


Hospital Plans Told



NEW LAUDERDALE HOSPITAL, on 35 acres purchased from L. M. (Bubba) Kirkpatrick, Jr., at about \$12,000 per acre, south of Asbury Road and with frontage on new Highway 51, has site preparation well underway. Paul Akin, reared at Arp, vice-president of Management-Construction, Inc., of Memphis, general contractor, will oversee construction, cost estimated at \$7,105,767, for 68,472 square feet providing 32 medical, 32 surgical, and six critical care beds, with planning for expansion. Jim Ramer, administrator, told Ripley Rotarians Tuesday that many of the new facility's features are already available in the present hospital, such as diagnosis via telephone from Baptist Hospital specialists in Memphis—and that the beds have not been sharply increased because present occupancy is 70% and with resumption of surgery, with a surgeon moving here from Georgia, it is anticipated younger patients will require fewer hospital days.

County Up A Digit On '83 Auto Plates

Fort Pillow State Prison Farm, on Highway 87 west of Henning, is manufacturing blank (un-numbered) automobile license plates which in 1983 will up Lauderdale County's prefix from 50 to 49, based on 1980 Census results, while Tipton also gains a digit, to 31.

Prefix numbers will change in 78 of the state's 95 counties, but not in the top six—Shelby (Memphis), Davidson (Nashville), Knox (Knoxville), Hamilton (Chattanooga), Sullivan, and Washington.

The new plates will be green on white and will cost \$20—\$17.75 for the state, \$1.25 for the clerk who sells them, and \$1.00 for the reflectorized coating.

Your editor is completely disgusted! Monday of last week was National Goof-Off Day, and we didn't know anything about it until it was too late. There are many national days and weeks which we don't observe, but we certainly would have observed National Goof-Off Day.

A large and appreciative crowd attended the spring concert of the Halls High Golden Tigers marching band Sunday afternoon. We continue to be amazed and gratified at the fine progress of the young Halls High Band. Once again we congratulate Band Director Bobby Webb, his assistant, Jane Webb, parents of the band members, and the Band Boosters for their continued successful efforts.

Perhaps some of you will remember, several months ago, when senior citizens were arrested in a Florida city for playing penny-ante-poker, with resulting national publicity. Well, just last week law enforcement officers became even more ridiculous, when they tried to bring charges of assault against a 5-year-old girl and try her as an adult. The prosecuting attorney has since backed off, but the effort was made, with, again, national publicity. We agreed that the girl should receive some punishment, but certainly not as an adult. It would seem that law enforcement officials could fine better things to do.

The present state legislature has continued true to form. Each year, we wonder if the standing legislature isn't a little worse than any previous one, and so far, we feel that this has held true.

All in all, it seems to us that the 1982 legislature is likely to compare unfavorably with almost any previous legislature.



Sarah Cherry called to tell me that her step-father, Tolle Stephens, was the son of Sara Hall and Jefferson Stephens. Halls was named for Sara Hall's family.

She also told me that Effie Stephens Hanna and Will Hanna had an adopted son, Harry Hanna, before any of their seven children I named were born.

Evelyn Stephens Bovy, of Tarpon Springs, Fla., granddaughter of Sara Hall and Jefferson Stephens, writes to Sarah Cherry, her step sister, as follows:

"Yes, Aunt Mat Brandon and Grandma (Sara) were sisters. Grandma had the five children, Papa (Tollie S. Stephens), Uncle Will (Stephens), Charlie (Stephens), Aunt Beulah (Cardough), and Aunt Effie (Hanna).

"There was a big (to me at the time) brick hotel right near the railroad track, between Aunt Effie's and the tracks.

"One night, they had a big dance there—put on by a lodge—I've forgotten the name of the Lodge, I think it had the name Woodman in it.

"The hotel burned after the dance and there was a frame house across the street with a big porch around it, and I believe it caught fire, too.

"They thought Aunt Effie's house was going to burn and moved out all the furniture—call out on the sidewalk (I was little but I remember it).

"Aunt Effie's house was saved. She had a 2-story brick house.

"After the hotel burning, the town said it burned because of the dance, and they banned dancing, and I mean banned it. There were no more dances held in Halls for at least ten years.

"The remains of the hotel was boarded up.

"Then Aunt Effie (Hanna) started taking in drummers, as we called them in those days. It was so convenient for the salesmen to get off the train at the depot and walk to Aunt Effie's.

"She enlarged the house, and that family worked. She had two negroes in the kitchen, and she put on fabulous meals, considered so at that time, and the traveling men tried to make it to her house for the night meal. I can remember Naomi making pies.

"She used the brick from the old hotel to enlarge her home; later she added the big porch. She did a good business.

"Uncle Cardough and Aunt Beulah, who built their home across the street (the stone house where the Noel Sherrods live, now owned by Bobby Cherry).

"You couldn't find a speck of dust in that house. She kept it immaculate.

"Of course, Aunt Beulah was a wonderful seamstress. She sewed for a lot of people. Aunt Beulah had no children. Aunt Effie had seven in all. Two are still living.

Tollie L. Stephens and Matilda Schoffner Stephens had one other child, Dr. George J. Stephens, who married Inez Hart Stephens. They had one child, Virginia.

Her mother died in 1916 when she was two. Dr. Stephens then married Martha Rickman and practiced dentistry in Lake County.

Virginia lived in Halls with her grandmother Hart and Uncle George Hart. She died in 1948.

After Tollie L. Stephens' first wife, Matilda Schoffner, died, he married a widow, Grace King Cherry. They had two children, Winnona who died in 1918 only one year old, and Noye Delle, who now lives in Memphis.

She first married Bernon Martin and they had a son, Steve Martin, who now lives in Memphis. Noye Delle's second husband, Wilson Davis, is also deceased. She now lives with her husband, Frank Robins in Memphis.

Tollie L. Stephens had two step-children, (children of Grace King Cherry), J. E. Cherry, who is married to Ina Mae Gay Cherry, has no children; they live in Texarkana, Tex. Sarah A. Cherry, who was married to G. W. Cherry (deceased), had three children, Mary Katherine Osborne, of Monroe, Mich., Madeline Vaden, of Halls, and Sarah Alice Richardson, of Memphis.

In 1913, and she lived with her Aunt Irene and Uncle Will Stephens after her father moved to the country.

Evelyn married Green Seals and lived in Greenville, Miss., until his death after an automobile wreck. She then moved to Tarpon Springs, Fla., where her brother, Odell Stephens, and his wife, Mable, live. She is married to Floyd H. Bovy.

Evelyn is a talented musician, and I can remember her playing the piano at the pic-

nic. "I don't have Aunt Irene's Bible, I'm sure it had a record of the family in it.

"You know years ago, Papa and Uncle Will were in business together. They had a store, but they dissolved partnership. It seems to me there was a fire.

"Grandma Sara (Stephens) had a big house facing the railroad on the east side of the railroad, but it burned. To me (being little) it seemed like a big house, and it was, compared to ours.

"The Stephens family was related to the Bob Conley family—distant cousins."

Will Stephens married Irene Campbell and they had one daughter, Ollie, who married Bill Beasley. They had no children. He was mayor of Halls for several years, and she worked a number of years at the Kimbrough Dry Goods Store.

Sarah Cherry tells me that Evelyn's parents were Tolle L. Stephens and Matilda Schoffner. Her mother died



Halls History

Before leaving the Halls, who were early settlers and founders of Halls, I will make a few more corrections.

Marie Brandon, who now lives in Memphis, writes that the missing daughter of Caswell Brandon and Martha Hall Brandon was named Euvalah (I never saw it written out, everybody called her "Slater," and that is the way it was pronounced). She married Ira Westbrook and when I knew them, they lived in Blytheville, Ark.

"I thought for a while I would not correct you on me and mine but am sure my grandfather is turning in his grave over your spelling of his name, so—

"My husband was called by his family 'Gee,' but he had a beautiful name (I think), William Graham Brandon (I always called him 'Bill'; I would never have married a man named 'Gee').

"My name is correct, Marie White.


"My daughter's name is Nancy Stuart Brandon (your spelling of Stuart as Stewart) always set all our teeth on edge.

"My son is William Graham Brandon, and he is called, 'Bill'.

I am glad to make these corrections and hope others will correct me when I get the wrong spelling of names or other incorrect information.

I am leaving the Halls, at least for a while, to write about the family of George Whitfield Hurt, I quote from

Goodspeed's Tennessee History: "George Whitfield Hurt, a farmer and mechanic of Lauderdale County, was born at Paducah, Ky., March 20th, 1845, and was the sixth child of a family of eight sons and three daughters born to William W. (the W. is for Washington, Joe Hurt tells me) and Sarah E. (Camburn) Hurt, and is of Irish descent.

"His father was born in Maury County, Tenn., where he was raised and educated. He then went to Graves County, Ky., where he married and lived for a short time before moving to Paducah, Ky., where he lived until 1856; then moved to Booneville, Mo., a few years later came to Lauderdale County, where he is still living, three miles from Hall's Station.

"Our subject's mother was born in Graves County, Ky., in 1812, and is still living in Lauderdale County, Miss. "George W. Hurt was raised and educated in Paducah, Ky., and has always been a farmer and a carpenter.

"He has been married three times. The first time, in McCracken County, Ky., to Virginia Potter, a daughter of Squire James Potter, a prominent farmer. She was born in that county in 1848. One daughter, Virginia, was born to this marriage.

"Mrs. Hurt died in November, 1865, and December, 17, 1965, he married, in Lauderdale County, Miss. Cornelia E. Jordan, a daughter of Dr. Thomas Jordan, a popular physician of Williamson County, Tenn. Two sons and two daughters were born to this marriage: Mattie Y., Thomas Leonidas,

Mary Florence and William Edmonson. Mrs. Hurt, their mother, was born in Henderson County, Tenn., in 1844, and died in 1876.

"Mr. Hurt was married again December, 1878, to Miss Addie Wright, a daughter of John Wright, a prominent farmer. One son and three daughters were the result of this union; two of the latter were twins and died when four months old, within fifteen minutes of each other. These children were named Myrtle and Beulah (the twins), Floyd C. and Bernice. The wife, Floyd C. and Bernice, was born in Lauderdale County, Tenn., in 1857, and is a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church South.

"Mr. Hurt is a Missionary Baptist and a Democrat. He owns a farm of 80 acres, and is a prosperous liberal man."

Since the Goodspeed His-

ory was published in 1887, the other information I have has been given me by his descendants now living.

His youngest son, and only living child is Wymond Francis Hurt, who lives in Halls and is married to Pattie Rhea (Spence) Hurt.

Other children of George Whitfield and Addie Wright Hurt, born after 1887, were Fred Raymond, who married Jodye McDearman; Harold Wright; Paul Hamilton, who married Annie Smith and after her death married a widow, Myrtle Gooch Upton; Bernice, who married Fred Bellis; and Floyd Cambrian, who married El Reno Clayton.

Joe Hurt, son of Floyd and El Reno, tells me that she was the first white child born in El Reno, Okla.; the others were Indians. After she was born and named for the town, the city council met and gave her two lots as a birth present. She owned the lots until a few years before she died.

Joe also tells me of the house his grandfather built in and around Halls, the last one for Dr. and Mrs. W. T. Nunn on West Tigratt Street, now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Alley.

Among other houses were the big 2-story house built for Mr. and Mrs. Hardy Wyse on the corner of College and Shannon Street; this house burned.

The house next door was built for Ivan and Bertha (Warren) Wyse. It is now owned by Joe McCarthy and has been made into apartment.

Others were the Strayhorn house on College Street now owned by Mrs. Annie Nall and the Baldwin Lucas home, southeast of Halls.

Wymond tells me that his father built the first frame house on East Tigratt Street and was the first mayor of Halls, serving two terms. He was also the policeman and would put the drunks in the old frame jail on Front Street when they would come to town on Saturday and were often too drunk to get home before a sobering up period in the jail.

After George Whitfield Hurt's third wife died, he married a widow, Ella Hart, they did not have any children.

Mr. Hurt has many descendents living in and around Halls, but the latest one is Melissa Anne Hurt, daughter of Tonya and David Harold Hurt III, his great, great, great granddaughter, who is

only a few weeks old. I hope to get information on the other descendants of this early settler and our first Mayor and policeman, as well as a talented carpenter, teaching his trade to some of his children and many of the houses here were built by Mr. Hurt, his son Floyd (my house was built by him for Dr. and Mrs. Josh Nunn and Floyd's son Joe Hurt, who lives west of Halls.



COMBINE SAFETY AT HARVEST TIME

Plugging of the feeder, cylinder, or separator is bound to increase combine operator stress. It also subjects him to the hazards of unplugging the machine. Cylinder plugging usually occurs because a crop is weedy or due to overloading. James B. Wills, University of Tennessee Extension safety specialist, says you can sense the load on the cylinder by checking the tachometer during operation. Since the threshing cylinder is a primary user of power, load on the engine is a good indicator of cylinder load. Slow down the combine ground speed and avoid taking in slugs of crop or weeds. This will reduce chances of plugging. Remember that the likelihood of plugging increases as cylinder speed decreases. After you've unplugged the cylinder a few times, you should be able to tell when it's about to be overloaded.

Running the combine separator slower than recommended in the operator's manual will result in less effective harvesting and, ultimately, plugging of the separator and conveying mechanisms. Adjust and equip your combine properly for the particular crop being harvested to reduce plugging problems.

If the cylinder or some other part of the combine does plug, stop the mechanism as quickly as possible and shut off the engine. To unplug the machine: *Make sure the separator drive is not in gear. *Take off the inspection plates to permit easier location of the plugged material. *Remove the plugged material, using tools or hands protected by heavy gloves. *Move your hands and fingers away from the mechanism before anyone attempts to turn the drives. *Turn the main drive shaft or



Diseases Hurt County Wheat

By Charles T. Peal
Cool, damp weather in late March and early April aided infection of county wheat—especially Arthur and Coker 747—by a fungus which causes a disease called GLUME BLOTCH, most consistently damaging, shows reddish spots on lower leaves, progresses upward to turn glumes brown, and reduces seed size, lowering yield.

LEAF RUST shows small reddish-brown pustules on lower leaves that progress to the flag leaf. Yield may be cut.

POWDERY MILDEW, grayish-black, grows on lower stems and may or may not be significant as a yield.

Diseases are promoted by high yield potentials, thick stands, high amounts of nitrogen fertilizer, and not rotating land used for wheat.

Spraying deserves a wait-and-see attitude.

Ground equipment will damage fields, and planes will not have clearance for some materials, such as Benlate, effectively used in Arkansas, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Alabama but not yet cleared in Tennessee.

Available is Mancozeb 80% wettable powder. Apply when heads are in the late boot stage and again when heads have fully emerged, usually 10 to 14 days later, with good coverage of heads and the upper leaves, especially the flag leaf.

Planes use two pounds per acre in five gallons of water, ground rigs increase water to 20 gallons.

Duck Stamp Fee Up To Congress

A \$70 duck stamp—required to continue (on basis of present stamp sales) 50 years of federal purchase of wetlands under the 1961 Wetlands Loan Act expires in 1983, says Walt McAllister, director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Price was raised from \$5 to \$7.50 in 1979.

Congress must extend the act, provide other funds, or up stamp prices to continue acquiring wetlands.

It's doubtful that stamp sales at any price can alone support the program.

The largest amount ever spent on a beef advertising campaign comes from the Beef Industry Council of the National Livestock and Meat Board.





Vitamins and esophageal cancer

The major risk factor for esophageal cancer for western developed countries is the use of alcohol and tobacco together. Scientists think tobacco smoke provides cancer-causing substances and alcohol makes tissues of the mouth and throat more vulnerable to these carcinogens.

There may be several pathways to this effect. Alcohol is a solvent and could make tissues more easily penetrated by carcinogens. By adding calories to the diet, alcohol can replace other foods to create vitamin and mineral deficiencies. Alcohol use can also decrease absorption and increase elimination of such nutrients. Some of these, particularly vitamin A, are important in strengthening and rebuilding epithelial tissue—the kind that lines body cavities such as mouth and lung. Deficiency of vitamin A may make cells more vulnerable to cancer. Studies of vitamin A consumption and lung cancer are of interest in this regard, showing that daily intake of foods containing this vitamin

greatly decreases risk even for heavy smokers. The same thing may hold true for cancer of the esophagus. A recent study at Roswell Park Memorial hospital in Buffalo compared dietary, alcohol, and smoking habits of patients with cancer of the esophagus to those of other patients. Strongest associations for this cancer were with smoking and alcohol intake. But low consumption of vegetables and fruits increased risk considerably at every level of tobacco and alcohol use. Investigators noted that their findings were similar to those of other studies showing lower risk of lung, colon, bladder, and oral cancers with higher vegetable consumption.

Animal research supports the idea of vitamins as protective against oral cancer. So do studies from abroad, including countries where diets are more vitamin deficient than in western cultures. Plummer-Vinson disease, a degenerative disorder of the esophagus that is closely associated with cancer of that site, was once prevalent among Swedish women, many of whom had no exposure to cigarettes or other identified carcinogens. These women were found to be deficient in iron and vitamin B. A national supplementation program markedly reduced rates of both diseases.

In Iran, esophageal cancer was associated with low intakes of fruit and raw vegetables; in Puerto Rico, with poor nutrition generally, heavy consumption of alcohol and tobacco, and deficiencies of vitamin A and riboflavin, a B vitamin. Much evidence suggests that dietary deficiencies interact with toxins and contaminants to produce cancer of the esophagus. This was a clue to the problem of why one out of four persons died of esophageal cancer in a province in China. Soil of the region was deficient in molybdenum, causing plants to concentrate nitrate, a carcinogen, in their leaves and to make less vitamin C. Vitamin C inhibits the action of nitrates in forming cancer-causing nitrosamines. Drinking water also had excess nitrate, and cooking methods concentrated them in foods. Moldy bread and vegetables in the diet may have contained toxins. Remedies included adding molybdenum to crop seeds and urging people to drink purified water, eat fresh vegetables and avoid moldy foods. Scientists hope that these measures will someday solve the problem of esophageal cancer in this part of the world.





Attack On Police Chief Is Refuted

Editor:
Due to several potentially misleading articles which have appeared in "The Voice" newspaper in recent weeks, we, the undersigned, feel it necessary to write this letter and give what we consider to be an accurate rendering of the facts.
"The Voice" has accused Police Chief Buddy Moore of withholding public information from their reporter. As the following facts will show, we feel Chief Moore acted in an able and professional manner.
The reporter from "The Voice" called Chief Moore requesting the names of the suspects of a recent burglary in Halls. At the time of this call, formal charges had not yet been filed by the investigating officers, so Chief Moore could not, by law, divulge the names of the suspects. We asked the City Attorney, Thomas Caldwell, for his opinion, and he stated quite clearly that Chief Moore was absolutely correct for not releasing the names until formal charges were filed. Had he done so he would have broken both ethical and legal codes.
Once formal charges are filed, they become a matter of public record, on file at the county courthouse in Ripley, the City Hall in Halls, or both; thus, any resident, including a member of the press, can retrieve this information if he or she simply visits the proper location and requests the pertinent records. Since this information is on file at these public buildings, it seems impossible for Chief Moore, or anyone else, to withhold such information from the press.
"The Voice" has also accused Chief Moore of unprofessional behavior by not filing charges against a former police officer, suspected of burglarizing a Halls business. Again, we will let the facts speak for themselves:
1) A former police officer was a suspect in the alleged break-in.
2) It was decided by Chief Moore not to file charges against him, due to lack of evidence. This decision was made only after consulting with and receiving the approval of Mayor Cheshire.
3) The victim of the alleged burglary refused to press charges.
4) The former District Attorney, Mike Whittaker, was aware of the case and even sent a T.B.I. agent to investigate. We can only assume they approved of the handling of this case, since the Town of Halls has never received a report showing otherwise.
5) The officer in question was not fired, as reported by "The Voice"; he voluntarily resigned.
Since these facts can be verified with a little research, and they occurred over five months ago, we do not understand why "The Voice" has decided to report it now as some kind of great mystery. All necessary parties from the county and city, including the D.A., Mayor, and victim, were aware of Chief Moore's handling of this case. Since all of them were satisfied, we see no reason not to be.
We certainly acknowledge the press's right to free access to public information, but with this right goes the responsibility to completely and accurately report the facts. We respectfully implore "The Voice" newspaper to ensure they comply with the same high professional standards they expect of the Halls police department.
In conclusion, after conducting an investigation into these specific accusations, we feel Chief Moore and the entire Halls police department has acted professionally, and the residents of Halls should be proud of their services.



Halls History

By Lucinda Alsbrook Coulter
When I was a student in Mrs. Alvin Hallman's American history class in Halls High School in 1955, we were required to do a senior research paper on some aspect of American history. I decided to research my family history and began by interviewing my parents, grandparents, and anyone else I could find who might know some of my family's story.

From a relative, C. C. Sumrow, I copied the short biographical sketches about my great-grandfather, James Cary Alsbrook, and his brother, Simmons D. Alsbrook, from the 1887 Goodspeed History of Tennessee.

In the sketches was my first introduction to my great-grandfather, Micajah Alsbrook. I learned that Micajah was born in 1794

in Edgecombe County, North Carolina, that he served in the War of 1812, that he married Chloe Simmons, that he had moved in 1836 to Gibson County, Tennessee, where he lived in Trenton for four years, and then to a farm 12 miles from Trenton where he stayed for several years, to Hardeman County, and finally in 1848 to Lauderdale County, where he bought more than 1000 acres of land from J. Henry Sumrow. Some of that land still belongs to my father.

One son, James Cary Alsbrook, married Mary Sumrow, daughter of Henry. Another son, Simmons D. Alsbrook, served as deputy sheriff for two years before being elected sheriff of Lauderdale County. Then, as Goodspeed says, "on the first day in November, after the election, he was shot at Double Bridges and killed while in the discharge of his official duties." Before the next day was over, "the murderer was hung and riddled with bullets." Justice moved much faster in those days.

In the 27 years since I finished that paper for Mrs. Hallman, I have been haunted with questions about Micajah Alsbrook. Where did he get the money to buy the land in Lauderdale County? Why did he leave Edgecombe County, in the northeast part of the state of North Carolina, to come more than 700 miles at age 42 to an unsettled wilderness with a wife, two sons, and three daughters, and then moved three more times before settling finally in 1848 at age 54 near Double Bridges?

For those who have not been bitten by the anecdoting bug, a 25-year search for just one node of a root may seem rather ridiculous, but the process is more fun than the result.

I was delighted by the discovery one day in a library in Orlando, Fla., of a postscript on a letter dated January 1821, from a lawyer in Living-

MICROWAVE MAGIC 'Taking it off' for summer

Summer fast approaches. More sun and less clothing may cause you to become more aware of your figure after winter's bulky sweaters are shed.

Caloric restrictions and a health-conscious attitude about what you ingest are wise counsel for any season. And hearty cold-weather feasting may have left you feeling conspicuous on the beach so now is a good time to stick to a diet plan that makes you look good in that new string bikini, or those swim trunks with the racing stripe down the side.

There are many advantages to preparing your diet meals in a microwave. A minimum of oil or butter is needed, if any, to prevent sticking. Sauces can be eliminated or kept to a minimum. The cooking process itself causes foods to steam in their own natural juices, retaining vitamins and flavor.

With the aid of your microwave oven, dieting can be a creative culinary adventure, and the good results will be obvious when you don summer's figure-revealing clothing.

LEMON YOGURT SOUP
2 egg yolks
Juice of 1/2 lemon
1 tsp. cold water
1/2 cup chicken broth
Salt, white pepper
1 cup plain yogurt

Cook chicken broth in a 2-cup glass measuring cup 2 minutes, until boiling. Blend 2 tbsps. of hot chicken broth into egg mixture, seasonings to taste, add yogurt. Serve well chilled. Makes 2 servings.

ZUCCHINI BOATS
4 small zucchini
2 cups crumbled herb-seasoned stuffing mix
1 tsp. butter
1/4 tsp. salt
1 slightly beaten egg
2 tbsps. grated Parmesan cheese

Cut zucchini in half lengthwise. Scoop out center, using spoon, leaving 1/4-inch shell. Chop scooped out pulp and place in glass mixing bowl. Add stuffing mix, butter and salt. Mix lightly. Cook, covered, in microwave oven for 6 minutes until stuffing mix is moistened. Stir in egg. Spoon into zucchini shells. Place on large serving platter. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Cover with waxed paper. Cook in microwave oven 8 minutes, until zucchini is tender.

Tip: A grapefruit spoon is handy for scooping out zucchini.

Each of the 8 halves contains about 64 calories.

COLORFUL FILLETS
1 lb. haddock fillets, cut into serving pieces
3 sliced green onions
1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
1 cup chopped tomato
1/2 tsp. salt
Dash pepper
1/2 tsp. basil leaf

Arrange fillets in 8x8x2-inch glass baking dish. Top with vegetables. Sprinkle with seasonings. Cover with plastic wrap. Pierce. Cook 4 1/2 minutes, until fish flakes easily with fork. There are only 118 calories in each serving of this fish recipe that serves 4.



A Report for Tennesseans

REBUILDING TVA'S IMAGE
During my time in the Senate I have been both a friend and a critic of the Tennessee Valley Authority. I have always considered my friendship to be genuine and my criticism to be constructive.

With the series of public hearings that I'll be holding around the state, I hope to extend that friendship to the ratepayers and consumers of the Tennessee Valley by giving them a voice, by letting them have the opportunity to state their concerns and give their advice on the operations and management decisions of TVA.

There's no question that TVA needs serious examination. There's no question that its operations can be improved substantially. Not long ago I said that a crisis of confidence was hanging like a dark cloud over TVA because of public doubts, a cloud that stretches from the Tennessee Valley to Washington.

It is my feeling that TVA alone cannot rebuild the confidence of ratepayers, although the TVA Board of Directors' decision to hold a similar series of public meetings will indeed go a long way in that regard. But it will take a substantial effort by all of us, and I hope my hearings will serve as a first step toward developing a consensus for improving TVA's operations and relations with the people it serves.

Heretofore I have opposed the idea of amending the original TVA Act. Now, however, there are a number of amendments already pending in both the House of Representatives and the Senate, and a number of public officials and groups have likewise expressed an interest in restructuring the agency.

I intend to keep an open mind on the matter, but -- if the hearing should demonstrate that there is no other way to improve TVA's operations -- I would reluctantly support restructuring the agency. I would not do so, however, if I could not be assured that amendments harmful to TVA could be avoided.

It may be that restructuring the agency can be avoided altogether. Already the TVA Board has indicated a willingness to open its doors to closer scrutiny, to form a better partnership with the people and businesses it serves. They are to be commended for that.

But recognizing the need for openness and fulfilling it are two different things, and these hearings could go a long way towards accomplishing these goals through open, constructive debate.

This year it will be the Netherlands, marking 200 year of continuous diplomatic relations between that country and the United States. The Netherlands will also be participating in 1982 World's Fair across the state in Knoxville.

Among the many events which will bring a touch of the Netherlands to the Mid-South will be a Dutch Flower Festival, performances by a Dutch Folkloric troupe, a Dutch film festival, a Netherlands/American business conference, and several Dutch art and photography exhibitions, including the "Rembrandt Etchings in Southern Museums" exhibition.

Perhaps the premier drawing card of the entire festival will be a major exhibition of the works of one of the world's most celebrated artists, Vincent van Gogh. The exhibition will include paintings, water colors, drawings and prints of the famed Dutch artist. It will be held at the Dixon Gallery and Gardens (4339 Park Avenue), open 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. every day except Monday. Admission is only \$1 for adults, 50¢ for children and senior citizens. Lectures, films and informal gallery talks will be scheduled as part of the exhibition.

Other highlights of the festival, which are all free to the public, include:

International Festival Week-end: May 1 & 2

The festival officially opens with "Netherlands Day," May 1. A "Dutch Market" atmosphere will be created with Dutch artisans and craftsmen, and plenty of Dutch foods and other goods. The Dutch folkloric troupe will perform, including a 27-piece "klomping" (wooden shoe) group.

Scheduled for 7:30 Saturday evening is the "Bicentennial Tattoo," a gigantic musical salute featuring the 90-piece Marine Band of the Royal Netherlands Navy, the U.S. Marine Drum & Bugle Corps, and the Memphis Blues Brass Band. Some 150,000 people are expected to line the riverfront at Tom Lee Park for the Tattoo production.

Sunday is "International Day," with cuisine, costumes and performances representing many nations, including those honored in festivals past.

Fine Arts Festival: May 7-12
Visual arts include art bazaars, the annual Memphis in May Arts Competition and many Dutch exhibitions such as the works of Karel Apple,

the foremost living Dutch artist.

Performing arts will feature opera, drama, chamber and choral music. The Metropolitan Opera will have three performances at Dixon-Myers Hall.

International Barbeque Cooking Contest and Fiddlers Convention: May 15 & 16

The riotous cook-off, which usually transforms into an overnight party, attracts contestants from across the nation. Such show-stopping events as the Hog Calling contest and the Ms. Piggie contest fill the hours.

Fiddlers, banjo players and other bluegrass musicians will converge on the famed Orpheum Theater for competitions on Sunday.

The Great Wine Race: May 16

This unique relay race is run by waiters from restaurants from around the world. Colorful costumes, creative showmanship and zesty on-lookers are all part of this unusual festival event.

The Beale Street Music Festival: May 22 & 23

This highly acclaimed event brings an international roster of musicians to Beale Street, the "Birthplace of the Blues." There will be continuous music on three separate stages, featuring blues, jazz, rhythm & blues, rock and roll, and gospel. This outpouring of music, such an integral part

of the Memphis heritage, is a rare treat.

The Sunset Symphony: May 29

A performance by the Memphis Symphony Orchestra, enhanced by a radiant sunset over the mighty Mississippi, attracts crowds of 200,000 for this splendid event. James Hyter, bass-baritone, will again perform his rendition of "Ole Man River," always a tremendous crowd pleaser. The performance traditionally concludes with Tchaikovsky's "1812 Overture," complete with live cannon blasts and a spectacular fireworks display. It all provides a very special Grand Finale for the month-long festival.


