World's Fair Band Theme Found Apt

Halls High School's Golden Tiger Marching Band paraded through the World's Fair in Knoxville late Friday afternoon during intermittent sprinkling of rain. Its playing of *Rise Again* was applauded by thousands of fair-goers who lined walkways and bridges to see the two scheduled bands of the day. The Oviedo Fla., High School Band also performed.

Halls Band Boosters attending with the band, along with parents who arrived the day of the parade, agreed that *Rise Again* was appropriate, after several unfortunate occurrences had somewhat dampened spirits.

On arrival at Tenn. Military Institute in Sweetwater the previous day, the run-down condition of the dormitories was so disturbing to all concerned that plans were started to move the band.

Before three other motels could be secured, however, two serious thunderstorms caused additional damage to the dormitories, soaking some rooms so badly that some occupants had to be moved to other rooms. One student's travelers' checks were found floating around in her room.

About half-way to the Fair, one of the buses chartered from a Memphis firm stopped

in the middle of the inter-state. The driver managed to pull to the side; another passing bus spotted the stranded bus, made the loop, and returned to push the bus until it could run on its own power.

Minutes later, two of the buses stalled on steep Knoxville streets. One was rocked back and forth at the bottom of a hill by 20 male chaperones and sympathetic passers-by, who managed to free the bus as the back clung to the asphalt. As the clock ticked away, the possibility of missing the parade began to loom.

After the parade, the group returned to three new motel

sites and enjoyed an evening of swimming.

A record-breaking Memorial weekend crowd swarmed Saturday as the band attended the fair as sight-

seers. Long lines prevented many from seeing all they had come to view, but the beautiful weather which had suddenly returned added to the enjoyment of the day.

En route home Sunday morning, numerous bus break-downs began, including one only 20 miles from Knoxville. All during the trip homeward, the frustration of failing air-conditioners, in addition to the constant worry over which bus would break down next, began to show on the faces of all.

The climax of breakdowns occurred 15 miles east of Jackson, when one of the buses lost its fuel on the highway, resulting in the bus having to be unloaded on the side of the road into the other two buses, as well as into cars and vans.

The group arrived home around 7:45 p.m., about 2½ hours later than expected, confident that each will someday chuckle at the experiences of the long-anticipated trip—with some contemplating writing a book about it.

Chaperones complimented the behavior and attitudes of those band students who waited patiently for plans to be changed, schedules to be readjusted, and repairs to be made.

Unusual Weekend

Back to the band. Their troubles were not over, since, as they returned Sunday, a bus broke down near Dickson and another near Jackson, creating more problems. It seems too bad that the trip had to be marred after the band, the Band Boosters, and the people of this area had done so much to make the trip possible.



Cooking Corner

Summer stalk steals the show

What is bitter, ugly and partly poisonous, yet is a favorite in summertime sweet treats?
It's none other than rhubarb, star of pie, cobbler and shortcake and frequent co-star - with the always popular strawberry - in divine dessert productions.

Now is the time the sweet-fanciers' chorus resumes, renewing its praises as the prized plant rears its elephant-ear leaves and blood-red stalks from the thawed ground.

Once cut it provides a fountain of tangy stalks, rising again and again to fulfill the many dreams that await it. And, if the supply exceeds the demand, it can easily be sliced and frozen, providing a year-round deep freeze crop.

When poring over the store-mixed delights, look for stalks that are firm, straight, well-colored, crisp and do not appear wilted or stringy. They should also be fairly thick, at least 1 inch in circumference. And, if they have leaves, although they will not be eaten, they should look fresh and not droopy.

Nutritionally, rhubarb adds carbohydrates to the diet and contains appreciable amounts of calcium, phosphorus and vitamins A and C, and some iron and potassium. It is low in sodium and one cup of raw, diced rhubarb contains 20 calories. The catch, however, comes with a 1/2-ounce serving of cooked rhubarb with sugar added. It contains approximately 140 calories (depending on the amount of sweetener used).

FRESH RHUBARB PUDDING

8 slices bread, toasted, crusts removed
1 1/2 cups milk
1/4 cup butter or margarine
5 eggs
1 1/4 cups sugar
1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
1/4 tsp. salt
1 lb. fresh rhubarb, diced (2 cups)
1/4 cup chopped walnuts
Heavy cream or half and half, optional

Cut toast into 1/2-inch cubes. Place in medium bowl. In medium saucepan, heat milk and butter just to boiling. Pour over toast cubes. Let stand 15 minutes.

In medium bowl, beat together eggs, sugar, cinnamon and salt. Add rhubarb. Stir into bread mixture.

Place mixture in buttered 2-quart casserole. Sprinkle with nuts. Bake in a 325 degree oven for 50 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Serve with cream, if desired. Makes 8 servings.

VEGETARIAN COOKING

Creole cooking

From the land of Spanish moss, bayous and fireflies comes that exotic and eclectic cuisine known as Creole.

Anyone who has walked beneath the wrought iron balconies in the French Quarter of old New Orleans knows the delightful aromas that permeate the streets there. These are the aromas of Creole cooking, native to Louisiana but derived from a variety of far-flung sources.

With the ingenuity and flair of black and Cajun cooks, using the methods and spices of these diverse cuisines, Creole cooking was born. The Cajuns were refugees, expelled from Canada in 1765, who eventually settled in Louisiana. Originally known as Acadians, these refugees were immortalized in Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem, "Evangeline: The Louisiana 'Cajuns' are immortalized, too, in the culinary legacy they have left behind.

Creole recipes make use of whatever is at hand, and many of them are suitable for a vegetarian diet. The vegetarian menu below makes for a delightful Creole repast, straight from the Old South. To make the salad authentically Creole, rub the bowl with garlic before adding salad greens.

NEW ORLEANS FRENCH DRESSING

1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. pepper
1 tsp. paprika
1/2 tsp. prepared mustard
1/4 cup mild vinegar
1 cup salad oil
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

CHEESE RICE CASSEROLE

1 1/2 cups rice, cooked
1/2 lb. Cheddar cheese, sliced
1/2 cup onion, thinly sliced
1 tbsps. butter
2 eggs yolks, slightly beaten
1 can condensed tomato soup
1 soup can water
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 tsp. salt
2 egg whites

PEKING SPARRERIBS

3 lbs. spareribs, cut in finger-size pieces
1 cup orange juice
1 tbsps. soy sauce
2 tps. dry mustard
1 tsp. sugar
1 jar (3 1/2 oz.) "hot" mustard

OKRA AND TOMATO SALAD

1 cup okra, sliced
1/2 cup water
1/2 tsp. chili powder
1/2 tsp. white pepper
1 tsp. parsley, chopped
Salad greens
1 hard-cooked egg, grated

Combine okra and tomatoes in a bowl with lemon juice, seasonings and parsley. Serve on salad greens. Garnish with grated hard-cooked egg. Serve with New Orleans french dressing.

SWEET AND SOUR

2 lbs. boneless pork, cut in 3/4-inch cubes
4 med. carrots, peeled and sliced
4 tbsps. oil
1 med. onion, sliced
1 tsp. black pepper
1 tbsps. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 tsp. hot pepper sauce
1/2 cup soy sauce
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup vinegar
1 cup pineapple chunks (reserve syrup)
4 tbsps. cornstarch, stirred into 1/2 cup pineapple s.rup

SOUP

5 tbsps. butter
2 med. onions, sliced
6 med. potatoes, pared and sliced
1 clove garlic, minced
1/2 cup water
Salt and pepper
2 bunches watercress, coarsely chopped
3 cups milk and water in equal quantities
1 cup light cream

SOUP

Melt the butter in a deep saucepan. Add onions, potatoes, salt and pepper. Cook very slowly until mushy. Add 1/2 of the watercress. Pour on the milk and water and stir over the fire until soup comes to a boil. Press through a coarse strainer. Spread over the cheese layer and cover with remaining rice.

SOUP

Combine egg yolks, tomato soup, water, Worcestershire sauce, and salt. Mix well. Pour carefully over layers of rice and cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 minutes or until firm.

Put ribs, with everything except prepared mustard, into a large heavy plastic bag to marinate. Refrigerate 12 hours, turning bag over several times. Arrange ribs and marinade in 2-quart oblong baking dish (they will overlap). Brush lightly with half the prepared mustard. Cover with plastic film wrap. Cook 15 minutes. Turn ribs over; turn dish 180 degrees. Brush ribs with remaining prepared mustard. Bake 10 minutes longer in oven. Makes about 12 appetizer servings.

Instructed City Utility Supt. Akin Barnes to check water drainage problems rated by several residents report to the Board.







Halls History

Early this year, I also began writing these recollections, dreaming that by July Street Festival time, men would be wearing beards and ladies long dresses and bonnets.

I hoped some organization would raise money by selling mugs or mustache cups with an inscription saying Halls was 100 years old.

Someone thought the Mayor and aldermen should get behind the idea in order for it to work. They were glad to do what they could, but my only proof of how old we were was the Tennessee History by Goodspeed, written in 1887, that said Halls was founded in 1882. They wanted to know when we were incorporated.

Some of you may have had trouble getting a birth certificate. This has been more difficult.

In addition to Goodspeed, I had proof from the National Archives in Washington, Business Economics Branch, dated July 1, 1961, in a letter to E. J. Shannon, postmaster of Halls at the time, giving him a list of Halls postmasters and other information, as follows:

"Halls, Lauderdale County, Tennessee
Established as Hansford on July 10, 1882."

I know when we were founded and established, but incorporated?

I wrote to the Tennessee State Library and Archives in Nashville, and last week I received a letter from Miss Fran Schell, Reference Librarian, State Library. Excerpts from it follow:

"I am sorry to be so long in replying... Also in this case we have had considerable difficulty with the question and even after all this time have found out very little.

"In the Acts of Tennessee for 1891, page 597, we see a 'List of Incorporated Towns, January 1, 1889, to December 31, 1890'.

"Halls Station appears, with the information that the charter was filed April 18, 1889."

"Our problem is that we cannot find that charter. It is not filed with the Secretary of State. Nor is it in the County or Chancery Court records for 1889."

"The Archives staff read the

Twitty City: Conway's Showcase

When country music superstar Conway Twitty built a new house, he designed it as much for his fans as for himself.

"If it weren't for the country music fan, I couldn't live in a home like we have built at Twitty City," Twitty said. "I couldn't do the things I do. I wanted to put back into country music as much as I've received from it."

Twitty's plantation-style home is the highlight of an eight-acre development called Twitty City in Hendersonville, Tennessee just 20 miles north of Nashville. In addition to Twitty's home, the complex includes a gift shop, Twitty's corporate offices and "Conway's Showcase," an entertainment center telling the story of Twitty's life.

Twitty sees himself as an entertainer and entertaining visitors was his goal for the Showcase.

Conway's Showcase begins with a fast-paced audio-visual presentation which tells the story of Conway's life and career. The presentation, screened in a 50-seat theater, uses computer-timed 15 projectors to show 550 slides in seven and a half minutes.

"The first time I ever saw a presentation like that it knocked me out," he said. He liked the idea and effect so much he decided on a similar type of slide presentation for his Showcase.

Following the theater, fans enter an exhibit area featuring a mini-reproduction of Friars Point, Mississippi, Twitty's hometown. A film from one of Conway's rock 'n' roll performances on a Dick Clark Show in the 1950s is featured in this area. Other exhibits include scaled-down replicas of his touring buses, life-sized cut-outs of his band members and his classic sea green, 1956 Ford automobile.

Throughout the Showcase, spoken narration is shared with portions of his songs to tell the story of the star's life.

"There were a thousand different ways to go when planning the Showcase. I wanted to include some songs

with the narration of the Showcase because my image is built around the songs I've written and recorded down through the years.

"I've heard it said and I'm beginning to believe it, if a singer has the longevity in the business, he'll record a life without even knowing it. As we got into this project and I started going through all the songs, I found songs that I had written and recorded and that just fit."

The final exhibit is a wall showing all the gold records out by Twitty including many with his long-time duet partner, Loretta Lynn. With 42 gold number one records in his career, Twitty qualifies as the recording artist with the most number one country hits.

Just outside the Showcase are the beautifully landscaped grounds which form the front yard of the star's 7,000-square-foot residence. Pathways and bridges go by streams and waterfalls on the grounds. Although access inside the home is not allowed, there are several viewing and picture-taking spots on the grounds. A gazebo snack bar on the upper end of the grounds serves refreshments and snacks. The gift shop stocks a variety of items, including a number of items with the famous Twitty Bird trademark.

"I enjoy walking around on the grounds out here and visiting with the fans. This is where I live, where I work and this is where I am when I'm at home. I'm a part of it all the time. There's not many tours that come through here that I don't get out on the grounds and talk to the people."

Directly behind Twitty's residence are four condominium-style homes for his four children and their families. Twitty's home and his children's homes encircle the office swimming pool. The offices for his employees are on the upper floor of the Showcase building.

"This is a family project. I built homes for each one of my four children on the complex. They all live right here and work here."




