### NOTICE TO PAR

A new dimension will be added to Parent-Teacher Conference Day set for Monday, March 14 between the hours of 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. in the respective schools. While parents and teachers of children in grades K through 7 will discuss student progress and placement as usual, parents, teachers and students in grades 8 through 12 will make plans for next school year as well as discuss the new proficiency test requirements for graduation.

Eighth grade parents will be asked to come to Parent-Teacher Conference prepared to help plan their child's high school program with specific emphasis on registration for the freshman year. However, these students and parents will be asked to outline a four-year plan to be reviewed in the spring of the freshman year. Ninth, tenth and eleventh grade parents and teachers will sign off on the respective student's registration for the next school year. This will not be a pre-registration as in the past but will be actual registration for the next school year with students and parents committed to the courses for which the students register. This committment on the part of students and parents will enable the school system to better plan for the years ahead and allow the students to give more serious thought to course selection and their future.

Senior parents will want to visit the school to check on the progress of the students in terms of the new proficiency test requirement which will determine the type diploma the graduate will receive. There will be three diplomas issued as required by the state board of education: regular high school diploma for those students completing the required 18 units of credit and passing the proficiency test, high school certificate for those students who complete the required 18 units but fail to pass the proficiency test, or the specialized education diploma for students who complete an Individualized Educational Plan (IEP) but the do not complete the standard units or pass the proficiency test.

It is very important that all students and parents understand the requirements outlined for graduation. The respective high school staffs will be prepared to assist parents with this understanding; therefore, all parents are urged to attend Parent-Teacher Conference Day or make an appointment for another time if there is a conflict with this date, March 14th.

ground is literally as old as the hills. Man has always been fascinated with caves. For prehistoric man they were often part of a religious exberience and modern man still Teels a certain sense of awe in the presence of scenery unlike anything found on the surface of the earth.

Tennessee is a cave lover's paradise because so much of Middle Tennessee and East Tennessee is underlined by limestone. More than 3,000 caves have been discovered thus far, and an almost end less number of labyrinthine passages have yet to be found and explored.

The damp nooks and tight crannies in the vast majority of these caves are seen only through the eyes of hardhatted, mud-splattered speunkers, but several particulary grand and unusually beautiful caves have been developed commercially. Visitors may savor these subterranean wonders in clean, safe, and well it surroundings in the care of competent guides.

Cumberland Caverns, near McMinnville, was opened for tourists in 1956. The second largest cavern system in the United States, Cumberland Caverns was discovered in 1810 by a surveyor named Aaron Higgenbotham. Venturing into the cave alone, he was trapped for three days on a high ledge when his torch went out. According to legend, when a rescue party reached him in the same spot his hair had turned white Years later, this same cave was mined extensively for saltpeter during the Civil War.

The cavern's gigantic "Hal of the Mountain King" - 60 feet long, 150 feet wide and 140 feet high - is the larges cave room in eastern America Sensational natural formations are found throughout the cave while man-made amenities include a light and sound dramatization and huge underground dinin. room containing a 1,500 pound cut glass chandelier and a stage equipped for live shows or movies 350 feet below the surface of the ground.

Raccoon Mountain Cav erns, named for the mountain near Chattanooga which contains it, is a live, still growing cave. It is said to contain more cave formations in their natural state than any cav

in the region. Deep inside nearby Look out Mountain lies Ruby Falls, containing the highest underground waterfall open to the public. Since the cave has no natural opening, visitors reach it by means of an elevator shaft drilled through the solid rock of the moun tain. A short walk leads to the room where the spectacular waterfall tumbles from the ceiling in a sheer drop of 145 feet.

At 1,120 feet below the surface of Lookout Mountain Ruby Falls is also the deepest commercial cavern in the United States.

The Cherokee Indians play ed an interesting part in the history of Bristol Caverns, ir Upper East Tennessee. The cavern's many passageways of fered a hideaway for the Indians who would attack settlers on what was then the western frontier, race back into the cave, then emerge from a back entrance to stage still another raid on the near by villages and farmsteads.

When it first became com mercialized in 1944, 18 Indian skulls and other artifacts were found in the cave. Two of those skulls plus other relics are now on display at the cave. A tour through this 200 million year old cave leads through three levels and blind cave fish populate its underground river.

Near Sevierville, it was moonshiners, rather than In dians, who played an active role in the history of Forbidden Caverns. In fact, the original 'shine still found in the cave can be seen during one-hour tour. Among the other attractions are natural chimneys, a waterfall and the largest wall of onyx known to exist in the world.

According to the Guinness Book of World Records, The Lost Sea near Sweetwater h the home of the world's largest underground lake. Just 1,000 feet from its entrance, visitors can glide in glass-bottom boats on the surface of this 4.5-acre lake stocked with

One of the more unusual methods of exploration is offered by Wonder Cave, the oldest commercial cave in the South, near Monteagle. The



### Less Tooth Decay Among Children

Tooth decay in childre has declined 25-70 percent in countries that once experienced the highest dental decay rates in the world. These decreases have been demonstrated in regions both with and without water fluoridation.

Reductions in caries of around 50 percent were reported for most countries. and these occurring without changes in sugar consumption

The First International Conference on the Declining Prevalence of Dental Caries (tooth decay) was recently held at the Forsyth Dental Center, Boston, Massachusetts. The program inspeakers from England, Scotland, Ireland, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, The Netherlands, New Zealand and the United

As far back in time as records are available, these countries once experienced the highest caries prevalence in the World. Data from research studies of children presented at the Conference, indicated that caries prevalence has diminished by 25-70 percent in all of these countries. The extraction (loss) of teeth due to caries, once a common occurrence in children, is now unusual.

In areas with water fluoridation, the reason for the decline would seem to alent decreases are observed in regions without water fluoridation. Exact reasons for the latter may not be specified. However, the most logical explanations include the near universal use of fluoride tooth pastes by children, fluoride pills and drops. fluoride applica tions by dentists and greatly mproved oral hygiene.

The PIK program is designed to reduce the amount of acreage that farmers plant during this crop year and at the same time drastically reduce the size of the surpluses of farm commodities that we now have on This would be done by the farmer agreeing to idle part of his farm land in exchange for a percentage of the crop that would have been raised on that land. He would receive that percentage of the o from the surpluses now being held in government storage facilities.

The Department of Agriculture moved ahead with the implementation of this program and set March 11th as the deadline for farmers to sign up to participate.

However, the Department of the Treasury issued an opinion that many fear will deter farmers from participating in teresting and significant roles the PIK program. 

### TAX BREAK FOR

**TWO-EARNER MARRIED COUPLES** 

As it gets closer to April 15th, when federal income tax returns are due, taxpayers should be aware of a special new deduction that does away with the old "marriage penalty."

What is, or was, the "marriage penalty"? Under the old law, a married couple making \$10,000 each would pay \$2,745 in taxes on their combined income of \$20,000. In the same couple was not married, they would pay only \$2,354 in taxes. This \$391 difference in tax liability was the "marriage penalty."

As more and more married couples both work -- the number is well over 30,000,000 now -- the inequity in this situation grew ever more obvious. I began to fight the "marriage penalty" five years ago, and in 1981 the Senate passed an amendment doing away with it.

Now the penalty is gone. Beginning with the 1982 tax year, two-earner married couples can deduct an amount equal to 5 percent of the lesser of \$30,000 or of the income of the husband or wife with the lower income -- that is, whichever is less, \$1,500 or 5 percent of the lesser earned income. Next year this deduction will increase to 10

Perhaps the most significant point of this new deduction is the fact that at a time when more and more families' budgets are being stretched to the limit, the only way that many households can afford to save is if there is a second earner. Median earnings for two-earner married couples are about \$27,000, compared with \$18,000 for single-earner

The way in which many families have attempted to remain whole against the ravages of inflation has been for a non-working spouse to take a job or increase the number of hours worked if already working. This is all that has kep many families from suffering a tremendous decline in their standard of living.

My only disagreement with the elimination of the "marriage penalty" is that the amendments doing away with it didn't go far enough to ease the tax bite on working couples. Nevertheless, it's a start, and one that all taxpayers should be aware of and should take advantage of I am proud to have played a role in doing away with

the "marriage penalty" and in helping Congress take a step towards achieving true tax equity. **ENERGY INDEPENDENCE A REAL NEED** 

There are no lines at the gas stations these days, and conservation efforts by consumers and industry alike have paid off in cutting our nation's dependence of foreign energy supplies.

In short, our nation has made giant strides towards energy independence since the oil embargo of 1973 and the gas shortage of 1978. We have curbed our appetite for oil, and have turned instead to better, more efficient use of fossil fuels, alternative energy sources such as solar power, and the production of synthetic fuels of all kinds.

Further, crude oil prices may fall significantly in the near future because of the current world-wide petroleum surplus. This surplus has been a major factor in the decline of inflation in the U.S., by many accounts.

But we're not out of the woods yet, according to Ulf Lantze, head of the International Energy Agency. In fact, he said recently, the possibility of a new oil crisis in the mid- to later part of this decade could "deal a devastating blow" to major industrial countries.

The IEA, a 21-nation agency set up after the '73 oil embargo to help the U.S. and other countries with their energy policies, has just issued a new report on the world energy outlook, and the message is quite simple: "There are no grounds for believing our energy problems have been solved. The basic vulnerability of the world economy to oil supply disruptions is far from being eliminated."

The IEA said there is a real "danger that conservation and investment efforts" in alternative fuels may dwindle because of a sluggish economy and other world-wide factors. But the underlying market trends indicate the world oil demand will deplete the current surplus by the mid-1980s, after which demand will outreach supplies by as much as "9 million to 21 million barrels per day by the end of the century."

Industrial nations will find themselves competing more feverishly than ever for the dwindling supplies, with oil imports rising because of "economic development, increasing urbanization and industrialization.'

What it all adds up to is the fact that the United States cannot afford to slow its efforts in achieving energy independence. We have made giant strides, as I said, but we must not slacken up now.
