More Sales Tax

We imagine most of you have noticed that beginning Sunday you are paying an additional 1% sales tax. This means that in Lauderdale County you are paying a total of 71/2%—even more in Dyer, Tipton, and Shelby Coun-

The additional 1% is to help pay for Gov. Lamar Alexander's new better education program, even though estimates show that even more money will be needed.

We have always opposed a state income tax, but we are now beginning to feel that an additional sales tax is too great a burden on the poor and the senior citizens who are dependent on Social Security checks or other small retirement checks. Some better means of raising the money needed for education most be found.

We hope that the new education program and the additional sales tax cost don't turn out to be an April's Fool joke!
