

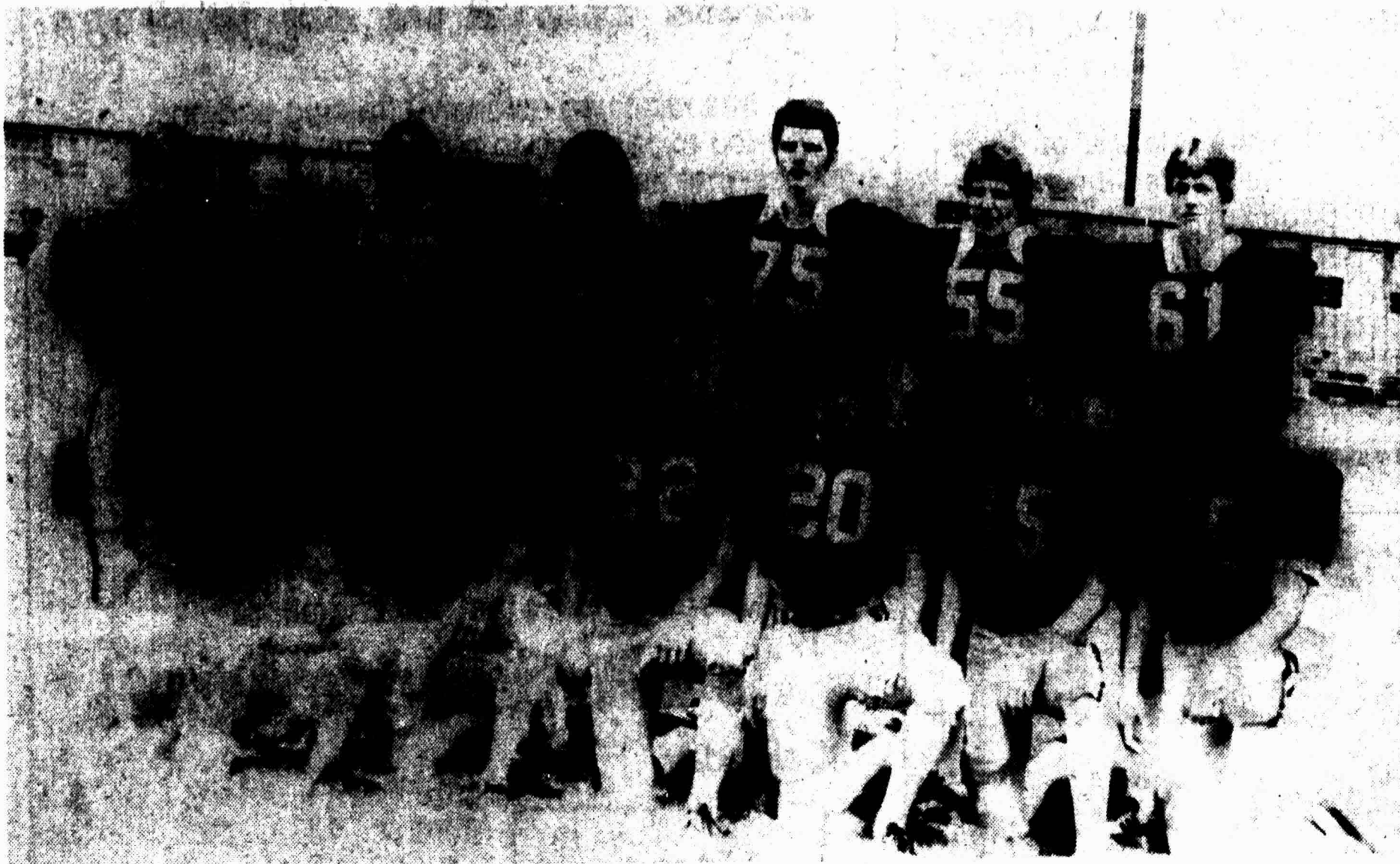

Halls Hosting Bolton To Open Grid Season

The Halls Tigers will host Bolton at 7:30 p. m. Friday in H. G. Conley Memorial Stadium to open the 1983 football season.

Bolton, with a 4-6 record in 1982, is expected to be improved. The Bolton attack features the running of Deron Bell, along with a good passing attack. Bell, while not having blazing speed, is a shifty runner and a threat every time he handles the ball.

The Tigers received one encouraging note during the weekend when injured quarterback Fletcher Taylor was allowed to return to practice Monday. While not likely to play a great deal for some time, Taylor is certain to heighten the morale of the Tigers.

Probable offensive starters and others seeing action, their weights and classes, are split end Scott Meeks, 155, senior, weak tackle Jimmy Clark, 178, junior, or Clay Dew, 171, senior, weak guard Clay Baker, 160, junior, or John Kerby, 145, senior, center Paul Ward, 174, senior, strong guard Lawayne England, 180, senior, strong tackle David Hughes, 215, senior, tight end Dicky Deaton, 220, sophomore, running backs Pat Smith, 163, senior, and Jarrett Rogers, 160, sophomore, running back and fullback Chris Dennis, 151, junior, fullback Malcolm Parker, 150, junior, quarterback David Blackwood, 162, senior, quarterback and kicker, Benjie Goodwin, 155, sophomore.

Defensive starters are ends Scott Meeks and Clay Dew, tackles David Hughes and 282-lb. sophomore John Arwood, with sophomore Dicky Deaton relieving either tackle, nose guard John Kerby, and linebackers Lawayne England and Paul Ward.

Also seeing action will be Malcolm Parker and sophomore Michael Dew, 150, cornerbacks Pat Smith and Chris Dennis, and safeties David Blackwood and Benjie Goodwin.

All but Goodwin, Deaton, Arwood, and Michael Dew are lettermen.

Mark Holder, Agrico manager, will continue with Crop Production Services. He says the fertilizer firm will continue to offer the same services, stressing agronomic programs, service and soil testing.

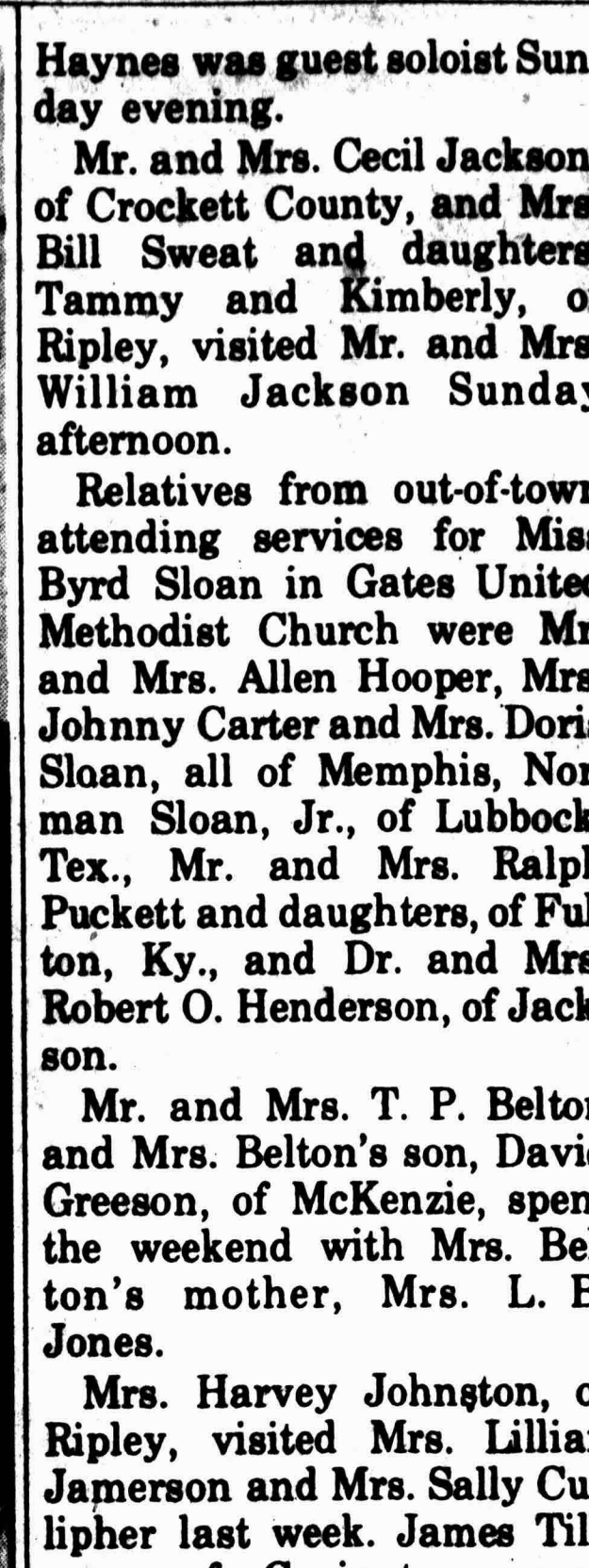

J. W. Sweat and Lawson Elder were among the first to recognize this problem with Lawson controlling one badly infested field by using Methyl Parathion. This insect basically eats foliage but is known to attack the pod as well.

To determine threshold or control level, it is necessary to determine the percentage of foliage that has been eaten. When soy beans are in the bloom stage, up to 30% of the foliage can be destroyed before spraying takes place. In the pod fill stage 20% is the threshold level. The leaves are, of course, necessary for the manufacture of the food to fill the pods. Moisture would have helped us two ways. First, the natural predators of these worms would have become more active and probably would have taken care of enough so that the activity would have been lessened below the threshold level and, second, rainfall would have caused more growth on the plant giving additional leaf surface for better pod filling.

There have been more acres sprayed in the north end of the county than in any other area. Material such as Lan-nate-Nudrin, Sevin, Methyl Parathion and Pydrin are being used. The controls seem to be rather effective. We urge our producers to continue scouting fields and to certainly not spray unless absolutely necessary. The cost of the plane plus materials in most cases equals nearly one bushel of beans.

possible damage. The economic threshold is two worms per foot of row. To determine the number of worms per foot of row, take a cloth or newspaper three feet long, place it between the rows and shake the plants on either side vigorously. Also, check for pod damage and remember that a mature worm can do a tremendous amount of damage, and that one will eat on several pods.

Trouble spots should be scouted at least every other day to determine the extent of worm activity. We hope that by the time that you see this in print that the situation will have passed.

Weather Reduces Yields
The continuing hot, dry weather has heightened farmers concern about crop yields and livestock pastures. In our area, temperatures have been above normal during the past month and many producers around the county report no rainfall since the first of July.

Little farm activity has been going on. Some are still spraying spots for weeds while others are cutting some silage and preparing fallowed land for fall seeded crops. Some land is, of course, too hard to be worked at this time.

Corn continues to be harvested for silage and some is getting close to the moisture content for grain harvesting. Yields of 50 bushels will be excellent this year. We have seen some fields where there was hardly any cob in the ear.

Cotton is beginning to open on some of the upland soils and at least 11 days ahead of the average. Some bolls are opening prematurely as a result of hot, dry weather. Wheat beans continue in poor condition. About 70% of them were beginning to set pods last week which is actually much behind the normal schedule.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

Recently, the General Accounting Office released to the Congress a summary of its investigation into the bankruptcy statutes of the country and offered some ideas of what changes might be contemplated. Since the Congress made changes in the Bankruptcy Code several years ago, there has been a growing concern over its impact. Consequently, calls for additional reforms have come from several quarters. Many feel that the changes made in the code made it easier for persons to declare bankruptcy and alleviate debt obligations that they had incurred.

The GAO, at the request of the Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, undertook a comparison of personal bankruptcies filed under Chapters 7 and 13 before and after the implementation of the 1978 legislative changes. The analysis was not done nationwide but was compiled in five bankruptcy court districts in New York, Ohio, Kentucky, and California. Chapter 7 bankruptcy provides for the liquidation and distribution of the debtor's non-exempt asset to creditors. Chapter 13 bankruptcy differs from Chapter 7 in that it does not require that property be surrendered to satisfy debts to creditors. It does provide the debtor to retain his or her assets when he or she agrees

to pay the creditors over a period of time. The GAO report indicated that the Chapter 7 debtors showed similar personal characteristics such as employment and occupation both before and after the 1978 law went into effect. That was also true of Chapter 13 bankruptcy after the 1978 law went into effect. In many other respects, those filing bankruptcy before and after the new law went into effect had similar characteristics.

The GAO also analyzed how several modifications to current bankruptcy law would affect those cases they reviewed. If, for example, a \$3,000 limit were placed on the value of exempt household goods, there would be a significant increase in the amount of property that could be liquidated for distribution to creditors. That would also be true if a total dollar limit was placed on exempted property when using Federal exemptions.

Among the most prominent issues at hand is legal authority to restructure the bankruptcy court system which the Supreme Court has ruled unconstitutional. The legislation now pending to do that is H. R. 3 and it would create a separate bankruptcy court with judges appointed similar to the way they are for federal district courts. The Supreme Court ruled that the present system is unconstitutional because judges were not tenured and could therefore not rule on issues in a case that exceeded bankruptcy matters. The Supreme Court has allowed the present system to continue operating, within some constraints, until Congress took the needed action.

These issues relating to bankruptcy appear to be among those that will be acted upon later this year. I plan to study this legislation closely before it comes to the House floor.

Halls Winners Enter District At Dresden

Halls High School's Tigers, victors 14-6 Friday over Bolton, launch their District 7-AA campaign this Friday in Dresden, whose Lions lost last weekend to Martin Westview, 12-0.

Westview, 2-8 last season, is stronger this year, says Coach Gary Capers (now in his fifth season there), despite loss of six offensive and six defensive players by graduation, and a shoulder injury which required replacement of senior quarterback Doug Sims by junior Mike Ford.

Nevertheless, the Dresden Lions are widely considered the weakest of five contenders for the District 7-AA crown—Halls, District 15-A champs who made the state playoffs last season, perennial power Lake County, South Fulton, with 12 starters back from a 5-5 team, and Sharon, with only two starters lost from its first football team in 10 years, which was 2-6 last season.

Halls Won Sloppily From Perky Bolton

It wasn't pretty, but Halls High School's Tigers took a 14-6 decision Friday from visiting Bolton.

Four lost fumbles, an intercepted pass, and a poor snap to punter Benjie Goodwin gave a scrappy Bolton eleven opportunities to score, but it was unable to handle a swarming Halls defense.

The Tigers blew an early chance to get on the scoreboard when halfback Pat Smith was jarred loose from the ball at the Bolton 4-yard line. A second opportunity apparently was gone when Jarrett Rogers fumbled at the 13 near the end of the first quarter but Bolton obligingly fumbled on the next play and Keith Barlow fell on the loose ball. The Tigers drove for 59 points with Rogers going 5 yards with 11:18 left on the clock in the second quarter. Goodwin lined up to kick the extra point, but Bolton jumped offside and HHS Coach Andy Fugh elected to go for two with Rogers diving into the end zone for a 80 Tiger lead.

A Bolton passing attack worked well during the second quarter with quarterback Ray Craft throwing to 6' 3" Sylvester Gray and split end Hilton Malone, but they needed help from the Tigers to get their points. Tiger QB Fletcher Taylor, going back to pass, was trapped, hit hard and lost the ball with Bolton recovering on the Tiger 27.

Both teams were plagued with penalties and mistakes during the third quarter and much of the final stanza before the Tigers drove to their second tally from the Bolton 43. 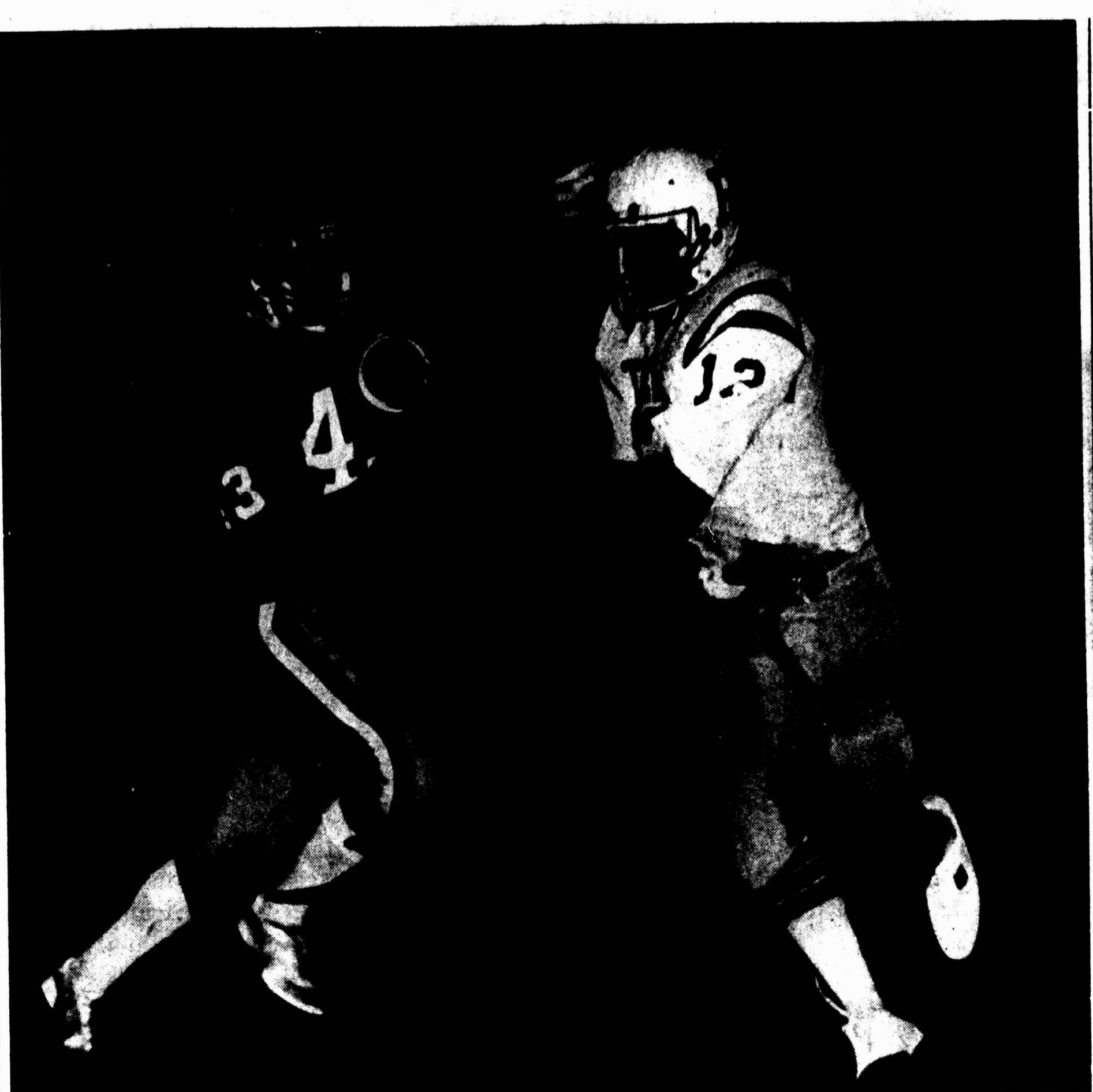

Vike Mistakes Utilized

Jimmy Isom passed to tight end James Ford for 43 yards and a TD with two minutes left in the first period.

After forcing a punt, Isom faked to Winston Harris for a 72-yard TD. After another Viking punt, Harris went 66 to score.

With 3:13 in the half, Viking quarterback Joe Gentry's pass was intercepted by Stacy Champion for an 18-yard touchdown.

Isom recovered Gentry's fumble on Humboldt's 40 to close out the first half.

Isom then faked superbly for a 39-yard TD, and a Humboldt fumble on its 28 set up Isom's toss to Ford, taken on his finger-tips on the goal-line, with seven Vikings in close pursuit.

In the final period, Robert Joy returned a Viking fumble 46 yards to score.

Average Backfield?

Bolivar's giant killers, District 13-AAA and Region 7, AAA champs in 1981, had an 8-3 season last fall.

This year's 40-man squad has 16 returning lettermen and 11 returning starters, including six from the defense, who obviously turned in sterling performances Friday.

But over-all size is below average, and Coach Errol Hook, in his eighth year in Bolivar, calls his offensive backfield "average."

Even the veterans have to adjust to a slightly altered offense, tending more toward the washbone, to make best use of fullback Bill Moody, 6-1, 234-pound senior who runs a 4.5 second 40-yard dash. Moody hurt a shoulder as a sophomore and was brought along slowly last season.

He was impressive in Humboldt's first jamboree, Aug. 26th, though the Vikings only led young and small Jackson Central-Merry 13-7 (after JCM had trounced the Vikings in a scrimmage a week earlier).

In the jamboree, the teams met in 20 minutes of play without kick-offs or punt returns.

Power, Speed Shown

Moody went seven and then 13 yards to set up his score over left tackle with 7:01 left in the first, 12-minute period.

On Humboldt's second possession, the Vikings were fourth and one on their 40 when Moody barreled up the middle, veered to his right, and headed up the side-line.

An JCM's defensive back and in for the kill, Moody showed him his heels and left him 15 yards behind at pay dirt.

Moody then kicked the extra point to make it 13-0 with 2:45 left in the first period.

ONLY INCHES separated Jeff Fain's pass to Tim Maben, in the last seconds of the first half, from Savannah's Jacky Byrd (43)—but Byrd intercepted to hold Ripley to its 16-7 final loss.

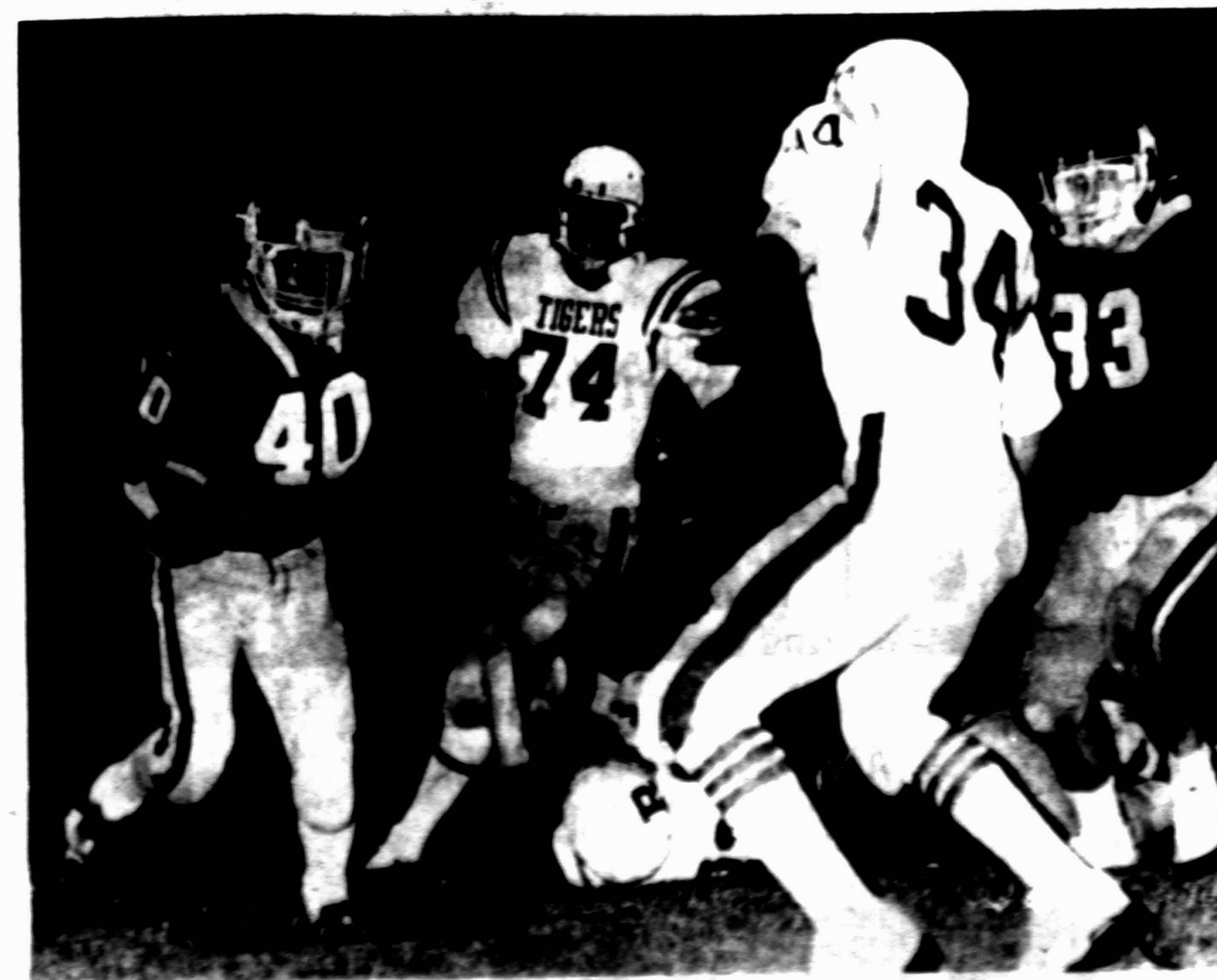

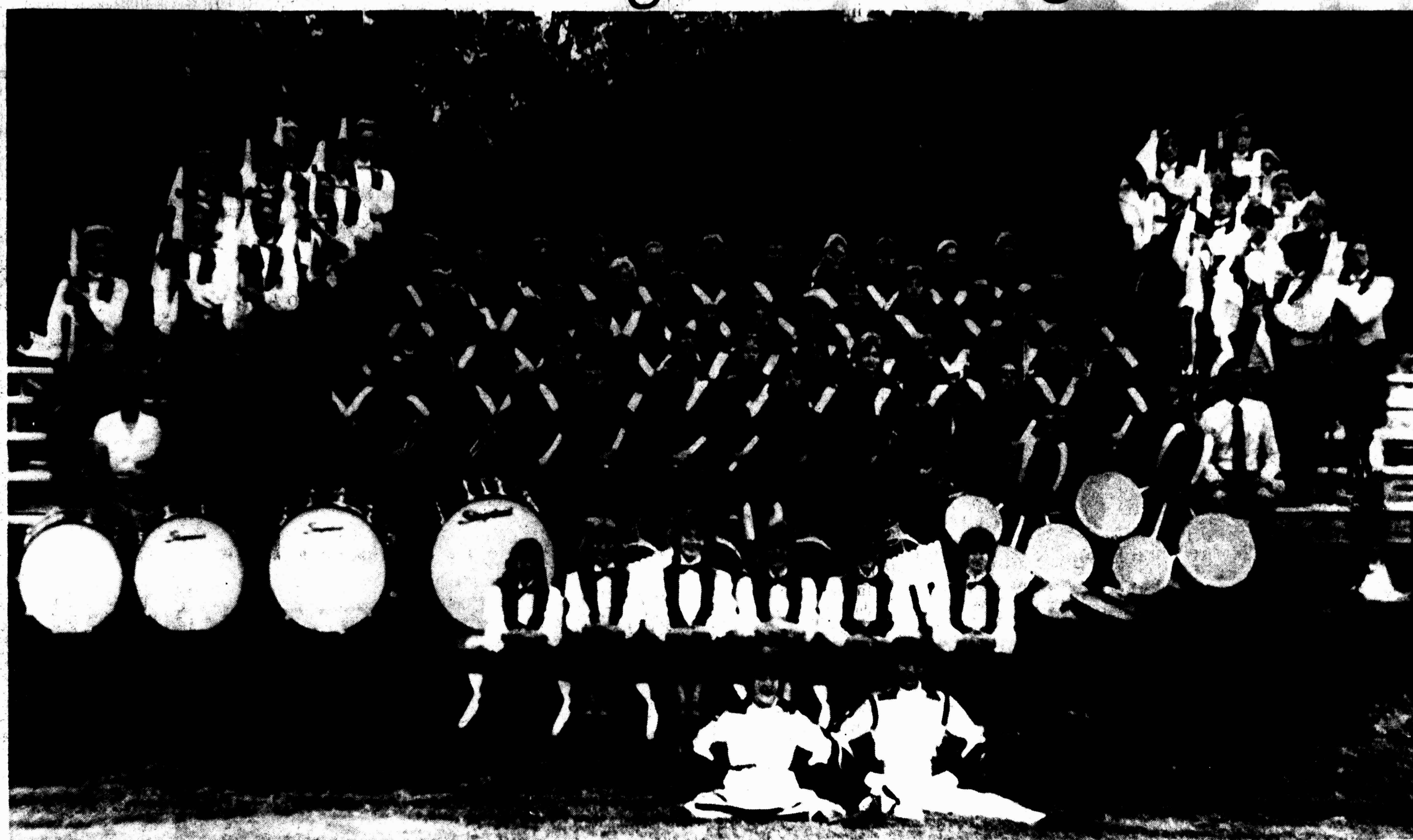

Halls To Crockett After 96-Yard Prudent Play Tops Dresden, 6-0

Halls High School's Tigers, holding an early season tie with Lake County for Region 7-A's leadership on a 6-0 win Friday in Dresden, leave the district this Friday to visit Crockett County High. While Lake's Falcons visit Sharon (9-6 winner from McKenzie, 14-6 loser Friday to Gleason) for Sharon's first district game, Halls faces a Crockett County team which has lost 27-8 to Obion Central and 29-6 at McKenzie.

This will be the third game in the history of the Crockett County Cavaliers.

Crockett County High is a consolidation of five Crockett County high schools at Highways 20 and 88.

Coach Ron Mohandro, who took the Memphis Skyview Hawks to the state play-offs in his last year as head coach there, coached Alamo's Red Devils last season.

Consolidation has doubled his squad this year, to 56, but loaded it with experience.

Because of the high schools consolidation with Alamo—Bells, Crockett Mills, Gadsden, and Maury City—did not have football programs.

Weak in the line, Crockett County has a capable quarterback, senior Eddie Churchwell (6-1, 175), and his favorite receiver, senior tight end Nathan Alexander (6-3, 200).

Churchwell hit Alexander for 61 yards in waning seconds of the first half to move the Cavaliers, trailing 20-0, to Obion Central's 10.

Churchwell got close to the five before fumbling with 14 seconds on the half.

Crockett County scored on the first play of the fourth period after Tony Johnson intercepted on Obion Central's 35.

Churchwell fell a yard short before senior full back David Pitts (6-2, 210) posted the Cavaliers' first touchdown when Churchwell then hit Alexander for a 2-point conversion.

Playing Safe Wins

One good offensive call and a perfectly executed quarterback sneak culminated Friday night in a 95-yard run by Halls High School quarterback David Blackwood to give the Tigers a 6-0 win in Dresden.

The Tigers took the opening kickoff but could not move the ball and were forced to punt, with Dresden taking possession on its 41. Three plays later, Dresden had to kick, with the ball rolling dead at the Tiger five.

Thinking to wedge out a few yards and not risk a hand-off deep in Halls territory, Halls Coach Andy Pugh called for a quarterback sneak. Blackwood took the snap, moved forward, and suddenly found that he was behind the charging defensive line.

He broke for the goal line, eluded the Dresden safety, and went 95 yards for the Tiger touchdown with a little more than five minutes remaining in the first quarter.

Benjie Goodwin's kick for the extra point was no good, and the Tigers had the only points scored during the game.

The Tigers missed an opportunity to add more points after recovering a Dresden fumble at the 25, on the ensuing kick-off. They were unable to move the ball because of a penalty and a missed hand-off.

The Tigers were able to muster only one first down during the remainder of the game, though amassing 123 yards on the ground.

Dresden had 12 first downs, with 123 yards on the ground and 25 yards in the air, but it was never able to post any points against the strong Tiger defense.

The Tigers never got a pass off. Dresden could complete only three of eleven.

Halls fumbled seven times, losing two. Dresden fumbled four times, and Halls got two of them, with Chris Dennis and David Hughes picking up the fumbles.

Defensive play was outstanding for the Tigers, with Scott Meeks participating in 17 stops, David Hughes in 16, Dennis in 15, Lawayne England in 14, Blackwood in 12, and Paul Ward in 11.

Jimmy Meeks, a 1983 graduate of the University of Tennessee in Martin, has been named a graduate assistant in the Physical Education Department at Memphis State University.

He will continue his studies toward a master's degree.

Custom Paving, of Ripley, submitted a bid of \$35,124.

Alderman James Jones, Eugene Pugh and Marcus Spiller were named to study the cost of repairing or buying a new back-hoe.

Mayor Joe Jacobs told the board that the Halls Medical Board had requested some consideration for Dr. B. G. Robbins, operator of Halls Medical Clinic, who said slow payment of insurance claims has created financial problems. The Board voted unanimously to forgive the rent on the clinic building to Jan. 1, 1984.

Mayor Jacobs said he and city recorder Katie Davis had discussed an expense account for the mayor with city auditors, who said a resolution would be required but no documentation would be requested to verify actual expenses.

James Jones, Eugene Pugh, and Dr. Robert Stolarick were named to make a recommendation to the board.

A request by Dorris Rodgers for some relief on his sewer bill was denied. Rodgers said water from his swimming pool never goes through the sewer system but must be pumped out from the surface.

The Board ruled that under the present setup, there could be no change from a tie-in to the water usage.

It was agreed to place a street sign at Hazel and Tigrett Streets and a stop sign at Bob's Market.

Proficiency Testing Shows County Gain

County School Supt. Phillip W. Jackson reports that 71% of the county's high school freshmen passed all parts of their proficiency tests, compared to 60.3% in 1981 and 65% in 1982.

The county ranked 82 out of 147 school districts in Tennessee in 1983.

Of 317 seniors graduated this year from Halls and Ripley High Schools, 288, or 91%, passed the test by or during their senior year. Only 9% either failed to pass or were not required to pass the test as special education students. The test, first given in 1981, tests minimum skills and must be passed to earn a regular academic diploma.

Students take the test first in their freshman year. Those who do not pass initially are given an opportunity to take the test each succeeding year and twice in the senior year.

Not Satisfactory

The Tennessee Department of Education last week released results of the high school proficiency tests, with Lauderdale County ninth graders showing 71% with passing grades.

This figure should be completely unacceptable to teachers, parents, and students, since the test is supposedly set at a sixth grade level. A passing grade is required to secure a high school diploma, but more than that, the students need a higher proficiency to compete in the job market.

Lauderdale County is reasonably close to its neighboring counties, with Tipton County lower, Memphis city schools lower, Haywood County lower, and Dyer County somewhat higher. Fayette County ranked lowest in the state, with 51%.

Apparently the greatest weakness is in reading and language skills, with grades somewhat higher in mathematics.

We don't have any immediate answers and certainly don't think that the schools must bear all of the blame, since home background, etc., play a significant part. Every effort should be made by all concerned to better these grades.

Incidentally, we feel certain that students would have graded no higher when we were in school, but the need of better education is much greater now than was true in the late 1920s. All of us should join forces in trying to improve.

Our Opinion

A number of newspaper columnists and TV commentators have been critical of President Reagan's response to the shooting down of the Korean airliner by a Russian fighter plane.

It seems to us that there was little more that he could do. Mr. Reagan commented after one critical column, "Would you prefer war?" We must agree that the only steps he can take must be guided by actions of our allies as well as our own feelings.

Actually, the Russians made a serious error, since world-wide opinion seems to be strongly against their actions and their refusal to admit responsibility by lying about it.

Perhaps some good will come out of a terrible act if nations and people begin to realize the threat that Russia is to world peace.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

As Congress returns from its August recess this week, it faces a full agenda before adjournment later this year. The target date for adjournment has been set for the end of October, but that goal may not be met as crucial decisions must be made on various issues awaiting final action.

For example, while substantial headway has been made on the appropriations bills, which are needed before the start of the new fiscal year, there are several that have not yet been considered. It is hoped that these bills will be ready for floor action so that they can be finalized in the near future. The House has already taken action on eight of the thirteen required appropriations bills and others are awaiting the action of the House. The Senate has worked on several of their appropriations bills but are still behind the House in the number on which action is needed. The House must still finish its work on appropriations bills for Defense, Foreign Aid, Labor-Education-Human Services, State-Justice-Commerce, and Treasury—Postal Services which were sent back to committee for changes.

In addition to these important bills which authorize actual spending by various federal agencies, final action must be taken on the Defense

in the House is still awaiting Senate action.

Among the issues that must be acted upon before adjournment is the telephone rate problem resulting from the court-ordered divestiture of AT&T. The committees with jurisdiction in the House and Senate have already begun hearings on this matter, which will affect every telephone user in the United States. Those hearings are expected to continue when the Congress reconvenes with the possibility that legislation will be ready to come to the floor of the House in late September. This legislation must be acted upon in a timely manner because the AT&T divestiture and other decisions made by the Federal Communications Commission will take effect January 1, 1984 without it. This is a terribly important issue and there is a growing concern that Congressional action must be taken to avert substantial increases in telephone rates. Obviously, these are only a few of the bills that need Congressional action before the end of the session. There are others that are waiting in the wings but could be considered early next year. They include natural gas pricing legislation, immigration reform, clean water act amendments, and legislation deregulating radio and television broadcasting. All of these issues are active in the Congress. In many cases, they have already been reported out of the committees with jurisdiction. That means that any one, or all of them, could be brought to the House floor for debate and a vote as the schedule permits.

Needless to say, there are plenty of important issues that warrant Congressional action. There is no doubt that many of them will be resolved before adjournment. Hopefully, many others will be, as well, so that a legislative log-

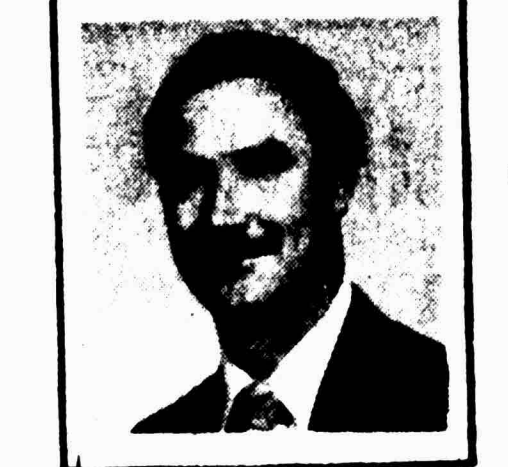

Bands Begin Contest Season In Dyersburg

Ripley and Halls high school bands begin their competition season Saturday.

They will join in the Fourth annual Dyersburg Invitational Marching Festival, which begins at 2 p.m. with nine bands participating. Halls will appear at 3 and Ripley at 4. Ratings will be given of band, color guard, percussion section, and drum major.

The Ripley band then defends its title, held four years, as champions of the Gold (largest) Class in the eighth annual Milan Invitational of 24 bands. Awards will also be given for overall best drum majors and color guard. Ripley is scheduled to perform at 9:24.

All bands will receive taped comments from judges.

Drouth Spurred Prussic Danger

The severe drought in our county can cause serious health problems for cattle. While lack of enough to eat for their cattle is becoming a problem for many owners, the presence of a poisonous cyanide in the feed also can cause sudden death of cattle which grazes drought-damaged forage.

Prussic acid poisoning (also known as cyanide or hydrocyanic acid poisoning) can occur in cattle grazing a variety of plants belonging to the sorghum family. Johnson grass, Sudan grass, common sorghum and sorghum-Sudan hybrids all can contain high levels of prussic acid.

The amount of prussic acid in these forage crops is increased by heavy fertilization, weeding, trampling, spraying with herbicides and freezing. Also very young, rapidly growing plants contain greater amounts of the agent, glycoside, which releases prussic acid when digested by ruminants. Thus the severe drought, followed by a period of rains and new growth, could provide a "double whammy" for cattle allowed to graze this group of plants during late summer and fall.

Prussic acid acts within the cells of the body to block oxygen uptake by the cells. Blood appears bright red because the exchange of oxygen for carbon dioxide in the tissues does not take place. Animals affected with prussic acid poisoning die very quickly.

Affected cattle show signs of excitement and muscle tremors followed by slobbering, running eyes and passing urine and feces. Death comes quickly due to respiratory failure, although the heart may continue beating for minutes following failure of lungs.

While animals are usually found dead following prussic acid poisoning, if sick animals are suspected of having eaten forage containing this toxin, treatment with a mixture of sodium nitrate and sodium thiosulfate can break down the cyanide complex that forms with red blood cell enzyme systems.

Modern sorghum species grown for forage have been selected for low cyanogenic capability. Under normal circumstances, they should not be troublesome; however, under drought or other stresses, the production of prussic acid may occur.

This year, Johnson grass may present a particular problem because of its presence in and put in the federal grain reserve program. P.K acreage is now being grazed as a drought relief measure for cattle producers.

Fields with heavy growth of Johnson grass severely stressed by the dry weather can present a serious hazard for cattle. Deaths of cattle have already been reported in West Tennessee.

Cattle which have had feeding of grain or other readily available carbohydrates before grazing are more tolerant of toxic levels of prussic acid. However, it is best to keep cattle completely out of fields where prussic acid may be present. This poison is also present in wild cherry, apricot, peach and apple leaves, especially when wilted.

Soil Tests Help County Farmers

By Charles T. Peal

Soil tests results were received last week from the University of Tennessee Soil Testing Laboratory in Nashville by Donald Smith, Talmage Critchfield, Jr., C. H. Baker, David Hopper, W. H. Jordan, W. S. Meadows, Philip Brasfield, J. S. Fullen Farms, Sam Henderson, Charles Simpson, and Rob Revere as they prepared to apply recommended amounts of fertilizer to a variety of crops this fall and early winter. Alfalfa recommendations accounted for five of these tests. Presently there are over 1,000 acres of alfalfa being grown in Lauderdale County. This is a high quality crop and with our newer chemicals we are able to keep the stand for at least five years under good management. Other crops were fescue and ladino pastures, wheat and soy beans in a double-cropping situation, corn, soy beans, milo and gards.

The advantages of applying fertilizer and lime this fall are: Soil conditions are usually good for spreader equipment to get across the field. Fertilizers can be incorporated into the soil along with crop residues.

Fertilizers applied in the fall may avoid potash supply problems in efforts to reduce accident losses among farming and ranching families by promoting the safety of their children and youth.

National Safety Council estimates indicate that in 1982 farm work accidents resulted in approximately 1,800 deaths and 180,000 disabling injuries. Children and young persons 24 and under accounted for about 1 of every 4 of these totals. Many thousands of farm and ranch residents of all ages were also seriously injured or killed in traffic, home and recreation mishaps. All told, the dollar cost of these accidents to farming families exceeded \$5 billion. However, no dollar value can be placed on the resulting suffering and grief, the hardship and emotional devastation.

Soil Tests Help County Farmers

The analysis provided by the laboratory is based upon extensive research over many years, we can only say that soil tests are not perfect but are the best guidelines that we have available.

Instructions and materials for taking and mailing samples are available at the U-T County Extension Office, Ripley.

Soy Bean Worms Fewer

In our scouting soy bean fields on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week we found lower levels of the cloverworm complex than we had the previous two weeks. It appeared that there was very little new leaf damage.

We are advising producers to watch the worm situation on a day to day basis. Though some of our fields have gone above the 20% threshold, where we normally recommend spraying, we feel that with the small number of worms, very little spraying will need to be done.

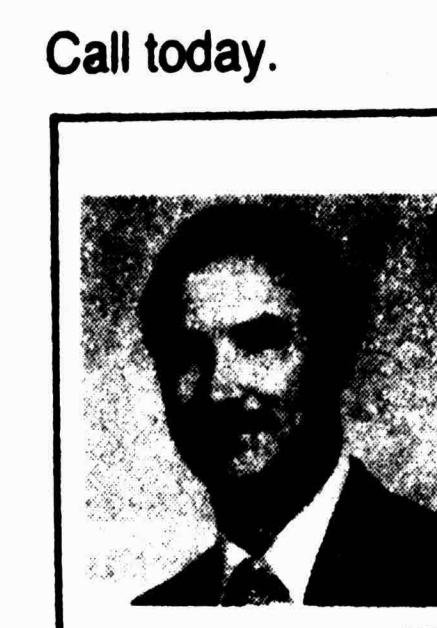

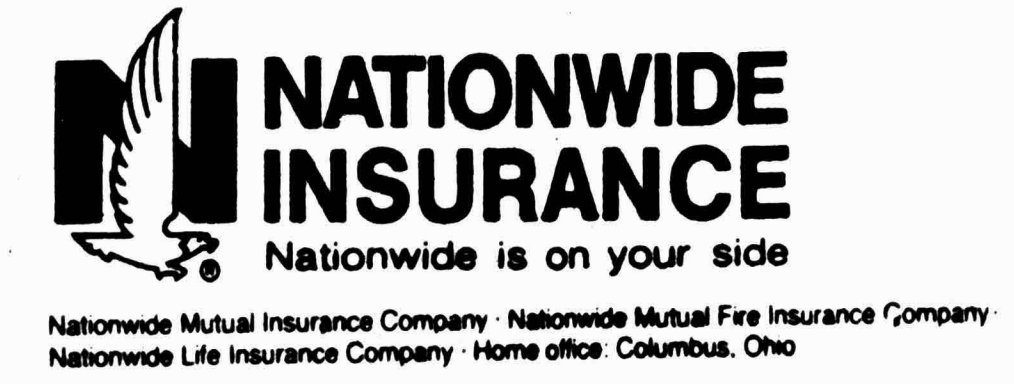

Drouth Withers Crop Forecasts

The persistent hot, dry weather during August has stressed crops and resulted in forecasted yields on Sept. 1 to be below the August 1 level for all crops. The aggregated production of all the major spring planted crops is below other "drought years." Temperatures exceeded the 100 degree mark in many locations during the month and rainfall was light and scattered. For several areas, it was the hottest August since record-keeping began 103 years ago.

Tennessee's 1983 soy bean production is forecast at 32,640,000 bushels, down 49 percent from 1982. An estimated 1,920,000 acres will be harvested with an expected yield of only 17 bushels per acre, the lowest yield on record since soy beans have become a major crop in Tennessee. The lack of moisture has caused pods on early planted beans to not fill and has stunted the growth of late planted beans. The 17 bushel yield is 10 bushels below 1982. U. S. soy bean production is forecast at 1.53 billion bushels, 33 percent smaller than 1982's record crop. Yields are expected to average 24.9 bushels per acre, compared with 32.2 bushels per acre in 1982.

The Lauderdale County Emergency Board met Sept. 19 to develop a report of the current crop situation for state officials. Our yield assessment for early planted soy beans is 12 bushels per acre average, for wheat,

beans, 5 bushels, and cotton was reported at 225 pounds of lint per acre.

The dry conditions are delaying the planting of alfalfa, winter cover crops and could affect wheat sowing if moisture is not forthcoming soon.

The drought relief will create a lot of talk in Washington but not much action. Congressman Ed Jones reports that he recommended to the Secretary of Agriculture in Chicago Conference that he examine the

many programs now in place that he can use at his discretion to help alleviate the serious problems that will result from the drought.

Apparently the Secretary is not planning to use this discretion authority because this year's PIK Program has already put \$9 billion into 26 drought damaged states. In addition the thought was advanced that crop farmers had an opportunity to take advantage of crop insurance.

Saving Garden Seeds
Protecting purple hull pea

seed for next year's planting was the concern of Mrs. Jewell Sutton as she recently received a supply to be used for next year's crops. Weevils are not properly protected. Gardeners interested in saving their own seeds may store them in cans or jars. Carbon disulfide may be placed in a fruit jar lid on top of the seed to destroy any weevils that might be present and to keep others out.

With the high cost of garden seed those of string beans,

Alert Teller Thwarts Halls Bank Robbery

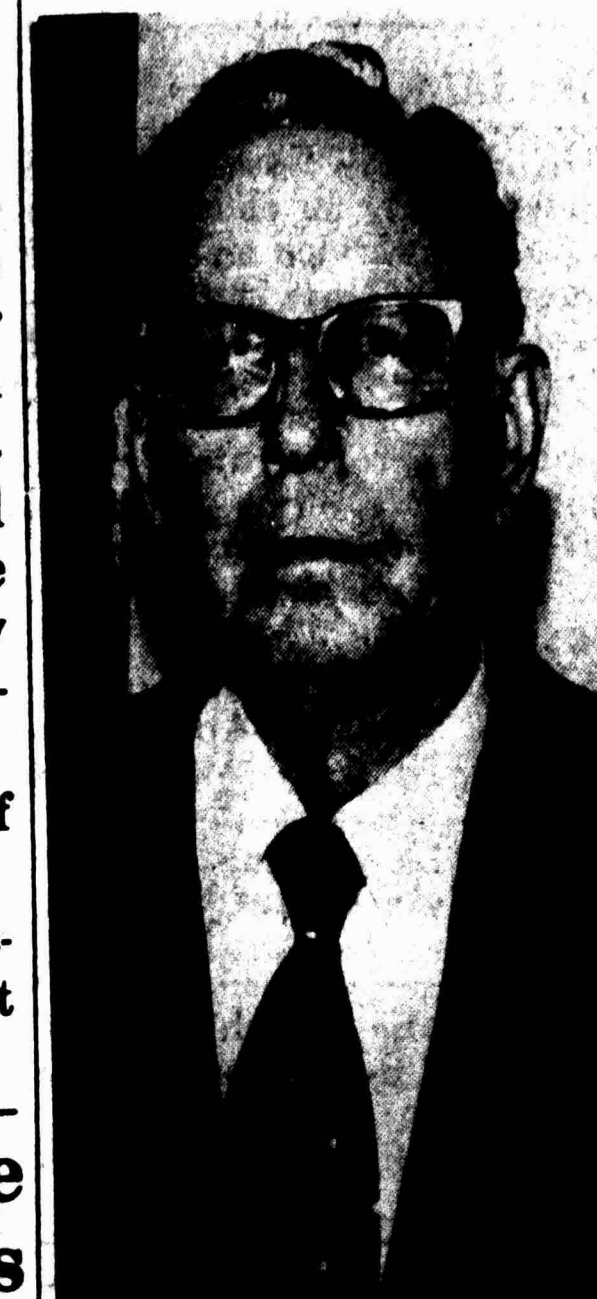

Bruising Rushing Game Nets Halls Big Home-Coming Win

Halls High School's Tigers used a bruising running game to cap their homecoming Friday with a 35-14 win over Madison County's hapless Denmark West squad. Tiger full-back Chris Dennis had his best night, scoring three touchdowns and picking up 53 yards in five carries. He also posted a 27-yard dash to the end zone on a screen pass as Halls completely dominated the game.

West, unable to move after receiving the kick-off, gave the Tigers the ball on their 45 after a short punt.

The Tigers rushed for four first downs before quarterback David Blackwood dove into the end zone.

Benjie Goodwin's kick was good with 3:42 in the first quarter.

On their second possession, the Tigers moved in eight plays from West's 47 to its 40. Dennis drove in, and Goodwin's kick was good for 14-0 lead with 8:47 in the second quarter.

Gill got Denmark West's last six points with a 2-yard run, aided by two Tiger penalties. Hines was unable to get his pass off for two points.

The Tigers had 13 first downs on 188 yards rushing and 31 passing. West had 11 first downs on 106 yards rushing, 20 passing.

For the first time this season, the Tigers lost no fumbles, though they dropped the ball twice.

Blackwood led Tigers rushers with 64 yards on 14 carries. Dennis had 53 on five. Jarrett Rogers 24 on six.

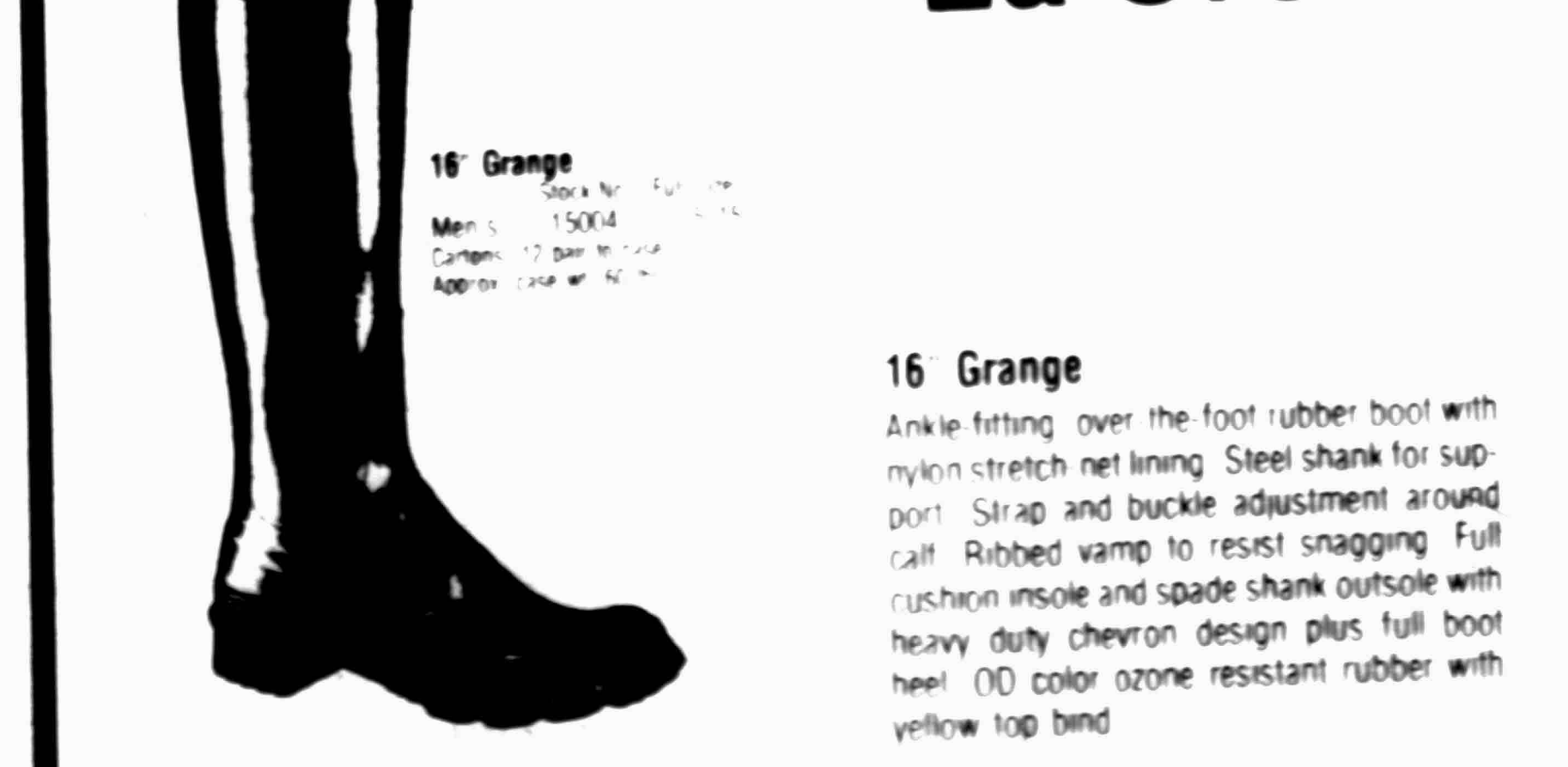
