## Halls' Dist. Kings Host Martin West

After a heart-stopping 3-0 win Friday from Lake County's Falcons to take the District 15-A championship and a spot in the state play-offs, the Halls High School Tigers host Martin Westview at 7:30 p.m. Friday in H. G. Conley Memorial Stadium.

Westview, a Class AA team, has won its last two games, after going 0-7. Two weeks ago, it thrashed Dyer County, 41-0, and last week won from McKenzie. Most losses were by close scores to Lake County by two touchdowns and to Union City by two points.

Last Friday, Danny Edenfield split the uprights for a field goal with 1:47 in the game to defeat the Falcons in Tiptonville.

With the help of Tiger mistakes, the Falcons missed three scoring opportunities when Rodney March missed three field goals, two of them within the ten.

In the middle of the first quarter, Lake County recovered a Tiger fumble at the Tiger 26, moved on one first down to the 15, and stalled at the eight. On fourth and three, the field goal was long enough but wide to the right.

With 26 seconds in the half, Lake County picked off Sammy Burnette's pass at mid-field and apparently had clear sailing for the score, but Bobby McCadney brought the runner down at the eight. Calling time-out after each play, the Falcons could gain but four yards on three attempts. March's field goal narrowly missed to the left.

Lake's third field goal attempt came after another Tiger mistake, with the try missing to the right.

## Thomas Ruled Elected In 'Free & Fair' Voting

Ruling Friday on the challenge by Ripley attorney Robert G. Millar to his defeat by incumbent Ninth District Chancellor Robert S. Thomas, of Ripley, by an officially certified 162 votes Aug. 5th, Chancellor Homer W. Bradberry, of Dresden, said that "only one conclusion can be drawn from the proof in this case."

"The officials of elections in these counties worked hard and diligent to hold a fair and honest election as indicated by the fact that they sought the advice and instructions of the co-ordinator of elections in Nashville."

"When they were in doubt, they sought and followed professional advice."

"A perfect election has never been held and never will be."

"The paramount questions are, was it honest, did the voter express his own individual preference, and was any candidate offered an unfair advantage over the other?"

"People must be encouraged to vote and not discouraged by having their vote declared illegal by a Court."

"Elections should and must be decided at the polls and not at the courthouse."

"It is too bad that both of these fine gentlemen could not have been elected, since this cannot be, it is the opinion of

the Court that plaintiff [Millar] has failed to prove his case; that the election did express the free and fair will of the qualified voters and should be upheld."

Bobby Crikfield, owner of Bob's Market, immediately removed the candy from sale until each bar could be examined.

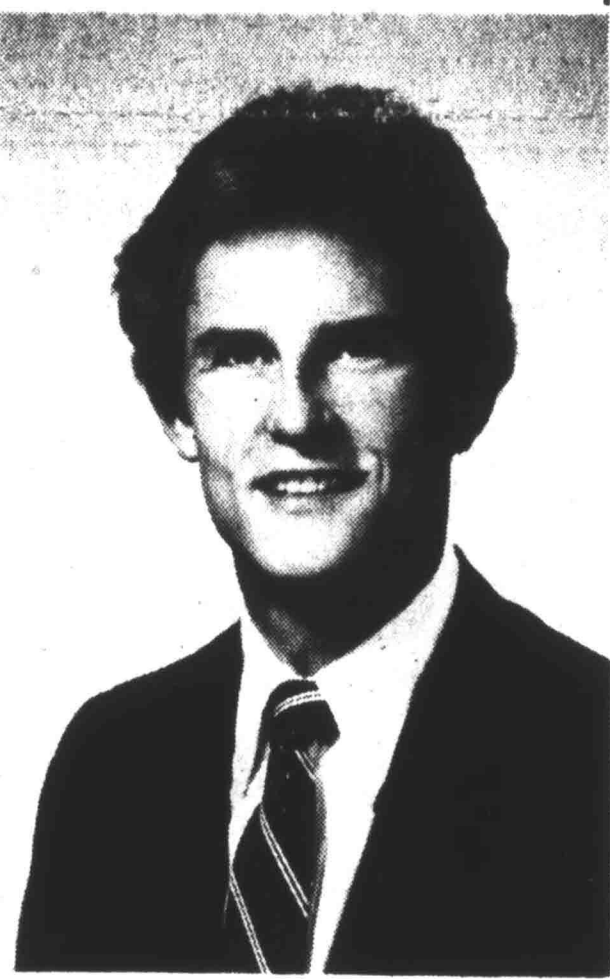
## Death Claims Rev. Burnette

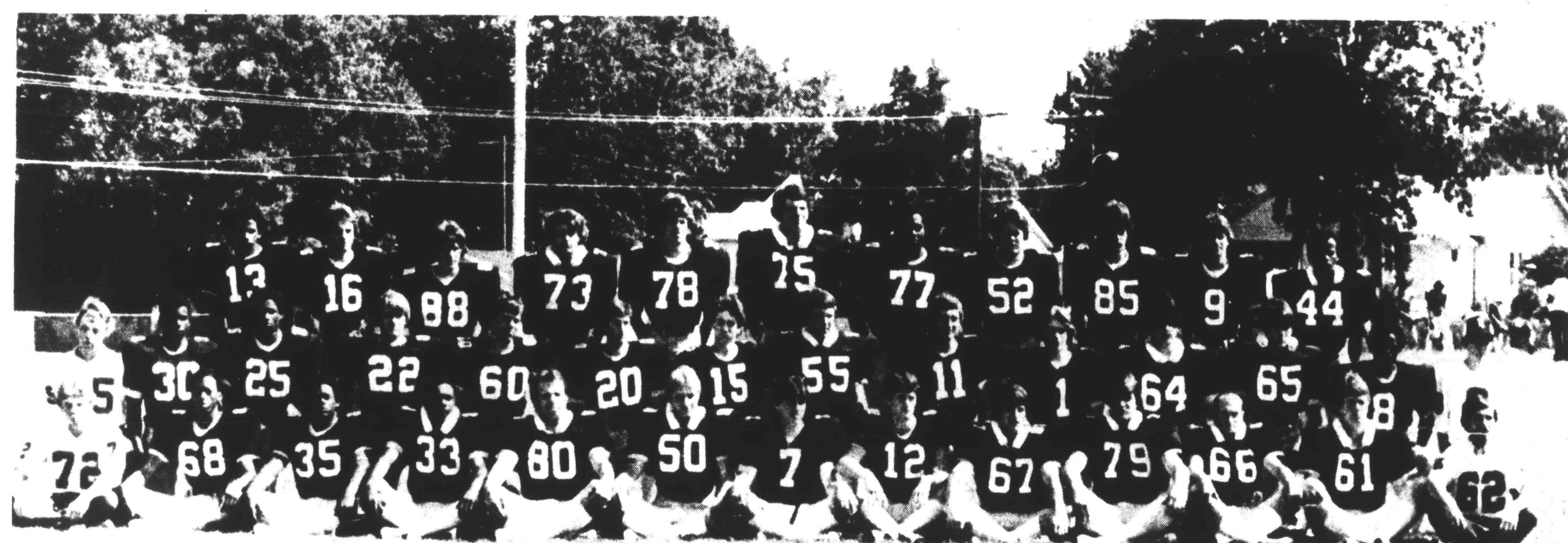

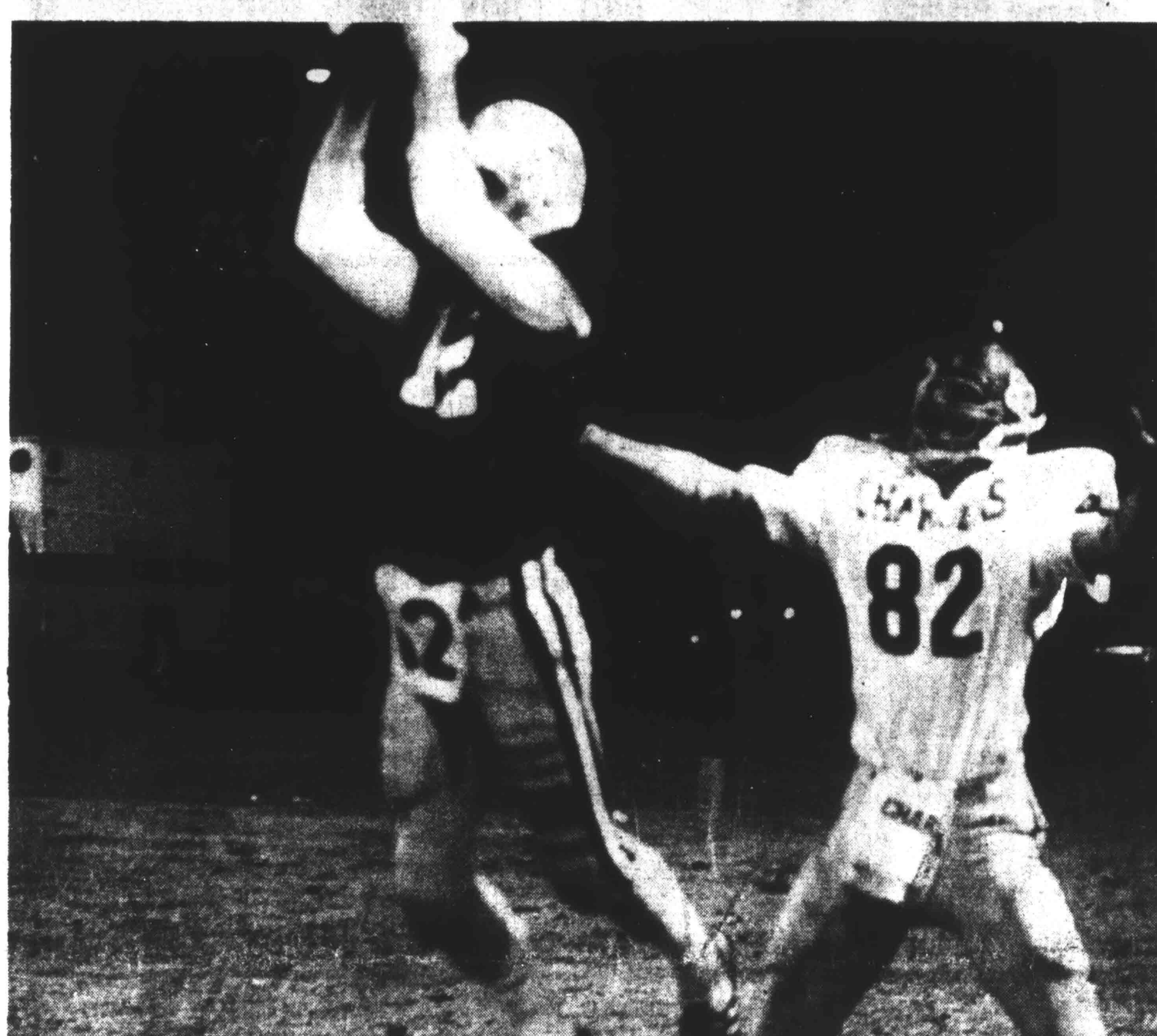


## Halls Tigers Confront Top Ranked Catholic

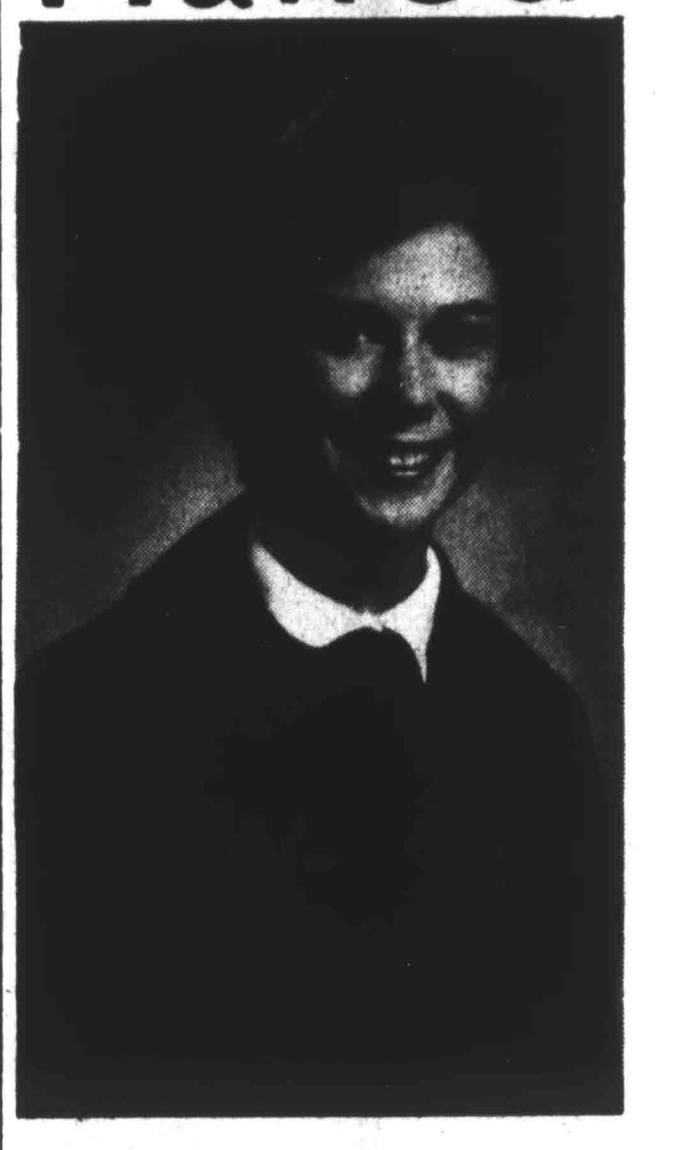

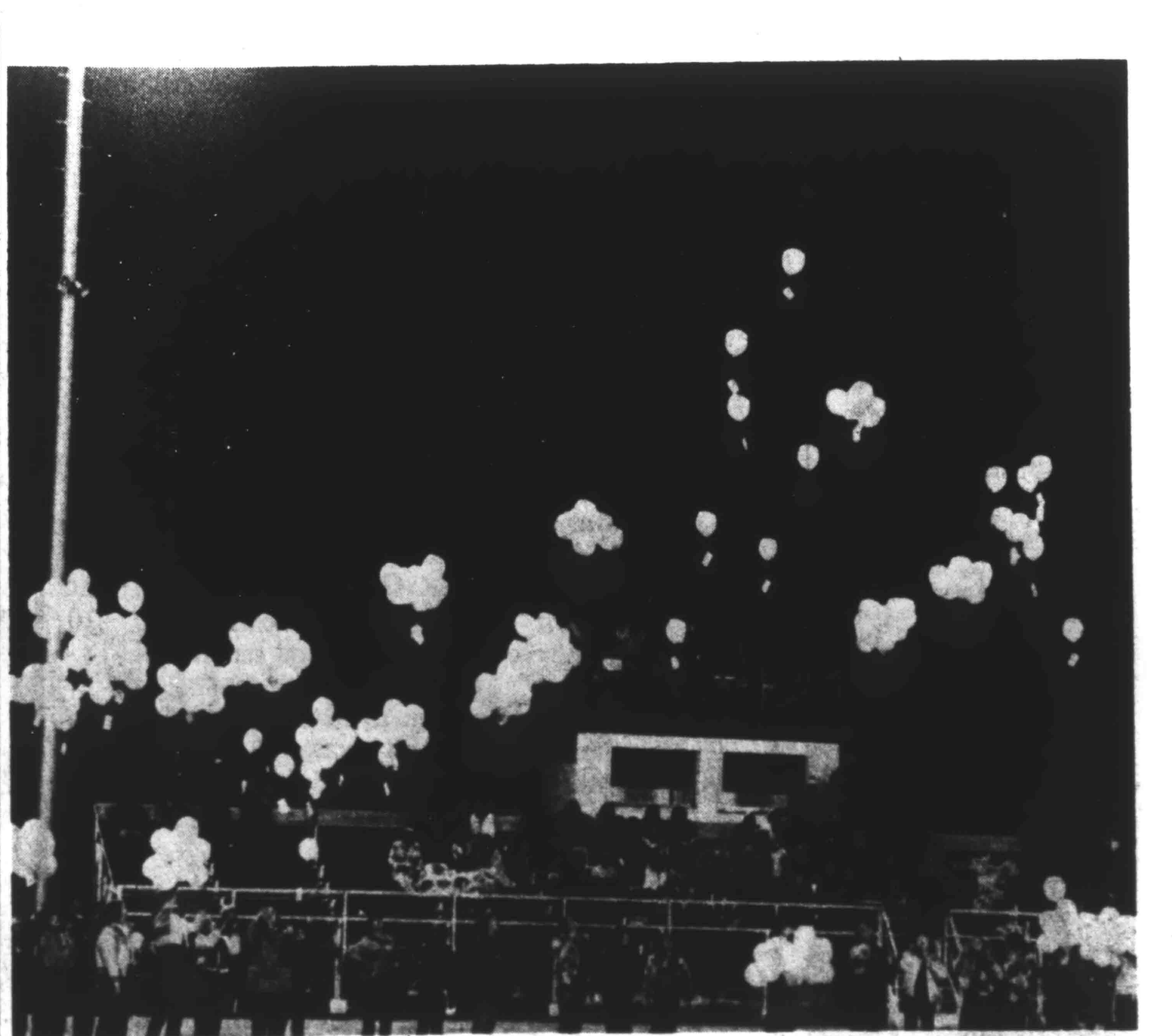

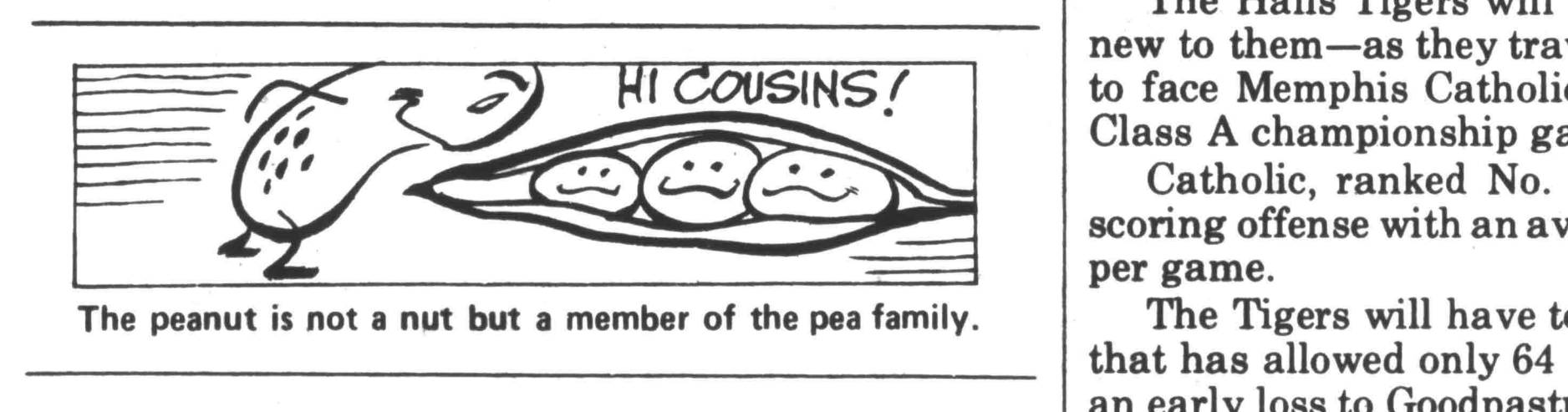

Old Stone Fort Archeological Area

Frontiersmen penetrating the wilderness of Middle Tennessee in the late 1700s stumbled upon an intriguing system of man-made walls between the forks of the Duck and Little Duck Rivers near the present day city of Manchester.

Rock and earthen walls three to six feet high enclosed an area of 34 acres. Noting no particular use of the area by contemporary Indians in the region, the early settlers wondered about the origins of the structure which commonly became known as "The Old Stone Fort."

The purpose of the structure evaded archeologists in the 1966 study. "No conclusive evidence was discovered during the University of Tennessee study about the use of the enclosure by the Indians," Thompson said. "So there is still a mystery attached to the fort, despite the study putting to rest local legends attributing the structure to visiting Europeans. The mystery that remains is whether the prehistoric Indians used the structure for defense, similar to a 'fort,' or whether they used the enclosure for ceremonial purposes, or a combination of both," Thompson said.

Other structures similar to the enclosure have been discovered in the Ohio Valley, leading some authorities to believe the Indians in Tennessee and the Ohio Valley may have shared a cultural network. The Middle Tennessee enclosure is located on a peak of land that forms a plateau between the forks of the rivers. On the north and south sides, the walls cross the neck of land. The walls, if continuous, would have a total length of about 4,600 feet encircling the central area of over 30 acres.

However, a wall was not constructed where the river bluffs presented a natural barrier. Standing on top of one section of the wall overlooking waterfalls on the Little Duck River, Thompson pointed out one of the places where the wall ends and rock bluffs begin. "Here the bluffs become sheer cliffs about 80 feet high, so the wall picks up again where the slope becomes more gradual."

The enclosure is part of a 940-acre park that includes a museum and visitors center, 51 campsites with fireplaces, picnic areas, hiking trails, and an adjacent nine-hole golf course. The museum's exhibits explain the origins of the enclosure as well as documents other developments in the park. The area was the site of the beginning of industrial activity for the city of Manchester during the Civil War, 3,000 Union troops were stationed within its boundaries. Artifacts from the mills and the Civil War time period are on display in the museum. Old Stone Fort is located just off U.S. Highway 41, about 1 1/2 miles north of Manchester. The park can be reached from Interstate 24 by taking the Manchester-Woodbury exit to Highway 41. For more information contact the Tennessee Department of Tourist Development, P. O. 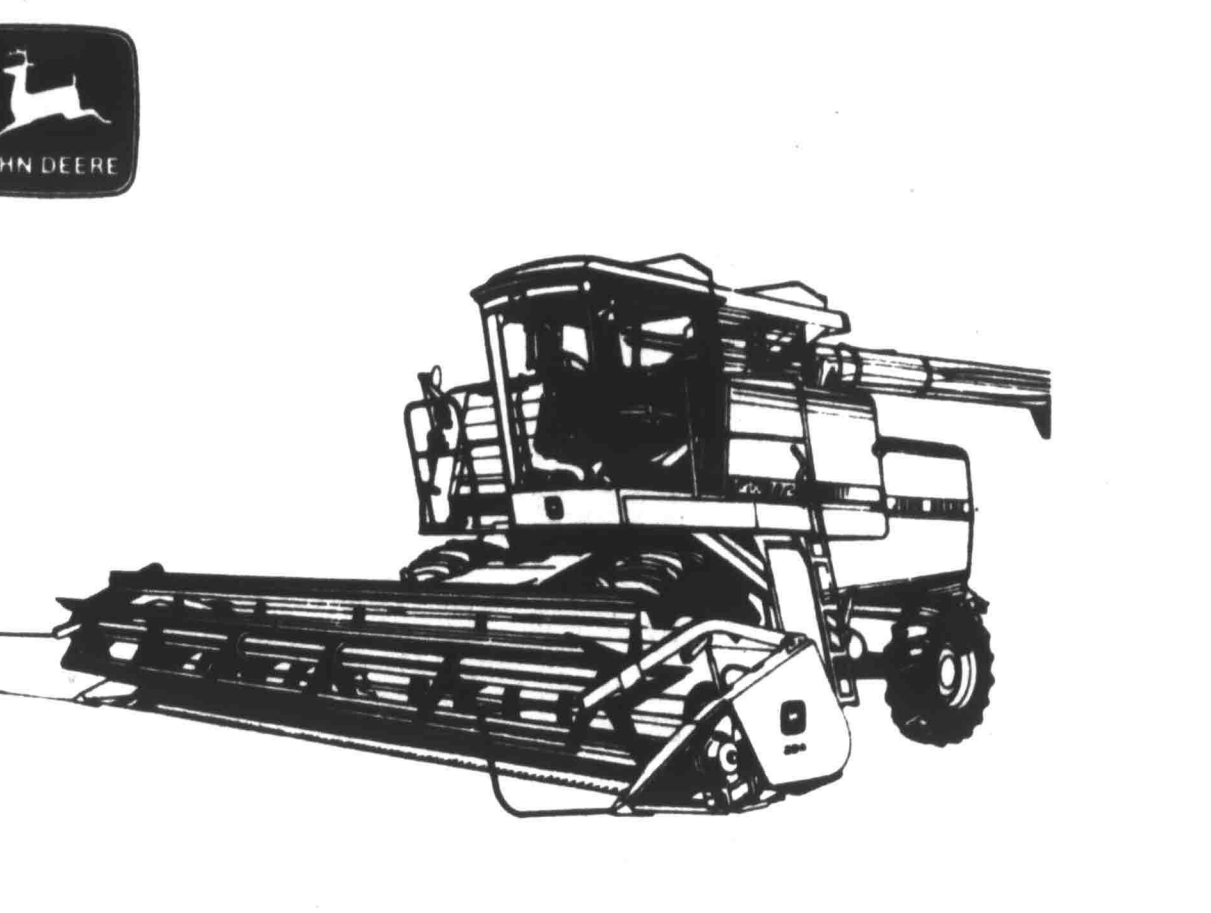

### MICROWAVE MAGIC A ducky idea

Winging their way overhead or milling about the pond, ducks are delightful birds with one big drawback so far as they are concerned — they are delicious.

This savory setback saw the last Labrador duck blasted from existence in 1875. Today wild ring-necked ducks are beginning to make a comeback after over-zealous hunters nearly eliminated them.

Fall heralds duck hunting season and many an eager nitwit will be out wading through the wilderness in an attempt to bag an innocent, unsuspecting mallard or brant. An additional plumed duck. Once these fowl are gunned down, there are a number of ways to prepare them in a microwave.

The flavor of these most taste-tempting ducky dishes could be almost enough to erase the guilt of shooting a wild and free spirit out of the sky.

If you can't bring yourself to hunt wild duck, you may want to turn to Long Island for the bird. Long Island, N.Y., supplies more than half of the marketable quackers to the country. They're not ones to fowl around.

Ducks sometimes make an appearance in the supermarket, hanging around with chickens and other poultry, but if they are unavailable there and you can't bear the thought of another day without a melting morsel of duck meat caressing your palate, try hitting up a friendly farmer or even a local butcher and/or meat processor.

All domestic ducks, with the exception of the Brazilian Muscovy, the female of which is quackless, are descended from the wild mallard. The most prominent meat duck raised in the United States, ask any Long Islander, is the Pekin, a large white breed that originated in China. These unfortunate can often be seen plucked and dried and hung by the beak in many a Chinese meat market.

Duck eggs serve little purpose on the American market and are rarely found on the supermarket shelf, but if you possess some backyard quackers who keep you well stocked whether you like it or not, take heart. Duck eggs are great to bake with. They render a richer cake than chicken eggs and are good in breads and cookies as well.

A microwave and a duck go wave in wing, as the meat cooks quickly, retaining its juices and flavor. Since browning does not occur in the cooking process, the various glazes and gravies to accompany are perfect to color the bird or utilize a browning skillet.

When roasting a duck, a general rule holds that a 4- to 6-pound duck takes six to seven minutes per pound. If it is stuffed allow six minutes per pound extra. Tie down the legs and wings, close to the body, and place the bird breast down in a shallow glass baking dish.

Cover the protruding parts and cook, covered, for half of the cooking time. Remove shielding, place breast side up, turn the duck one-quarter turn around, cut string binding wings and legs and baste the bird with its pan drippings, while removing the excess juices. Cook uncovered for the rest of the prescribed cooking time, or until a meat thermometer placed in the breast of the bird registers 180 degrees. Let rest for 15 minutes or until the thermometer reads 190 degrees.

**DUCKLING BORDEAUX**  
4 to 5 lb. duckling  
1/2 cup marmalade  
1 tsp. soy sauce  
1 tsp. butter  
1 tsp. all-purpose flour  
1/2 cup white wine  
1/2 cup chicken broth  
1 tsp. vinegar  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
Preheat browning skillet in microwave 4 1/2 minutes.

**Quarter duckling.** Place two pieces of duckling skin-side-down in skillet. Cook five minutes, turning duckling over halfway through cooking time. Drain. Preheat browning skillet again for two minutes. Drain and dry fruit with paper towels. Arrange, coating with butter mixture so that fruits are well mixed in colors and shapes. Cook, covered, three minutes. Spoon butter sauce over fruit, rotate dish one-quarter turn, and cook two to three minutes, covered. Rest, covered, for five minutes. Serves 6 to 8.

**Mineral oil should not be used to make salad dressing. It interferes with absorption of fat-soluble vitamins like A, D and K and should not be used on or in foods.**

**Preheat browning skillet 4 1/2 minutes.** Place half of duckling pieces in skillet and cook one minute per side. Drain off fat and reserve. Heat browning skillet two minutes. Place remaining half of duckling pieces in skillet and cook one minute per side. Drain fat.

**Place duckling pieces on paper towels.** Return 3 tablespoons reserved fat to skillet. Cook 45 seconds. Blend in flour and paprika. Stir until smooth. Gradually stir in sherry. Blend in chicken bouillon. Mix well with wire whisk. Cook sauce three minutes. Stir after two minutes.

**Add browned duckling.** Top with onion. Cook, covered, 20 minutes. Turn skillet halfway through cooking time. Garnish with tomatoes, olives and parsley. Serves 4.

**APRICOT-ORANGE GLAZED DUCKLING**  
5 lb. ready-to-cook duckling  
Pepper  
1/2 cup apricot jam  
1/2 cup chicken broth  
1 tsp. soy sauce  
1 tsp. dry mustard  
1 tsp. grated orange peel  
1 tsp. each cornstarch and water

**Remove giblets and neck from duck cavity,** reserve for other uses, if desired. Rinse duck well, then pat dry. Prick skin in several places with a fork and spritz cavity and skin lightly with pepper. Secure wings akimbo style and fasten skin across neck opening to back with wooden pick.

**Place duck, breast side down, on a non-metallic rack or inverted saucer in a 7x11-inch baking dish.** Cook 10 minutes; turn dish once or twice. With two forks to support duck, tip and drain cavity juices into baking dish; turn duck breast side up. Cook 10 minutes, turning dish once or twice. Drain drippings from baking dish into glass measure, baste duck with remaining jam mixture and cook 10 minutes longer or until leg joint moves easily. Drain juices from cavity into baking dish; place duck on serving platter and keep warm.

**Combine all drippings in glass measure, discard fat.** Blend cornstarch and water, stir into drippings and cook for one minute or until bubbly. Pass sauce. Serves 3 or 4.

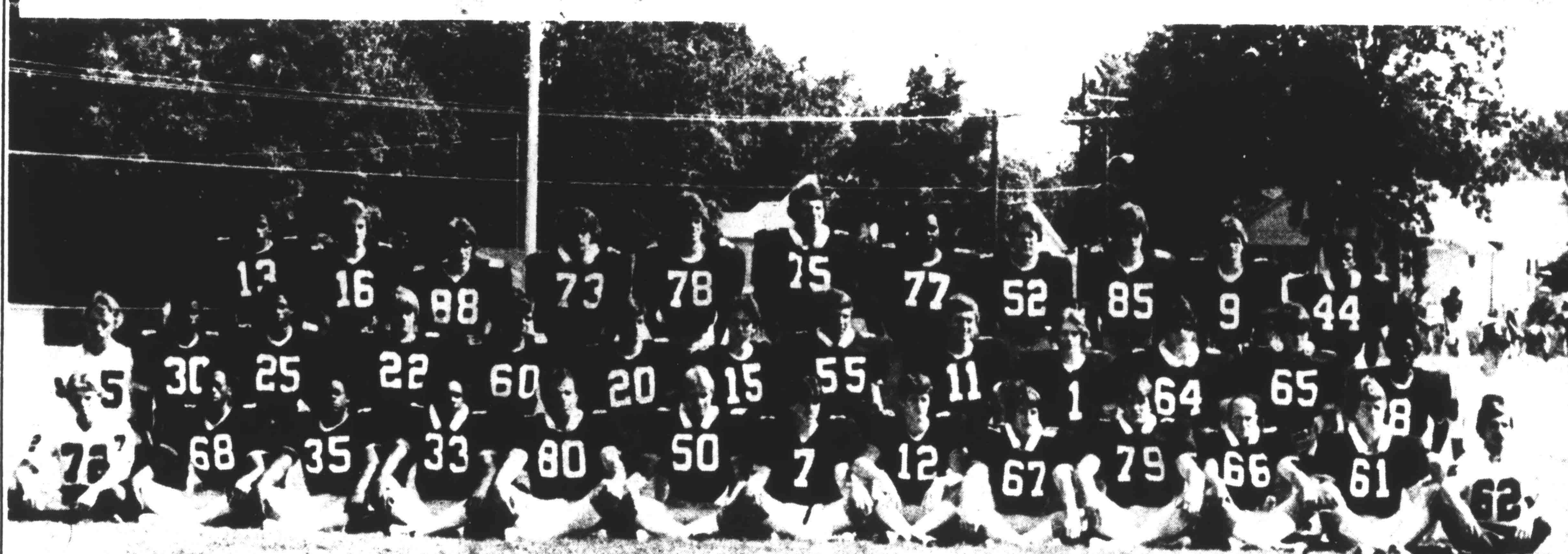

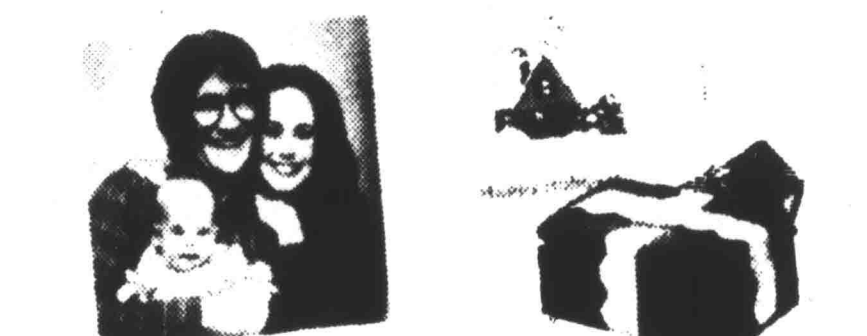

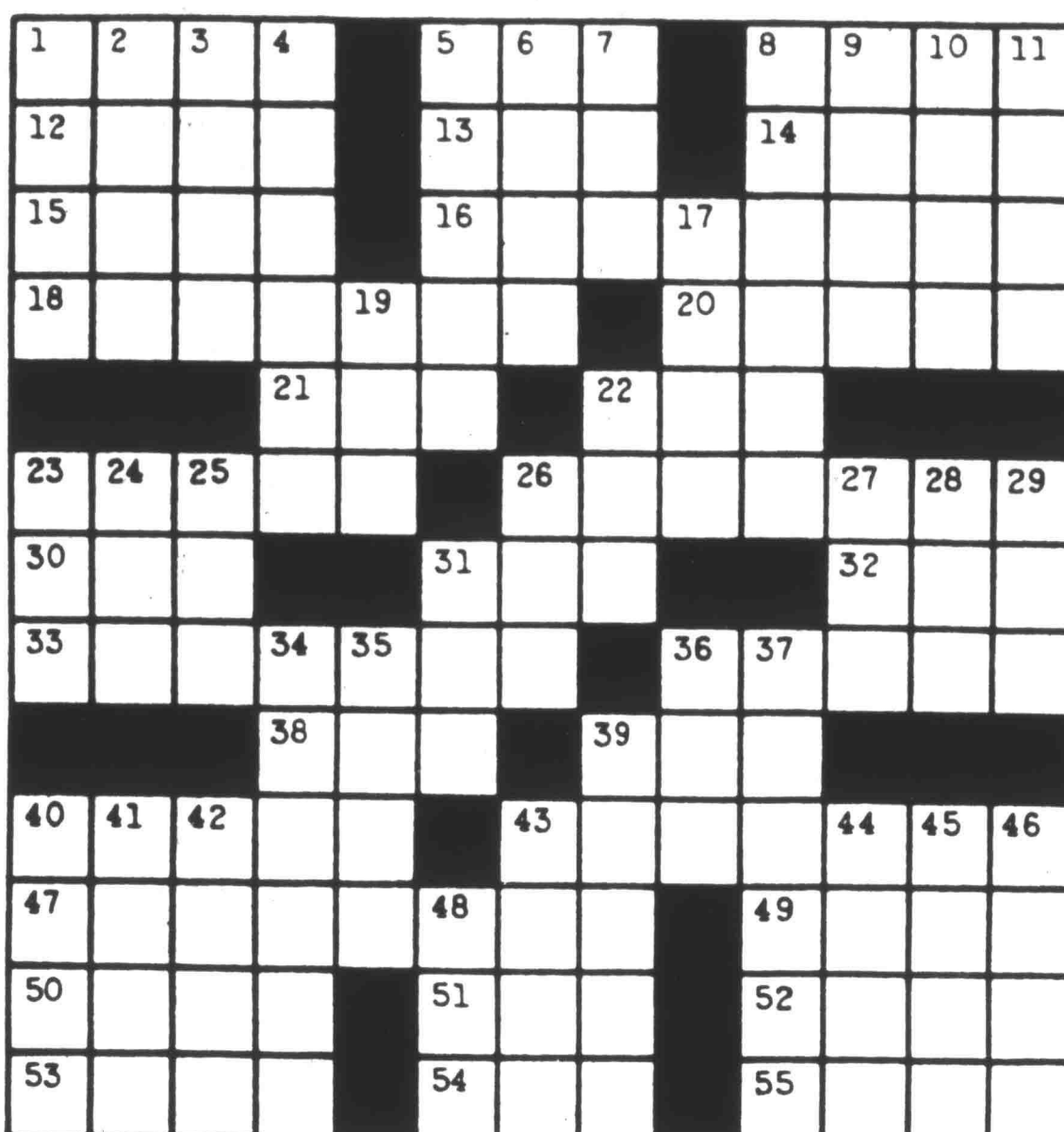

Grid Districts Are Changed

After nearly four hours of debate on four plans submitted, the Board of Control of the Tennessee Secondary Schools Athletic Association voted 8-1 Tuesday of last week to classify — for the next four years — equal numbers of schools in Classes A, AA, and AAA. Of 117 schools in Class AAA, Ripley (enrollment 794) will be in District 13 of Region 7, along with Bolivar (845), Brownsville (964), Covington (698), Dyersburg (848), Jackson Central-Merry (1231), Jackson North Side (735), Lexington (753), Crockett County (750), and Savannah (848). The region's other district, District 14, will include Bartlett, Germantown, Fayette Ware, Briarcrest, Christian Brothers, Craigmont, Kingsbury, Raleigh-Egypt, and Millington. Halls is pitted in Region 7's Class A, against only Sharon and Greenfield, in District 13. Its nemesis, Lake County, in District 14, faces only Dresden, Gleason, and South Fulton. But in Class A football only — 118 schools with 290 students or less — schools play on the regional level, two top teams making the play-offs regardless of district results. Class AA schools will have 291 to 701 students, Class AAA schools 702 and above. These numbers divide all TSSAA schools into three groups of equal size. Enrollments are for a high school's top three grades. Any student in school two semesters is automatically a sophomore. 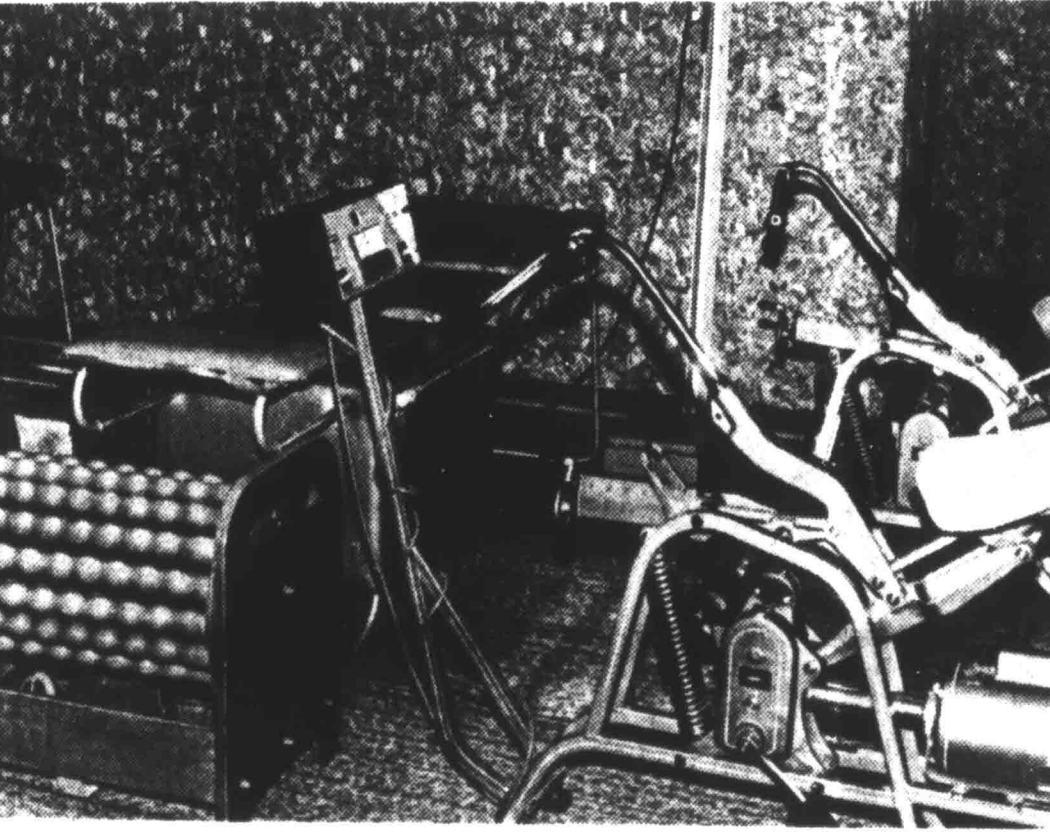

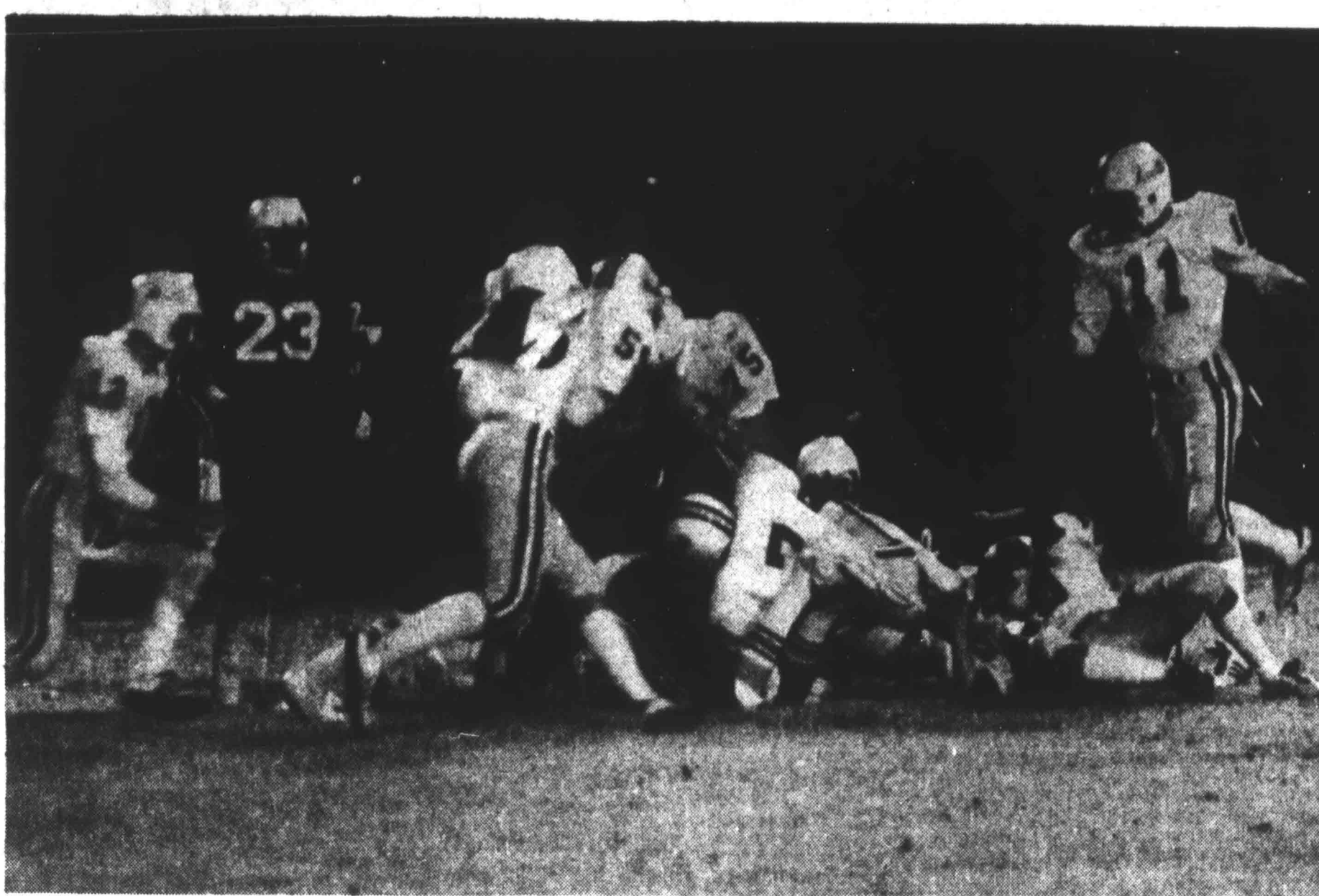

## Halls Battles Drag Racing

Halls' city board Monday directed Mrs. Katie Davis, recorder, to write County Executive Jerry Corlew and County Attorney J. Thomas Caldwell to protest drag racing on the Halls air base on Sunday afternoons.

The board also: Accepted bid of \$75.11 per acre by Lucky Humphreys for lease of 34 acres of tillable land on the air base. Charles O. Vlar, only other bidder, offered \$59.41 per acre.

Approved a request by Milton Williams, Community Development director, to set aside the rehabilitation limit of \$9,900 on the home of Birdell Payne. Williams told the Board that the lowest bid exceeded the limit by \$2,200.

Since several citizens had urged help for Payne, the Board approved additional funds, five voting yes, Judson Vaden abstaining.

Heard Alderman Eugene Pugh report that the Forked Deer River Basin Authority has resumed work. The Board agreed to contact the Authority seeking assistance with the town's drainage problems.

Instructed City Supt. Akin Barnes to recommend repairs for the bridge on North College, near the Milton Williams home.

Heard Barnes report that about \$3,000 would be needed to extend the natural gas line west on Ward Road, near Nankipoo. The Board voted to require payment of cost in advance unless a contract can be completed to recover installation costs.

Agreed to study possibilities of giving some sort of tax break to industry on the next gas increase. The bond resolution forbids any waiver of rate increases.

Accepted the recommendation of the Industrial Board to renew the lease of property on the old air base to West Tennessee Auction Co. The lease will be retroactive to June 1, 1982, expiration date of the previous lease.

Denied a bill from Ernest Jackson for a burned out element in a hot water heater. Jackson claimed neglect because of service being cut off at his home. The city could find no record of such a cut-off.

Agreed to work with Roger Harris to correct a problem of water use at his home just off Hwy. 88. Harris has had an average consumption of 24,000 gallons for the past two years.

Directed Mrs. Davis to write a letter to the Illinois County Gulf Railroad, seeking repairs of the East Tigris Street Crossing.

Approved repair of the roof of Northside Community Center at a cost of \$405.

Agreed to study a proposal to prohibit the placing of political signs in the future, unless some plan is made to remove the signs after the election. The proposal was placed on the agenda for December.

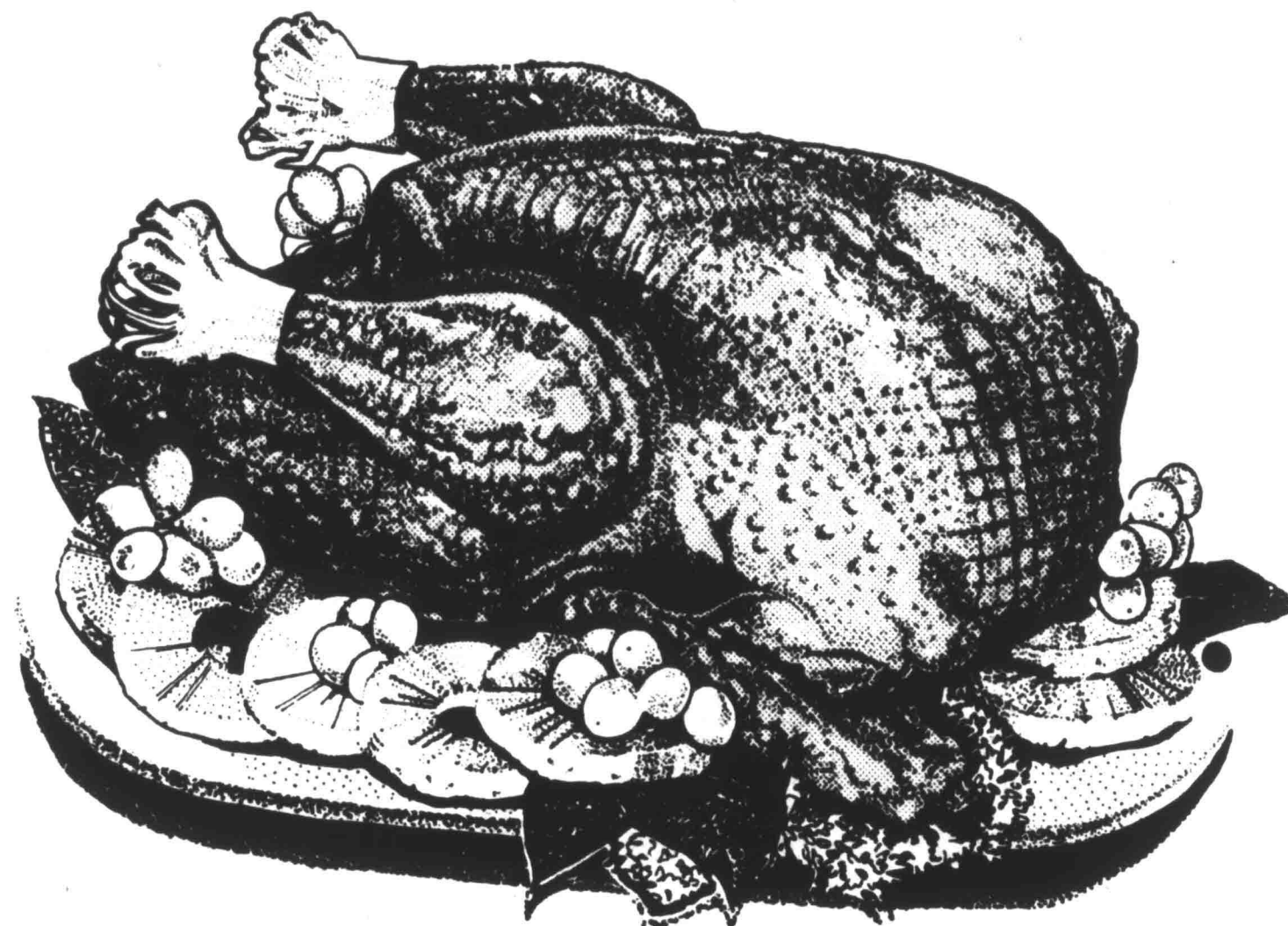

 GUM FLAT, Nov. 16 — Bobby Kerby was admitted to Parkview Hospital in Dyersburg Tuesday of last week, after a tree fell on him.

My oldest brother, Claude, wanted to go to France with everyone else, but just as he got signed up to go, the war ended, and he never got there. For years we still had his khaki uniform with woolen leggings—just long strips of khaki material wrapped around his legs, either under or over the pants and down into his shoes.

Although he missed getting to Europe with the boys in the service, he did make two trips there, one soon after World War I and the other about ten years before he died two years ago.

The late Harry Hall, a veteran of this war, served as city policeman in Halls for many years. When I worked for Thelma (Mrs. Joe) Hurt, City Recorder, and later, after she went to the Bank of Halls, as City Recorder for 12 years, Mr. Hall also worked for the city.

He came to blow the fire whistle, and the late Lynn Vaden, alderman, would blow the old canning factory whistle he had moved to his dry cleaning plant.

There are very few veterans of this war left here in Halls, but one is my friend, Cloise

Carmack (Mack) Sumrow. He is the son of Mary Hubbard and Everett Sumrow, born at Nankipoo Nov. 15, 1883. He was the first boy to volunteer for service in Halls.

It was not until June 14th that the convoy, consisting of a cruiser and four torpedo boat destroyers, picked up the party of some twelve transports bound for France.

Every effort was being made to keep them from being flagged, but they were irrepressible; "Bound for Berlin," "Can the Kaiser," and similar slogans appeared in large chalk letters on the cars.

In the dead of night, June 10-11th, 1917, they marched on to the transports Saratoga, Havana, and Montanan, in Hoboken.

For several days they lay in the docks, but no shore leaves were granted.

Strong instincts of affection brought many friends and relatives to the dock, but the farewell messages had to be spoken through the picket fence.

It was the evening of June 25th when the transports quietly slid into the St. Nazaire harbor and dropped anchor.

On board, all was excitement in preparation for the landing.

Bright and early on June 26th, the boats glided through the locks and the welcoming cheers of the French people.

With band playing and colors flying, the regiment marched to its first encampment on French soil.

To the French, the arrival of the American troops brought new hope of victory for their war-ridden country.

Sharing that distinction with the 16th were the 18th, 26th, and 29th.

The 16th was not only the first to land in France but the last to leave, staying in Germany six months after the Armistice was signed. Mack served in five major battles.

## Hendersonville's House of Cash

It's not just happenstance that the main thoroughfare in Hendersonville, Tennessee, is called "The Johnny Cash Parkway."

Cash and his wife, June Carter Cash, live on the eastern edge of Hendersonville on Old Hickory Lake. June, as a singer and as a member of The Carter Family, has her own claim to fame in country music circles.

The main thoroughfare through Hendersonville, located 18 miles northeast of downtown Nashville, leads to the House of Cash, a colonial-style building that includes the Johnny Cash Museum, a photo gallery and a gift, souvenir and jewelry shop.

Just inside the large double front doors is the gift shop. The main gallery that features shots taken by Johnny of his friends and family.

Cash's oldest brother, Roy, serves as curator of the museum. In a low voice reminiscent of his famous brother, Roy Cash explains, "The museum is a collection of memorabilia and other items of interest from the lives and careers of Johnny and June along with things they've collected in their world travels.

We have things in here from everywhere, including antique furniture that goes back over 300 years."

Areas of the museum include a Cash family section, a Carter family section, an awards wall and a variety of special sections. Cases display collections of Americana, photos, newspapers, guns and an assortment of items given to the couple from country music personalities - such as a hat from Minnie Pearl and a violin and yo-yo from Roy Acuff. Other museum artifacts include hand-written scripts and other items from Johnny's or June's participation in movies or television productions.

The Cash family area includes early pictures of Johnny and June, the iron bed he slept on from boyhood to high school graduation, and such family mementos as the scales the family weighed cotton with on their 20-acre farm in Dyess, Arkansas.

Near the Cash family area are a set of musical instruments and a Sears Roebuck amplifier. Roy Cash explained this exhibit. "By today's standards, these musical instruments are primitive and inexpensive. However, these are the instruments used by Johnny and the original Tennessee Two, Luther Perkins and Marshall Grant, to record some of his first songs such as "Hey, Porter," "I Walk the Line" and "Ring of Fire."

An adjacent case has seven of Johnny's first albums recorded on the Sun Record label in Memphis. One wall in the museum displays the many awards and honors presented to Johnny Cash. "At the present time Johnny has 45 U.S. gold records and eight U.S. platinum albums besides the foreign gold records he's received," his brother noted. "His first

gold record was "I Walk the Line" which was recorded in March, 1956. To date, Johnny has sold a little over 85 million records since he started recording in 1955."

The awards displayed on one long wall of the museum do not include all of the awards received by Johnny, his brother said. "We decided to display the things that are the most valuable to Johnny, including at least one thing from every state in the Union."

Roy Cash pointed to the Country Music Hall of Fame plaque awarded to Johnny in 1980. "He's the youngest living member ever inducted in the Country Music Hall of Fame. Nearby are his Grammy and Country Music Association awards he's received for his songs and other

achievements as an entertainer."

Along the opposite wall is the Carter family section. The Carter family is one of the oldest families in country music and they first started recording in 1927. The original members of the group include June Carter Cash's mother, aunt, and uncle - Mother Maybelle, Sarah and A. P. Carter - but the group later included June and her sisters. Some of the items on display are pictures of The Carter Family, some of their earliest albums, and the gold record Mother Maybelle Carter received for her single, "Wildwood Flower."

In a separate case are costumes worn by June and various members of the Carter family for special occasions, such as Country Music Hall of Fame ceremonies. "June is the only woman living that has a mother, an aunt, an uncle and a husband in the Country Music Hall of Fame," Roy Cash said.

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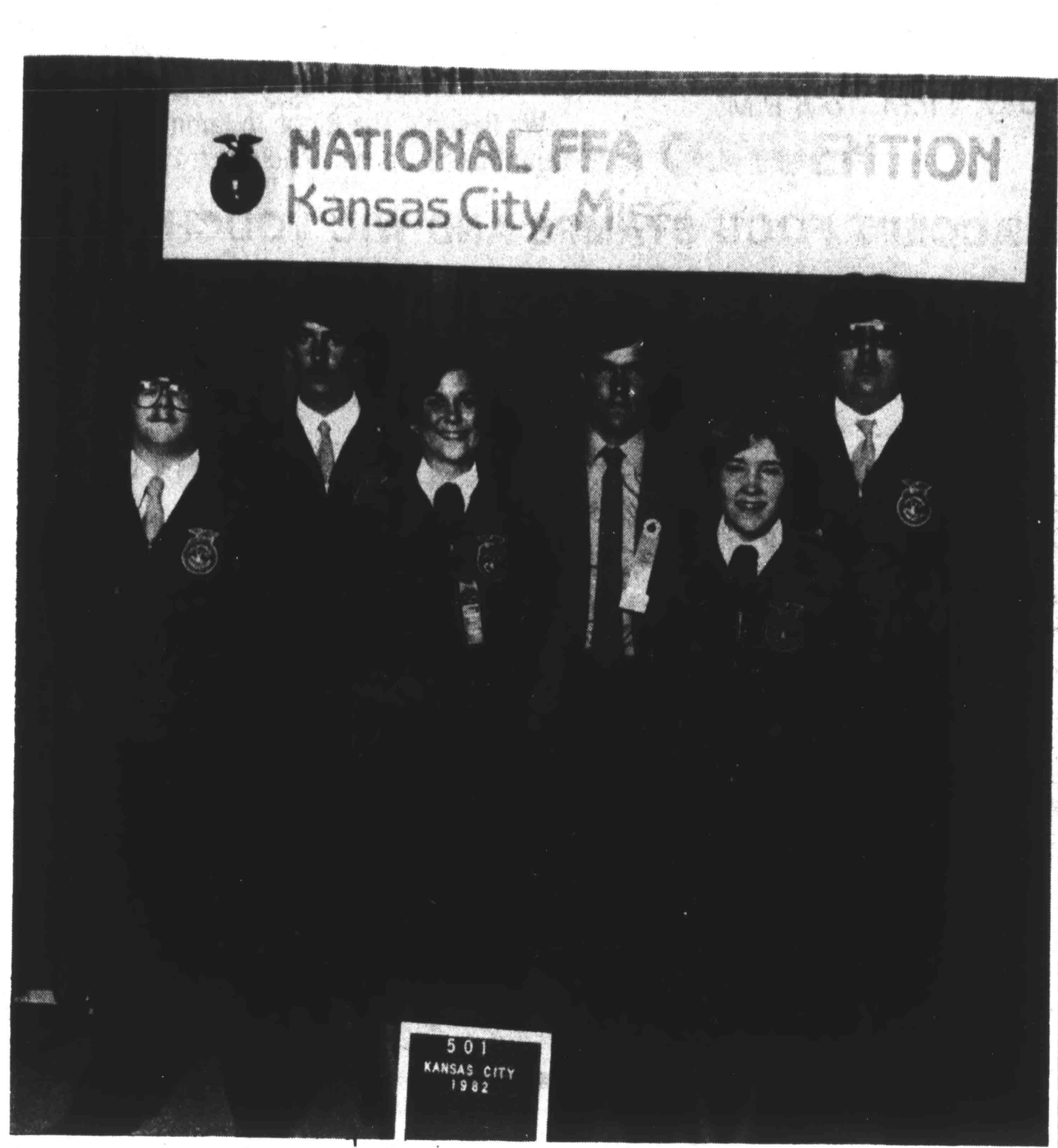

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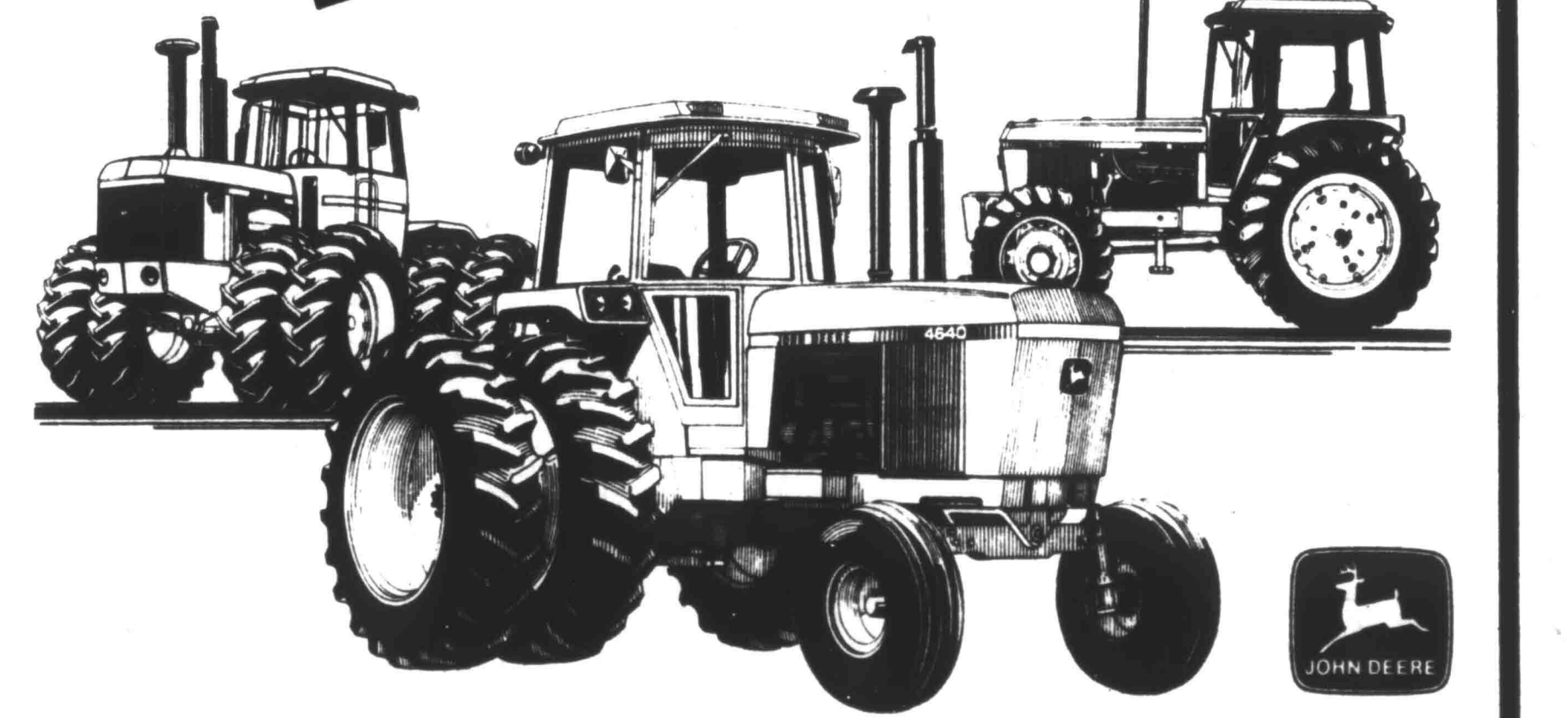

### Our Opinion

Well, the National Football League strike was at least temporarily ended last weekend, but local football fans didn't seem to be particularly interested. It seems to us that most of the differences could have been worked out without the strike, and apparently that is the general opinion, since attendance was well below normal.

Every day we listen to television commentators, read magazine and newspaper columnists, hear opinions of economists foretelling doom for the American economy. Each spends a great deal of time criticizing President Reagan and the administration for their policies or in a few instances criticizing past administrations and Democratic Congresses for their excesses, but few offer any real remedies.
