THE DEITY OF CHRIST IN THE REVISED STANDARD VERSION (No. 1)

It is my conviction that the new translations of the Scriptures, especially beginning with the Revised Standard Version (1946 R.S.V.), cast reflection and doubt on the Deity of Christ Jesus. In this article, ample proof from the R.S.V. will be presented.

(1) The R.S.V. translators rendered the word "virgin" in Isa. 7:14 as "young woman." Why is it that out of the seven times where the Hebrew word "almah" is found in the Old Testament, these men rendered only one passage, Isa. 7:14, as "young woman." It is significant that they include a footnote, showing that "almah" can be translated "virgin." Why not translate it like the footnote? (See last week's article for a fuller discussion of this passage.)

(2) The R.S.V. adopted the policy of addressing God with the words "Thee" and "Thou," but the word "you" is used in reference to Jesus. These translators are not always consistent throughout the R.S.V. in following this policy, but they do understand the charge check Matt. 16:16 and Acts 1:6.

(3) The deletion of the word "begotten" from Job. 1:14,18 and 3:10 and other N.T. passages cast reflection on the Deity of Christ. The expression "only begotten" is from the original word "monogenes." The word "only" does not translate "monogenes" because "mono" means "only" and "genes" means "begotten." Thus, these translators have left out part of the original word which bears on the Deity of Christ.

(4) The derogative reference to Jesus as "something" in the R.S.V. (Matt. 2:6,41,42) is further proof of unwarranted changes in the text.

(5) In Matt. 1:25, Jesus is called the "firstborn son" of Mary. The R.S.V. leaves "firstborn" out!

There have been several reviews of the Revised Standard Version. Dr. John Scott of Northwestern University in one review has charged these translators with deliberate dishonesty. When one studies the hundreds of changes that have been made in the R.S.V., then he can understand the charge of Dr. Scott. (More to follow).

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THE DEITY OF CHRIST IN THE REVISED STANDARD VERSION (No. 2)

Translators of the Scriptures have a tremendous responsibility. In his book, *Bible Revision*, R. C. Trench has stated, "Clearly the office of the translator is to put the reader of the translation on the same vantage-ground as the reader of the original." Because of many deviations from the original languages, decisions, and changes, the Revised Standard Version (R.S.V.) should be rejected.

In this article, we will produce more passages from the R.S.V. that reflect on the Deity of Christ.

(4) When Gabriel announced the birth of Jesus to Mary, she replied, "How shall this be, seeing I know not a man?" (Lu. 1:34). The R.S.V. renders this verse: "How can this be, since I have no husband?" Anyone that can see through a ladder knows the difference in these statements. There are many homes for unwed mothers. These mothers could say, "I have no husband," but they could not say, "I know not a man."

(2) In Lu. 2:33, the expression, "Joseph and his mother" is found, but the R.S.V. changes this expression to "his father and his mother." This change places Joseph on the same level as the father of
