

**Richard Bostic Jailed** As Halls Bank Bandit




### Can Be Salvaged



## **Death Takes** Earl Tupper

Earl S. Tupper, 76, who in vented Tupperware, died of a heart attack Oct. 3rd in Costa Rica, to which he retired in 1973, becoming a citizen.

Tupper invented poly-T, the flexible, unbreakable, and heat-resistant blend of plas tics of which he first offered 2 pastel items, including drink ing glasses and a double-wall ice bucket.

He sold the business to Rex all Drug Co. in 1958 for more than nine million dollars. The line now has about 225

items, including toys and in door garden accessories, sold by more than 250,000 dealers in 30 countries.

World-wide, there are an average of 75,000 Tupperware parties every day, the firm says, and probably more than 1,000 in the New York area

Born in Berlin, N.H., on July 28, 1907, Tupper grew up on a farm in Massachusetts.

As a boy, he found he could make more money buying and selling other people's vegeta bles than by raising his own

He later shifted to a mail or der business in combs, tooth brushes, and other small items which financed a smal factory in Massachusetts in 1937, despite the depression gripping the nation. Five years later, he began

making Tupperware. Another five years, and it had total receipts of more than five million dollars.

"He was the fussiest man you ever saw," says Tom Da migella, of Everett, Mass., who has distributed Tupperware for 40 years.

"He told the managemen at one time that under no cir cumstances would he appea at a meeting. He never did."

He leaves a sister and five children, three of whom live in Costa Rica, where he was bu ried in a cemetery near San Jose. He also leaves 14 grand





The Natural Areas Preservation Act, passed by the Tennessee General Assembly in 1971, helps to insure that these areas remain undisturbed - - forever

The State Natural Areas Program stands guard over a wide variety of Tennessee' natural treasures: virgin forests, majestic waterfalls, cavern systems, unique rock formations, deep gorges, scenic lakes, and swamp-like bottomlands. There is even an area containing the largest remnant prairie in the southeastern United States.

To date there are 29 State Natural Areas scattered around the state, encompassing over 50,000 acres. They range in size from the 18,000 acres at Reelfoot Lake to the twoacre Natural Bridge site near Sewanee.

"There are plenty of other local, state and federal parks for high-impact recreation. With the Natural Areas, the idea is to allow as little impact by man as possible."

In other words, when you visit a Natural Area don't expect to find tennis courts, ball diamonds or golf courses. In many cases, the only evi dence of man's intervention are the foot trails leading through the forest.
