Wild Life Haven

Apparently our backyard is becoming a wild life haven. We have a young rabbit, a squirrel, assorted species of birds including a thrasher, blue jays, mockers, and cardinals, and there is a woodpecker somewhere in the neighborhood.

Earlier this year Nell again had trouble with sparrows trying to nest in the mail box but she remembered how she handled it last year and soon put a stop to it by taping the lid down.

The young rabbit is right at home and pays absolutely no attention to us unless we move suddenly or get within a couple of feet of him. He can be found admiring the periwinkles in the planter along the edge of the patio or investigating the tomato plants or other flower plants but so far has done no damage. So long as he behaves himself he can stay.

The squirrel is a visitor from across the street but he makes regular pilgrimages to investigate any possible change. He found our pecan trees last year and Nell caught him on the flower urns nibbling on the petunias. His latest escapade was standing on his back feet and reaching up to get grapes off the vines. Nell says the squirrel must go, but we doubt it.

The birds behave very well except they are very noisy early in the morning and sometimes awaken us with their chatter.

This, of course, has nothing to do with our backyard but last week en route to Ripley a beaver started across old Hwy. 51 just a few hundred yards south of Cane Creek. When he saw the car he turned back to the east side of the highway. In past years we have had a bobcat cross the road in front of our car, and we have seen mink on the highway.

Another Birthday

This is being written prior to our 75th birthday Monday but will be read after we have reached that milestone. We recently have been thinking of the many things that we can remember and the many things that have been invented during the past 75 years.

Some of our earliest memories are when the first telephones came to Maury City where we lived, the first electric lights, our first radio, our first car and so many other things which we now accept as common place. Our first telephone was one of eight with all of them on the same line. It didn't operate after about 9 p.m. because there was no one at the exchange. The first electric lights were installed after the Poston brothers bought a diesel engine and generator. When the diesel engine wouldn't start they had to call our father because he was the only man in town who knew anything about a diesel engine.

Dad bought our first radio in 1922 although a friend and your editor had attempted to construct a crystal radio the year before. It worked sometimes but only in the best of conditions. Our first car was a Model T Ford that had been driven about 100 miles. The previous owner was never able to learn to drive it. Dad stored it up town in a livery stable that had been converted into a garage. He drove it through the back of the building the first time he tried to park it.

Later came electric refrigerators, air conditioning, television and all of the many marvels of science. All in all we would say that we lived through the period of time when the greatest changes—not necessarily improvements—occurred.

We never dreamed that men would walk on the moon and that space flight would become common place just as we never dreamed of television in the earlier years. It has been a marvelous 75 years.

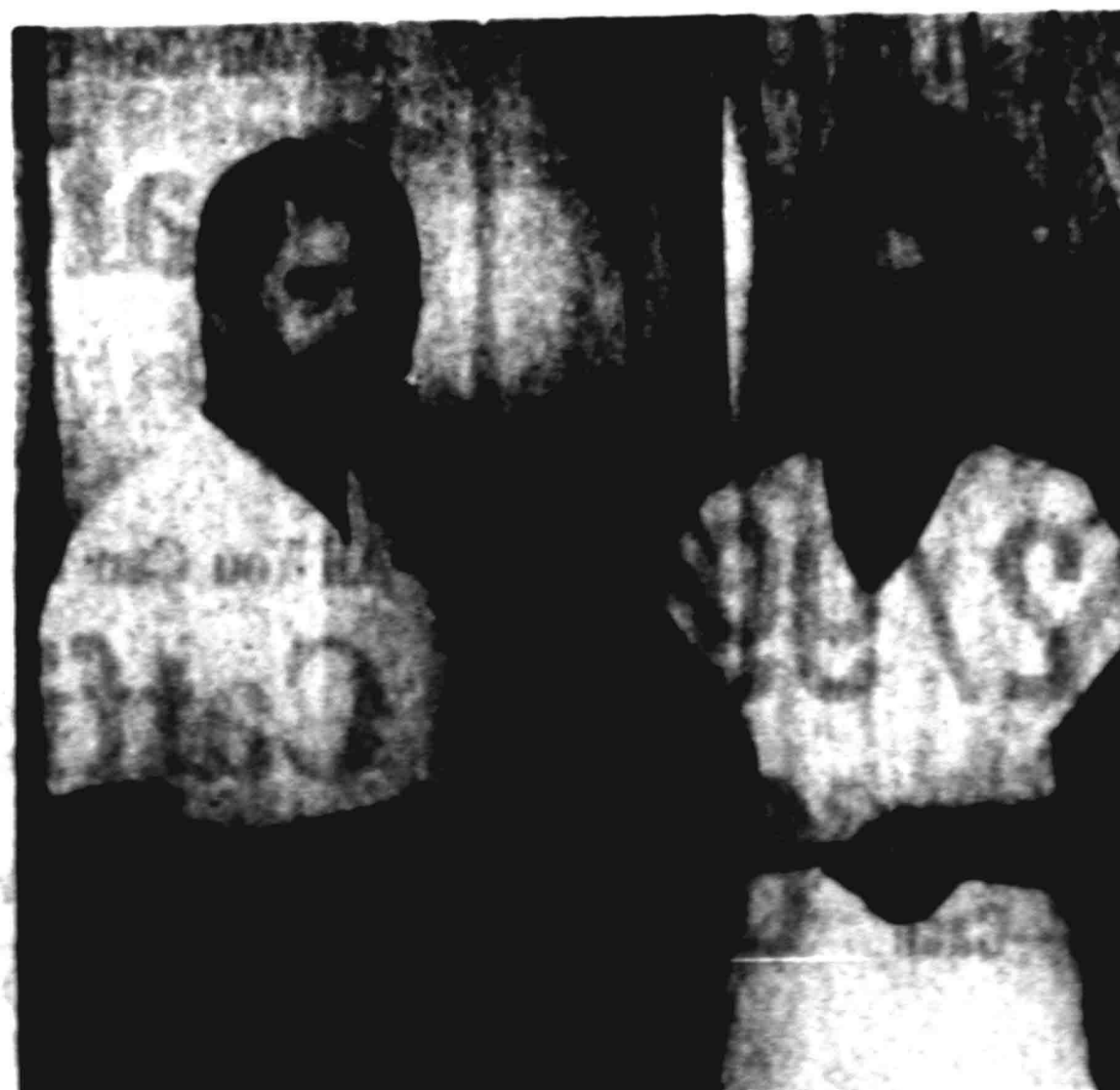

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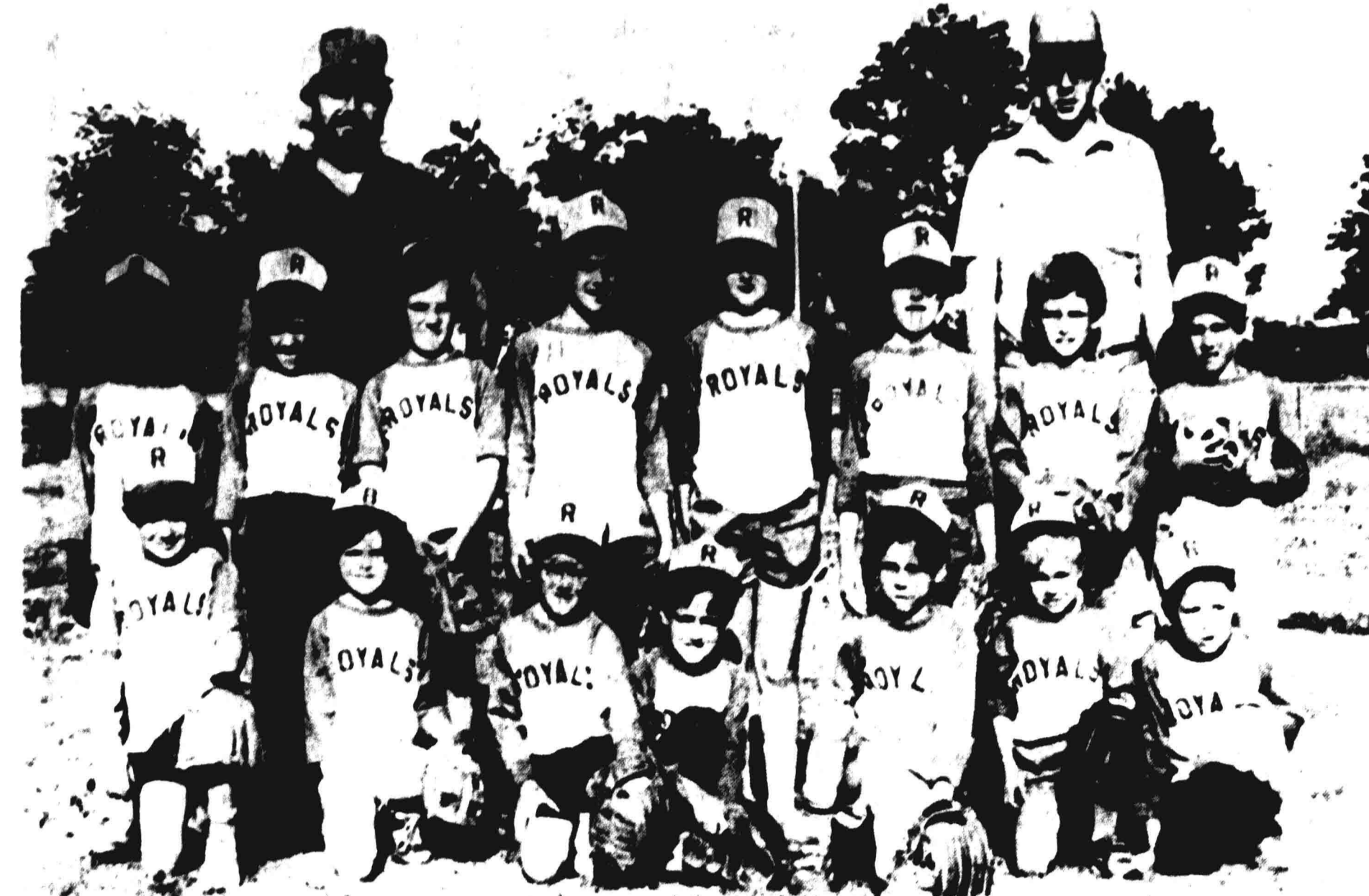

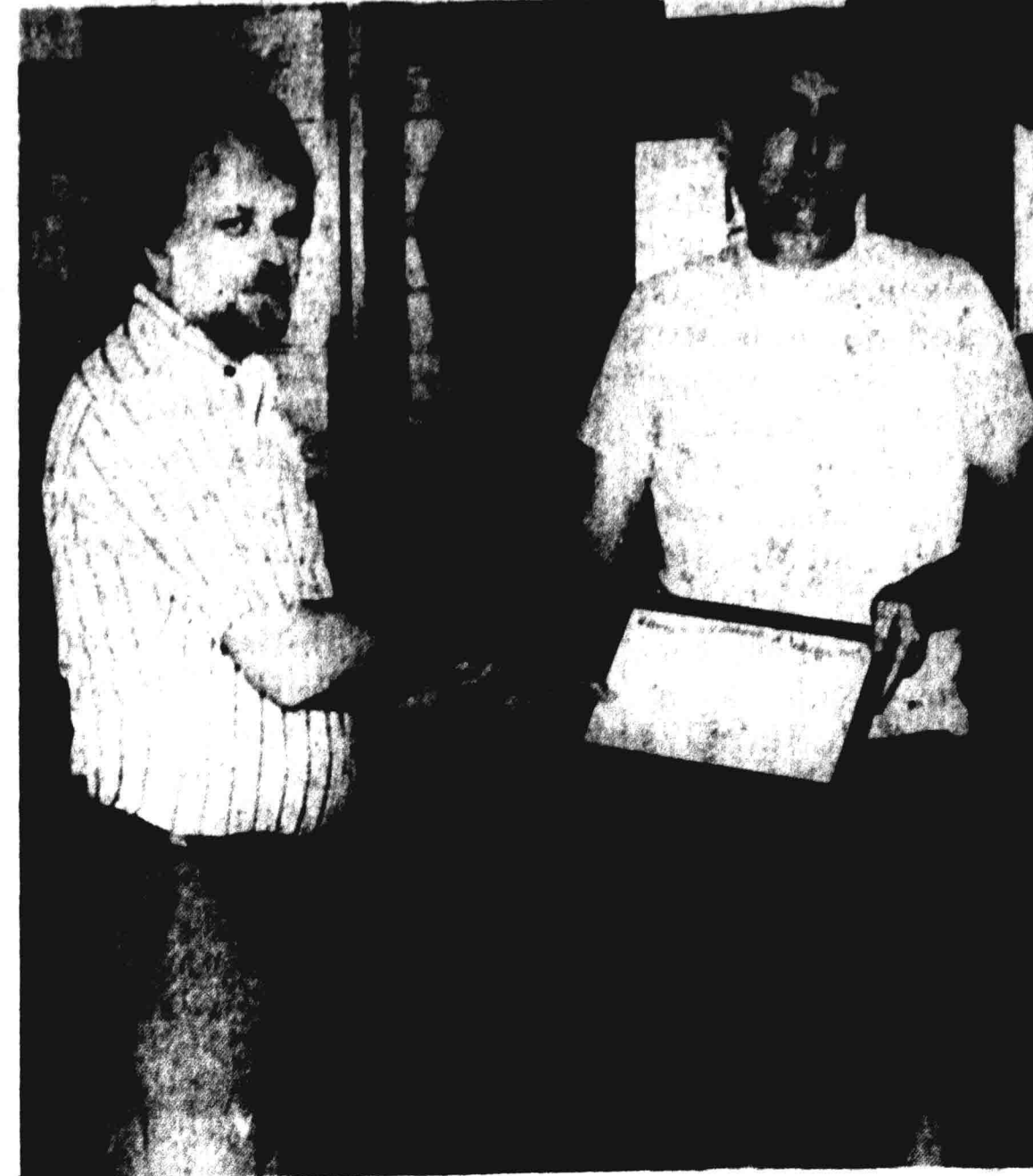

Recently the House passed legislation that will release over \$5 billion in funds for interstate highway construction projects throughout the country. These funds are to be allocated to the states in the second half of fiscal year 1984. This had become an important issue among many states because of the difficulty they were facing in continuing interstate highway construction. In some cases, the freezing of these funds by the U. S. Department of Transportation could have resulted in a state missing an entire construction season.

What was holding up their release was a new estimate of what the completion of the interstate system is expected to cost. Under the Surface Transportation Act of 1982, the money could not be released until Congress approved a new cost estimate. However, the Department of Transportation previously released about one-half of the funds available and held the remainder in abeyance until the new cost estimate could be considered. Under the '82 act, Tennessee was to receive \$955 million through FY86. About \$22 million of those funds have already been made available to Tennessee. Passage of this legislation will make an additional \$8.3 million available for use in the state's efforts to continue interstate construction.

It is anticipated that the Senate will consider an identical amendment to its highway bill when it is considered there in the next few weeks.

In addition to action on this bill that is important to our state, an amendment was added to it which linked an increase in the drinking age to federal highway aid money. That amendment simply said that certain funds would be withheld from the states unless they enact minimum drinking age of 21.

The amendment would withhold 15% of federal highway construction money over two years beginning in 1987, if states with lower ages at which individuals are permitted to buy liquor fail to raise the minimum age. Eight other states and the District of Columbia have laws restricting the sale of hard liquor to those 21 and over.

Two dozen Members of the House rose to speak in support of the amendment during the debate on this amendment. It was passed on a voice vote indicating that there was a general consensus that such action was needed. Earlier, I reported to you that action had been taken in committee on a bill that clamped down on the problems associated with situations where young people are able to cross state lines to take advantage of a lower drinking age in a neighboring state. I think that is an indication of the seriousness with which the issue of increasing drinking ages is being viewed throughout the nation.

All over the country, the states, including our own state of Tennessee are passing laws to increase the legal drinking age. That effort has come about after a number of studies have indicated that there are more incidences of young people being involved in serious accidents after drinking. Up to this point, the drinking age question has

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The Museum of Tobacco Art and History

Portugal and Spain were eventually demanded through-out Europe and became as precious as gold.

In 1612, John Rolfe harvested the first successful crop of tobacco at the English colony of Jamestown. Within seven years Virginia was supplying Europeans with more and better tobacco than Spain and Portugal. Cultivation spread to the other English colonies. Soon the ceremonial herb of the Indians became the stabilizing cash crop of the economy of the New World. It was the most important product exported from America.

Pipes of clay, deer horn, briar, glass, and porcelain reflect the utilitarian and decorative aspects of pipe smoking.

Cigars, cigarette containers, match holders, and ashtrays display the wealth of products manufactured for the tobacco smoker. European snuff boxes, Chinese snuff bottles, snuff graters and snuff mills from Scotland all attest to the popularity of inhaling snuff. The practice was advocated by Catherine de Medici, Queen of France, in the late 1500s. Since tobacco has always been associated with the American Indian, there is a fine exhibit of peace pipes and a handsome, six-foot, cigar store Indian chief.

According to David Wright, museum director, "Tobacco is truly an American product. The Indians were the first growers and manufacturers of tobacco. When Columbus made his historic voyage in 1492, he found natives of the New World smoking and using tobacco in every way we do today, from snuff to chew."

The adventurers carried the pleasure of pipe smoking home with them and some found their new hobby shocking and hazardous. Writers of the times recorded that the public often thought smokers were on fire and rushed to their aid with buckets of water to put the fires out. The superstitious believed that pipe smokers were using a product of the devil and tobacco enthusiasts were sometimes arrested and accused of demon possession. In spite of trying times, tobacco grown in the colonies

The Museum of Tobacco Art and History

The U.S. Tobacco Museum collection contains some of the first trading cards printed. Actresses and actors of the 1870s preceded famous baseball figures. Advertising posters and cigar box labels became works of art as printing progressed to the use of six colors and elaborate, embossed foiling. Famous artists such as Art Nouveauist Alphonse Mucha, were enlisted to create art

The U.S. Museum of Tobacco Art and History keeps approximately 600 objects on display at all times. Museum guides provide an introduction to the exhibits but visitors will enjoy browsing through the self-explanatory displays. Group tours are welcome. Special exhibits the museum receives from its

More Reminiscing

Last week, your editor wrote of his 75th birthday and thought back about the many changes that have occurred during his life-time.

Probably we are living in the past, as many older persons do, but nevertheless we enjoyed thinking of some of the earlier days of our life and some of our early impressions.

We can't remember the first automobile that we saw, but we can remember vividly our first ride in a car. Mr. Elmo Handle, a rural mail carrier, of Alamo, took us on a car ride around the courthouse in Alamo. The car was built much like a buggy with a tiller to steer it and hard rubber tires on high wheels.

The late Dr. B. G. Marr, who lived in Maury City at that time but later practiced in Dyersburg, had the first car we can remember in Maury City. It was a bright red runabout—now called a convertible—but we don't remember the make. We were given a number of rides in that car.

A neighbor bought a Studebaker touring car—the first luxury car in Maury City, although there were several others within a short time.

After we moved to Halls, our father purchased a Dodge sedan but continued to drive a Model T Ford until his death, May 19, 1927. Two-car families were unusual at that time.

Several months before we moved to Halls, in April, 1923, Dad bought a house and began remodeling it. It had no bathroom nor plumbing, other than a single water faucet on the outside, so the first priority was a bathroom and the complete re-building of the kitchen.

At the same time, the house was completely rewired, and Dad started a lot of conversation by having a light placed on the front and back porches. At that time, there were electric meters in Halls, and the bill was figured by the number of drops or lights in a house, so most people installed only the barest number of lights possible to serve their needs. Lights on the porches were almost unheard of.

The sewer lines were in place, but the streets were unpaved when we moved to Halls. There are plenty of persons still around who can remember some of the more notorious mud-holes in Halls.

We could write much more, and probably will at some time in the future, but we will cease and desist now, so that you may continue to read this column.

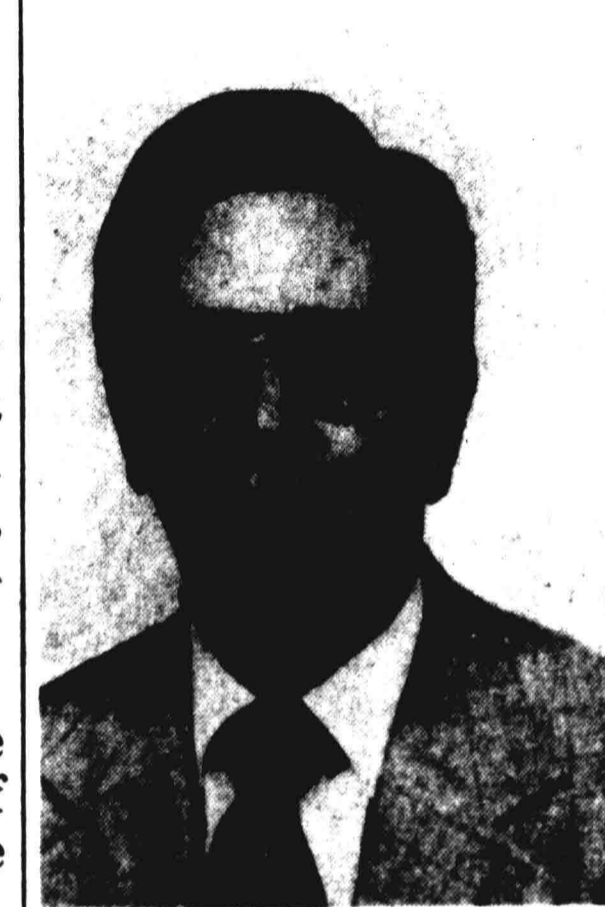

People from throughout the area are extended a cordial invitation by the people of Halls to join them for this service.

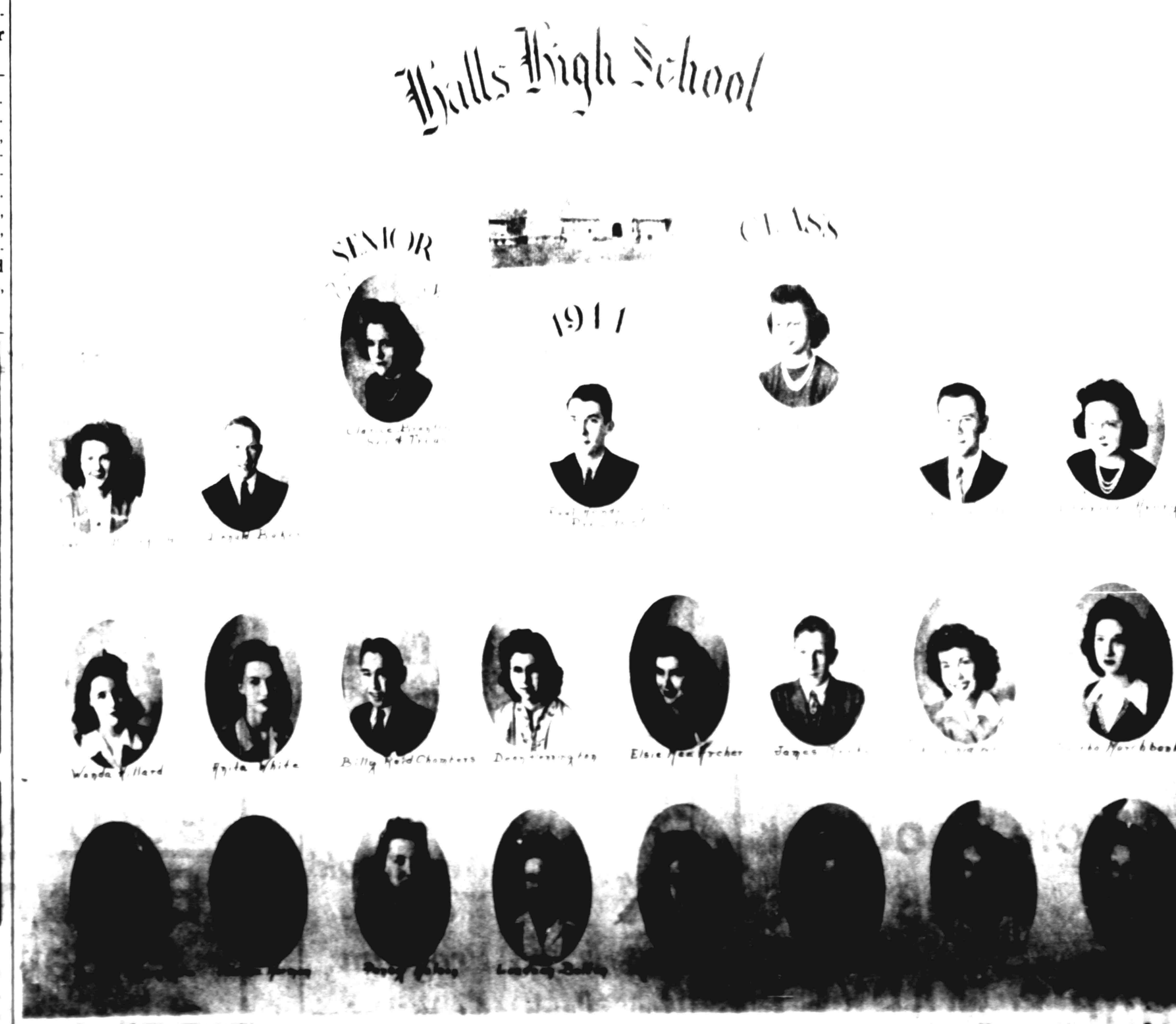

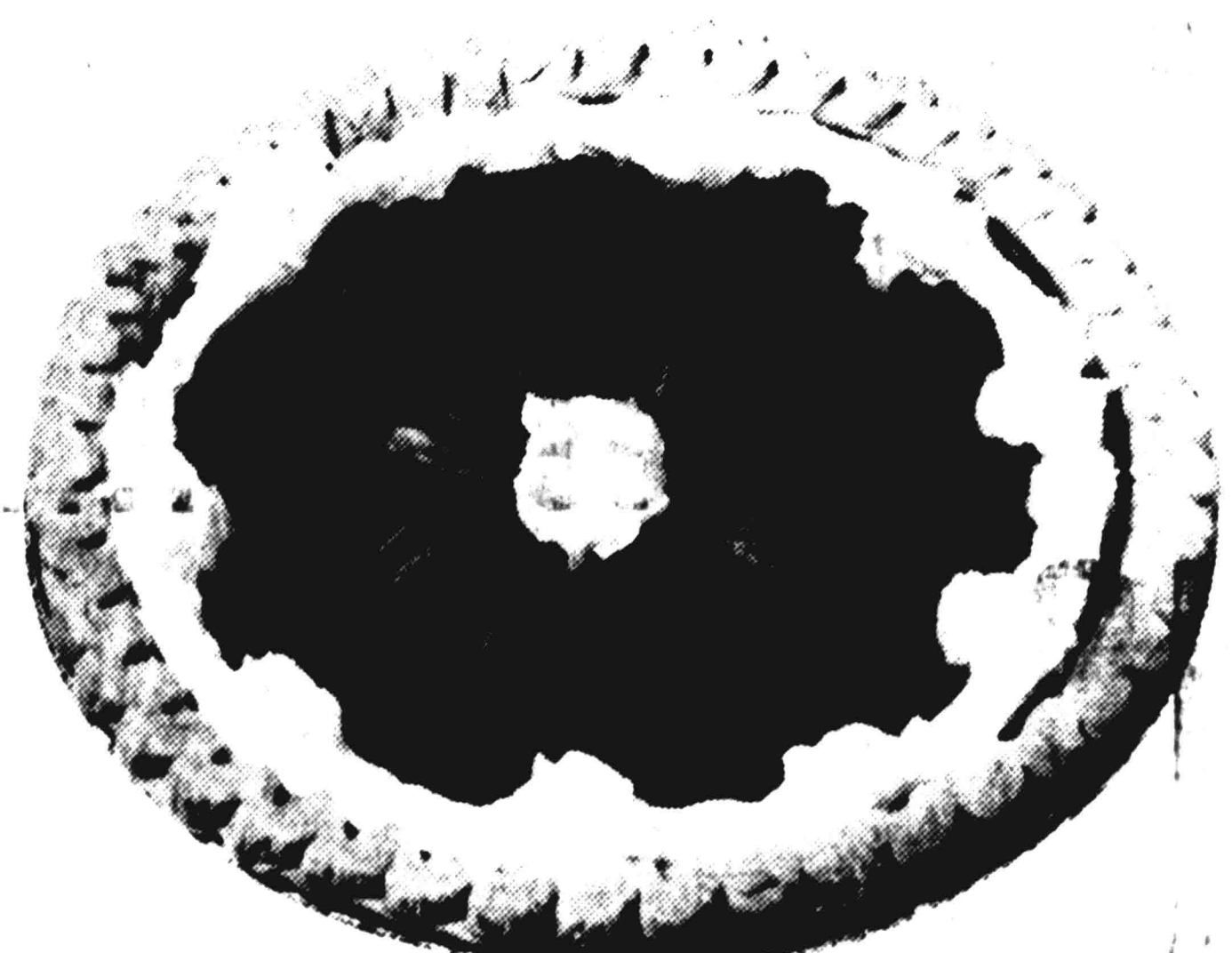

ED JONES 8th DISTRICT OF TENNESSEE REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

An unsuspecting issue has risen to the forefront as one of several prominent differences in the House and Senate versions of the Defense Authorization Act for FY85. It is legislation that would provide for a system of educational benefits for those serving on active military duty. The House and Senate have both passed very different versions of such a program and will have to try to reach agreement on what to implement when the bills go to a Conference Committee.
Before getting into the particulars of this legislation, it is rather interesting to note how the intent of this kind of program and, in fact, the motivation for its implementation, has changed. As many people will remember, the first of this type of program was passed to provide assistance to the millions of Americans who were returning from World War II. Because of the sacrifice that they had made for the nation, it was felt that some effort should be made to insure that these valiant veterans were provided the opportunity, if they wanted it, to attend college. That program was later extended to apply to veterans of Korea and Vietnam.
When the GI Bill was discontinued in 1976, a newer model was implemented that allowed the government to match contributions made by the individual serviceman to a fund that would be available to him or her for the purpose of furthering their education. That program was designed as a program to improve recruiting, as opposed to the earlier program of reward for service to the nation.
Once again, the Congress is grappling with the issue of how to improve recruiting by offering educational incentives. On the one hand, the House of Representatives is seeking to reestablish the GI Bill approach. Under this proposal, which was included in the House version of the Defense Department Authorization bill, those serving three years on active duty would be eligible for basic education assistance benefits of \$300 per month for up to 36 months. Those serving two years of active duty and four years of reserve time would be eligible for the same benefits
