Who's Running?

On several occasions in the past we have found little interest in elections but never have we found so little interest as is being displayed in the forthcoming city election. The city election is slated for May 1st which means that the qualifying deadline for running for city offices is next weekend. The law calls for qualifying not later than forty-five days prior to the election so with the situation as it is the actual deadline would be Sunday, Mar. 16th, but the deadline will probably be on Saturday.

Mayor Sammie Arnold, appointed to fill out the term of James Cheshier after Cheshier's resignation, has indicated no willingness to seek the post again although he has not completely ruled out making the race to your editor.

Because of the upcoming decision on sewage disposal plans and the effort to secure park funds for Halls, we would hope that he would seek the office again along with enough of the present board to keep things moving.

No board member has stated to us that he will run again although at least two are certain to make the race and another pair are likely candidates. Again there is a possibility that all of the present members will run but it seems unlikely.

With the present state of the economy, the growing cost of city government, and the likelihood that we must build a new sewage disposal system, the town should have competent and dedicated officials. Every voter should urge the persons of his choice to make the race.

State of The Economy

Gov. Ray Blanton made a report to the state legislature Tuesday evening calling for a budget in excess of \$2.1 billion although major cuts were made in an effort to keep the budget within the anticipated state income.

Under present law and let's hope it stays that way, the state is forbidden deficit spending and must either raise sufficient funds to meet the demands or cut spending.

Included in the budget is a proposed \$400 a year raise for teachers and other state employees making less than \$10,000 a year. Also included in the budget is a 12% increase in pay for state legislators, judges, other state officials as passed by the past state legislature and which had now been ruled as required by law.

Along with the budget message, Gov. Blanton called for increased taxes to raise an additional \$40 million although this has been called a "bare bones" budget.

It occurs to us that the state employees including high officials, judges, legislators, as well as teachers, etc. might be thankful that they have jobs paying at the present level. Tennesseans are not likely to be in much of a mood for increased taxes or salary raises at this time although there is no doubt that many of the increases are justifiable and needed.

A REVIEW OF THE NEW ENGLISH BIBLE

The current generation is a time of translations, versions, and revisions. Roy E. Wallace, Jr. has estimated that there have been fifty different productions in the last fifty years.

The result of so many translations and versions has been confusion, discord, and division because each version has its nomenclature and phraseology. All so, most of these new productions are nothing more than springboards for different theological views.

THE NEW ENGLISH BIBLE is the product of liberal scholars of extreme modernism for the churches of England and Scotland and the English speaking world.

THE NEW ENGLISH BIBLE or N.E.B. has many omissions, changes, and doctrinal errors. The edition that is being reviewed was published in 1961.

In the introduction of the N.E.B., the revisers admitted, "Thus we have not felt obligated (as did the Revisers of 1881) to make an effort to render the same Greek word everywhere by the same English word." They conceded their task to be that of putting in

to their own words what they believed the original authors were saying! Friends, it is not their own words that we want to read, but it should be the words of the inspired writers. Translators of the Scriptures have a tremendous responsibility. In his book, BIBLE REVISION, R. C. Trench has stated, "Clearly the office of the translator is to put the reader of the translation on the same vantage-ground of the reader of the original."

In describing the Triumphant Entry of Jesus into Jerusalem (Matt. 21:1ff), these men combine and abbreviate verses 6-7 and they leave out "blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord," (vs. 9).

Lk. 22:19—After the Lord's words, "This is my body," the rest of verse 19 is left out, and the entire verse 20 is omitted! In Col. 1:14, the significant words "redemption" and "blood" are missing in the N.E.B. The last invitation found in the Bible is Rev. 22:17, and in this beautiful passage, the words "whoever will" are left out. Who gave these men the liberty of change the text? (More their task to be that of putting in

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\$5 Bushel Price For Fall Beans?

By Charles Feal
Farmers who contracted last fall to sell this year's soybeans at \$7 or more per bushel seem to have put themselves in a good position. Beans seem likely to sell this fall at the \$5 per bushel level, or below.

Prices for soybeans have declined steadily since last October. Farm prices for soybeans dropped from over \$8 per bushel last October to \$7 in December and were on the low side of \$6 in late January and below \$6 in February. Indications are that prices are due to the overall drop in economic activity in the United States.

In addition, the reduced demand for soybean oil and soybean meal and the resultant price decline for these two commodities has carried through to affect the overall price for soybeans.

Because of the general mood of pessimism that pervades much of the commodity buying at this time, businesses are restraining buying activity. Here in the United States, soybean crushings this season are expected to drop to around 750 million bushels compared with the record level of 821 million bushels in last year's season. Demand for soybean oil and meal has weakened and stocks are above year earlier levels.

Soybean exports are now estimated at around 475 million bushels compared with the record of 545 million bushels shipped in 1973-74. Economic recession and inflation in our major foreign markets, along with increased world supplies of competitive oil seeds in Brazil and fats and oils from other countries, have reduced demand for U. S. soybeans.

Producers should watch the market closely for day-to-day price increases as crushers go to the market. These price increases periods might be opportunities for those who have not already contracted beans to do so.

Chemical Aid Potatoes
Jack Chambers, of Edith, is always on the lookout for chemicals which will make his sweet potato operation more efficient by reducing labor for weed control or preventing disease. Two years ago, in co-operation with your Extension agent, Jack came up with Vernam, applied broadcast immediately before bedding disks set to cover the vine can shade the ground. This completely eliminates hand-hoeing. A new material on the market this year, Mercet 340-F, is a fungicide which prevents black rot. Seed pods are dipped in suspension of this material just before bedding.

This is the first control for blackrot and scurf which has been available. These diseases have been a problem for producers for many years.

Chick-Weed Troublesome
W. H. Hartman, of Halls, reports his garden enveloped by chick-weed. Other home-owners have had problems with this weed and with hibiscus. Both are winter annuals, difficult to control. The only material which will kill these weeds is 2,4-D, or Silvex. There is only one local source for this.

The most effective means of preventing chick-weed and henbit infestation is the use of pre-emergence herbicides. One such herbicide safe for use in home gardens is Dacthal.

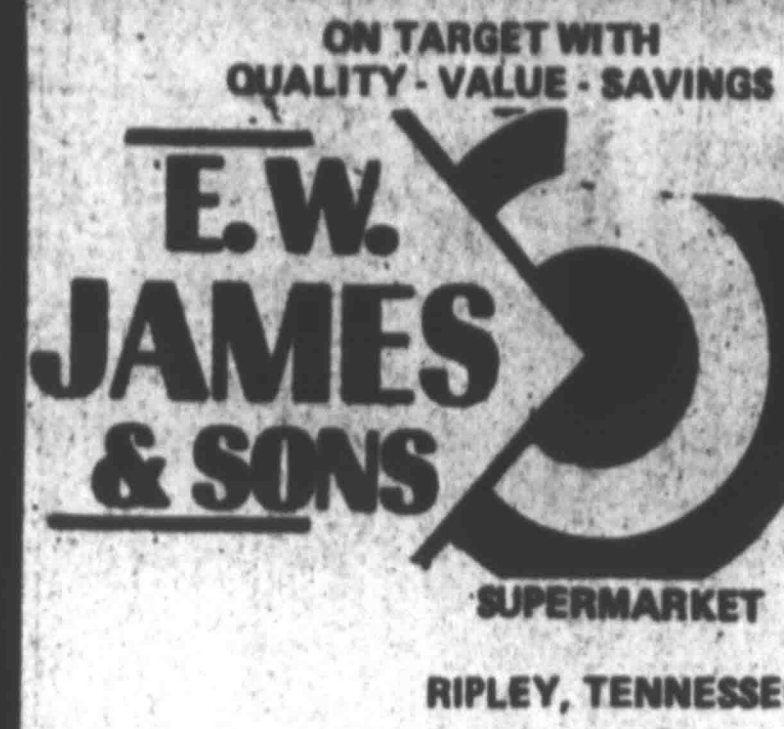

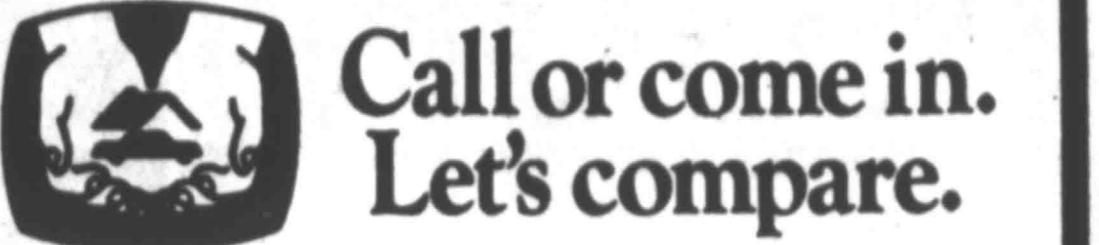

A MUTUAL STIRRING SOCIETY
Lesson for March 16, 1975

Background Scripture: Hebrews 5:1 through 11.
Devotional Reading: Matthew 5:5-11.

Some time ago a wonderful friend and parishioner passed away following many years of struggle against cancer. This woman had been an inspiration to many because of her undiminished faith that conquered both sickness and death. People with lesser ills and troubles were frequently named and lifted by her inspiring witness.

She passed on her passing, one Rev. Althouse of her friends confided that he wanted to attend church so that he could find "a faith as powerful as that." It must be said that that faith to which she was dependent upon her own unique personality, yet at the same time it was also true that that native faith was much nurtured by a Christian fellowship. The fellowship was vital to this individual.

To stir up one another... "The life of a church" is to be the kind of fellowship in which faith is planted and nurtured. If it is not, this group of people, regardless of how organized and authorized, can really be a "church." If it is not a nurturing fellowship, it is not a church.

In the Epistle to the Hebrews the writer admonishes his readers to "hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering..." (10:23). Still, it is easier said than done. It is one thing to tell people to keep their faith, but something else to tell them how.

Thus, the writer of Hebrews goes on to point to the source of help in maintaining their faith: "... let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another..." (10:24-25).

Christians would do well to carefully consider this advice. The writer of Hebrews calls for us to "stir up" one another. Actually, the church should be a kind of "mutual-stirring society" where people are challenged and inspired to an ever-increasing level of love and service to one another. That's not perfect attendance or community acceptance. Should be the great goal of our participation in a church fellowship.

Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that "The Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law" as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court will be enforced throughout the county.

All Dogs 3 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian
All Cats 6 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1975, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

The law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dogs owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$2.50 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

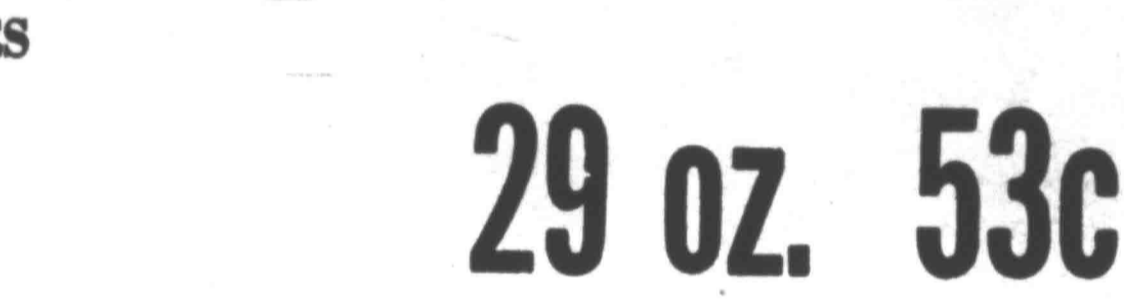
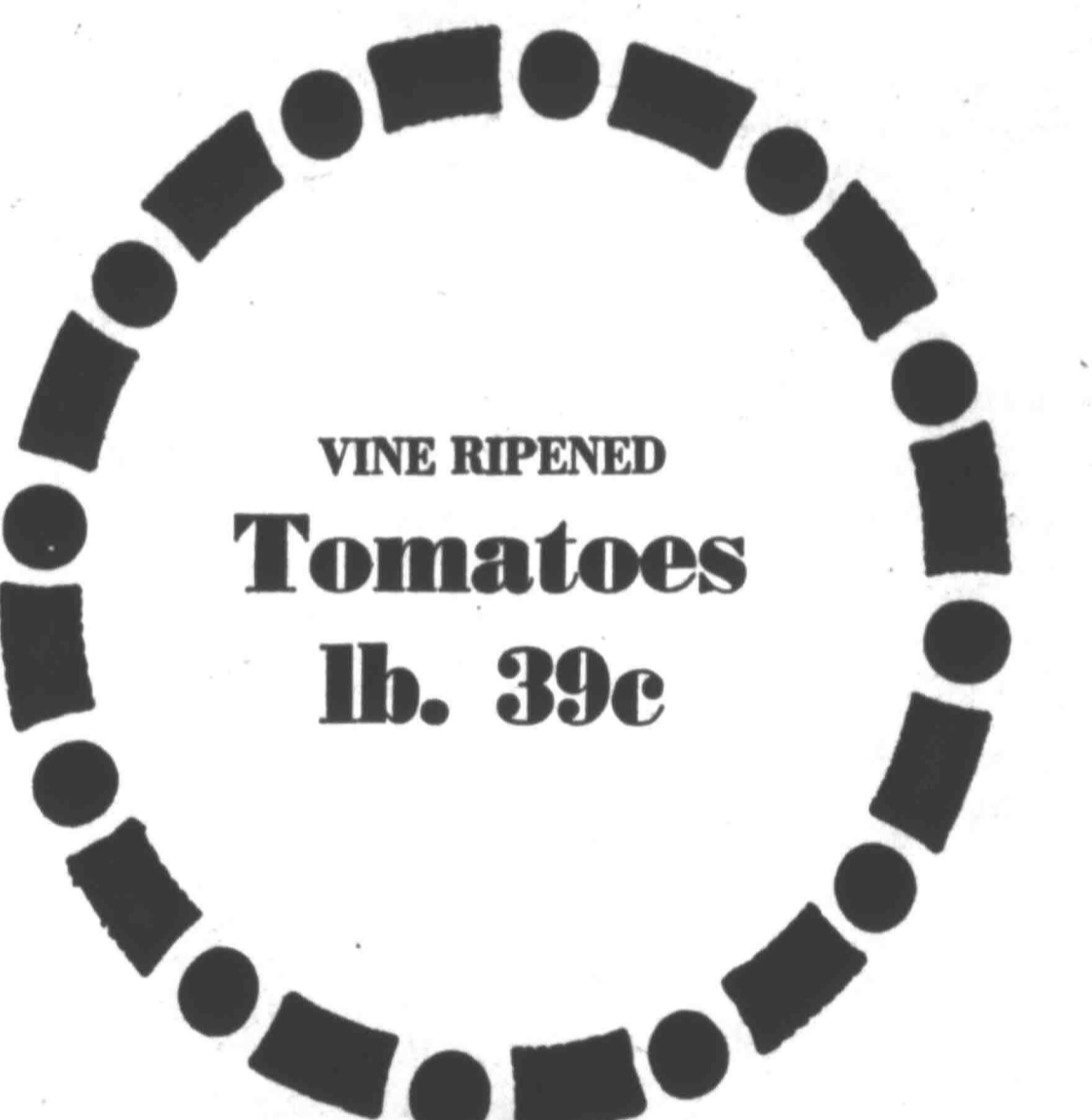
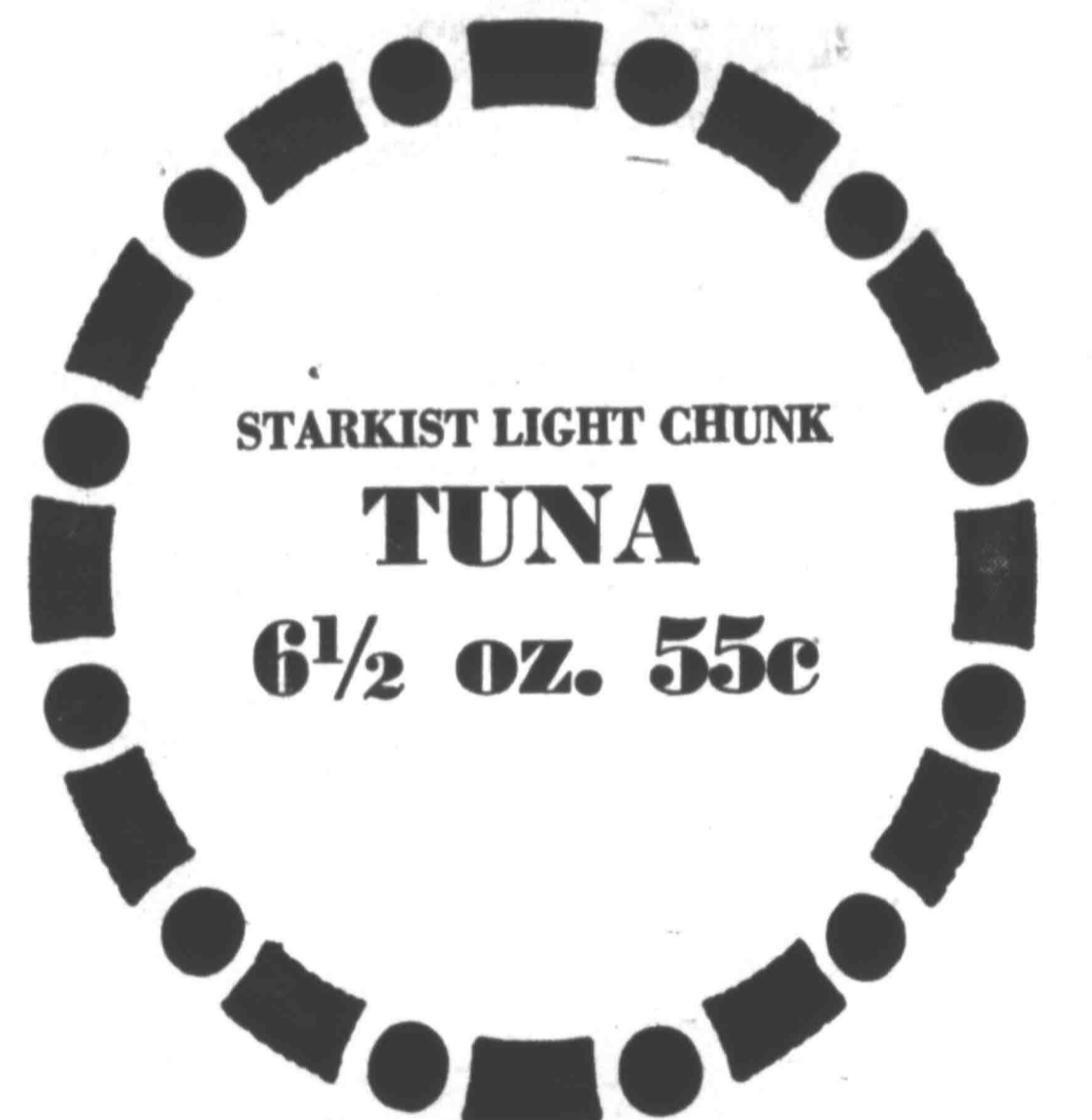

Permits Needed For Buildings

Halls officials are concerned that Halls growth in an attractive and efficient manner. To help coordinate this growth, they have developed a system of regulations to direct patterns of new development, and city officials are available to provide information to anyone who plans to build in Halls.

Building Inspector Joe Clyde Escue noted, "All contractors and builders should be familiar with the laws concerning subdivisions and other building procedures, and private citizens who plan to build new homes or make additions to their present homes should also have knowledge of these regulations."

The use of building permits helps the city to keep up with new growth of all types. The permit must be obtained before any type of construction is begun. According to the law, persons may not "commence the excavation for the construction of any building, including accessory building, or to commence the moving or alteration of any building, including accessory buildings, until the building inspector has issued a building permit for such work."

Some of the city's developmental regulations are prepared with the help of the Halls Planning Commission. Included in these rules are the zoning ordinance, subdivision regulations, and the mobile home park ordinance. These laws, along with the requirement of building permits, help to insure Halls residents that new growth in the town will meet community standards.

HAVE MIRACLES CEASED?

The question of divine healing is confusing to many people. This should not be so because one needs only to understand a few simple passages and what the issue is to be able to comprehend the matter. Did God intend that miraculous healing be continued by His disciples for all time? Are miracles of healing wrought today? In order to understand whether miracles have ceased, we need to get a clear understanding of the issue before us.
YESTERDAY, BUT TODAY, All Bible believers recognize that miracles of healing were performed in the past—that is, in the days of Christ and the apostles. Luke writes, "For the man was more than forty years old on whom the miracle of healing was wrought" (Acts 4:22). That Christ and the apostles worked miracles of healing, no one can successfully deny. The issue is not what they did. It is not where such miracles wrought, but where is the passage that says they are for us today?
IT IS NOT A QUESTION OF POWER. Certainly God is powerful enough to heal a man by a mira-

cle. It is not what God can do but what does God do today? In the creation, God could have made pecans grow on a watermelon tree. It is not where can God make pecans grow, but where does He make them grow? God's law is that pecans grow on a pecan tree. Is His law. In the healing of the sick, it is not what God can do, but what is the law concerning the sick? The question before us is not one of power, but of law and fact.
What is God's law today? Where is the passage that says God will miraculously heal the sick today? IT IS NOT EVEN A QUESTION OF PRAYER FOR THE SICK. We all believe that it is right to pray for the sick. We should pray for all men everywhere. We must be given prayer for our daily bread. That, however, does not mean that God will hand us a loaf of bread directly from heaven. Bread must be gotten according to God's natural law. Yet, we must pray for it. To ignore the natural law concerning bread is to starve. God has certain natural laws in regard to the sick. To ignore them is to fail in God's plan for the sick today.

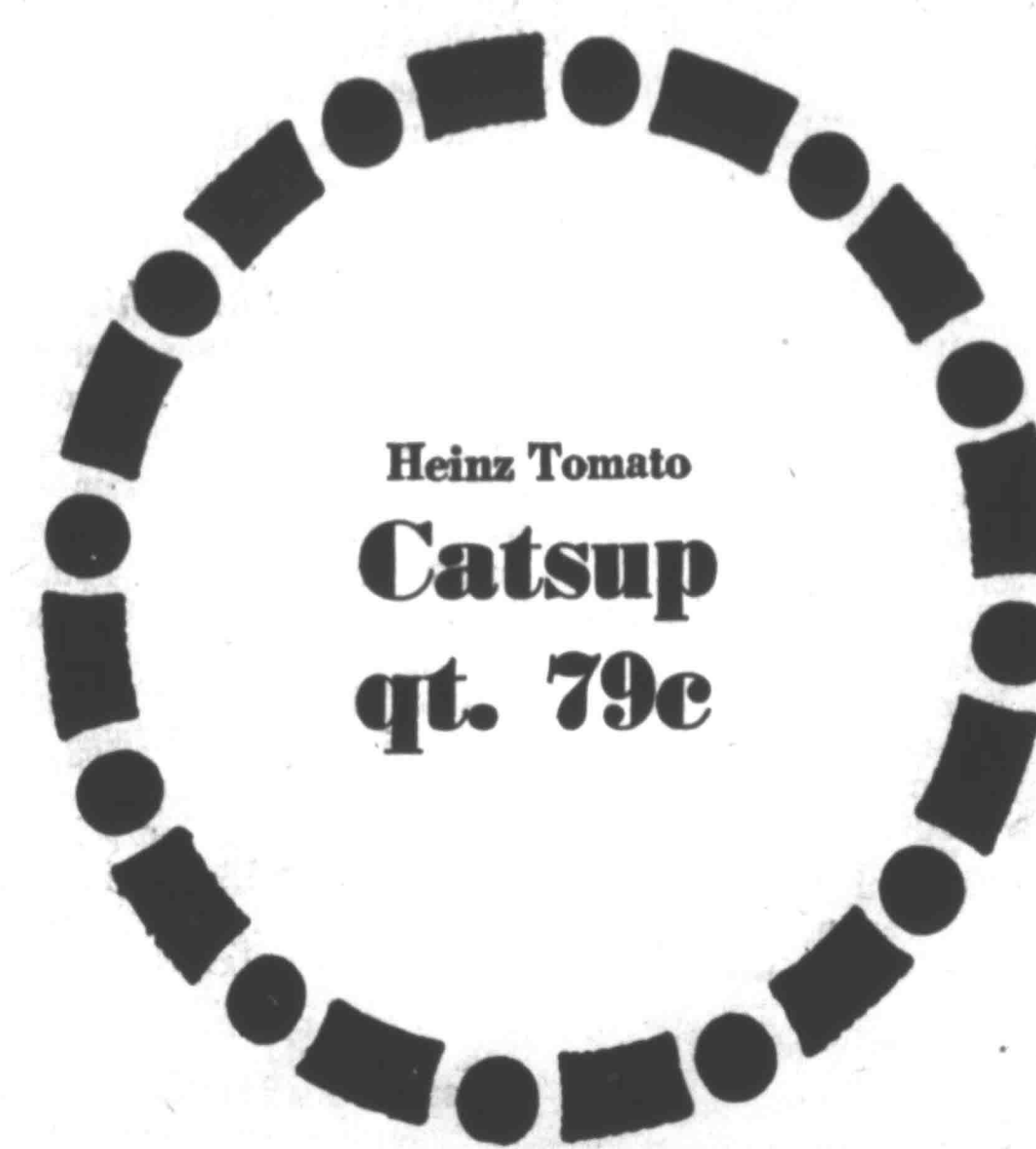

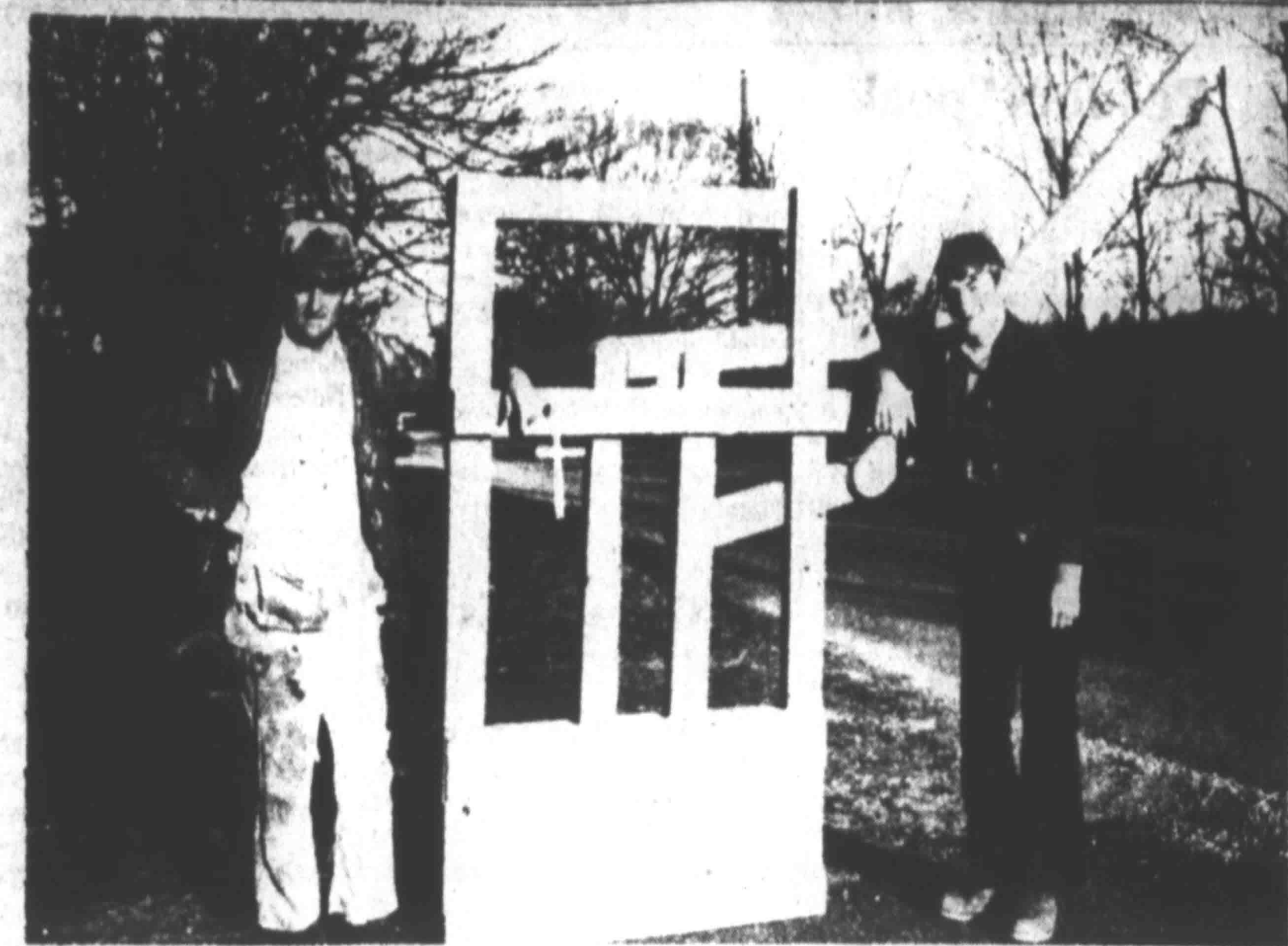

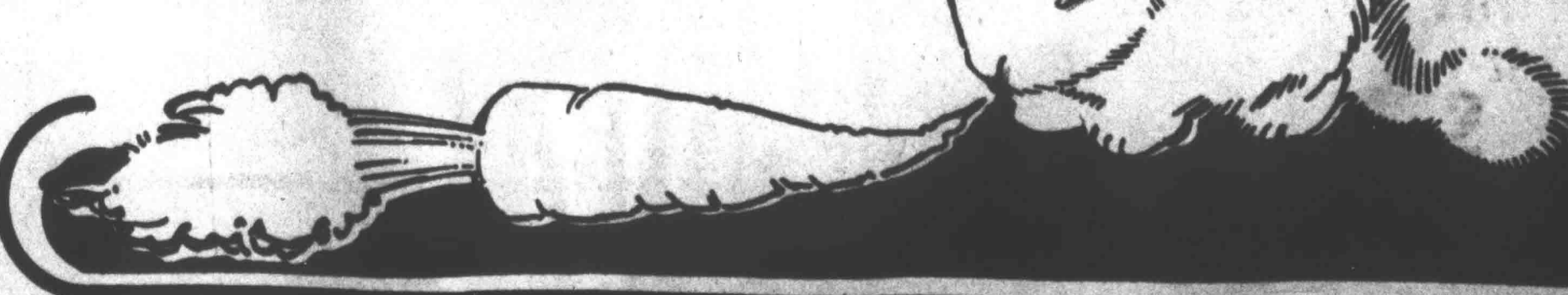
