Halls Tigers Slate Grim

Despite a veteran squad featuring 16 seniors and 24 letterman, the Halls High Tigers this fall face their toughest schedule since the days, when Brownsville, Covington, Dyersburg and Ripley were regular opponents every year.

With Tennessee Academy, Greenfield, Bruceton, and First Assembly Christian School no longer on the schedule, the Tigers must play four teams which were in the 1980 state play-offs, plus Reelfoot Conference champion Alamo! The Tigers open in McKenzie Friday, with the Rebels gunning for a win after a one-sided loss here last year.

McKenzie showed improvement throughout the year and wound up with a surprising 31-7 win over Old Hickory in the play-offs, before losing to eventual state champion Lake County.

Also in the play-off, last year was a new foe, Goodpasture. In the first home game next week, the Tigers will host Goodpasture, habitually in the top ten in Class A football.

Other new foes are Greene County, Ark., and Martin Westside, both Class AA teams, plus a new-comer to District 15-A, Bolton.

Led by state scoring champion, Mike Hudson, the Tigers will have only one new-comer in the starting lineup. Mark Bernard, a senior, will open at guard on defense, despite no previous experience.

Eric Smith, defensive corner back and back-up quarterback last year, will start at quarterback, backed by Fletcher Taylor.

Gid Olds has been moved from tight end to full-back, replacing the graduated Dwight Napper. Olds has shown well at the position.

Backing Olds at full-back will be Mike Kerby and Bobby McCadney, both at line-backer on defense.

At weak guard on offense will be either Dennis Newman or Clay Newman.

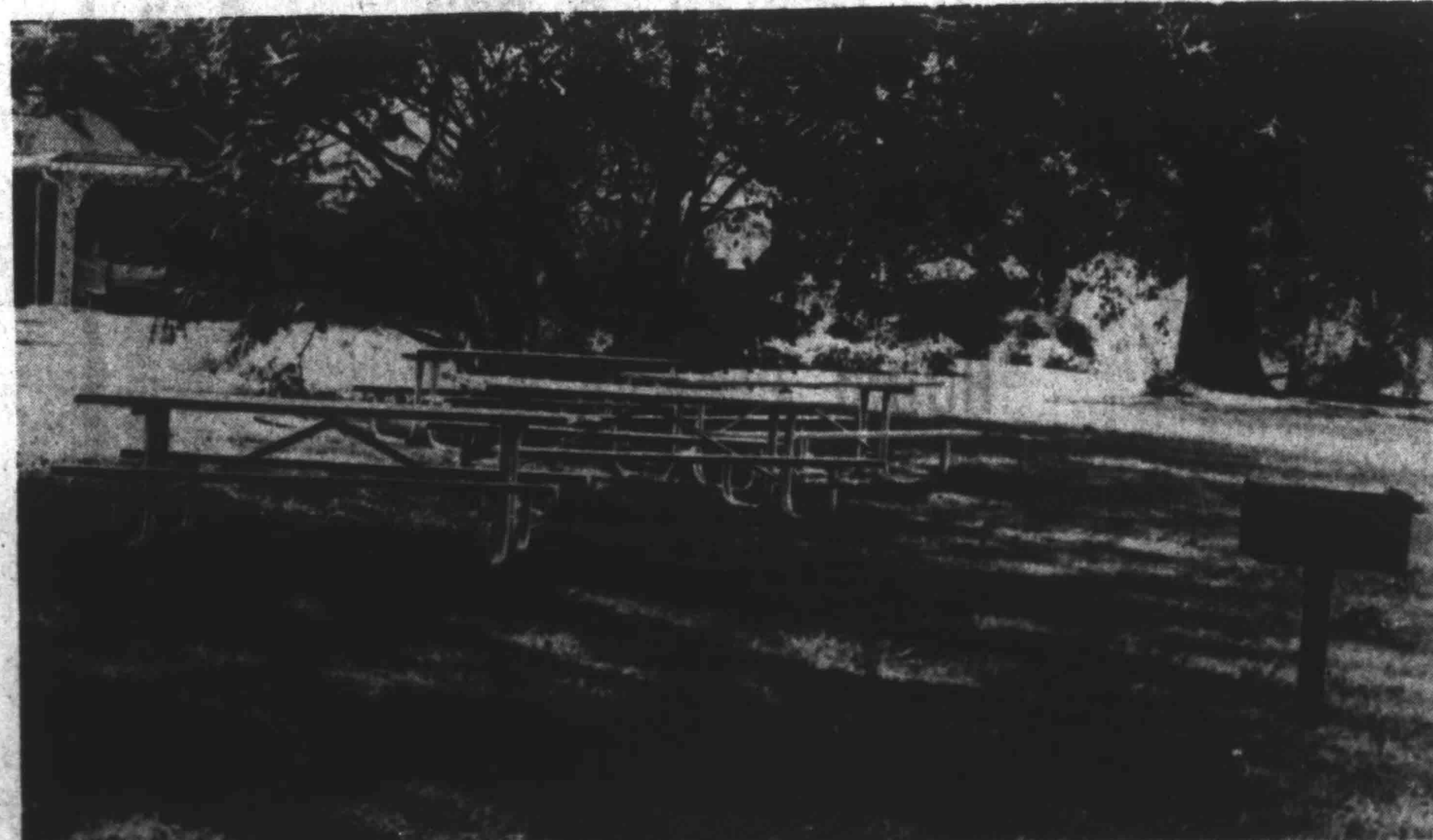
Gates Apartments Rising

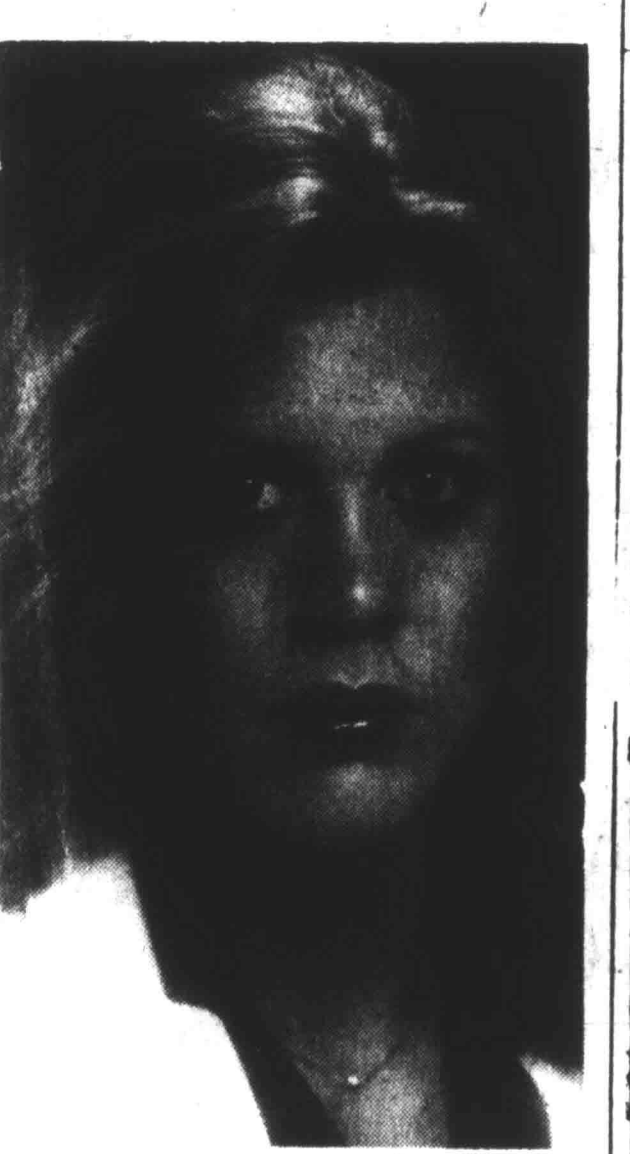

During the next few days, our country will be celebrating Labor Day. More often than not, the arrival of Labor Day is the signal of summer's end. School has started back for the children, the days at the lake or vacation are over, and generally people are readying themselves for the winter. Unfortunately, the last holiday of the summer is oftentimes not given the attention it deserves as a day for our entire nation to pay tribute to the millions of Americans whose work makes our nation great.

As I went around the Seventh District during the August recess, I had the opportunity to meet with and talk to many, many of the people of West Tennessee. Though they all took the time to discuss their complaints, their problems, their desire to work and provide for their families

was not overlooked. From the factory worker, there was no doubt as to their desire to be a constructive part of our society. While those I talked to sought to obtain answers to the concerns they had, they expressed reservations about the economic problems confronting our nation. Inflation Drops

Government figures last week showed a drop in the inflation rate, but few consumers were able to believe it, since the slowdown has not yet trickled down to the local level.

It is our belief that some prices are going to drop within the near future, but a drop in the inflation rate is going to mean very little unless production increases and the still climbing unemployment rate is slowed.

Despite a continued drop in automobile sales and high unemployment, the car manufacturers continue to raise their prices, with the middle man, car dealer, suffering much of the brunt of the drop in sales.

Electricity rates are slated to increase in the near future, telephone increases have already been approved, natural gas will probably cost even more, and food shows little sign of becoming cheaper. These are the basic needs of all families and directly affect almost every household.

Until these cost of living factors are controlled, production increases, and unemployment and interest rates drop, there would seem to be little to encourage most consumers.

It is to be hoped that some of the measures that the Administration has been using to control inflation will soon begin to work.

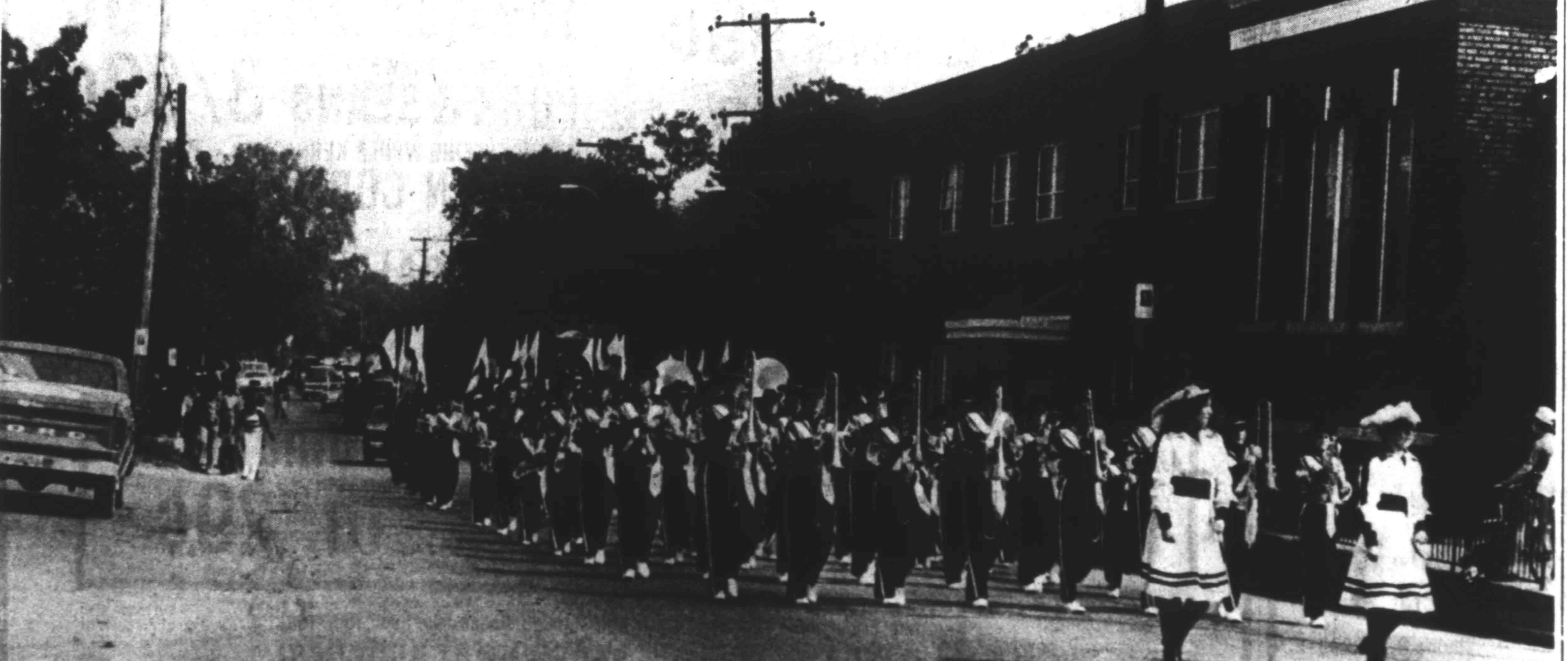

Halls Cable Hope Rises

Meeting Tuesday evening of last week, Halls' Board of Mayor and Aldermen, at the suggestion of City Attorney Tom Caldwell, voted to leave open franchises granted to Ripley Cable TV and Alten Cable TV, with the city encouraging them neither to continue nor discontinue work on lines to bring cable television to Halls. Both had previously been granted franchises but had been unable to meet deadlines and withdrawn, but both have now resumed operations. Mayor James Cheshier presented a new subdivision ordinance. The Board asked Caldwell to study it and report at the October meeting. On recommendation of the Planning Commission, the Board adopted a resolution to comply with flood insurance requirements. The proposal is similar to a plan already adopted by Lauderdale County. Under the proposed resolution, home and property owners would be able to qualify for flood insurance. In other business, the board: Agreed to purchase a 1967 International truck for \$1,250 for conversion to a fire truck, at a cost of about \$300. Approved recommendation by Utility Supt. Akin Barnes to discontinue sending delinquent notices to gas and water customers, effective Jan. 1, 1982. The Board tentatively approved the change with the requirement that adequate public notice be given, plus a line on the monthly bill stating that no further bill will be sent. Estimates are that the city will save from \$150 to \$250 each month under the change. Cheshier named a committee of Noel Sherrod, Eugene Pugh, and Marcus Spiller, plus Caldwell and himself, to work with Anderson-Hickey Co. for purchase of additional land, west of its present site.

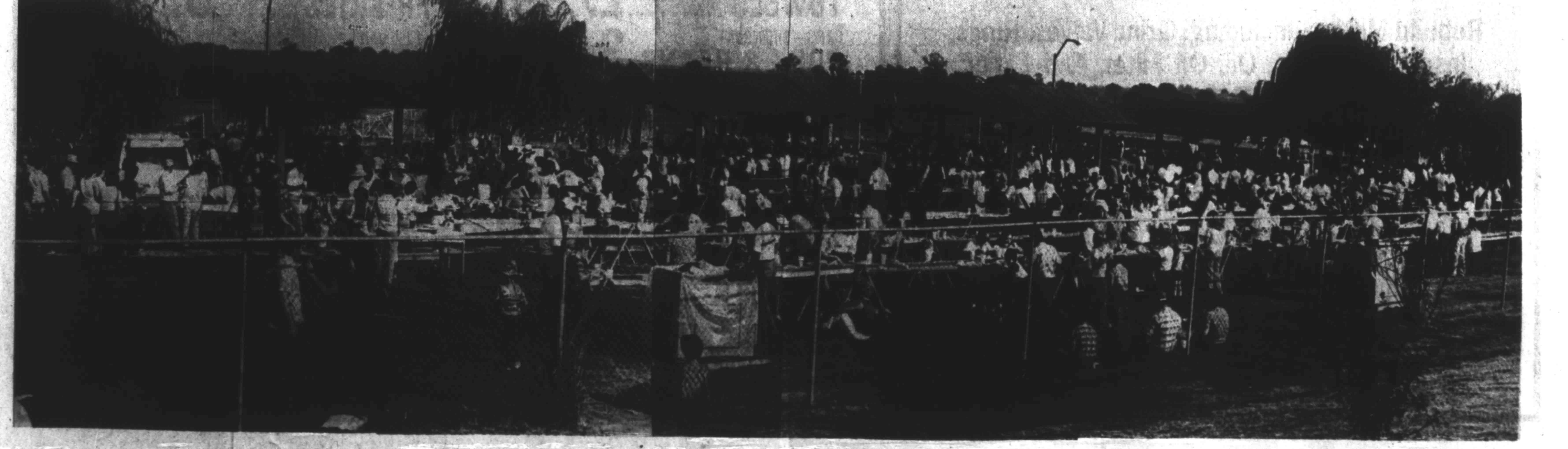

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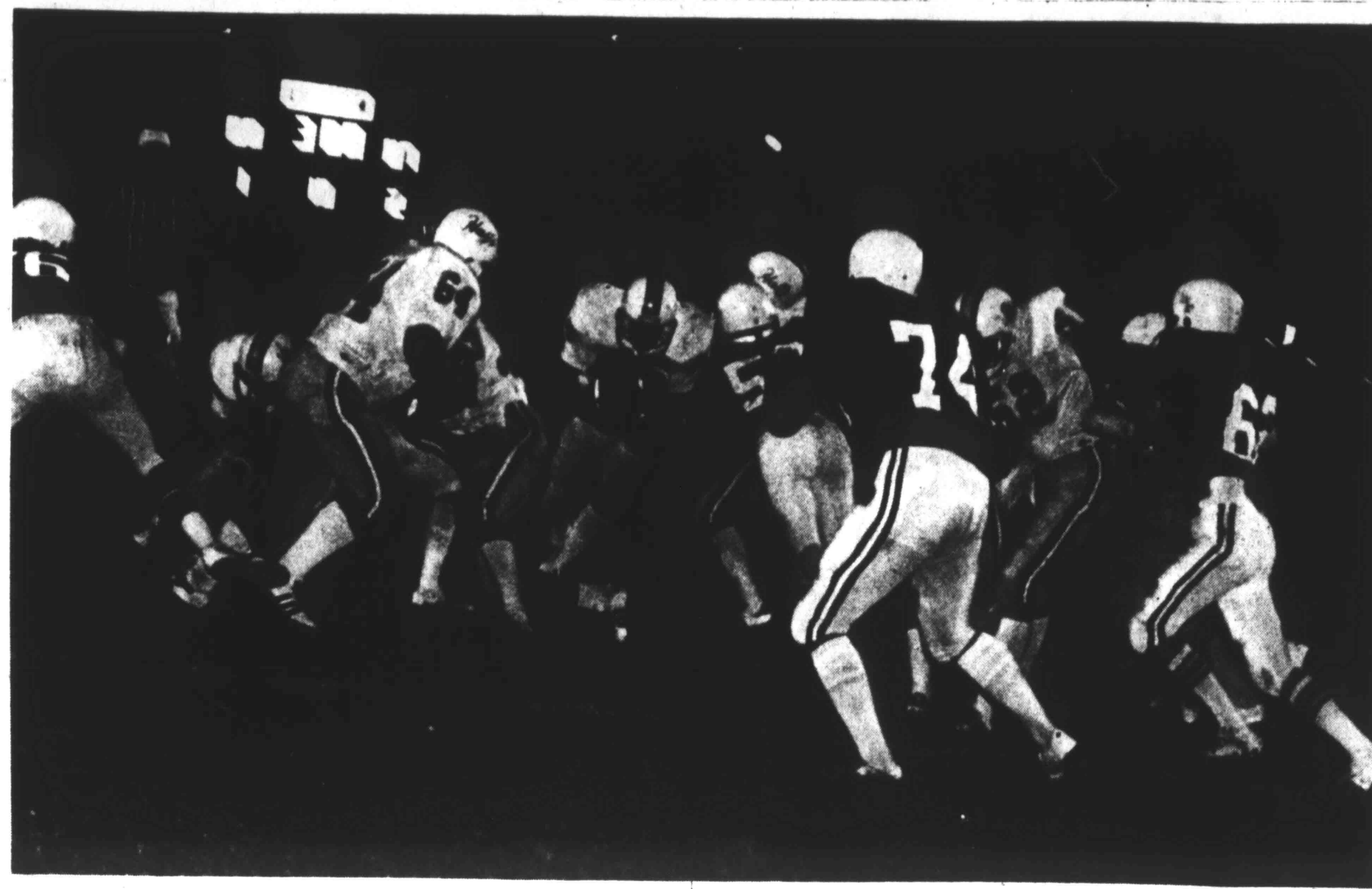
