placed in the reserve. Interest will be charged on the \$4 loan for the first year grain is in the reserve and waived thereafter.

You may place 1982 wheat directly into the reserve at harvest but the national average farm price has to hit \$4.65 a bushel (trigger price) before it can be redeemed without penalty.

## 15% Wheat Cut Asked

Wheat prices are the lowest in three years, and prospects for recovery are limited. To improve chances of better prices, the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture has used authorities in the new farm bill to propose a voluntary 15% reduced acreage program.

To participate, you must reduce 1982 wheat-for-harvest acreage by at least 15 percent from an established wheat base and devote that land to conservation uses. This base generally will be the higher of either your 1981 wheat acreage or the average of your 1980 and 1981 wheat acres.

Although you should check with your County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office for full details, here's how the program will work:

A farmer with a base of 100 acres can plant no more than 85 acres of wheat for 1982 harvest. The 15 acres reduced (17.65 percent of 85 acres) must be devoted to a conservation use. Farmers planting less than the full 85 acres to wheat can devote fewer acres to conservation. For example, if only 50 acres are planted, only 8.8 acres (17.65 percent of 50) would have to go to conservation.

The land taken from production and devoted to conservation must be eligible cropland protected from wind and water erosion. Land already planted to winter wheat and then designated as reduced acreage may be cut for hay or grazed, but cannot be harvested mechanically for grain.

For spring wheats, grazing is not permitted on conservation acreage during the six main growing months as determined by the ASC Committee. No payments will be made for grazed acres. Neither offsetting compliance nor cross compliance is required. In other words, a farmer owning or operating more than one farm need not participate on all farms to be eligible for program benefits on the participating farms. Also, compliance in the wheat program is not necessary to qualify for benefits from other program crops.

You may sign up from Feb. 16th to April 16th at your County ASCS Office. Final eligibility will be determined by certification of compliance, usually 4 to 6 weeks before harvest.

Benefits include eligibility for deficiency payments on the production from 1982 acreage planted for harvest. Payments will be made if the national average farm price during June—October 1982 is less than the \$4.05-a-bushel target price.

By participating, you may also receive a regular loan of \$3.55 a bushel, or place your wheat in the farmer-owned reserve and receive a loan of \$4 a bushel. You will receive a prepaid storage payment of 26.5 cents a bushel for wheat

## Backyard Gardener

### Recipe for potting mix

If there's one thing I'd like to find time for in my garden operations this season it's to start making my own potting mixture. I've sorted through all the recipes I have for potting mixes and come up with the one I like best and already the wheels are set in motion for preparing the ingredients, which are compost and vermiculite, half and half.

I'm determined to keep our compost piles carefully tended during the season and to guard meticulously the oldest one from marauding wives who also like to garden. By midseason, I should have compost broken down enough for sifting.

The sifted compost will then be brought into the house in small quantities for sterilizing in a 200-degree oven for a half hour. This pure and beautiful stuff will be stored in a brand-new plastic garbage can, where it will accumulate bounteously for all my potting needs.

I'll store the bin, along with one filled with vermiculite, carefully closed in our little greenhouse, in the vicinity of which I do most of my potting. A free and serviceable scoop will be made for each bin from a large plastic bleach container cut on the slant from the bottom, the top left on.

cess of filling the containers in the first place, how high you fill them depends on what kind of seed you are planting. If you are planting fine seed, the pots can be filled to one-half inch of the top right away. For fatter seeds, don't fill so high, so that you can sow on top of the mix and cover it after.

Once the seed is settled into place with the appropriate amount of soil on top of it, I like to lightly

## REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

The number of personal bankruptcies being filed throughout the nation has risen dramatically since changes in the bankruptcy codes enacted in 1978.

Those changes were designed to provide needed protections to consumers. However, some of those changes have now been recognized as having left loopholes that are easily abused.

Certainly, part of the increase in the number of bankruptcies can be attributed to the present economy. High unemployment, high interest rates, and abuse of credit availability have put many families in unforeseen financial difficulty.

However, a recent study by Purdue University shows that at least 25% of those filing for bankruptcy in the first half of last year could have paid off at least half of their debt, aside from home mortgages, had they chosen to do so.

Those who have not attempted to repay but were able to do so have abused a provision included in Chapter 7 of the bankruptcy law.

The provision allows that a bankrupt person's personal possessions can be sold to pay the creditors. However, it also provides that whatever debt remains be forgiven completely, except for taxes, alimony, child support, and traffic fines.

Consequently, a person can file for straight bankruptcy whether they should or not.

Obviously, there are many cases where there is no choice but to file bankruptcy. For whatever reasons, some people do face situations where they cannot repay the loans that have taken out.

However, the Purdue study

financial situation. They were not intended, however, to allow individuals to sue them to get rid of debt that they can repay and that they accepted knowingly and fairly.

This bill is not going to eliminate the problem of bankruptcy where people simply cannot pay, but it should put an end to the practice of those who would use the system for their own selfish purposes.

Hostesses at the Tennessee Welcome Center on Interstate 24 at Clarksville say developing "smile" lines is a hazard of the job.

Welcoming up to 2,500 people to Tennessee in one day is all in a day's work for Drama Keatts and Cindy Weaver, who are typical of the hostesses at all of the nine Tennessee Welcome Centers.

The passing motorist, stopping at the center located within a mile of the Tennessee line, wouldn't notice the smile lines. The smiles, however, are big and friendly.

"I wouldn't do anything else. I love to meet people from different places," Weaver said. Keatts agreed, "I love being around people and I enjoy meeting people, talking with them and answering their questions. I enjoy my job."

The Welcome Centers provide rest rooms, water fountains, pay phones, picnic areas, brochures and other information about Tennessee. Each center has a manager, hostesses and maintenance personnel.

"Several motorists have told me they're thankful to Tennessee for providing these facilities," Weaver said. "These southbound travelers claim that there are no rest areas with facilities for some distance north of us."

The hostesses and other personnel are available to greet motorists, provide information about Tennessee, assist with directions, distribute brochures and, when the situation merits it, make referrals or provide assistance in emergencies. Despite the numbers, the pretty blond hostesses manage to individualize their comments and conversations.

With a winning record, we feel that this is the perfect time for us to give up coaching.

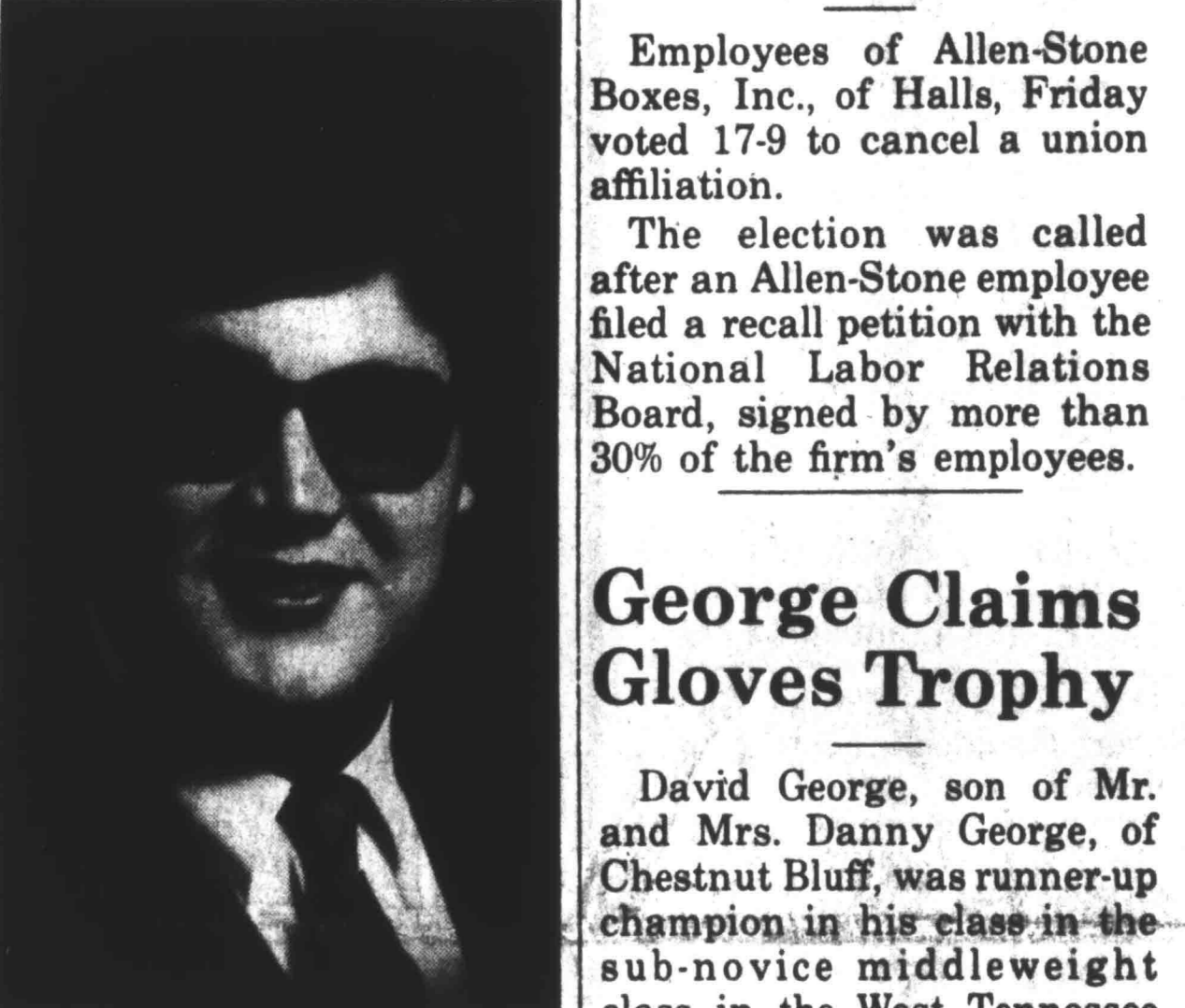
The girls' team for the Athletic Boosters also won, 26-18, but we had nothing to do with that game except to feel sorry for Lana Koonce and the others who played so hard.

### RED MAPLE LEAVES ARE TOXIC TO HORSES

Red maple leaves can kill horses that eat them. This phenomenon was originally observed in the Northeastern States, but cases have been reported in Tennessee, North Carolina, and Georgia.

The red maple tree is common to the eastern half of the United States and is prevalent in Tennessee, according to Frederick Harper, University of Tennessee Extension horse specialist.

"Red maple syndrome occurs from June to October, but you should not assume that this condition exists only during this time," he said.

Eighteen to 24 hours after eating red maple leaves, the horse begins to show pale yellow or brown discoloration of the mucous membranes in the gums and eyelids, slug-

gishness, loss of appetite, weakness, and dark red or brown urine. A fever (102.0 to 103.5 degrees Fahrenheit) may also occur.

In field observations, 50 percent of the horses exposed to red maple were affected. The death rate was 64 percent of those individuals which became sick. Thinning pasture and boredom probably encourage horses to eat the red maple leaves. In one case, a storm caused a red maple limb to blow down in a pasture. The two horses which ate the wilted leaves became ill a few days later.

Apparently the leaves of the red maple must be wilted or dried, and they remain toxic for at least 30 days. The exact chemical toxin is not known.

Since not all horses which are affected die, there must be different forms of the disease or animals react differently to the causative agent(s). All animals

which exhibited methemoglobinemia (breakdown of blood hemoglobin) died.

Horse owners should not graze horses or ponies in pastures or paddocks which contain red maple trees or have them along the fence rows. Do not leave limbs and leaves of red maple trees where horses have access to them. Based on the occurrence of this condition between June and October, the winter months would seem to be the best time to remove red maple trees from horse pastures.

If you do not know how to identify red maple trees, contact your county agricultural agent for assistance.

Treatment of horses with methemoglobinemia from red maple leaf consumption has been rather unsuccessful. Prevention is the major management tool to protect your horse.
