1. SCHOOL DISCIPLINE ACT "PUBLIC HEARING NOTICE"

In carrying out the requirements of the "School Discipline Act" passed by the Tennessee Legislature, Lauderdale County Board of Education will conduct a public hearing in conjunction with its regular monthly board meeting scheduled for September 9, 1982 at 5:30 p.m. in the Court Room of Lauderdale County Court House. The school discipline code is being revised under the requirements of the new law and public imput is welcome prior to its final approval by the Board.

"It is the intent of the general assembly in enacting this law to secure a safe enviroment in which the education of the students of Tennessee may occur." This act deals with the safety of students and teachers, authorization to search lockers, persons, containers, vehicles, the use of metal detectors, use of animals, the reporting of probable cause by principal to law enforcement officials, the disposal of contraband and the defense of school personnel by education agency—indemnity. Effective date current.

#### SYSTEM-WIDE GRADING POLICY

The Tennessee State Board of Education has passed the following regulation found on page \*B.(e) Page 35 (e) of Rules, Regulations, and Minimum Standards to which Lauderdale County Schools will comply for the 1982-83 school year. "Local school systems shall develop and implement a system-wide grading policy. Beginning at grade four, the grading policy shall include a state-established minimum standard of 70 percent for passing and shall be based on subject matter presented. The local Board will determine if this applies also to K-3.

State Grid Finals Set For Nashville

The Tennessee Secondary Schools Athletics Association's Board of Control voted unanimously Aug. 28th to let the Nashville Area Junior Chamber of Commerce hold state final football games, in all three classes, in Vanderbilt University's Dudley Stadium Dec. 4th. with Minnie Pearl as honorary chairman.

The new plan will be financially beneficial to most playoff finalists. In past years, Class A finalists have averaged payoffs of approximately \$825, Class AA \$1,600 and Class AAA \$4,200. Under the Junior Chamber plan, schools will receive expenses plus guarentees of \$1,500 for Class A teams, \$2,500 for AA and \$4,000 for AAA.

TSSAA Executive Director Gill Gideon presented Board members the results of a survey of schools, showing an overwhelming majority approved the moving of the football playoffs to a

IT PASSED in every section of the state with East Tennessee voting 55-25 in favor of it while Middle Tennessee approved 68-11 and West Tennessee endorsed it 49-8.

"It's obvious the schools liked the idea," Gideon said. "I like it for two reasons. As purely a football fan, it will afford me the opportunity to see three fine games played in ideal surroundings. "From the TSSAA standpoint, I like it because it will add additional pageantry to the games. It

will assist fans from the schools in the Eaststate and Weststate who won't have to make the long trips they have made in the past. I'm also excited about the cooperation and willingness to work together that the Junior Chamber and Vanderbilt's Athletic Department have exhibited." A number of other states play their champion-

ship games at a central site. For instance, Missouri has parlayed it's "Show-Me" Classic Day at Busch Stadium in St. Louis to a statewide sporting and social event.







fascinating new exhibit cur rently in progress at the Abraham Lincoln Museum on the

campus of Lincoln Memorial University at Harrogate, Tennessee. The exhibit, running through November 1, is perlection of Civil War medicine ever assembled. "A collection of this cal-

iber will very likely never be chief conservator Edgar Arch from a variety of private and public sources. "It is unique after the war. Most of what was left disappeared into private collections. "Civil War medicine was

surprisingly advanced in some respects," Archer notes. "And the battlefield provided a place for experimenting in new techniques, but infection was a major hazard from any standard battlefield form of surgery. One Civil War audier's chances of surviving battle were approximately 99%, but his chances of surviving the hospital if he were wounded were about 30%. The wide use of amputation is evident in the wide array o medical kits on display in the Lincoln Museum exhibit.

"At the beginning of the war the United States Army owned exactly one stethoscope and one medical manual." Archer said. "As the war progressed the Union Army developed standar medical kits, but Confederate surgeons throughout the wa had to order their own custom medical kits from manufackits are likely to be exactly the same. The one thing they all had in common was a complete set of amputation in

"Dentists on both sides had much the same problem Their kits leaned heavily on large files, heavy probes an pulling pliers. Extraction was as standard a practice for dentists as amputation wa for surgeons. The kits we have on display truly show the horrors of Civil War dentistry

One of the most intriguir items in the exhibit is a di play of dispensary chemistry which in the modern world known as pharmacy. Drugs range from morphine and quinine. "Most were admini solutely no knowledge of the hazards of drug addiction Archer says. "A wounde soldier who spent several weeks or months in a hospita. stuffed full of morphine c opium often had quite a addiction problem when he was finally released.

"Ether and chloroform were also among the relatively new tools available to Civil War surgeons. Ether, unfortunately, is a highly vola tile substance and since can dles and lanterns were the usual forms of light, doctors spent much of the war tryin to find a happy medium b tween light and safety. Ex plosion was a constant risk in a Civil War operating room.' Another fascinating feature

of the exhibit is a Civil War ambulance and its blood stained stretcher. The Englishmade undercarriage indicates vehicle since the Union Army had its own manufacturers.

#### **Grant Reclaims** Old Gravel Pits

Gov. Lamar Alexander today announced the award of a \$20,000 state grant to the Lauderdale County Soil Conservation District to reclaim two abandoned gravel pits near Halls.

The grant will provide 60 percent of funds for the proiect, and the landowner will finance 40 percent of the cost of reclamation. Austin Gaines, state direc-

tor of Surface Mining, said the two sites totalling 21 acres were mined prior to passage of a law in 1972 that required reclamation by surface mining operations. The abandoned mineland program was established to reclaim that land which had been mined and abandoned prior to the state
