Tuesday's qualifying deadline passed with eight candidates for sheriff but all other officials elected county-wide unopposed for re-election.

The sheriff candidates are incumbent Joe O'Steen, Thomas E. Brown, Billy Joe Childress, Louis Craig, Lewis Gitchell, Clarence Holcomb, Henry L. Love, and Woodrow W. Scearce.

Without opponents are County Court Clerk Vernon McBride, Jr., Trustee Paul Meadows, Register Nolan Criner, and Circuit Court Clerk Don Connell.





THE LATE IRVIN 'TINY' KNEE was among eight men-four surviving-admitted into the Sports Hall of Fame at Cumberland College in Lebanon, founded last year. His widow, Mrs. Willard Knee, of Ripley, and their only child, Mrs. Ned Rooks, of Brownsville, were among the honor guests at the ceremony, along with Mr. and Mrs. Homer Knee, of Watertown.

They were presented a walnut plaque with engraved brass plate and a citation reading as follows:

"Because he both coached and played football during his four years as a Cumberland athlete, the 1924 team ranking third in Tennessee and the 1926 team losing only two games, the record for the seasons 1923-26 being 23 wins and 11 losses;

"And because he continued at Cumberland a record of achievement that he had begun at Wabash College in his native Indiana after earning a position on the All-State high school football team for two years, then earning a backfield position alongside Jim Crowley of 'Four Horsemen' fame on the All-Indiana college team in 1922;

"And because he was also an outstanding performer at track, setting the Indiana intercollegiate record for the javelin throw and a still unbroken record in that event in an Eastern intercollegiate meet in 1923; "And because he also coached basketball at Cumberland for three years, and introduced golf as an intercollegiate sport, designing and supervising the building of a nine-hole golf course on the university campus; "And because he was known as 'the incomparable Knee' and was considered 'the fastest man at circling the ends that ever wore the Maroon and White' and led Cumberland to a 17-0 victory over the University of Tennessee Medical School at Memphis, the first defeat for the Docs in eight years; "And because he subsequently went to Ripley, Tennessee, in 1927 and remained there until his death in 1968, not only rebuilding the Ripley High School football program but building a field and track that is named Irvin Knee Field and developing a public recreation park called 'Tiny Town' in his honor, his teams winning championships in football, track, and basketball;



LARRY TILLMAN, Ripley High School graduate who played football for Murray, Ky., State University from 1965 to 1968, was inducted into the MSU Athletic Hall of Fame in its All-Sports Banquet Wednesday.

Tillman, a 5-9, 170-pound gurterback from Ripley, guided Murray to one of its best records ever in 1968 (7-2-1) and stills holds most MSU passing records.

He was named the Ohio Valley Conference's "Offensive Player of the Year" in 1968.

He played his first season at Murray as a defensive back and was named to the All-OVC team at that position in 1965.

As a reserve quarterback in 1966, he completed 32 of 71 passes for 463 yards and three touchdowns. He started at quarterback in 1967 and completed 190 of 380 passes for 2,300 yards and 18 touchdowns.



HETTY B. Born in Haywood County in 1948, she was encouraged by Mrs. Izora Bowers and the late Mrs. Ora B. Bowers, teachers in Currin's Elementary School in St. Luke community, to continue her education. She was graduated from Carver High School in Brownsville and received a bachelor of science degree from Tuskegee, Ala., Institute in 1970, to which she returned, after a year of teaching in Halls High School, to earn her master of education degree in science and mathematics education in 1973. She served on Tuskegee's Educational and Executive Councils, won the Student National Education Association Award in 1969, and was chosen for 'Who's Who Among College And University Students" in 1970. She is a member of the National Education Assocation, Kappa Delta Pi, education honorary, lota Sigma Pi, women in science honorary, Sigma Xi, research potential honorary, and Zeta Phi Beta, social society, a co-ed affiliate of the Pershing Rifles, and a member of the National Black Science Student Organization.

In 1968, he completed 162 of 307 passes for 2,206 yards and 25 touchdowns.

His career passing statistics are 384 completions in 758 attempts for 4,969 yards and 46 touchdowns. All are Murray records, and most are OVC records.

In a 35-14 victory over Middle Tennessee in 1967, he completed 28 of 71 passes for 425 yards and four touchdowns. He once threw five touchdown passes against Austin Peay.

The Racers lost the OVC championship in 1968 when they were edged 21-20 by Eastern Kentucky. A Tillman touchdown pass in the final seconds, which would have won the game, was lost on a penalty call.

I wanted to take this opportunity to express to your department and in particular the three firemen who were in attendance at the above referenced my sincere appreciation and personal gratitude for the service that you rendered in the recent tragedy in one of the counties that I serve. Waverly is in Humphreys County where I prosecute on Wednesday of each week. I arrived at the scene of the explosion approximately one hour after the occurrence. Needless to say, chaos and fear were ever present.

During the minutes immediately following the blast, the need for personnel to aid with the treatment and evacuation of the injured was grave. It was comforting to see the many people from the surrounding counties and even from West Tennessee respond in the manner in which they did to a small town's cry for help. I want you to know that you endeavors in these people's behalf did not go unnoticed.

It was not until some weeks following this tragedy that I became aware that my hometown had persons present and participating in the aid to victims. The portable generator and floodlights that were brought to the scene by the Lauderdale County Rescue Squad proved invaluable during the first night of the blast. There illumination provided some benefit to those of us working in and out of the cemporary morgue facility.

The courage you have demonstrated and the willingness to serve others is truly an outstanding attribute for each of you to possess.

Thanking you once again for your assistance to the citizens of this county within my circuit, and looking forward to being able to see you in the future, I remain,
