

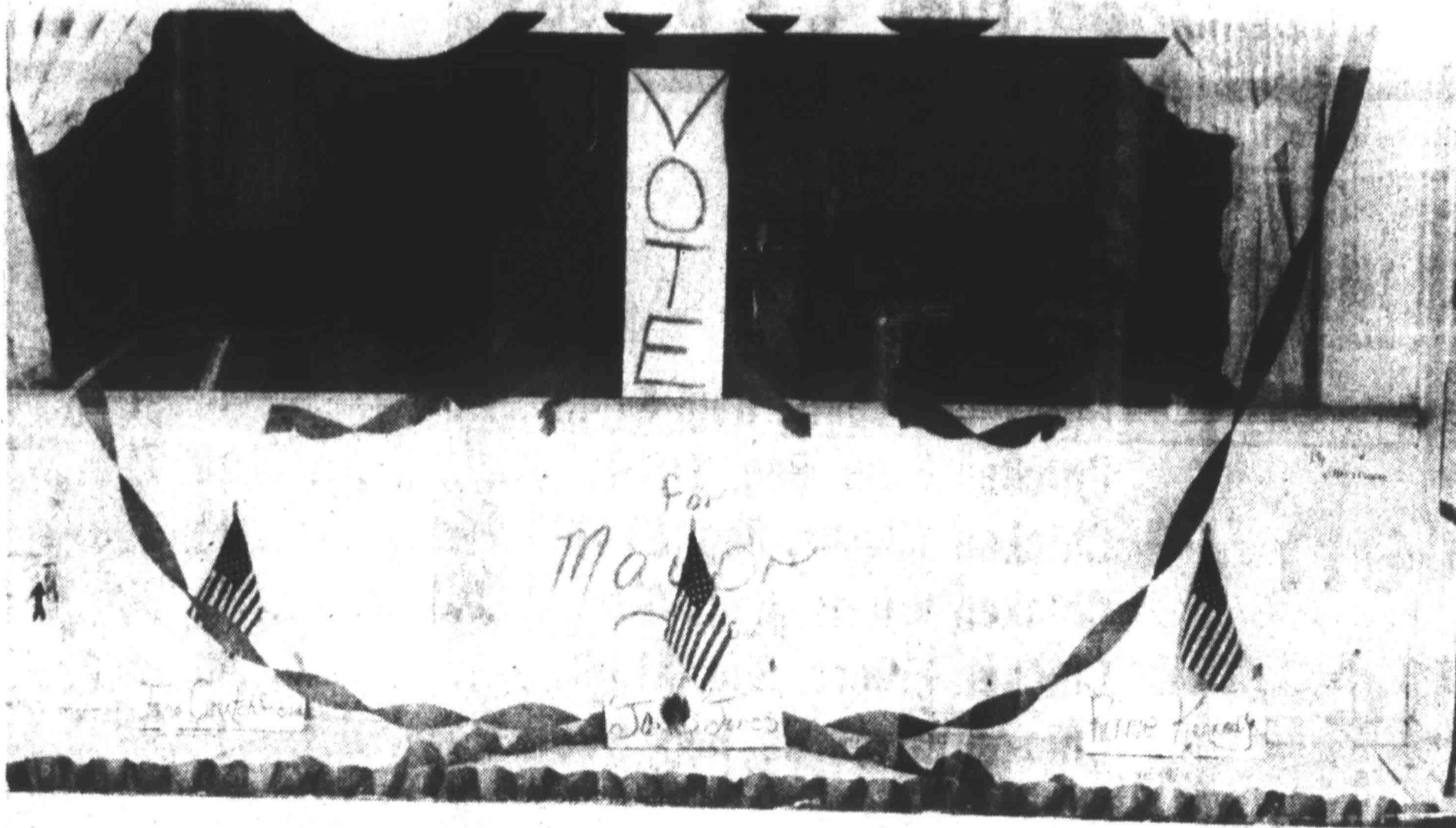

**Pecan Trees Galled**  
Pecan tree owners all over the county are finding galls on leaves and other parts of trees—coatings the tree forms over eggs laid by a small, wasp-like insect, especially during damp, cool weather.

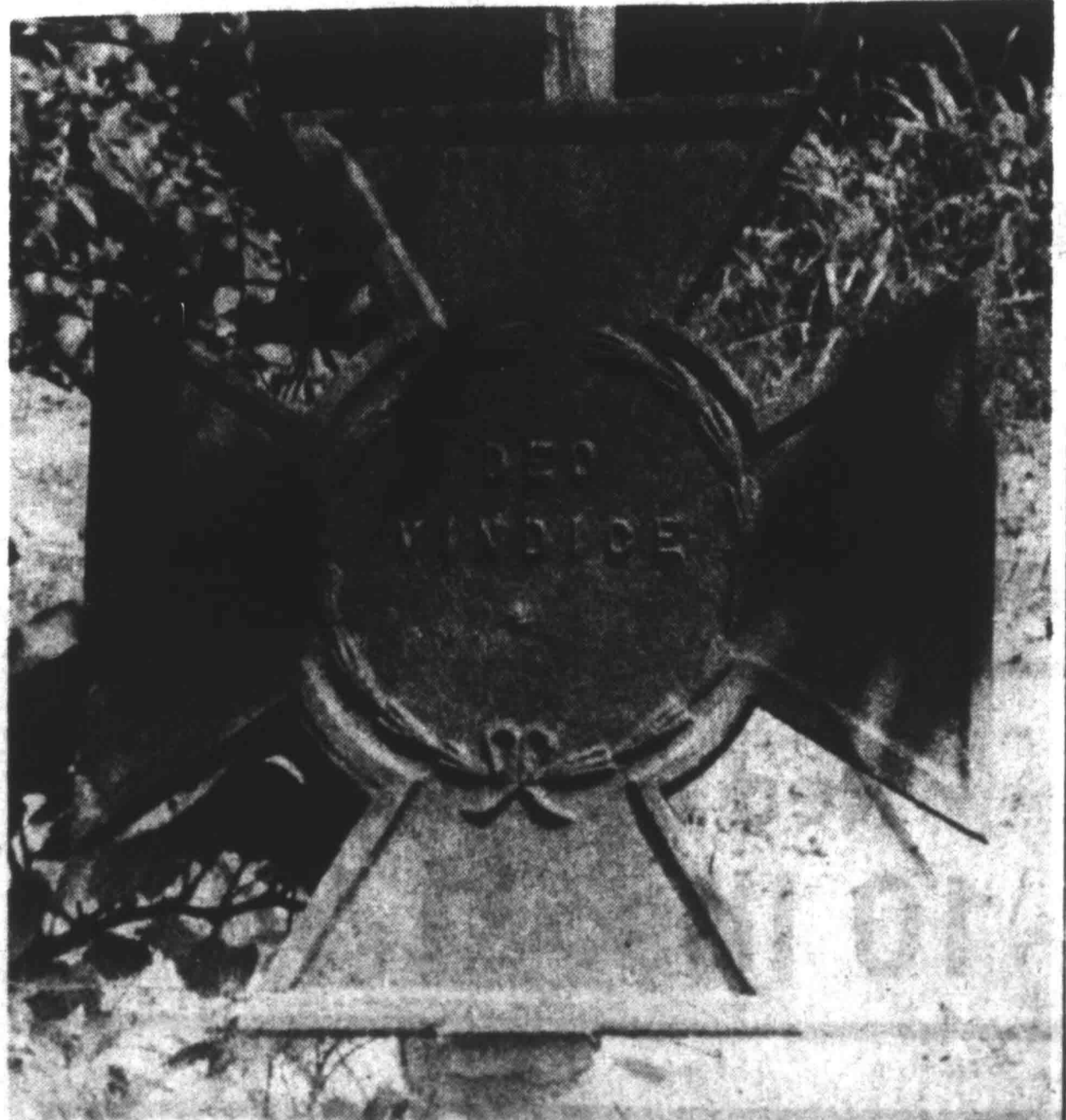
No record is found of permanent damage, though if very prevalent, young trees may be ruined; leaves will not manufacture the food needed for full kernel development.

## CSA Marker Found



**THIS MARKER** dedicated to the Civil War was unearthed last week at Halls Cemetery. On the front the marker has the Latin words, "Deo Vindice" and the dates 1861-65. On the reverse the Stars and Bar and the letters CSA are in relief. It is believed that the marker, long missing, was originally placed at the grave of Caswell Brandon, a colonel in the Confederate army during the Civil War. Mr. Brandon was the grandfather of Mrs. Martha Brandon Bentley and Mrs. Clarice Brandon Edwards, both of Ripley, and the great-grandfather of Mrs. Alice Wright Smith, of Ripley, and Mrs. Donna Edwards Porter, of Halls. The family plans to re-set the marker.

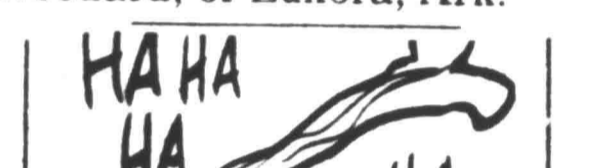

**Digging into Nashville's Past**

For anyone wishing to be part of the project, trained archaeologists will welcome visitors, discuss the history of the area and the Ryman family, and explain the discoveries at the site.

"We want to uncover information about the past... where the outbuildings and well were located," explains Cherrie Hall, executive director of Historic Nashville, Inc.

"We would like to find evidence of living such as china shards, buttons and other artifacts from this famous family."

All items found will belong to the owners of the property and may not be kept by workers. Later this year the unearthed artifacts will be displayed in a special historical exhibit relating to Nashville's famous Ryman Auditorium, which was named after Captain Ryman.

Born in 1841, Captain Tom Ryman was an influential Nashville businessman who rode into prominence during the mighty days of steamboating in the 1870's.

He owned and operated the most powerful fleet of steamboats along the Cumberland River and was the hero of hundreds of river men. His fleet of 35 steamboats funneled millions of dollars worth of farm produce into Nashville and shipped

other millions in goods out. But this swearing, drinking, gambling steamboat captain had an experience which changed not only his, but Nashville's destiny.

In May, 1885, Ryman and several of his men attended a tent meeting, supposedly to heckle revivalist Sam Jones. Instead they were soundly converted by a powerful sermon dealing with liquor.

Jones' influence on Ryman was profound. With a sharp 180-degree turn the born-again captain returned to his steamers, threw the whiskey overboard and began earnest plans to build a tabernacle for revival meetings.

Collections were taken up for several years and the new building, the Union Gospel Tabernacle, was completed in downtown Nashville in 1892. Ryman was the chief proponent of the structure and assumed a large portion of the financial responsibility.

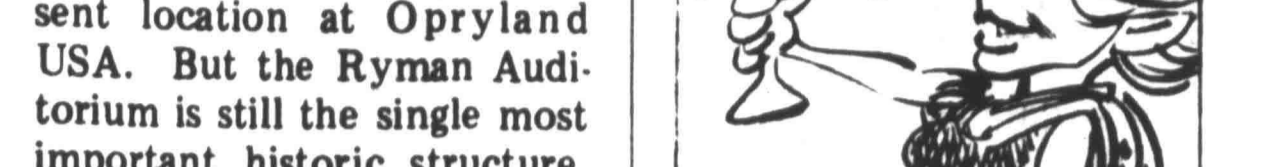
When Ryman died in 1904, Reverend Sam Jones presided over his funeral in the tabernacle, and at his suggestion the large red brick building with white lanet windows was renamed the Ryman Auditorium.

Although originally intended for religious functions, non-religious activities were

staged as a means to erase the debt. Many famous celebrities of the day including Caruso, William Jennings Bryan, Charlie Chaplin, Helen Keller and W. C. Fields played the Ryman, the only legitimate theater in Nashville at that time.

In 1941 the Grand Old Opry moved into the Ryman Auditorium and the famous radio broadcasts originated from there until 1973 when the Opry moved to its present location at Opryland USA. But the Ryman Auditorium is still the single most important historic structure, except for the State Capitol, remaining in downtown Nashville and tours are offered everyday of the year.

If you would like to be part of a fascinating dig into Nashville's colorful history, toss on your old clothes, grab a shovel and plunge into this historical adventure on Rutledge Hill.



Mead, the mildly alcoholic beverage that was the favorite drink of Queen Elizabeth I, was made by combining honey and water with spices, herbs and lemons. After boiling, it was left to stand for three months. Finally it was bottled, and considered fit to drink six weeks later.

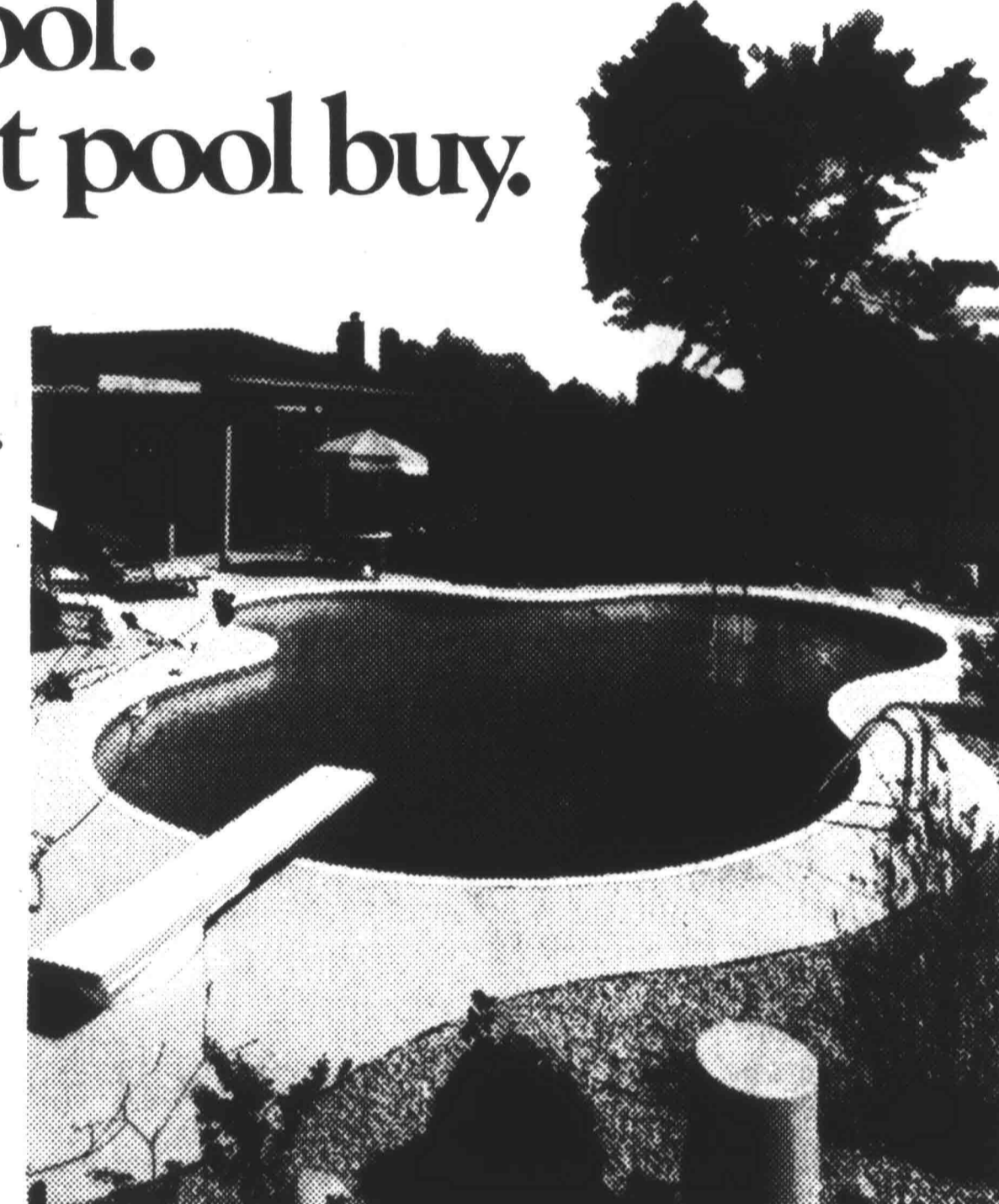

#### Coffee drinking and cancer

The convivial brew that animates and stimulates, the solitary cup that comforts and cheers is under scrutiny again. One's first inclination is to quit reading about coffee. On second thought, information may help us toward a reasonable perspective.

Most adults know caffeine as a minor drug of the "upper" variety. It stimulates the central nervous system and has effects that vary widely from person to person. The dose of caffeine is about 100 mg in an average cup of coffee and about 50 mg in a typical serving of tea or cola drink. Most people tolerate caffeine well, but some suffer effects such as jitteriness, withdrawal headaches and depression.

The FDA has issued warnings about the effects of caffeine on the developing fetus. Many expectant mothers elect to drink very little or no coffee during pregnancy and breast feeding, since drugs consumed during these times reach two people. One of these two, the developing infant, is especially vulnerable to any drug.

Cystic breast disease, unpleasant and sometimes serious and painful, has also been associated with coffee drinking. Some clinical reports suggest that cases have been cured by eliminating coffee.

A Boston study indicated that heavy coffee consumers were at increased risk for heart attack, but other studies have not confirmed the association. Coffee drinking can raise blood pressure temporarily and can produce temporary heart rhythm problems in some people.

School of Public Health involved 369 patients with cancer of the pancreas and 644 control patients.

The study was designed primarily to test the associations between pancreatic cancer and smoking and alcohol, but coffee and tea consumption were also noted.

Surprisingly, there was no association of alcohol consumption with pancreatic cancer, although there is such an association with chronic inflammation of the pancreas. Their study was a weak association with cigarette smoking.

But the unexpected result of the data was a consistent association of pancreatic cancer with coffee drinking, regardless of smoking habit.

This study showed an 80 percent greater risk for cancer of the pancreas among those drinking one to two cups of coffee every day. Risk increased more than two and a half times for those drinking three or more cups daily.

Cancer of the pancreas is now the fourth most common fatal malignant disease in the U.S., after lung, bowel, and breast cancer. MacMahon es-

timates from his data that coffee consumption could account for more than 50 percent of pancreatic cancer.

This is the first study to show such results. It is not reason enough to condemn coffee. But it may be a good reason for moderation.

### County Budget

Lauderdale County Executive Officer (County Judge) Jerry Corlew was guest speaker at Monday's meeting of Halls-Gates Rotary Club and gave members something to think about as he discussed county finances and some of the changes that will go into effect during 1982.

Judge Corlew said the county is looking at a \$9,500,000 budget for 1981-82 if all budget requests from the various departments are approved. He further stated that such a budget would require a 50% increase in the tax rate, to \$3.43. However, he said that he expects the budget committee to cut requests to the point where the present tax rate of \$2.93 can be retained, or at least have only a small increase.

Mr. Corlew also reminded the group that his office as such was abolished in 1978 by the Constitutional Convention, and the present County Judge position will no longer exist but will be County Executive Officer, with no judicial duties. Under the present set-up, Judge Corlew is Juvenile Court Judge and Probate Judge, but changes will remove those duties. Probate duties probably will be transferred to the Chancery Court. Juvenile jurisdiction is yet to be decided but probably will be moved to General Sessions Court.

He also stated that Lauderdale County will be required to re-appraise property in 1983, with the probability that the county tax assessments will more than double. He said, however, that he felt the tax rate would be cut in direct relation to the increase in assessments. One statement that concerned the auditor was that the state will probably complete the appraisal. Crockett County has recently completed a new tax appraisal with increases as much as 300 to 400 per cent. We, of course, do not know how Crockett County's previous appraisal compares with Lauderdale County, but certainly any such increases would be a hard blow to Lauderdale County property owners.

### Junior Police Badges

Halls Police Chief Buddy Moore has established a new program which he hopes and expects will slow down vandalism and petty crime in Halls. He is offering Junior Police Badges to any youngster 12 and under who aids police in any way in combating vandalism and crime. The youngster who gives assistance will automatically be awarded one of the badges. We hope that the program accomplishes its goal and at the same time we think that the program may make children aware that they can help.

Normal rainfall through June 7th for Ripley was 21.2 inches. It received 26.72 May 27th through June 7th was 12.5 inches at Ripley.

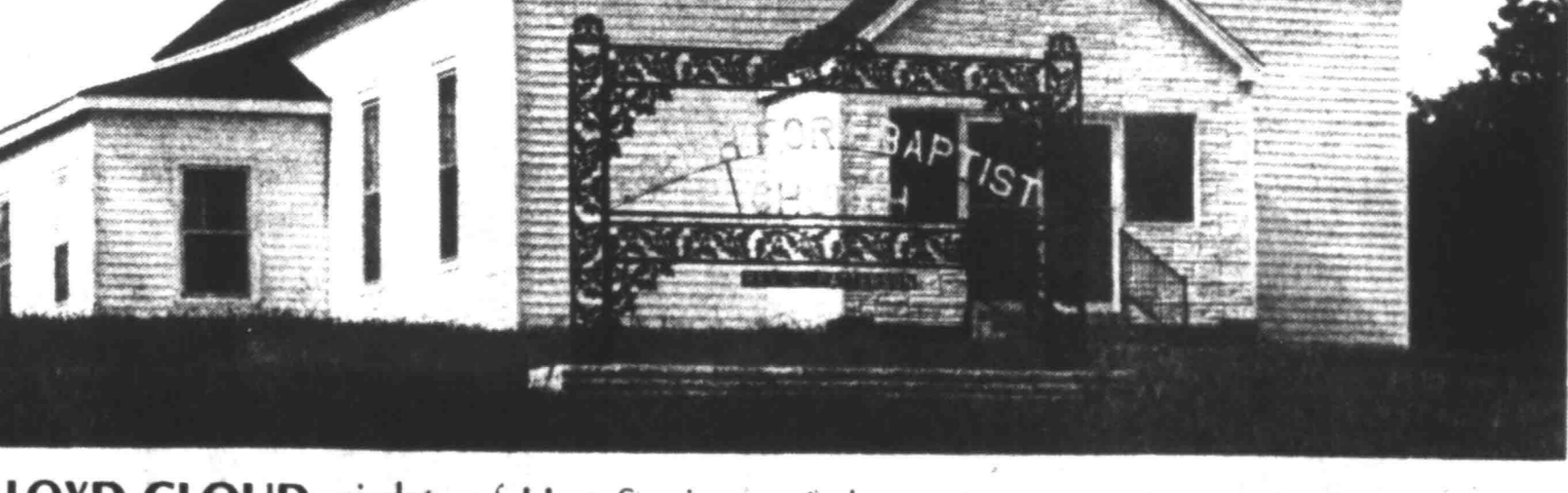
Bill Meadows reports his onion control program a success. Samples from his loads have yet to show any onion bulblets.

Are we eating too much meat?

Nutritionists have said that, generally, people in the United States eat twice as much protein as they need, most of it from animal sources. Is there any harm in this? Medical evidence and economic data indicate that is so. Eating less meat, eggs and dairy products would reduce consumption of saturated fat and cholesterol. Population and clinical studies lead to the belief that this would greatly reduce our burden of heart disease. It might also lower rates of breast, bowel, and other cancers associated with obesity, animal fat consumption, and diets low in vegetable fiber.

Besides saving lives, a national diet with less meat and meat products could also save money, land, and water resources, according to scientists at a meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. The majority of U.S. agricultural land is used for production of animal foods. According to one AAAS speaker, land requirements for raising cattle and their food have been the major drain on our prairie and forestlands. This land usage has in turn had major effects on soil productivity because of erosion and mineral depletion and has limited the areas available for wildlife. The United States now holds the world's record for use of water for food production with animal products accounting for 35 percent of the total. The result is increased ground-water depletion and water pollution. Americans did not always eat so much meat. Our current high consumption can be traced to the period after World War II, when economic conditions demanded that productivity, including farm productivity, be kept at wartime levels to forestall depression. The U.S. Department of Agriculture thus was saddled with enormous costs, and perishable stores of grain, legumes, and other staples purchased to support farm prices. A program was begun to encourage animal agriculture and the establishment of feedlots where the grains and beans could be processed through animals. The next step was a massive promotional campaign that eventually doubled the annual consumption of beef, to about 95 pounds per person by 1976. Since many people, including infants and young children, are not eating anything like this amount, many people are consuming much more.

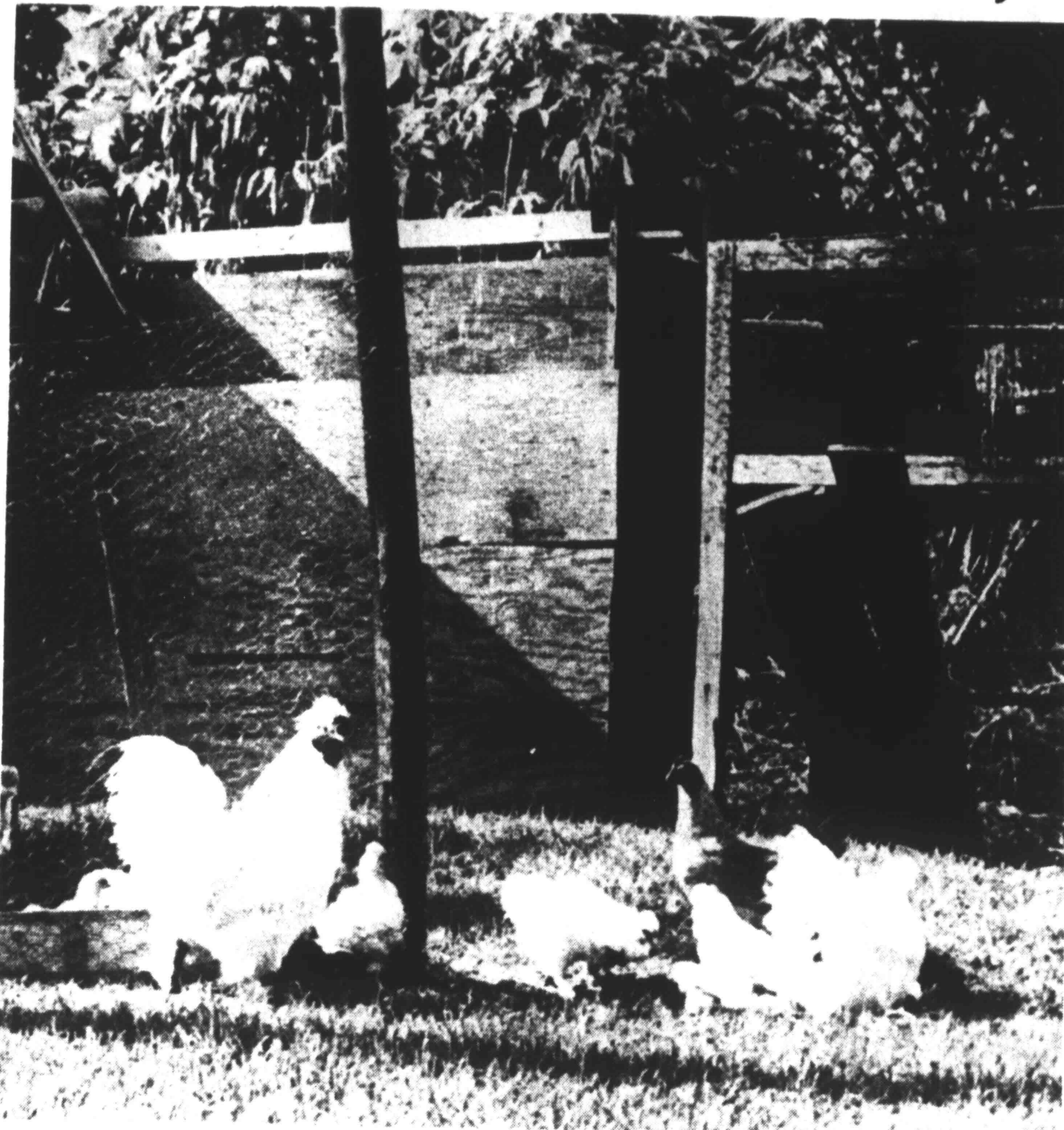
