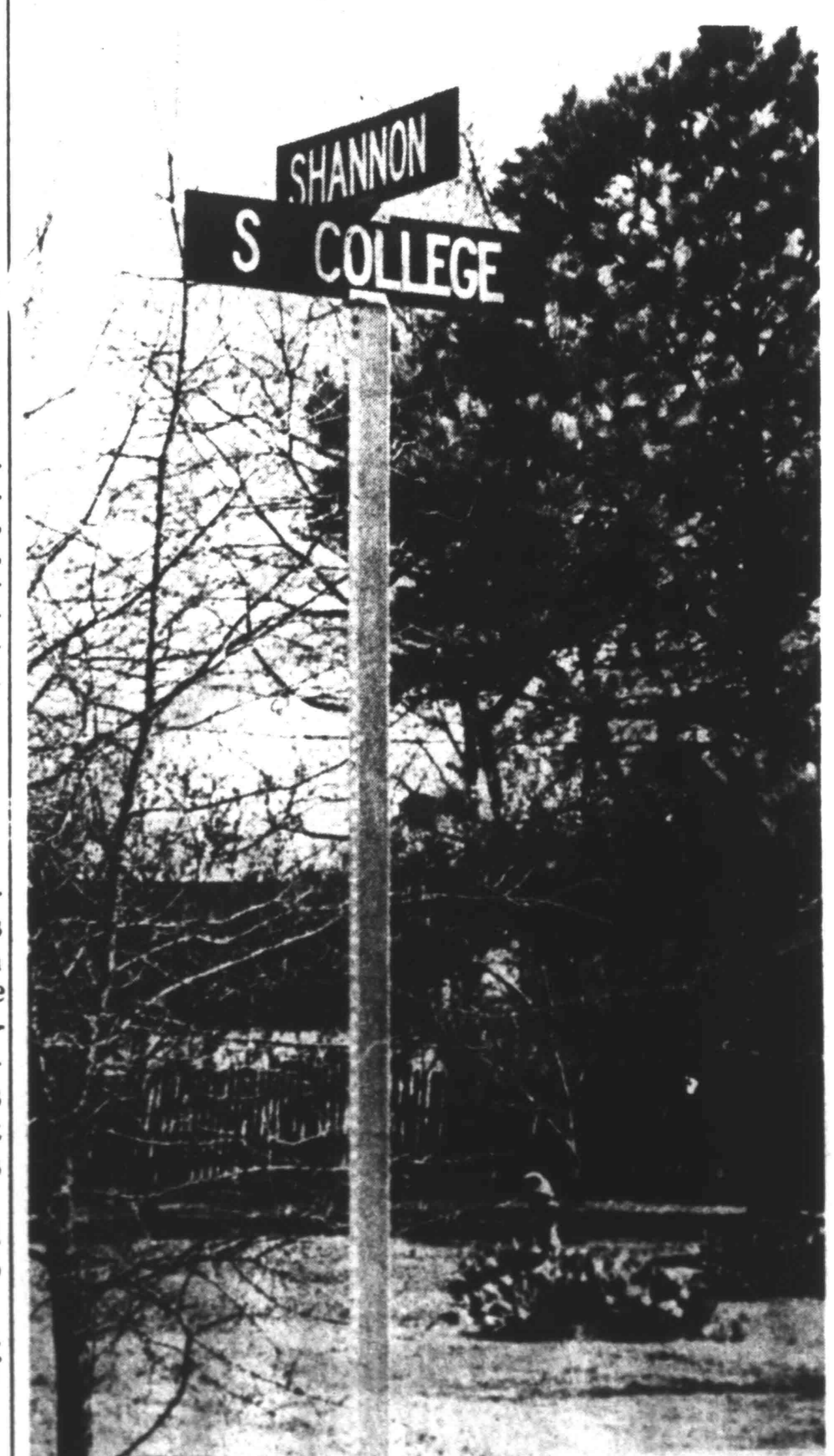
Kelvin Alexander

Third and final reading on proposed ordinance No. 68 will be held at the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen April 14, 1981, at Gates City Hall.

Ordinance No. 68 Town of Gates, Tenn. An ordinance authorizing the deposit of chauffeur's or operator's license in lieu of bail in certain cases, the procedures for the acceptance of the license, and the disposition of the license in case of forfeiture.

WHEREAS, Section 55-7-401 Tennessee Code Annotated provides that a Municipality having a City Court may by ordinance, authorize any person lawfully possessed of a chauffeur's or operator's license issued by the Tennessee Department of Safety under the driver's license laws of any state, territory or District of Columbia, who has been issued a citation and charged with a violation of any municipal ordinance or statutes regulating traffic, excepting those requiring a mandatory revocation of the operator or chauffeur's license, to have the option of depositing his chauffeur's or operator's license with the officer or court demanding bail in lieu of any other security required for his appearance in court of the municipality and answer such charge before the court; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of Gates, Tennessee, deems it to be the best interest of the Municipality to adopt such ordinance;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of Gates, Tennessee, that the procedures for the acceptance of a driver's license in lieu of bail and the disposition of the same in case of forfeiture shall be in accordance with the procedures set forth and delineated in Sections 55-7-401 through 55-7-405 Tennessee Code Annotated which are incorporated herein by reference as much as if they had been set forth therein verbatim.

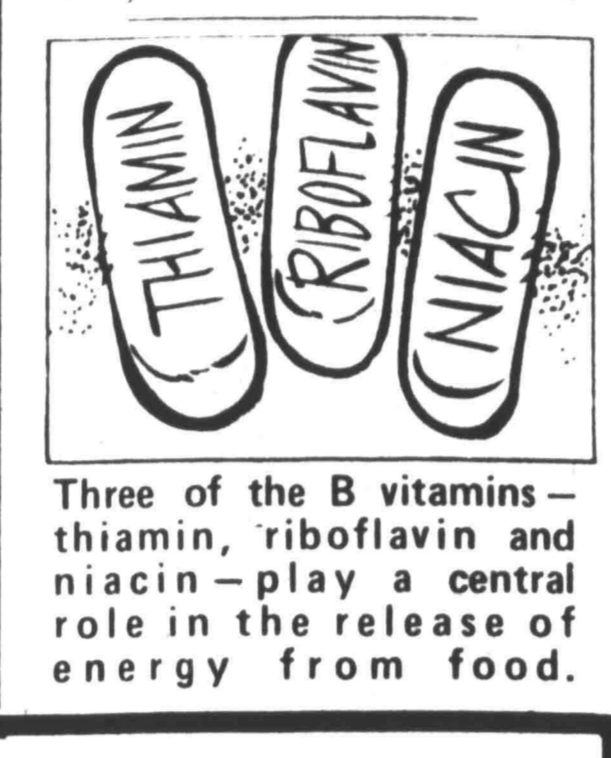

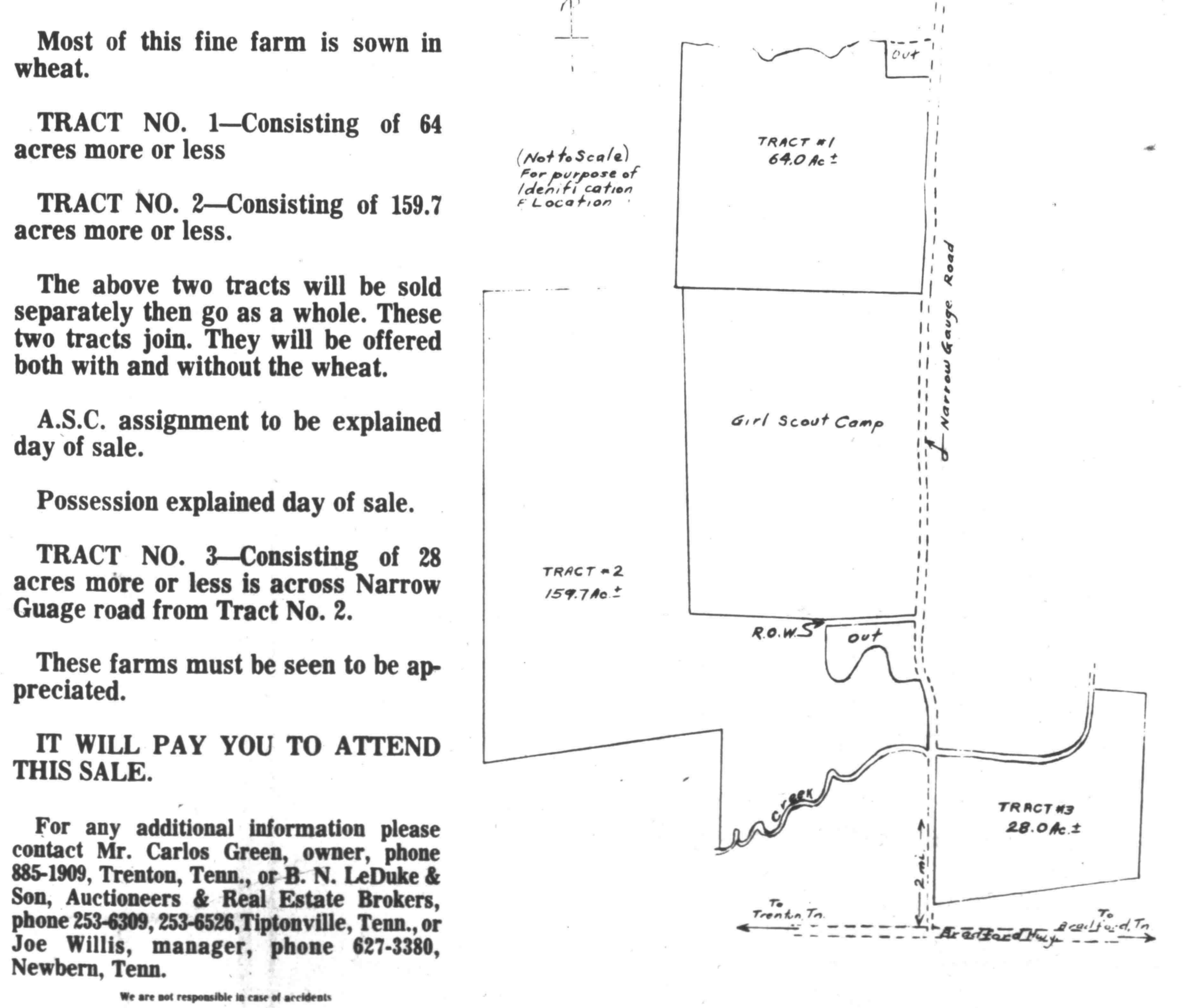

Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that the "Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law, as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county.

All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian.

All cats six months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county, and a charge of \$3.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

Mayor Arnold Asks Support

Dear Citizens:

After serious consideration I have decided to once again ask your support for my candidacy as your Mayor.

In doing this I also believe it is my responsibility to let you know my feeling about certain projects our city has undertaken in the last few years.

First of all I believe we must have a progressive city. Anytime a city ceases to make progress you can be sure that there are many of its people suffering because of lack of opportunity and work.

Today, the location of industry within a city is very competitive. The western part of our country and other areas in our state and throughout the South have all come to realize that without jobs which industry provide that they are doomed to a poor economy. Therefore, all of these areas have become much more competitive and this means we have to work harder to get our share of these jobs for Halls.

One thing we have done to give us an edge in locating industry is to open an airport. We did this in cooperation with the Tennessee Bureau of Aeronautics at hardly any expense to our city. This airport will be a valuable tool in years to come in locating industry in our area. Surveys have shown that up to 85% of all industries would not locate in a city without access to an airport.

Another project we are working on is the Crichfield Municipal Park on East Main Street. Baseball fields are already in operation and this year we will be able to add two double tennis courts and a parking lot. The money for the park comes from a \$53,000 grant by the State Conservation Development, a \$25,000 donation by Tupperware and approximately \$25,000 from Revenue Sharing Funds. This 17 acre park which is so convenient to our people is something we can all be proud of.

Another project we are about to conclude is a new Public Safety building to house the Police and ambulance station. By constructing this one building we will be able to close three others, the old Police Station which we now pay rent on, the Elmore building where the ambulance attends street, and the old jail on Front Street. With a 5% loan we have secured from Farmers Home Administration and by closing three buildings in favor of one, thus saving a large part of the utilities, we will be able to operate two very important departments at probably no extra cost to our city.

I am also very proud of our Senior Citizens Center which we are now completing and which means so much to so many deserving people of our town and I will continue to work hard to see that it continues to serve our senior citizens well.

The Halls Community Building on College Street is also providing a valuable service, thanks to the hard work of the Halls Community Club. We hope to be able to pave the parking lot there this year.

Finally, we have \$600,000 of the \$900,000 Community Development Grant left which we must spend this year. I will appreciate your help and support.

Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that the "Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law, as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county.

All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian. All cats six months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county, and a charge of \$3.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

Last week's attempted assassination of President Reagan was certainly a tragic shock to the nation. Needless to say, the initial reaction of all members of Congress and the public in general was one of outrage and disgust. Members of Congress I have talked to, on both sides of the aisle, were completely dismayed and upset at the shooting which wounded the President and three others.

What brought this incident particularly close to home was its occurrence in the nation's Capital. Not since a group of radicals attacked Blair House in an effort to assassinate President Truman in 1950 has there been such an attack on the President of the United States within the District of Columbia.

President Franklin Roosevelt was, of course, attacked in Miami, and President Ford was assaulted twice in separate trips to California. Everyone remembers the tragedy of the death of President Kennedy in Dallas almost twenty years ago.

It is sad to recall these incidents which directly involved a sitting President. Even worse, attacks such as the one on President Reagan also reminded of similar incidents in our recent past in which one presidential candidate, Robert Kennedy, was killed, and another, George Wallace, was permanently paralyzed by a bullet from the gun of a would-be assassin.

Each of these incidents I have mentioned have occurred in my lifetime, but they are something I will never get used to nor will most other Americans. The initial shock of this type of incident gives way to anger and a certain amount of fear in everyone. The anger arises from our realization that the highest public official in our country must be carefully guarded in a society that is free and that seeks to recognize the dignity of all. The fear, whatever its degree, stems from concern over who else may be a target.

In the case of President Reagan, I am sure that we all shared a feeling of relief when told by the media that the surgery performed to remove the bullet from his lung was successful, and that he was responding very well to the medical attention he had received. I know that all Americans were glad to hear that he would completely recover.

Though initial concern was justifiably focused on the well being of the President, the future is sure to include a wide range of calls for investigations, assessments of conspiracy theories, and the like. No doubt, there will be those who will question intensely the Secret Service's protection practices, and I am sure some new strengthening of Presidential protection will be implemented. At this point, though, I think the nation as a whole is offering thanks that another presidential assassination was not successful, and are continuing to follow Mr. Reagan's medical progress.

In the meantime, government is going to continue to operate. Vice-President Bush and other members of

Committee and the full Committee on House Administration. When the final resolution was prepared for action on the floor, its total funds for operation of the committees of the House were about \$4 million below the amounts requested and about \$300,000 below the levels authorized last year.

Once the resolution reached the floor of the House, the House leadership offered an additional amendment which further reduced those authorized funds by another 10%. In its final form, that was passed by the full House of Representatives, the committee funding resolution dropped from \$42 million to \$39 million, a figure that is about the same figure that was actually spent in 1980.

This effort to take a very intense look at committee budgets was designed to do two things, both of them in keeping with the feelings of most Americans that federal spending needs to be cut back. First, it includes an effort to reduce the growth in Congressional staff. Secondly, it is also in keeping with the effort to cut federal spending throughout government.

Needless to say, this was a difficult task but one that was needed. The Committee on House Administration on which I serve, has agreed to continue monitoring committee staff work to insure that it is being done efficiently and at the least expensive cost and to continue in the future its efforts to reduce Congressional spending where possible. This is an important move. It signals to the people that Congress is not exempting itself from budget cuts.

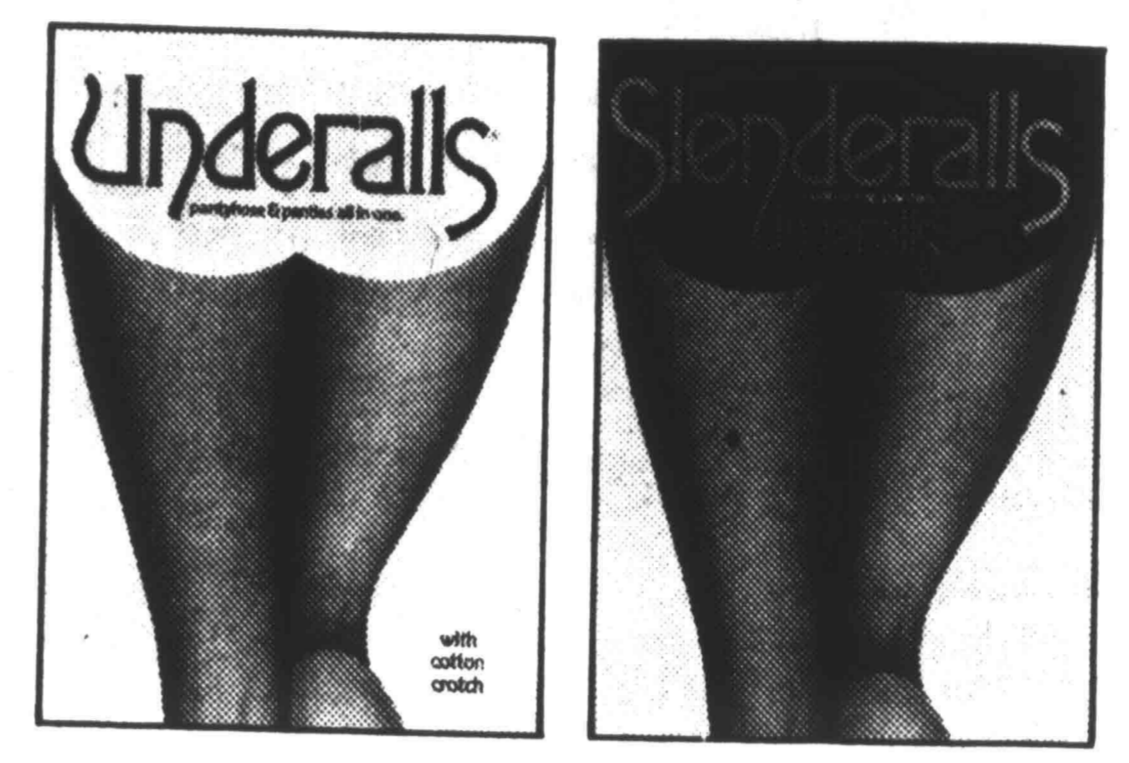

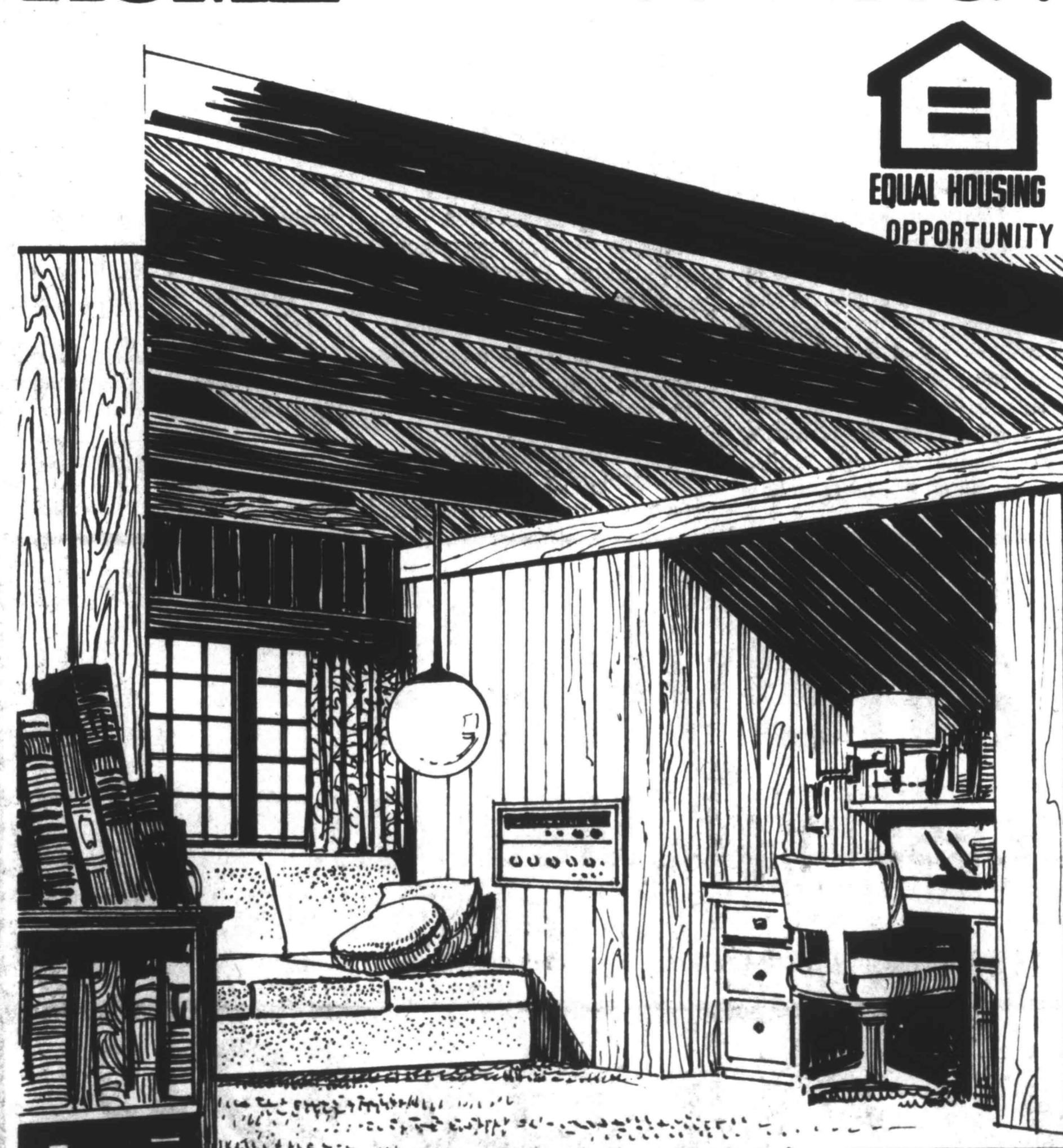

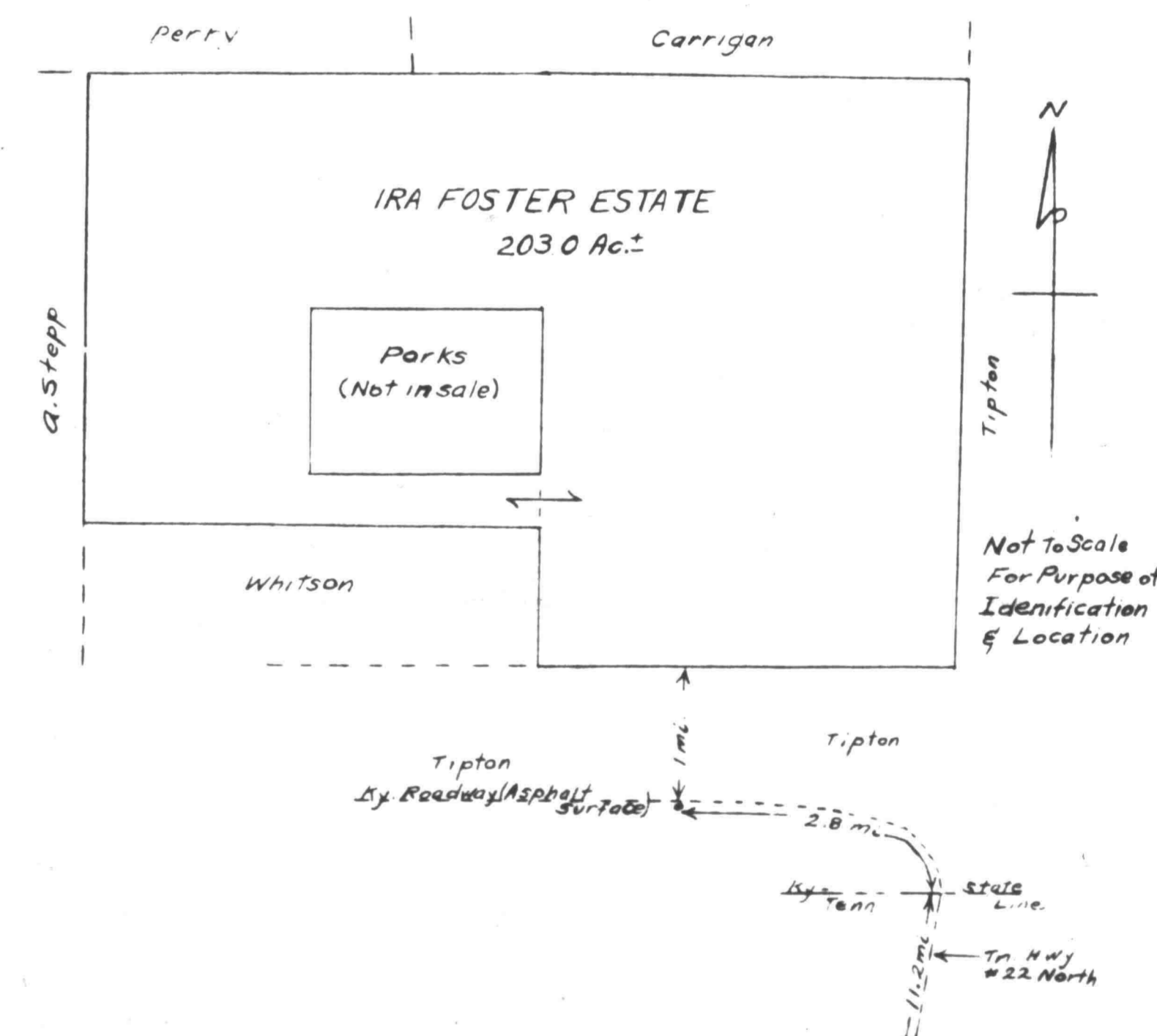

Smoking and side stream effects

There has been a lot of argument about whether smoking hurts anybody but the smoker. At one time, nonsmokers thought "Well, it's their lungs

and none of my affair." Then various individuals, some of them asthmic and hay-fever victims, became aware that they suffered in the presence of tobacco smoke, either because it irritated already exacerbated mucous membranes or because they were directly allergic to it.

For a long time there was no evidence that exposure to the smoke of others actually caused problems of the lungs or heart. But it was determined that people who already had heart and lung diseases were at increased risk from smoke-filled surroundings. Other studies showed that young children were another especially vulnerable group and that those exposed to tobacco smoke in the home had more colds and other respiratory and health problems.

The discussion of risk to the "passive smoker" has continued and has become one of the emotional issues of our society. Smokers are incensed by the clean-air lobbying of groups they perceive as self-righteous spoilsports. Nonsmokers feel imposed upon in public places. Many are offended not only by the smoke around them but by attitudes they see as thoughtless or inconsiderate.

One of the major arenas in this feud has been the workplace, where so many adult workers spend a great deal of their waking hours. A recent study sought to provide some answers.

Group 1 consisted of 2,100 middle-aged subjects without obvious health problems who had not been exposed to industrial pollution was tested. The subjects included professional, executive, technical and blue-collar workers and were divided into groups.

Group 2 consisted of nonsmokers who lived where smoking was not permitted but worked in an enclosed area where people smoked. Group 3 were pipe, cigar or cigarette smokers who did not inhale.

Group 4 consisted of light smokers who inhaled one to 10 cigarettes a day. Group 5 inhaled 11 to 39 cigarettes a day. Group 6 inhaled more than 40 cigarettes a day.

All of the smokers worked in smoking environments. The subjects were tested on a machine that measures lung function to evaluate damage and scarring of the tubes and sacs that make up the small airways.

Nonsmokers in non-smoking environments scored well above all other groups in lung function. Heavy smokers of course scored worse.

The most interesting finding, however, was that there was no significant difference in the scores of passive smokers (nonsmokers who worked around cigarette smoke), smokers who did not inhale, and smokers who inhaled between one and 10 cigarettes a day. There was some loss of function and airway injury in all these groups.

This is the first study of the effects of passive smoking on well adults based on actual measurement of physical effects. It suggests that nonsmokers who work in a smoky environment have about the same risk of lung impairment as smokers who do not inhale and 10 cigarettes a day.

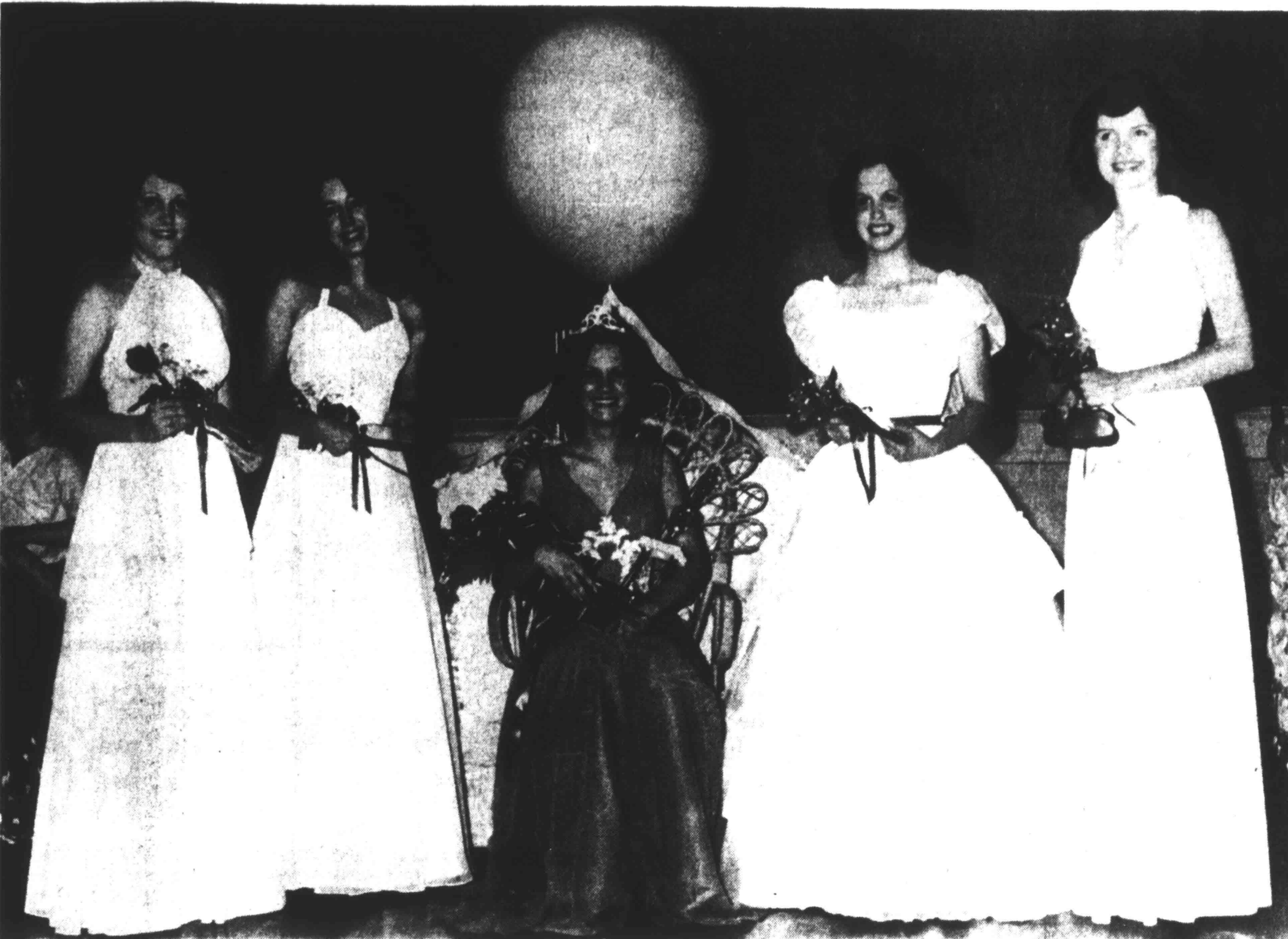

Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that the "Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law, as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county.

All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian.

All cats six months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county, and a charge of \$3.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

Shakespeare Is Program Topic

Mrs. Billy Brewer, vice-president, presided last Thursday at the April meeting of Halls Garden Club at the community center.

50th Anniversary



Mrs. E. C. Thurmond chose to read several poems for her meditation including "The Mystery" by Emily Dickinson and "We Thank Thee" by Ralph Waldo Emerson. Each poem was suggestive of spring and the beauties that we may see in nature—always knowing that after winter, God always sends the spring.

The beautiful arrangements of spring flowers made it difficult for the judging committee to place the ribbons accordingly but their decision gave the blue ribbon to the arrangement of bright yellow forsythia in a glass crystal bowl by Mrs. David Nunn, the red ribbon went to the attractive grouping of buttercups by Mrs. Clyde Younger who also claimed the white ribbon for her purple violet in a small white pitcher. A bright yellow double tulip was the winning specimen for Mrs. Brewer as was her Mt. Hood buttercups as second place winner. Mrs. H. G. McCorkle placed third with her triple-blossomed narcissus.

The club spent a most pleasant and informative afternoon with Shakespeare, made possible by Mrs. W. A. Smith who so ably reminded us of the many great works of this English dramatist born 417 years ago in Stratford-on-Avon which lies in the midst of England's fairest rural scenery.

We may imagine that in Shakespeare's walks over the Stratford fields, he obtained suggestions which enabled him to hold captive the ear of the world when he sang of the pearl in the cowslip's ear, of the bank where the wild thyme blows, of the greenwood tree, and the merry note of the bird. Many of the references in his plays are unsurpassed in English verse. The most famous lover's walk in England is the foothold from Stratford to the hamlet of Shottery. Anne Hathaway's home. At the age of 18 he married her.

Of the thirty-seven plays included in Shakespeare's complete works, only sixteen were published during his lifetime. One who reads a few of his great plays and then the meager story of his life may be filled with a vague wonder. Here is an unknown country boy, poor and poorly educated according to the standards of his age, who arrives in the city of London and goes to work at odd jobs in a theatre. In a year or two he is associated with scholars and dramatists writing plays of kings and clowns, of gentlemen and heroes, and noble women, all of whose lives he seems to know. Play after play runs from his pen—plays that stand the test of time and their poetry is still unrivaled in any language. For all of this great work the author apparently cared little since he made no effort to preserve his writings. Shakespeare still

lives in the world he left behind. He died on the anniversary of his birth 365 years. He was given a tomb in the church because of his interest in the affairs of his country village. Shakespeare's influence upon our language and thought is beyond calculation. Even those that read no Shakespeare are still unconsciously guided by him, for his thoughts and expressions have so pervaded our life and literature that it is impossible, so long as one speaks the English language, to escape his influence.

Staratford-on-Avon as its name implies is a town through which flows the beautiful river Avon. Shakespeare must have lingered on the banks of the Avon and observed the many wild flowers growing there as he walked the foothold to court Ann Hathaway. Among those would have been the tall iris with its bright colors of purple, yellow or white. At that time we would have called it "flower-de-luce."

The rose is the national emblem of England and Shakespeare mentioned it at least seventy times in his plays and sonnets. Like other poets of his time, he compares roses to human lips and cheeks, and uses them to suggest a blush of shame or anger. Some of his loveliest poetry is concerned with morning dew on the petals of a rose, a sight that he must have often observed in his garden or in the more splen-

did gardens of his friends in London. The violet is one of the best loved of all flowers, whether it grows in a garden, in a wood, or on a bank. It is prized by poets for its perfume and sometimes pitied by them for the shortness of its life. Violets grew and probably still grow very plentifully in the woods near Shakespeare's home as well as in the gardens. Poets have always loved to write about daffodils and he was no exception. The first Sunday in April is known as Daffodil Sunday in England. These beautiful golden flowers are spread out like a rich carpet on the hillsides

and under the elm trees over many miles of the rolling English countryside. Shakespeare shared with many early poets the charming idea that the marigold closes its eyes with the sun and opens again at sunrise. In spite of its beauty, its slender grace and elegance, and its ancient history, Shakespeare did not write much about the lily except as a symbol of purity and of the finest quality of whiteness, especially when decorating the hands and fingers of his heroines. The tall white lily has always disputed with the rose for the right to be called "Queen of Flowers." But even if the rose won the crown, the lily is honored above all flowers by its dedication to the Virgin Mary.

It may be said of Shakespeare that mere genius without wonderful self-control and a well-ordered eye of time would not have enabled him to leave such a legacy to the world. Shakespeare was the spokesman for his own time, but he had the genius to speak to all ages. He loved to present the eternal truth of the human heart and to invest them with such a touch of nature as to reveal the kinship of the entire world. He was not for an age but for all times. Dear Citizens:

War Games Slated Along Mississippi

About 700 Reservists of all branches of military service will attack an "enemy" force on Islands 26 and 27, on the west side of the Mississippi River, northwest of Ashport, the weekend of May 2nd-3rd.
Members of the National Guard's 168th Military Battalion, which has headquarters in Dyersburg and a company in Ripley, will direct traffic for 30 to 40 trucks and jeeps moving the attacking force into Fulton and Ashport. Eight to ten helicopters—UH1E "Hueys" and CH-53 troop transports—will also be involved, along with Naval river patrol boats.
Residents of the area should not be alarmed by simulated gunfire and explosives to be employed.

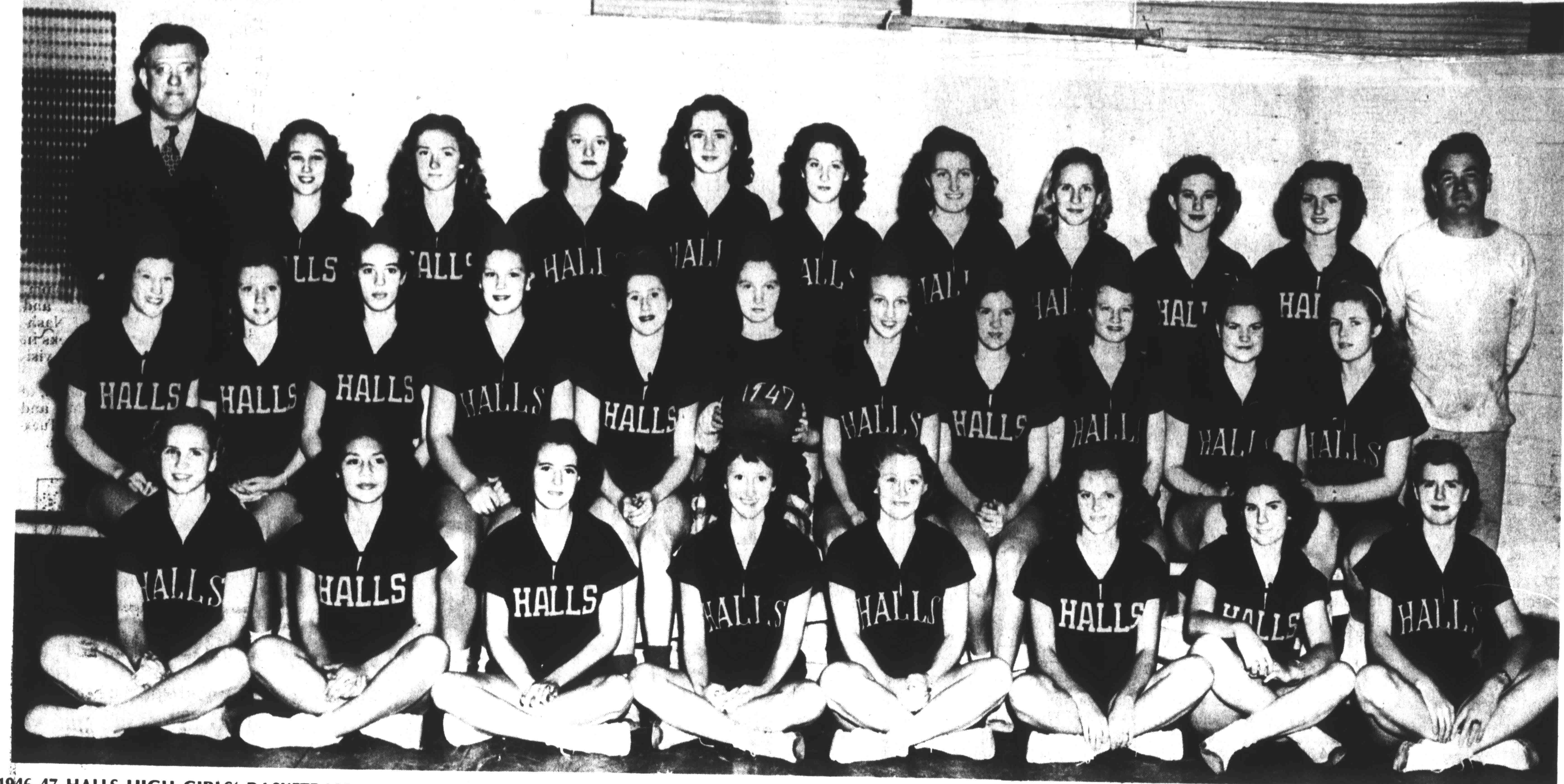

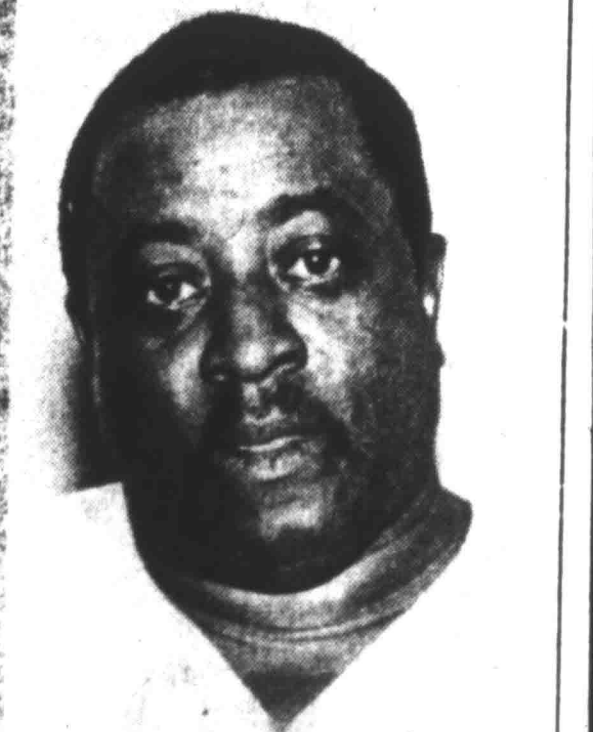

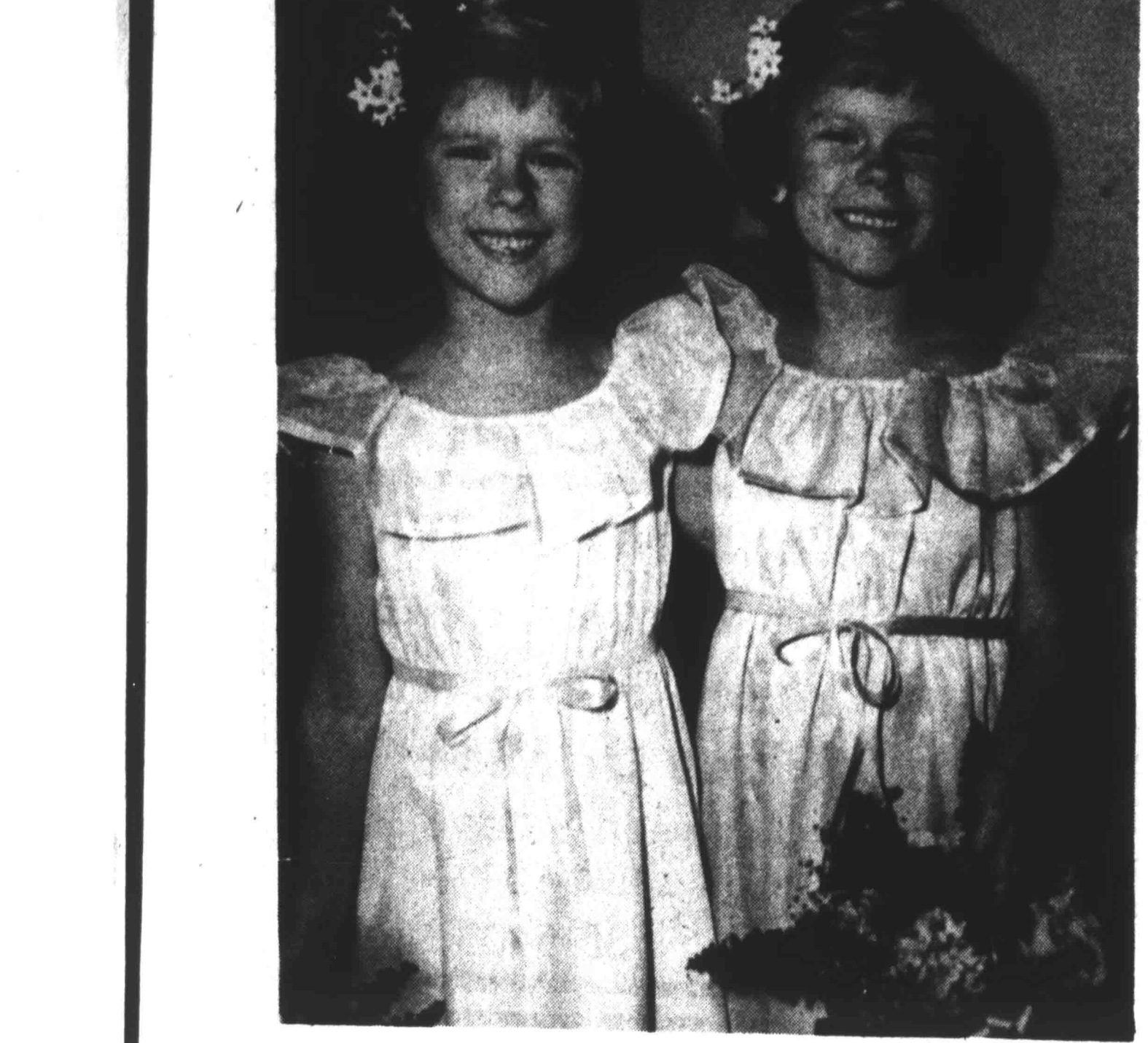
