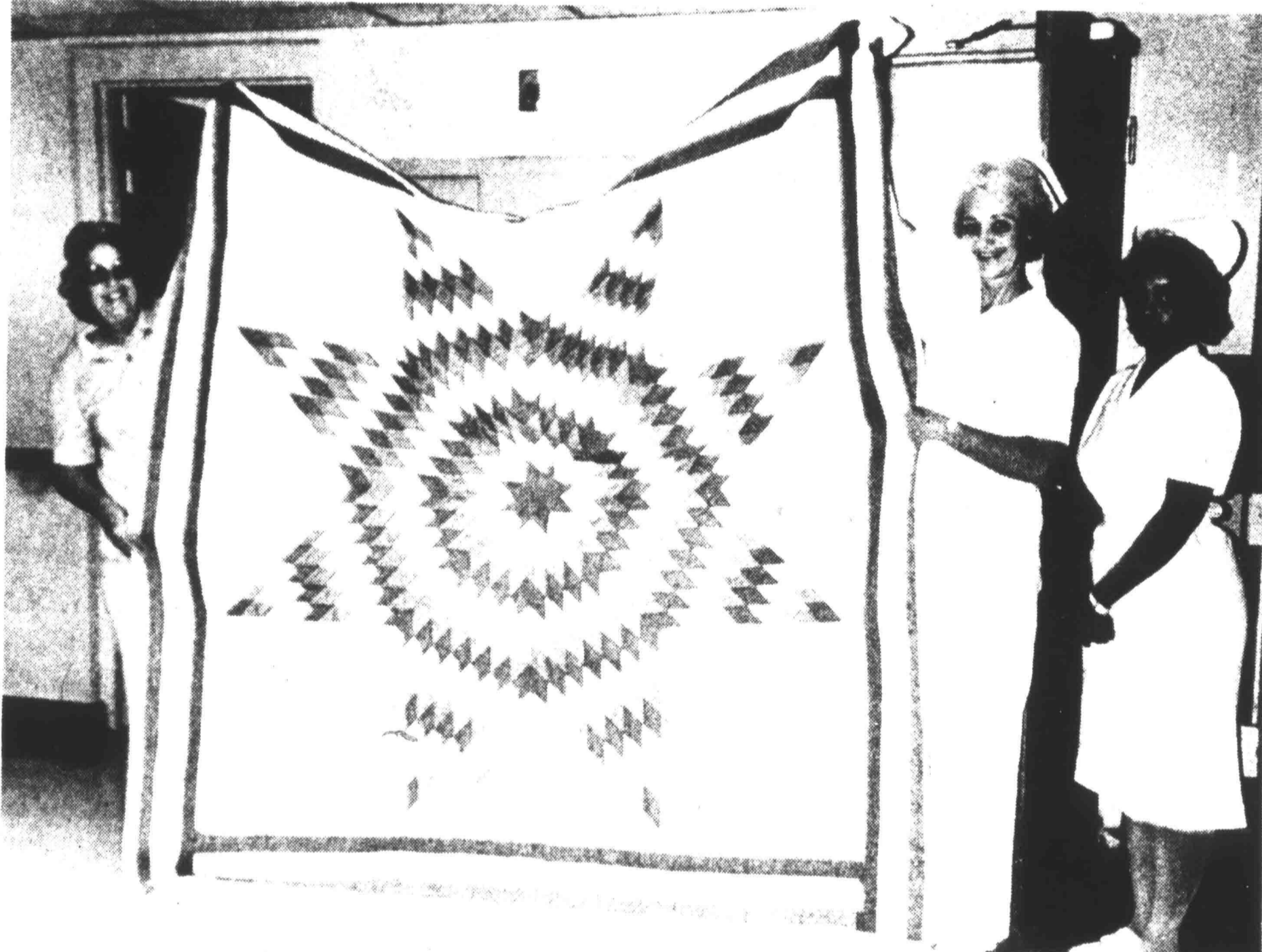
Revival Near At Woodville

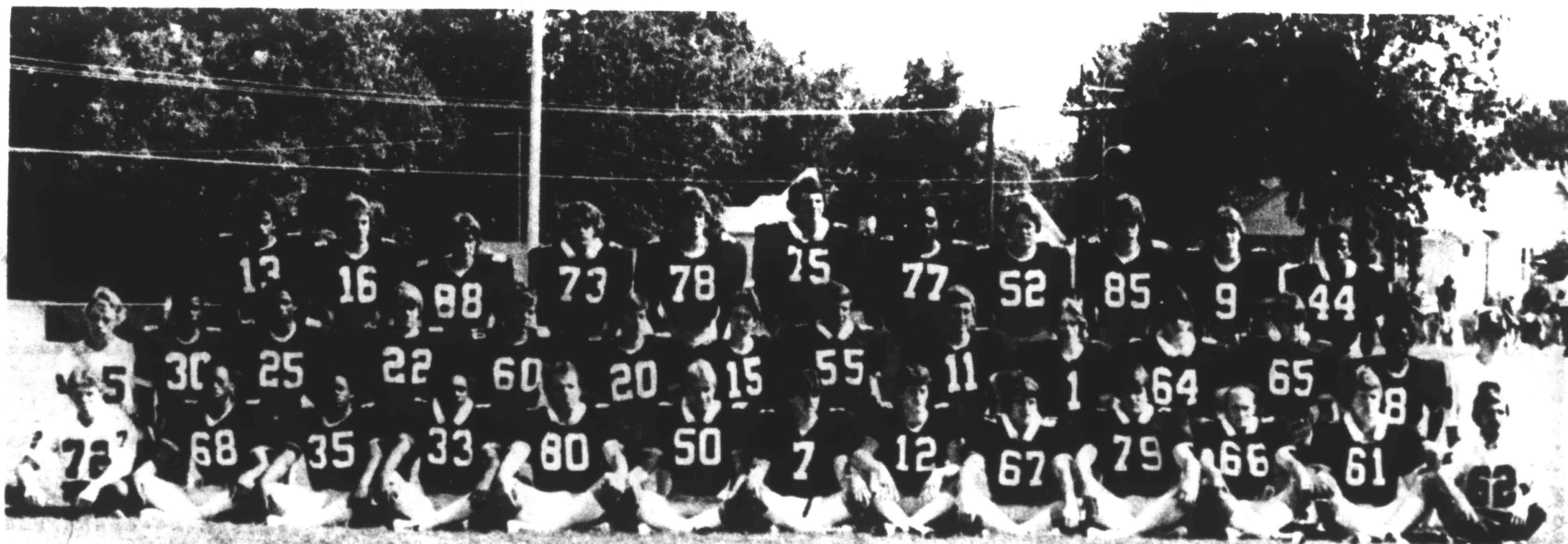

1. SCHOOL DISCIPLINE ACT "PUBLIC HEARING NOTICE"

In carrying out the requirements of the "School Discipline Act" passed by the Tennessee Legislature, Lauderdale County Board of Education will conduct a public hearing in conjunction with its regular monthly board meeting scheduled for September 9, 1982 at 5:30 p.m. in the Court Room of Lauderdale County Court House. The school discipline code is being revised under the requirements of the new law and public input is welcome prior to its final approval by the Board.

2. SCHOOL SECURITY ACT

"It is the intent of the general assembly in enacting this law to secure a safe environment in which the education of the students of Tennessee may occur." This act deals with the safety of students and teachers, authorization to search lockers, persons, containers, vehicles, the use of metal detectors, use of animals, the reporting of probable cause by principal to law enforcement officials, the disposal of contraband and the defense of school personnel by education agency—indemnity. Effective date current.

3. SYSTEM-WIDE GRADING POLICY

The Tennessee State Board of Education has passed the following regulation found on page *B.(e) Page 35 (e) of Rules, Regulations, and Minimum Standards to which Lauderdale County Schools will comply for the 1982-83 school year. "Local school systems shall develop and implement a system-wide grading policy. Beginning at grade four, the grading policy shall include a state-established minimum standard of 70 percent for passing and shall be based on subject matter presented. The local Board will determine if this applies also to K-3.

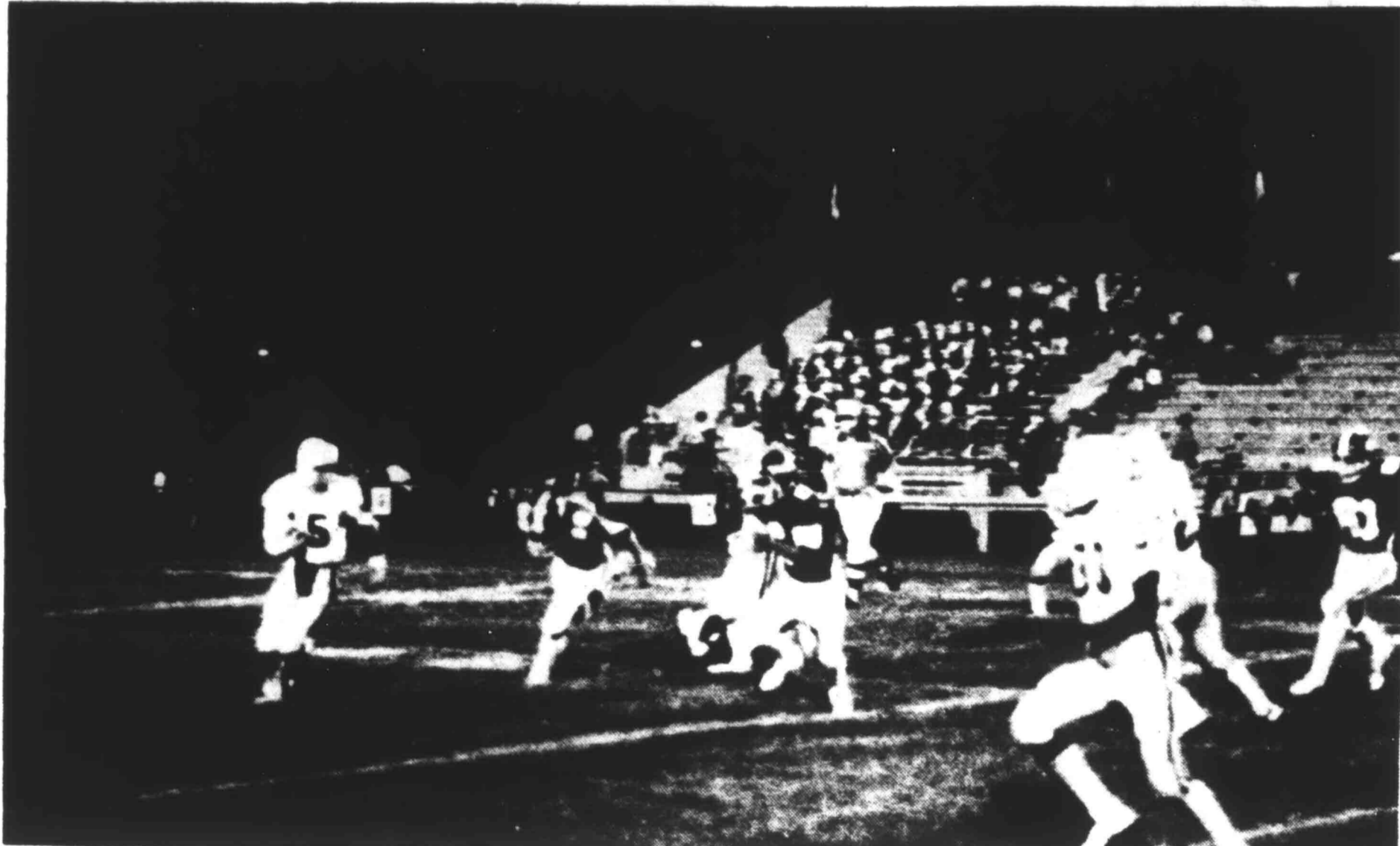

Grant Reclaims Old Gravel Pits

Gov. Lamar Alexander today announced the award of a \$20,000 state grant to the Lauderdale County Soil Conservation District to reclaim two abandoned gravel pits near Halls.

The grant will provide 60 percent of funds for the project, and the landowner will finance 40 percent of the cost of reclamation.

Austin Gaines, state director of Surface Mining, said the two sites totalling 21 acres were mined prior to passage of a law in 1972 that required reclamation by surface mining operations.

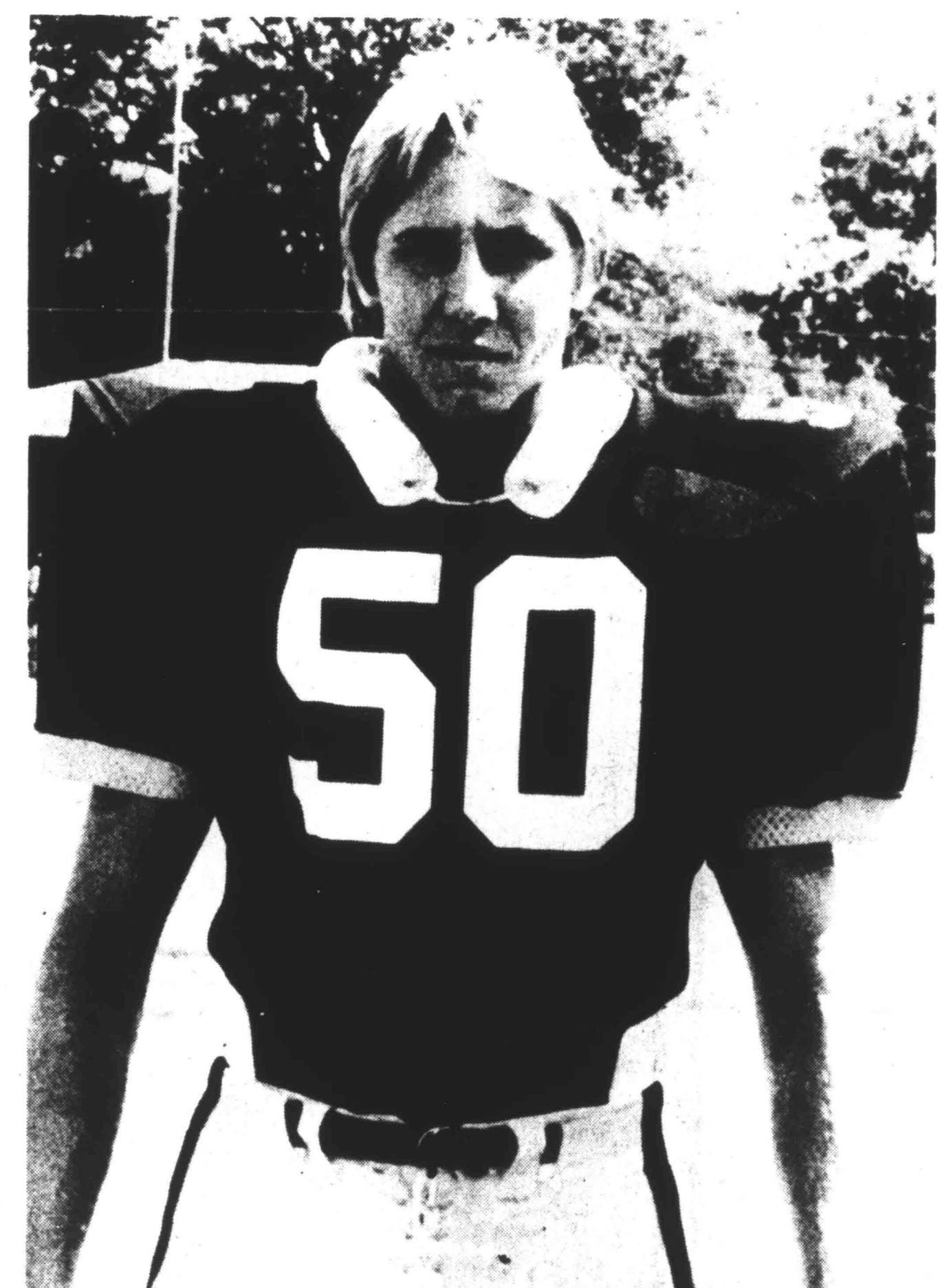

Inheritance Law Changes Pressed

Early this year a committee of County Farm Bureau Presidents was appointed by the Tennessee Farm Bureau Federation Board to study Tennessee's Inheritance Tax Laws, and make recommendations or changes the committee felt needed to be made. The committee report was given at the Annual County Farm Bureau Presidents' Conference last month, and the highlights of the committee study were:

- (1) Increase the exemption for Class A beneficiaries from the current \$120,000 to \$600,000 which will match the federal law.
- (2) Give an unlimited marital deduction for the present one-half or \$250,000. This would also match the federal law.
- (3) Change the current Class A and Class B beneficiaries to just one class.
- (4) Change in the gift tax procedures.

Farmers and others who do not have wills are urged to give some thought to this matter. It is more important than most people realize regardless of the size of the estate. We have in our Extension Office information on how to develop a will.

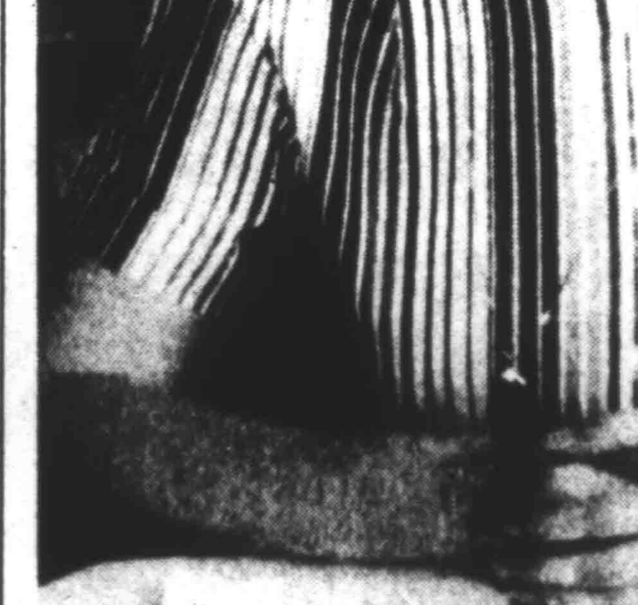

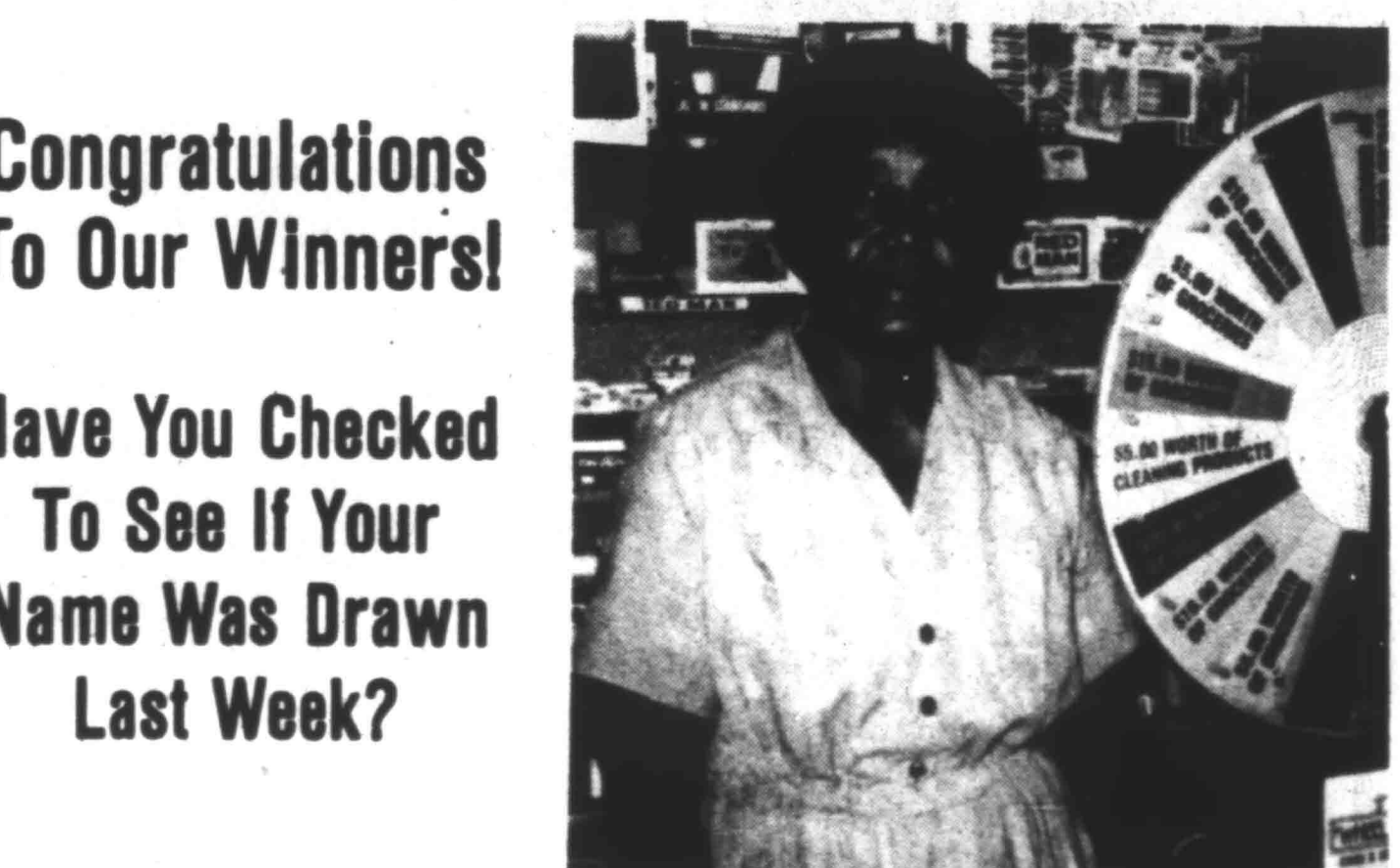

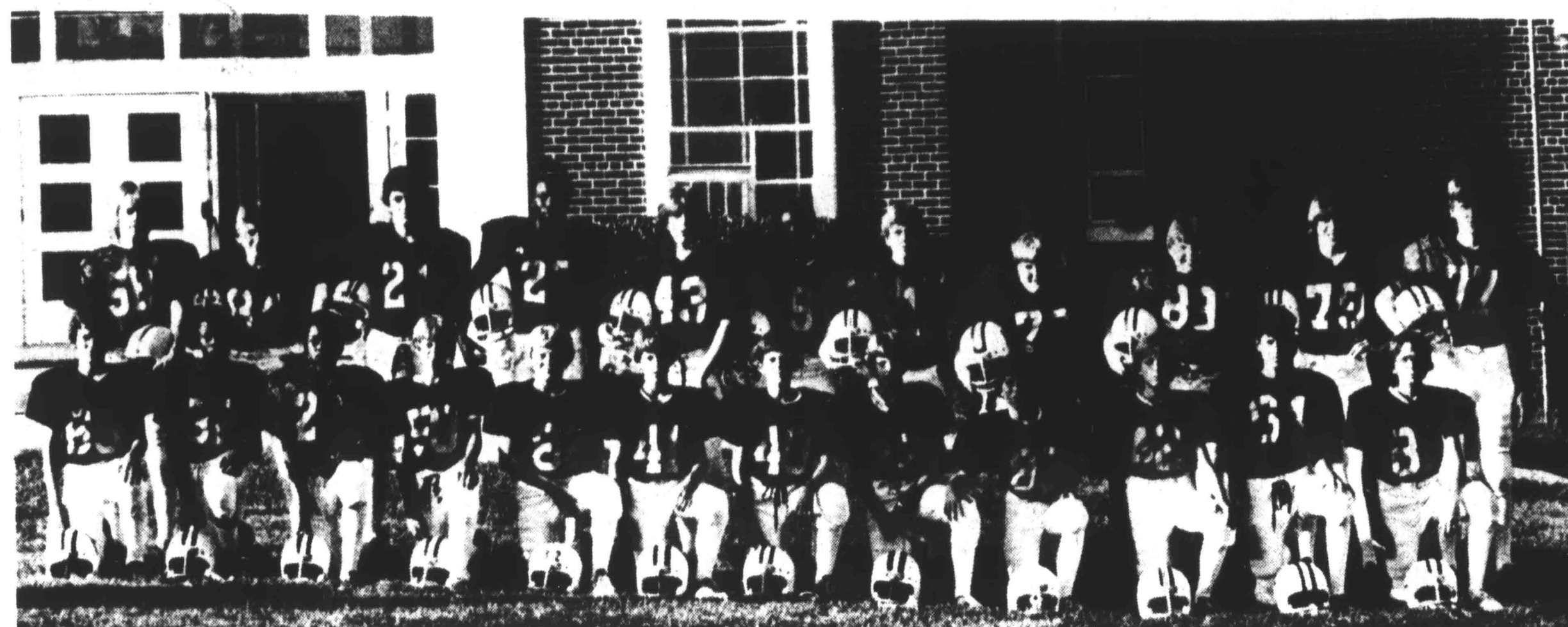

County Receives More From State

State Representative Floyd H. Crain has announced that during fiscal year 1982-83 Lauderdale County will receive approximately \$18 million in state appropriations. Also, Lauderdale County will receive a portion of the \$1.2 billion of federal funds included in Tennessee's 4.2 billion dollar budget as adopted by the 92nd General Assembly.

"Excluding highway construction," Crain said, "Lauderdale County's 1982-83 share of the state budget represents a \$2,900,000, or 18.5% growth."

The second-term lawmaker listed budget appropriations for Lauderdale County in the following general categories: \$4.6 million for education (kindergarten through 12th grade and higher education); \$978,817 for county roads and city streets; \$427,851 in shared state tax collections; \$1.4 million for health and social services; \$265,768 for justice and public safety; \$340,458 for recreation and resources

development; \$920,629 in miscellaneous items; \$65,000 for capital projects; and \$2 million for state highway projects.

Crain said, "The \$978,817 cited for county roads and city streets, generated entirely from petroleum taxes, is estimated to be distributed as follows: \$820,021 for Lauderdale County; \$9,500 for Gates; \$42,051 for Halls, \$96,757 for Ripley."

The proposed budget allocates \$3,524,379 for the Lauderdale County School District.

"The lion's share of the school funds go to the Tennessee Foundation Program which is primarily teachers' salaries," Crain said. The county's portion of the Foundation Program is estimated to be \$3,128,742.

Other school funds go for pupil transportation, capital outlay, textbooks, food services and teachers' sick leave and retirement.

Estimates, also reflect that Lauderdale County will receive \$427,851 from state tax collections shared with local governments.

Crain stated that health and social services' appropriations benefiting Lauderdale County residents include \$379,371 for Human Services programs; and \$17,210 for Community Mental Health and Mental Retardation Program.

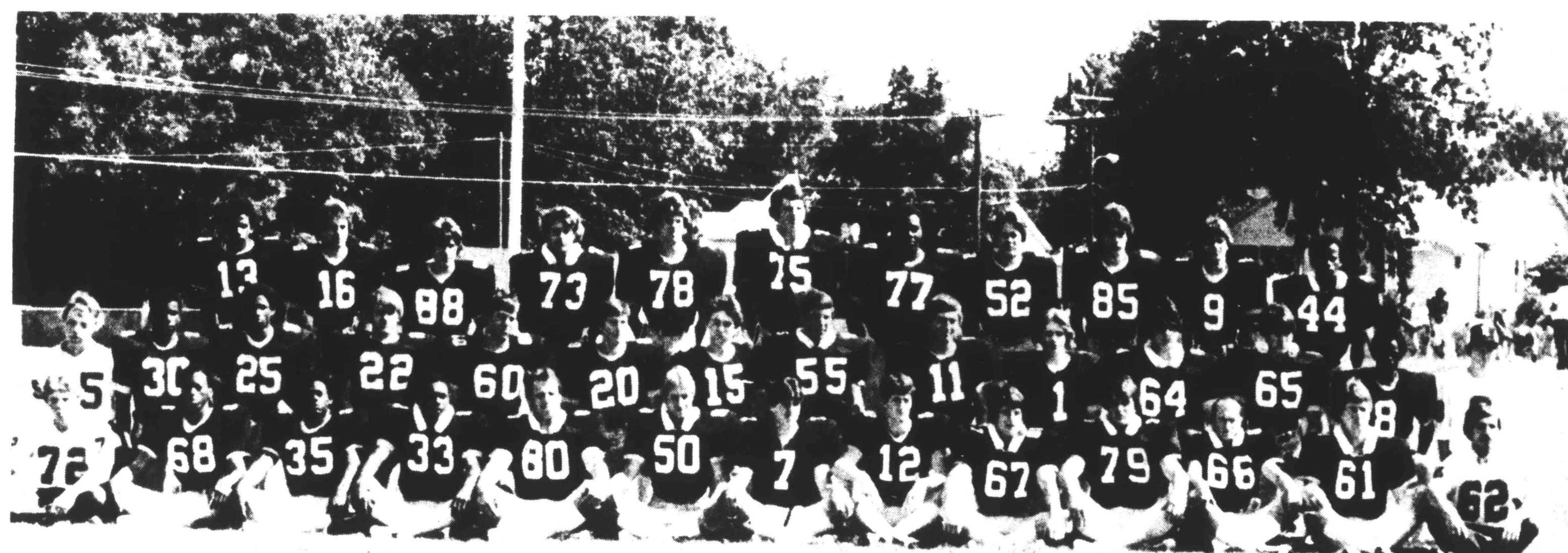

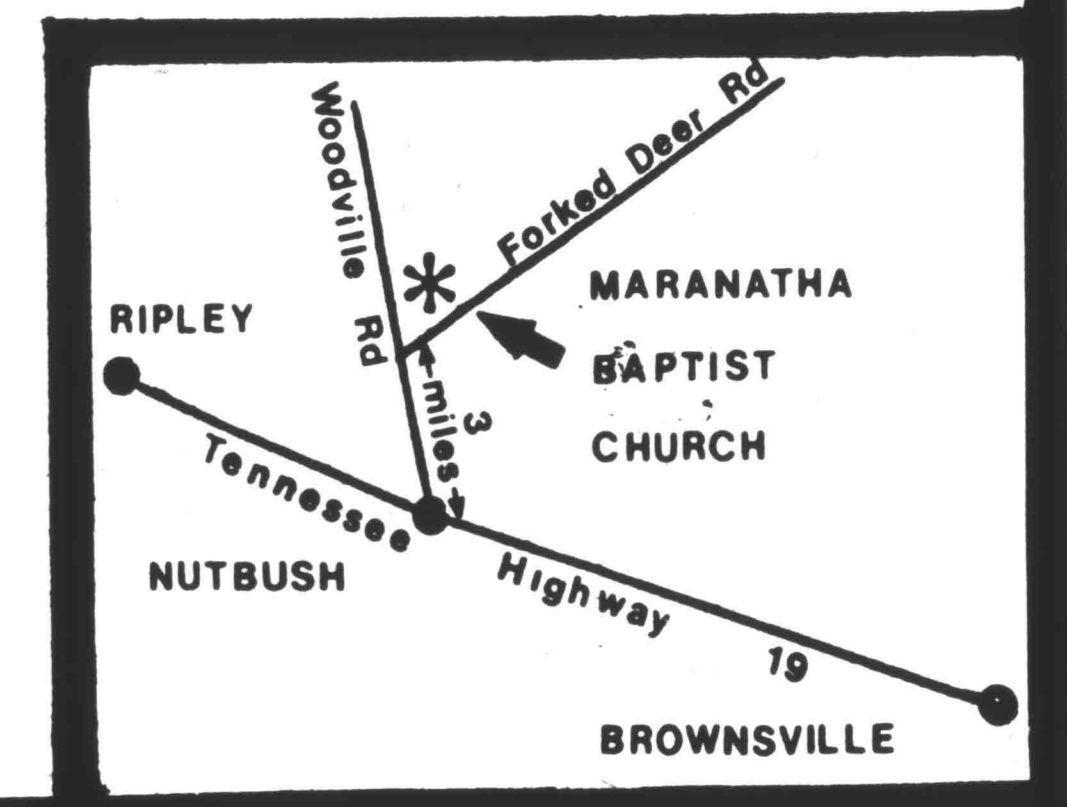

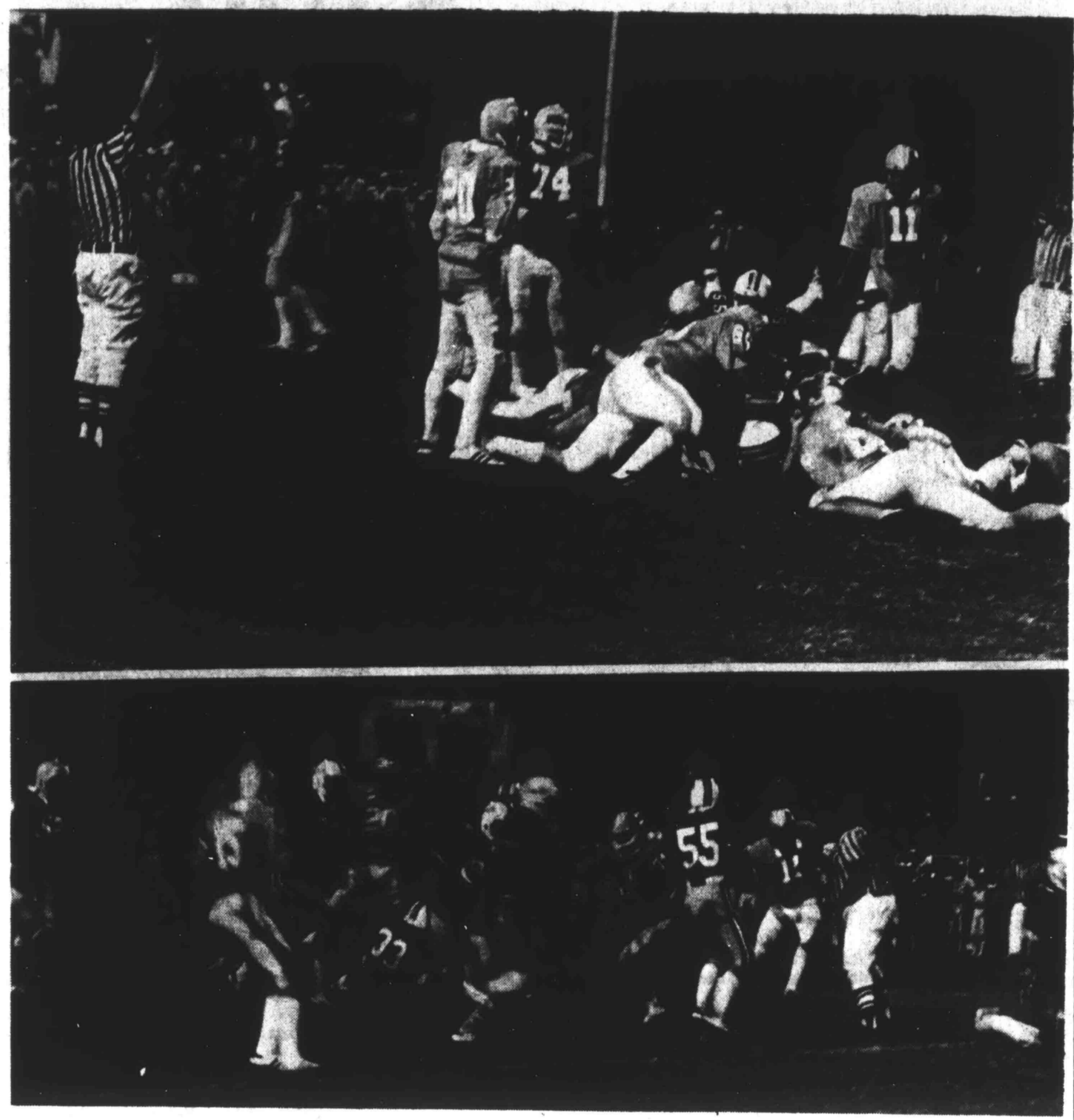

Winning Tigers Arkansas Bound

The Halls Tigers, showing a 3-1 slate after a 20-0 win over the Dyer County Choctaws last Friday night, will be slight underdogs as they travel to Greene County Tech at Jonesboro, Ark., this Friday.

Greene County has a similar 3-1 record after being upset, 16-0, by Trumann, Ark., last Friday night.

The Tigers got off to a winning record last year with a tough win 14-0 victory over Greene County in Halls. Greene County played tough defense last year but could never get their offense clicking. This year, however, led by Quarterback Phillip Dunn the Eagles have been moving the ball well with Dunn averaging more than 100 yards a game until Trumann stopped him Friday night.

The home field advantage will give Greene County a slight edge, but a tough Tiger defense could be the deciding factor.

In the win over visiting Dyer County Friday night the Tigers sputtered at times, but completely dominated the Choctaws defensively with the Newbern eleven's three first downs coming with the aid of penalties. For the second week in a row the Tig-

ers stopped their opposition with a total of 37 yards and three first downs.

Moving the ball well, the Tigers took the opening kickoff and drove deep into Newbern territory, only to be stopped by a Dyer County interception in the end zone. After Dyer County was forced to punt, the Tigers again moved deep into enemy territory, but were frustrated by a fumble with the first quarter ending scoreless.

The Tigers put their first points on the scoreboard with 7:28 remaining in the second quarter with Stephen Hudson setting up the tally with a 24-yard run and then scoring from the 1-yard stripe. Playing without Kicker Danny Edenfield who had been disqualified, along with Newbern center, Larry Rhodes, for unsportsmanlike conduct, the Tigers went for two, but were stopped short and led, 6-0, at halftime.

With second-string quarterback at the helm as starting QB Fletcher Taylor was sidelined with leg cramps, the Tigers moved 64-yards for the second score at 3:13 in the third quarter. Burnette hit three of four passes with Mike Blackwood, taking the final strike in the end zone for a 12-0 lead. A two-point pass to Blackwood was nullified by a penalty and then Burnette found David Hardy free for

the two points and a 14-0 lead. Earlier in the game Burnette was intercepted by Newbern's Daniel Mobler, but made the saving tackle as Mobler seemed likely to go all the way.

The final Tiger points came on a Fletcher Taylor pass to Scott Meeks with Taylor trying for the two-point conversion stopped at the 6-inch line.

Stephen Hudson led Halls rushers with 113 yards in 24 carries, David Blackwood got 38 yards in 6 carries, Bobby McCadney added 26 on 5 attempts and Pat Smith carried the ball 3 times for 16 yards.

The game was marred with seeming indiscretion on the part of the officials with no penalties stepped off during the first half and then three major penalties within the first three minutes of the second half, two against the Tigers and one against the Choctaws.

Sophomore tackle David Hughes, led the Tiger defense with 10 stops. LaWayne England, Dennis Newman, and Chris Dennis each had five.

ASKS CO-OPERATION

COULD HELP

It has occurred to us that football in Tennessee probably needs four classifications, rather than the present three.

Under the present plan, schools near the top or bottom of a classification are having trouble maintaining schedules or competing in some instances.

Halls is near the top in Class A, and many schools have stopped playing the Tigers. Lake County is another example with the same problems.

Rumor has it that Ripley may have to return to Class AAA. They have been doing well in Class AA but were unable to compete with much success in Class AAA several years ago.

Dyersburg, on the low end of AAA, has not been able to field a winning team in a number of years.

We are not familiar with all of the problems of classification. There probably are some reasons for not having the fourth classification, although most states around us do have four groups.

We have no idea how the TSSAA and coaches would receive such a proposal, but it would seem to us that such a change would solve many problems.

COMPLETELY RIDICULOUS

Recent efforts to pass anti-abortion and prayer in school laws seem to us to have been handled in a completely ridiculous manner.

Such bills have been attached to budget bills that must be acted upon, but filibusters and every type of delaying tactics have been used to delay votes because of opposition to amendments.

The Tennessee legislature cannot attach any amendment to a bill that is not appropriated in the heading. This prevents attaching unrelated amendments.

The issues of prayer in schools and anti-abortion need to be decided on their own merits and not attached to unrelated bills. Congress would do well to pass rules eliminating such procedures and have each bill voted on according to its own merits.
