Bald Eagles Return to Reelfoot

The annual return of the eagles has become a major event in northwestern Tennessee. The opportunity to view a live American bald eagle brings scores of visitors each winter to Reelfoot Lake State Resort Park...

Tours originate at the park's Airpark Inn at 7 a.m. daily. Visitors are encouraged to make advance reservations by contacting the inn at 901-253-7756.

There is a charge of fifty cents per person for the guided tour. Visitors should dress warmly, and bring their cameras and field glasses. Park rangers provide a spotting scope for the tours.

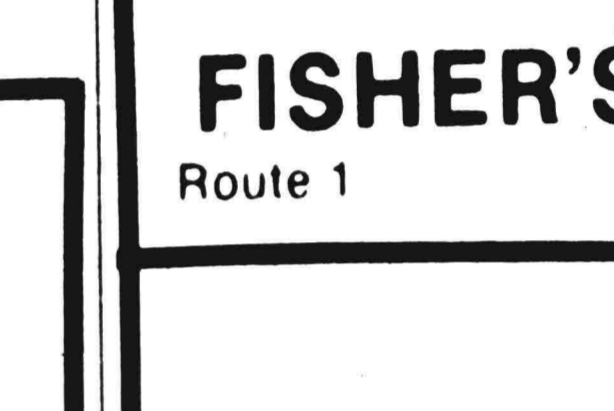
The eagle programs include orientation sessions on Friday and Saturday nights at the Airpark Inn. The programs offer guest speakers and films, and give visitors an insight into the unique living biology laboratory that is Reelfoot Lake.

The mysterious lake was created in the winter of 1812 by a series of earth tremors rumbling along an ancient fault line centered around the little town New Madrid, Missouri.

The tremors climaxed on February 7 with perhaps the most violent earthquake ever to strike the continental United States. The whole land area sank between eight and twenty feet, and the Mississippi River flowed backward to fill the depression.

When the earth settled, a huge new lake stood between the river to the west and the towering Chickasaw Bluff to the east. The swamp forests and marshes surrounding the lake provide home and sanctuary for a rich variety of plants and animal species.

Halls Gas Rates To Rise Slightly

Halls Mayor and Aldermen Monday night voted to pass on to customers an increase of approximately 1 1/2% in the price of natural gas.

The board voted to call for bids on repairs and improvements for the recreational building in Northside Park. No action will be taken until costs are ascertained.

The board voted to purchase a new Case Tractor Co. backhoe at a cost of \$21,000, cut from the original bid of \$35,000.

Alderman Harry Adcock reported on the request by Birchfield Crop Dusting Service to move nearer the Arnold Airport runway.

City Attorney Tom Caldwell was asked to work out a lease agreement with Birchfield but keep in mind that all property is reserved for industrial improvements.

The board accepted a bid from S. N. Anthony Insurance for insurance on city property at a cost of \$2,900. Halls Insurance Co.'s bid was \$5,342.

Mayor Joe Jacobs told the board that lawyers for Ripley Power & Light Co. have asked to meet with the board at the Feb. 6th meeting to settle disputes on franchise rights for property on the air base annexed by the city several years ago.

The area is presently served by Forked Deer Electric Co-Operative. Representatives of Forked Deer Electric will be invited to the February meeting.

Mayor Jacobs named Harry Adcock, James L. Jones, and Eugene Pugh to recommend an ordinance setting city policy for holiday, vacation, and sick leave pay for city employees.

County Meeting Combats Litter

All interested are urged to meet with Miss Edith Beatty, State Co-Ordinator for a Clean Tennessee, at 7 p.m. Tuesday, in the courthouse in Ripley, to plan an attack on littering in this county.

16 Bridges To Get Repair In County

County Commission Monday approved 20% participation in the cost of repairing 16 bridges in the county; the state will pay 80% of costs.

Douglas Collins was re-elected highway commissioner for the county's northern end. James G. Douglas and Anthony Fisher were re-appointed to the county's Industrial Board.

Commissioners approved moving the trailer now used by the Ambulance Authority to the Department of Human Services site, for storage.

The Authority will occupy space in the former county hospital building as soon as X-ray equipment is moved.

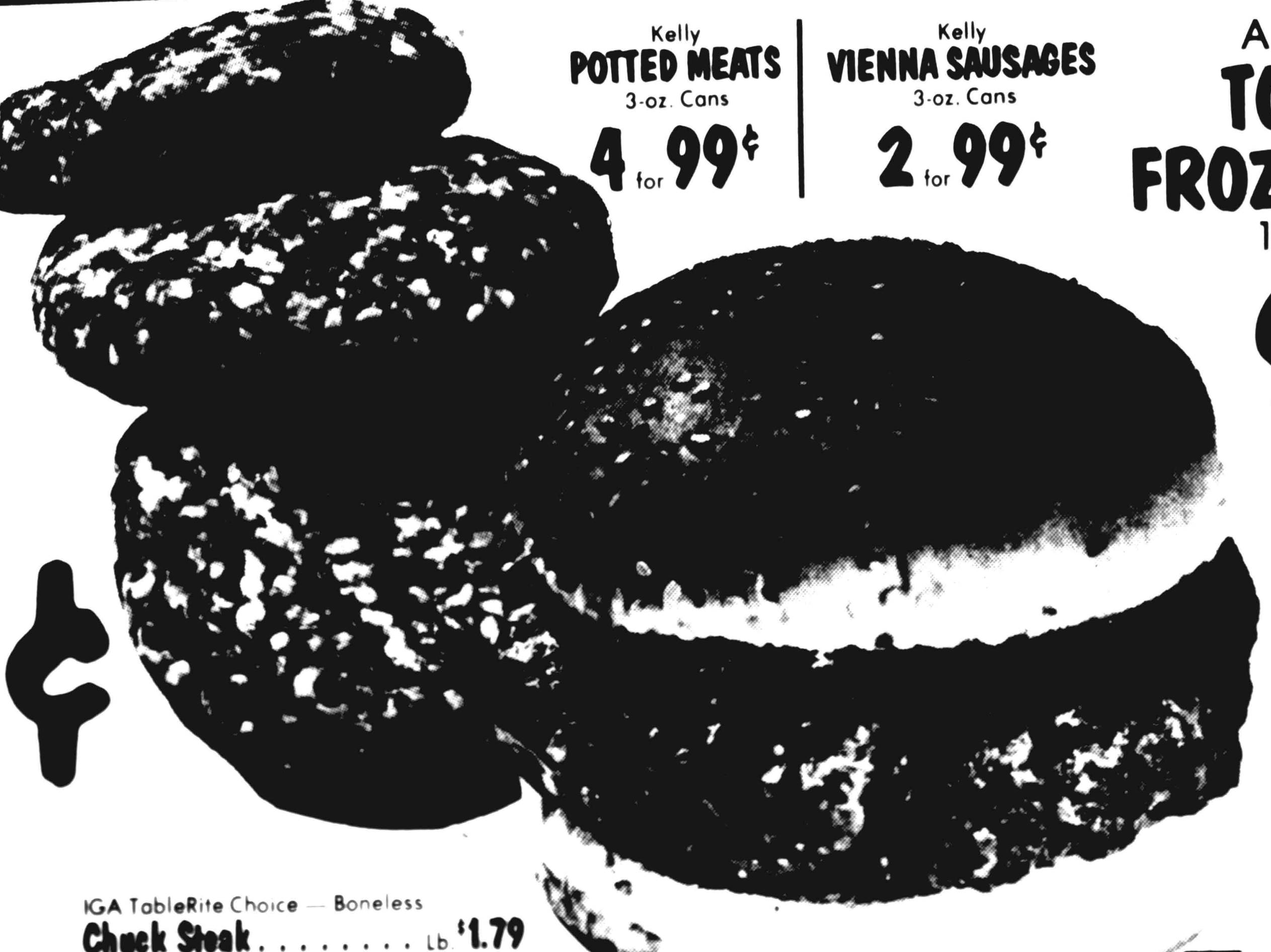

### CONFIDENTIAL CORNER

#### As We See It

The United States Supreme Court Tuesday of last week ruled by a vote of 5-4 that consumers do not violate federal copyright law when they use video cassette recorders to tape television programs for their own use. While there would seem to be some sound and convincing arguments for both sides of the questions, that is not the portion of the ruling that is of major interest to your editor. In writing the majority opinion, Justice John Paul Stevens indicated that the appropriate avenue of redress for copyright owners was the Congress. The court concluded that Congress had not intended to impose liability for non-commercial use, and Justice Stevens ended his comments, "But it is not our job to apply laws that have not yet been written." Since the Supreme Court has not followed that policy for many years, we find it both interesting and encouraging that the court may finally realize that it should be interpreting laws enacted by Congress and not establishing new laws with their rulings.

#### Weather Problems

The snow and ice which resulted from the extremely bad weather created some problems which city officials need to study means of correcting. The city has no machinery nor budgeted money for removing ice and snow from the streets. Nevertheless, some arrangement needs to be made for certain unusually bad spots, such as the corner of Circle Drive and Carmen Street, Carmen Street and North College at the intersections with West Tigrrett Street, the East Main Street approach to the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad, and others. Because of inclines or other reasons, these spots create unusually hazardous driving conditions when the streets are covered with ice. We don't really have a suggested remedy, but maybe something can be done.

#### Rushing Into It?

Apparently Gov. Lamar Alexander's master teacher plan is going to be passed by the special session of the Tennessee General Assembly, but not without some major changes. Just where the money is to come from to pay for the huge additional costs has not yet been determined, but we wonder if the proposed increase in the sales tax is the best solution. Over the years it has been claimed that the sales tax is the fairest of all taxes. Perhaps so, but at the same time it can be the most devastating of all taxes to the really poor. We have always been opposed to a state income tax, because of the always increasing tax rates and the lack of local control. We still doubt that an income tax is the best solution, but we are still more doubtful that increasing the sales tax rates is even as good a solution. We need better education in Tennessee, but we wonder if we are rushing in before we know what we are doing!
