

Former Halls Mayor Challenging Arnold

James Cheshier, who was elected Mayor of Halls by a 603-307 vote over Perry W. Williams in 1973 but resigned before his 2-year term expired, seeks the office again May 7th from his successor, Sammie Arnold—elected first by aldermen to succeed Cheshier and three times since then by popular vote in biennial elections.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county, and a charge of \$3.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

Ripley Doctors Leasing Clinic

Halls Board of Aldermen Monday night voted to lease the Halls Health Clinic to Dr. C. R. Webb, Dr. Larry Farris, and Dr. B. G. Robbins, of Ripley Medical Clinic, after Baptist Hospital officials told Mayor Sammie Arnold that it is not the hospital's policy to enter a field if private doctors are interested.

Under the proposed lease agreement the Ripley Clinic will pay \$1,300 per month for the first 12 months, \$1,600 per month for the next 12 months, and \$1,700 per month for the remaining three years of a five-year lease. The lease agreement, if approved by Farmers Home Administration, will become effective July 1st.

Under the agreement Ripley Clinic will have at least one doctor on duty five days each week and maintain x-ray and laboratory facilities at the clinic. Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that the "Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law, as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county.

All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian. All cats six months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county, and a charge of \$3.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.
