## Thomas Wins Seat, \$60,000 Back Pay

Six days short of 13 months after Robert S. Thomas, of 161 Tucker, Ripley, won re-election Aug. 5, 1982, as Ninth District Chancellor, the state Supreme Court, in Jackson, Wednesday of last week, affirmed his election and charged Robert S. "Bob" Millar, then a Ripley attorney, who after the election moved his law practice to Memphis, with court costs.

No fraud at issue, the case revolved around Millar's contention that 167 votes were illegally cast absentee in Haywood County because not accompanied by a physician's statement.

The high court noted that the law requiring medical certificate applied only to those seeking permanent registration on an absentee ballot register and was, in any case, repealed by the legislature in 1972.

Millar, representing himself in the challenge to Thomas' election, originally filed suit against all nine counties in the Ninth Chancery Division.

Before trial, he dropped allegations against six counties, retaining only Hardin, Haywood, and Tipton.

Chancellor Homer W. Bradberry, of Dresden, said that "only one conclusion can be drawn from the proof in this case."

"The officials of elections worked hard and diligent to hold a fair and honest election..."

"A perfect election has never been held, and never will be."

Bradberry found Thomas elected by the "free and fair will of the qualified voters."

The high court agreed, giving Thomas \$60,000 in back pay to match that paid to Joseph H. Walker III, who has served as interim Chancellor while the courts ponderously pondered the vote returns.

## Agrico Applies For Pipe-Line To Halls

Agrico Chemical Company, which closed its Blytheville, Ark., plant, employing 127, last month, partly because of natural gas costs from Arkansas-Louisiana Gas Co., has asked the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for permission to build a 25-mile, \$8,700,000 pipe-line to connect the plant to a Texas Gas Transmission Co. pipe-line near Halls.

Using about 16 billion cubic feet of gas a year, or 7% of total sales in Arkansas, Agrico says it had been paying \$3.30 per 1,000 cubic feet to Arkansas Louisiana Gas Co.

A Texas Gas spokesman told The Associated Press that though prices vary widely, the average price to industrial customers is 83.9 cents per 1,000 cubic feet.

Don Johnson, ALG spokesman, declined comment.

James Early Mayfield, 58, Maury City farmer found dead Thursday of last week, of a gun-shot wound, in his pickup at Nadine's Place on Espey Park Road east of Halls, is believed a suicide, law enforcement officials report.

He leaves a son, Timmy, a daughter, Mrs. Betty McGee, and his parents, the James Mayfields, of Halls; two bro-

thers, Charles E. Mayfield, of Ripley, and Marley Mayfield, of Friendship; and a sister, Mrs. Lurline Crews, of Gates.

## Richard Bostic Jailed As Halls Bank Bandit

Richard Bostic, 35, of Coleman St., Halls, was arrested Monday afternoon by Halls Chief of Police Buddy Moore and officer Wymond Lovelace and jailed in Ripley on charges of attempting to rob the Bank of Halls branch Tuesday of last week.

Moore said a pistol believed used in the robbery was found in a field west of Fenton, between Main St. and Tiggrett St., and a shirt believed to have been worn by the black man who demanded all the cash in the branch was found off Pearl St. in Halls.

Blonda (Mrs. Bill) Robison, of Gates, was alone in the branch while Mrs. Barbara Fowler, of Halls, had gone to lunch, when the man entered the lobby and asked for traveler's checks.

Told they were available only from the main bank, he turned away, Mrs. Robison said, then turned back, pointing a pistol. When she dropped behind the glass-protected counter, screamed, and pressed an alarm button to alert police, the man fled.

## Halls Board Gets Plea For Gutters

Halls' city board Monday received a petition from 32 residents of Elm and Oak Streets and Jaynes Drive, seeking curbs and gutters.

The board said it would get estimates of the cost.

Milton Williams, community development director, was allowed to exceed stated limits of \$9,999.99 for rehabilitation of houses owned by Ernest Edison and Corrine Pearson. Williams said cost will run about \$12,000 each.

Rules passed three years ago allow some deviation, so long as the total budget is not exceeded.

A request for 30 mile per hour speed limits in Beech Grove Sub-Division was deferred until a resolution can be prepared by city attorney, Tom Caldwell, and a public hearing can be held. Action is expected at the November meeting.

The board voted to let customers pay for moving gas meters, unless a safety factor is involved.

Bids of \$19,310, less trade, and \$35,000, less \$8,000 trade, by D. C. Tractor, of Jackson, and Wynnburg Tractor Co., of Wynnburg, for purchase of a new back hoe were held for further study.

Dyer County, winless since 1981, came out throwing the ball, using laterals, the old "flea flicker", and everything in the book in an all-out effort to defeat the favored Tigers. Only a determined come-back by a good Tiger football team re-grouped to take charge for an 18-16 win.

They are to be congratulated but should also be reminded that their strongest foe of the year, Lake County, will come to Halls this Friday evening, with a chance at the Region 7 title at stake.

Lake County, rated number one in one poll and number two in another, comes to Halls off an easy 41-0 win over the Obion Central Rebels in Tiptonville last week.

Lake County (2-0) will be favored, but only the Tigers have been able to knock them from the top rung during the past several years.

Speaking of football, we are more than a little disgusted at the poor officiating that we are seeing in Class A games. There is no question of favoritism, just that many of the officials simply do not know the rules. It is a shame for teams to have to play with some of them officiating.

# Chocs Led Halls 16-0 But Got Nicked 18-16

The Halls Tigers spotted the Dyer County Choctaws a 16-point lead in Newbern Friday night but to win 18-16.

The Tigers helped the Choctaws with two pass interference calls and a fumble as Dyer County hit the 16-0 count with 1:45 in the second quarter.

Dyer County got on the board at the 5:38 mark in the first quarter on a 12-yard pass from David Hendren to Jeff Evans, but Reed Walton's kick was blocked.

Walton knocked through a 34-yard field goal with 7:29 in the second quarter for a 9-0 lead.

The Choctaws added to their lead with a 12-yard Hendren to Tim Capps pass, and Walton kicked the extra point.

That's when Sammy Burnett, back in Halls after having moved to Savannah, entered the game.

On the second play after the Newbern kick-off, Burnett hit Chris Dennis at the Tiger 28, and Dennis traveled the remaining 72 yards.

The try for two was stopped, and Dyer County led, 16-6. Earlier in the quarter, Dennis had gone 64 yards on a screen pass, but the touchdown was nullified by penalty.

The Tigers wasted no time getting on the board in the third quarter, with the final 21 yards coming on a Burnett pass to Bubba Wright. Again the Tigers failed for two, with 8:06 in the quarter.

Regaining the ball on an interception by Charlie Wilder, the Tigers moved the ball into pay dirt from the 22 in four plays, with David Blackwood getting the touchdown from two yards out.

Dyer County moved the ball into the fourth quarter, but two interceptions and a fumble stopped drive after drive.

The Tigers moved well into Dyer County territory late in the quarter but failed to gain

# The Majesty of Maury County

In September 1868 a New York reporter visited Maury County, a county of gently rolling hills and lush farmlands in southern Middle Tennessee. Impressed with what he found, the reporter filed the following with his editor: "The finest plantations in the commonwealth are located in Maury County."

Although the lifestyle of the area has undergone many changes since the reporter's time, Maury County's reputation for fine homes and lush farmland is still evident today. Each fall a tour of these antebellum homes enables the visitor to view a wide variety of architectural styles along with the antique furnishings found inside the homes.

The 15th annual Majestic Middle Tennessee Autumn Tour is scheduled October 7, 9 and 14-16. Fourteen restored and maintained antebellum homes and churches are included in the tour. Two of the homes are registered National Historic Landmarks and several are on the National Register of Historic Places. Four homes on the 1983 tour are open for the first time since their construction.

The two homes listed as National Historic Landmarks are the Ancestral Home of James K. Polk, the 11th President of the United States, and Rattle & Snap, an outstanding example of Greek revival architecture.

The ancestral home of James K. Polk is in downtown Columbia, the county seat located approximately 50 miles south of Nashville. The Polk Home has been restored to its original state and is furnished with items connected to Polk of his family. It is open year round in addition to being part of this year's tour.

Rattle & Snap, built in 1846 by George W. Polk in hardwood floors laid in lovely patterns.

Montrose on the Campbellsville Pike was built between 1814 and 1823 and is a solid brick home with a setting atop a gently rolling hill. It was the boyhood home of James H. Thomas, who served in the U.S. Congress and the Confederate Congress. The present owner's horse gaze on the countryside surrounding the home.

Other homes open for the October tour are Booker Place, Vine Hill, the Lucius Frenson Home, the Kennedy House and the Moore Landers Home on Baker Road.

In addition to the twelve homes, two historic churches are on tour. Gothic St. John's Episcopal Church, built in 1842, is possibly the state's only remaining plantation church. It was built by the Polk brothers, one of whom was George W. Polk of Rattle & Snap.

Zion Presbyterian Church is the oldest church still active in the county, dating from 1807. The present church building was constructed in 1849. The church was founded by a colony of eleven immigrant families who moved westward from South Carolina to settle in Maury County. More than 1,500 persons are buried in the churchyard, including 11 soldiers of the American Revolution.

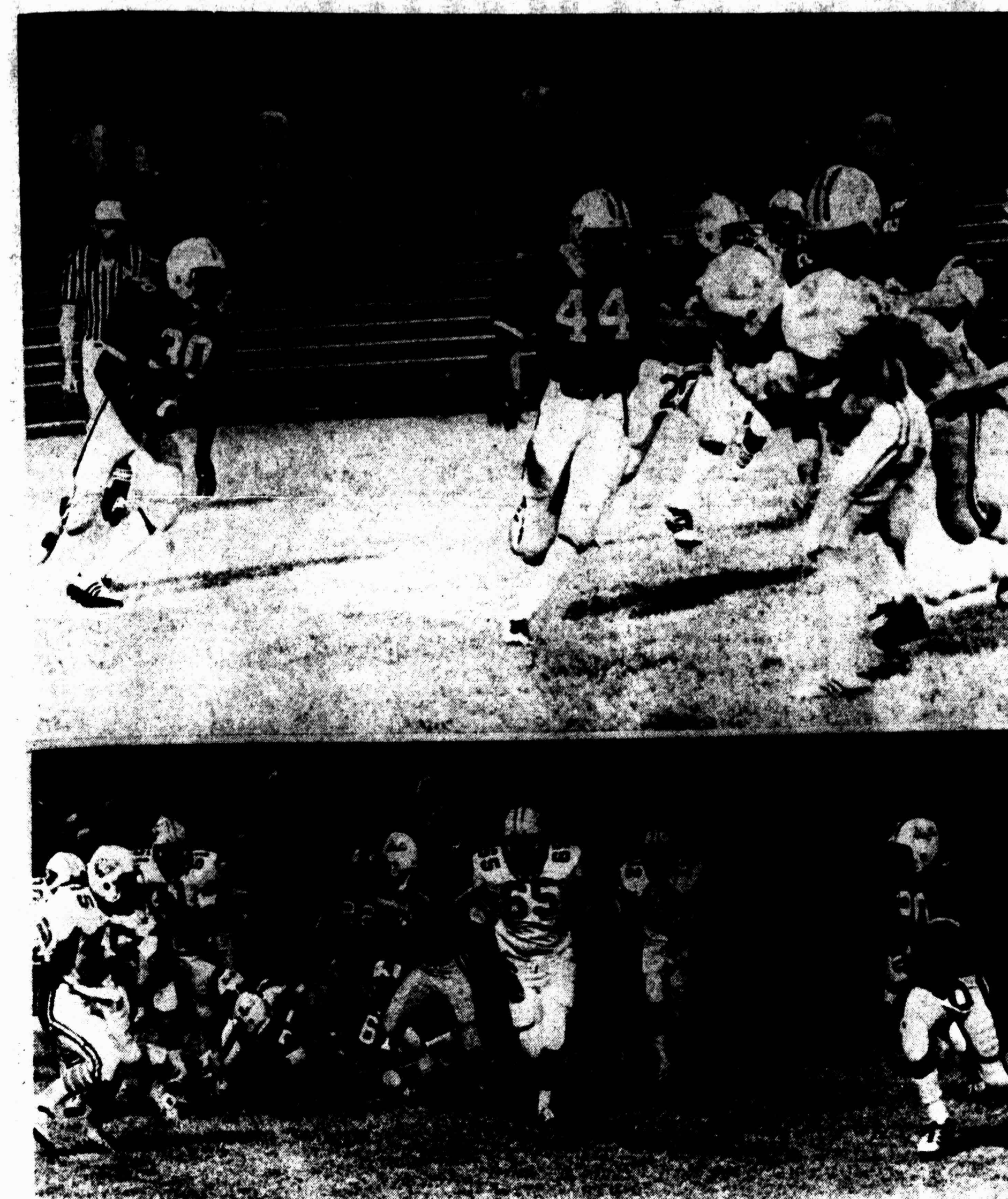

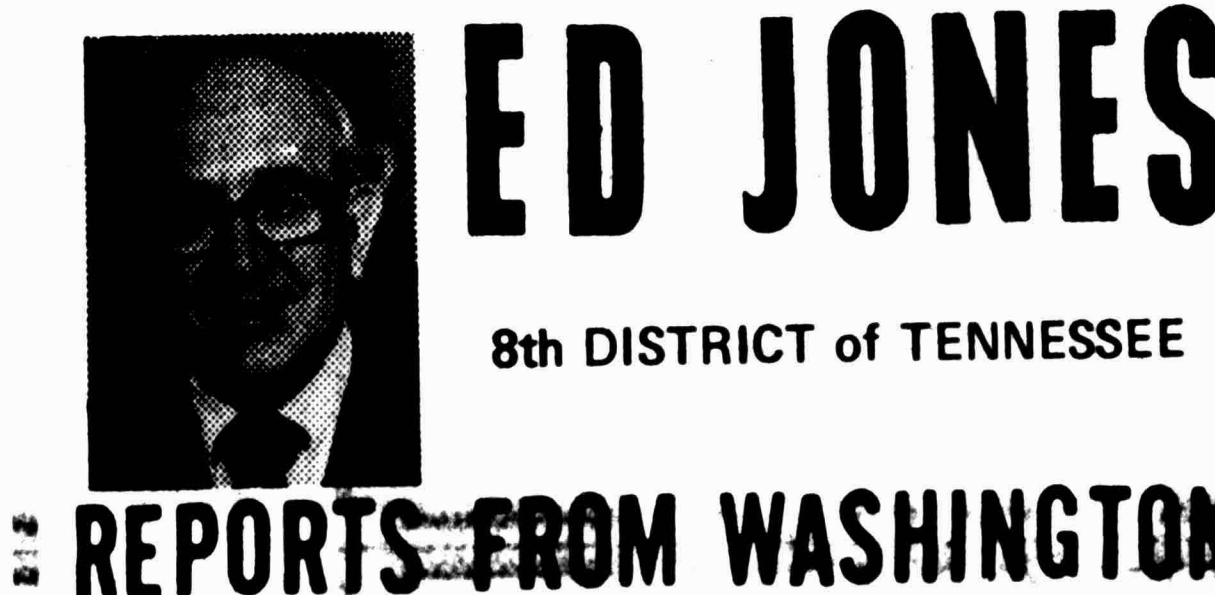

### REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

International trade matters have been a growing concern in the Congress over the past few years. Unfortunately, though there have been numerous objections raised about trade barriers that exist in various countries to American products, little progress has been made on developing a policy that responds to those barriers. Over the years, a number of efforts have been undertaken. But this year, it appears that the House Ways and Means Committee is trying to develop legislative authority that the President can use to effectively respond to barriers that prevent the full development of markets overseas for American products.

Just recently the Committee reported a bill to the House that will provide the President with strengthened power to retaliate against unfair trade practices of other nations. That bill clarifies the President's authority to deny licenses to foreign service companies from nations that have barriers to American service exports. It also allows the President to retaliate against nations that block foreign investments in their country or that refuse to protect American property rights such as patents, copyrights, and trademarks.

On another front, the bill requires the President to seek international negotiations to eliminate barriers in services and high technology products and requires an annual report by the U. S. Trade Representative detailing where barriers exist to U. S. exports. This may be only the first of several pieces of legislation that are aimed at reducing barriers to U. S. exports around the world. Trade Subcommittee Chairman Sam Gibbons of Florida is also working on a bill to strengthen the antidumping and counter-vailing duty laws of the United States.

These efforts are important but obviously must be undertaken with thorough consideration and debate. Foreign trade is a very sensitive issue. While we, as a nation, do not want to take actions that might trigger a trade war with our trading partners, there is a growing consensus that something must be done that will result in a strengthening of our own nation's exporting capabilities. That effort is being undertaken with the ultimate goal to do that without causing undue interference in international trade.

The legislation recently passed out of the Ways and Means Committee deals primarily with service oriented trade which holds great promise for American companies in world trade. The current international trade structure is governed by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade which deals primarily with trade in manufactured goods.

The international trade arena is a very complicated one. Consideration of legislative impact must include its ultimate impact on our own consumers of imported goods which include large domestic corporations, its potential for long term harm of our own export sales, and its impact on relations with other nations of the world.

Obviously, no one wants to implement a policy that is obstructionist in nature. However, whatever policy emerges must be one that is based on principles of fair trade as well as free trade. Our country has stood forthrightly as an advocate of free trade, but in the final analysis we are going to have to see some reciprocity on the part of other nations in trying to achieve free trade. Hopefully, this issue will be taken off the shelf and get a full airing in Congress so that a sound and viable trade policy will emerge.

Rep. Ed Jones, D-Tenn., Chairman of the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Conservation, Credit and Rural Development, and Chairman Kika de la Garza, D-Tex., of the full House Agriculture Committee, Friday introduced a bill designed to broaden eligibility for federal drought disaster loans. The bill would require the Agriculture Department to make drought emergency credit and other aid available to individual farmers whose crops have been damaged by natural disaster, whether or not the Department has declared the farmer's entire home county eligible for aid.

the administration to activate an already authorized program providing emergency feed aid to drought-stricken owners of livestock foundation herds.

Jones said, "Farmers this year have suffered through the worst drought since the Dust Bowl. Probably about 2,000 agricultural counties have been affected and at least half have serious losses. The Secretary of Agriculture so far has not used discretionary powers to help farmers to the degree justified by the situation, so we must try to see what can be done in Congress."

De la Garza said, "The new bill does not authorize any new programs. It simply would require the USDA to activate several emergency assistance programs which are already fully authorized by existing laws which the administration has so far refused to put into effect."

"The credit programs which have been put into effect so far are useful and will be helpful to many farmers. I have been hoping the administration would listen to farmers, members of Congress, governors and others who have been pleading with them to use other existing authorities to meet the needs we all recognize. But if the administration won't act, we will have to try to require some of these additional steps."

De la Garza said he hoped the Conservation, Credit and Rural Development subcommittee can act rapidly on the legislation.

Co-sponsors of the bill include Reps. Tom Loeffler, R-Tex., Bill Alexander, D-Ark., and Harold L. Volkmer, D-Mo.

### Crippled Halls Team Couldn't Hold Lake

The Lake County Falcons came to Halls Friday night to prove something, and they did, 34-0. A crippled Halls Tiger eleven was never in the game as Lake County scored in all four quarters and led 21-0 at halftime.

Lake County running back Brian Avery was the difference, compiling 165 yards rushing on 24 carries and scoring three touchdowns. Time after time, when Lake County needed yardage, Avery delivered.

The Tigers aided the Falcons with fumbles and interceptions in crucial situations.

Lake County got its first touchdown on a 12 yard run by Avery, after it recovered a Tiger fumble at the Halls 32. Lake County took five plays to score. Ronnie Capps kicked the extra point.

The Falcons added touchdowns in the second quarter with Avery scoring on 7 yard and 3 yard runs. Capps' kicks were good each time.

Lake County recovered a Tiger fumble at the seven for the 7 yard TD and drove 43 yards, after a Tiger punt for the third score.

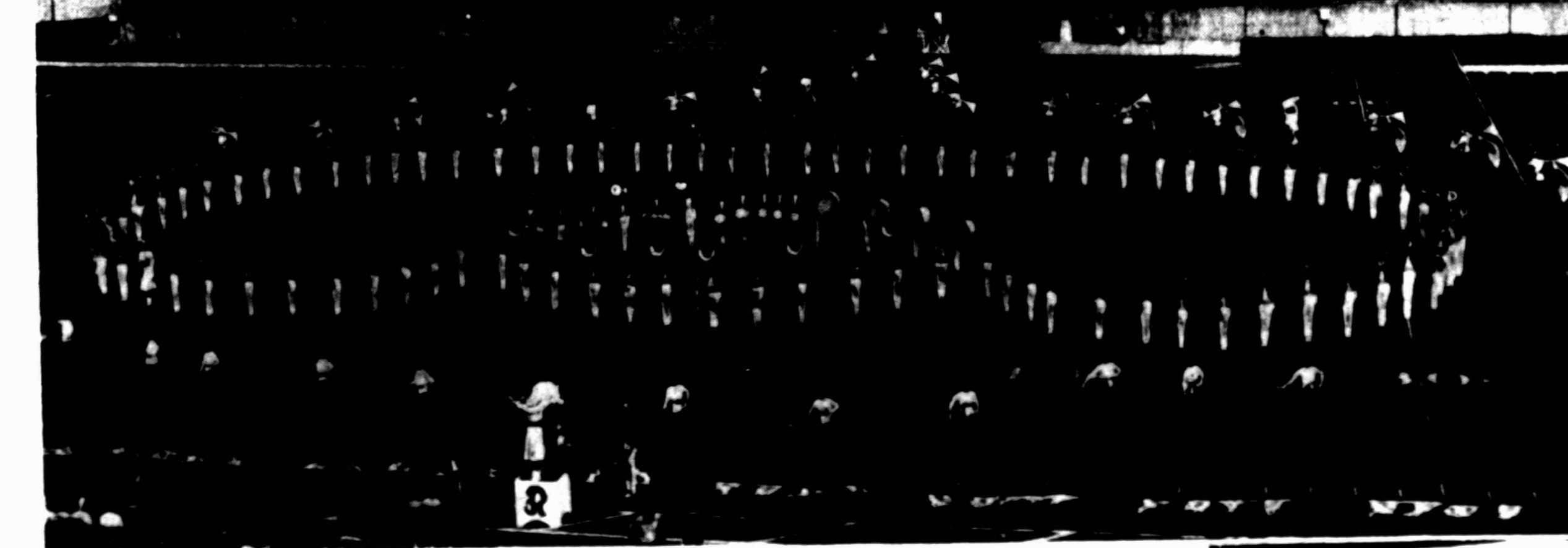

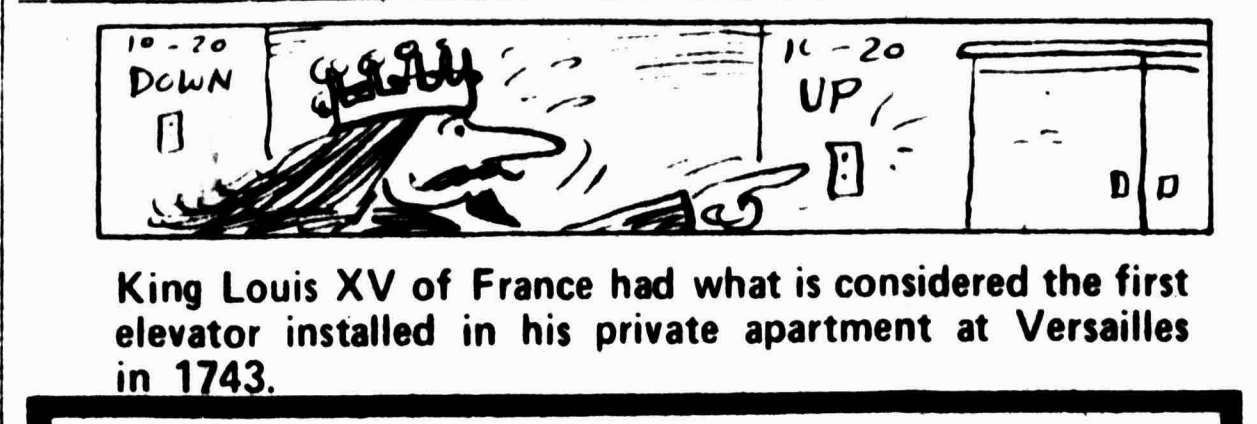

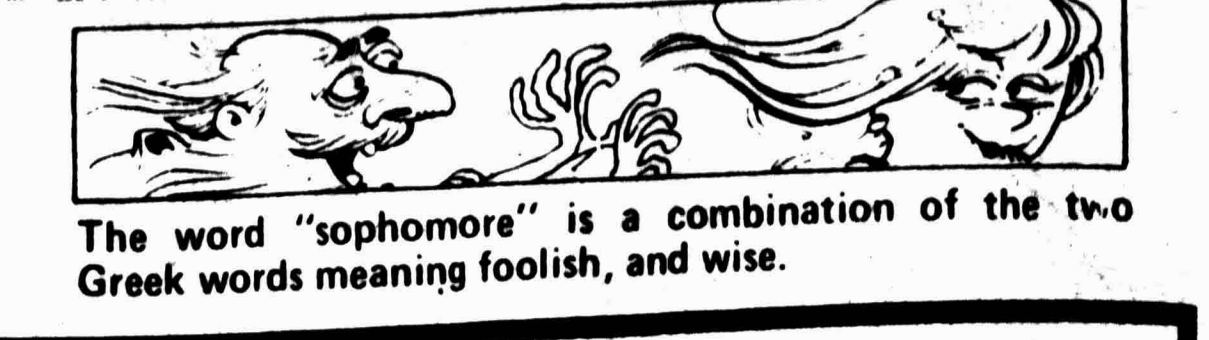

## Rebuffed In Region, Halls Visits Undefeated Gibson

Halls High School's Tigers, whose 34-0 loss Friday to Lake County's Falcons requires that they win from both Sharon and South Fulton to nail down a Region 7 A play-off berth, leave the Region this Friday to visit District 13-AA's undefeated Gibson County.

Gibson County's Pioneers have only existed for three previous seasons. They have improved steadily. Against "B" teams, they were 2-4 their first year. Playing varsity squads, they were 3-7 in 1981 and 5-5 last fall.

But all foes last year, except Trenton, were Class A, and this year's Pioneers, assigned to District 13-AA, are skipping the district race to join Crockett County, Dyer County, Martin Westview, and McKenzie in the West Tennessee Conference, with a post-season play-off and a 24-player all-conference team.

Coach Harry Tignor has only seven seniors on his squad of 29, but he has eight starters back. One senior, quarterback Brad Garner (5-11, 175), passed for 1,676 yards, rushed for 284, and scored 28 points en route to second team All-West-Tennessee honors last season.

Three other veterans fill out the backfield—fullback Scotty Wilson (5-10, 170, senior), and halfbacks Tom Shaw (5-11, 185, senior) and Scott Conder (5-9, 150, junior).

Other offensive starters back are tackles Jeff Dahlstrom (6-1, 195, senior) and Sid Nichols (6-1, 213, senior) and split end Greg Minton (6-3, 170, junior), shifted from tight end.

All except Wilson join senior returnee Mike Spence (6-0, 180) as defensive starters.

**Tide Turned Back 3-0**  
In its baptism of fire, the Pioneers' interior defensive line, with only one player having experience from last year, keyed a 3-0 win from Trenton Peabody's Golden Tide.

Fumbles—on the Tide 13, after Conder went 24 to the Tide 22, and on Gibson's 23, Minton recovering after Trenton had moved 64 yards in 12 plays—kept the first half scoreless, after Garner's pass (11th play of the possession) was intercepted by Ricky Barnett for 24 yards.

With :06 in the half, Barnett batted down a bomb intended for Gibson's new tight end, junior David Hollis (6-0, 165).

Taking the second half kick, the Pioneers drove 51 yards to fourth and five at the 16. Garner split the goal posts for the 30 win.

**Penalties Bailed Tide**  
Tide halfback Robbie Jackson got 27 yards on one of nine plays to move the Tide to Gibson's 22, but an offside penalty suggested a pass, shifted down by Minton.

When, on fourth and seven, split end Kevin Scott collected Jeff Oliver's toss on the six, a clipping penalty made it fourth and 15 on the 35, and Shaw, smelling out a screen pass, whirled Barnett to the turf for a 3-yard gain, Garner running out the clock for the win.

**Defense Held Martin**  
Defense, again, edged Martin Westview 14-13, in the PACER Stadium.

A pass completed from Gibson's 31, on its first play of its first possession, was fumbled away on the Charger 17, but Barry Kendall, with the ball on Gibson's six, tossed into the end zone.

Garner and Conder teamed to tip and intercept another Rebel pass before one clicked for 45 yards, with 4:00 in the game, and Troy Boucher intercepted.

A pass to Minton in the end zone was ruled incomplete. The Chargers swept right

booted to close it at 12-7. **Crockett Got Crushed**  
Crockett County's Cavaliers grabbed two fumbles and a pass to hold the Pioneers to a 12-0 lead at the half, but Conder returned the second half kick-off 72 yards to spark a 20-point third period and a 32-0 win.

Conder got 177 yards in 13 carries, of 277 rushing and 309 total. The Cavaliers had only 87 rushing, completing six of 15 passes for 60.

**Final Second Bomb**  
Greenfield tossed 45 yards to lead 7-0 with 8:08 in the first quarter but in the second period gave up a safety after a bad snap for a punt.

The Yellow Jackets' quarterback kept for 21 to make it 15-2 with 5:58 in the half. After another safety, Wilson scored from the two and McKenzie last week, 35-12.

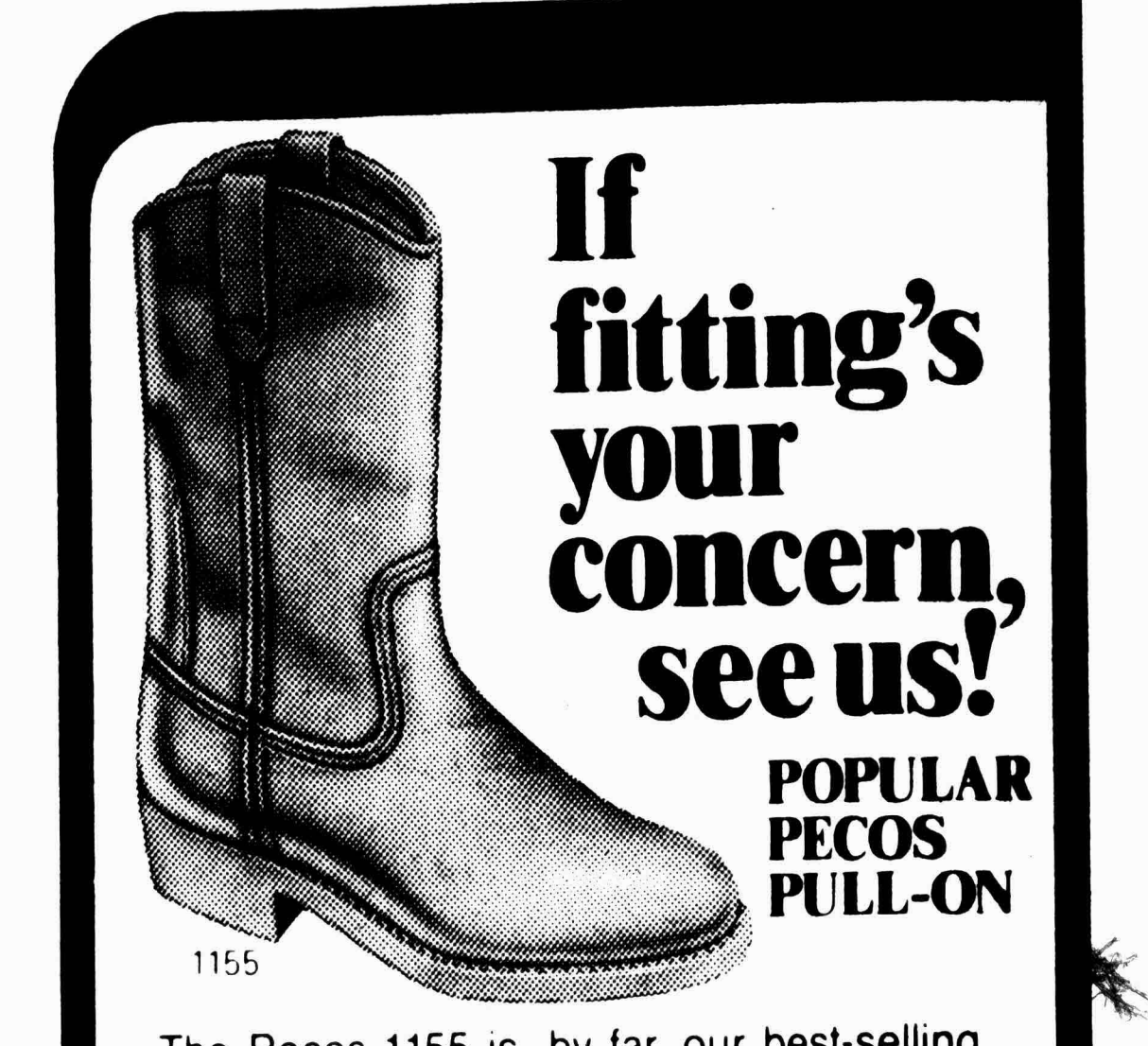

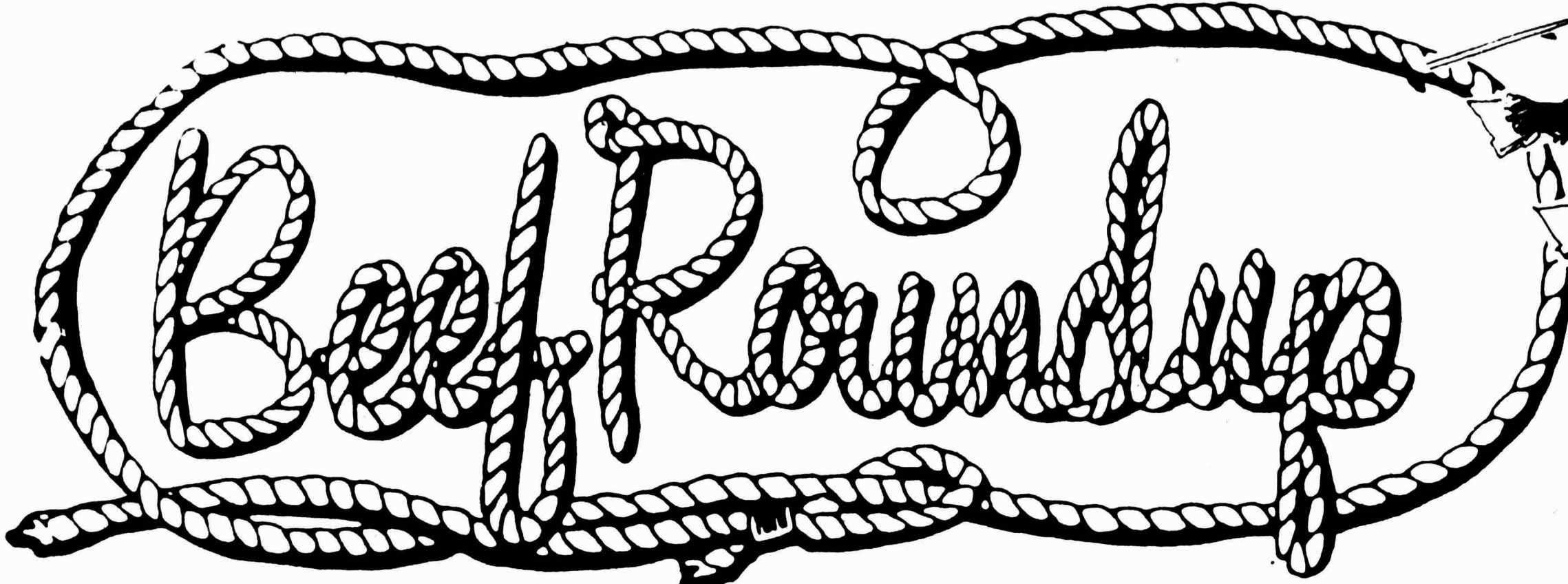

### Out of Line

Your editor was unable to attend last Friday night's football game at Gibson County, but we have been informed that a number of Halls fans accosted officials after the game, using threatening gestures and otherwise abusing them.

We can understand the frustrations of Tiger fans, but we wonder if they realize just how serious such actions can become. Continued actions of this type can result in censure and possibly probation for the Tigers, though the team is in no way involved.

We have been critical of some of the officiating, because of lack of knowledge, but at no time have we felt that any official has favored either the Tigers or the opposing team. It seems to us that the officiating needs improving, but certainly there is no way that actions of the fans at Gibson County can be justified or defended.

Stop no before serious damage is done. Give the Tigers your whole-hearted support, but don't place the whole Tiger athletic program in jeopardy by actions which will reflect on them with the Tennessee Secondary Schools Athletic Association. The TSSAA has full authority to even close down a program, should conditions justify such measures.

### Can Be Salvaged

The Tigers apparently were flat last Friday night and showed little effort at Gibson County, after the devastating 34-0 loss to Lake County two weeks ago, but remember that Gibson County is a Class AA team and has not lost this season.

The Tigers can re-group, win at South Fulton, and go on to a winning season and a place in the state play-offs.

Injuries have plagued the Tigers the entire season. Senior quarterback Fletcher Taylor injured a leg in a 3-wheeler accident during the summer, and back-up quarterback Sammy Burnette moved away. Taylor recovered enough to get in one series of plays, only to break a collar-bone and be sidelined again. Burnette returned in time to play in the last three games but is still not at top form.

Jarrett Rogers and Dickie Deaton, promising sophomores, who were seeing lots of playing time, went out with injuries, as did junior fullback Malcolm Parker and junior running back Chris Dennis. Loss of Dennis, Parker, and Taylor weakened the defense, with Deaton also missed as he was showing improvement.

In all probability, only Dennis and Deaton will see action against South Fulton, but the major change must be in effort. All is not lost if the Tigers play up to their ability.

## Death Takes Earl Tupper

Earl S. Tupper, 76, who invented Tupperware, died of a heart attack Oct. 3rd in Costa Rica to which he retired in 1973, becoming a citizen.

Tupper invented poly-T, the flexible, unbreakable, and heat-resistant blend of plastics of which he first offered 25 pastel items, including drinking glasses and a double-wall ice bucket.

He sold the business to Rex-all Drug Co. in 1958 for more than nine million dollars.

The line now has about 225 items, including toys and indoor garden accessories, sold by more than 250,000 dealers in 30 countries.

World-wide, there are an average of 75,000 Tupperware parties every day, the firm says, and probably more than 1,000 in the New York area alone.

Born in Berlin, N.H., on July 28, 1907, Tupper grew up on a farm in Massachusetts.

As a boy, he found he could make more money buying and selling other people's vegetables than by raising his own.

He later shifted to a mail-order business in combs, tooth brushes, and other small items which financed a small factory in Massachusetts in 1937, despite the depression gripping the nation.

Five years later, he began making Tupperware.

Another five years, and it had total receipts of more than five million dollars.

"He was the funniest man you ever saw," says Tom Dammigella, of Everett, Mass., who has distributed Tupperware for 40 years.

"He told the management at one time that under no circumstances would he appear at a meeting. He never did."

He leaves a wife and five children, three of whom live in Costa Rica, where he was buried in a cemetery near San Jose. He also leaves 14 grandchildren.

## Barclay Riley State Choice

Barclay Riley, former Gates resident who is Superintendent of Potter Home and School in Kentucky, has been appointed by Governor John Y. Brown to serve on the Institute for Children, an advisory committee of eleven citizens attached to the Cabinet for Human Resources.

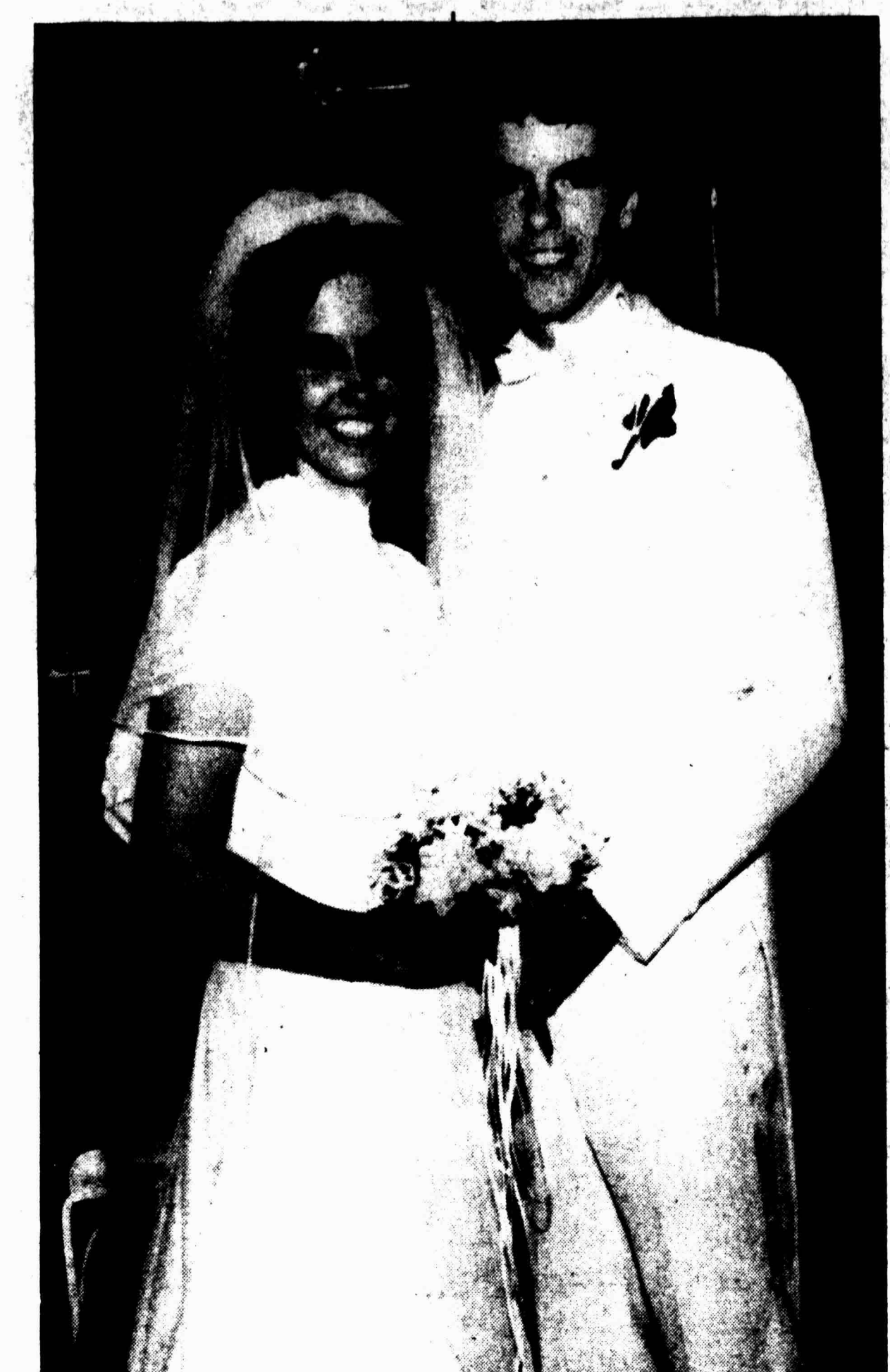

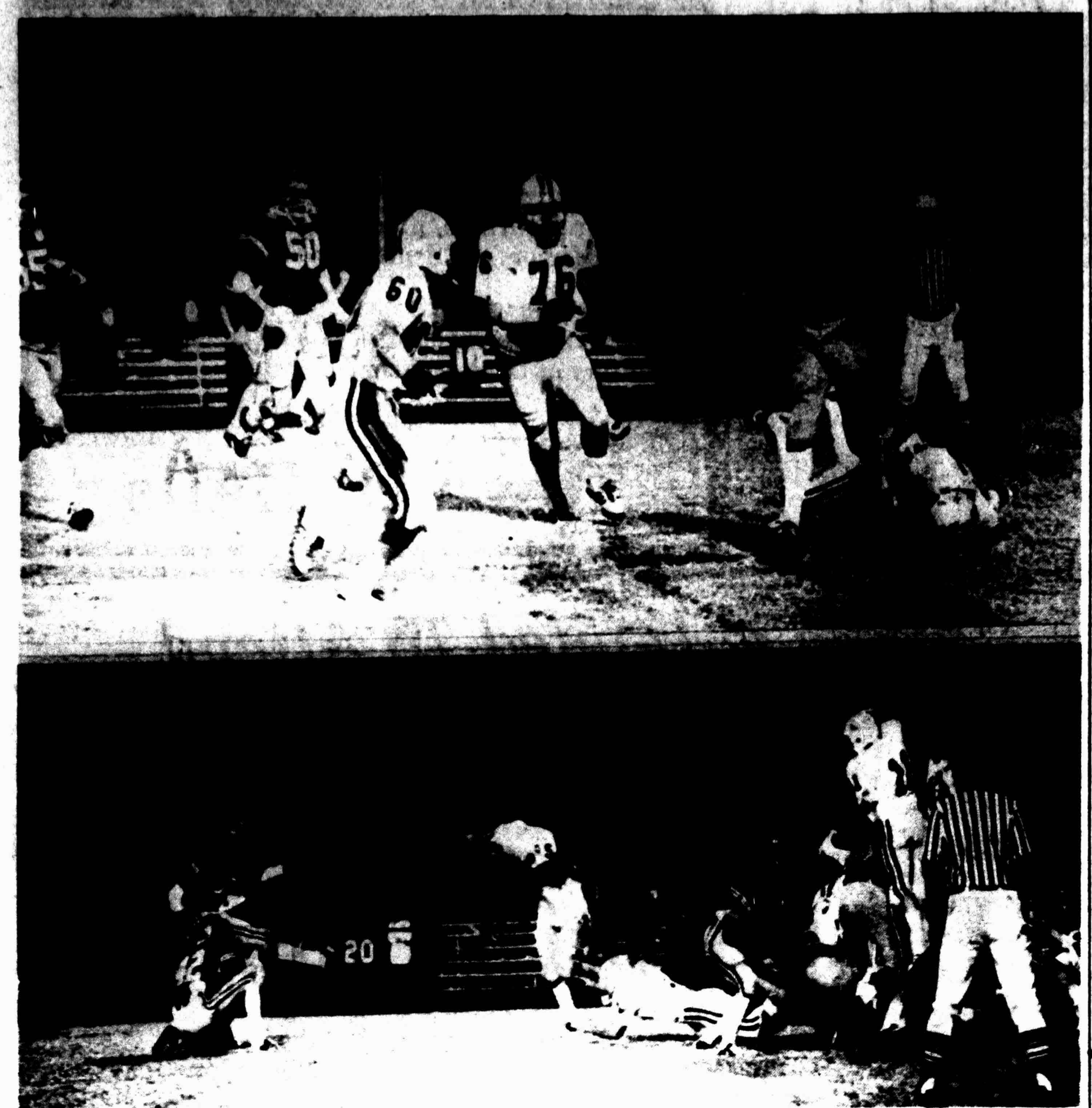

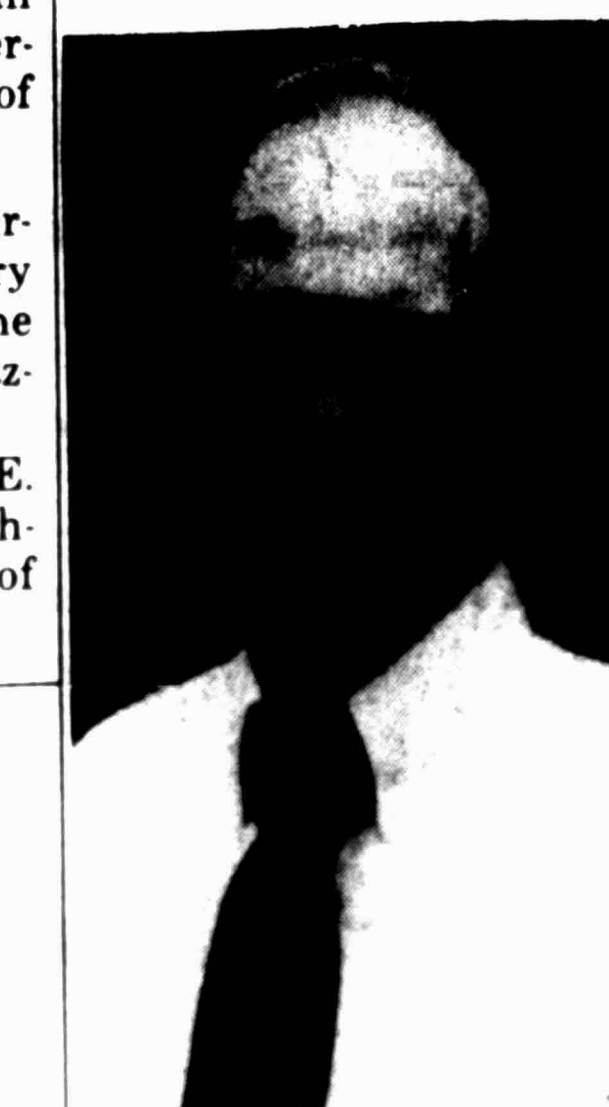
Those who wish to pattern their shotguns should provide their own ammunition, and they are asked to keep their firearms locked in their trunks while on Historic Area grounds.

Bean Yields Vary Widely

By Charles T. Peal

With soy bean yields in this county ranging from three to 40 bushels an acre, and many fields disked into corn, wheat without a freeze, storing them in plastic bags, and refrigerating them until next March.

August was the time nitrogen should have been applied to strawberries. Since there was no rain and the fertilizer may not have been beneficial anyway, one still can lightly apply nitrogen to encourage fruitbud growth.

Normal rate is 30 to 45 pounds per acre, about a pound per 1,000 square feet.

At this time, less than half this amount would probably not damage plants nor cause excessive growth but would supply enough nutrients to strengthen the fruit-bud.

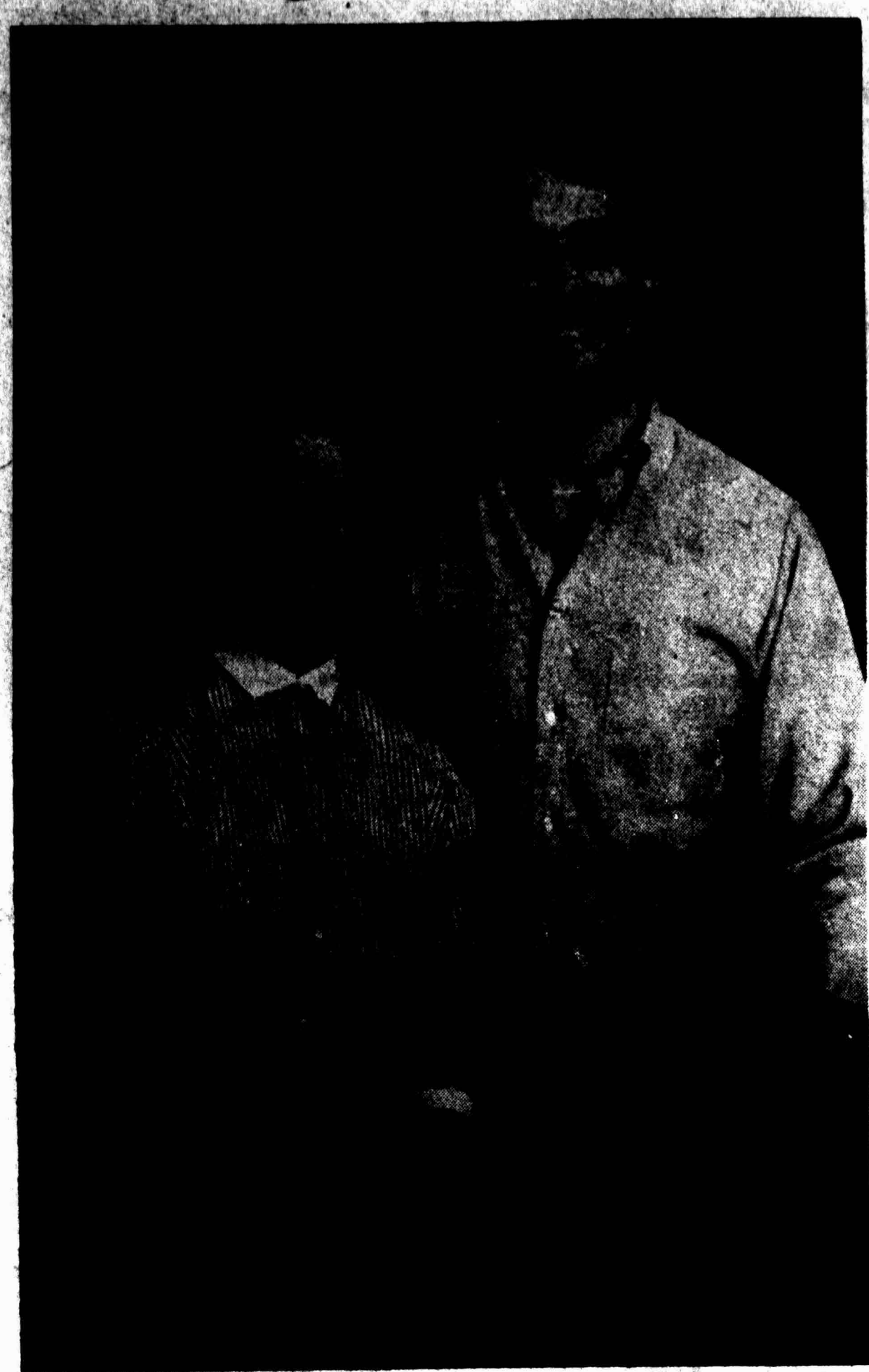

### REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

Last week, the tenth anniversary of the first OPEC oil embargo quietly slipped by us with only a minimum of fanfare. Though a few stories appeared in the media during the week about the embargo and its impact on our nation, there was no day of commemoration or memorialization. However, it might be interesting to take a look at our nation ten years after the start of the energy crisis.

It is hard sometimes to believe that only ten years ago, we could buy gasoline for about 35 cents a gallon. The oil producing countries of the world were selling oil for about \$2.10 a barrel. In 1973, the United States was getting 17.3 percent of its oil from the OPEC countries. Saudi Arabia was our second largest supplier. That same year, we were importing about 6 million barrels a day, a figure that rose to about eight and a half million barrels a day in 1977. Of all the energy consumed in this country, 47 percent of it was oil.

Those figures have changed a lot in the intervening ten years. Gasoline is running about a dollar a gallon higher now. The oil producing countries are selling oil for about \$30 a barrel. The OPEC nations supply only 7.6 percent of American oil needs, and Saudi Arabia has dropped from our second largest supplier to our tenth largest. We are importing about 4.3 million barrels of oil a day now and it now accounts for about 42 percent of all the energy consumed in our nation.

Those figures tell us a lot about what has happened over the last ten years in our use of energy. Conservation and recycling has become a way of life for most people. There is a greater consciousness of energy use among all people. Houses are better insulated. Automobiles are being designed to use less energy and appliance manufacturers are marketing their products with

All over Tennessee there are pockets of natural beauty that have escaped the onslaught of man-made developments, places that remain much as they were before the first white settler set foot in Tennessee. The Natural Areas Preservation Act, passed by the Tennessee General Assembly in 1971, helps to insure that these areas remain undisturbed - forever.

The State Natural Areas Program stands guard over a wide variety of Tennessee's natural treasures: virgin forests, majestic waterfalls, cavern systems, unique rock formations, deep gorges, scenic lakes, and swamp-like bottomlands. There is even an area containing the largest remnant prairie in the southeastern United States.

To date there are 29 State Natural Areas scattered around the state, encompassing over 50,000 acres. They range in size from the 18,000-acre at Reelfoot Lake to the two-acre Natural Bridge site near Sewanee.

"There are plenty of other local, state and federal parks for high-impact recreation. With the Natural Areas, the idea is to allow a little impact by man as possible."

In other words, when you visit a Natural Area don't expect to find tennis courts, ball diamonds or golf courses. In many cases, the only recreation is the foot trails leading through the forest.

The 12,000-acre area is named for one of the highest peaks in the Cumberland Mountains, the top of which is often shrouded in snow or ice. The observation tower provides a commanding view of the Cumberland Plateau.

Botanists say that Frozen Head is one of the richest wildflower areas outside of the Smoky Mountains. The Natural Area sponsors a wildflower pilgrimage every spring. There are over 55 miles of foot trails meandering through the hardwood cove. The Natural Area contains several picnic areas, picnic areas, and an amphitheater.

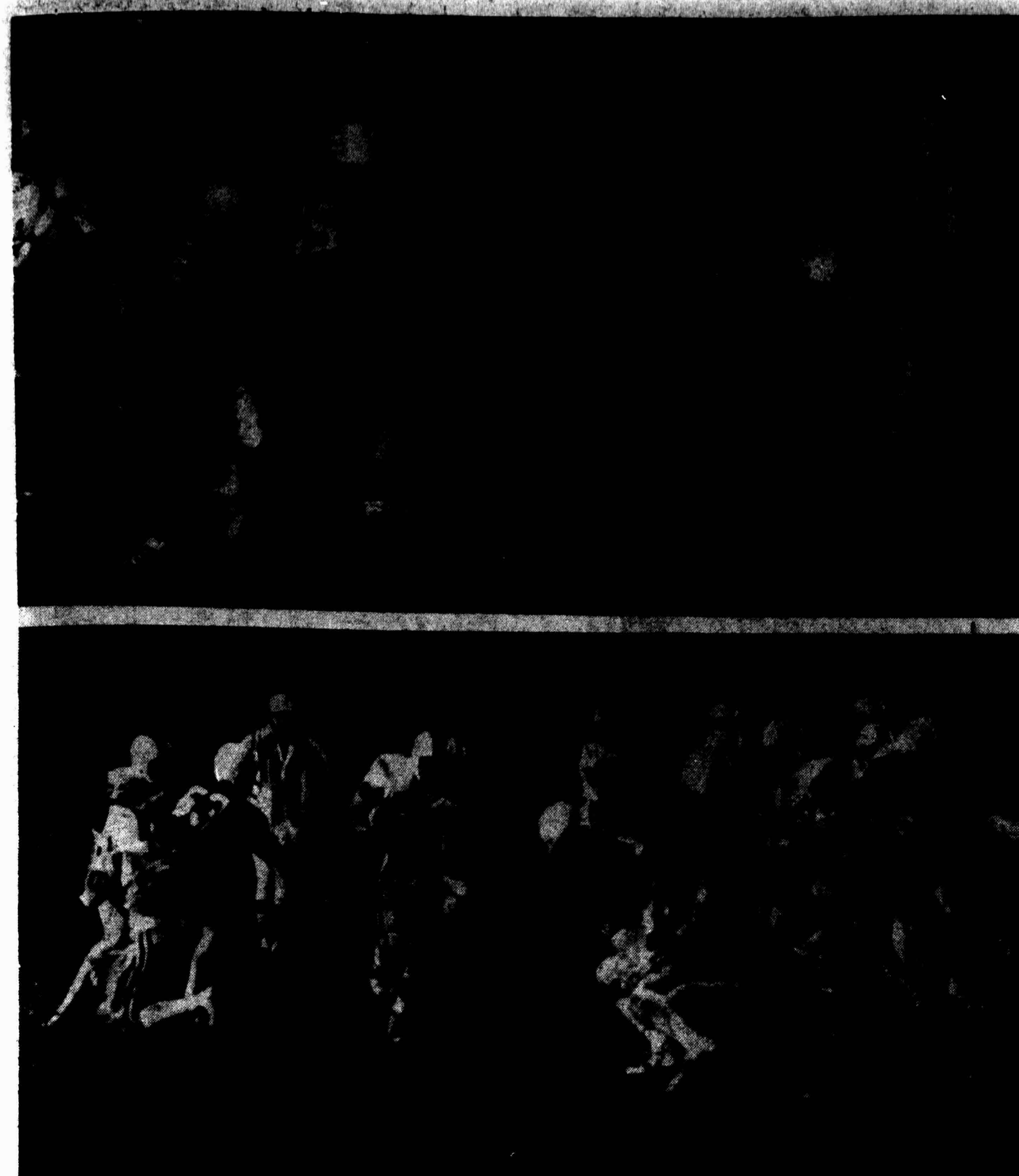

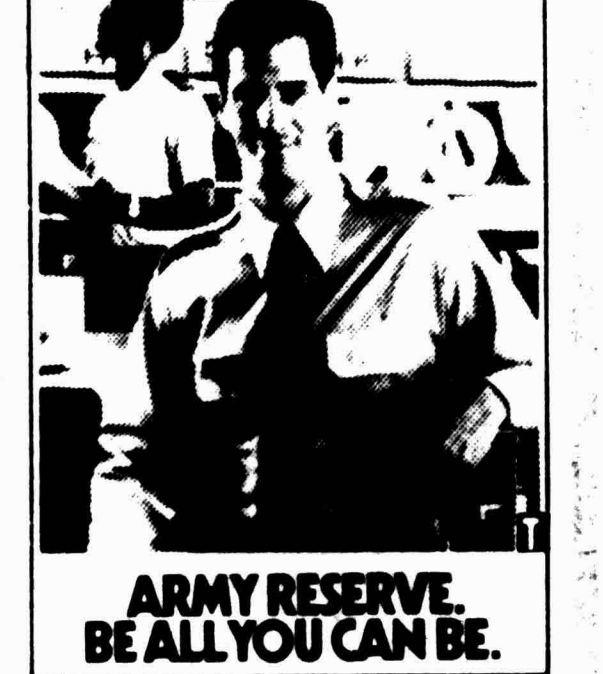

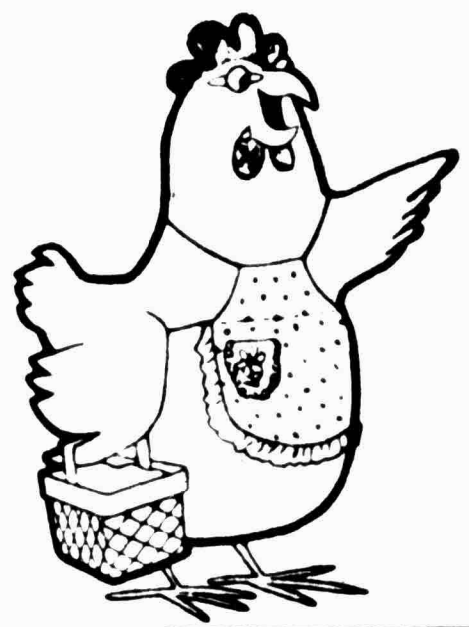
