Box Seeks Props For Bean Prices

Ripley soybean farmer Page Box joined soybean leaders from 25 states who gathered in Washington, D.C. last week to launch an intensive effort to gain congressional action to bolster soybean prices.

"We need action," says Box, who currently serves as Tennessee Soybean Association Board of Directors member. "Unless we sell what we produce and sell at a profit, 'bin busting' crops will continue to depress farm prices while government supports add to federal budget deficits. We don't want a tax supported surplus hanging over the market to lower prices. We want to sell soybeans at profitable prices and we're asking Congress for immediate action."

Box was one of more than 50 soybean leaders who attended the emergency meeting which included briefings from Agriculture Secretary John Block; Congressman William Emerson (Rep., Mo.); Sen. Richard Lugar (Rep., Ind.); and an official from the White House. Following the briefings, Box sought action during meetings with Congressman Ed Jones and Senators James Sasser and Howard Baker.

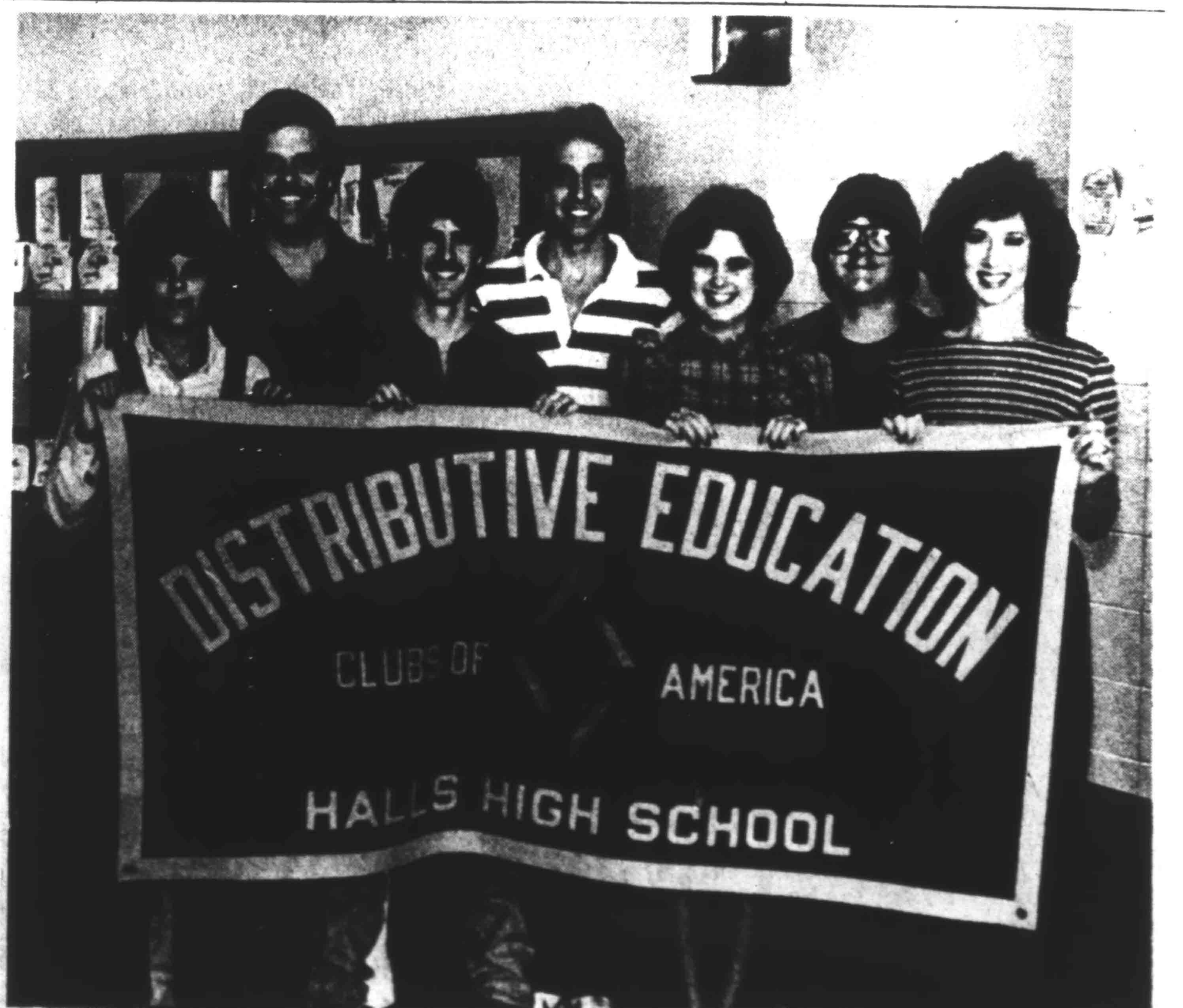

AMENDMENT

To Ordinance No. 67
Regulation Of Sewer Use Ordinance

An Amendment To Clarify Penalties For Violation Of Sewer Use Ordinance

BE IT ORDAINED and enacted by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Gates, Tennessee, as follows:
Article IX. Penalties. —Add the following section:

Section 7. In addition to any other method of enforcing the requirement of an owner connecting to the proper public sewer in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 4, of this Ordinance, the Town of Gates may refuse water service to such owner until there has been compliance with said requirement and may discontinue water service to an owner failing to comply within 90 days after notice to comply.

Passed and adopted by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Gates, Tennessee, on first reading Aug. 10, 1982, on second reading Sept. 14, 1982, and on third reading Sept. 14, 1982.

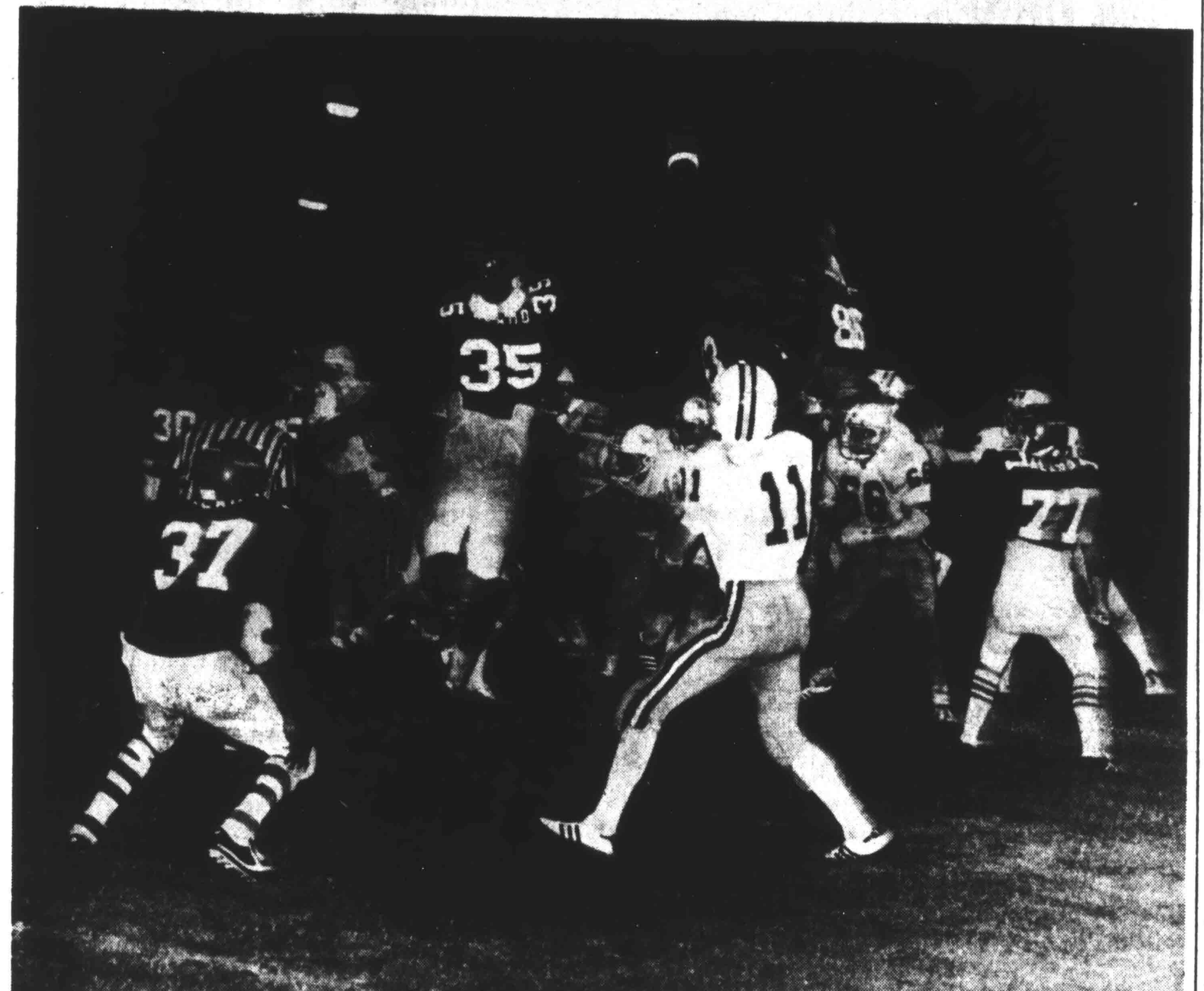

South Dyersburg Gains Vet Clinic

A branch office of the Dyer County Animal Hospital located in Dyersburg opened on Highway 51, South, Aug. 21st.

Dr. Bob Wilbanks, of the Animal Hospital, said the new facility will be staffed by Dr. Jimmy Crisp, a 1981 graduate of the University of Tennessee School of Medicine of Knoxville.

The branch office is located adjacent to the former office quarters of Dr. N.D. Thurmond, DVM. Thurmond is retiring from active practice, but will be affiliated with the Animal Hospital in an advisory capacity.

Crisp, a West Tennesseean, was raised on a beef cattle and soybean farm near Trenton in Gibson County and graduated from Animal Hospital High School in 1974.

He attended the University of Tennessee at Martin graduating with high honors in Animal Science in 1978. While at UTM, Dr. Crisp was a member of Phi Kappa Phi honorary society, Alpha Zeta, and Phi Sigma Kappa social fraternity.

Since graduation, Dr. Crisp has been in practice with Dr. Harry Ward, of Fulton, Ky. His experience ranges from farm animals, such as swine, beef, and dairy - to the more companion-type animal such as the household dog or cat.

The South Dyersburg office is open Monday thru Friday from 7:30 til 5:30 and on Saturday from 8 til 3. The office is closed on Wednesdays.

The clinic is classified as a full service veterinary facility with capacity to hospitalize animals if necessary.

Animals requiring complicated laboratory tests, X-rays, and intensive over-night care will be transported to the large facility on St. John Extended.

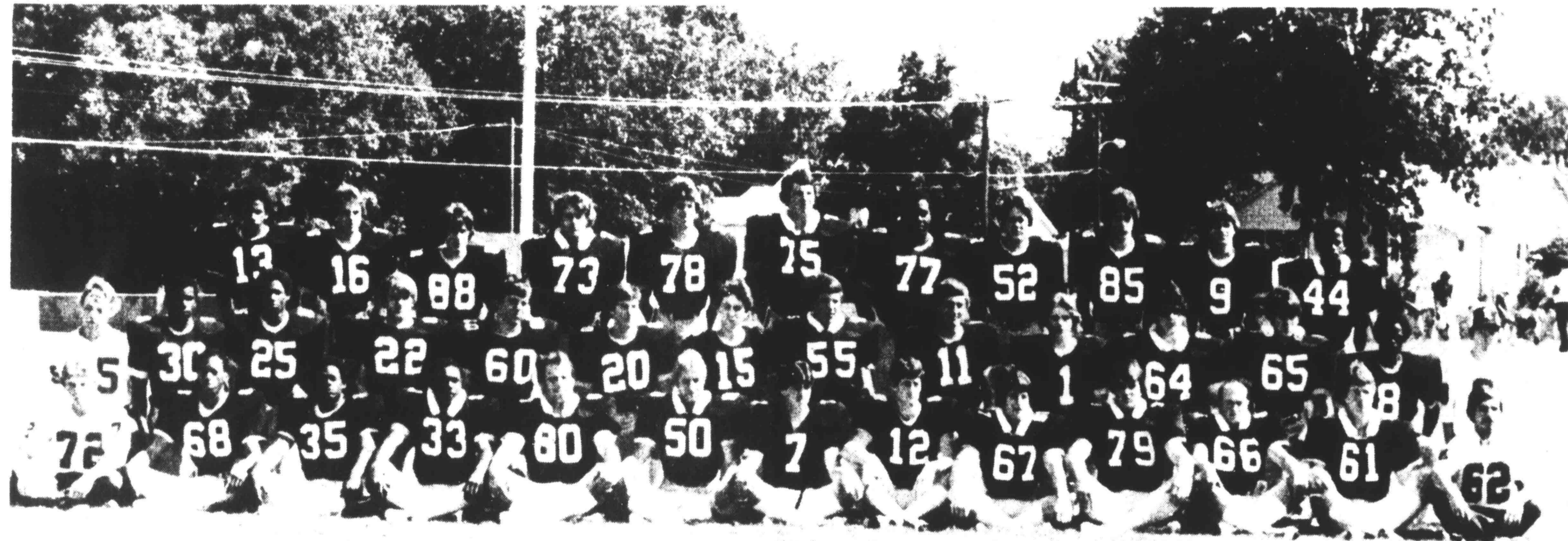

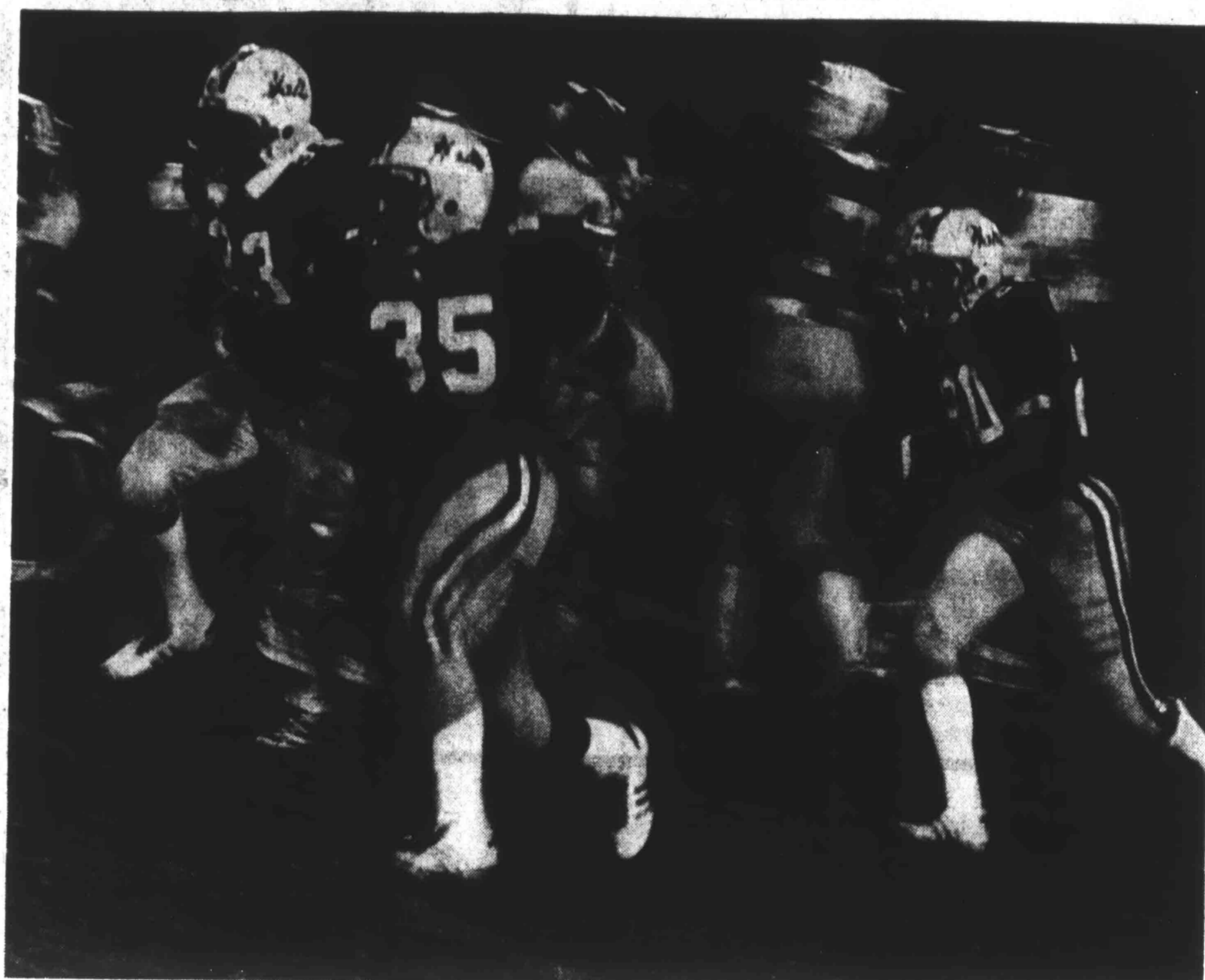

Tyree is probably a good candidate, but we cannot believe he is as capable as Alexander.

By the way, one more gripe. We think that the mayor's race in Memphis is likely to prove the most re-educating thing to happen in Memphis since the killing of Dr. Martin Luther King. Memphis would have done well to have allowed the city council to select a mayor for the remainder of Wyeth Chandler's term.

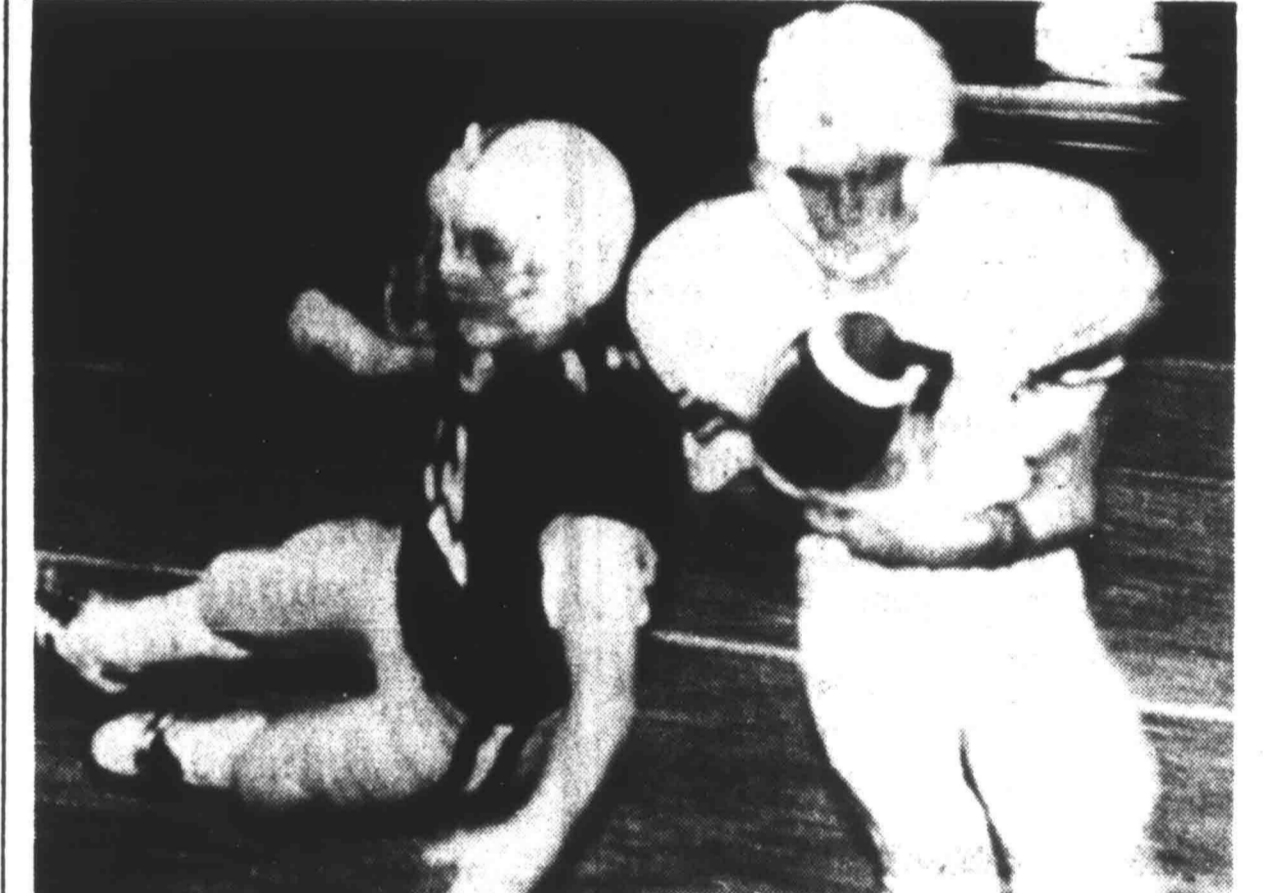
