

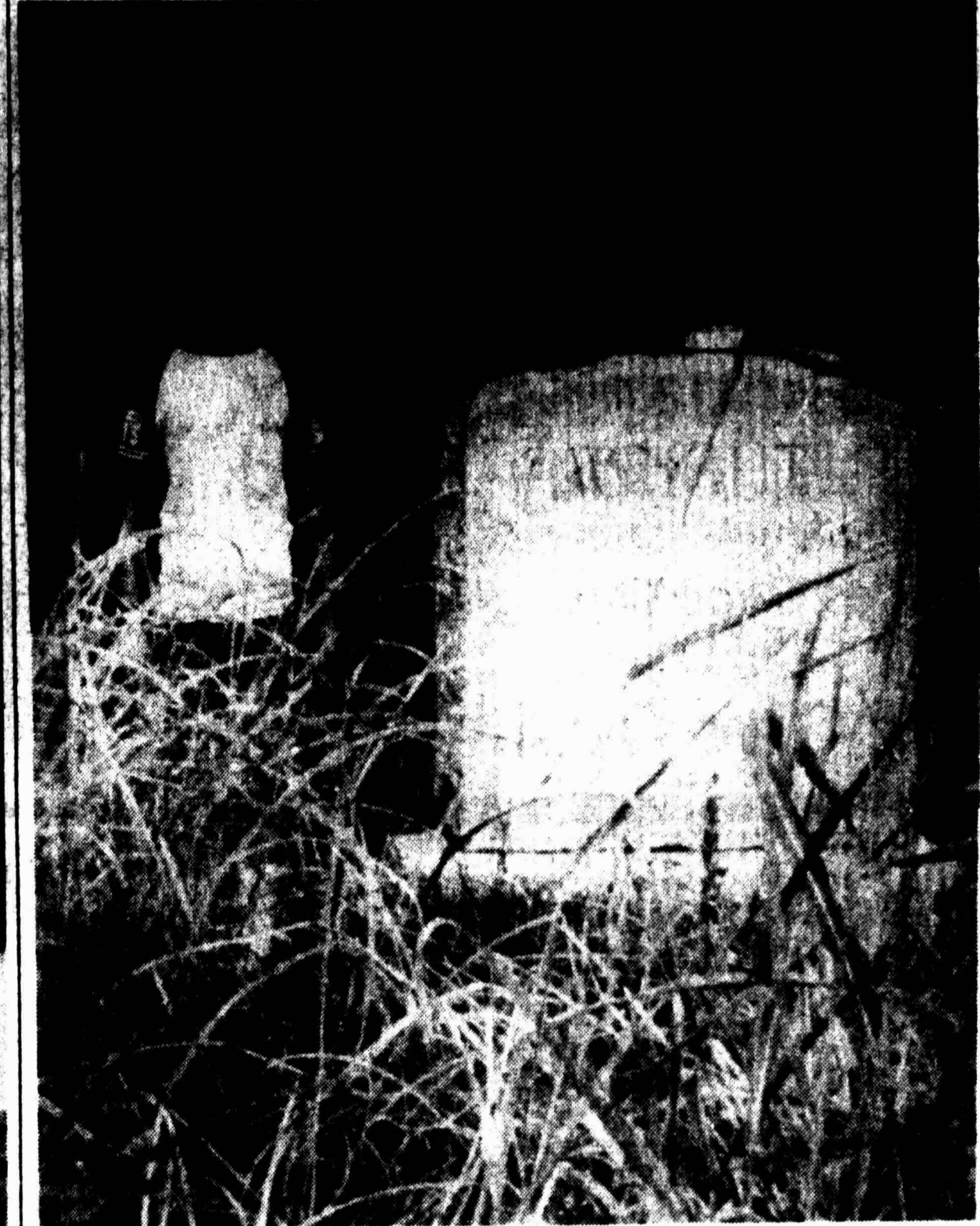
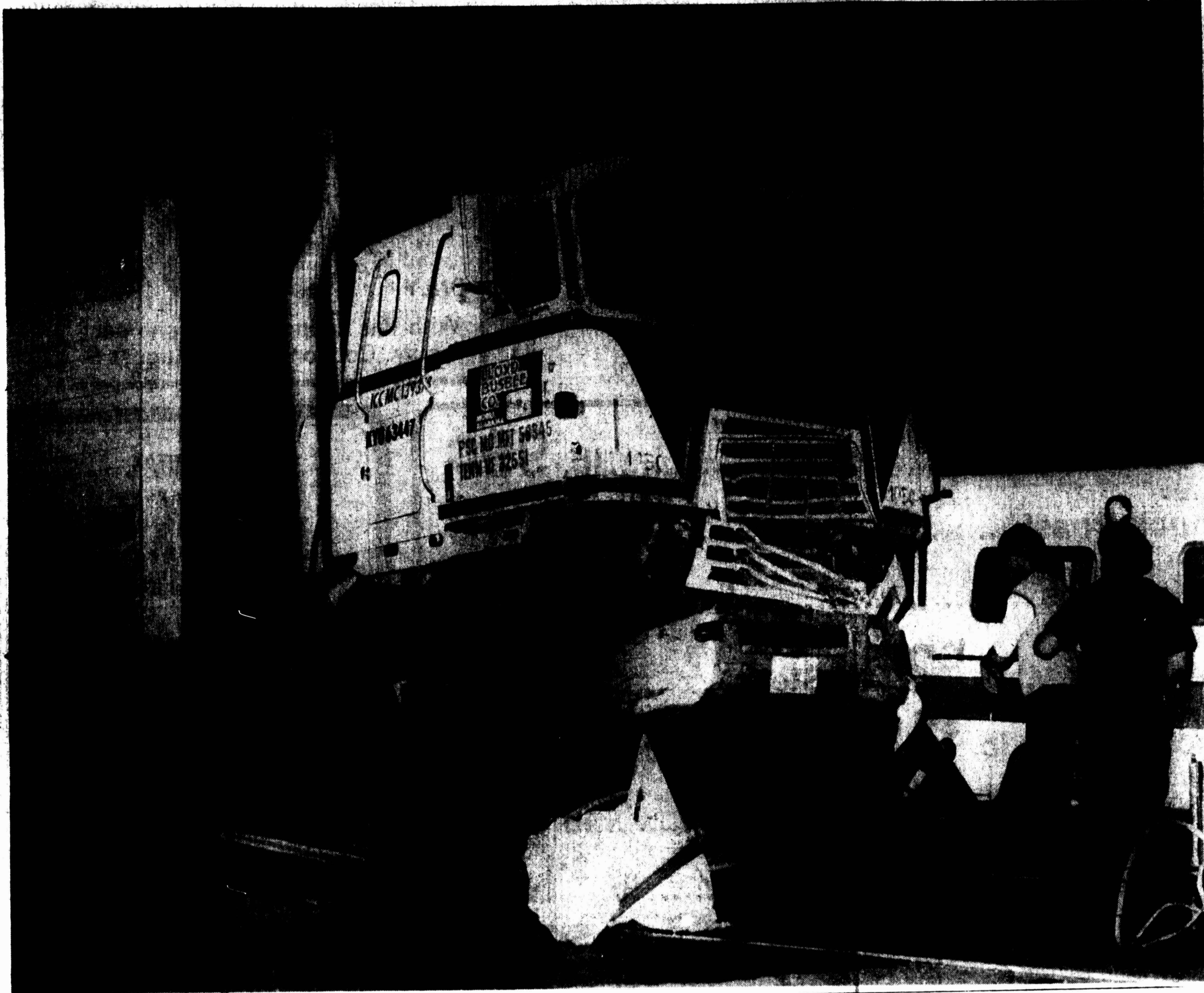

Services for Mr. Jackson, 82, were at 3:30 p.m. Sunday in Spring Hill Missionary Baptist Church, with burial there; he leaves a daughter, Mrs. Virginia Jordan, of Memphis, and two sisters, Mrs. Virgie Handy and Mrs. Nora Lee Means, of Chicago, Ill. Services for his wife, Louise, widow of Thomas A. Halliburton, were at 2 p.m. Monday in Morning Star Baptist Church, where she had been choir president; burial was in Canfield Cemetery. Born in Ripley July 31, 1917, daughter of the late Bert and Bertha Oliver, she was 65. A nurse in Lauderdale County Hospital 15 years and a high school teacher's aide two years, she had been president of the regional Baptist Convention choirs and the county Diabetes Association and had served on the city Planning Commission. She leaves a sister, Mrs. LaBelle Johnson, of Detroit, Mich.; a foster brother, Decatur Johnson, of St. Louis, Mo.; two foster sisters, Mrs. Ruthie M. Griffin and Mrs. Katie Bullock, of Ripley; and an uncle, George Halfacre, for whom she cared until unable to do so.

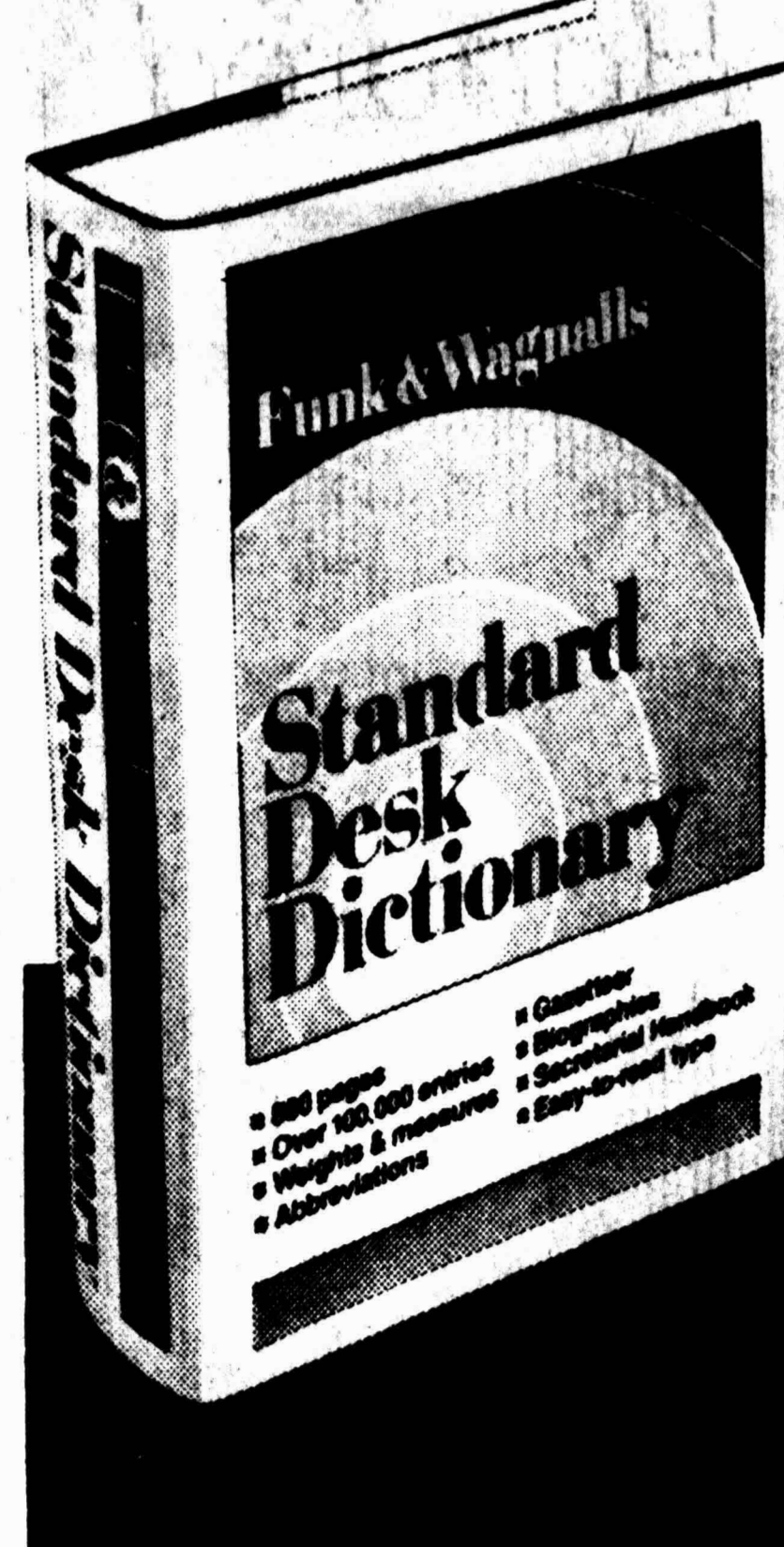

# A Choice Collection Of Indian Relics

Many people in Lauderdale County have collections of arrowheads and Indian artifacts, but few have collected as long as Joe Hurt, who has been at it since he was 12.

His home, off the By-Pass near Halls, which he shares with his wife, Thelma, attests this.

His daughter, Mrs. Vernon McBride, Jr., of Ripley, grew up among Indian relics.

His mother, El Reno Clayton Hurt, was the first white child born in El Reno, Okla., on the Arapaho Reservation.

The first thing he had in his collection was a pair of moccasins his mother had made for his father before they were married, more than 70 years ago.

"The moccasins were made by an Indian woman whose name was Mary Lona, because she was never married," says Mr. Hurt. "She was also a hunch-back."

This is not, however, why he started his collection.

"When I was a boy of 12, and they were building Halls

High School, I found some arrowheads, and then some were found when they were digging a grave across from the school in Halls Cemetery, which I later received.

"I left the collection when I ran away to Oklahoma at the age of 17."

In the 1940s, he built the two-story house in which he and his wife now reside. He keeps most of his collection in a chest there.

He has found a few arrowheads and instruments in this county but has bought some from Arkansas.

He carries with him a "flint stick" about four feet long, to flick at the dirt in his quest for relics, but he says would never disturb a grave.

He doesn't know how old some of his finds are but believes they may be 8,000 years old.

From the smallest bird arrows to a 7-inch spear point, knives, drills, hoes, and meal stone, he has a fascinating hobby and link to the past.

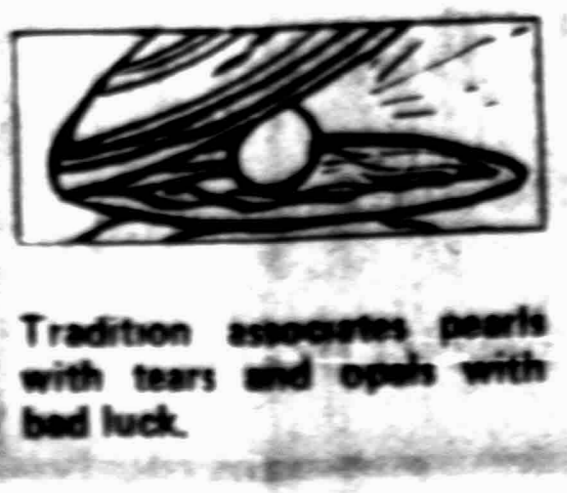

## Riplian Building At Poplar Grove

Far north in the county, at Poplar Grove, is one of the most peaceful sights for miles around.

Down a narrow little dirt lane, a one-room log cabin is nestled under large oak and gum trees which provide cool shade on a hot August day.

This cabin belongs to Raymond Kelly, of 493 Perkins Ripley. He built it with the help of the late Jerry Corlew, his father-in-law. Raymond Watts, and his wife's uncle, L. H. Watts.

The cabin measures 20x20 feet and has a 20x11 foot loft which can serve as a bedroom.

Kelly has worked for Turner Dairy, driving a truck, for 21 years.

"This has given me something to do on my day off," he says. "It's taken two years to almost finish it," Kelly says, "but it's been an enjoyable hobby and most rewarding. It's almost finished except for the fireplace and the bathroom, in which Raymond was installing a red clay foot tub the day of our visit."

The logs in the cabin came from a log house built by slaves in the early 1860s, owned by Mrs. Montell Carter, at Curve.

The logs are put together with cement, so that the house is air tight.

Inside are many things that take us back into time.

Over a little desk given him by his mother, which dates back to the 1930s, hangs a mirror framed by a mule collar.

In the corner of the kitchen is a cream separator used in many homes in the 1930s and 1940s.

On the wall next to the door is an oak mantel which will frame the fireplace. Kelly plans to start soon.

Out back, down a shaded lane is a tranquil, spring fed pond, with ducks dabbling about. This pond served as baptismal waters 60 or 70 years ago, and also as community laundry day on Thursdays.

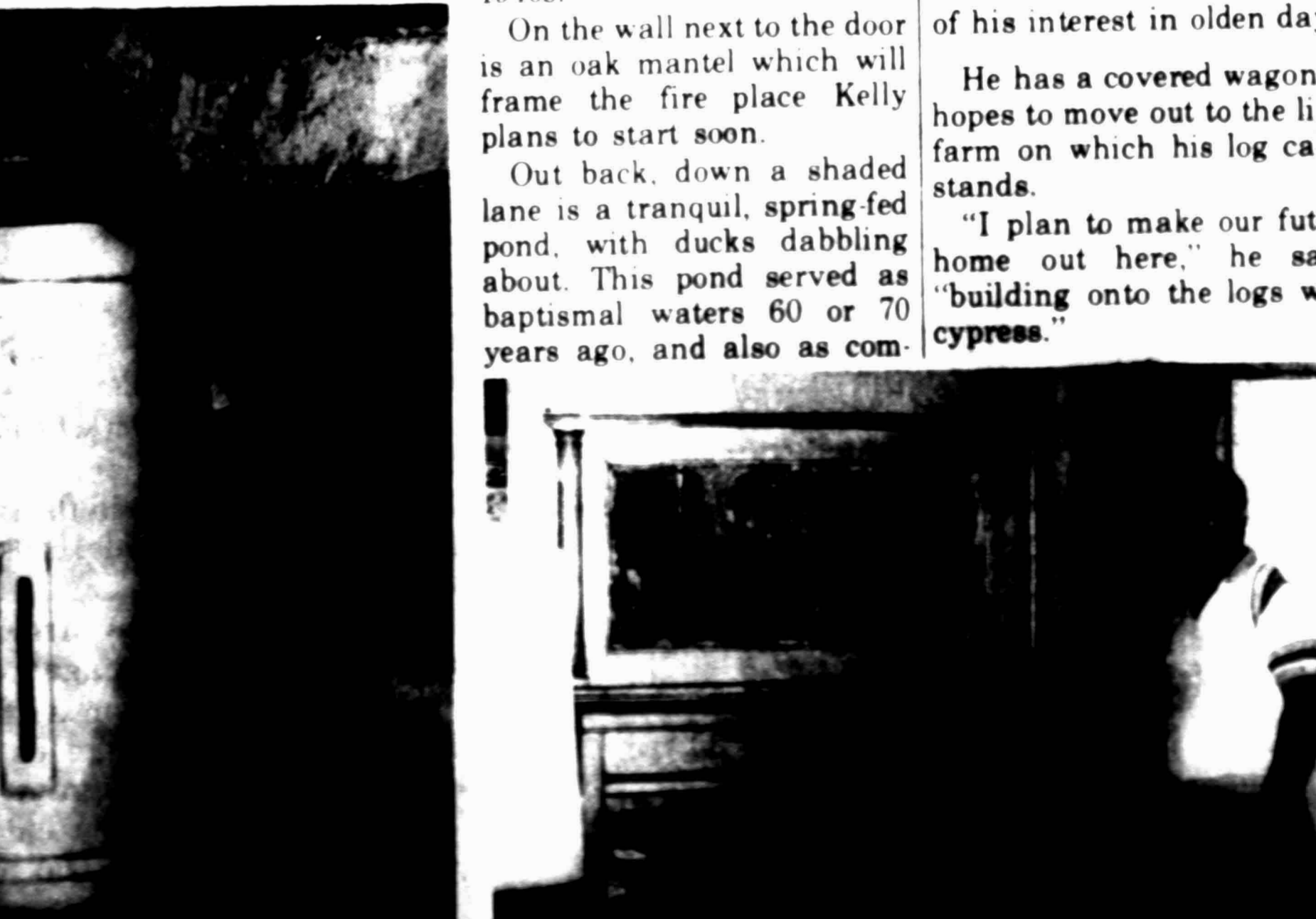
Raymond's back yard on Perkins St. holds further proof of his interest in olden days.

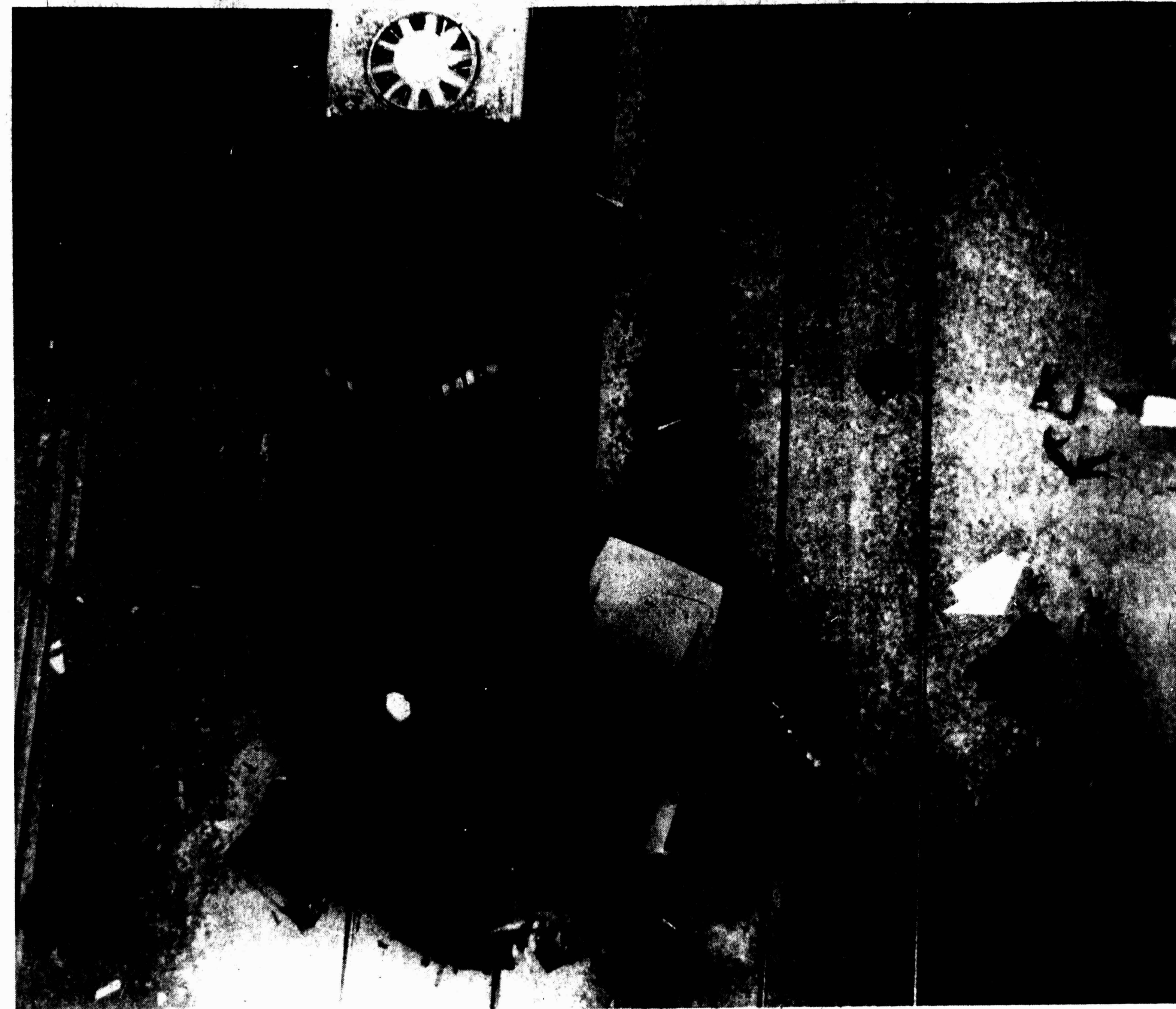

Some cattlemen have been feeding silage and hay.

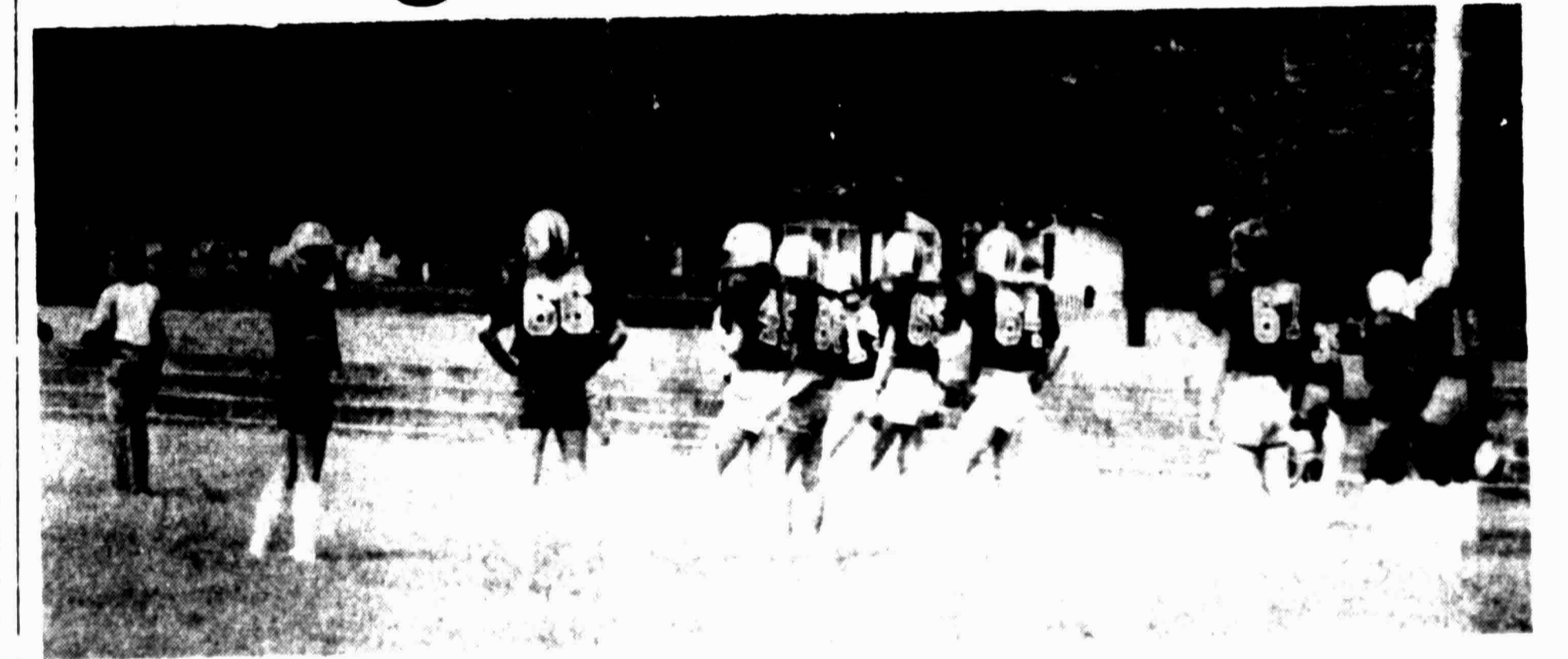
Earlier planted beans have not been hurt as badly, and larger and deeper root structures can utilize any available moisture quickly, but drouth stress slows pod-setting.

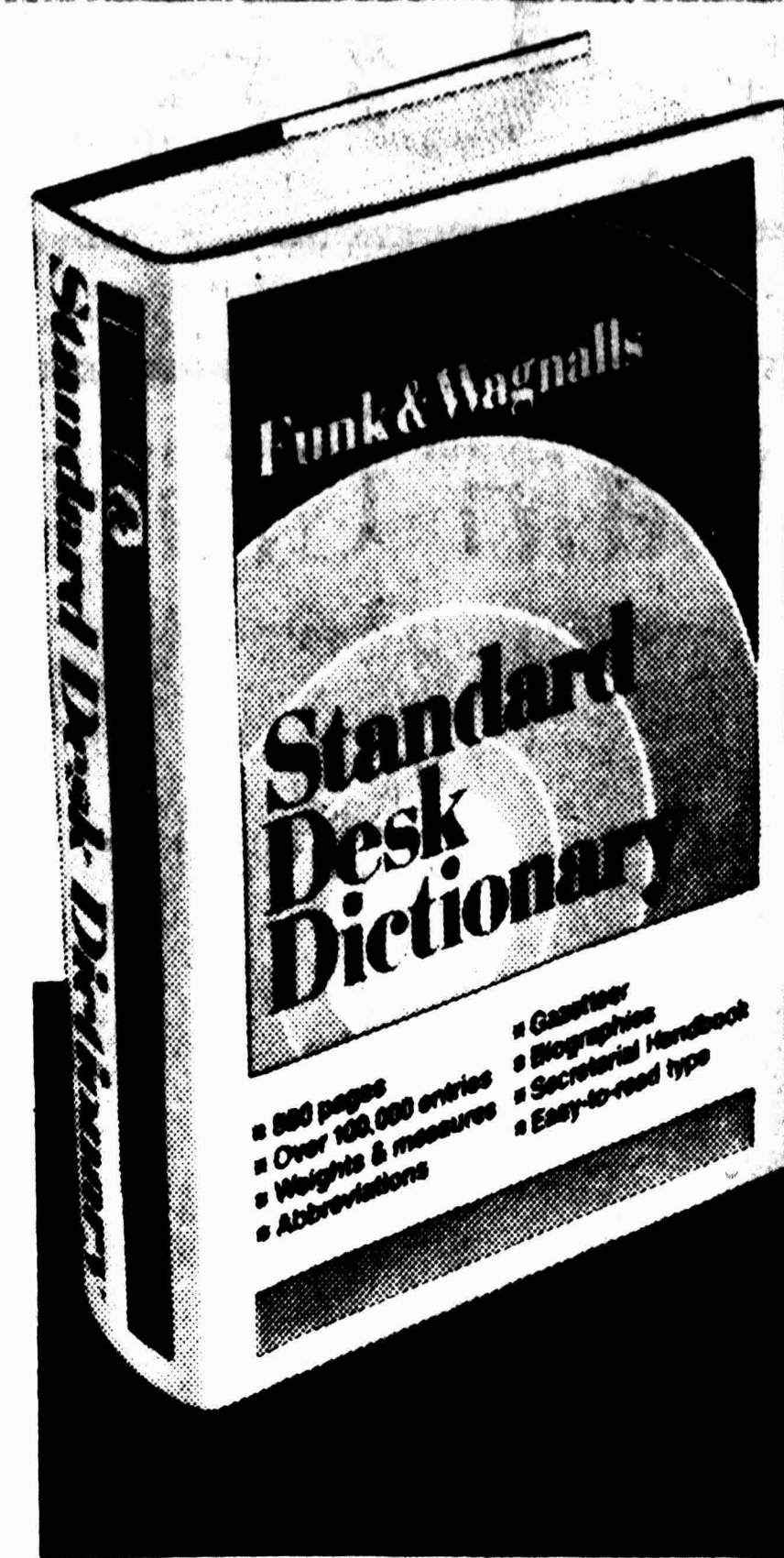

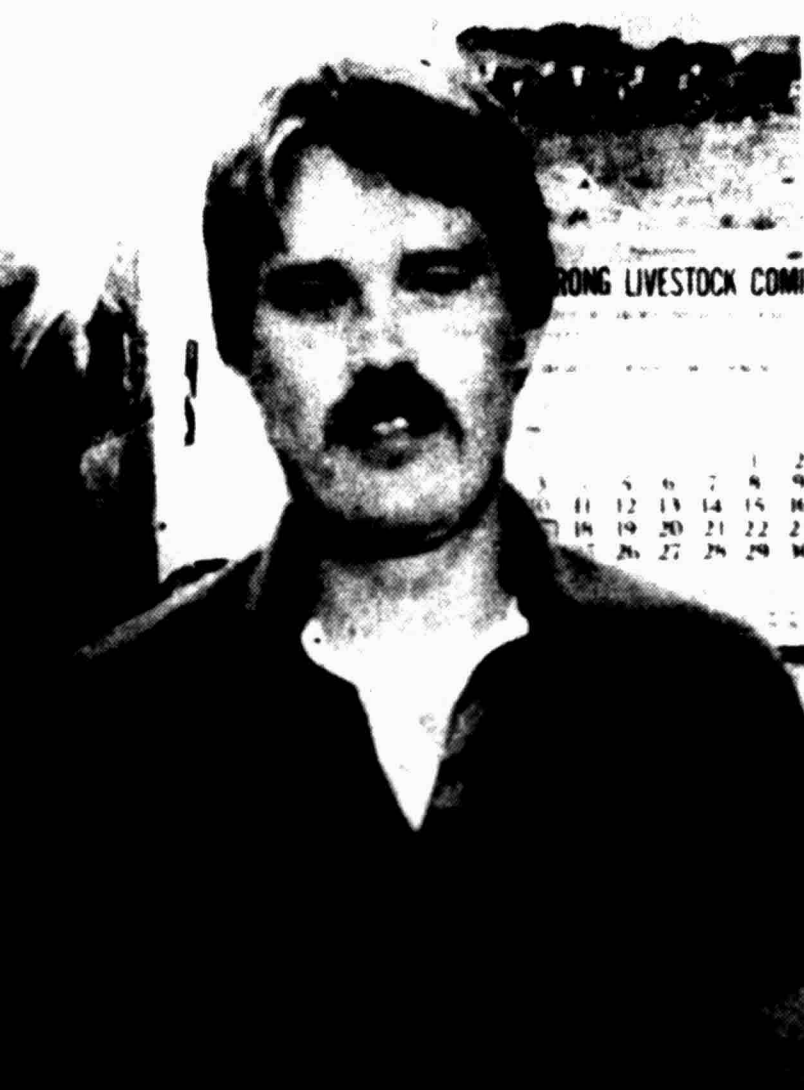

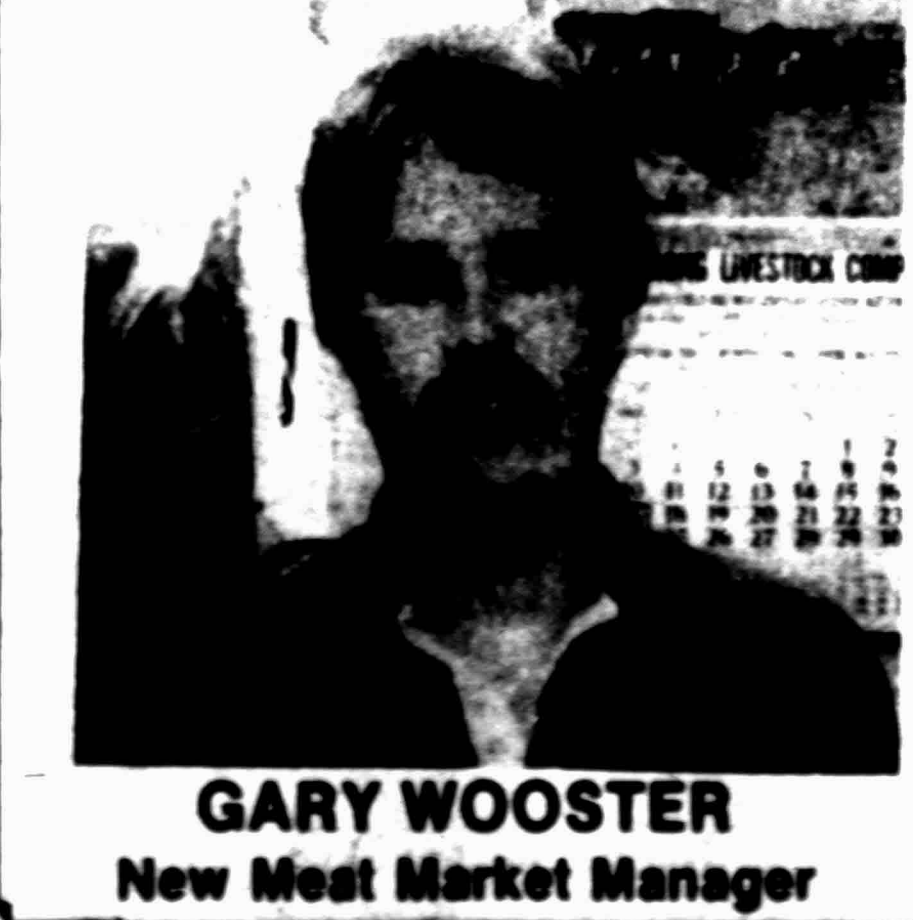

### Spray Milo For Worms

With some county milo at ready sprayed for ear worms and web worms, county row

crop producers should be checking filling milo heads and soy bean pods for worm damage.

Shake into a light colored container 20 plants at each of ten locations in a milo field, one to two ear worms per head warrants spraying.

Shake bean plants in three feet of row, two pod feeding worms per foot of row warrants spraying.

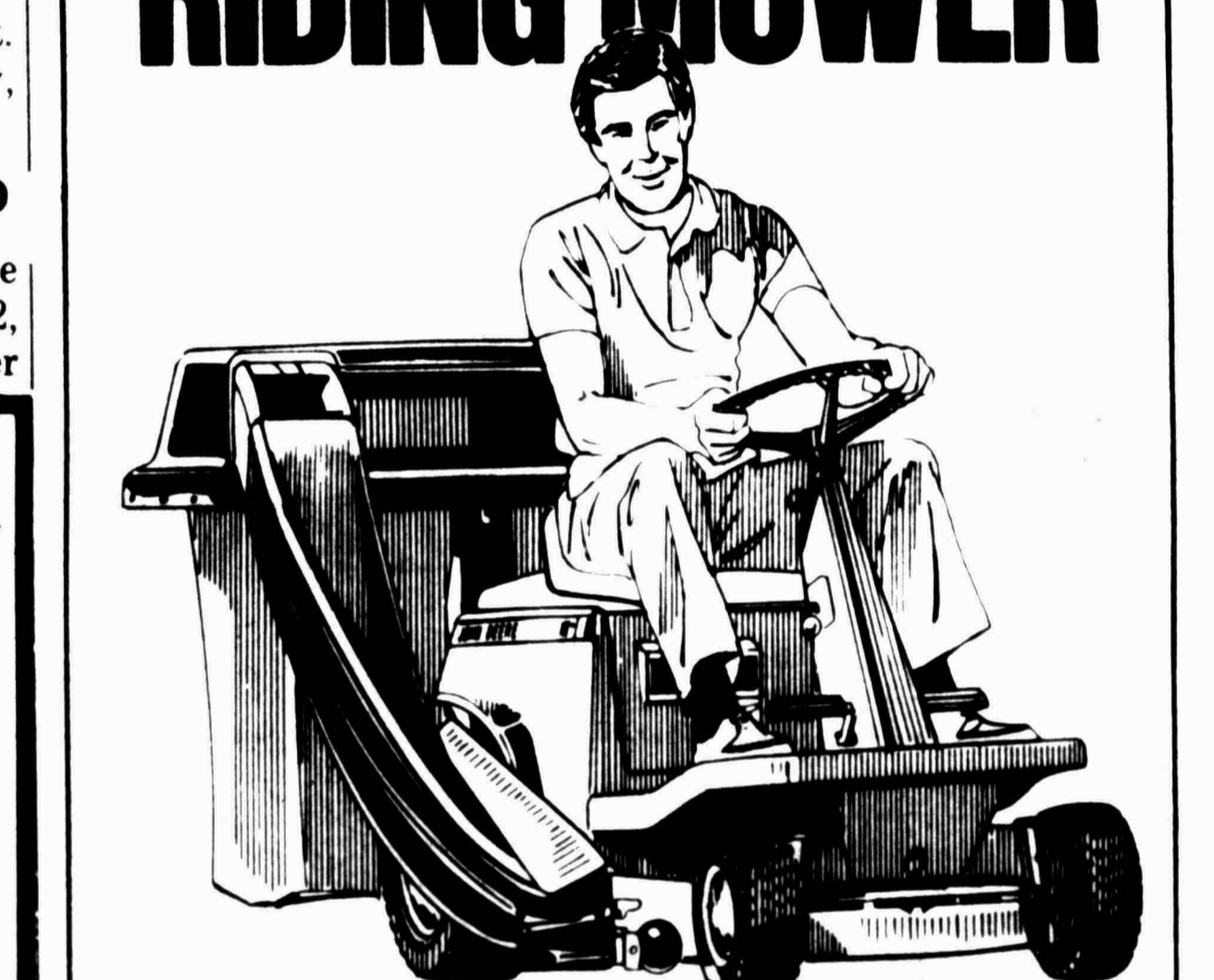

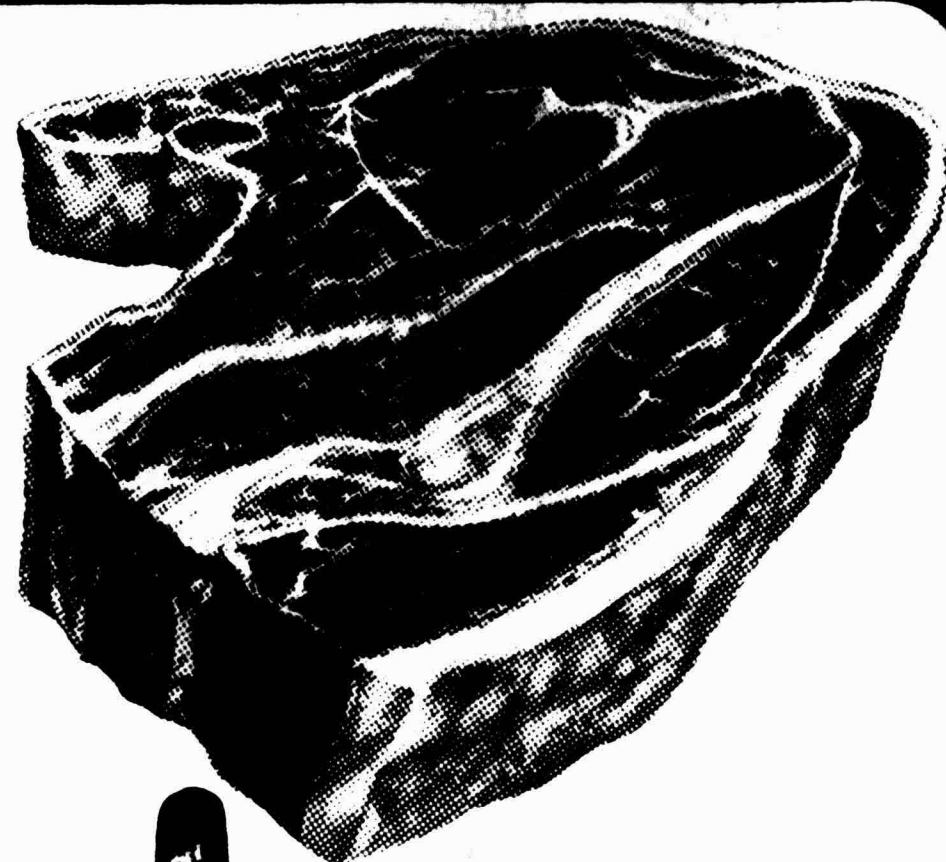

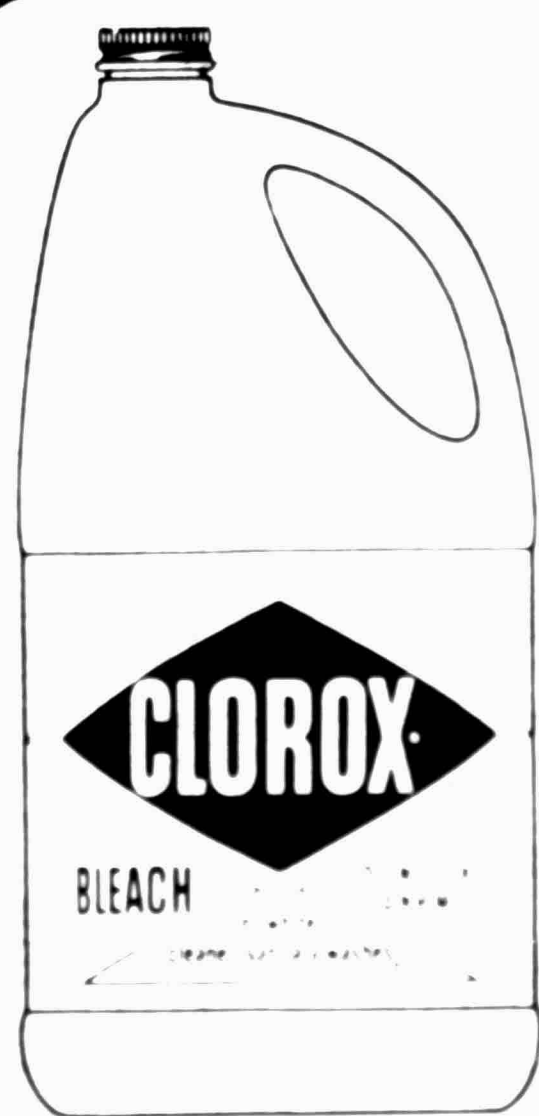
