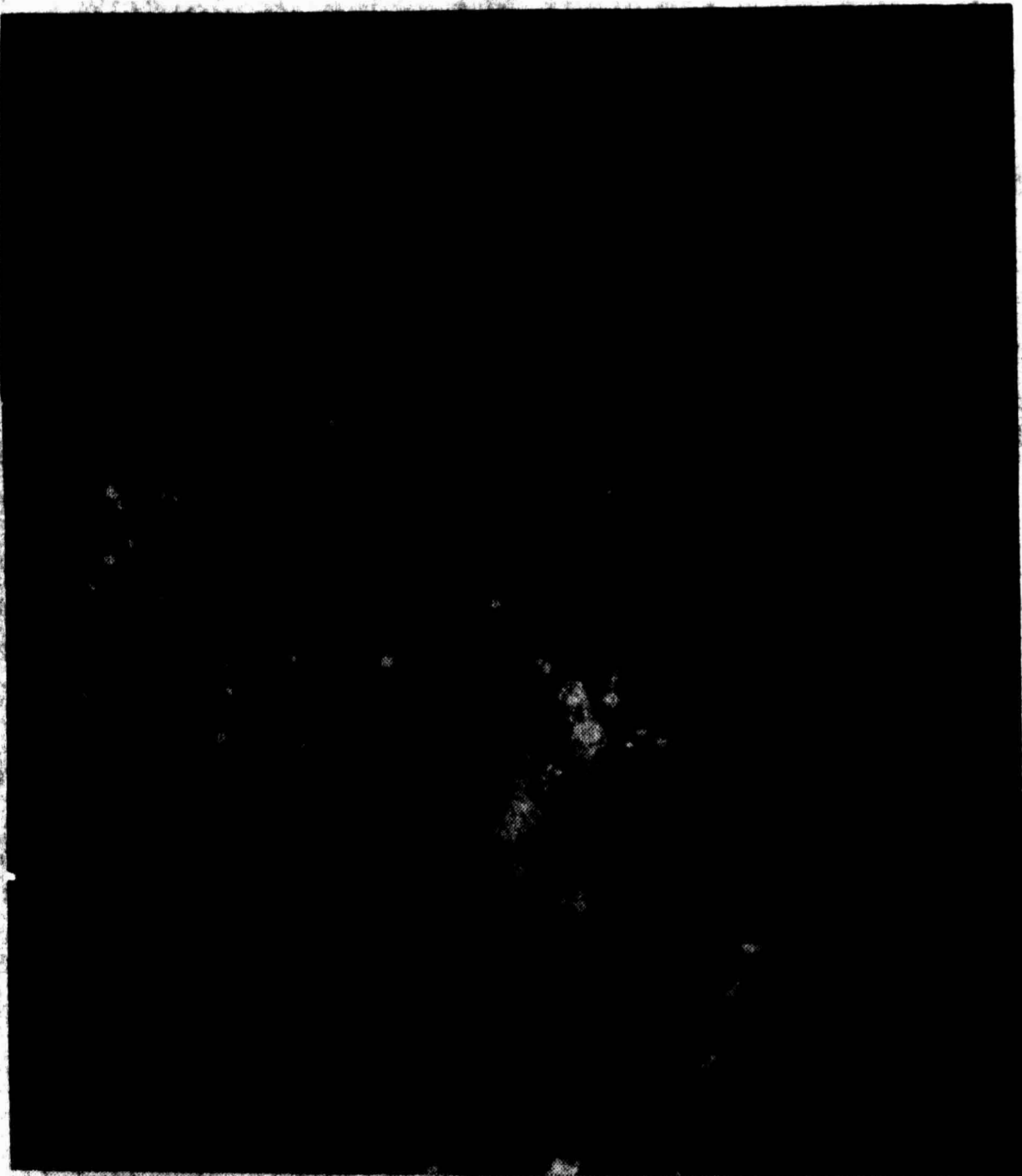

During his last year, he served as chief resident of the Department of Family Practice and was elected a delegate to the Tennessee Academy of Family Practice.

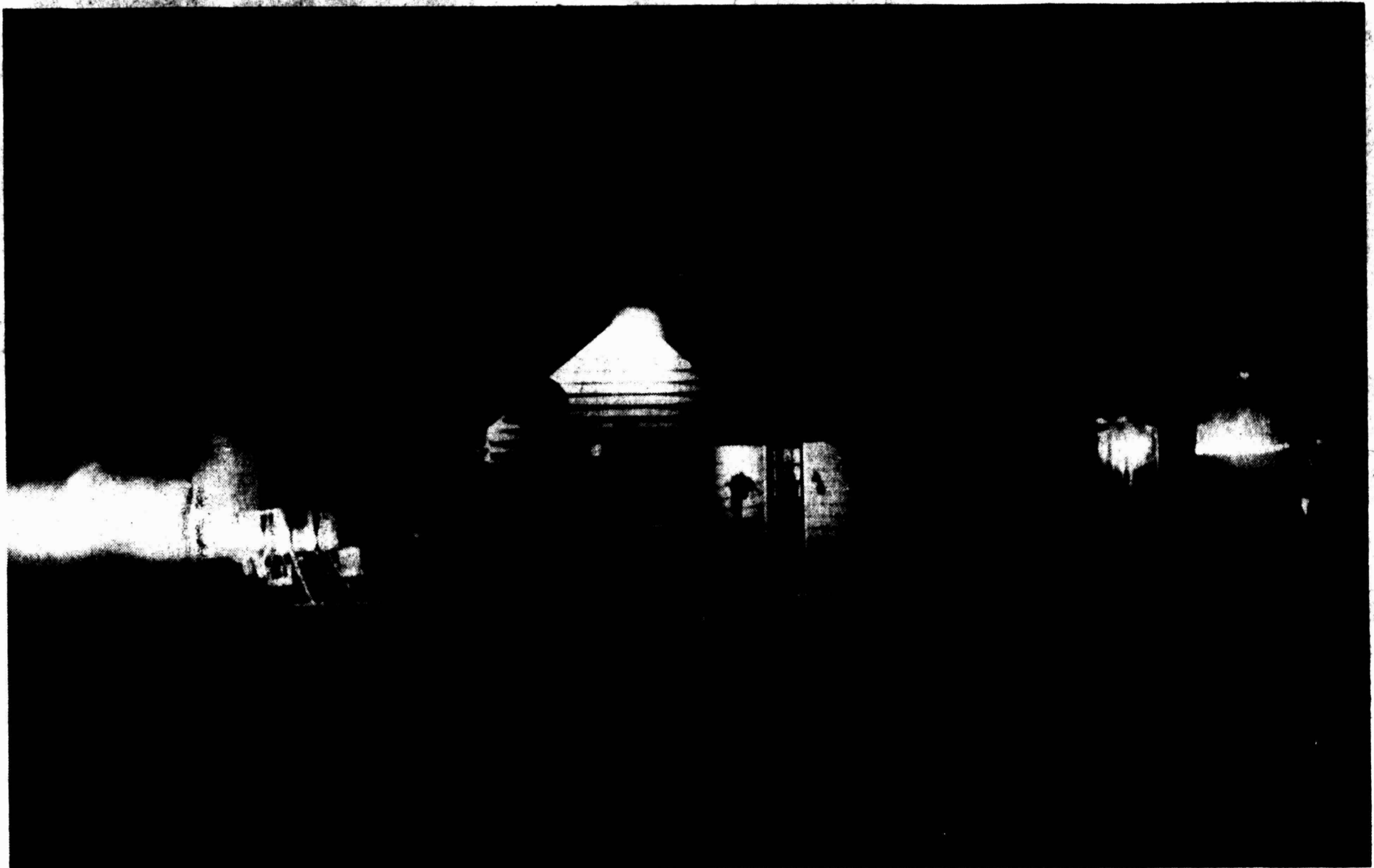

He served as Mayor of Halls for ten years after one term on the Board of Aldermen.

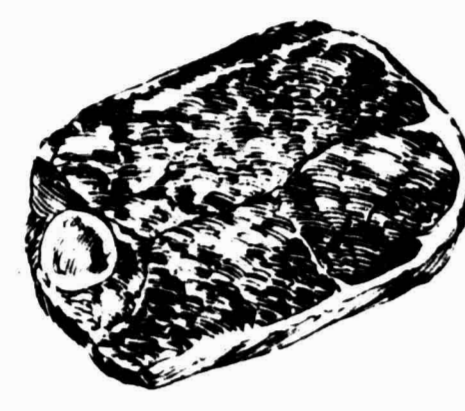

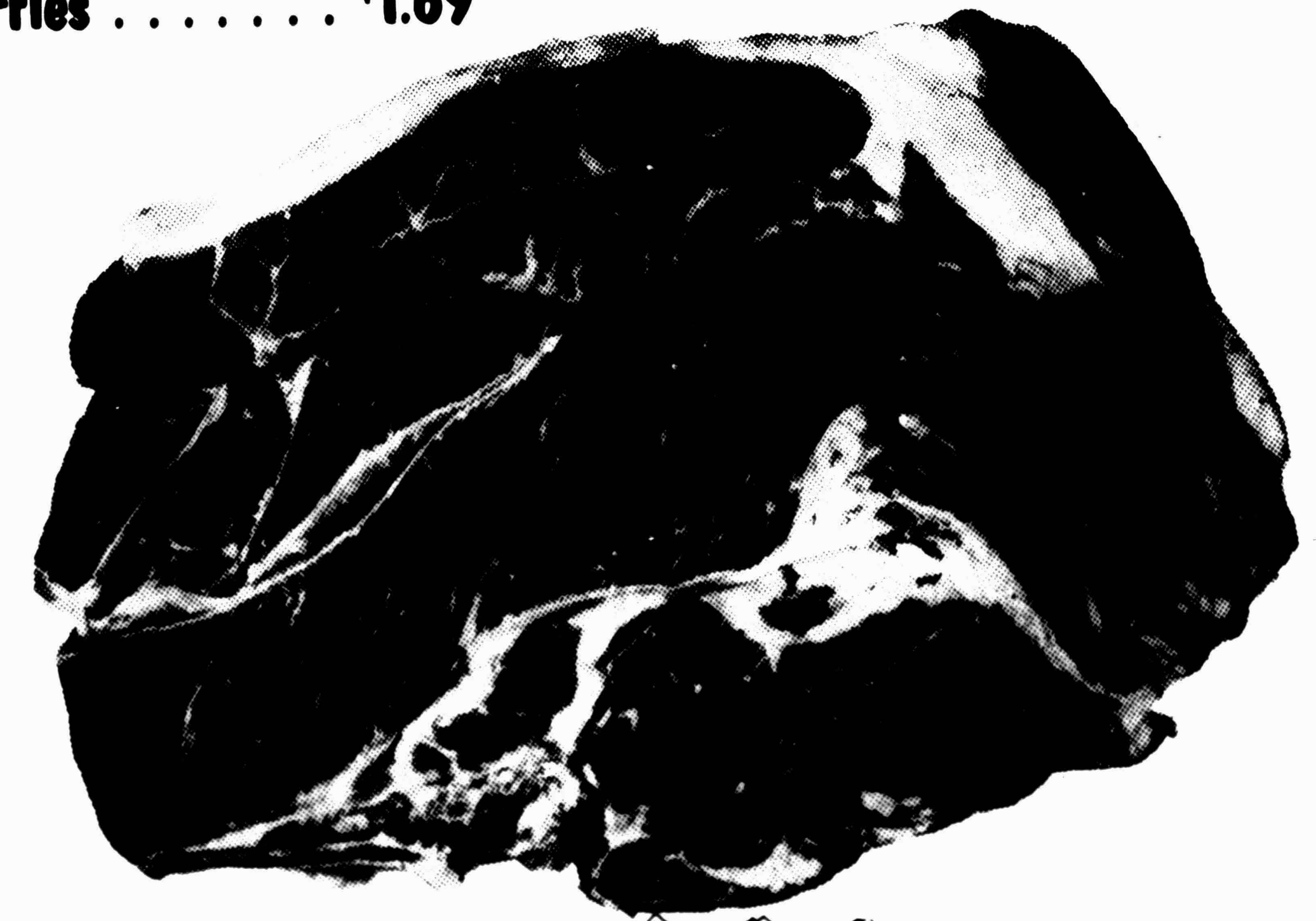

### County Tax Rate Held, Sixth Year

County Commission Monday held its \$2.97 tax rate for the sixth consecutive fiscal year.

Education got 60% of total estimated expenditures of \$12,194,373, but the Commission funded not a penny of \$42,815 in increased pay for teachers negotiated in many months of haggling between the county Education Association, in its first year as collective bargaining agent for all county teachers, with the Board of Education—after calling in federal mediators.

The Commission's budget committee voted unanimously, on two separate occasions, to give no county employees any increases in salaries or in fringe benefits. It did provide, in the budget the Commission adopted, an additional \$1915 for part-time sheriff's deputies.

The budget did increase salaries for the Assessor of Property, General Sessions Judge, and sheriff—all about 2% or less.

Sharpest increase was 500% for the county health department purchased home health service—up from \$2,000 to \$10,000.

The budget presumes \$250,000 in federal revenue sharing funds not yet approved.

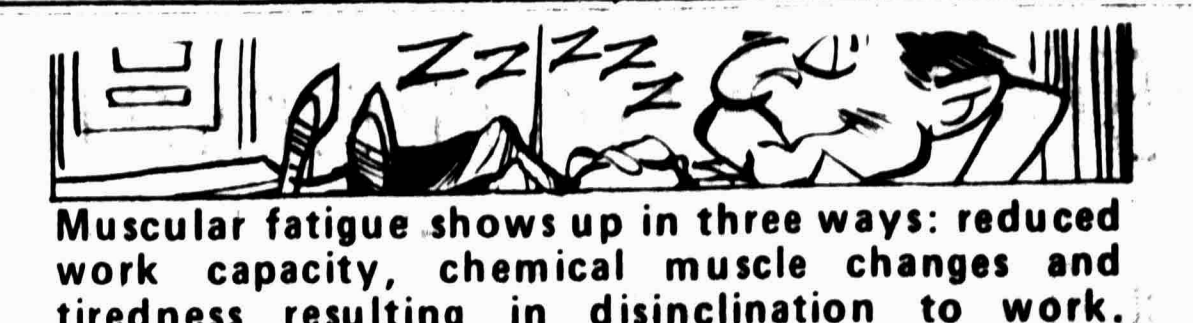

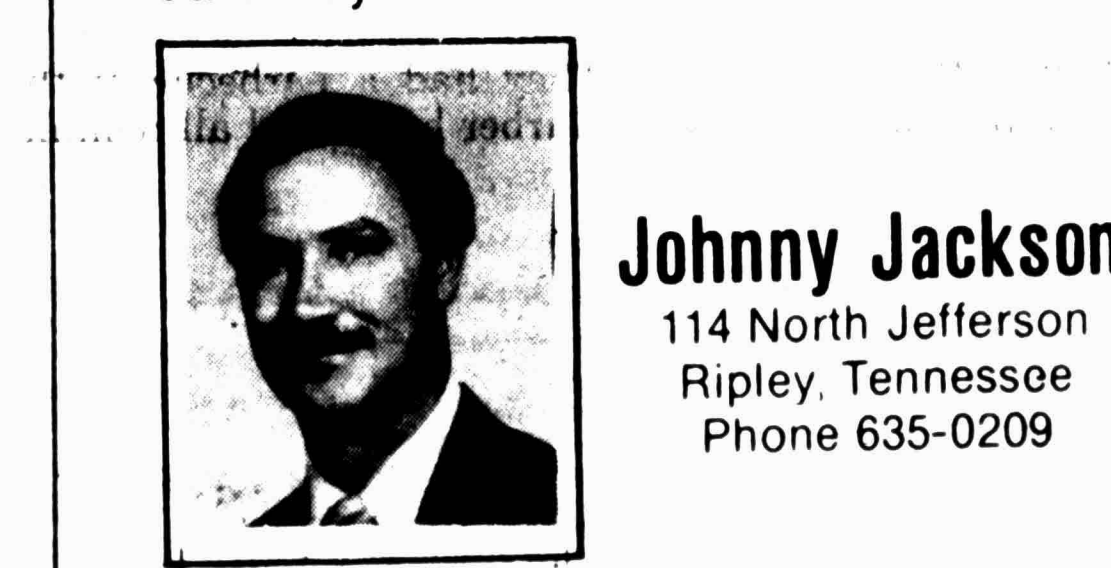

## Federal Grant To Halls Park

## Two Salaries Not Boosted

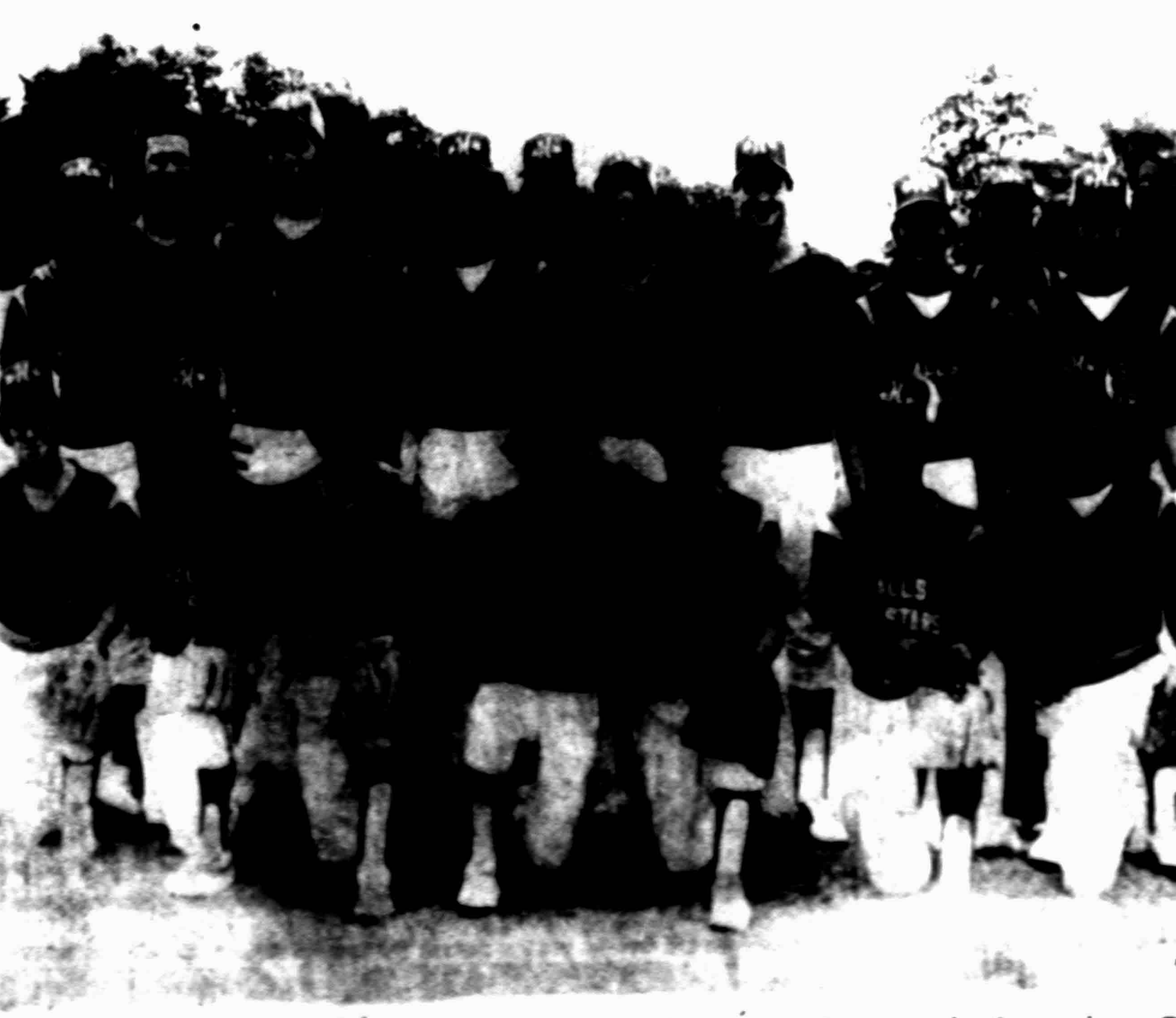

## Cole Loses Case Against County

Chancellor Dewey C. Whitton, of Bolivar, sitting in Ripley Thursday of last week, denied the claim of Aliene Cole, of Halls, that the county school system had discriminated against her, as a black female teacher with tenure, by employing her for substitute duty, full time, for the school years 1980-81 and 1981-82, while subsequently electing non-tenured teachers to regular classroom posts. Cole's suit, filed in November, 1981, against School Supt. Phillip W. Jackson and the Board of Education, charged that requiring her to substitute in any school in the county on any school day was not required of any other tenured teacher and was for the purpose of "harassing her to compel her retirement or resignation." Chancellor Whitton agreed with her contention that she had been assigned to teach in areas for which she held no state certification, but he found that the school system had not practiced racial discrimination. He denied her request that it be ordered to employ her as a fixed assignment classroom teacher.
