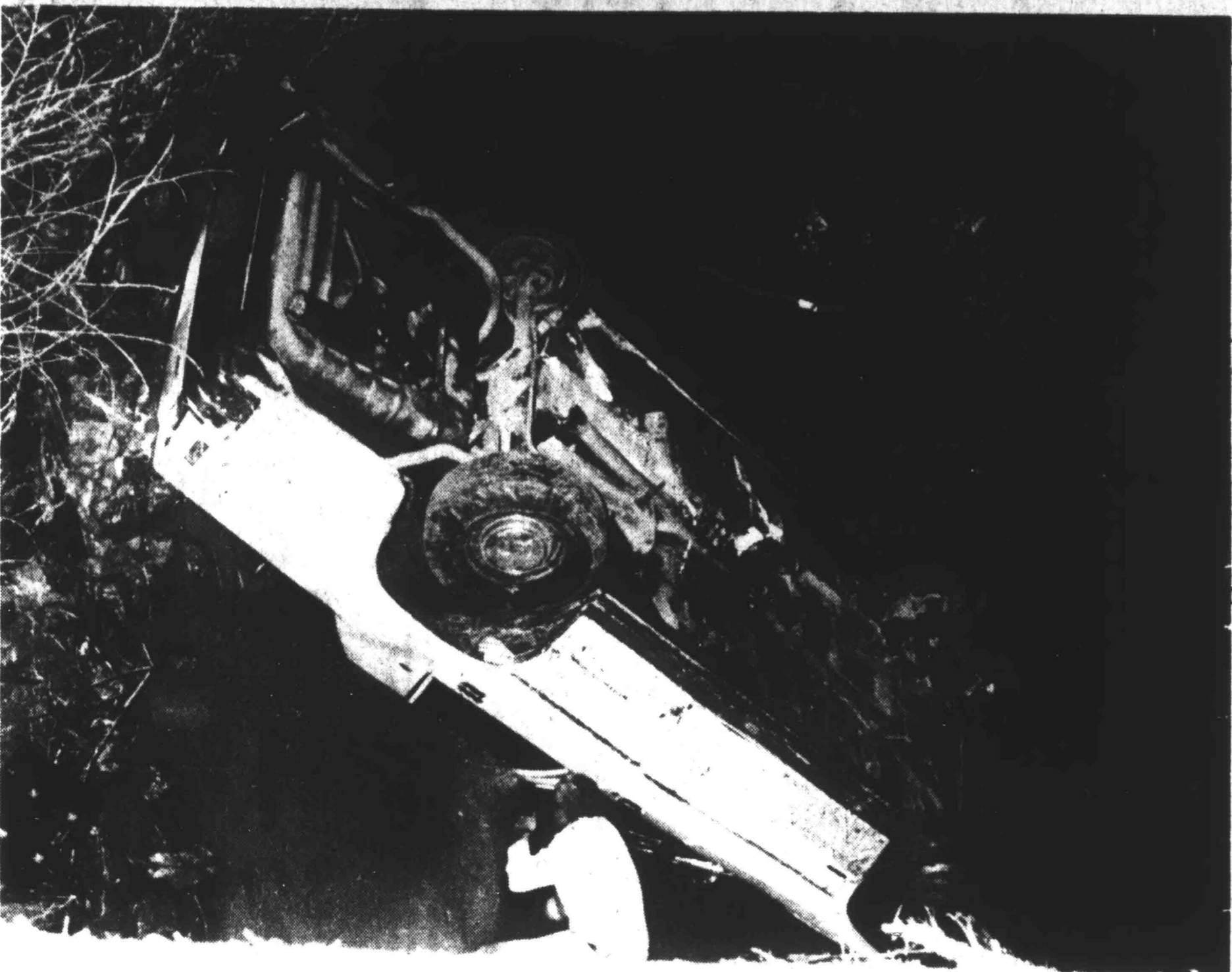

We are thoroughly disgusted with ourselves. Several days ago we were driving along a 4-lane highway when we noticed an unusually large turtle waiting to cross the highway. The turtle had placed his forefeet on the highway and had his head and neck stretched out to consider chances of crossing safely. We are disgusted because we didn't have our camera in the car. It certainly would have made an unusual picture.

We enjoyed some college football games on television during the weekend but didn't enjoy the small segment of professional football we watched. ## Senator Heard



STATE SEN. LEONARD DUNAVANT, of Millington, was guest speaker Monday at Halls-Gates Rotary Club. ## Rain And Wind Cut Deer Kills

Despite rainy, windy weather for the second consecutive year, the first two days of the regular bucks-only deer season, Nov. 20-21, saw 15 kills reported in this county, compared to 24 last year and 12 in

each of the two preceding years.

The trend was the same all across West Tennessee, with preliminary figures of 3,425 this year, compared to 3,581 last year, 2,585 in 1980, and 2,906 in 1979.

The first half of the split gun season in Unit A closes at sunset Dec. 5th; the second half runs Dec. 20-Jan. 2.

**Turkey Season Slated**  
Lauderdale County will be open to turkey hunting March 26-May 1, 1983.

State-wide bag limit is one male per day, two per season; shooting hours, 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset.

Illegal will be electronic calls; shooting or stalking from a boat; agricultural grain on hunter's person.

## Record Yule Parade Set Friday In Halls

The largest Christmas parade in the 7-year history of the event is expected at 7 p.m. Friday in Halls. Rain date is Monday night.

## A Report for Tennesseans

**RECOGNIZING VIETNAM VETS' NEEDS**

Veterans Day 1982 has come and gone, and perhaps the most moving part of the event this year was the dedication of the national memorial honoring America's veterans of the war in Vietnam.

There is no question but that this formal recognition was long overdue. The Vietnam veterans have long been the forgotten ones, and the memorial is a fitting tribute. Yet much remains to be done in terms of recognizing the special needs of these veterans.

Sadly, though, there is a great deal of question about the Veterans Administration's willingness to address these needs.

In particular, the VA has dragged its feet in preparing a study on the effects of Agent Orange, a chemical defoliant used in Vietnam between 1962 and 1971, on those veterans exposed to it and to their offspring. Initial studies show Agent Orange to be toxic, with possible deleterious, long-term side-effects.

In 1979, the Congress ordered the VA to investigate whether the use of Agent Orange harmed American GIs and entitled them to compensation. And earlier this year, the Congress ordered the VA to give priority treatment to vets with disorders suspected of being caused by the chemical.

But in October of this year, the General Accounting Office issued a report concluding that veterans are generally dissatisfied with the VA's handling of the Agent Orange study. Further, the GAO concluded that these complaints were valid. Also, the Office of Technology Assessment reported that the VA was delaying the study unnecessarily and was undermining efforts by the Army to get the study underway.

The Agent Orange study is now in the hands of the Centers for Disease Control, and I am confident that it will be handled promptly and competently.

The situation surrounding the Agent Orange study in recent years is not unique, unfortunately. There have been repeated attempts by the current Administration to cut to the bone those health care services and functions that will be needed more and more as our veteran population expands.

Willie Claybrook, 33, of Halls, is charged with first degree murder of Leona "Ginsey" (Mrs. Frank) Fitzpatrick, 65, of Henning, whose body, with severe head injuries, was found Wednesday of last week by rabbit hunters in partly flooded woods near Bruceville, east of Dyersburg just north of the Lauderdale County line.

Dyer County Sheriff Tommy Cribbs said that though Claybrook denied ever having seen the woman, her family identified an embroidered handkerchief found under his truck as that of the woman missing

since 9:30 a.m. Nov. 9th, when she was seen getting into a red pick-up truck, according to Lauderdale County Sheriff Milford "Pop" Durham.

The day after Mrs. Fitzpatrick disappeared, a billfold containing her identification was found near Fowlkes, on the southbound lane of new Highway 51, devoid of money. Sunday before last, a purse containing her identification—again, no money, but a loaded .22 revolver—was found on Highway 20, near Unionville, by Mrs. Sue Richardson, of Dyer County.

Services for Mrs. Fitzpatrick were at 1 p.m. Saturday in New Hope C.M.E. Church at Henning, with burial in Canfield Cemetery in Ripley. She leaves a brother, Floyd Maak, of Henning.

She was a senior in Halls High School. She leaves her mother, Mrs. Inez Johnson; a twin sister, Brenda; and four other sisters.

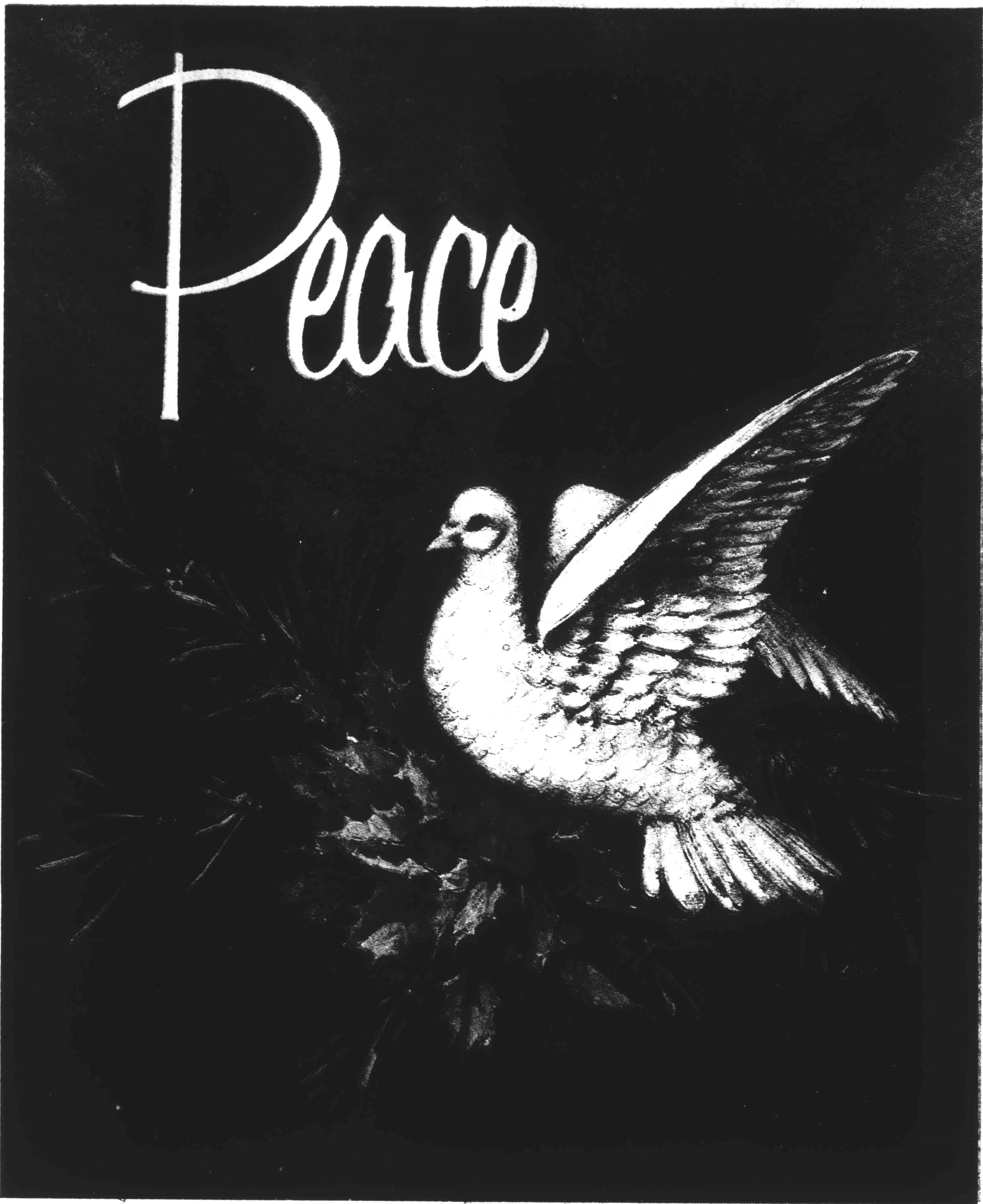

3 tablespoons butter  
1/2 cup buttermilk  
1 to 4 tablespoons milk

1/2 cup sugar  
1 cup buttermilk  
1/2 cup flour  
2 teaspoons grated lemon peel  
2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
2 teaspoons sugar  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
Lemon slices, if desired

Preheat oven to 375° F. For filling, beat eggs and 1/2 cup sugar in small mixing bowl on high speed of mixer until thick and lemon colored, about 5 minutes. Stir in buttermilk, flour, lemon peel, juice and vanilla. Pour into cool crust. Combine 2 teaspoons sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Sprinkle over top of pie filling. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Cool completely on wire rack. Garnish with lemon leaves and a lemon slice.

### Christmas Eve Supper Spells Hospitality

If Christmas day is for family, then Christmas Eve should be a social one with friends and neighbors. Although this is a busy time, it's easier than you think to have this supper. Center this meal around a delightful, creamy chowder made in advance, then serve with quickly prepared cheese toast.

To climax this special occasion, plan a Cranberry Eggnog Soufflé. This too, can be readied the day before.

The entire meal can be served buffet style using a festive-looking tureen out of which guests ladle the chowder. Cheese toast can be ringed around the tureen and will keep warm that way. Seafood buffs will enjoy this chowder with three shellfish: shrimp, oysters and crab meat. Because the seafood cooks quickly, this soup takes little preparation time. Start by melting the butter, then sauté chopped vegetables for seasoning and color. This takes about 10 minutes. Remove the pan from heat, add remaining ingredients with cream to make the thickened sauce. Stir in shellfish and heat through. It's delicious served with toasted, buttered Italian bread on which you sprinkle shredded Gouda cheese and cooked, crumbled bacon.

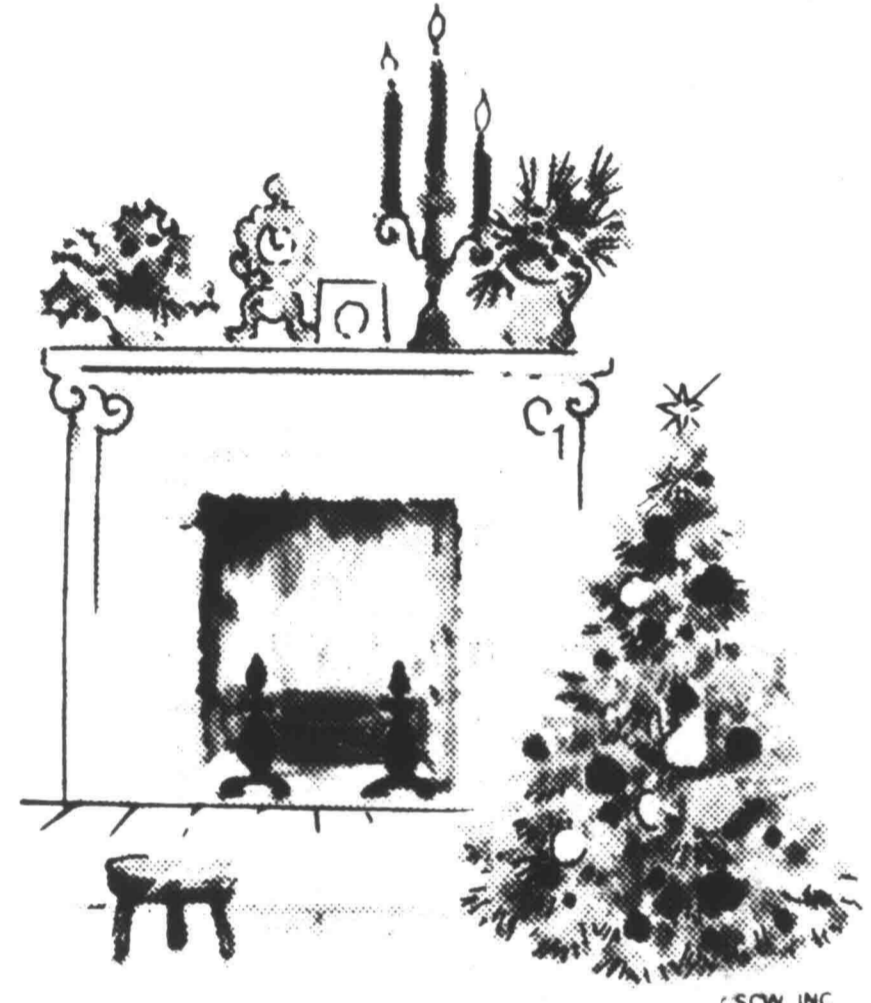

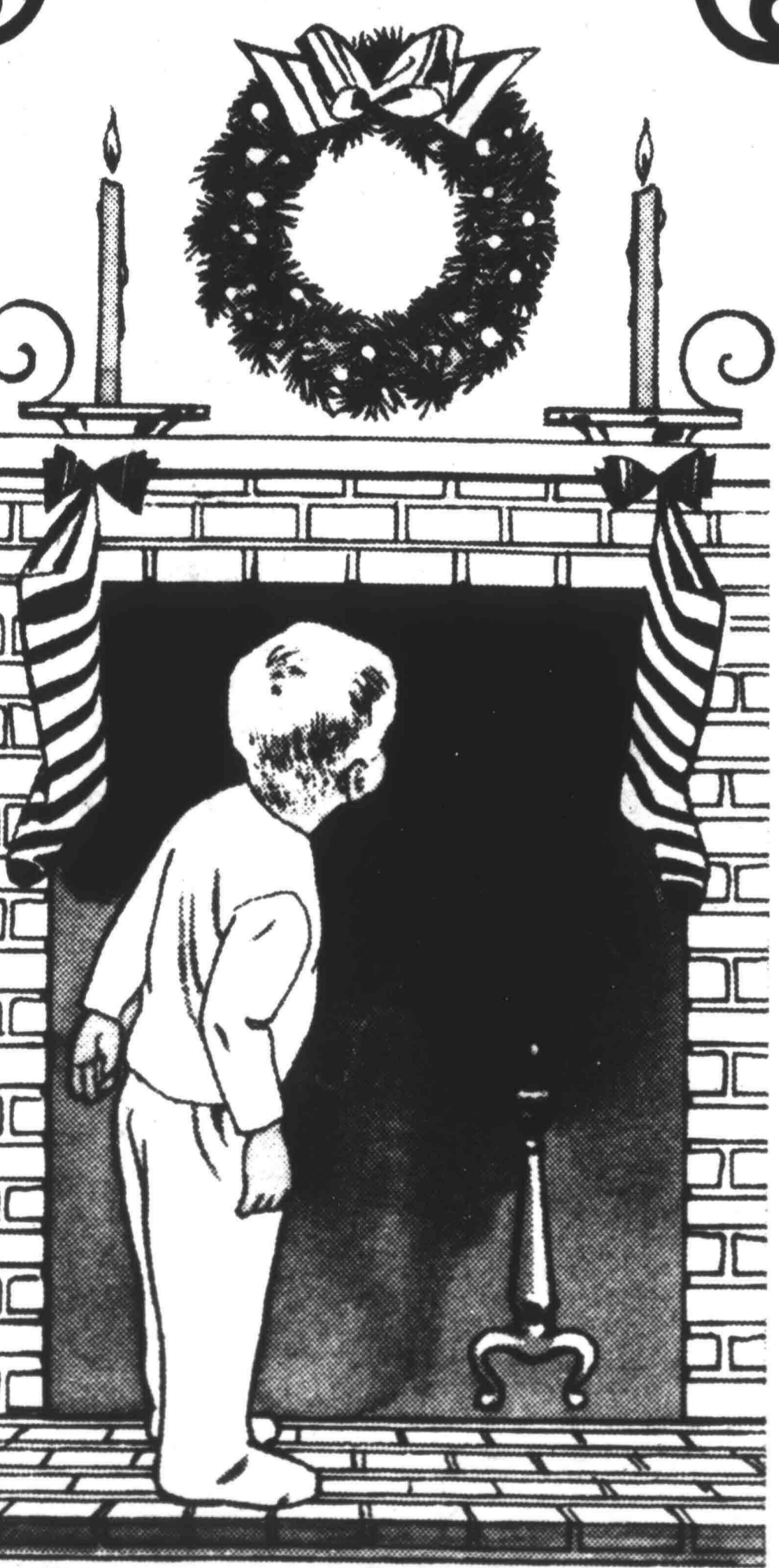

 1 1/2 cups (3 sticks) butter  
 1 1/4 cups firmly packed brown sugar  
 4 eggs  
 2 teaspoons vanilla extract  
 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
 2 cups grated carrots (3 to 4 carrots)  
 1 can (8 oz.) crushed pineapple, well drained

**cup seedless raisins**

**Cream Cheese Glaze**  
 1 package (3 oz.) cream cheese, softened  
 2 1/2 cups sifted confectioners sugar  
 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract  
 3 to 4 tablespoons milk

Preheat oven to 350° F. Cream butter, gradually add sugar and beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in vanilla. Combine flour, baking powder, salt and spices. Gradually add to creamed mixture, blend well. Stir in carrots, pineapple, raisins and nuts. Spoon batter into well-buttered and floured 12-cup bundt cake pan. Bake 60 to 65 minutes, or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Let cool in pan 15 minutes, remove from pan and cool completely on wire rack. For glaze, beat cream cheese in small mixing bowl until fluffy. Beat in sugar until light and fluffy. Stir in vanilla. Add enough milk to make a slightly thick glaze. Drizzle over top of cake.

### Handel's "Messiah"

Each Christmas, music-lovers throughout the country are once again enraptured by the most popular choral work of all time, Handel's "Messiah."

Since its first performance in Dublin in 1742, this beloved oratorio has been per-

formed countless times in concert halls as well as churches.

Although it was originally intended as an Easter work, "Messiah" has become synonymous with the Christmas season for English-speaking peoples. However, the entire oratorio is not usually performed at Christmastime, but is limited to those sections relating to the Nativity.

The reason for the

popularity of this magnificent work is not difficult to determine. Based on texts from the Scriptures, the music for "Messiah" is both melodic and moving. Tradition has it that when the oratorio was performed in London before King George, he was so inspired by the "Hallelujah" chorus that he spontaneously rose. Since subjects do not remain seated while the

monarch stands, the rest of the audience promptly rose as well. Since then, audiences traditionally rise to the their feet at the beginning of this magnificent chorus.

Handel, it is said, claimed to have received divine inspiration in the writing of his greatest masterpiece. Certainly, he wrote "Messiah" in record time — he started the work on

August 22, 1742 and completed it on September 11, approximately two weeks later. Scholars, in studying the original manuscript note that Handel wrote so furiously, he sometimes neglected to put stems on the notes and scratched or


blotted out changes instead of erasing. The manuscript reveals a composer working at a fever pitch and would seem to support Handel's claim.

Whether presented on a grandiose scale or with smaller ensembles, all will agree that lis-

tening to Handel's "Messiah" is both a spiritual and a musical experience.

The clipping tells of the finding of a balloon, released by Halls High School band members, in a field near a school formerly known as Halls High School, now called Halls-Pine Grove School.

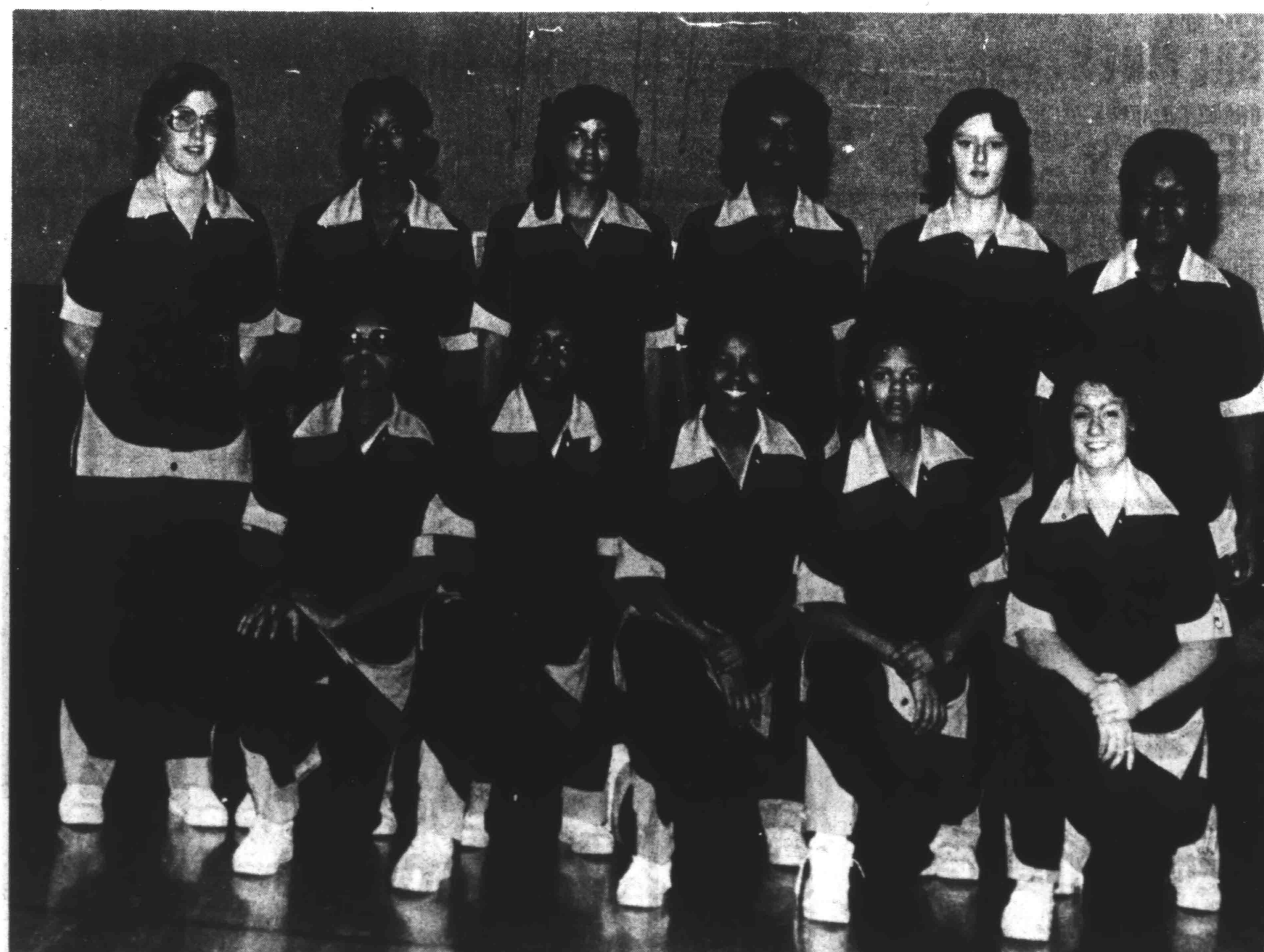

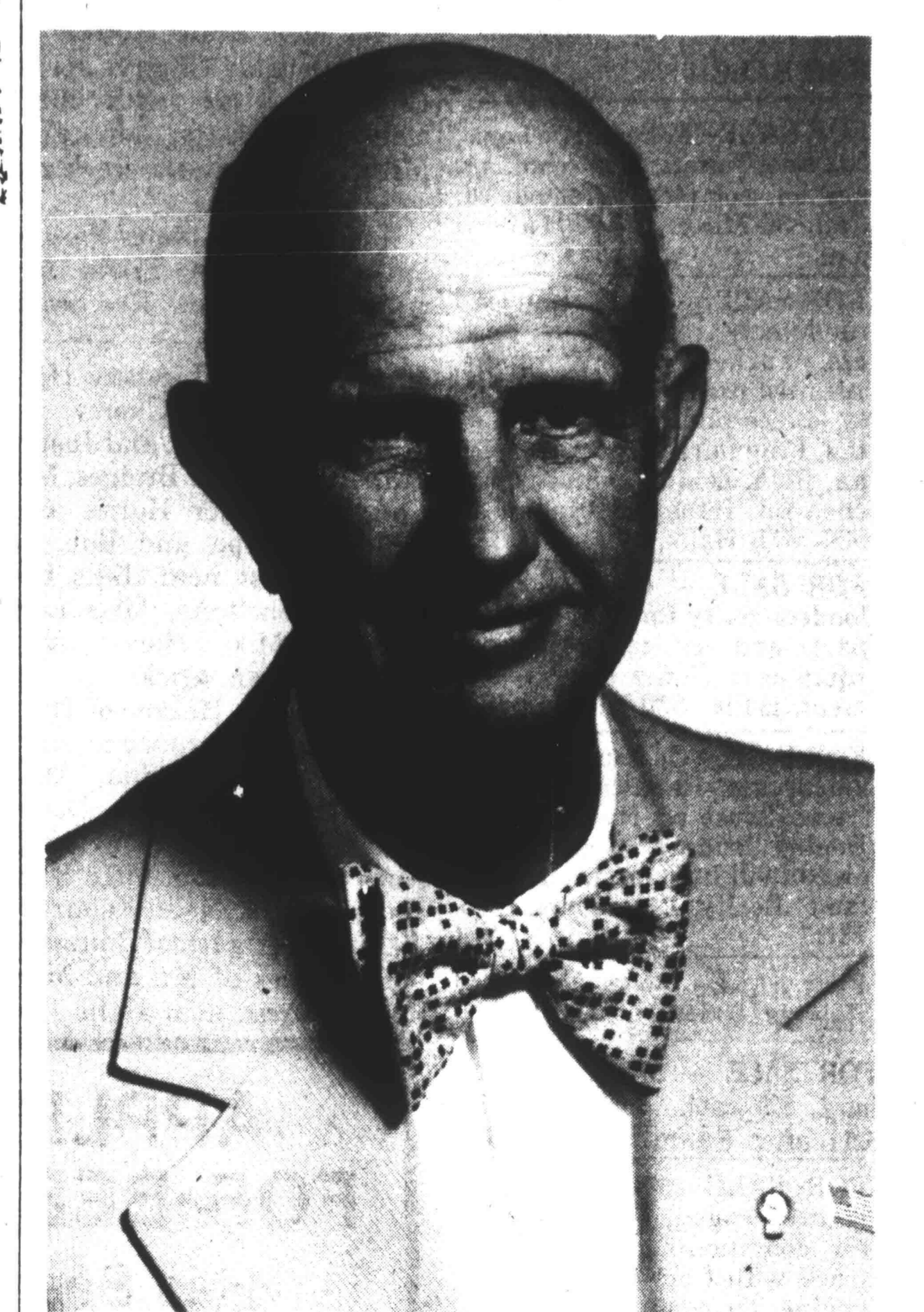

Judge C. S. Carney was born in Ripley, in a log house next door to the Methodist Church, on Dec. 12, 1909. He attended elementary school and was graduated from high school in Ripley.

He took a bachelor of arts degree in 1931 and a law degree in 1933 from Vanderbilt University in Nashville. He was high in his law class.

While attending law school, he studied law during the summers in the office of E. C. Bullock in Ripley. After his graduation, he joined the firm of Craig, Durham, and Carney in Ripley. He opened his own law office in January, 1940.

In February 1943, he entered the Air Force. He was discharged as a sergeant in December, 1944, after his election to the state legislature. He served two terms in the legislature, from 1945 to 1949.

"He was one of the founders of the Bank of Ripley where he has served as president and is now chairman of the board of directors.

"He has always been very civic-minded and has been a driving force behind many projects for the betterment of Ripley. He was instrumental in establishing Sugar Hill Lauderdale County Library and has served as a trustee for many years. He was instrumental in the establishment of the Lauderdale County Hospital. He spear-headed the drive to build the public swimming pool for Ripley and was chairman of the fund-raising drive to build Tiny Knee Stadium. He gave unstintingly of his time and money for any project which was good for the City of Ripley.

"He is a great supporter of Lambuth College and has served as a trustee since 1966.

"He served in the Constitutional Convention, of 1953 and 1977. He became a Judge on the Tennessee Court of Appeals in 1953 and was Presiding Judge of the Court of Appeals from 1970 to 1977, when he retired.

"He was instrumental in getting the Legislature to provide funds for the new Supreme Court Building in Jackson, completed just before his retirement in 1977.

"He re-entered private practice in 1977 in partnership with Robert C. Wilder.

"There is no place on earth the Judge would rather be than on the square in Ripley, Tennessee. In fact, he could never understand why anyone would want to take a vacation and leave Ripley.

"He says he still remembers when he left Ripley for a week while in high school, and someone got his place on the basketball team."
