Another Side

For the past several months, there has been a great deal of conversation about the low quality of education in Tennessee. The Master Teacher Plan has been formed by Gov. Lamar Alexander and passed the State Legislature as one step toward the improvement of public education.

We have agreed with many of the statements about public education and certainly agree that improvement is needed, but at the same time, there is another side to the story.

Despite the horror stories about education, the teachers at Halls High School must be doing something right.

Several departments in Halls High School have had some remarkable achievements during the past few years. The vocational agriculture education department, year after year, has had an outstanding record and is conceded to be one of the finest in Tennessee despite certain handicaps. The Vocational Education department is showing up well in district and state competition and the Distributive Education department continues to have state and national winners. This year the DECA group had seven winners at the state level who are eligible for national competition at Kansas City, Mo. later this month. Because of conflict with graduation, some have chosen not to attend the national convention, but four will go to Kansas City.

Other academic departments have sent some outstanding students to colleges and universities and will continue to do so. Over a five year period, the Halls High School band has become recognized as one of the better small school bands in the state and, of course, the Halls High athletic teams have continued to post outstanding records.

We think that every teacher will agree that the schools can stand improvement, but they are not the rank failures that some would have you believe them to be.

While we cannot speak with authority, we feel that there are many other schools throughout Tennessee with similar records. Let's do our part in helping to improve Tennessee's schools, but don't write them off as complete failures.

A New Approach

Your editor has been watching the political scene locally and nationally for many years, and we have reached some conclusions we would like to outline.

One of the things that seem apparent to us is that the present primary system of selecting the presidential candidates is both cumbersome and ineffective.

The drive for the presidential nomination has been spread out over such a long period of time that it has become too costly and more often than not will not select the best possible candidates.

The presidential primary in Tennessee two weeks ago is said to have cost the state more than \$1,500,000, with only a very small percentage of the qualified voters participating, due to a general feeling that the primary will have virtually no effect on the nomination, since it comes at such a late date.

If the present primary system is to be continued, then sectional primaries or some similar arrangements must be placed into effect, and a limit placed on the length of campaigns.

It seems to us that the whole presidential primary system needs re-thinking and a general overhaul.

Living In Fear

The recent series of thunderstorms and tornadoes in the Mid South has created a feeling of fear, as have the articles on the possibilities of earthquakes in the area of the New Madrid fault which, of course, includes virtually all of West Tennessee.

It is our feeling that much of this fear is completely unnecessary. Of course, there is good reason to be afraid of tornadoes and earthquakes, just as there are good reasons to fear nuclear explosions, but constant fear can only do harm and has little value in saving property or lives.

Taking precautions when the danger exists is just common sense, but constantly living in dread is an entirely different matter. Those dangers exist just as the danger exists of a fatal automobile accident each time you drive your car.

Take all reasonable precautions, but don't live in dread and spoil your entire life.

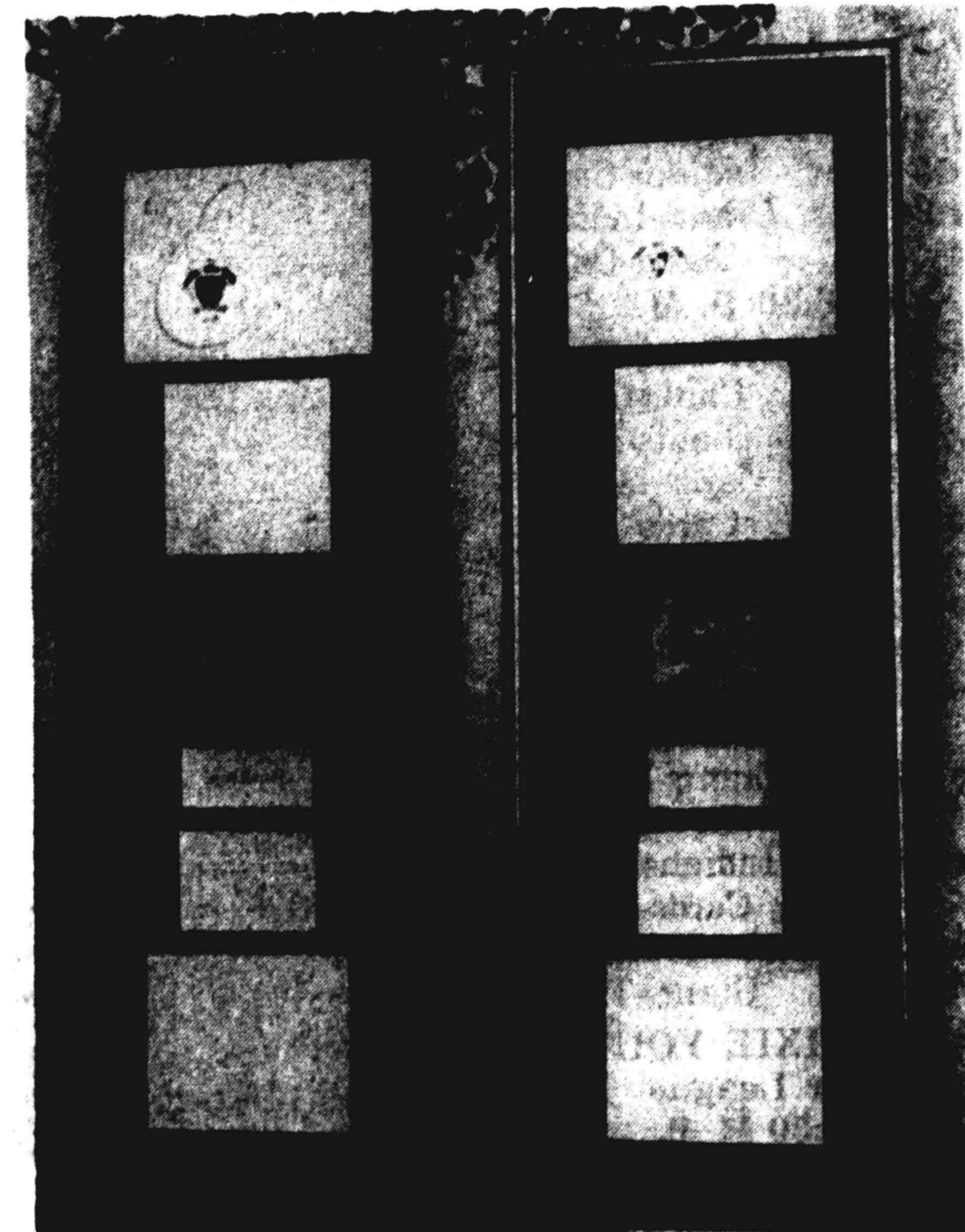

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Rains Hampered County Farmers

By Charles T. Peal
After excessive rains limiting field work, county farmers began stirring soil late last week in hopes of planting cotton.

Green planting cotton scene
Some cotton was planted on April 26th and 27th, along with some grain sorghum and corn.

It's now too late to plant corn, but much milo is yet to be planted.

Tomato producers transplanted all their early crop, and despite adverse weather, it appears to be in fairly good shape.

A good plowing will provide oxygen, and heat from the sun will start plants growing much faster.

Extreme erosion has occurred on plowed land, because of intense rain. Soils have reached the saturation point plus, and several small bottom areas have reported flooding.

The second water in the river bottom has eliminated any prospects for cotton in that area, and any grain sorghum plantings may be doubtful.

There is no indication at this writing as to when the crest will actually occur, but there is still ample time for a normal soy bean crop.

Wheat is in fair condition. Heads appear not as large in many fields as they were last year. Warm, dry weather would mature wheat early, staying ahead of the disease problem.

Beware Pesticides

Most county farmers are more careful with chemicals than in earlier years. Pesticides are potent toxins. Ten steps for handling them are: Know what you're working with. Read the label, note warnings and precautions.

Wear appropriate protective clothing (coveralls over uniforms, rubber gloves, heavy workboots, air filter masks). Store pesticides properly and in their original containers.

Avoid spills, and immediately clean-up any that occur.

If you spill pesticides on yourself, remove any stained clothing and wash the affected area immediately with hot, soapy water. Keep a spare set of clothes in your vehicle.

Wash hands and face immediately after completing each pesticide application.

Never smoke, eat or drink while applying pesticides. Cover or remove food during application.

Crush empty pesticide containers so they cannot be reused. Dispose of leftover materials and containers properly.

Be aware of innocent bystanders. Children, senior citizens, pregnant women and pets are highly susceptible to poisoning.

Watch co-workers for symptoms of pesticide intoxication or illness.

Top Young Farmer

Rickey Daniels deserves congratulations for receiving the Junior Chamber of Commerce Young Farmer Award.

He is representative of young farmers establishing themselves in this county. Unfortunately, agriculture is not as financially attractive as are other pursuits. Rickey and others lack independence, decision-making, and plain enjoyment as some of the reasons why they have chosen farming as a profession.

One can hope the farm situation will change to attract more young farmers.

Pay Your Children?

Paying your children for farm work can net you a tax deduction, if you pay them regularly, pay them a wage fair for what they do, and keep records to show that a true employer-employee relationship exists.

You can deduct their earnings as a farm expense, and they do not have to pay taxes, on their wages unless the total exceeds \$3,000 (although this total does not apply to unearned income such as trust fund payments, nor does it apply if a child is married).

POSTAL CRIMES NEED THOROUGH INVESTIGATION

The postmaster general of the United States, Mr. William Bolger, tells me he doesn't think the Postal Service needs any more postal inspectors. It seems to me that he should either request additional funds of the Congress to hire more inspectors, or ask for more work from the inspectors now employed.

The fact is that the inspectors just aren't investigating a lot of postal crimes anymore. They find themselves too occupied with "big-time" cases of postal crime to investigate such things as mailbox vandalism and the theft of checks from mailboxes. They spend their time and their manpower in New York and Chicago and Los Angeles, rather than the smaller cities and rural areas of Tennessee. And even in Tennessee, the productivity of the inspectors we have has fallen off rather dramatically. Nationwide, convictions of postal crime suspects have declined by 75 percent over just five years.

I have conducted an extensive investigation of this problem over a period of several months, and have concluded that the fault does not lie with the postal inspectors themselves or with the fine Postal Service personnel in Tennessee. The fault lies with Mr. Bolger and the top management of the national system.

I questioned Mr. Bolger about his policies at considerable length during a recent hearing of the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee. Frankly, his answers were not very responsive. I have submitted several follow-up questions to him in writing, and I expect answers soon. If he is no more forthcoming in those answers, and if he don't see some significant changes in his attitude toward the victims of "minor" postal crimes, I am going to suggest some very strong congressional action.

Meanwhile, here is one example of the preposterous lengths to which the Postal Service goes in escaping its responsibility to investigate crimes: A Kingsport resident is the victim of repeated mailbox vandalism. When he complains to the Postal Service, he is told that the mailbox is private property and the incident should be investigated by the local police.

But when newspaper carriers want to put their newspapers into mailboxes, they are told it is a violation of the law, because mailboxes are for official federal use only. Clearly, we can no longer allow the Postal Inspection Service to pick and choose, on its own, which laws it wants to enforce.

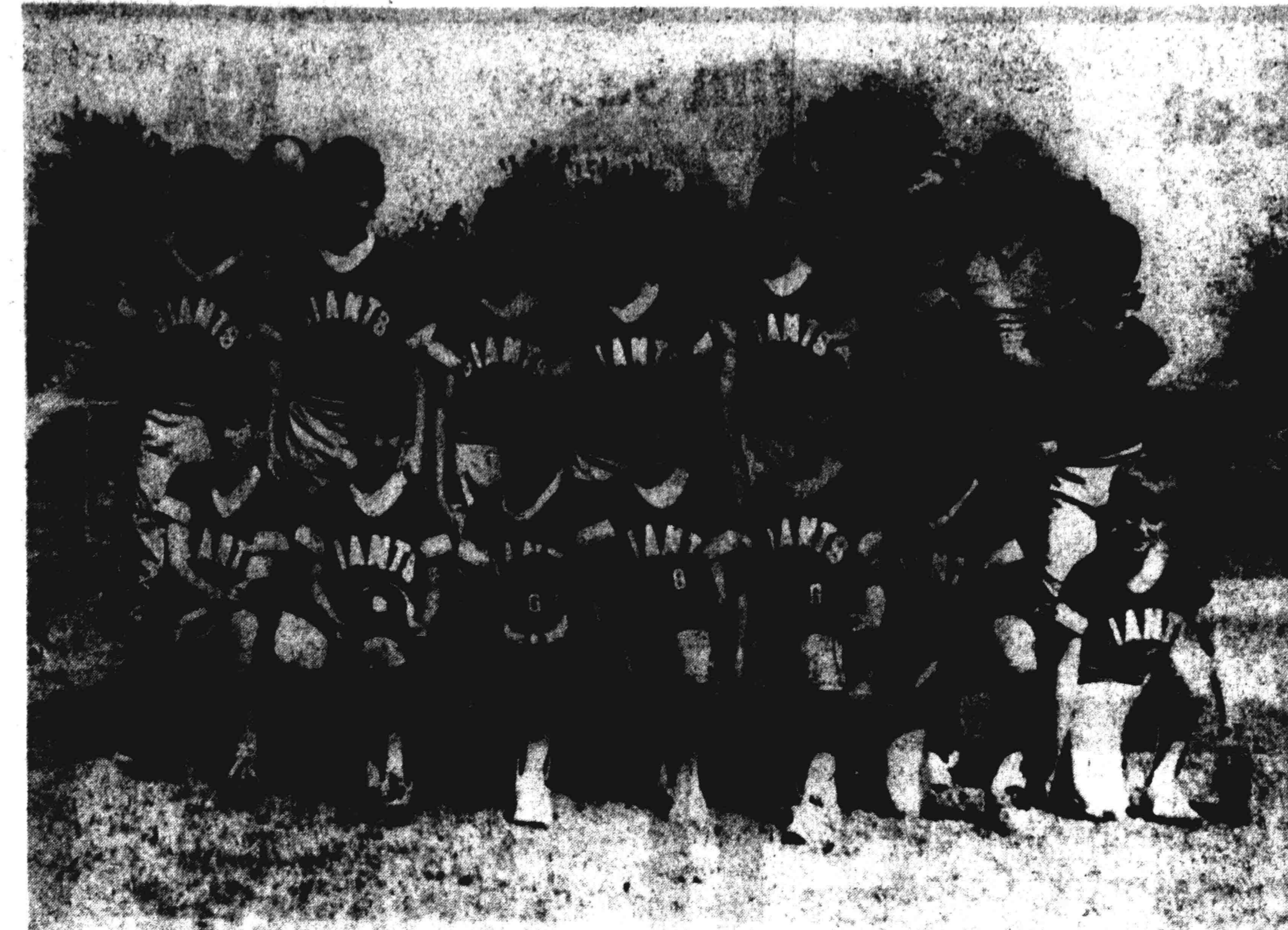

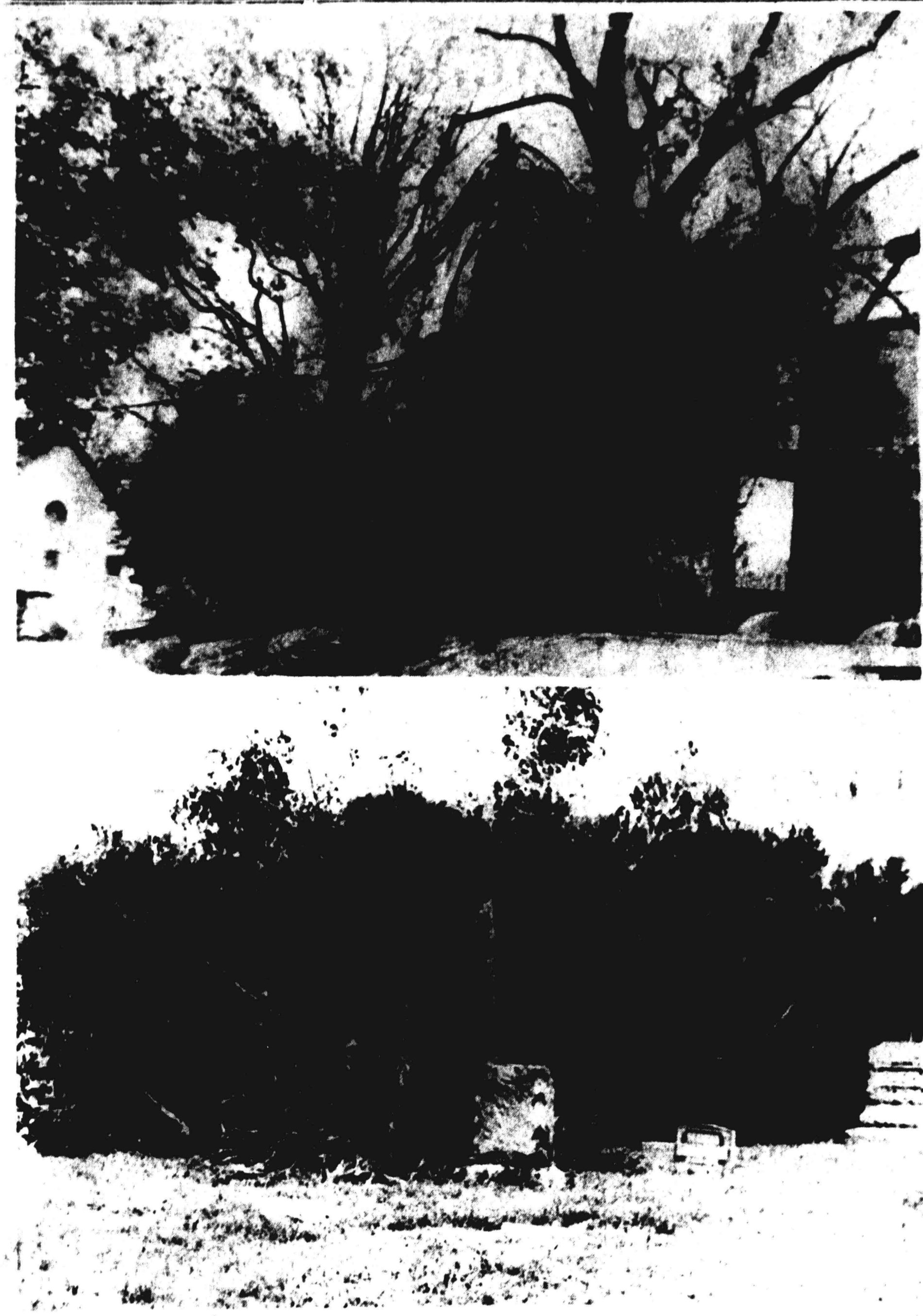

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

Recently, the House took action on legislation which appeared on the surface, to be rather straightforward and simple. Unfortunately, by the time it came to the floor of the House it was embroiled in a number of questions and Constitutional challenges. The bill was the Equal Access Act, a bill which was written to clarify a two year old Supreme Court ruling.

The intent of this legislation was to provide legislative authority to allow student-initiated religious groups to use public school facilities to hold meetings. It was designed to extend to the secondary school level a 1981 Supreme Court ruling that applied to colleges and universities. In that ruling, the Court voted 5-4 in upholding publicly supported colleges' and university's obligation to allow individual students to meet voluntarily for prayer, Bible study, and religious discussion in those institution's facilities. The Court stipulated that these meetings must be completely voluntary, student-initiated, and must not imply any state sanction of the beliefs of the participants.

That, in my estimation, sounds quite well defined and straightforward. The Equal Access Act, which was considered by the House, simply sought to extend that ruling to high schools. It even went so far as to incorporate in its legislative language safeguards against government involvement in religious activity. It specified statutory prohibitions against government trying to influence the form or content of such meetings, from requiring any student to participate in the meeting, or spending public funds beyond the cost of providing the meeting space. What it simply tried to do is insure that student religious groups who wished to hold a meeting on school property would be able to use those facilities just the same as other school groups. The

prayer. In reading the bill and the committee report, it appears to me that this legislation, while providing some fair and even handed treatment of all student groups in the nation's high schools, does not impose religious beliefs on any one. It even went to the pain of setting limits on the use of the school facility and the role that school or government officials could play in such meetings. It further restricted them to "student-initiated" groups.

This legislation was brought up under suspension of the rules. That procedure allows for 40 minutes of general debate, no amendments, and requires a two-thirds majority for passage. Unfortunately, though it obtained a simple majority, the 270 votes in favor of the bill were 11 short of the two-thirds majority needed for passage. I voted in favor of the bill.

The legislation, while running into some legitimate questions, got embroiled in issues that went far beyond the scope of the bill. This issue generated a good deal of interest throughout the country and I was contacted by a number of West Tennesseans who supported its intent.

The Education and Labor Committee did a very good job of putting together a well balanced piece of legislation. It had the support of Committee Chairman Carl Perkins, of Kentucky, and Rep. Don Bonker, of Washington. The decision was made to bring it up under the suspension procedure because if it came to the floor under normal procedure, it was feared that it would be amended to death.

It is indeed unfortunate that this legislation did not get the needed votes for approval. Though there is little chance that it might be considered again this year, it is hoped that it will again be considered in 1985.
