The Dog Problem

A number of concerned Halls citizens plan to present a petition to the Halls Board of Aldermen Monday evening, seeking help in solving the dog problem in Halls.

Several persons have been bitten by dogs running loose, and others have reported that dogs have attempted to bite them while walking or jogging. Children on bicycles have been threatened, as have others on the residential streets.

There apparently is no city ordinance requiring that dogs be confined or on leash, but perhaps there should be some control.

In the past, we have avoided the dog problem as much as possible, since dog owners resent any attempt to control them, but dogs are running in packs and must be controlled. Several incidents of dogs attacking children have been reported in nearby towns during recent months. Perhaps the Board needs to look at this matter and set some rules about dogs running loose.

Dangerous Practice

Some young owners of 3-wheelers and trail bikes are creating a potentially dangerous situation on some of the streets of Halls by riding their vehicles at high speeds in areas where collision with cars or trucks is possible.

Despite a state law forbidding the use of 3-wheelers on streets or highways, the Halls Board of Aldermen agreed to requests by parents to permit the use of streets, provided the vehicles are licensed and the riders wear helmets.

Parents should be aware of the dangers involved and see that the youngsters ride with caution and are not a threat to themselves or the general public.

Let them have their fun, but see that they do not ride in places and under conditions that are dangerous.

2 tablespoons cold water
 1/8 teaspoon salt
 1/3 cup sugar

Place egg whites, salt, and water in mixing bowl. Beat until it stands in peaks. Gradually pour in sugar and mix well. Spread over pie filling and cook at 300 degrees until brown.

CHOCOLATE CHIP PIE
 By Mary Ella Griggs

1 cup chocolate chips 1/2 cup flour
 2 eggs 1 cup pecans
 1 stick butter 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 cup sugar

Mix and bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes.

BLACKBERRY JAM CAKE
 By Mrs. Richard Lazure

1 stick butter, room temperature
 1/2 cup solid shortening
 2 cups sugar
 4 large eggs, room temperature
 1 cup blackberry jam
 3 cups all-purpose flour
 1 teaspoon soda
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1 1/4 cups buttermilk
 1 teaspoon vanilla

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cream butter and shortening. Add sugar, mixing well. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Mix in jam. Sift dry ingredients together. Add to butter mixture alternately with buttermilk beginning and ending with flour. Gently stir in vanilla. Bake in 3 greased and floured 9-inch pans for 20 to 35 minutes. Remove from pans and cool. Frost with caramel icing.

Caramel Icing:
 1 1/2 cups whipping cream, whipped
 3 cups sugar
 Dash of salt
 2/3 cup sugar, caramelized
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 stick butter

Whip cream and add 3 cups of sugar. Bring to a boil and add caramelized sugar. Cook to soft ball stage. Remove from heat. Add butter and vanilla. Cool and beat.

COCONUT PECAN CAKE
 By Mrs. Minnie Heath

7 egg yolks
 2 1/2 cups buttermilk
 1 cup oil
 2 cups sugar
 2 teaspoon vanilla
 1 teaspoon soda
 3 1/2 cups flour
 1 cup chopped pecans

Beat egg yolks and mix all the remaining ingredients. Pour into four cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes.

Juice:
 1 1/4 cup milk
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 1/2 stick butter

Cook until light brown and slightly thick.

LEMON SPONGE PIE
 By Mrs. Ward Hardy

2 cups sugar
 4 eggs
 1 tablespoon flour
 1 tablespoon cornmeal
 1/4 cup milk
 1/4 cup melted butter
 1/4 cup lemon juice
 2 tablespoons grated lemon rind
 1 unbaked 9 inch pie shell

Combine sugar, flour, and cornmeal in mixing bowl. Add eggs, milk, butter, lemon juice, and rind. Beat with rotary beater until smooth and well blended. Pour into pie shell. Bake in 350 degree oven for 40 minutes or until golden brown. Cool on rack.

CARAMEL PIE
 By Charlene Abernathy

Filling:
 1 1/3 cup sugar
 3 tablespoons flour
 3 egg yolks beaten
 2 cups milk
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 tablespoon butter

Mix all dry ingredients together. Beat egg yolks, then add milk, butter and vanilla. In a heavy skillet brown 1/3 cup sugar until golden brown and pour in filling and cook very slow until thick in a heavy pan. Pour in baked pie shell.

ANNA'S POUND CAKE
 By Dorah Lazure

2 sticks butter (softened)
 3 cups sugar
 1/2 cup Crisco
 5 eggs
 3 cups cake flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 cup sweet milk
 1 teaspoon vanilla

Cream butter, sugar, and crisco until fluffy. Add eggs one at a time (beating well after each addition). Sift flour, salt and baking powder together 3 times. Add alternately with milk. Add vanilla last. Pour into greased and floured tube pan. Bake at 325 degrees 80 minutes, test with toothpick; let cool in pan 20 minutes before turning out.

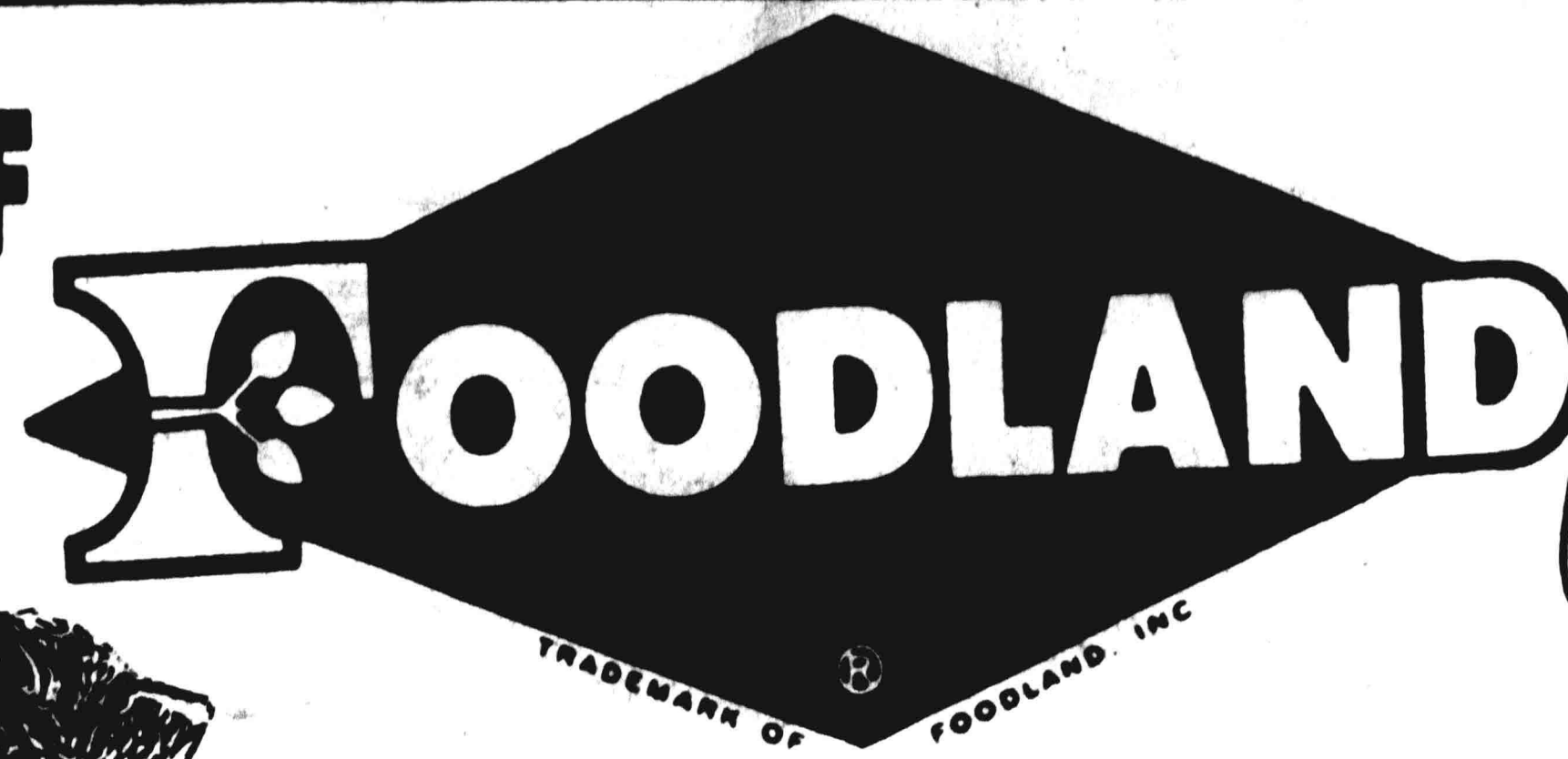

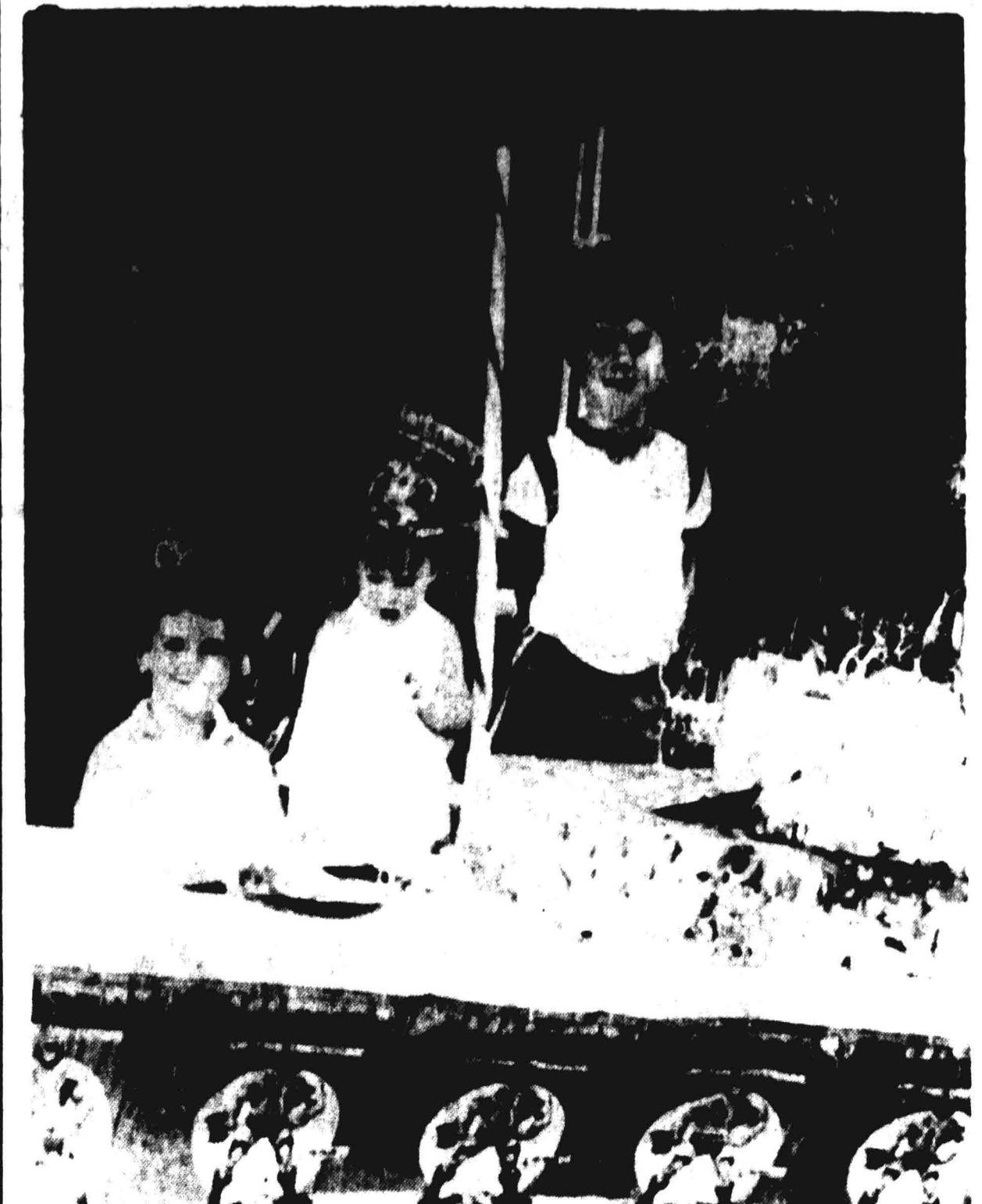

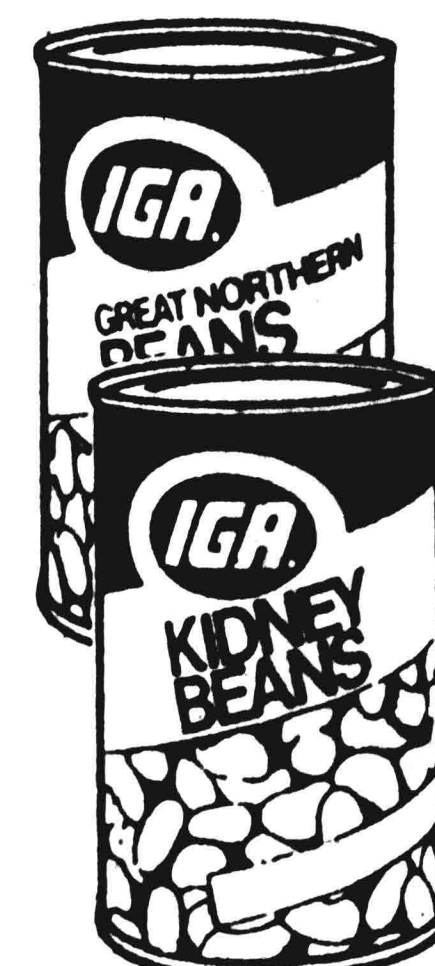

Cemetery Woes

Concerned by the continuing problem of maintaining the Halls Cemetery and the need for more money, the cemetery committee and other concerned citizens met at the cemetery Tuesday evening of last week to view the cemetery and seek some answers.

No answers were forthcoming at the meeting, but some suggestions for solutions were extended for study and possible action, including a renewed and stronger effort to collect cemetery dues from local citizens, a possible take-over by the Town of Halls, or the setting up of a trust fund for cemetery maintenance.

From information available to your editor, it seems that the people of Halls have been much more negligent about paying their dues than have those persons living elsewhere. Mrs. L. E. Criffield, Jr., who has acted as cemetery treasurer for a number of years, told us that much of the money problem could be solved if local cemetery lot owners would pay their dues regularly and promptly. Dues may be paid to Mrs. Criffield or to the Bank of Halls.

This could be accomplished immediately with cooperation from plot owners, but it seems to us that even then serious consideration should be given to the setting up of a trust fund. A trust fund would entail a considerable sum of money, but when divided among the many families involved, it could be handled by most of them. There is, of course, the problem of the graves of persons with no close family connections remaining, but these would just have to be included without participation in a trust fund.

Halls Cemetery was once a beauty spot, but costs of maintaining the cemetery have continued to rise, while financial support has declined. The support of all families with loved ones buried there is needed. For additional information, talk to L. E. Criffield, Jr., Paul Henderson, Jr., or Marshall Pierce.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

The Department of the Treasury is continuing its effort, which was requested by the President, to evaluate our present tax system, as well as others, to see what might be done to make our system more equitable. As many will remember, the President announced in his State of the Union message that he had directed the Secretary of the Treasury to undertake such a study this year. It is to be completed by the end of the year. I have used this space previously to attempt to keep the people of the Eighth Congressional District up-to-date on how that study is progressing. Consequently, this is another update on recent pronouncements that have come from various quarters regarding the tax study. As might well be expected, the idea of a flat rate tax system has continued to be center stage in just about every discussion of what changes might be made in the tax system. Such a system would entail a flat percentage tax rate which everyone would use. There are variations of that proposed system.

One version, incorporated into legislation sponsored by Senator Bill Bradley and Congressman Richard Gephardt, uses three rates ranging from 14% to 30% depending on income levels. Others use only one rate. Some others continue to allow certain deductions and use still other rates. Some within the Administration have previously implied some support for such a system. It has obvious appeal because of its simplicity and its ultimate effect of taxing everyone at the same rate. Furthermore, it eliminates tax loopholes altogether, keeping only a very few deductions which would probably be limited to mortgage interest and charitable contributions. With recent weeks, however, the Administration has sent mixed signals on its position of the flat rate tax system. Secretary of the Treasury Donald Regan was quoted as saying such a system should not be adopted. He went on to cite inequities and the regressiveness of the flat rate system as the reasons for not adopting it. Then, just a few days later, others within the formal statements indicating that the Secretary was not speaking for the Administration of this issue. Following that, the President implied that he may propose an increase in the exemptions allowed for each taxpayer and their dependents. The President's comments were made in such a way that he did not firmly commit to it, but did imply that such a proposal could be a part of a tax package that he would submit later. All the while, the Treasury Department continues its tax study which may explain the divergent views that have come out on what might be proposed next year. The Department, I am sure, has its own ideas about what needs to be done. However, for its study to be credible, it must retain objectivity in evaluating the tax options open to it. It would not seem fair for such a detailed study to take place and then the Department issue conclusions that it had drawn at the outset of the study process. This decision by the President and the Department of the Treasury to closely study the tax system is long overdue. The tax system is overburdened with complexity and special provisions. It needs streamlining, it needs to be fair, and it needs to make sense. Hopefully, Secretary Regan will be able to submit a report to the President this year that makes recommendations to achieve those goals. Once the Department reaches its conclusions and makes its recommendations, the Congress can begin to work on the legislation needed to implement them.

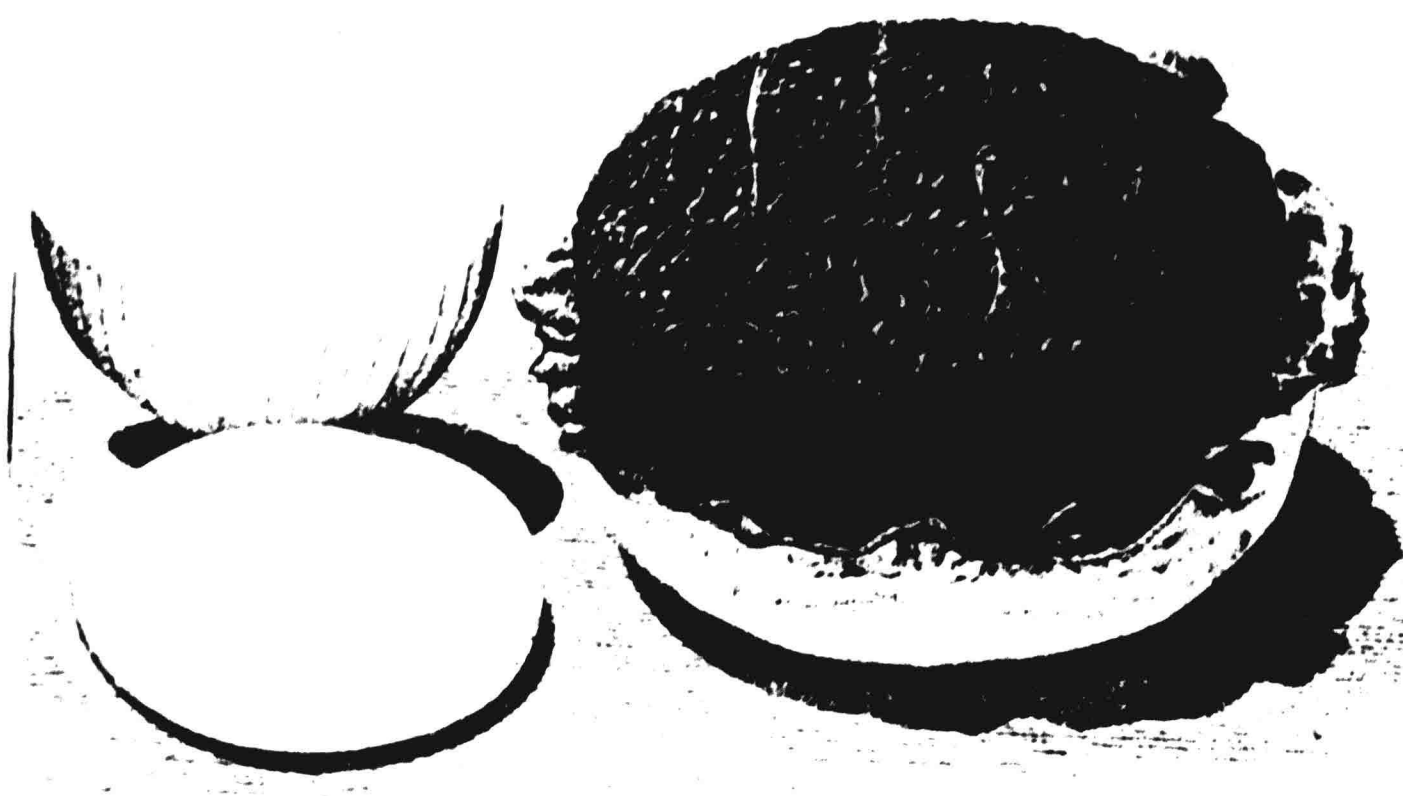

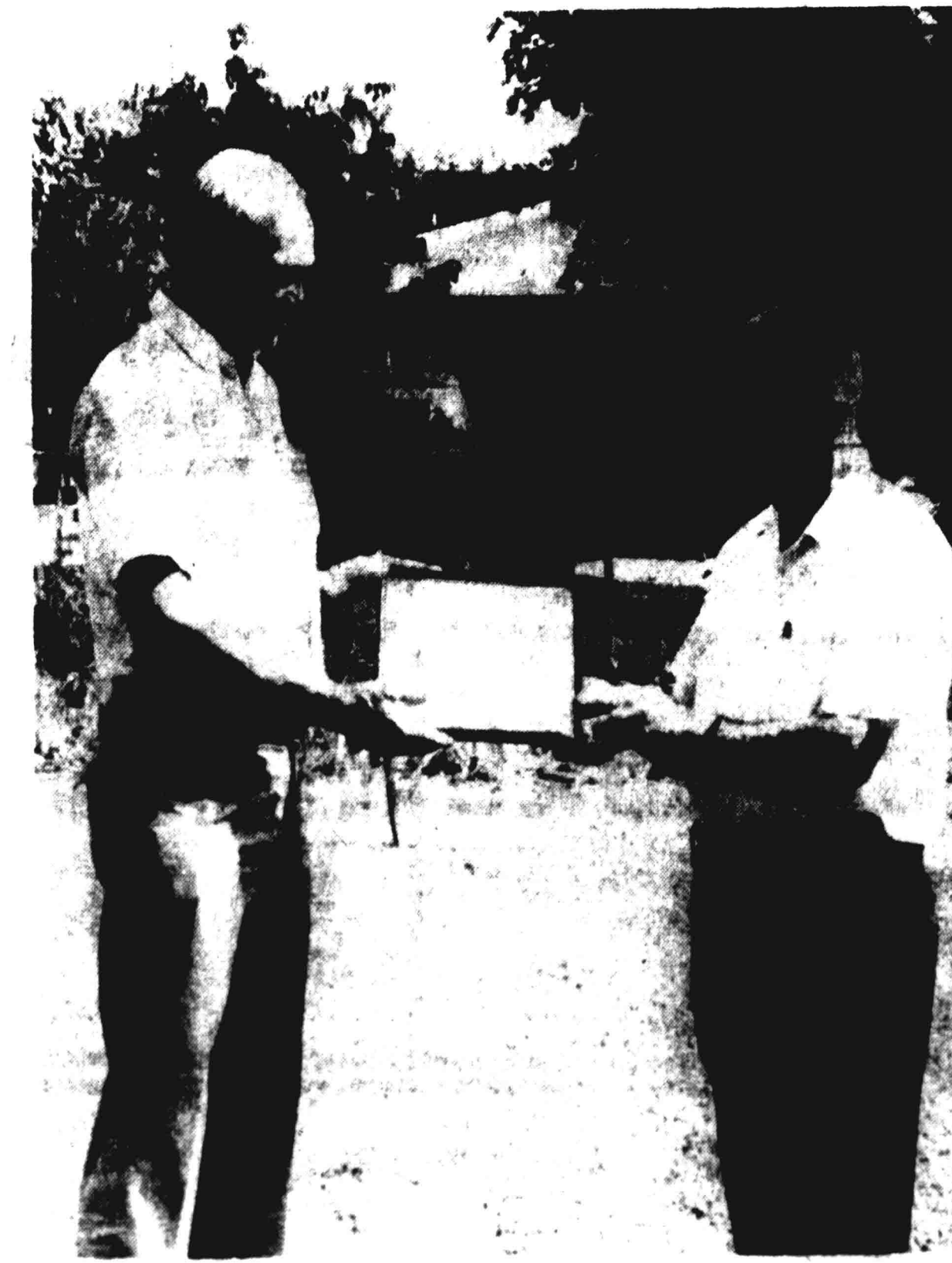

Another Birthday Many of you will recall that your editor had his 75th birthday last month. Well, we also have passed another milestone some time during the past several months, as The Halls Graphic completed its 90th year of continuous operation in Halls. Unfortunately the exact date of the establishing of The Halls Graphic is unknown, due to the loss of our files prior to the 1950s. However, it is known that W. E. Newport came to Halls as owner of this newspaper in the middle of 1894, and that the newspaper had come into existence a few months prior to that. We were fortunate enough to talk with Mr. Newport in 1944, when we published a 50th anniversary edition. Although in his middle 80s at the time, Mr. Newport was remarkably alert, and his memory was excellent, although he could not recall the name of the founder, believed to have been a Mr. Davis. Recently, Charles B. Guy, district manager of South Central Bell called us stating that he wished to present a plaque honoring The Halls Graphic for 90 years of service. Telephone company records reveal that the newspaper and the telephone company first began doing business July 10, 1894. We are proud of the long record of The Halls Graphic and proud to have been a part of it for so many years. The newspaper is the oldest continuously operating business in Halls, rivaled only by the Bank of Halls, which will celebrate its 85th birthday next October.

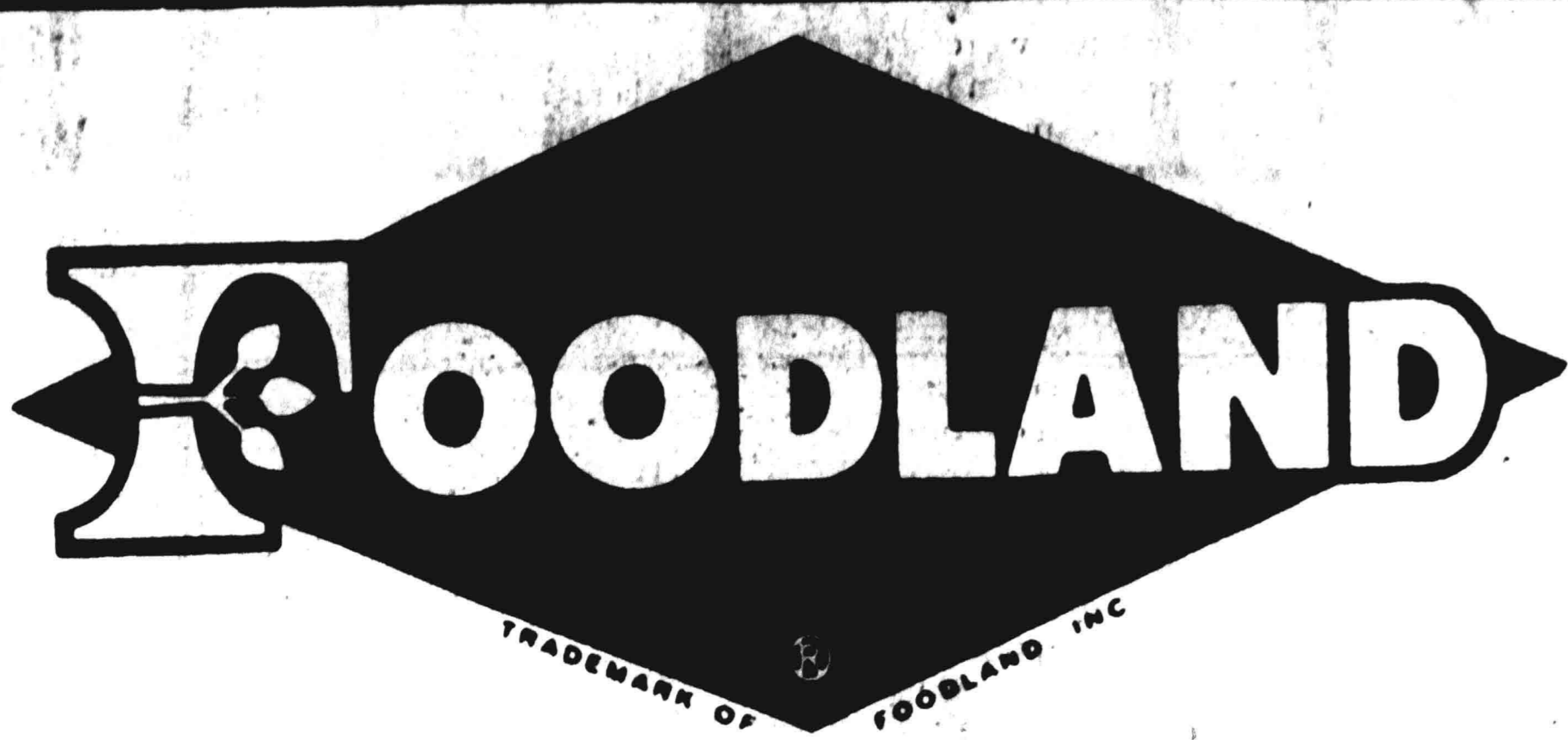

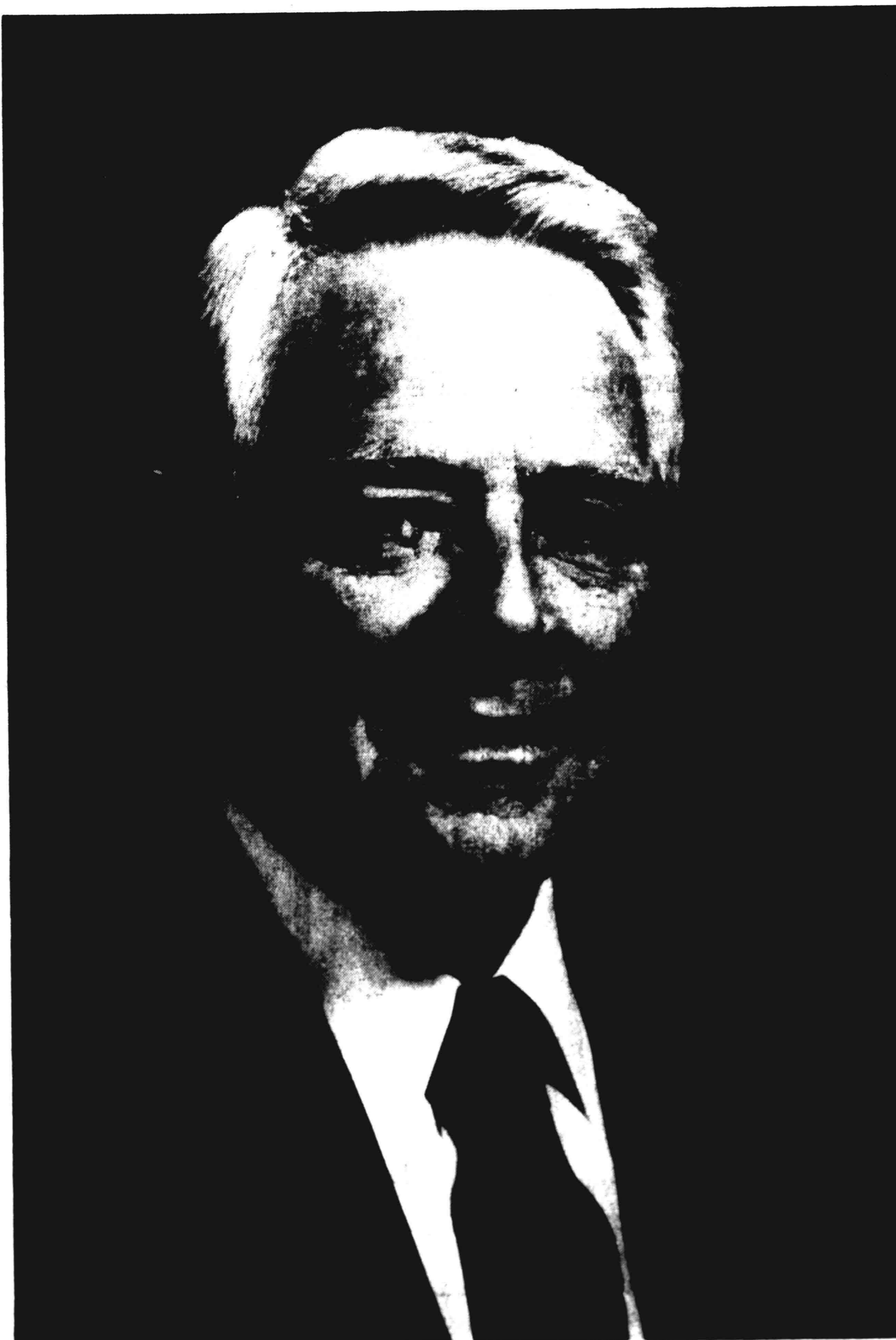

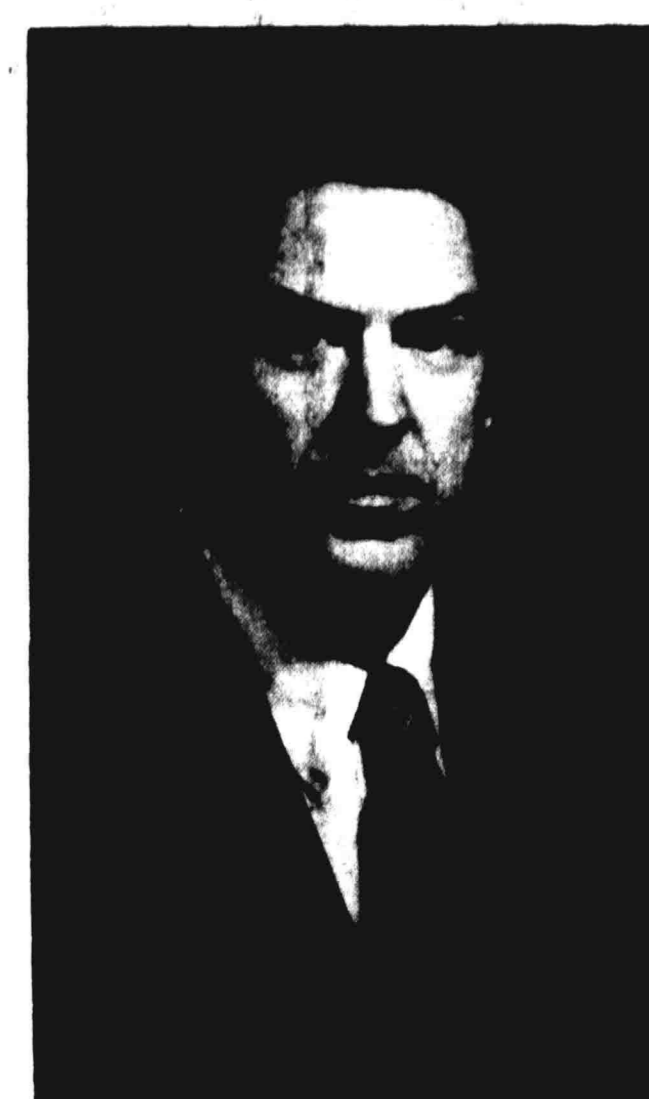

Tennessee's Wild Horse and Burro Days

Cross Plains—the name evokes an image of wide open plains under western skies, a place where wild horses roam. So it is fitting that the rolling pastures of Cross Plains, Tennessee serve as home port for thousands of wild horses and burros coming east for adoption. The official opening ceremonies of the Southeast Wild Horse and Burro Adoption Center will be at 10:00 a.m. on July 14. The general public is invited on July 14 and 15 to attend Tennessee's first Wild Horse and Burro Days celebration.

Beginning at 8:00 a.m. each day a pancake breakfast will be served and activities will focus on the Adopt a Horse Program and the fifth anniversary of the first permanent adoption center in the Eastern United States. Featured events each day will be a Wild West Comedy Show with professional actors and stuntmen, animal training and gentling demonstrations, guided tours of the adoption center, arts and crafts sales, and camp fire and pit barbecue cookouts.

Adopters from as far away as Florida and Louisiana will be returning with their adopted horses to demonstrate the progress that has been made in gentling and using the animals in the same manner that domestic mounts are used. Of particular interest will be horses, such as the one owned by sausage king Bob Evans, which display the ancient striped markings and conformation of the stock introduced into the New World by Spanish conquistadors.

The adoption center in Cross Plains is a family operation, built and operated for the federal Bureau of Land Management by Randall and Paula Carr. The corals were built on acreage farmed by the Carrs for about thirty years. It has taken five years to develop the center, and this year the public has been invited to tour the center and take part in the celebration.

Terry Lewis, public relations spokesman for the center noted that, "There are 47,800 wild horses and 12,300 burros on the range in 10 western states. Since 1973, 46,000 animals have been adopted nationwide, with some 10,000 here in the East. More than 5,000 animals have been adopted from the Tennessee center."

Many adopted horses have won endurance races, plowing contests, and have made particularly good 4-H projects. Burros make good pets and have been taught to break show calves.

"Another interesting thing about burros," remarked Paula Carr, "is their use in breaking bulls with a lead. Special collars with a short lead are put on the burro and the bull. By the end of the day, the bull will go anywhere the burro wants to go. Also, Randall and I have learned from experience that we are no longer losing calves to wild dogs, thanks to the burros. They chase the dogs and will not let them come into the fields."

"We've adopted some of the animals ourselves," said Randall Carr. "We want to find homes for all that arrive at

the center. The hard winter snows and floods have taken their toll on all the western wildlife. Without adoption thousands will starve to death."

Ideally, the wild horses and burros should remain wild, but the expansion of man and competition for grazing with wildlife and cattle on public lands has endangered the existence of many of the herds. The horses and burros on the range today are descended from those that escaped or were let loose during the settling of the frontier. Beginning in the 1500's, Spanish soldiers brought horses to their camps from Europe. Indians got their first horses from these camps, and through the years, escaped and abandoned animals formed the first wild horse and burro herds. These animals were joined by horses released by the cavalry when army posts were closed, horses turned loose when ranchers could not keep them during periods of drought, and burros belonging to settlers, prospectors, and mountain men.

Eventually, the herds became valuable as pet food, and "mustangers" rounded up thousands, driving them to exhaustion and destruction. Today, the herds are protected by federal law enacted in 1971. The adoption program offers a chance for survival and a chance for many people to own a horse of their own.

According to Paula Carr, "You meet the nicest people when you meet adopters. There is great joy in watching a wild creature come to know, trust, and love its human companion."

G. D. Bacon of Afton, Tennessee is one of these adopters. He has trained a wild mare and intends to adopt two more horses for his family.

"I believe the horses are good for my kids," said Mr. Bacon. "Give a kid a horse and he will stay away from alcohol and drugs. The

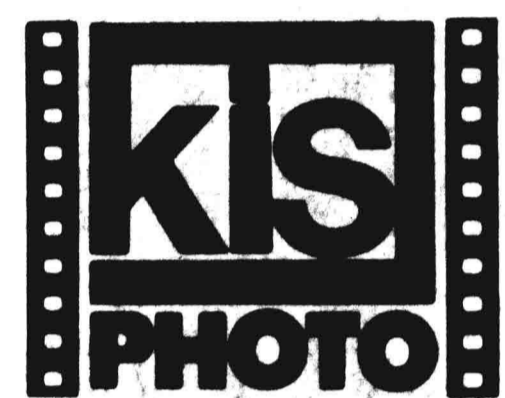

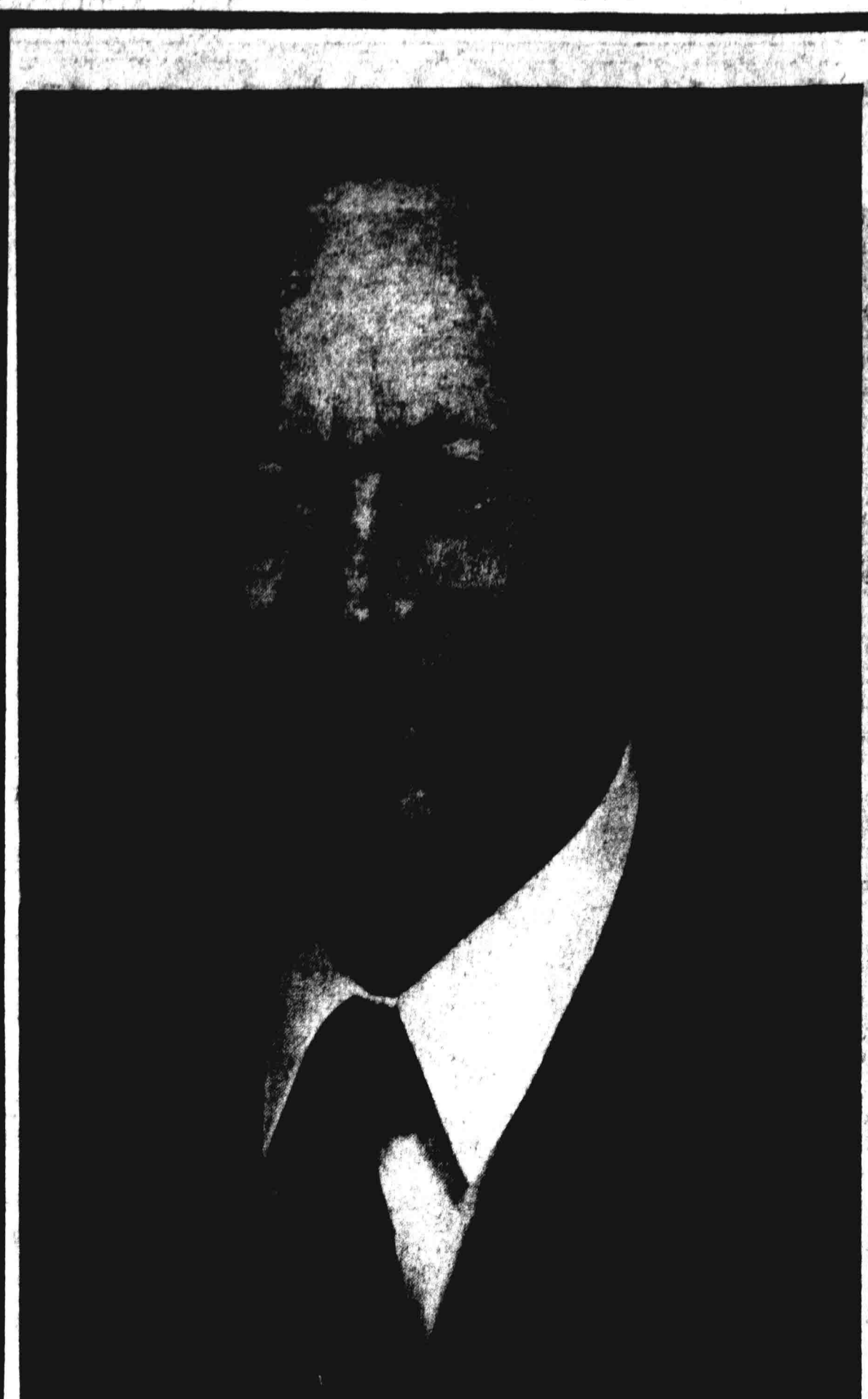

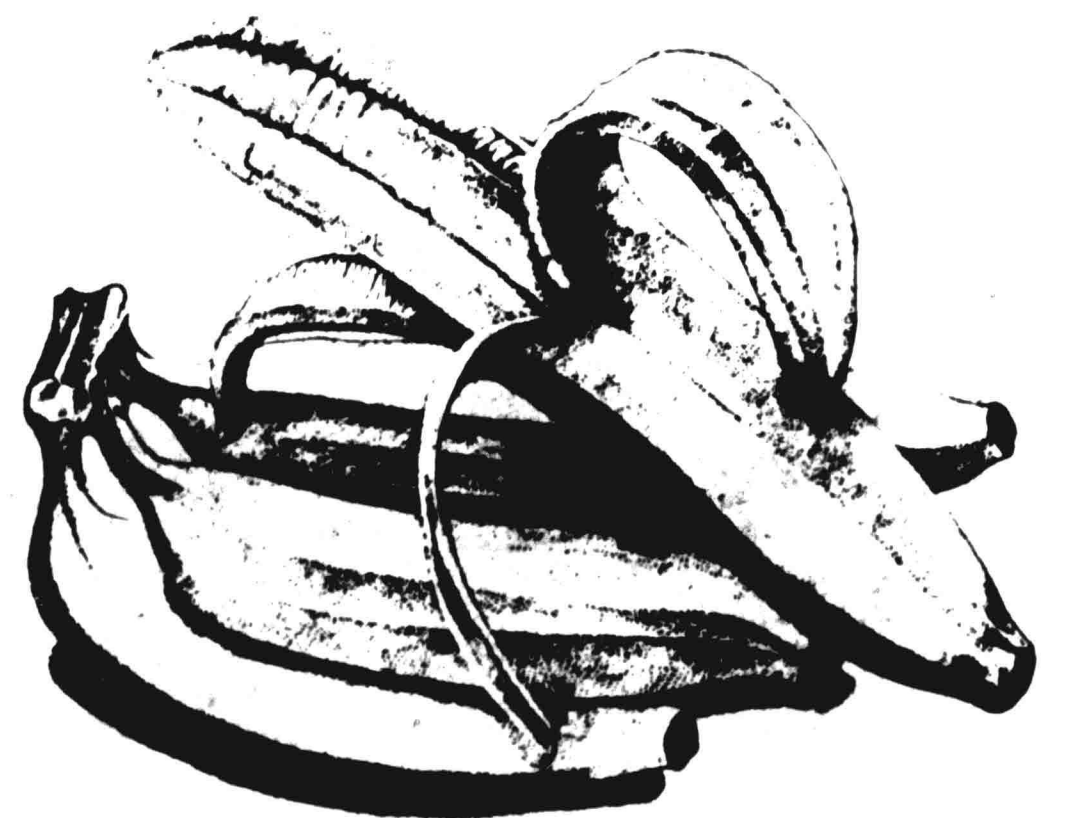
