we do not walk alone throug life: the faithfulness of God. As the writer of Hebrews assures us "...he who promised is faithful' (10:23). In the Christian fellowship we share with each other both the age-old stories o God's faithfulness and the contemporary evidences of his goodness in our own lives. In this fellowship we find that the Go who did not forsake Israel, who kept his promises to Jesus Nazareth, will also be with us in the midst of life.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1975, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored. The law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rables vaccination produced for each dog to be licensed

In order to help dogs owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$2.50 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs v

Because of Christ's resurrection through which we become like him, conquerors of death, we can therefore live victoriously Easter, thus, is more than the "happy ending" to the story of Jesus. It is much more a "happy beginning" to new life through his ower. It means, not only life after death, but life before death With everything good So Easter is not just

celebration, it is time when we are given power to live victoriously in the midst of both life and death. The power that broke open the grave of Jesus and se him free is also the same power that enables us to meet the challenges and obstacles along life's way.

A well-known Christian enediction drawn from the Epistle to the Hebrews makes this point:

Now may the God of peace who brought again from the dead ou Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, equip you with everything good that you may do his will, working in you that which is pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen. (13:20.21)In other words, the resurrected Christ will give us the resources we need in order to meet the challenges and opportunities life. Easter equips us to do God's will in our daily lives.

That you may do his will In what ways? The writer of Hebrews spells out some specifics: "Let brotherly love continue...'' (That certainly requires some good equipment. "Do not negelect to show hospitality to strangers" (That

"Remember those that are prison" (Still another.) "Let marriage be held in honor among all" (And another.) "Keep your life free from the love of money" (Here too!) There seems to be no end of opportunities and challenge hrough which we may make nanifest the power of the esurrection with which God quins us. Just as the early lisciples were empowered to turn the world "upside down," so the consequence of Easter in our own

time must be equally evident in the world around us. For the same resurrection power is sti

Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that "The Tennessee Anti-Rabies" Law" as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court will be enforced throughout the county.

All Dogs 3 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian All Cats 6 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1975, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

The law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination / produced for each dog to be licensed


In order to help dogs owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$2.50 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs car be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs with-




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
