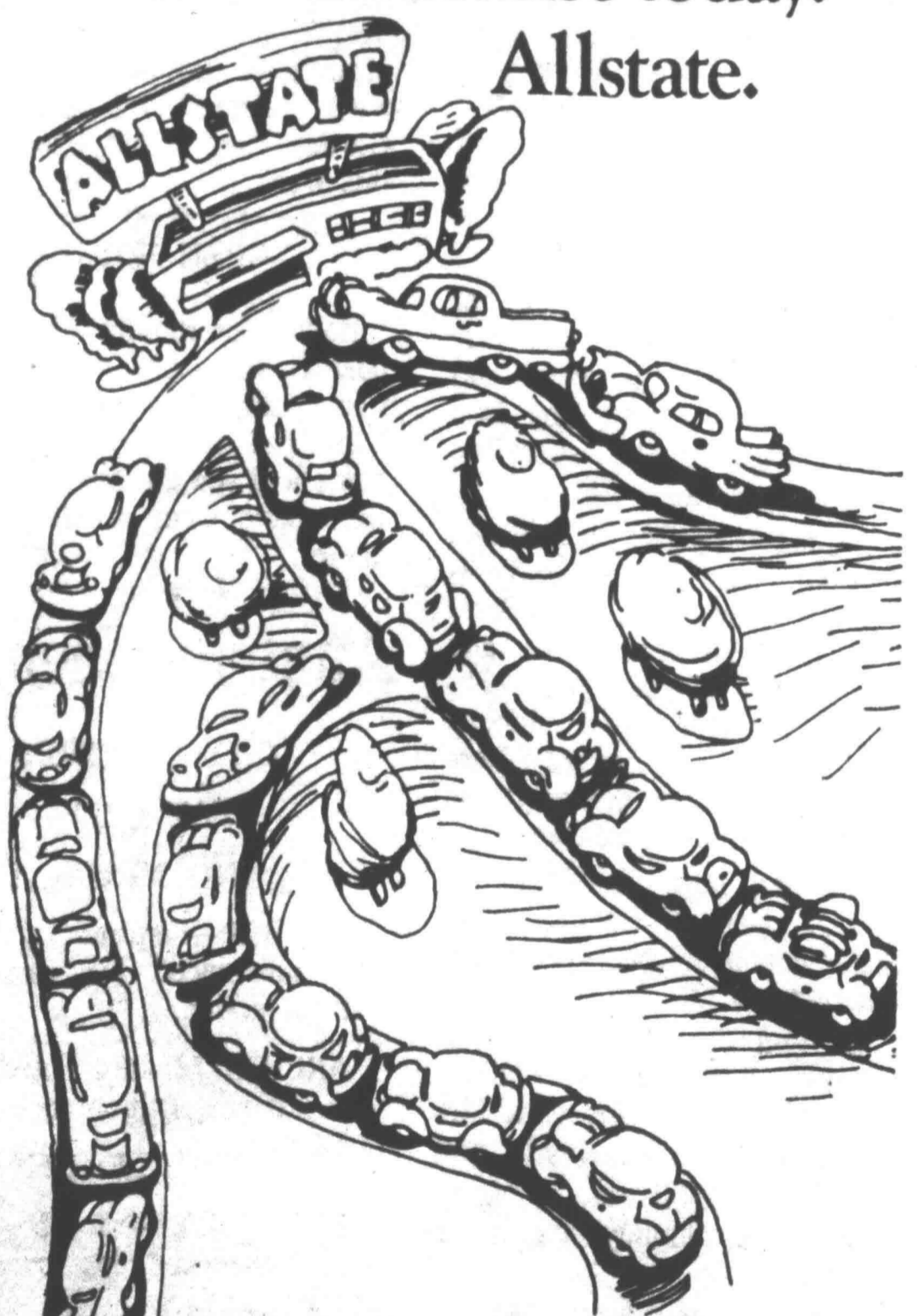
HAVE MIRACLES CEASED? (No. 2)

The topic of miracles is not only interesting, but it is also confusing to many people. In order to understand whether miracles have ceased, we need to get a clear understanding of the issue before us. We have noticed that (1) it is not whether miracles were performed in the past, but where in the passage that authorizes miracles today? (2) It is not a question of the power of God. God is all powerful, but where is the passage that says God will miraculously heal the sick today? And (3) it is not a question of prayer for the sick. We are taught to pray for our daily bread, but this does not mean that God will send bread directly from heaven.

In this lesson, we shall notice some other principles in order to get the issue clearly before us. IT IS NOT A QUESTION OF HEALING. Certainly God heals today, but how? There is a vast difference between being healed miraculously and being healed by using God's natural laws. These laws, of course, are divine. All healing is divine, but not all healing is miraculous. All bread is divine. It is provided by God's natural law.

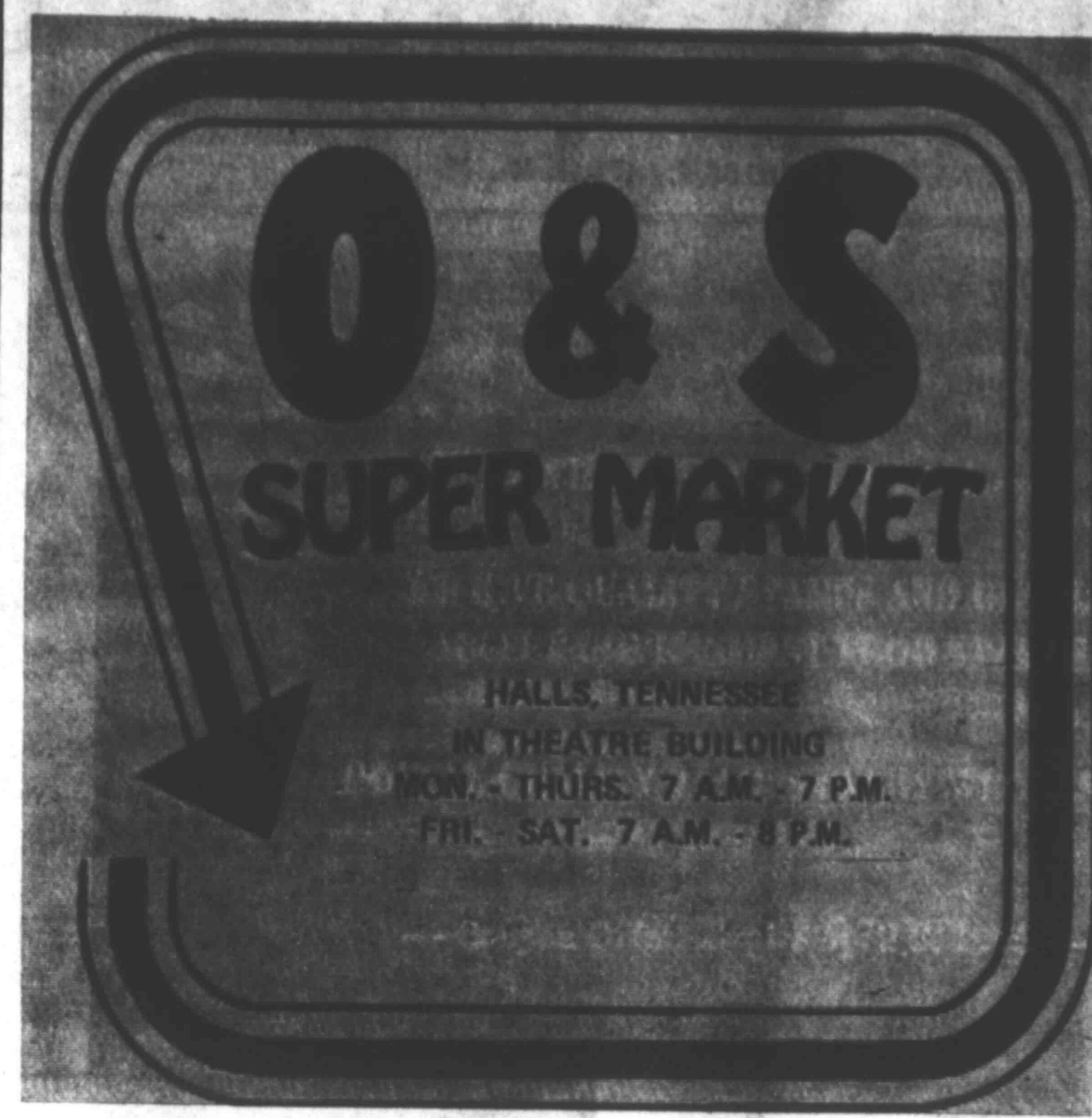

Lesson for April 13, 1975

Background Scripture Genesis 1:26-31
Deuteronial Reading: Psalm 150

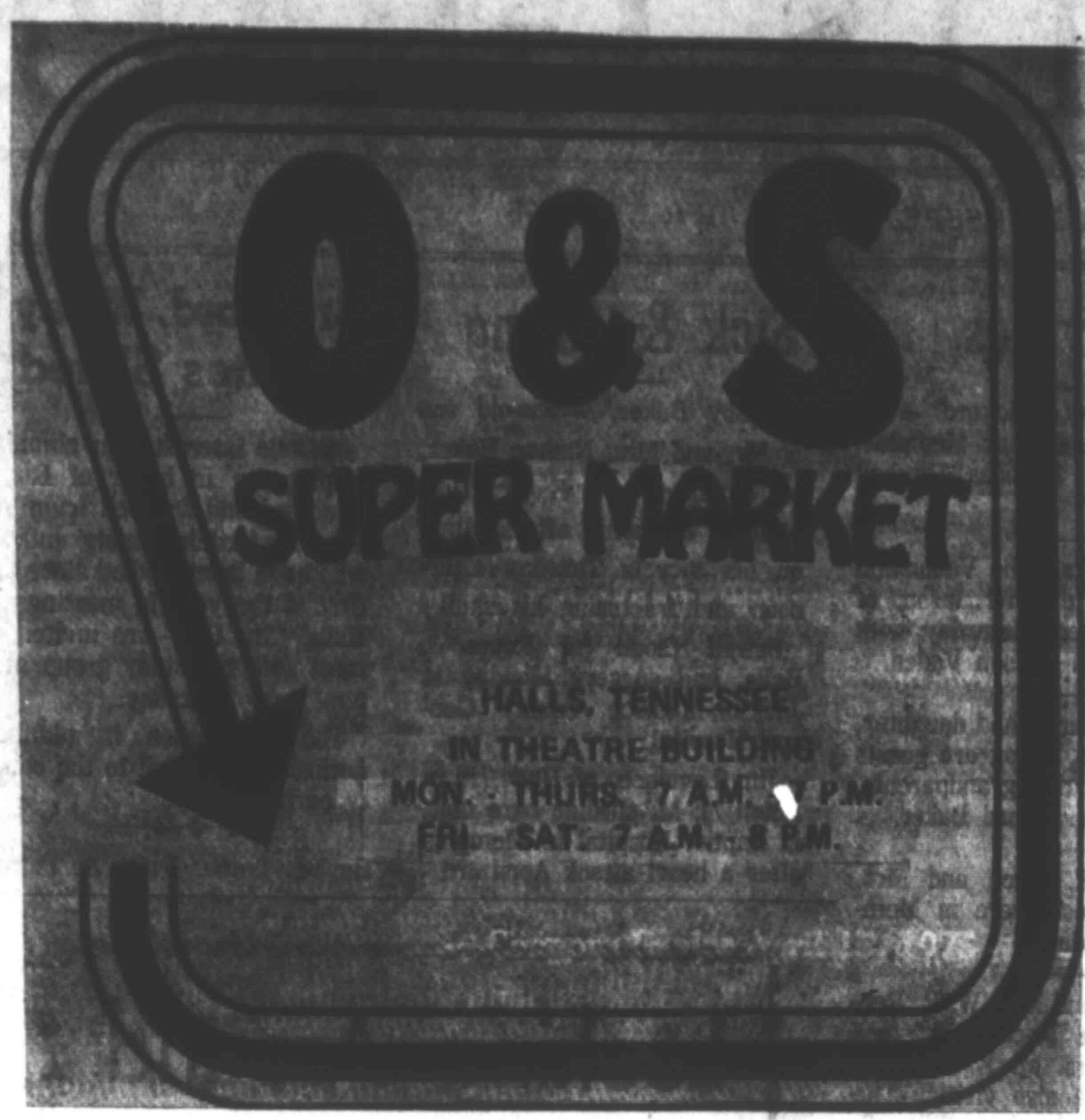

When it comes to God, however, and his grace for men, there is an answer on the question of "Which came first?"

You have seen. We all know that in the midst of their exodus from Egypt, God gave the people of Israel the Ten Commandments through Moses. There is hardly anyone in our culture who does not know the "Thou shalt not's" of Exodus 20. Most of us are aware that these commandments are the basis of the covenant between God and Israel. This is what God demanded of his people.

Yet, when we read the story from Exodus, we discover that something preceded the Ten Commandments. God did not begin his relationship (which is with the "covenant") with the people of Israel by making moral and ethical demands upon them.

Actually, he began the relationship with some action to save and help the people under Moses. Without any commitment from them, without any kind of agreement or promise, God saved the Israelites with a series of mighty acts. Thus, when Moses goes up onto the mountain to receive the commandments, God reminds him of what he has already done for the people: "You have seen what I did to the Egyptians, and how I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself" (Exodus 19:3). And, in what might be called the "promise" to the Ten Commandments, God says: "I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage" (20:2).

All of this God has done before he has asked anything of the people of Israel. There is no talk about which came first.

"Now therefore..."

It is because of what he has already done without obligation for the Israelites that he now calls them to live in obedience to him: "Now therefore, if you obey my voice and keep my covenant, you shall be my own possession among all peoples" (19:5). The "therefore" means because of what I have done, this is what I want you to do...

What God said to Israel through Moses he still says to us today because of what I have done for you, this is what I require of you. This means that God's grace always precedes his demands upon us. He speaks of what he has done for us, before he specifies what he wants from us.

Even then it is an offer more than a command. It is a relationship he offers us much more than is a set of rules. It is a relationship of love which he has already demonstrated for us in his mighty acts on our behalf. When the grace of God is concerned, there is really no question as to "Which comes first?"

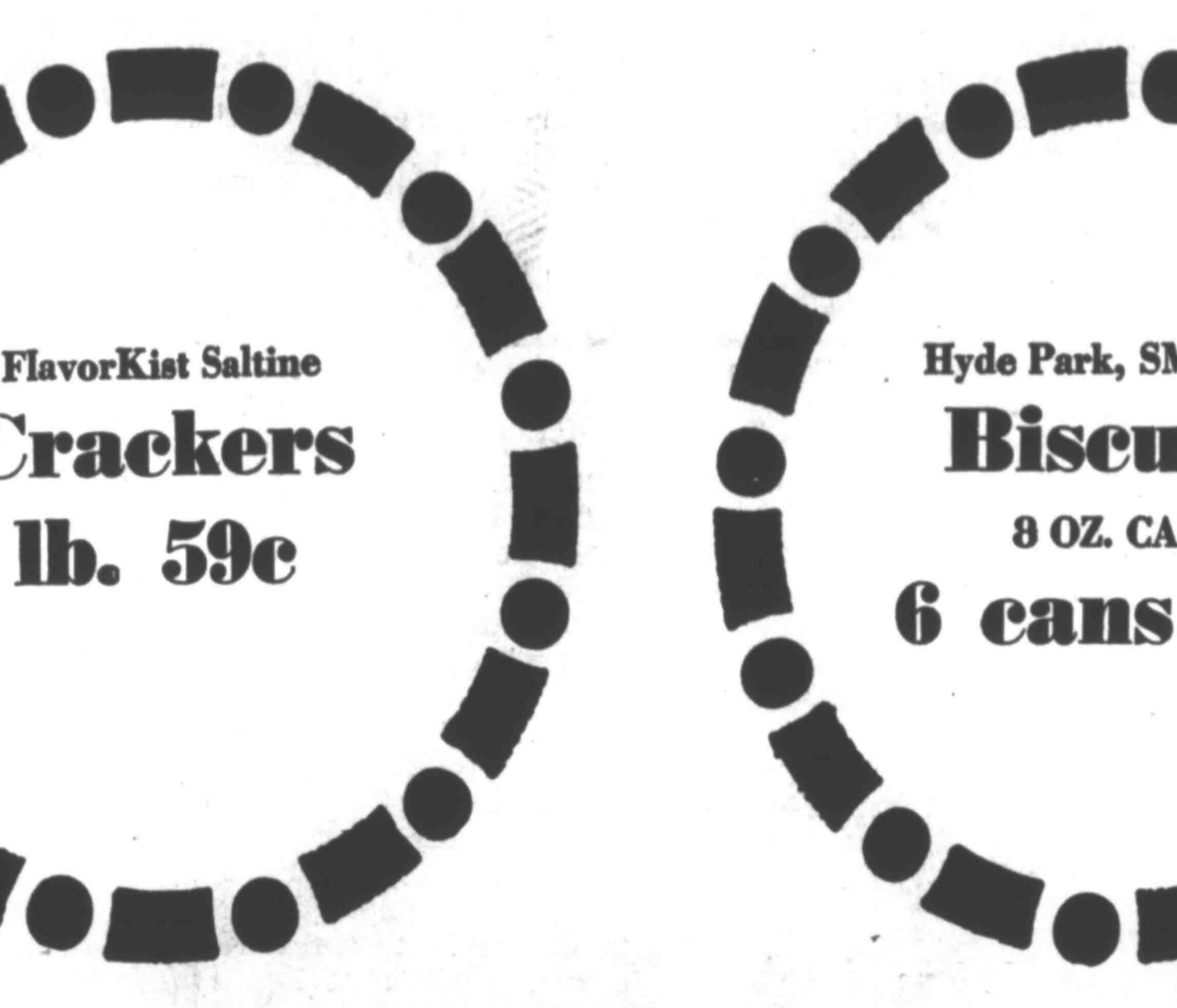
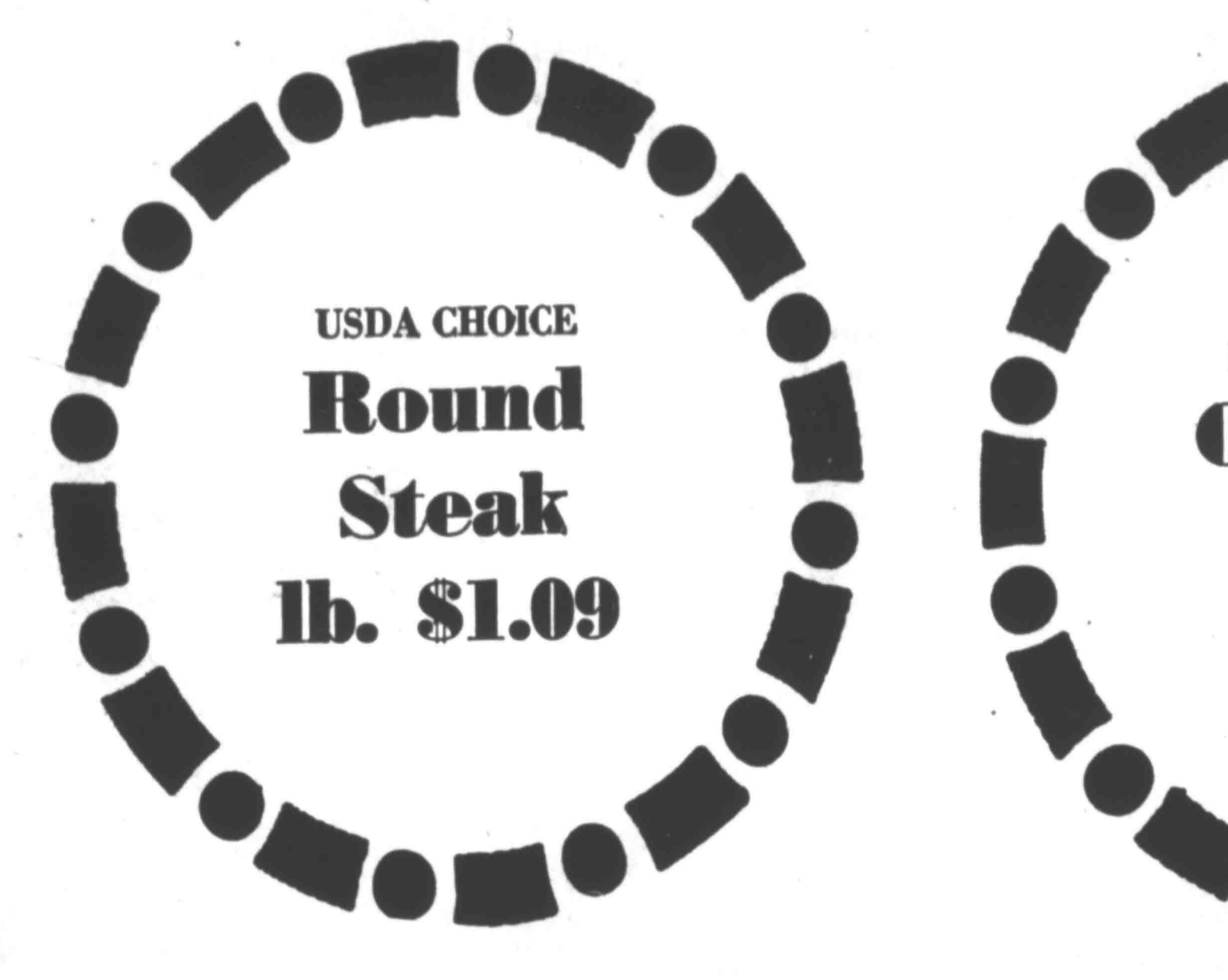

PURPOSE OF MIRACLES (No. 3)

In the first letter to the Corinthians, Paul deals at length with special gifts. In chapter twelve, he tells us the number of gifts-nine in all. Chapter thirteen tells how long these miracles were to last, and in chapter fourteen, Paul instructs the church how to use them while they remained.

Paul wrote: "Charity never faileth: but whether there be prophecies, they shall fail; whether there be knowledge, it shall vanish away. For we know in part, and we prophesy in part: But when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be done away." (1 Cor. 13:8-10). The "prophecies," "tongues," and "knowledge" in this passage are the miraculous powers mentioned in chapter twelve. Notice the language describing the duration of these miracles: "shall cease;" and "shall vanish away." That which is perfect is the perfect revelation, the Bible.

In Eph. 4:10-16, Paul sets the limit of special gifts. God had placed in the early church certain inspired workers. That is, certain ones who had these special gifts.

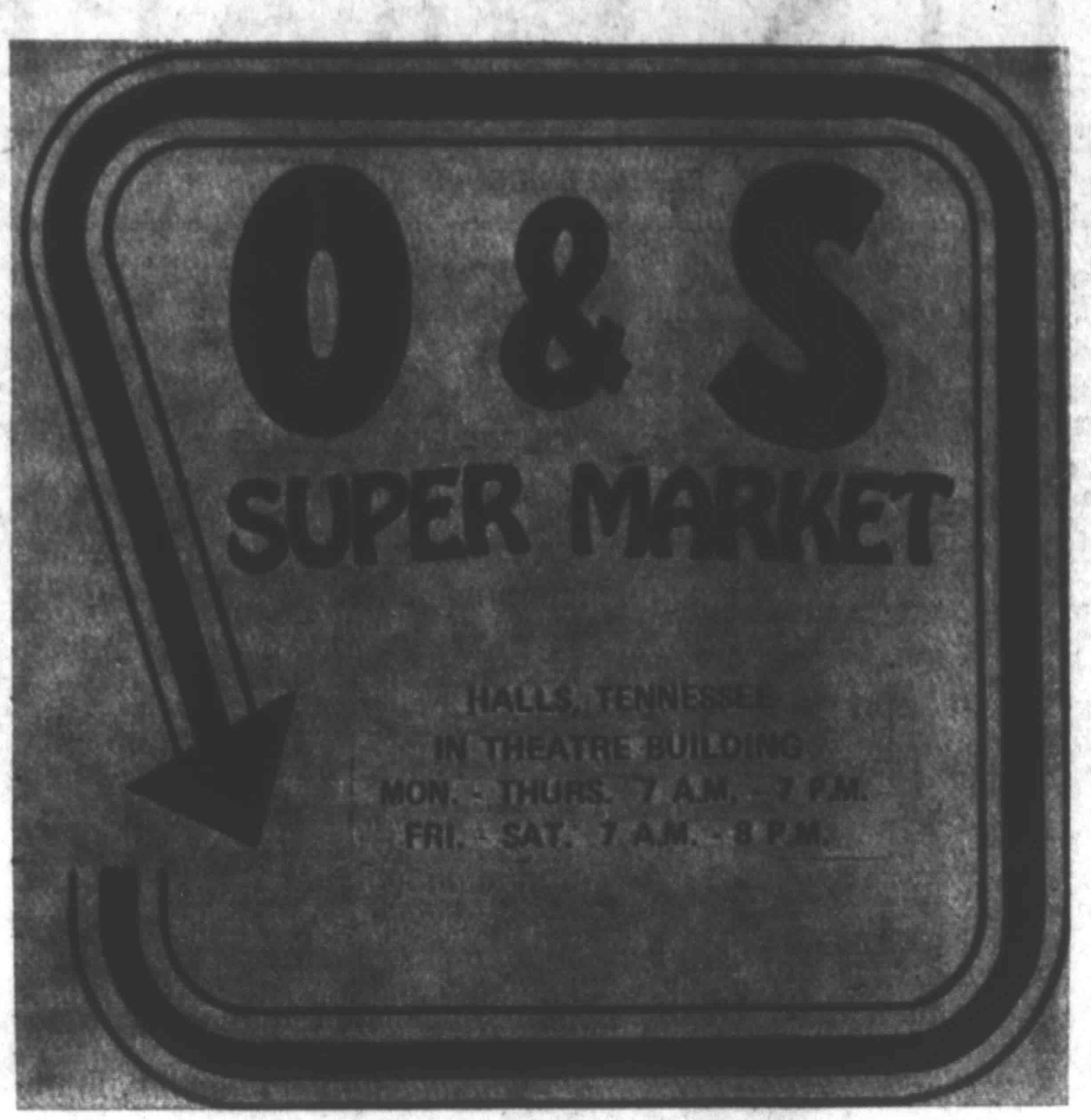

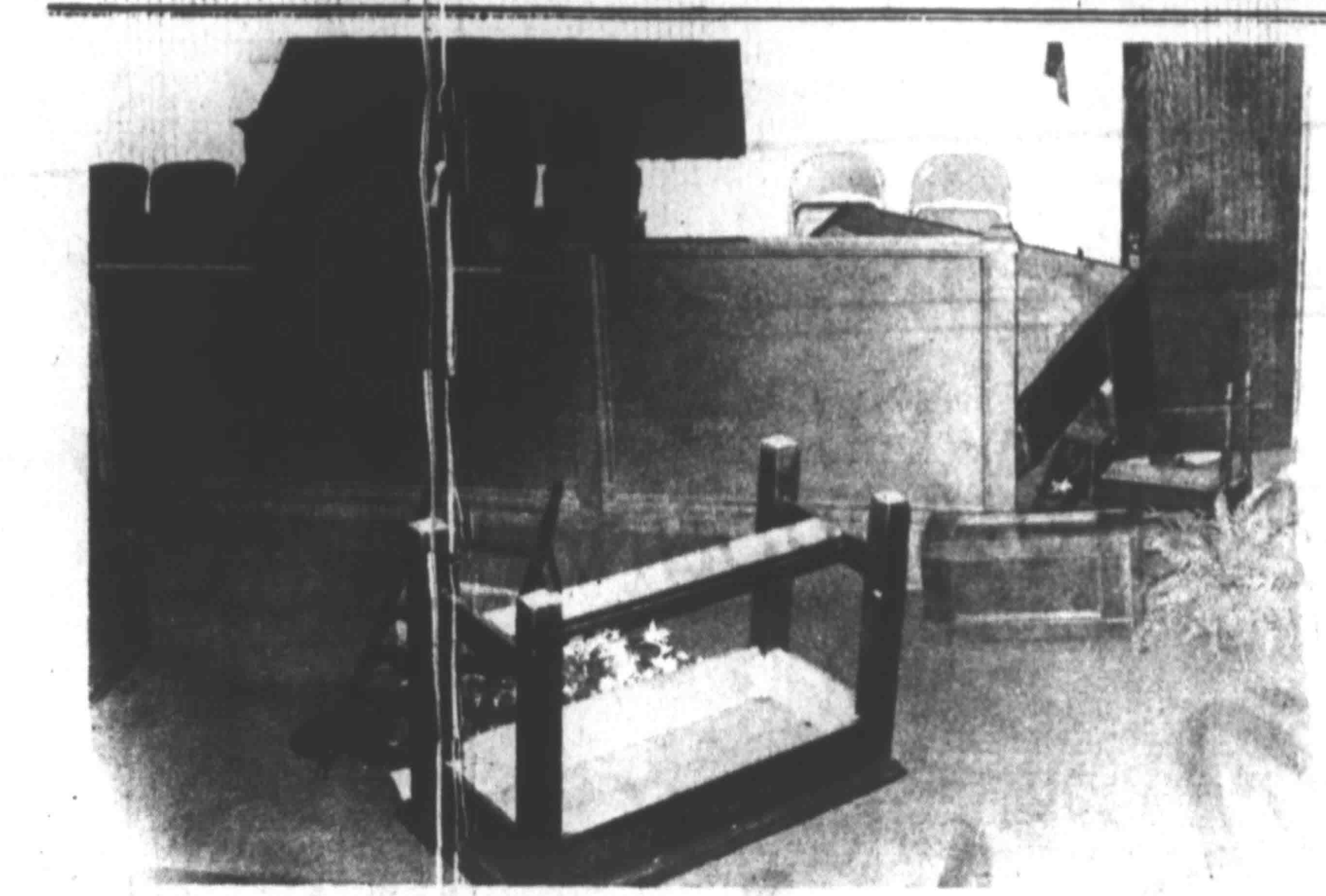
