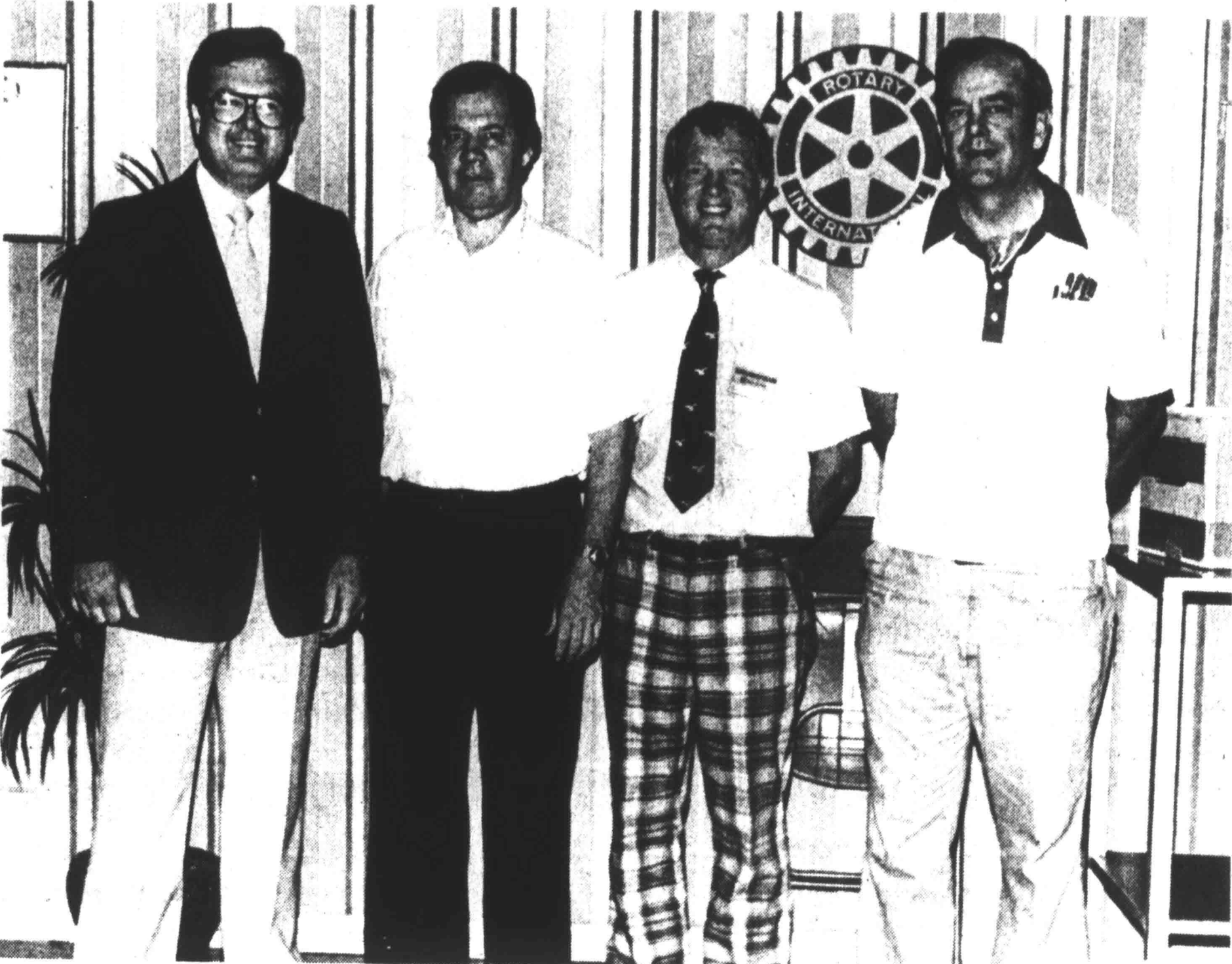

Halls Ready For Crowds

Predictions of the largest crowd in the history of Halls are being made this week as plans are completed for the sixth annual Halls Street Festival July 2, 3, 4, 5th.

Steve Levy, head of the festival committee, says wider participation among local businesses, support from the Tupperware Co. and other firms, has lengthened the festival to four days and enabled the committee to offer even more entertainment including professional fireworks at 9 p.m. Saturday at Cricfield Park.

The festival will open with a talent show at the Halls Community Center Thursday evening with the winners to enter the Mid-South Talent Show in Memphis in September. Friday night a street dance with live music will be sponsored by Halls Jaycees.

Saturday there will be something for everyone with more than \$1,000 in cash and merchandise to be given away by local business firms. Sidewalk sales will feature bargains for the entire family with gospel singing and live music to entertain the crowd. Ripley Radio Station WTRB will be broadcasting from Halls throughout the day. There will be booths with a wide variety of food.

Sunday the final event of the festival will be the songfest using the theme, "I Love America" presented by the choirs of the various churches in this area under the direction of Mark Branson, minister of music for Halls First Baptist Church. The songfest will be at 7 p.m. at Cricfield Park. Since seating capacity is limited, it is suggested that families bring folding chairs or blankets when possible. There is no admission charge.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

As we pack up our picnic baskets and stock up on fireworks for this week's Fourth of July celebration, we should also take a little time to reflect upon the birthday of our independence.

On July 4, 1776, 205 years ago, a small group of men, driven by their common wish to be free, adopted and signed the Declaration which severed our allegiance to Great Britain. Since that day, the anniversary of this act by the Continental Congress has become a part of our heritage in which we take great pride.

The traditional Fourth of July celebrations, usually marked by parades, patriotic speeches, and family get-togethers, have grown from the first anniversary of the Declaration of Independence which was celebrated only in Philadelphia. Through the years, Fourth of July celebrations spread to Boston and throughout the United States until it became an American tradition.

In more recent times, July 4th has been marked by a variety of events, including the beginning of the Erie Canal in 1817, the laying of the cornerstone of the Washington Monument in 1850, and the signing of the Freedom of Information Act in 1967.

Independence Day celebrations reached their peak in 1976 with the Bicentennial activities. The bald eagle became a familiar character on television commercials, along with the "Bicentennial Minutes." The world's tallest ships sailed into New York Harbor on July 4th, as ceremonies took place in cities all across the Nation.

Amid all the celebration, however, we should also realize that we as a nation are facing many problems. New international developments demand constant attention and the economy remains the major issue at home. Inflation and high interest rates remain the most severe economic problems and rising unemployment further complicates their resolution. Government and business officials on all levels continue

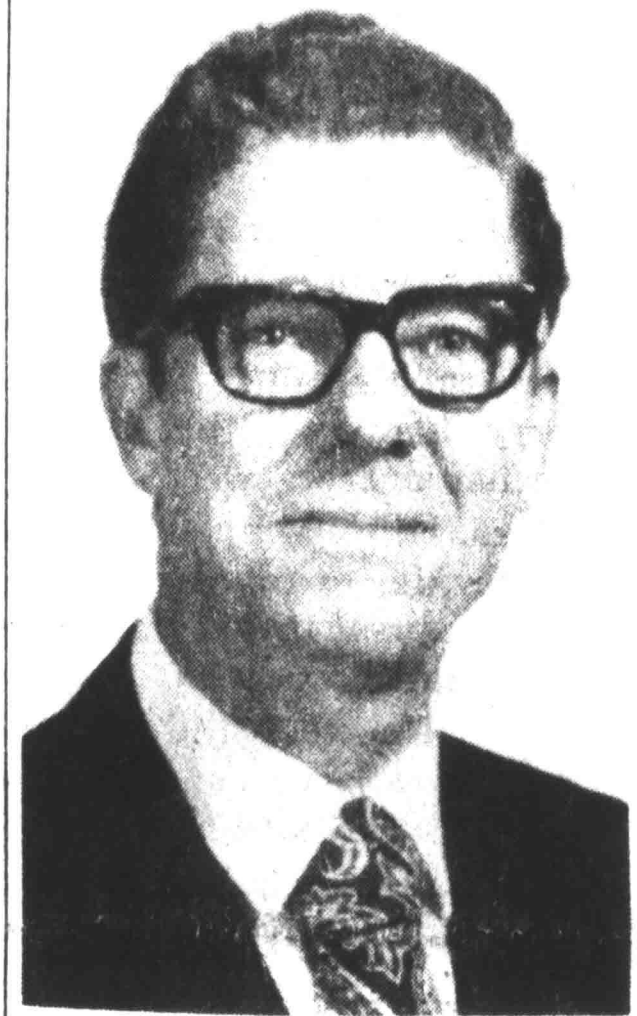
to seek solutions that are effective and constructive to the continuation of our democratic system. Without a doubt, the economic problems encountered in the 1970's remain the most persistent and troublesome our nation has ever faced.

In spite of that, however, it is imperative that every American citizen be continuously aware of the benefits we enjoy in this free and democratic republic. On this day we celebrate our personal as well as our national freedom. Every American has the right to voice his opinion and to initiate changes where and when he sees them necessary.

Because of the ability of the American people to persevere, many of the problems we have experienced in the past have been ironed out. Likewise, future trials will be overcome. Of course, finding solutions to some of our difficulties will take time, but because we are a strong and enduring people, we will find these solutions. Events of this year, such as the swearing in of a new President, the freeing of the hostages in Iran, and the remarkable flight of the space shuttle are all symbolic of our Nation's strength and its potential.

On this Fourth of July, 1981, I urge every American to suggest rather than criticize, to dare rather than abstain, and to participate fully in the debate that has been joined to resolve our Nation's problems. This is the spirit of American democracy, and it must be kept alive by each of us.

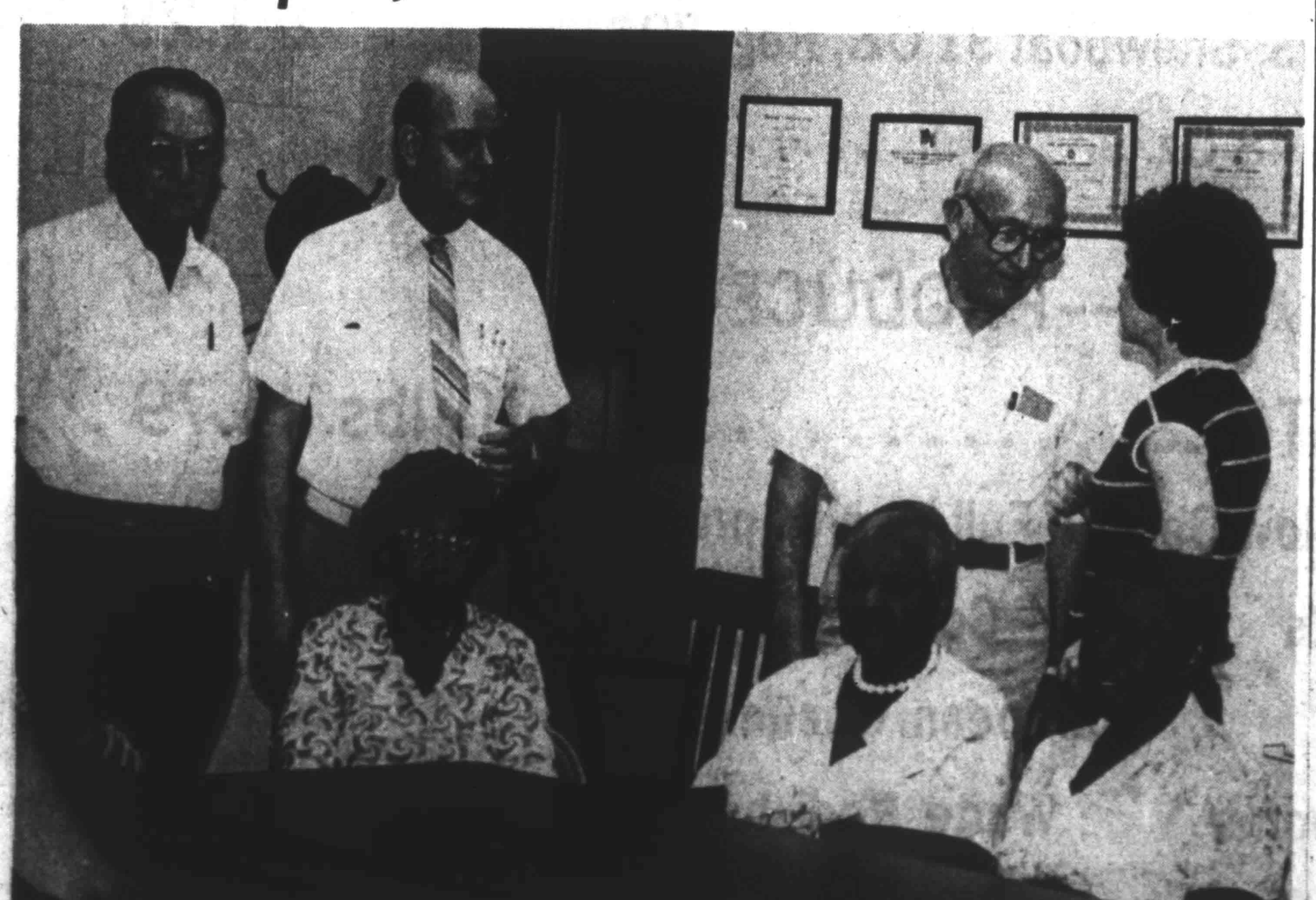

Knoxville Mayor Randy Tyree, new president of Tennessee Municipal League, has called a meeting for July 14th in Nashville which should be of great interest to every tax-paying citizen of Tennessee.

He has invited representatives of the County Services Association, Tennessee Farm Bureau, Tennessee Taxpayers Association, the state Labor Council, Tennessee Education Association, and State Employees Association to meet in Nashville to discuss and form an agreement on a package of tax tradeoffs such as cuts or ceilings on sales, property, business or special taxes in exchange for some form of a state income or payroll tax.

Any agreement among these widely diverse organizations would seem to be unlikely in the near future, but there is a possibility that they could reach some sort of agreement to work toward a state income tax which has been considered unconstitutional under the present Tennessee constitution.

Each of us should watch action of this meeting closely and consider the possible future impact on Tennessee.

Because of rains Saturday night, the event was moved uptown, and several hundred persons were present to hear a program of patriotic music presented by choirs from area churches. Our congratulations to everyone involved in the festival and the song-fest. We think that it will continue to grow.

Halls Approves Record Budget

Halls Board of Aldermen Monday night approved a record city budget of \$1,138,000, but kept the present tax rate of \$2.30 per \$100 assessment.

The board did approve a \$2 per month increase in water and sanitation fees.

City Utilities Supt. Akin Barnes told the Board that in a telephone call from a representative of Texas Gas Transmission Co. he had been informed that natural gas rates will increase approximately 17%, effective August 1st.

The increase was discussed informally, but no action was taken, pending additional information.

Library Board Chairman Don Levy asked when the present ambulance service building would become available and was told that the building should be available about July 15th.

The library will be moved because of leaks in the roof of the present building.

The Board approved payment of a cost-overrun on construction for Beech Bluff sub-division with sewer revenue funds.

Dills told the group that under present environmental rules, the by-pass cannot be built without the approval of TWRA, because of wetlands the by-pass would cross.

The by-pass would link I-155 with Hwy. 20 and U.S. 51, near Fowkes.

State Rep. Floyd Crain, of Ripley, introduced Mr. Dills.

State Sen. Bill Jim Davis, of Covington, also attended the meeting.

Oliver Nunn was in charge of the program.

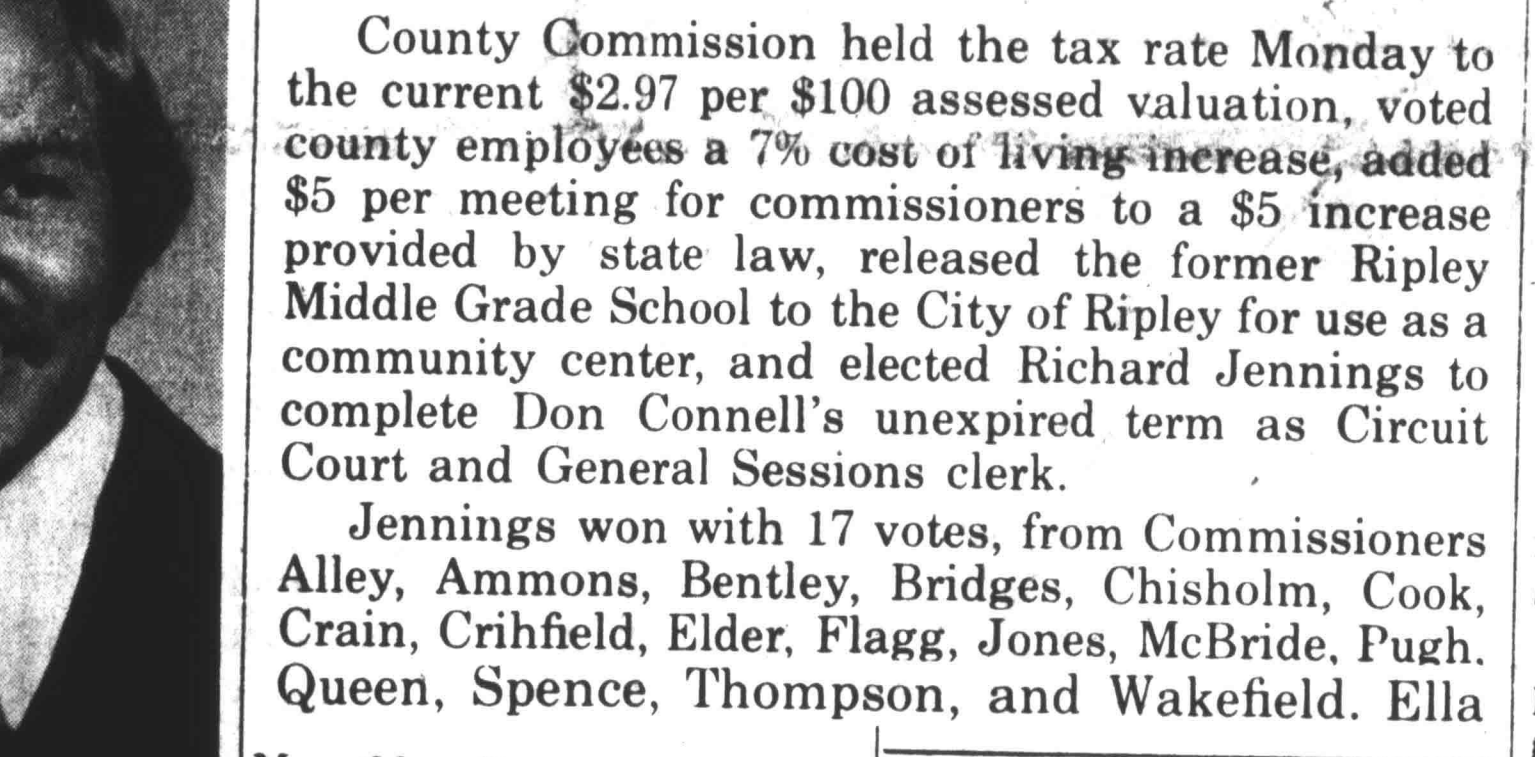

Looking Back
 In looking over last week's issue of *The Halls Graphic* we were reminded of when we first went to work for *The Graphic* more than 50 years ago, and the vast difference in techniques during a half a century.

The *Graphic* had a single magazine Linotype machine, but much of the type was still set by hand, including such things as bank statements, all advertising, headlines, etc.

Actually, things changed over the years, but still a great deal of hand-set type was used until we began switching to offset printing in the middle 1970s. Today, *The Graphic* is set on computer key-boards, and no hand-set type is used. Photographs are used plentifully but were rare in the old days.

There are some things we don't like about the offset process, but on the whole the new process enables us to give you a much better newspaper and with some less effort, although it is time-consuming.

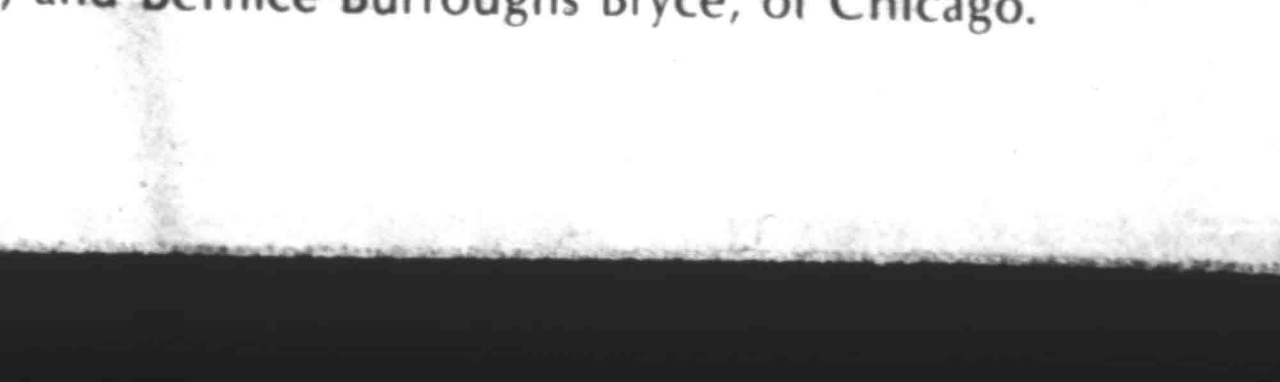

With the House Ways and Means Committee putting the finishing touches on tax cut legislation, it appears that there will be significant changes included that affect estate tax laws.

In present law, the estate and gift taxes are unified so that a single rate is applied to both gifts and bequests.

Proposals now being considered essentially make changes in the amount of tax credit that can be applied to the estate or gift tax that is owed.

While this new estate tax provision will have an effect on anyone who has, during their lifetime, accumulated an estate to be passed to their children, it will be especially crucial for small business owners and farmers.

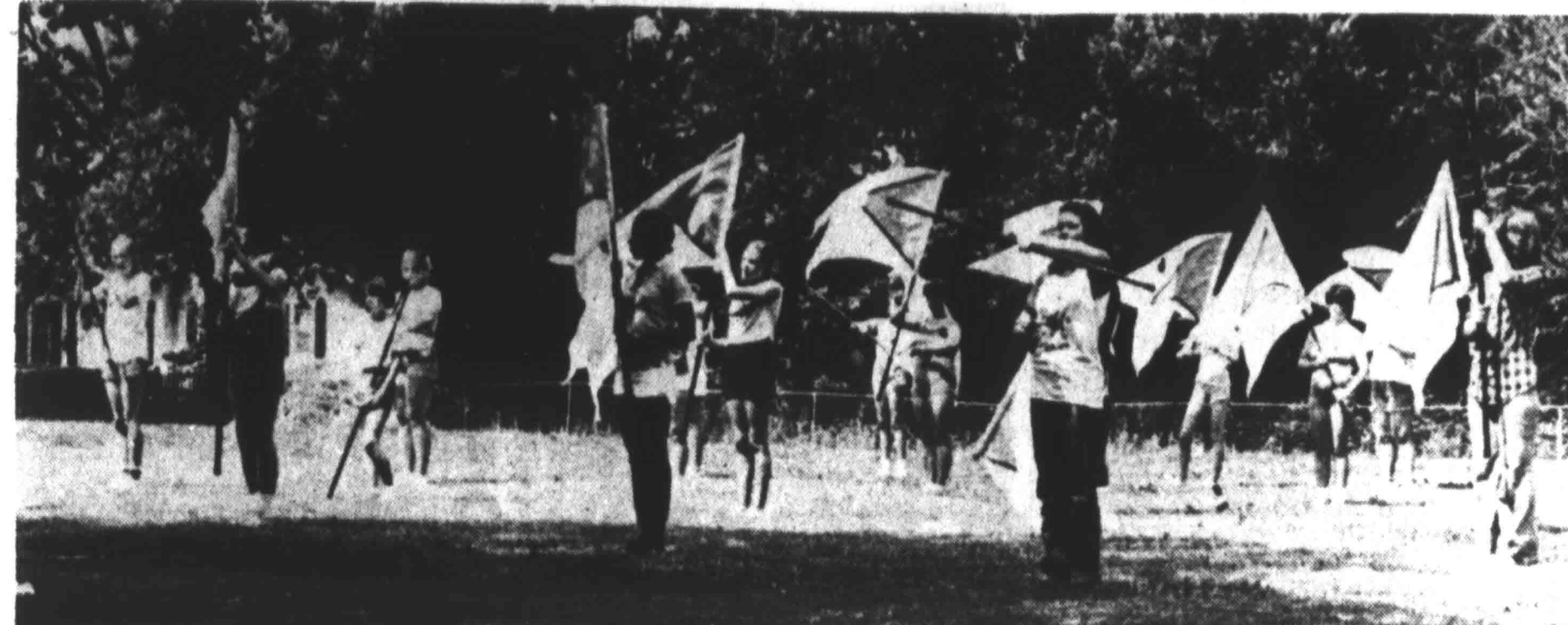

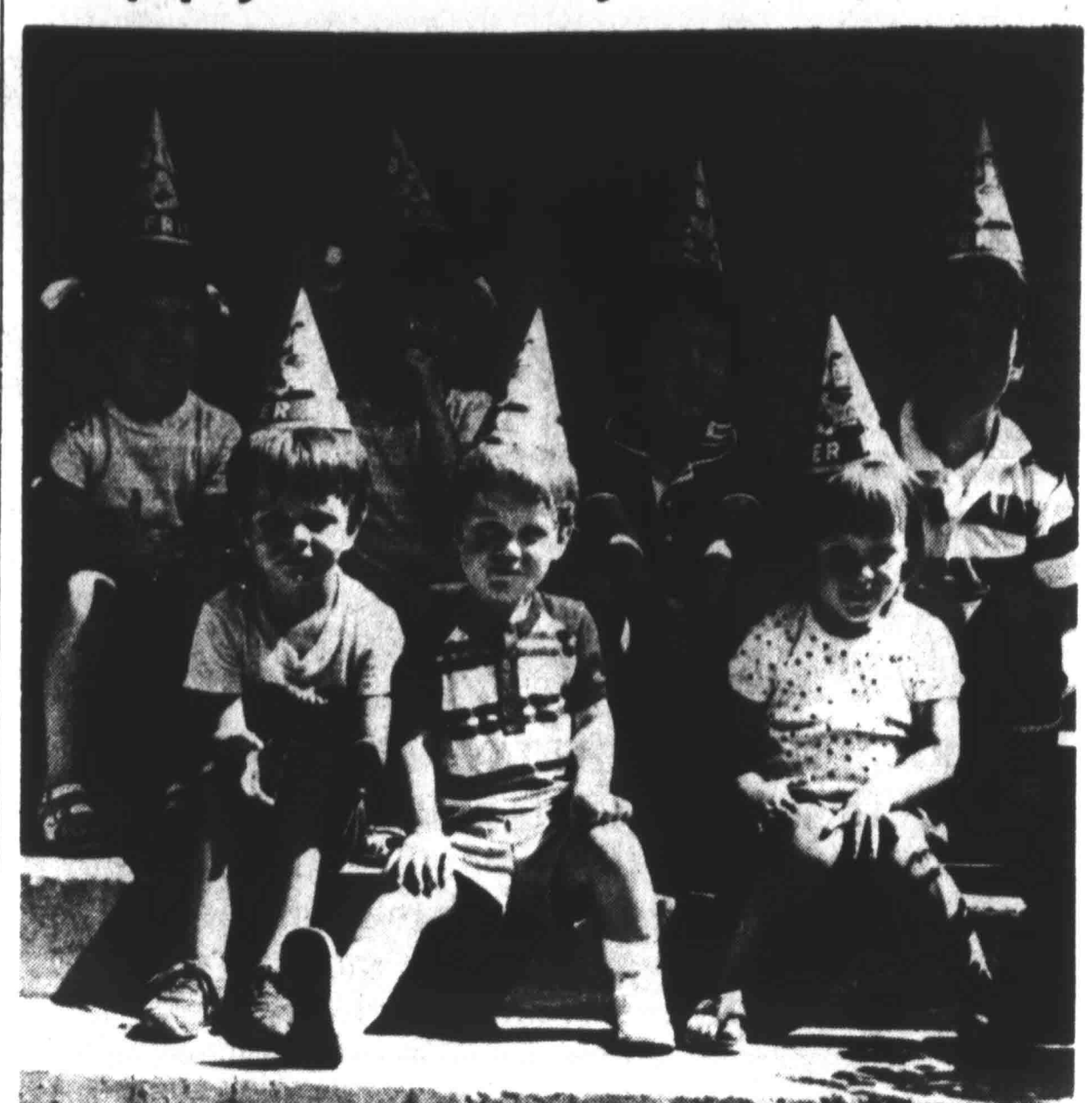

County Gains State Dollars

State Sen. Leonard C. Dunaunt (Republican, of Millington) says Lauderdale County will receive about \$14,792,601 (plus a portion of \$1,300,000,000 in federal funds) from Tennessee's 1981-82 \$4,100,000,000 budget adopted by the 92nd General Assembly.

This is an increase of \$872,406 over 1980-81, he says.

The county share includes: \$4,344,184 for education; \$896,781 for roads and streets; \$385,321 in state tax collections; \$1,296,813 for health and social services; \$267,132 for justice and public safety; \$623,161 for state highway construction and maintenance; and \$171,107 in miscellaneous items.

The \$886,781 cited for county roads and city streets will be generated entirely from petroleum taxes distributed as follows: \$749,191 to the county; \$36,989 to Halls; \$83,558 to Ripley, etc.

The budget allocates \$3,298,378 for county schools.

The lion's share of the school funds go to the Tennessee Education Program which is primarily salaries, Dunaunt says. The county's portion of the Foundation Program is estimated at \$2,926,793.

Other school funds go for pupil transportation, capital outlay, textbooks, food service and teachers' sick leave and retirement.

Ripley Area Vocational-Technical School will get about \$208,512.

The budget reflects an estimated 7% increase in state tax collections to be returned to the county. Fiscal year 1979-80 returns were \$87,874, and 1980-81's were \$128,369.

The budget includes \$390,645 for Human Services programs; \$17,210 for mental retardation programs; and \$888,960 for public health services, with about \$813,915 of the latter devoted to Medicaid.

Minister Feared Drowned Comes To Light In Houston

The Rev. Dr. John C. Hartman, who disappeared from the Hatchie River boat ramp on Highway 51 south of Henning, Wednesday of last week, where his boat was found with motor running in neutral, was still being sought by weary members of 18 rescue squads when word came Monday that he had walked into a Houston, Tex., police station, neatly dressed and carrying a duffel bag containing his fishing clothing, to report he didn't know who he was.

He said he had no idea how he got to a Houston parking lot with the duffel bag, according to Sgt. W. M. Castell of the Houston police missing persons bureau.

"My ring finger caught under water, and I felt I was drowning," he was quoted as saying in a press conference. "From there, I don't remember anything."

He had gone to the Hatchie to test his boat and motor, after some repairs.

Sheriff Joe B. O'Steen says 21 22-caliber shells were found near the boat landing. He says "load play" may have been involved.

Hartman, 46, wore slacks, a white shirt, and new black dress shoes but carried no identification when he walked into Houston's police headquarters.

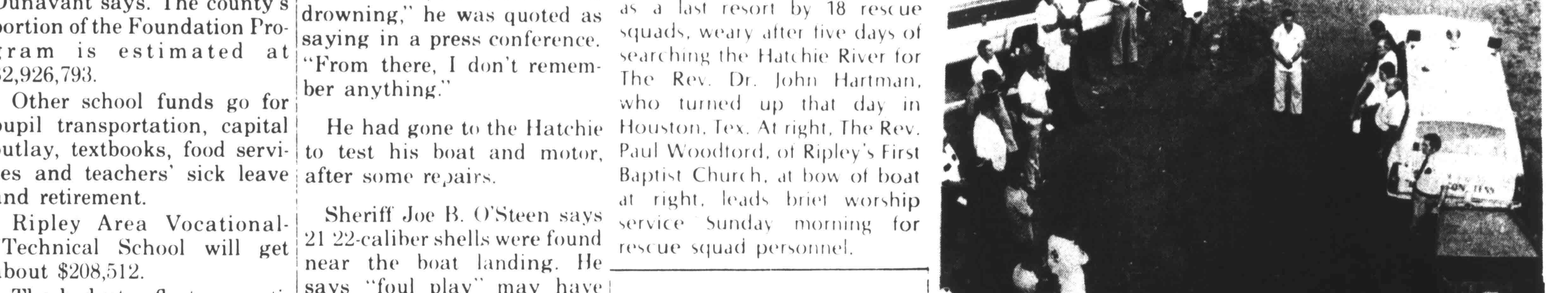
Castell said Hartman was "not in a panic." He appeared to be convincingly confused.

"He kept coming back to religious things," Castell said. "We had some benches out in front of the office, and he kept calling them pews."

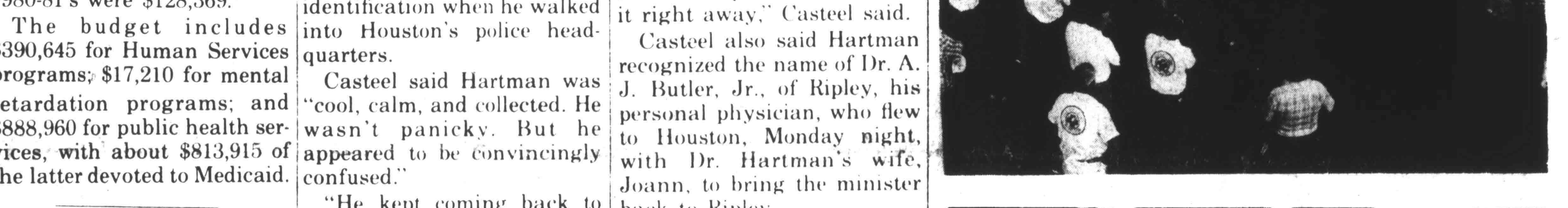

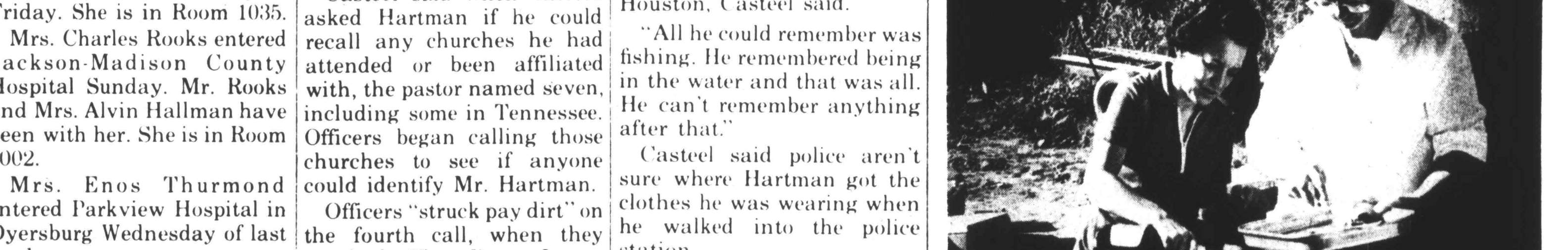

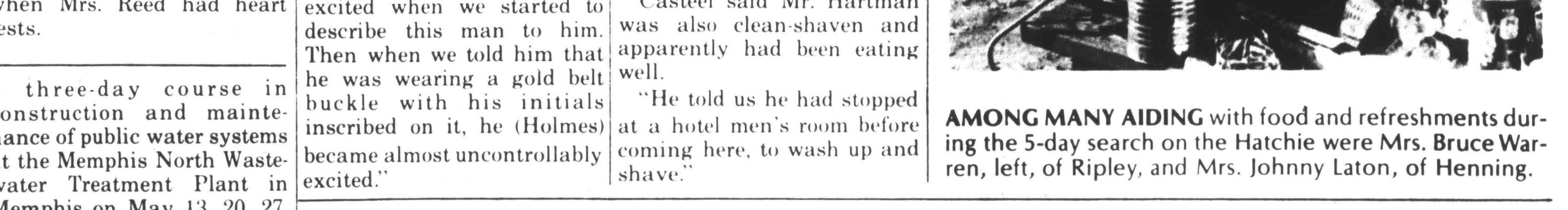

Castell also said Hartman recognized the name of Dr. A. J. Butler, Jr., of Ripley, his personal physician, who flew to Houston, Monday night, with Dr. Hartman's wife, Joann, to bring the minister back to Ripley.



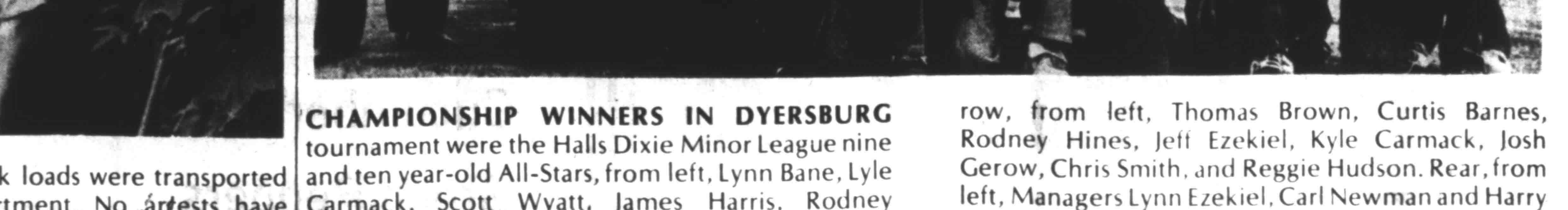
"Though Hartman was then able to recall some things—such as his name—he could not remember how he got to Houston," Castell said.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

Prior to the start of the Fourth of July recess, the Democratic members of the House Ways and Means Committee completed their work on a tax cut package for consideration soon after Congress reconvenes. Without a doubt, this will be one of the top priorities when Congress returns to Washington July 8.

This proposal seeks to accomplish the same objectives that the Reagan administration has but with major differences in the way those goals would be achieved. It is a two year bill providing an average 25 percent tax cut for individuals. However, instead of providing "across the board" individual tax cuts, the 25 percent reduction is weighted toward middle income taxpayers. For example, a family of four with the husband and wife both working earning a combined income of \$25,000 per year would receive a cut in taxes of \$527 per year in 1982 under the Committee proposal. By comparison, the Administration's proposal would provide that same family with a cut of \$396 per year in 1982.

Similarly, a two earner family of four making \$35,000 per year would get a \$1,013 tax cut under the Committee proposal compared to \$700 per year under the Administration proposal. In essence, the tax cuts provided by the Com-

mittee's proposal would provide for \$39.8 billion in individual tax cuts with \$31.5 billion going to families making under \$50,000 per year and \$8.3 billion going to families with incomes over \$50,000.

In addition, major changes that would be provided would reduce estate taxes, reduce marriage tax rates, and provide greater incentives for savings. All of those changes in the tax code would, of course, be part of the Committee's individual tax cut proposal.

On the business side, the Ways and Means Committee has put together a provision that allows a business to deduct the entire cost of an asset in the year it was purchased. This would simplify the present depreciation system, especially for small businesses. It would further reduce the corporate tax rate from its present 46 percent to 34 percent in stages by 1987. It would provide a tax credit for a portion of research and development costs incurred by a business. Finally, it would allow companies that have little or no taxable earnings, particularly the automobile and steel industries, to claim unused investment tax credits against taxes paid in earlier years.

Obviously, some of these provisions in the Committee bill represent major changes from the President's tax strategy while still providing needed tax relief for individuals and businesses. The Committee recognizes the need for tax relief in both areas though the individual cuts are weighted to those earning between \$15,000 and \$50,000 a year. This group pays about 58 percent of the taxes in the coun-

try and would receive 67 percent of the tax cuts. It needs to be emphasized that this tax debate does not center around whether it is most important to have a business tax cut or an individual tax cut. Both are provided for in both the President's proposal and in the Committee proposal. It is accepted by all parties that business needs tax help if it is to improve its productive capacity, and individuals need the cuts to encourage greater personal incentives.

The next several weeks will more than likely focus almost entirely on the best method of accomplishing those objectives. I certainly intend to study both proposals closely throughout the debate.

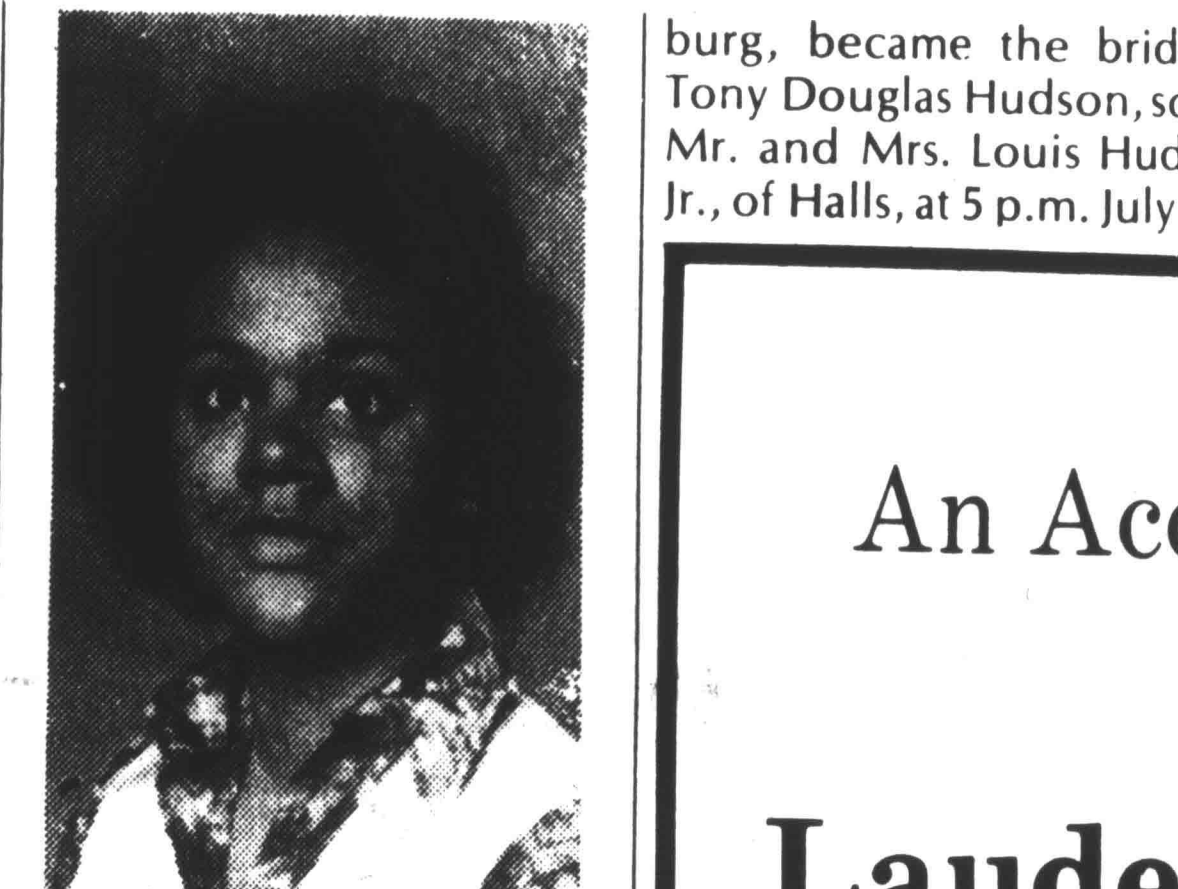

Fishing Is Improving
Cold Creek Chute, Chisholm Lake, and other areas are producing nice strings of crappie and bream. Crappie are being caught in early mornings and late evenings on live minnow and jigs at depths of three to ten feet.

Eagle Year Sought
The National Wildlife Federation is calling on the nation to observe 1982 as the "Year of the Eagle" to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the selection of this bird as our national symbol.

The bald eagle, currently on the endangered species list, was adopted as the central figure of the great seal of the United States by the second Continental Congress on June 20, 1782.

The NWF has asked President Reagan to declare the "Year of the Eagle" in a Presidential proclamation.

Boat Ramp Planned
The Pugh family has donated land for a boat ramp on the Obion River, to be called the Pugh Crain reports.

"We plan to pour the concrete boat launching ramp in two sections," says Mike Stubbs, supervisor of field operations for the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency.

"Just as soon as the Obion River water level drops back to normal summer pool, the lower slab, about 30 x 15 feet reinforced with half inch steel rods, will be poured and pushed into the river.

The contract for this concrete has already been awarded.

"The upper section, about 30 x 130 feet, along with the parking area and any rip-rap that will need to be done are planned for early fall, hopefully, by the first of October. We plan to complete the Obion

River Access Area no later than Thanksgiving.

"The only thing that would deter us would be an overabundance of rain, causing the Obion River to flood. We will keep our fingers crossed."

Farm Income Off, Costs Up

By Charles T. Peal
The June index of prices received by farmers dropped 0.7% from May, while prices paid by farmers for commodities, services, interest, taxes, and hired labor rose 0.7%.

Over the past three years, prices paid by farmers for production items have increased by 39%, compared to a 10% increase in prices received.

It is hoped production cost increases will slow over the next year while product prices increase.

Beyond this, each producer will feel pressure to place even greater emphasis on improving production, management, and marketing efficiency.

Cow Funds Restored
Congress has authorized additional funds to restore brucellosis indemnity payments to levels which existed before May 1st, when indemnity payments were cut 20%.

Restoration of the full indemnity rates will be retroactive.

Plan Fall Pastures
Fall grazing from small grains planted early can allow fescue pastures to get extra growth for winter use. Plant around Sept. 1st for high yields in the fall.

Wheat and rye produce the most feed during cold weather. These small grains can be seeded in a Bermuda sod.

Ronnie Roberts, of Halls, plans to sow alfalfa at the first opportunity after Aug. 20th. He will start by testing the soil for lime and fertility, applying as needed.

The high cost of seeding alfalfa in such a short period must follow proper practices. University of Tennessee research offers a program using weed control chemicals, increasing the longevity of the stand.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

As the Senate last week continued its work on its version of the tax cut bill, the House Ways and Means Committee reported its bill out for consideration on the floor of the House this week. As many people know, the tax cut issue has been one of the most intensely debated in Washington. Like the budget cuts of May and June, its importance to the nation's economy has, of course, been the most often discussed aspect of both the Ways and Means Committee bill and the Administration bill.

Mr. I have mentioned before in this space, the tax nature of the debate on tax cuts has not evolved this year into an argument of whether there should be tax cuts for business or individuals. Both bills being considered this week will provide reduced tax liabilities for the businesses of the nation, the individual taxpayer, and estates. Both are essentially designed to improve incentives for making investments and savings. The ultimate objective, of course, is to increase the capital that is available for doing the things that are necessary to increase the nation's productivity and, by so doing, lowering inflationary pressures in the economy.

Though the objectives of both bills are the same, their methods are different and arguments about which one will be most effective tend to hinge on the philosophies of those discussing them. Both bills attempt to cut taxes for both individuals and businesses in such a way that will result in more investment and more savings. From that standpoint, the two plans are similar but from there on, there are significant differences. For businesses, the Administration bill calls for an accelerated depreciation schedule known as 10-5-3. The Committee bill provides for the expensing of new investments in the same year the investment is made plus cuts in the corporate tax rate from 46 to 34 percent. There are also special considerations in the Committee bill for such distressed industries as the automobile and steel industries, and a special credit for

percentage wise than those making over 50,000.

There are other issues that have entered into the bidding war that is being used by both the Administration and the Committee to attract enough votes to pass their particular proposal. Nonetheless, the major issues remain those I have already mentioned. How this legislation is going to affect West Tennessee, its people, its farms, its small businesses and larger corporate citizens, has been my greatest concern. It is that effect that is going to decide how I vote during this important debate. Members of Congress as well as the Administration, recognize the need for a tax cut if we are to regain control of our nation's economy. I want to ensure that whatever tax cut gets my support is fair and equitable for the people of West Tennessee.

For individuals, both bills provide for multi-year tax cuts. The Administration bill is a 25 percent cut across the board spread over three years. The Committee bill provides for two years of individual cuts spread over two years with a third year of cuts triggered by the realization of the economic forecasts being projected by the Administration for 1984. The Committee's proposal is also different in that it is not an across the board cut. It does provide for 15 percent in cuts during the first two years, but weighs cuts so that families in the ten to thirty thousand dollar a year income range will get a bigger tax cut

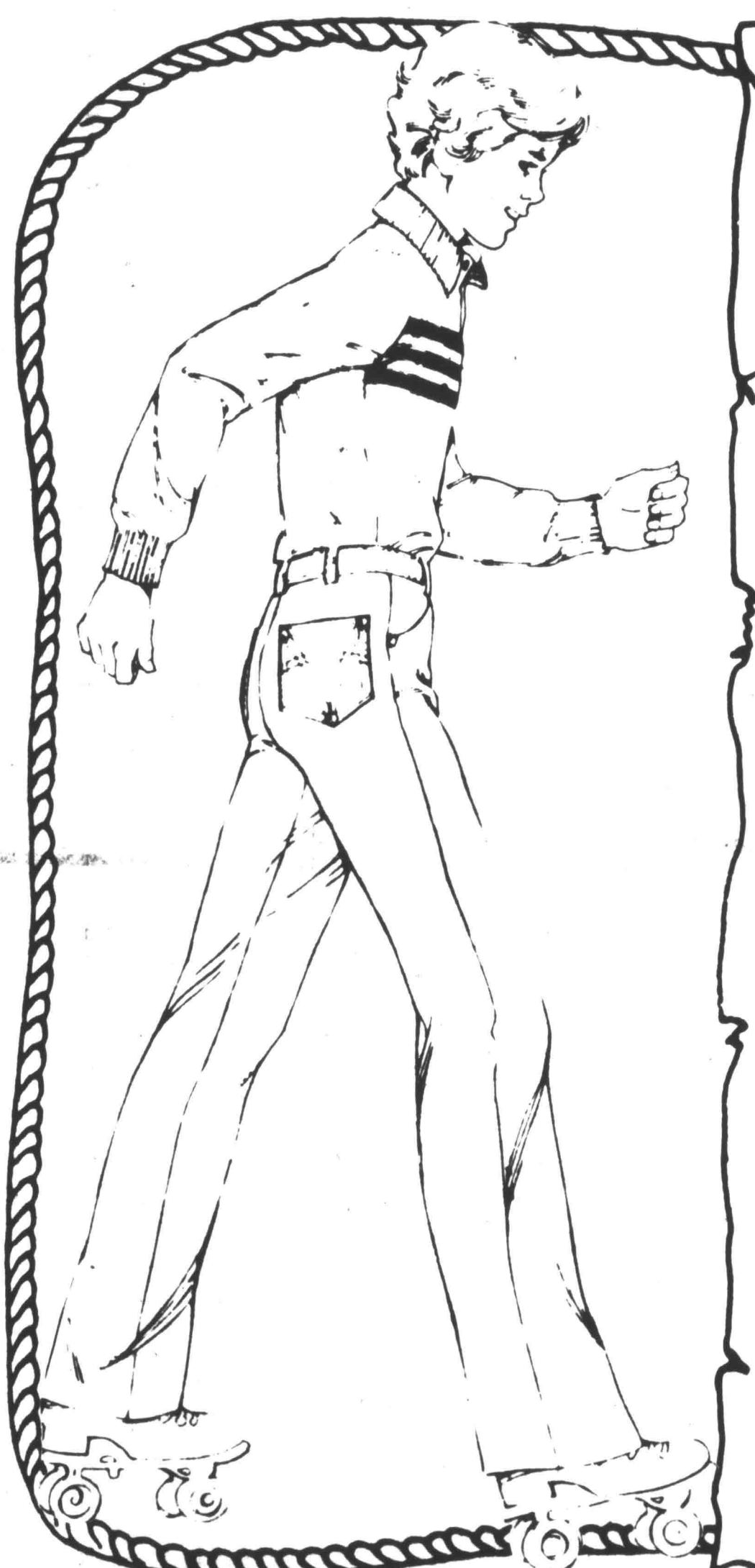
