It had no bathroom nor plumbing, other than a single water faucet on the outside, so the first priority was a bathroom and the complete re-building of the kitchen. At the same time, the house was completely re-

wired, and Dad started a lot of conversation by having a light placed on the front and back porches. At that time, there were electric meters in Halls, and the bill was figured by the number of drops or lights in a house, so most people installed only the barest number of lights possible to serve their needs. Lights on the porches were almost unheard of. The sewer lines were in place, but the streets were

unpaved when we moved to Halls. There are plenty o persons still around who can remember some of the more notorious mud-holes in Halls.
