


Bobby Crihfield, owner of Bob's Market, immediately removed the candy from sale until each bar could be examined.

MICROWAVE MAGIC A ducky idea

This savory setback saw the last Labrador duck blasted from existence i 1875. Today wild ring necked ducks are beginning to make a comeback after over-zealous hunters nearly eliminated them.

Fall heralds duck huntng season and many an eager nimrod will be out wading through the wilderness in an attempt to bag in innocent, unsuspecting mallard or brightly olumed wood duck. Once these fowl are gunned down, there are a number of ways to prepare them a a microwave. The flavor of these most taste-temptng ducky dishes could be almost enough to erase the uilt of shooting a wild and ree spirit out of the sky.

If you can't bring your elf to hunt wild duck, you nay want to turn to Long sland for the bird. Long Isand, N.Y., supplies more han half of the marketable ackers to the country; ey're not ones to fowl

Ducks sometimes make an appearance in the supermarket, hanging round with chickens and other poultry, but if they re unavailable there and ou can't bear the thought another day without elting morsel of duck e, try hitting up a friendfarmer or even a local utcher and/or meat pro-

The most promi nent meat duck raised in the United States, ask any long Islander, is the Pekin. a large white breed that iginated in China. uck eggs serve little and are rarely ound on the supermarke some backyard quackers who keep you well stocked **vhether** you like it or not take heart. Duck eggs are **great to bake with. They** ender a richer cake than chicken eggs and are good in breads and cookies as

A microwave and a duck o wave in wing, as the meat cooks quickly, retaining its juices and flavor Since browning does not cur in the cooking proess, the various glazes and gravies to accompany are erfect to color the bird or utilize a browning skillet

When roasting a duck, a eneral rule holds that a 4to 6-pound duck takes six **lo seven minutes** per ound. If it is stuffed allow six minutes per pound xtra. Tie down the legs and wings, close to the ody, and place the bird **preast down** in a shallow zlass baking dish.

Cover the protruding arts and cook. covered or half of the cooking he dish one-quarter turp round, cut string bindin ngs and legs and baste he bird with its pan dripp s. while removing the cess juices. Cook uncovcooking time, or atil a meat thermometer laced in the breast of the ird registers 180 degrees et rest for 15 mintutes or intil the thermometer reads 195 degrees.

- 4 to 5 lb. duckling 1/2 cup marmalade
- thep, soy sauce thep, butter

Quarter duckling. Place two pieces of duckling skin-side-down in skillet. Cook five minutes, turning duckling over halfway through cooking time. Drain. Preheat browning skillet again for two min utes. Repeat above process with remaining duckling

Mix marmalade with sov sauce. Reserve ¼ cup mix ture. Use remainder to baste duckling. Arrange al duckling quarters in browning skillet and cook 20 minutes, turning dish every five minutes. Cover and let stand while preparing sauce.

Melt butter. Stir in flour and then remaining ingred ients. Cook one minute Add remaining marmalade. Cook an additiona 1¹/₂ minutes until smooth Spoon over duckling.

BRAISED DUCKLING ESPAGNOLE One 5 lb. duckling,

cut up 4 cup all-purpose

2 tsps. paprika

1/2 cup dry sherry 1¾ cups chicken

bouillon 1 sliced onion

1 sliced tomato

1/3 cup chopped, stuffed olives

2 tbsps. minced pars

Preheat browning skillet 4½ minutes. Place half of duckling pieces in skillet and cook one minute per side. Drain off fat and reserve. Heat browning skil let two minutes. Place remaining half of duckling pieces in skillet and cook one minute per side. Drain

Place duckling pieces on paper towels. Return ablespoons reserved fat to skillet. Cook 45 seconds. Blend in flour and paprika. Stir until smooth. Gradually stir in sherry. Blend in chicken bouillon. Mix well with wire whip. Cook sauce three minutes. Stir after two minutes.

Add browned duckling. Top with onion. Cook, covered, 20 minutes. Turn skillet halfway through cook ing time. Garnish with tomatoes, olives and parsley. Serves 4.

APRICOT-ORANGE GLAZED DUCKLING 5 lb. ready-to-coo duckling

Pepper

1/2 cup apricot jam 3 cup chicken broth

1 tbsp. soy sauce tbsp. dry mustard

1 tsp. grated orange

Remove giblets and neck from duck cavity; reserve for other uses, if desired. Rinse duck well; then pat dry. Prick skin in several places with a fork and sprinkle cavity and skin lightly with pepper. Secure wings akimbo style and asten skin across neck opening to back with wood-


Place duck, breast side down, on a non-metallic rack or inverted saucer in a 7x11-inch baking dish. Cook 10 minutes; turn dish once or twice.

With two forks to support duck, tip and drain cavity juices into baking dish; turn duck breast side up. Cook 10 minutes, turning dish once or twice. Drain drippings from baking dish into glass measure, baste duck with remaining jam mixture and cook 10 minutes longer or stnil leg joint moves easi ly. Drain juices from cavity into baking dish: place duck on serving platter and keep warm.

Combine all drippings in glass measure; discard fat. Blend cornstarch and water, stir into drippings nd cook for one minute or until bubbly. Pass sauce. Serves 3 or 4.



In 1¹/2-quart glass cas-serole, melt butter 45 seconds. Blend in sugar and curry. Drain and dry fruit with paper towels.
