Coffee drinking and cancer

The convivial brew that animates and stimulates, the solitary cup that comforts and cheers is under scrutiny again. One's first inclination is to quit reading about coffee On second thought, information may help us toward a reasonable perspective

Most adults know caffeine as a minor drug of the 'upper'' variety. It stimulates the central nervous system and has effects that vary widely from person to person. The dose of caffeine is about 100 ng in an average cup of coffee and about 50 mg in a typical serving of tea or cola drink Most people tolerate caffeine well, but some suffer effects such as litteriness, withirawal headaches and depres-

The FDA has issued warnings about the effects of caffeine on the developing fetus Many expectant mothers elect to drink very little or no coffee luring pregnancy and breast eeding since drugs consumed luring these times reach two people. One of these two, the developing infant, is especial-

v vulnerable to any drug. Cystic breast disease, un pleasant and sometimes seri ous and painful, has also been associated with coffee drink ing. Some clinical reports sug gest that cases have been cured by eliminating coffee. A Boston study indicated

that heavy coffee consumer were at increased risk fo heart attack, but other studies have not confirmed the associ ation. Coffee drinking can raise blood pressure temporarily and can produce temporary heart rhythm problems in

County Budget

Lauderdale County Executive Officer (County Judge) Jerry Corlew was guest speaker at Monday's ces and some of the changes that will go into effect during 1982.


Judge Corlew said the county is looking at a \$9,500,000 budget for 1981-82 if all budget requests from the various departments are approved. He further stated that such a budget would require a 50¢ increase in the tax rate, to \$3.43. However, he said that he expects the budget committee to cut requests to the point where the present tax rate of \$2.93 can be retained, or at least have only a small increase.

Mr. Corlew also reminded the group that his office as such was abolished in 1978 by the Constitutional Convention, and the present County Judge position will no longer exist but will be County Executive Officer, with no judicial duties. Under the present setup, Judge Corlew is Juvenile Court Judge and Probate Judge, but changes will remove those duties. Probate duties probably will be transferred to the Chancery Court. Juvenile jurisdiction is yet to be decided but probably will be moved to General Sessions Court.

He also stated that Lauderdale County will b required to re-appraise property in 1983, with the probability that the county tax assessments will more than double. He said, however, that he felt the tax rate would be cut in direct relation to the increase in assessments. 

Are we eating too much meat?

Nutritionists have said that generally, people in the United States eat twice as much nonfrom animal sources. Is there any harm in this Medical evidence and eco-

nomic data indicate there is Eating less meat, regs and dairy products would reduce consumption of saturated fat and cholesterol. Population and clinical studies lead to the belief that this would greatly reduce our burden of heart disease. It might also lower rates of breast, bowel, and

other cancers associated with obesity, animal fat consumption, and diets low in vegetable fiber Besides saving lives, a national diet with less meat and ductivity, be kept at wartime daily

meat products could also save money, land, and water r sources, according to scientists at a meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. The majority of US agricultural land is used for production of animal foods. According to one AAAS speaker land requirements for raising cattle and their food have been the major drain on our plaus and forestlands. This land usage has in turn had major effects on soil productivity be depletion and has limited the areas available for wildlife The United States now holds the world's record for use c water for food production. with animal products accounting for 85 percent of the total. The result is increased ground-water depletion and

Americans did not always eat so much meat. Our current high consumption can be traced to the period after World War II, when economic conditions demanded that productivity, including farm pro-

water pollution

levels to forestall depression The U.S Department of Agriculture thus was saddled with enormous, costly, and perishable stores of grain, legumes, and other staples purchased to support farm prices. A program was begun to encourage animal agriculture and the establishment of feedlots where the grains and beans could be processed through animals. The next step was a massive promoional campaign that eventually doubled the annual consumption of beef, to about 95 pounds per person by 1976. Since many people, including infants and young children. are not eating anything like this amount, many people are onsuming much more.


If someone is consuming exactly his share of all animal products, he is eating 600 bounds of meat, eggs, and dairy products per year This provides 70 grams of animal protein per day in addition to the 32 grams of plant protein the average person consumes

HOW MUCH SOIL AM I LOSING BY EROSION?

How much soil will I lose by erosion in the next few years? How can I reduce this loss of water and soil so my future income won't decline? These two questions are very important to all farmers and also significant to all people because of our dependence upon the soil for our present and future food supply.

University of Tennessee Professor James H. Robinson explains that bare ground will lose two hundred fifty times as much soil as a field of closegrowing hay or an ungrazed forest. Likewise, usual row cropping may lose five to ten times as much soil as minimum-tillage, while straight row cultivation may lose three to six times as much soil as contour strip-cropped or terraced land.

Your local county extension agent or district soil conservationist can help you evaluate your opinions and determine answers to the two questions by relying on technical information in four areas: First, find out the kinds of soils on your farm from a soil survey.

Second, determine the steepness and length of slope on each field or part of field in the farm. Third, use a soil loss prediction equation to estimate the amount of soil that will be lost under each

combination of cropping systems and production practices under consideration. And fourth, choose among the many productive systems and practices that lose the least soil. The pictured field is Memphis soil with 8% slope with a slope length of 100 feet. Soybeans are planted

straight up and down the slope. Each acre will loose 59 tons of soil per acre per year. Contouring the field will cut the soil loss to 35 tons per acre.

No-till farming (soybeans, continuous, residue left, no-till planted in prior year's soybean residue) will cut the soil loss to 9 tons loss per acre per year Soil survey maps are available at the Soil Conservation District office. Call 635-0851 any week day from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The Lauderdale County Soil Survey was started in September 1979. As of May 31, 1981, approximately 85,000 acres or 27% of Lauderdale County has been mapped. The survey is scheduled to be completed in October 1983

Soil Scientists will go over all land in the county identify the soil series and slope range and show this information on soil maps. The survey party consists of four soil scientists. Two of these are employees of the USDA Soil Conservation Service and two are employed by the Lauderdale Soil Conservation District with funds provided by the TVA,





The Resource Management Conservation Program was implemented in the county in 1979 through the cooperation of the SCS, ASCS, FHA. and Extension Service. The idea of implementation for the program is to sign up two farmers per year for six consecutive years with a total of 12 farmers being on the program in the county. The purpose of the program being, a reduction of soil loss from erosion to tolerance levels on these icrease or maintenance of farmer income though he might take some land out of production. Possible enterprise adjustments, if to farmers advantage over a period of time, and the use of these farmers and their farming operations for demonstration purposes of soil erosion control practices, farm management and results obtainable from the program. In effect for the third year, the program at present has 6 farmers participating. Three thousand one hundred forty-three acres are owned or rented by these farmers. This represents the acreage involved

so far in the program Approximately 500 acres has or will have soil erosion control structures built on them. The structures include terraces, debris basins, waterways, diversion ditches and ponds. Other acreage will have crop and tillage practice adjustments.

Practices used for erosion control and enterprise adjustments include no-till planting, drilling, rotation of crops, increased pasturage, farm enterprise diversification, and better record keeping on farming operations.

Following guidelines for implementation of the RMC Program, all county agricultural agencies are aware of and participate in the recommendation for selection of farms. The final selection of farmers is done by the Extension Agents. Cost sharing in the amount of \$3,500.00 where applicable is provided by the Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Ser-

The soil survey can be used to appraise the effects of alternate land use on the environment and net production of land resources. Soil surveys can help land users evaluate soil hazards and suitability for: (1) Developing of sub-divisions, industrial parks and shopping centers; (2) Location, design, and expected performance of local streets, roads, septir tanks, filter fields, sewage lagoons, and sanitary land-fills; (3) Agricultural and rural uses--cropping plans and alternatives; (4) Forestry, recreation, and wildlife uses; (5) Location of source material for gravel, sand, top-soil, and road fill.

tive for soybean production in the county. No-till substitutes herbicides for the tillage opera tion in the preparation of a seedbed for the growing of the crop. A specially equipped planter is needed to plant soybeans in the untilled soil and through last year's residue

No-till is an excellent soil management practice that can improve soil structure as well as conserve valuable topsoil and moisture during critical growing months. It can also substantially reduce the time spent to establish a crop. Yields equal-to or better than conventional tillage yields can be achieved by using the no-till system for soybeans

Billy Lankford of the Woodville Community has recently purchased a planter that will plant fifteen rows of beans with rows nineteen inches apart. The planter is equipped to apply fertilizer, herbicides and seed in one operation. The difference in cost of conventional planting and no-till planting is about \$17 per acre in favor of no-till.

No-tillage will increase net farm income, generally increase production, lower labor requirements, let more land come into production and reduce erosion. Billy plans to no-till plant 900 acres this season. There are from 20 to 25 no-till planters in the county.

Erosion is probably the most serious problem fac ing Lauderdale County farmers. Many acres of marginal soils in the county have been taken out of sod crops.....such as pasture and planted to row crops ...primarily soybeans for the last several years this has resulted in a major erosion problem or these soils. Erosion now in progress on these soils will soon render them useless for crop production

Erosion not only destroys the land it originates on, but the sediment it deposits in stream channels will increase the frequency of flooding. This twoway destruction adds to the complexity of the problem.

Unless these excessive erosion rates.....caused primarily by poor cropping practices....are reduced to acceptable levels, present damages will increase to the point where farmers cannot profitably farm these acres.

The acceptable level of soil loss per acre per year on Memphis soil in Lauderdale County is five tons. The field pictured above is losing soil at the rate of 20 tons per acre per year.

The Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service cost shares on the following practices to combat erosion: Permanent Vegetative Cover Establishment or Improvement, Terraces, Diversions, Cropland Protective Cover, Conservation Tillage, Permanent Vegetative Cover on Critical Areas. Water Impoundments, Sediment Retention Erosion or Water Control Structures, Sod Waterways, Permanent Wildlife Habitat, Forest Tree Plantations or Stand improvements.

A contract between the Tennessee Department of Conservation Division of Surface Mining and Recla-mation and the Lauderdale County Soil Conservation District was signed in May 1980. The contract states that the Department of Con-

servation has the mission of reclamation of land affected by surface mining, and as a part of this mission has been authorized to reclaim lands affected prior to enactment of "The Tennessee Surface Mining Law."

The Tennessee Soil Conservation Districts have been given the mission of demonstrating by example the means, methods and measures by which soil and soil resources may be conserved. The landowner signs an agreement with the Ten-

nessee Department of Conservation agreeing to the right of entry upon the land for the performance of reclamation work The State agrees to pay up to 100% of funds needed for expenditures toward the reclamation of the abandoned lands. The landowner agrees to prepare seedbed, fertilize, seed and take all reasonable steps to protect the reclaimed lands for a period of 5

years. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assist the Soil Conservation District in checking site preparation to meet technical standards. Two sites were reclaimed in Lauderdale County in 1980 with a total acreage of 27 acres at a cost of \$18.023.85
