Halls Tigers Slate Grim

Despite a veteran squad featuring 16 seniors and 24 letterman, the Halls High Tigers this fall face their toughest schedule since the days, when Brownsville, Covington, Dyersburg and Ripley were regular opponents every year.

With Tennessee Academy, Greenfield, Bruceton, and First Assembly Christian School no longer on the schedule, the Tigers must play four teams which were in the 1980 state play-offs, plus Reel foot Conference champion Alamo! The Tigers open in McKenzie Friday, with the Rebels gunning for a win after a one-sided loss here last year.

McKenzie showed improvement throughout the year and wound up with a surprising 31-7 win over Old Hickory in the play-offs, before losing to eventual state champion Lake County.

Also in the play-off, last year was a new foe, Goodpasture. In the first home game next week, the Tigers will host Goodpasture, habitually in the top ten in Class A football.

Other new foes are Greene County, Ark., and Martin Westside, both Class AA teams, plus a new-comer to District 15-A, Bolton.



Certainly, we don't know the answer, but we're afraid that Mr. Volcker and many of the Administration's economists are in the same boat.


