

### THE MASTER TEACHER

Lesson for January 5, 1974

Background Scripture: Matthew 5:17-48; 7:24-29; 10:24,25a, 13:33-52 Devotional Reading: Psalms 78:1-8.

One of the most beautiful afternoons of my life was spent on a lovely hillside overlooking the Sea of Galilee. Having visited this spot, the traditional Mount of the Sermon, with a tour group in December of 1973, I determin-

ful Italian chapel and from my lit-Rev. Althouse tle red New Testament I read the Sermon on the Mount. The familiar words took on a new significance for me as the Master Teacher spoke to my heart.

"... These words of mine ..." As many were drawn to Jesus because of his healing works, others were attracted because, as one of his disciples put it, "You have the words of eternal life." Men came to him, not only to be healed, but also to learn, to grow,

mature. They learned that the teachings of Jesus, new and different as they might seem, were neither of these. His teachings were linked to the teachings they already knew. What seemed different was both the intensity of these words and their tendency to make clear what before had been obscure. "I have not come o abolish them," said this Masconcern for men's physical wellbeing. When Jesus read the scroll of Isaiah in the synagogue, note how he focused on physical well-

. . . good news to the poor . . release to the captives . . . recovering of sight to the blind ... to set at liberty those who are

oppressed . . ." (Luke 4:18). When John the Baptist's disciples came to Jesus asking if he really were the Messiah, Jesus responded by pointing to his ministry to the physical and spiritual needs of men. It was his concern for people's bodies that made his "good news" so good.

But that you may know . . . We find this same focus in the daily ministry of Jesus. In Luke 4 we find concern for both body and soul. For one thing, Jesus could easily see that this man was suffering a physical ailment: he was paralyzed. Jesus quickly determined to set this man on his feet: "I say to you, rise, take up

your bed and go home" (4:24) Yet, Jesus cannot minister to the man's body without taking cognizance of his soul, too: "Man, your sins are forgiven you" (Luke 5:20). This, of course, gave the religious authorities difficulty. for they assumed that body and soul had to be kept separate. But to Jesus, body and soul are just two different sides of the same coin. And Jesus demonstrates this when he challenges the authorities: "Which is easier, to say, 'Your sins are forgiven you,' or to say, 'Rise and walk'? (Luke


