### Halls Cagers To Regional

Both Halls High School basketball teams advanced to Region 7-A tournament in Dresden after placing third and fourth in District 13-A tournament play at Greenfield last week.

Halls girls took third place with a surprising 56-30 victory over Greenfield in the consolation game Friday. They had previously defeated Sharon, 43-38, and lost to Bradford, 58-40.

Sharon Piphus and Camille Pitts—both named District All-Stars—led Halls scoring. Piphus had 21 points and Pitts 15. Virginia Napper added 11.

Halls boys didn't win a game in the tournament, but were seeded for an automatic advance to the regional.

The Tigers lost to Bradford, 61-60, in overtime in the district semi-final. The Tigers, leading by one point, were called for a foul with one second on the clock. After Coach Russell, of Bradford, called time out, Erly Knotts sank both shots for the win.

Halls Coach Winston Jarrett protested that Kevin Knotts was fouled and that the wrong player took the free throws, but he was over-ruled.

Alfonzo Abernathy hit 22, and Calvin Jackson and Andre Wells had 10 each for the Tigers. Abernathy and Terry Parish were named All-Stars.

Saturday, the Tigers lost 80-66 as Kenton placed third in the tournament.

Greenfield defeated Bradford for the top spot.

### Two Stabbings Spur Search Of Prisoners

While three of five armed escapees eluded a massive man-hunt—and two were charged with adding a third murder to their records, after searchers passed within a few yards of them in Haywood County—two stabbings in a week persuaded Fort Pillow State Prison Farm Warden Herman Davis to lock up his prisoners and search them for weapons, narcotics, and other contraband.

Larry Doggett, 25, serving a 15-year sentence for burglary and rape in Shelby County, was stabbed about 8:15 a. m. Monday in the prison yard. Like Carl Webb, serving 50 years for murder in Gibson County, who was stabbed Tuesday of last week in the prison, Doggett was reported "stable" in the Nashville prison infirmary.

Elizabeth "Bo" Windrow, whose husband, Paul, 59, Brownsville tire dealer, was shot in the back at their home near Brownsville and Interstate 40 as he grilled steaks out-doors Tuesday evening of last week, and who was forced to accompany men identified as escapees James E. Clegg, 30, and Ronald Freeman, 41, in her family car to Dandridge, near Knoxville, where she was released unharmed, told investigators searchers passed within a few yards of the escapees, hidden under vines, the day after their escape.

A Brownsville man says Windrow, armed with a .45 caliber pistol, warned him away from fishing in the area, because of the escapees, shortly before Windrow's death.

Freeman was serving 199 years for execution style slayings of his wife and step-daughter, whose bodies he dumped into Fort Loudon Lake.

Of the five escapees, scores of officers scouring the state netted only Randolph Oliver, 33, serving a life term plus 35 to 40 years for assault to commit murder, rape, aggravated rape, and robbery with a deadly weapon in Shelby County, picked up on Highway 70 without resistance by Brownsville police about 11:50 a. m. the day after the escape.

The other re-capture was by a 73-year-old grandmother—Louise (Mrs. Nathan) Degrafrinried, of Highway 59 near Braden—

who gave bountiful breakfast, promised prayers, and summoned officers to arrest Riley Arzenaux, 26, serving 25 years for murder in Shelby County.

Lt. Gov. John S. Wilder, whose home is about a mile from Mrs. Degrafrinried's, and for whose grandchildren she has been a baby-sitter, left his chair as presiding officer of the state Senate to introduce a resolution commending her—but not refunding her cost of the breakfast. It was approved unanimously.

Gov. Lamar Alexander offered the first state rewards for Fort Pillow escapees in history—\$5,000 each for Clegg and Freeman.

Windrow was chairman of the Haywood County Republican Party.

District Attorney Paul Summers, Jr., of Somerville, asked the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation to find out how the escape happened.

Warden Davis has won wide publicity by boasting of putting prisoners to work.

He now has to explain why five dangerous men were "put to work" with two guards, only one of whom was armed.

Investigators snicker at the account released by the prison's public relations officials that the escapees "dug up" three pistols.

They expect to prove that the pistols were supplied within the prison.

Whether the results of all (or any) of the investigations will ever see the light of day is doubtful.

Dick Baumbach, spokesman for the Department of Corrections, says that its investigation "could take months."

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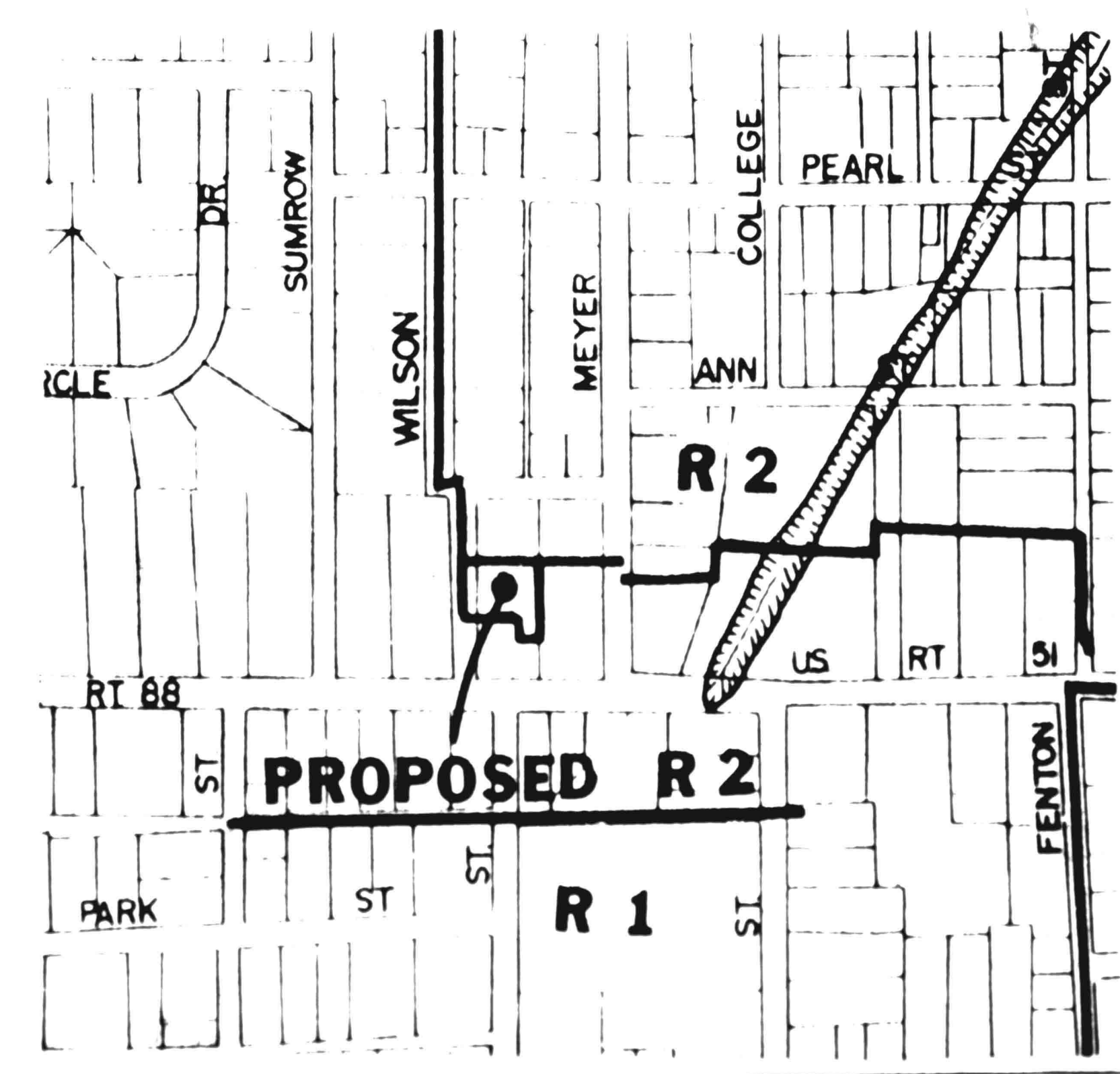

I thought I had written about just about everybody who owned or lived in the old brick house on the corner of Church and Shannon Streets.

However, last week, I received a nice letter from my friend Billie Bailey (Mrs. Douglas) Barbour, of Memphis, with another story about the house.

Part of her letter follows:  
"I have intended to write for the longest while to tell you how very much I am enjoying your articles about Halls. Keep them coming."

"I particularly enjoyed the ones about the white brick house back of the Bank of Halls. Douglas and I saw it last fall and it looked so restored and neat and loved."

"That house has always had special significance to me. The reason is that I was born in it. You may or may not know that I have a well-earned reputation for being a slow-poke. In my family there has been a life-long joke that my father told and enjoyed as long as he lived."

"It seems that Dr. Will Millen lived right across the street—and when the time came for me to make my entrance into this world, Daddy shot across the street as fast as he could to get Dr. Millen."

"When they got back across the street, I had already made my appearance and was waiting for them."

"My family, particularly Daddy, always teased me and said that was the only time in my entire life I ever got in a hurry."

"I would have never again remembered old 'Squire' Parker (who lived next door to Dr. Millen) and his wife if I had not been reminded of them by your article."

"When you mentioned that his wife always wore a long black dress and walked with a cane, I remembered having seen her."

"I believe I thought she was a witch—but she almost never appeared in public."

"I also remember that they had a white picket fence with a gate, and 'Squire' Parker often leaned over it and watched the world go by."

"Seems to me he also wore black, had a black beard, and carried a cane, and always leaned forward when he walked—which gave him a very humped appearance."

"I do not know how long we lived there—but it must have been several years for me to have been old enough to have all these images conjured up in my mind by your article."

"All the Barbours have been most interested in your articles about 'Aunt Matt' Mitchell. Incidentally, the Vera Hathaway who graduated from Halls High School in 1905 has been Vera Hathaway Barbour for the last 60 or 70 years."

"Her husband was Oliver Barbour, the brother of Will Barbour, who was Douglas' father."

"She is quite a gal! Now in Bright Glade Nursing Home very near where we live—her mind as sharp as it ever was, at 90 or thereabout."

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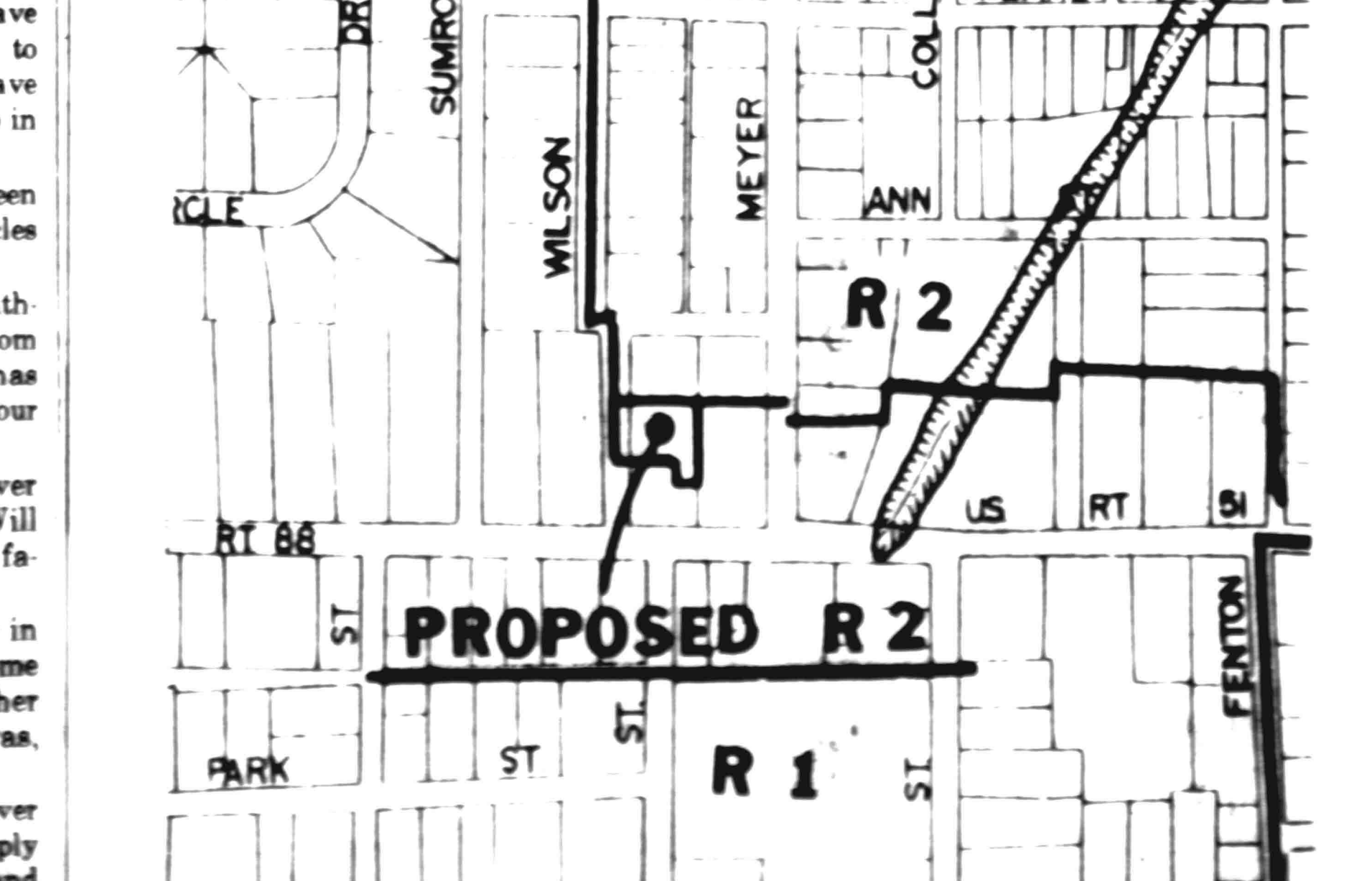

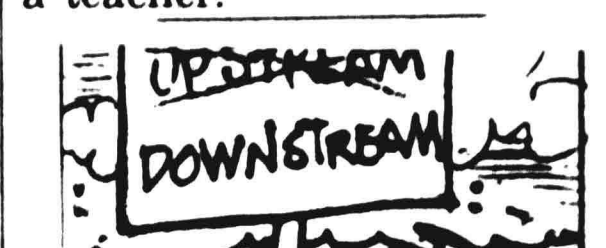

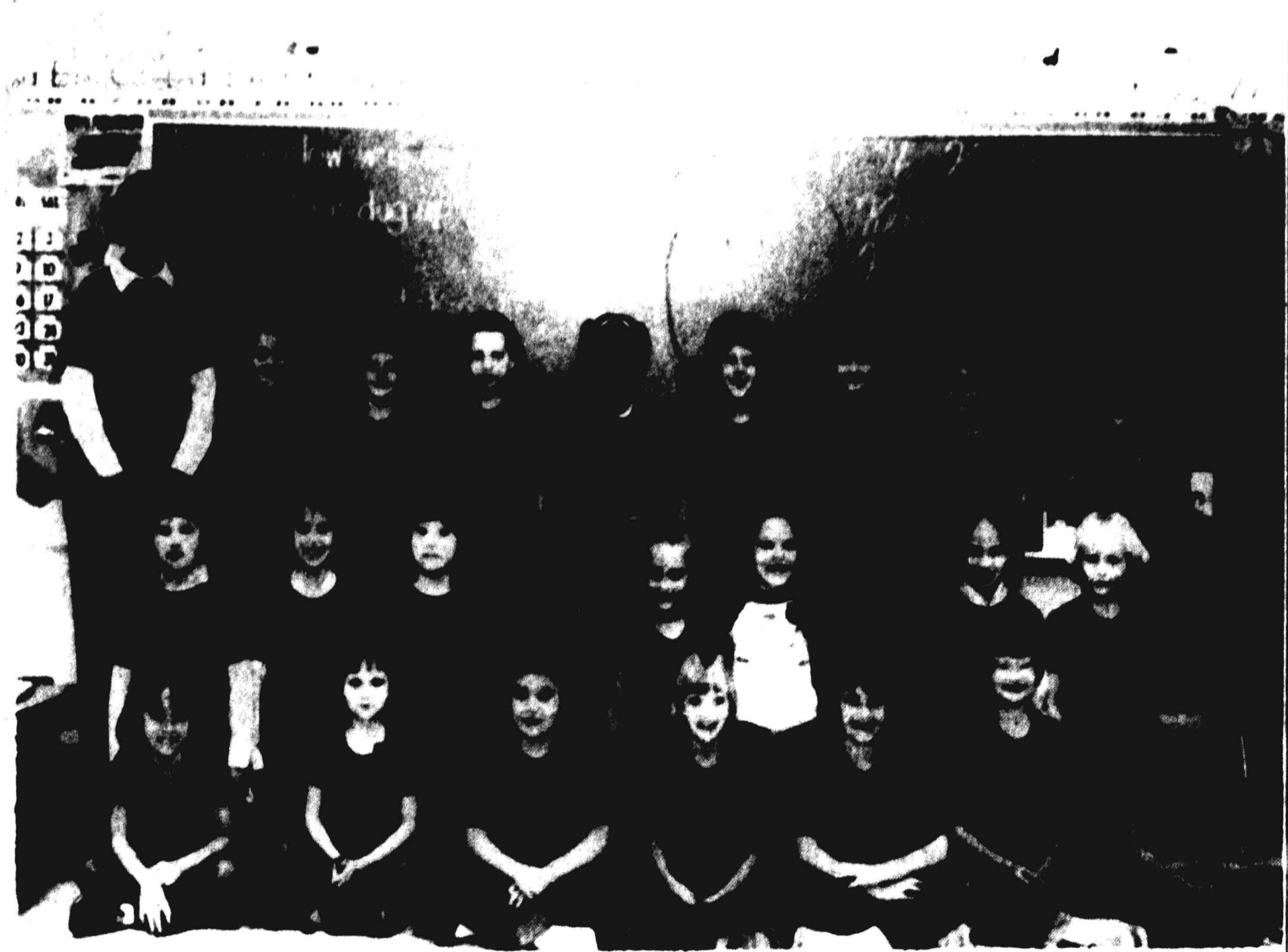

In 1950, Immanuel Velikovsky wrote *Worlds In Collision*, a book about world-wide catastrophe that have taken place in earth's past.

In doing research for this book, he came across a somewhat curious story in the Bible, in the tenth chapter of Joshua.

In this story, the sun is said to have remained in the same position in the sky for about a whole day—making a day twice as long as normal.

Many people have dismissed this story as being just that—a story—and not something that actually took place.

Velikovsky reasoned that if such an event as an extended day did indeed take place, then there would have had to have been an extended night on the opposite side of the globe.

With this in mind, he began studying into the folklore of the countries on the other side of the earth. Sure enough, he found accounts of just such a long night among the Aborigines of Mexico and North America.

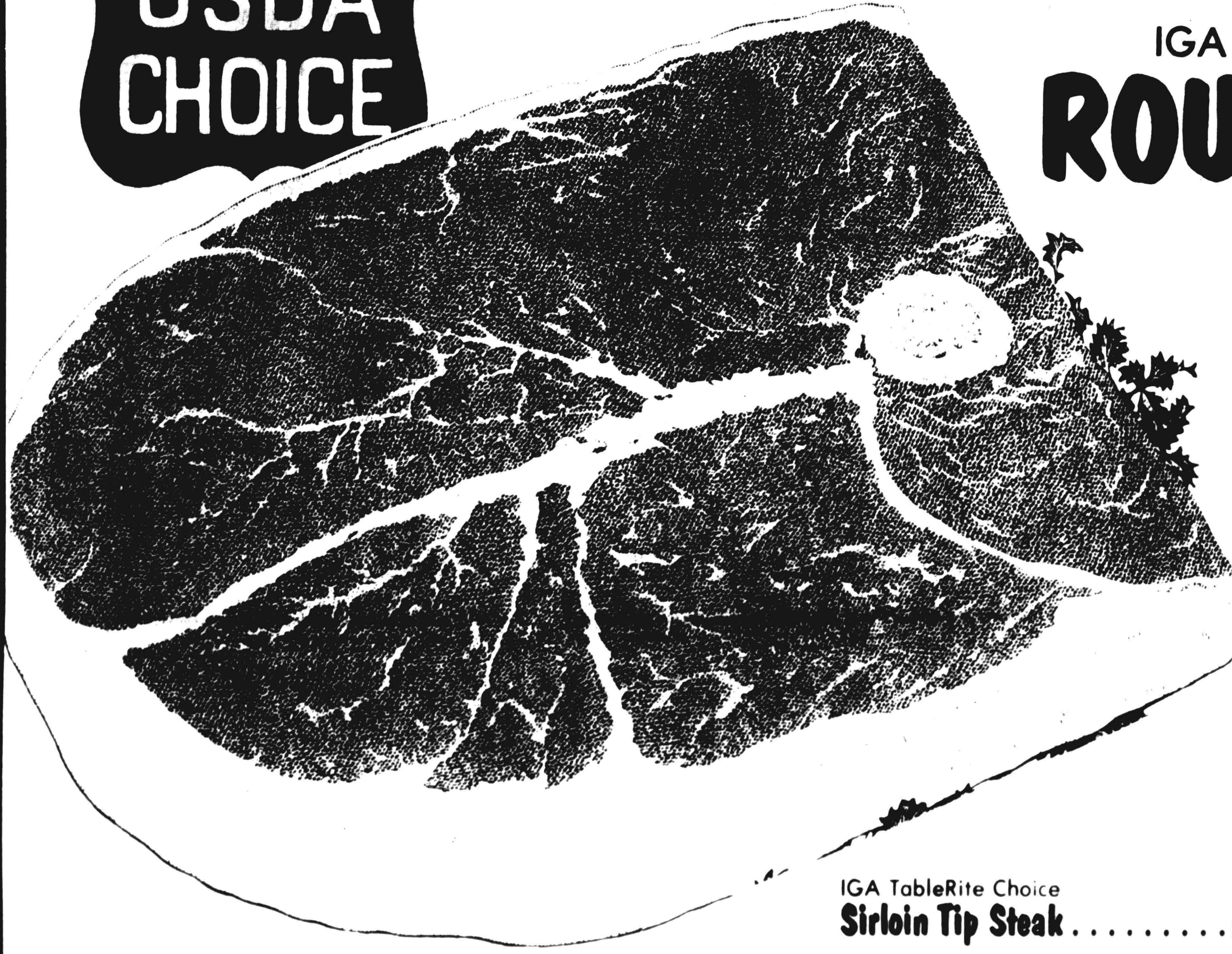
