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





The Budget Mess

One cannot read a newspaper or a national news magazine or listen to a television news broadcast with out some so-called expert either predicting dire consequences because of the continued high deficits or defending the Administration's recently proposed 1985

It seems to us that none of the experts know much more about just what we can expect within the next few years than your editor does, and certainly, we know

Also it seems likely that there could be cuts in defense spending without actually damaging the nation's needs for protection.

Perhaps it is time to come down hard on all concerned with the defense budget from Secretary Casper Weinberger to heads of the various procurement agencies of the Army, Navy and Air Force by requiring that they seek competitive bids on even the smallest items and by Halls High School's Tigers requiring that more than one company be allowed to fill



Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that the "Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law, as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county.

All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian. All cats six months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county, and a charge of \$3.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.
