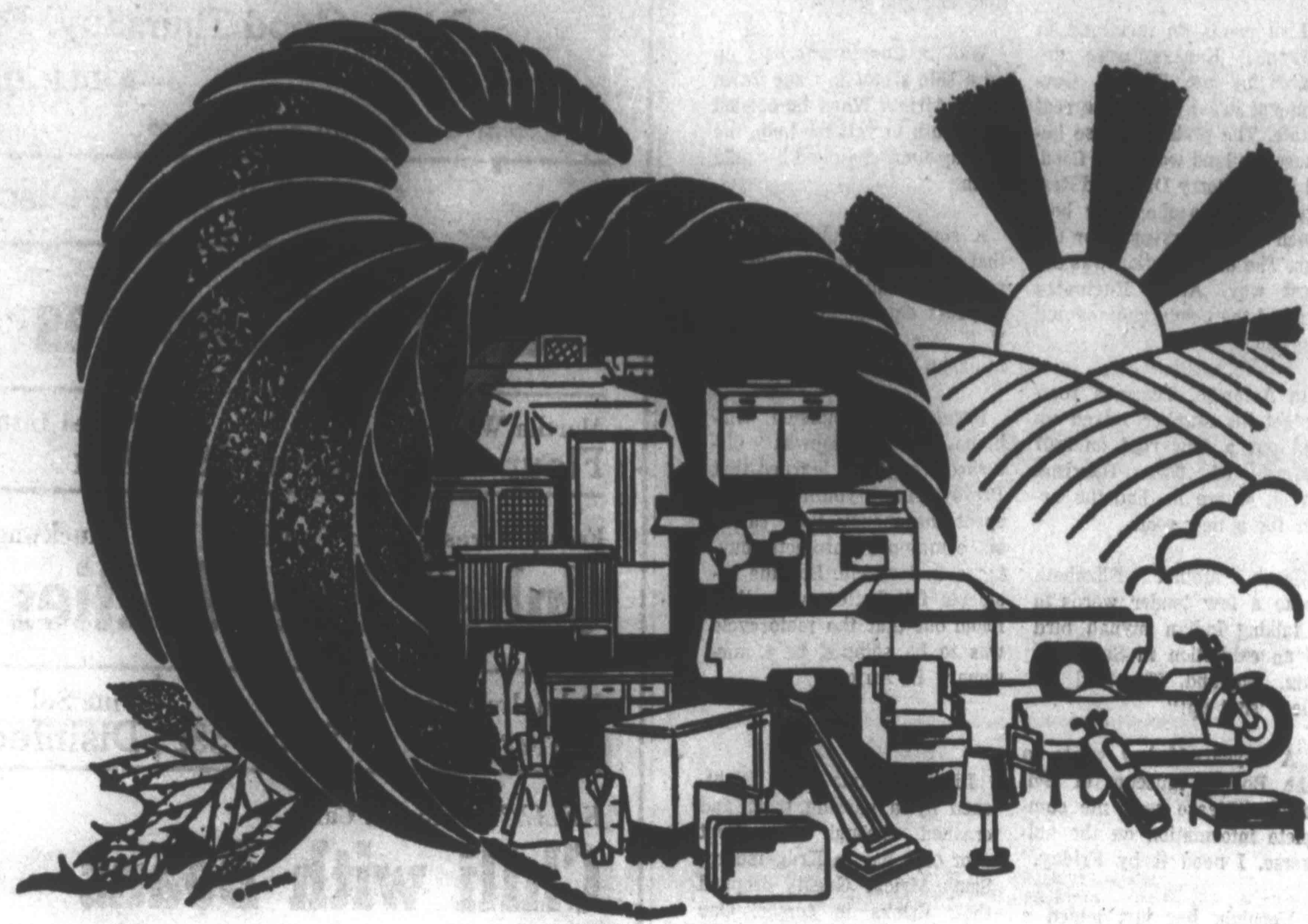

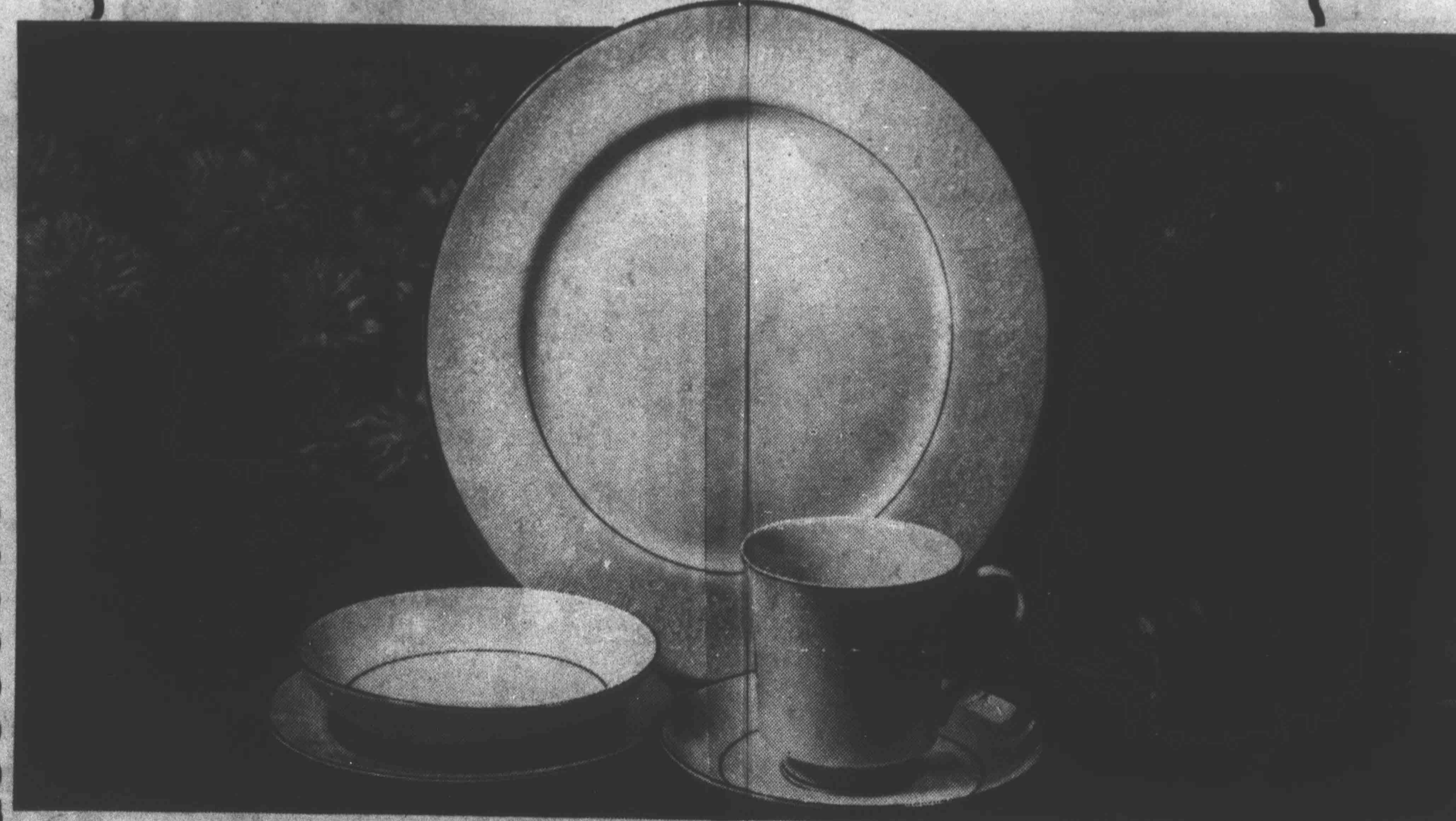
