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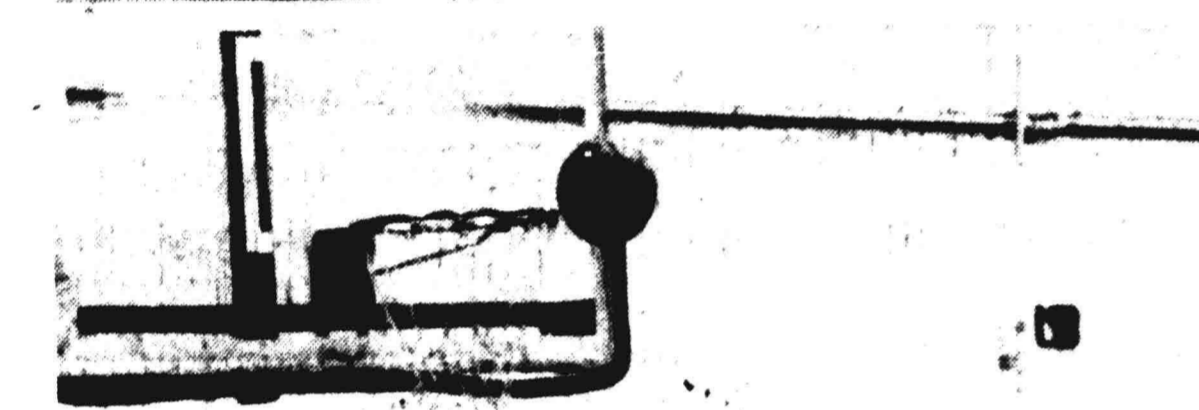

Gov. Lamar Alexander has endorsed legislation to establish new districts for state trial courts and will recommend more than \$500,000 in his new budget to fully fund 4 new judgeships.

Announcing his support for the redistricting bill, Gov. Alexander called it "a far-sighted approach" and predicted that passage of the legislation would give Tennessee "a good, well-managed court system."

The proposed 29th Judicial District would include Dyer, Lauderdale and Tipton counties, with three judges.

He told the bill's sponsors, Sen. John Rucker, (D-Murfreesboro), and Rep. Mike Murphy, (D-Nashville), that he has included in his 1984-85 budget more than \$500,000 to fund 4 new judicial positions and staffs that would be added this year.

Halls Cagers Susanne Hurt On The Road Made Interne

Halls High School basketball teams play in South Fulton Friday and in Bradford Tuesday.

Halls cagers took both games from Old Hickory Academy in Jackson Tuesday of last week, as the Lady Tigers posted a 56-41 victory, their second win of the 1983-84 season. Camille Pitts had 26 points, and Sharon Piphus added 21 for Halls.

Halls Tigers bombed Old Hickory, 92-33, for their highest point total this year. Ten players scored for the Tigers. Terry Parish led the way with 22. Alfonso Abernathy added 19 and Calvin Jackson 10.

In Halls Friday, the Tigers shocked Greenfield, 67-53. Halls girls dropped a 61-33 decision to Greenfield.

Pitts had 15 points for the Lady Tigers. Greenfield's Deanna Moore led all scorers with 16.

The Tigers trailed sixth ranked Greenfield 13-14 at the end of the first quarter but took the lead, 31-27, at half-time. Leading 44-41 at the end of three quarters of play, the Tigers outscored the Yellow-jackets 23-12 in the final stanza for the victory. Abernathy canned 22 points. Andre Wells and Reginald Foster each had 13 for the Tigers. Jeff Crouse had 19 and Malcolm Skinner 17 for Greenfield.

The Halls Tigers, 9-6 for the season, are rated number five among Class A boys' basketball teams in *The Commercial Appeal's* Class A Prep Poll.

Three Tiger losses have been to Class AA and AAA teams. The Tigers hold victories over top-rated Greenfield and third-rated Bradford.

Halls History

Pioneer Days in Halls, by Mrs. M. J. Mitchell, great-grandmother of Mary Martha (Mrs. Neil) Dyer, says:

"We went to church at Elon down at 'The Bridges' and listened to long and splendid sermons by Brother Joseph Borum, whose fine character was a great influence on this community. There was usually a sermon Saturday and Sunday, and Brother Nixon and Brother Young (father of Judge Young) preached there several years.

"At the church door, the boys used to wait for the girls to come out, then stepped up to ask if they might ride home with them. The ride home was usually a race, and the boy was apt to be left far behind if we didn't care much for him.

"For some special occasion, the boys would write notes to the girls on small cards enclosed in little embossed envelopes. They were written with great pains and many a fine flourish, then sent by a houseboy, who awaited a reply.

"We did not have flappers then, but some girls had a way of fainting on occasion. When Dr. Reynolds was paying court to Cousin Jinny, a crowd of girls stopped in a store at the Bridges and the doctor centered his attentions that day on Lonella Soward; Jinny fainted, and with the doctor's assistance, she soon revived and was escorted home."

Wooden Bridges Being Replaced

Like the Marine Corp. W. T. Cutchin & Associates, of Dyersburg, will be looking for a "few good men" in the spring.

"That's when work is really expected to pick up on replacing 14 wooden bridges on State Route 88 in Lauderdale County.

"We're working about 12 men down there," the project's general superintendent, J. C. Medley, said in Dyersburg Thursday of last week. "But just as soon as spring gets here, we'll up that to 24 or 25."

Most, he said, would be hired locally in Lauderdale County.

The firm was awarded a contract for the project last July 1st by the Tennessee Department of Transportation. It's bid, the lowest of six submitted, was for \$2,565,625.

The start of the replacement work was delayed, Medley said, because of the necessity of moving utilities in the area and building detours around some of the bridge sites.

"We're really just getting started," Medley said. "Because we're having to maintain traffic on the route, we had to move in quite a bit of dirt to make some detours. Then we had to get the utilities, phone lines, things like that, moved. But, we really expect to get cranked up in the spring."

Medley said the firm had the substructure up on three of the new bridges and the beams and deck panels in place on one of those.

"Right now," he said, "we expect the job to take about 18 months from start to finish."

The contract calls for the construction of prestressed I-beam bridges over Mill Creek, Sumrow Creek, Tisdale Creek and at three points along the South Fork of Forked Deer River.

In addition, it provides for the construction of five concrete box culverts along the 1.2-mile stretch. Grading, drainage and paving of the approaches and the installation of guardrails and pavement markings are also included in the pact.

W. T. Cutchin & Associates is a member of the Tennessee Road Builders Association in Nashville which represents nearly 300 highway contractors and related industries statewide.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

Among the first activities in Washington in the first week of the new session was the President's State of the Union address. This is the traditional report by the President on the state of the nation. It's generally the opportunity for the President to put before the Congress and the country his agenda for the year and the goals he hopes to achieve during the year. This year was no exception.

Over the years, I have come to recognize that the State of the Union Messages usually outline very worthwhile goals. That is the reason that President Reagan's speech was about what I expected. He put before us his list of priority issues on which action should be taken this year. Unfortunately, as is the case with this sort of message, it did not expound very much on the details of how the goals the President discussed would be achieved.

I think it needs to be emphasized that we all aspire to the President's goals. A balanced budget, greater international stability and less tension, a strong economy, and resolution of difficult domestic issues are important goals we all support. However, the disagreements on all of these issues are the result of the methods used to attain them. By their very nature, and the virtue of our system of government, issues such as these are going to bring forth differing views of how they can best be resolved.

The key to our system of government has been our ability to debate issues such as these, vote on them, and then abide by the wishes of the majority in that vote. That process entails discussions, negotiations, and compromise in a reasonable and responsible way. It is our obligation as elected representatives of our Congressional Districts to undertake the efforts needed to achieve these goals for the good of the country.

During the recent holiday recess, I stated several times that the two highest priority issues facing the Second Session of the 98th Congress were the budget deficit and the situation in Lebanon. I was glad to hear the President address the deficit problem. I hope that the bipartisan group which he suggested can reach some consensus on what needs to be done about it.

Even if it is only a short term, I do not feel that we can wait until after the elections eleven months from now to make progress on this important economic issue. Whatever progress that is made will depend heavily on all parties, including the President, reaching a reasonable agreement.

Probably my biggest disappointment in his State of the Union Message, was the President's lack of attention to the situation in Lebanon. He talked about that progress is being made there, but there is no solid evidence that the problems in that country are being

resolved. In fact, I am told by observers of that region of the world that the national reconciliation effort in Lebanon, which we all hoped would be successful, is at a stalemate with little reason for optimism that it will go any further. In fact, the morning after the President's State of the Union Message, the media was carrying stories to that effect.

The resolution to the problems in Lebanon depend on a diplomatic solution, as the President himself noted in a recent press conference. Unfortunately, diplomacy requires talk and from recent reports, it appears that fewer and fewer parties to the problems in Lebanon are doing that. It is a regretful situation and it is incumbent upon the President to re-evaluate the role our Marines are playing in it.

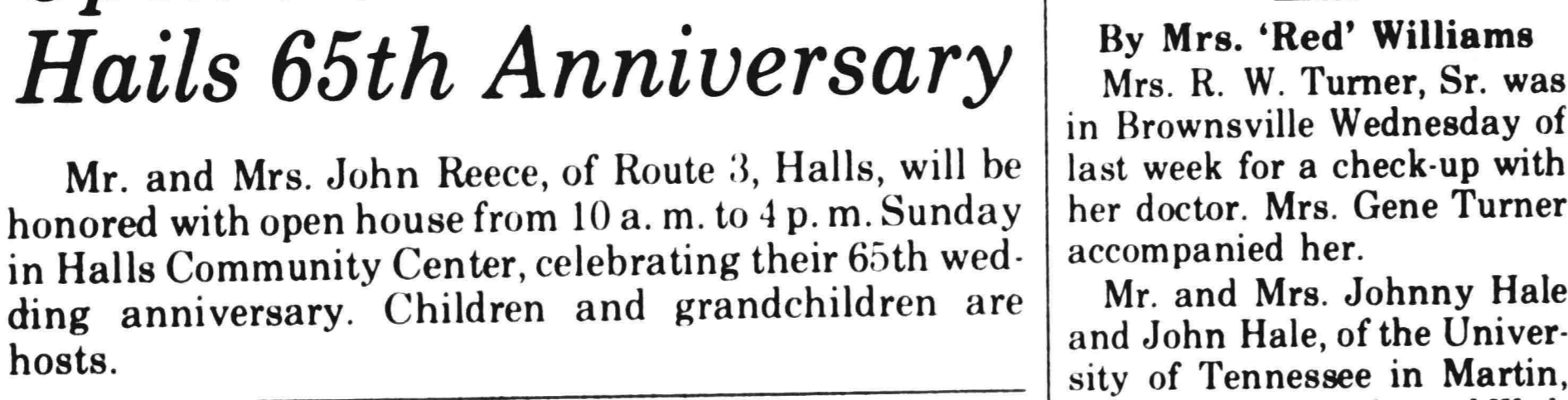

Third Murder Trial Awaits Claybrook

Willie Claybrook, 34, of near Halls, convicted of second degree murder in this county in 1973 and acquitted May 20th last year, in Dyer County, of the bludgeoning death of Leona "Ginsey" (Mrs. Frank) Fitzpatrick, 65, of Henning, was held Monday by the Crockett County grand jury for trial in Circuit Court in Alamo on charges of first degree murder and murder in perpetration of robbery. Jailed without bond in Alamo since a preliminary hearing Oct. 13th, he is docketed to appear in Circuit Court in Alamo at 9 a.m. next Wednesday.

He is charged with beating to death Leslie W. Jennings, 87, at Jennings' home near Friendship Sept. 17th.

Investigators say that Claybrook told them he and Jennings were on the porch of Jennings' home when a man came up to ask for water, and that while Claybrook went to get the water, the man beat Jennings, fleeing when Claybrook told him to stop.

Claybrook said he fled because of his past record. He served four years of a 10- to 20-year sentence for murder in this county.

He was arrested for Mrs. Kirkpatrick's death soon after having served a sentence for larceny. Since he did not take the stand in his trial for the Kirkpatrick death, this could not be told to the jury in that case.

Gas Demand High

Halls natural gas consumers used more than 31,800 million cubic feet of natural gas in December, and early indications are that consumption for January will be about the same. Use in November was just under 14,000. Mrs. Katie Davis, city recorder, said Monday that the consumption in December was the highest in the last five years, and she believes that it is a record high.

Completely Ridiculous

Along with the other gripes about the change in the telephone company as required in a 1982 court ruling, the new billing method is almost beyond comprehension.

Supposedly, there is an explanation sheet for each charge, but we have found it virtually impossible to make the bill balance. Some major changes need to be made if the average telephone user is to be able to interpret his bill.

As We Predicted

As we predicted in a recent column, the financing of the proposed new teacher bill is creating problems. Shelby County Mayor Bill Morris and Memphis Mayor Dick Hackett have joined others in questioning the raise in taxes which will be required to meet the huge costs.

We seriously doubt that the general public would approve a 1¢ sales tax increase or other increase if they were called upon to vote for or against in a referendum. Many legislators are going to feel the heat over the bill before this year's elections are over.

There can be no doubt that the school system needs improving and teachers deserve more pay, but while improving the economy in Tennessee must grow stronger if the people are to be happy with additional taxes for any reason.

Halls Suffering Growing Pains

Problems arising from the annexation of new areas into Halls' city limits got attention Monday at the monthly meeting of mayor and aldermen:

• Bob Critefield, asking about sewerage and lighting for annexed areas north of Halls, was asked to give the Town about 90 days to see what could be included in federal grant applications.

• Lester Kilzer, seeking street lights, more police protection, and enforced sewer connections in the Beech Bluff area, was told that a 5-year service plan was included in the annexation ordinance and that sewer service has been provided to each residence and tapping fees paid, aldermen Eugene Pugh, Marcus Spiller, and Robert Stolarick were appointed to investigate.

• Jody Walker, Ripley attorney and former interim Chancellor of the 9th District, representing Ripley Power & Light Co., and RPL's manager, Mike Allmand, asked the board to clarify RPL's position about areas served by Forked Deer Electric Co-Operative now annexed into the city limits of Halls.

Halls sought electric service from RPL in 1983, and in 1988 renewed the agreement for 20 years.

Russell Jacobs, FDE manager, was asked for comment. He referred the matter to J. Thomas Caldwell, Ripley attorney, who said that in his opinion the 1988 franchise since it did not say so, was not exclusive.

Pugh said he felt the two systems could reach a fair division of service areas.

He was appointed by Mayor Joe Jacobs to study the matter with aldermen Spiller, Harry Adcock, and James Jones, meeting at 6 p.m. this Thursday in Halls City Hall.

On motion of James Jones, seconded by Morris McCorkle, Bankers Life & Casualty Co., represented by Gladys Mrs. Bernice Crain, was unanimously (all aldermen present) awarded health, accident, and hospitalization insurance for a year.

Mike Tallent of the Tennessee Municipal League, had analyzed bids.

The board found BLC offered the best coverage per premium dollar and waived all pre-existing conditions.

Don Patton was instructed to look into lighting needs at Northside Center.

Motion by Jones, seconded by Pugh, assured ex-mayor Sammie D. Arnold that the board would underwrite expenses of the annual Industry Recognition Week, which Mayor Jacobs had asked him to organize, as in the past.

Arnold also urged the board to take advantage of 75% state funding available for Arnold Field, the Halls air base. He said Halls' 25% share could include local labor and contributions and would aid Halls' industrial growth.

Actually, in our opinion, being a "middle class" citizen is mostly a state of mind. Each individual determines for himself just where he stands in comparison to their fellow citizens. Money, of course, is both helpful and necessary, but it is far from the true measure of just where each person stands. We know wealthy people who are crude, impolite, and totally inconsiderate of their fellow citizens. We know others who are at the lowest poverty levels who are well read, courteous, and in every respect, fine citizens. Money is not the first basis for a person's classification.

Future Unknown

The announcement of the death of Russian President Yuri Andropov came as little surprise to the world, since he has been missing from Russian political scenes for more than six months and had been reported as seriously ill, with some speculation that he was dead. Speculation now is concerned with just who will succeed him. We can't see that it matters a great deal, since the Russian attitude is unlikely to change. There is no reason to think that any new Russian leader will be likely to favor the United States or the Western nations.

Jail, Water System Short On Funding

County Executive William Tucker IV told County Commission Monday he would be in Nashville Tuesday to pursue additional funding for county water system improvements, including two new water tanks and better filtration to reduce complaints about iron content.

Tucker said engineers had estimated cost, several years ago, at \$335,000, and the county obtained a \$379,000 federal grant, but the lowest bid received, from Childress Construction Co., of Ripley, was \$433,170. He said the county must seek more financial assistance or scale the project down to fit the funding available.

The jail has run out of money for boarding prisoners, the commissioners were told - \$24,000 budgeted for the fiscal year, through June, having already been spent.

Sheriff Milford Durham said the 46-bed jail had up to 73 inmates last fall. He estimated the county will receive \$80,000 to \$100,000 in reimbursements this summer for care of state prisoners and prisoners from other cities.

Commissioners budgeted an additional \$17,500 for the current fiscal year.

A 5-man committee was authorized to study the Board of Education's request to move its offices from the basement of the courthouse to the National Guard armory building on South Jefferson St. in Ripley, when the Guard moves into its new armory on New Highway 51.

School Supt. Philip Jackson said materials to renovate the armory would cost \$15,400.

He said students in county vocational schools could do much of the work.

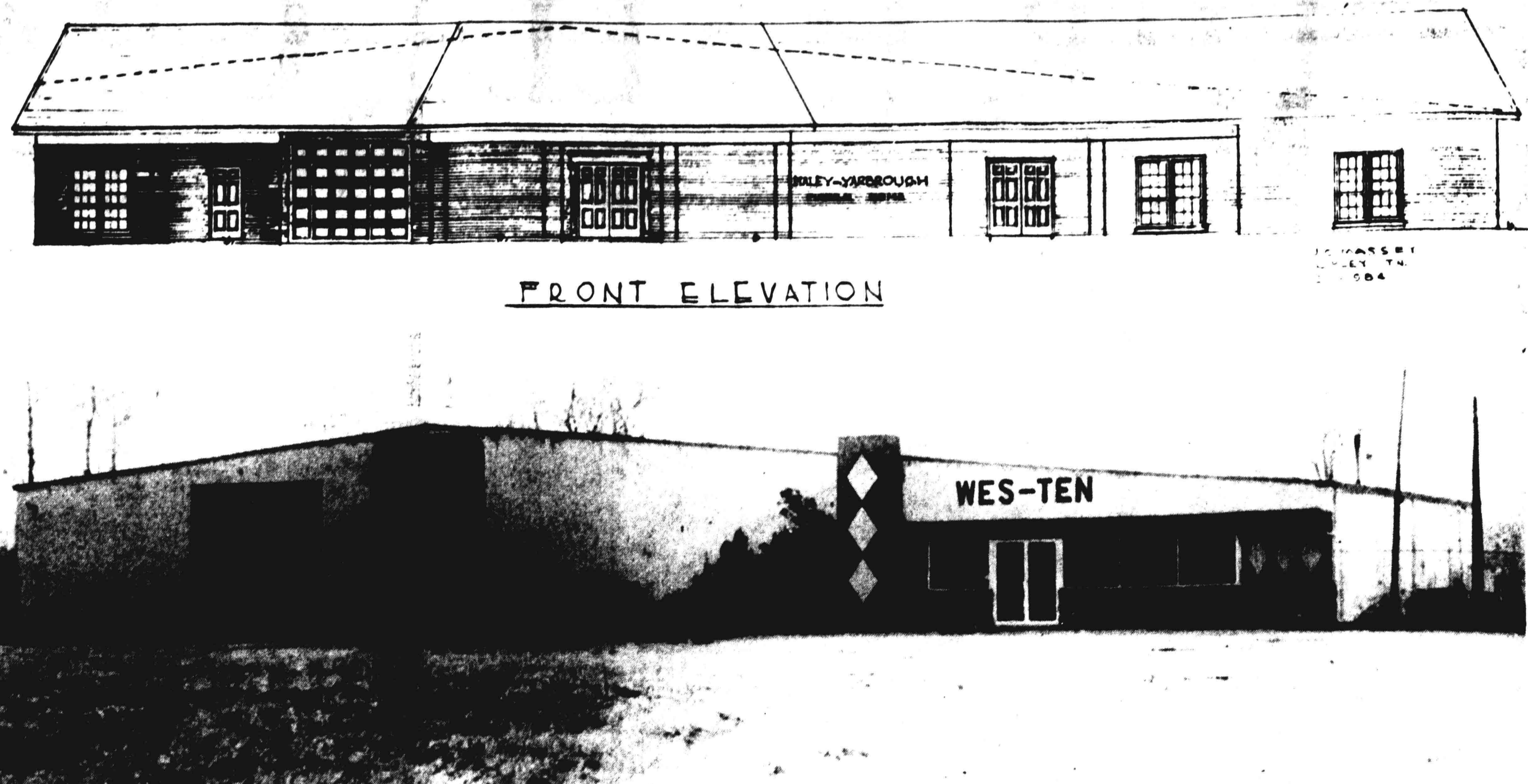

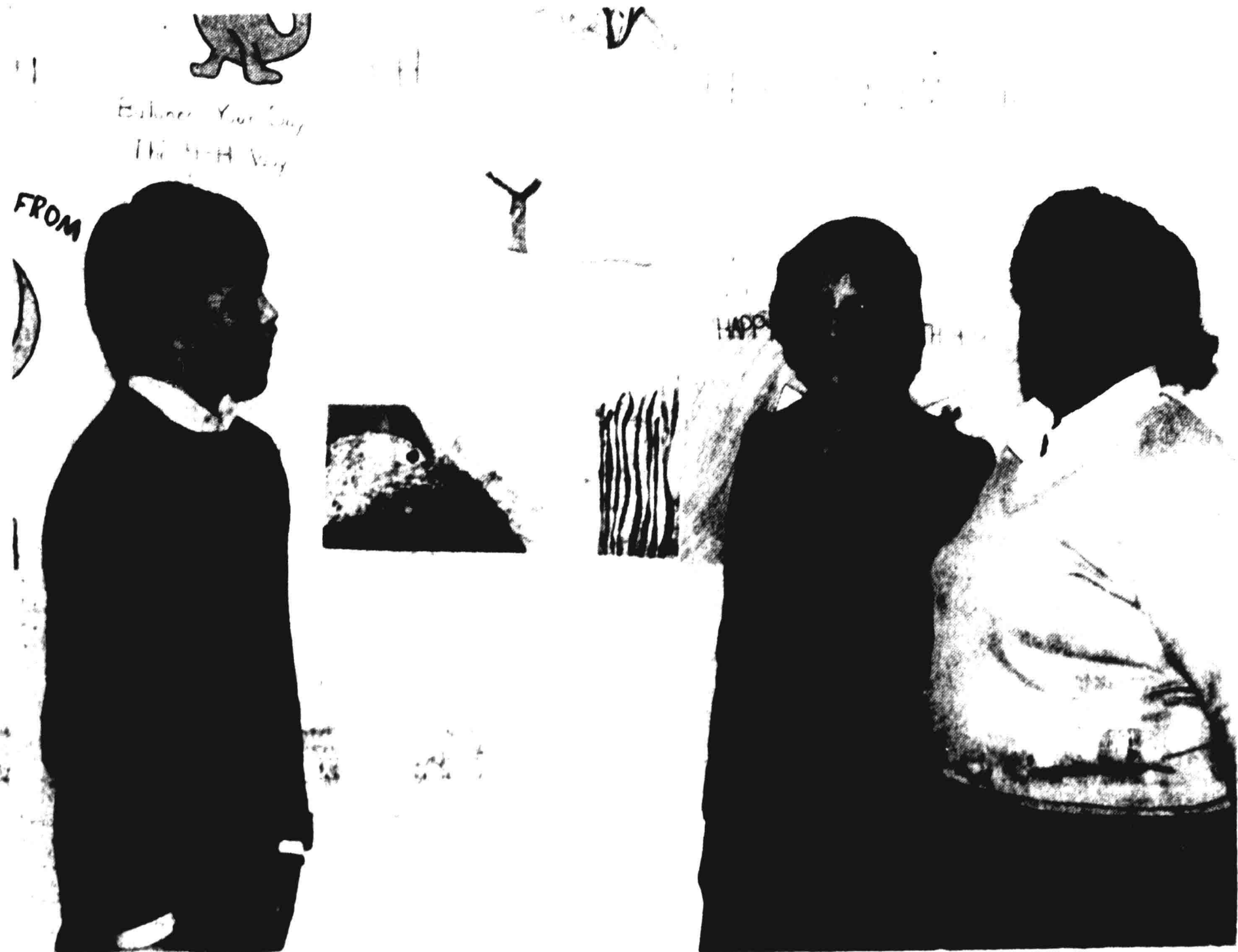

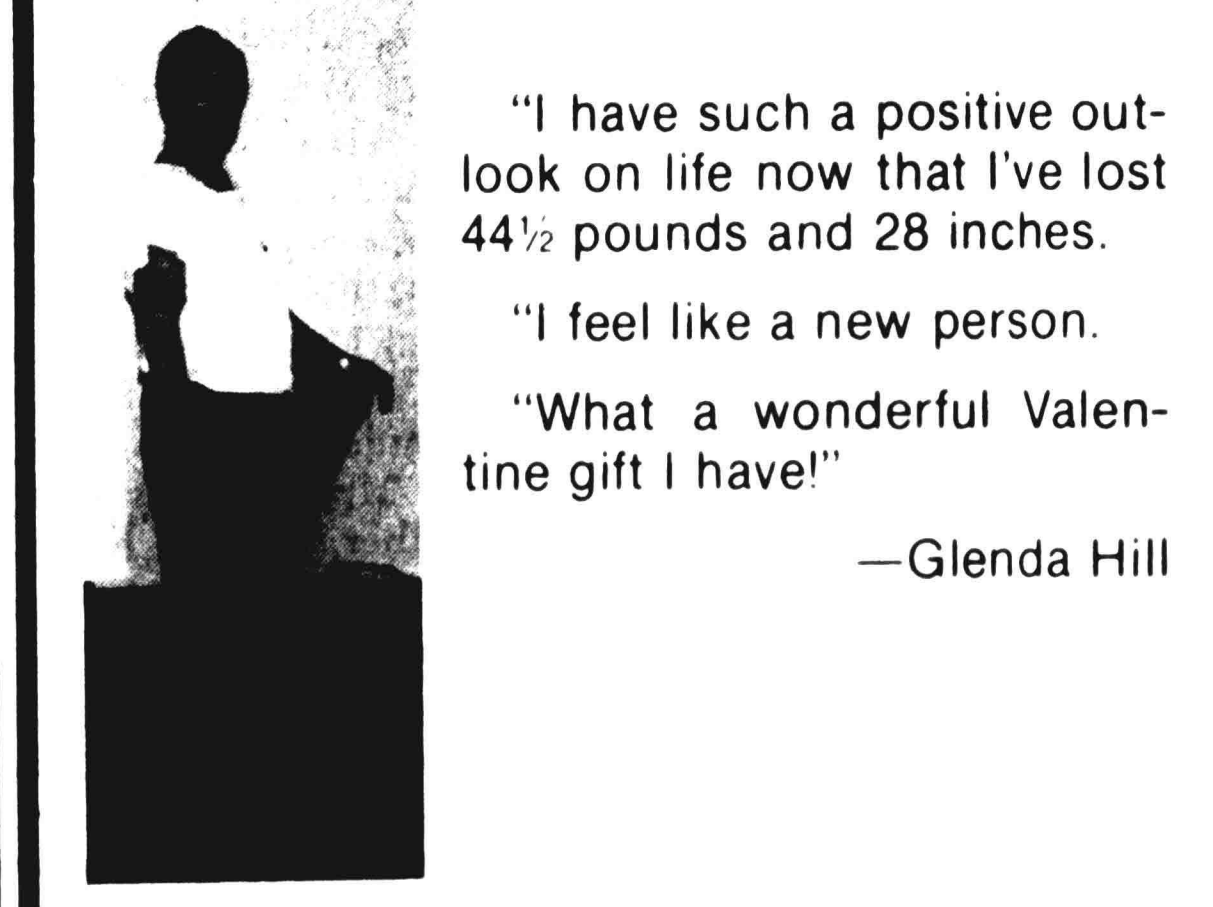

Halls High's Class Of '09 Was Small But Stood Tall

The Class of 1909 from Halls High School, when R. A. Moser was principal, W. F. Wilson was school board president, and W. C. Patton was secretary, set some high standards for the future generations in the area to follow.

The faculty included Mr. R. A. Moser, principal, graduate of Cumberland University, Lebanon; Lydia Schorn, (Mrs. Roark Bradford), of Peabody College, Nashville; Georgia Cunningham, of Tennessee College, Murfreesboro; and Zola Smith, of Dyer, Mrs. Clarence Dyer, mother of Judge Ross Dyer. There were others in elementary school.

One member of the fine class was the late Mrs. Gertrude Lancaster Satterwhite and she was very proud of all their accomplishments. She had treasured her graduation invitation and a picture taken through all these years. She had hoped that she and the only other living classmate, Allie Bess Henry, of Arkansas, might have a 75th reunion.

Among the accomplishments, the field of music under the direction of Miss Lula Mae Moore was one that continued from 1903-1965. She taught in her home for two years but later used a room in the new school building. She was responsible for a great deal of culture in this urban area.

Public speaking was encouraged and at the close of school, they always included a debate. The subject for the class debate was timely and entitled, "Would It Be Advisable For Our Government To Grant Absolute Independence To The People Of The Philippine Islands?"

invited the guest to graduation on May 24:26 at eight o'clock—in formal wording and manner.

The third page gave the program in old English lettering and quoted the motto: We have crossed the bay, the ocean lies before us. Then came class roll and four post graduates.

The late Mrs. Satterwhite related many interesting facts about the class members—all dearly beloved by her.

One of the facts concerned Miss Clifton Bradford, the Salutatorian of the class. Near the close of school, she was stricken with appendicitis and her father, after much deliberation, decided against an operation. This was not unusual for many operations were not successful.

The affirmative side was Ruth Branch, Annie Laura Young, Wanda Wyatt and Allie Bess Henry. The negative side included Mamie Hurley, Gertrude Lancaster, Lelia Dunavant and John Young.

broke her hip resulting in her death at age 92.

Most of the students of this Class of 1909 were young men and women of the families of Halls. However, due to the excellent reputation of the Halls School students came from Crockett and Dyer Counties as well. One could choose their school but transportation was their own responsibility.

An interesting footnote to this story was that the father two years later had appendicitis and had an operation and recovered. He felt perhaps he could risk his life but was reluctant to risk his daughter's.

The principal, Mr. R. A. Moser, always gave a medal for the best presentation and Allie Bess Henry was the recipient. Mrs. Satterwhite recalled that Allie Bess confided in her that she didn't deserve the medal as she had forgotten at one point and had to start over. The classmates agreed that she did deserve the medal because of the many programs she participated in during the year and had been outstanding. It was said she never did wear the medal.

In the academic field these students excelled. The curriculum included the following subjects: Trigonometry (Plane and Spherical); Elements of Astronomy; History of Ancient and modern Philosophy; Psychology; Political Economy; Latin (Sallust's Catiline); History of Greece and Rhetoric.

Their cousin, Ela Rawles, came from Finley, Tenn. in Dyer County.

Two members of this class made dentists—Dr. J. N. Wyatt, who practiced in Halls and Ripley, and Dr. George Stephens who practiced in Ridgely, Tenn. Miss Wanda Wyatt was Dr. Wyatt's sister.

Another brother and sister were Bessie Woody, Valdeictor of the class and Hubert Woody.

Annie Laura Young was the daughter of Dr. Sam Young and Ida Buck, a dentist in Halls for many years. Miss Young married Duke Pindexter of Covington, Tenn.

Elizabeth Brandon never married, according to Mrs. Satterwhite (Gertrude Lancaster) but was a member of the Brandon family of Halls.

Lelia Dunavant was married to a rural mail carrier, Mr. Floyd Colley and they had one son, Ralph. Mrs. Colley was a long-time resident on South College Street in Halls until ill health caused her to go to Memphis to live with Ralph and his family.

Ruth Branch was married to John Lee, of Gates, and they had one daughter, Vivian.

Miss Mary S. Prichard, a sister to Mrs. Bess Gordon, married Mr. Gordon Griffin, a lawyer, and they moved to McAllen, Tex. She taught school for many years and they had one son, Gordon, a judge, and one daughter, Ruth.

These students completed the courses of study while the aim of the educator was not only to prepare them for college, but for a life of usefulness and good conduct.

The school building was a large handsome two story brick building with ten recitation rooms and a very spacious auditorium with seating capacity of over 600. The auditorium was furnished with the latest and best folding opera chairs and amply supplied with electric lights. It was well heated and ventilated.

A spacious platform for any kind of performance that the school would desire.

There was a rule and regulation at that time that read, "Pupils who deface or impair any school property shall pay in full for such damages. Failure to do this within two weeks shall subject them to suspension, and they shall be readmitted only by a vote of the Board of Education."

This information was in the only Annual School Catalogue published by Mr. W. W. Dunn in year 1911-1912 now the property of Mrs. Kathryn Troiano, of Halls, Tenn., a splendid teacher herself for many years before she retired.

I sometimes wonder if the investment we are making in education today will yield as great a return as those dollars spent in the early years of our public school system.

Granny's Grub Fuels Escapee's Surrender

Promises of prayer—and delivery of breakfast—by a 73-year-old grandmother, looking into a gun, Tuesday morning re-captured a murderer—one of five escapees from Fort Pillow State Prison Farm—who had been pursued for three days by more than 100 officers, plus dogs, helicopters, and airplanes, in a 4-county search.

Riley Arzeneaux, 26, serving 25 years for murder in Shelby County, pointed his weapon at Nathan Degrafrinieri at his home on Highway 59 near Braden when the elderly man, expecting to find a stray dog, lifted old carpeting under which Arzeneaux had slept. "I knew right away it wasn't no dog," Nathan laughs.

In the house, his wife, Louise, was on the telephone with a friend, discussing the search in four counties. As her husband was marched in, she told her friend, "Call the police, they're here."

At gun-point, she told the murderer to put down his gun, and she'd fix him breakfast—as she did—bacon, eggs, and half a gallon of milk, from powder; "he drank half of the milk without ever stopping," she says. While he was eating, she promised to pray for him and urged him to give himself up. When officers arrived, he did exactly that.

After a first fusillade of bullets at the car of Wayne Douglas of Ripley, information officers at the prison, who unexpectedly (on both sides) pursued them, the five armed felons apparently deliberately restrained themselves from unnecessary violence during their obviously well-planned escape attempt.

And they did as well as if they had been brutal. The escape began when the five, of about 20 convicts sent to the site, dug up three pistols near a silage pit, half a mile from the main prison building, disarmed guards Norman Hopper and Ricky Long, and tied up him, stripping Hopper of his uniform and taking a shotgun, pistol, and a walkie-talkie radio.

Other inmates made no effort to join the escape and urged the officers as soon as the escapees were out of sight.

Others escaping were: Sylvester Alexander, 33, serving 40 years for robbery with a deadly weapon in Shelby County.

James Clegg, 30, of Sullivan County, serving a life sentence as a habitual criminal. Ronald Freeman, 41, of Knox County, serving 198 years on two counts of murder.

Con Freed Early Facing New Rap

Aaron Reese, 36, of Lauderdale County, one of the first dozen inmates released early from Lake County Regional Prison Nov. 14th, has been charged with theft of a tractor-trailer rig from Midway Truck Stop, in Dyer County, late Feb. 1st.

The \$100,000 rig was found next day, stuck in mud on a rural road in Lauderdale County, with its contents—\$200,000 worth of uniform material, the property of the Angelica Uniform Group, of St. Louis, Mo., intact.

To ease prison overcrowding, he was released 53 days before his earliest scheduled parole date of a one-to-five year sentence for passing forged checks.

Timothy Eugene McCorkle, of 1302 Tibbs, Dyersburg, released with Reese, was indicted last week by the Dyer County grand jury on four counts of grand larceny.

Those charges stem from the Dec. 28th theft of three vehicles and the burglary of a Dyersburg gas station.

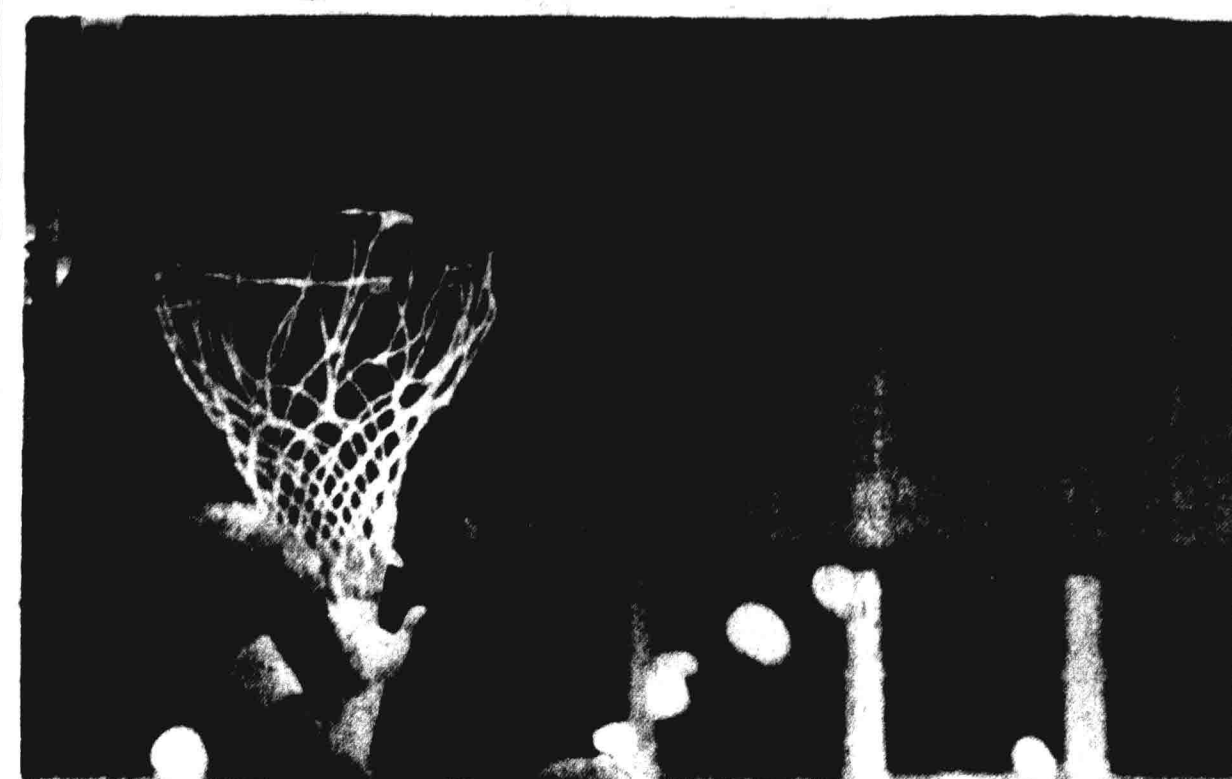

Halls Area Doctor In 1867 Feared A Hard Time Near

The letter below, written by Dr. E. M. Hall on Aug. 3rd, 1867, has been presented to Terry Ford, of The Lauderdale County Enterprise, by a Memphis friend.

Dr. Hall was the great-uncle of Mrs. Evelyn Brown, of Halls, and Mrs. Tony Troiano, of Double Bridges, and the late William Hall, long-time county director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. He heard the father of Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Troiano, Dr. William Hall, after his parents died when he was five years old.

Little is known of the early days of Dr. Hall, and nothing is known of the man to whom the letter was written. Although dated from Chestnut Bluff, to which all Halls mail went then, it is unlikely he was residing there, since he says he might go there. "It is possible Dr. Hall was residing in Lauderdale County at that time."

Dr. Hall is known to have been in the Double Bridges area in the 1880s, remaining there until his death in 1899. With two daughters, Edna and D. Hall, who died in 1935, and Ullita V. Hall, who died in 1946, he is buried on the west edge of Halls Cemetery.

Chestnut Bluff, Tenn. Aug. 3rd/67
 Mr. David T. Whittome

Dear brother, some time since read a letter from you which should have been answered ere this time and perhaps you are ready to accuse me of wanten negligence to ward you. But most assuredly somewhat lengthy delay. I have been, for some time, in a very poor mood for writing having been in bad health for some twenty days until the last few days. We are in very puny health at this time. Etta and the baby are scarcely able to be up. Etta has been very sick but is now able to be up.

There is not much practice doing here now and still I never saw more people coming. I fear we will have a hard time soon. Our bottoms have been inundated two thirds of the time since the first of February and if we have a dry fall, many of us will have dry skins.

We have had some excitement here for a few weeks concerning our election for Governor which I suppose you are aware came off the first Thursday of this instant, the results of which I have not yet heard. Our county went for W. G. but I don't know by what majority. My district went for Brownlow forty-seven, Ethridge three.

The Negro has been made a perfect tool of and frequently voting to please the one who would put himself on the most perfect terms of equality and sociability with him. Neither party has any rite to cry out to the other Negro equality any more for the kittle should not call the pot black.

The rebel or Ethridge party has certainly made as great a sacrifice to secure the Negro vote as the blacks did in enfranchising him. I have never as much as asked a Negro if he was going to vote for if he votes, I wish him to vote as I do according to judgement if he has any and if he has not, guess work is as good as any if it is his rite for I am opposed to Negro equality unless the Negro improves and gets to be better society than we have. If so, I want every man and woman to aspire to Negro equality.

I am unable to say to you where I will be another year. I shall not stay where I am. I may buy land in the neighborhood. I may go to Chestnut Bluff or I may leave the county or even the state. I can't tell.

Your letter stated that you were at school and should continue until September. I can say to you to make your scholastic days many and studious. Remember that knowledge is power and that kind of power most to be desired. That kind of power which the wisest man may drift back against you to that extent that some have and umble calm may be your abiding place even there learning will keep open to you some avenue of pleasantness and peace. Whether your bark

help you to steer your bark through life's uneven journey but to land it where disappontment is an entire stranger and sorrow never come.

Had I not had some education (which I regret is not more extensive) instead of trying to hold myself and family above the destructive and surging billows of ignorance and superstition I might have been a vagabond in the earth struggling to extricate myself from some awful dilemma without the hope or means of accomplishing the same, raising my offspring to worship at the shrine of ignorance and dwell beneath the mud sills of superstition.

He that chooses wisdom and religion is the model of human perfection and destined to eternal happiness.

Tell the old man that my prayer is that his last days be as long as his first.

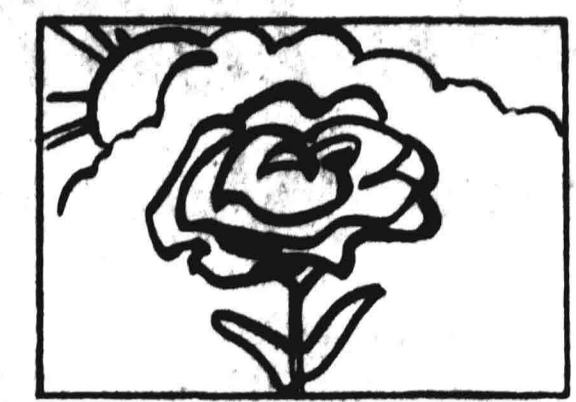
