The Graphic had a single magazine Linotype machine, but much of the type was still set by hand, including such things as bank statements, all advertising, headlines, etc.

Actually, things changed over the years, but still a great deal of hand-set type was used until we began switching to offset printing in the middle 1970s. Today, The Graphic is set on computer key-boards, and no hand-set type is used. Photographs are used plentifully but were rare in the old days.

There are some things we don't like about the offset process, but on the whole the new process enables us to give you a much better newspaper and with some less effort, although it is time-consuming. As an old dog, it had been difficult for your editor to

learn new tricks, but we have managed. We hope that we can continue to learn.
